Year-Long Legislative Battle Ends

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress finally completed action on the civil rights bill today as the House passed the historic measure and sent it to the" White House to be signed into

The House vote was 289 to

House approval of the Senatepassed bill brought to an end a year-long legislative struggle conducted against a background of rising racial tensions

President Johnson is expected to sign the bill quickly in hopes its bars against discrimination will help ease the pressure of civil rights demonstrations and countermeasures taken to oppose them.

QUICK TEST Negro leaders have promised a quick test of some of the bill's provisions, and some Southern members of Congress have predicted the first results of its passage will be increased violence, not a lessening of it.

The House originally passed its own version of the bill last February, 290 to 130. In the Senate, Southerners battled the bill with a three-months debate but on June 19 the Senate finally passed it 72 to 27 in a revised form. That sent the bill back to

There was talk at one time that the President would sign the bill with a big ceremony on July 4 Independence Day, but the White House decided instead on quick action.

THE FEDERAL corrupt practices act makes it a crime for any corporation or labor union to contribute to political campaigns. A UPI dispatch from Minneapolis on June 27 said:

"Minnesota Democrats brought in about \$375,000 in two fund - raising events held tonight in conjunction with President Johnson's visit to the twin cities. U. S. District Attorney Miles Lord said an estimated 2,450 persons paid \$100 each at the party's fundraising dinner at which the President

"Other party officials said about 130 people paid \$1,000 to attend an exclusive, ticket-only, half-hour reception at which the President shook hands with the faithful party donors.

NEWS DISPATCHES from Detroit also reported that about 75 individuals paid \$1,000 each for the privilege of attending a reception there for President Johnson, and that 2,000 persons were present at a later dinner, the tickets for which cost \$100 each.

A newspaper dispatch stating that one of the large automobile corporations bought 20 tickets to the Detroit dinner may have been in error, and it could have been that the corporation executives contributed their own money to purchase these tickets. But the news dispatch reported that the politicians in charge of the dinner actually announced the number of invitations allegedly bought by the automobile company itself.

Disneyland Beats Chavez Ravine Clowns

that it is less expensive, a lot more fun, and the customer is treated far more courteously at Disneyland than at the Los Angeles Dodgers ball park. Both, I suppose are major tourst attractions, but the similarity ends

AT DISNEYLAND, practically every guide and employe bends over backward to be of service. They are polite, and they give every attention to the visitor. By contrast, it is diffi-cult to even find out what time the game starts in Chavez Ravine.

We asked the ticket salesman for the best seats in the house at the ball park. We wound up between two drinking groups, who spent the whole nine innings trying to outlast one another in a determined bout with the bottle. Amid a din of loud guffaws and slurred language, they discussed the merits of the Yankees and the Giants, neither team playing on the field that night.

THE "BEST SEATS" we requested turned out to be somewhere between the field lights and low overhanging clouds-so far from the field that few could read the numbers on the player's uniforms. But after watching the Dodgers sluggishly masquerade as professional ball players, we didn't care anyway. They seemed determined to allow the Phillies to win, and the visiting Phillies drew most of the applause from the stands.

At regular intervals of five minutes, little boys paraded among the close, cramped seats with soda pop, pop corn, souvenirs, etc. They blocked what view there was, but their shrieks did help drown out the boozers surrounding us. Coffee was 25

After a visit to both, I conclude cents, and other goodies were priced on a par with that. I don't think they cook the wieners in the hot dogs, and the mustard obviously had been watered down.

BACK AT DISNEYLAND, the prices are much lower and the food far better. In the first place, the prices are clearly posted-both for entry into the area and for the rides and exhibits. The customer is in no doubt what it will cost nor what he will get in return for his money. There is a variety of places to eat, and the several where we stopped were ample and offered well-prepared food. Courtesy follows the visitor everywhere he goes, and we saw no boozers.

The entertainment is well done, and the persons doing the acting put their whole heart in it-far more than can be said for the Dodgers. We saw nothing designed to draw away the attention of the visitor from what he came to see.

