Approach To The Problem

State Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas, who may have a lot to say about the ultimate plan, has put his finger on a couple of points often overlooked in the problem of redistricting

Noting that the state is going to be redistricted-either by the legislature or by the courts-Sen. Parkerhouse pointed out that there are important considerations other than approaching a population equity between districts,

Congressmen with seniority are one of Texas' greatest assets, he noted. Playing hully-gully in creating comparable population piles easily could mean the election of four freshmen congressmen and the elimination of some veteran representatives through legislative edict.

What Sen. Parkhouse proposes is that districts be reshuffled on a community of interest basis that would cut across county lines. Thus, in his own home county of Dallas; he suggests that in addition to one extra congressman, other deserved representation could be gained by assigning parts of the county to adjoining districts which have interests comparable to those of Dallas.

Heretofore, solons have shown a reluctance to partition counties for purposes of representation. This time they may give more earnest heed to this possibility, especially if it offers a way to avoid letting vitally important committee positions and chairmanships go down the drain.

Supply Is Most Important

A note of irony has been sounded amidst the jubilation attending the announcement of plans for a second lake on the Colorado River. While there is unanimity of opinion concerning the need of water for area progress and development, a disident view on the location has been expressed by a number of individuals and interests in Mitchell County

One can appreciate the desire of Colorado City and Mitchell County to have a major lake in their backyard. Big Spring, Snyder, Odessa or any other city in the general area would be pleased to have such a project on their doorstep.

One also can appreciate the responsibility of engineers and Colorado River Municipal Water District directors in arriving at a decision on a project which involves the expenditure of

about 13 million dollars for which the district is solely liable. These men are expected to get the most for the money by securing the greatest supply of good water which will last for the longest period of time. When one site shows from 20 to 100 per cent advantages over another under these prime consideration, there would have to be some great, overriding reason to disregard the differences.

The purpose of impounding a new lake is to tie down water for this region. The well-being of this area, the chance for getting and sustaining industry, the freedom to grow without constrictions of thirst, are all tied to the ample availability of potable water. When considered in this light, the most effective availability of water supersedes the convenience of loca-

I had come here from the GOP Convention to get something better than the tiresome yak about "freedoms" and the meatless talk on the bare bones of political "morality."

IT WAS the right place to come because in some three decades prior to 1962 the high-principled, pioneer plane-maker, Donald Douglas, had refused to sign a compulsory union contract that would force workers to pay dues and toe the mark for the Labor bosses. But in that year, for reasons partly patriotic and partly practical, the Douglas Aircraft Company found a compromise called the "agency" shop-of which more later.

AS IT HAPPENED, both the company's spokesman