PARKING IS MUCH easier at the amusement park, and it is only a short walk to the gates. In the Ravine, the closest parking place we found-getting there two hours before the game started—was about 1½ miles from the entrance. Even the Cleveland ball park, which has practically no parking space, can offer the motorist a

better deal than that. The tinsel glitter of the ball park is tarnished in the Los Angeles version, largely by indifferent employes and a commercialism that rivals the fish markets. On the other hand, the big amusement park uses a pleasing softsell approach that wins the visitor even before he parts with his money and sees of the unusual sights. The difference between the two is striking.

Holmes Alexander Brushing Off The Space Program

WASHINGTON-Half a dozen senators, in 60 minutes, disposed of the debate on our authorization to spend clear - cut legal answer, has \$5.2 billion this year on space. Then, the bells sounded, the floor filled up, and the vote went 78-3 for the high figure. Hardly ever was so awesome a subject so summarily handled, by so few debaters in so brief a time.

Weariness from the Civil Rights hassle, boredom and ignorance in these matters of celestial nature, petty politics and personal spite far outdistanced erudition and responsibility in this discussion-as important a one as we shall have this year. To put the essence of it into a thimble, these senators set the contrasting argu-

SYMINGTON: The nation that controls Space, controls the world. Therefore, let us keep the program rolling toward a moon landing by 1970. Fulbright: The most important

'space" in the universe is the one between human ears. Ergo, let us slow down the space race, using the money for education and peace-on-earth.

BOTH ARGUMENTS are elevated and cogent, but it's doubtful if Symington won, and Fulbright lost on a matter of merit. Symington's thesis of world domination was bold and valid. The U.S.A. has no desire to straddle the earth, but if we don't, the Russians, the Chinese or the French will do so, and this must not happen. Unfortunately, however, the Space program was launched by President Eisenhower as an exercise in peaceful pursuits. He was out to "catch up" with Russia, and Mr. Kennedy was out to "get ahead" of the Russians. The national prestige of scoring Space spectaculars, culminating with a manned landing on the moon, has become the central motivation.

BUT WILL IT give us Space supremacy? The direct military benefits in this bill amount to only \$1.4 billion. The most warlike item in the whole program is the MOL (manned orbital laboratory) from which, conceivably, a nuclear weapon might be launched. It is a trifling investment if we are honestly trying to become a military power in Space.

IN SHORT, Symington's domination argument is sound, but the administration's domination policy is non-existent. Fulbright did not make this point -he's against military "domination," he said-but he did correctly finger the real reason why these huge Space expenditures will always get Congressional majorities. There are "goodies for everybody," Fulbright noted. He more than hinted that he might be supporting the big spending if more of it went to Arkansas.

Morse of Oregon represented the petty politics and personal spite which made up some of the opposition. He was in one of his customary rages. "My state is at the bottom of the totem pole," was his unabashed reason for voting to keep Space funds away from other states.

IT DESERVED a full-dress debate on whether Space programs should not be frankly militarized. We can afford to spend the extra \$5 billion a year if makes us stronger-but not if it merely buys spectaculars and spreads 'goodies'' among the states.













Charts can be misleading . . . but there must be an explanation why more advertisers use newspaper space than other kind of ad media.

It takes a little time to figure out how much to spend on advertising, but it's time that pays off. Here is a brief but basic plan for setting up an effective budget:

- 1. Figure the percentage of gross sales you spent last year on advertising. (For statistics on how much your kind of store can spend on advertising, check How to Budget Advertising for Bigger Volume, More Profits. Your Herald Salesman will be glad to show you a copy). Most retailers cannot afford to spend less than 4% on advertising
- 2. Then plan a month-by-month budget, spending more when business is off, less when you have peak-seasons. And keep an accurate record of it for a better guide next year.
- 3. Conscientiously inform your sales staff of your advertised merchandise-no advertising plan will work unless the salesman knows what the customer is talking about.

Just a last word about how to evaluate advertising . . . any kind of advertising:

Is it personal? Be sure to talk to only one person: the reader.

Is it unusual and imaginative, but above all, easy to read?

Is it a selling message?

Does it tell the customer exactly how you can benefit him. (Check to see that your ad doesn't 'brag'.)
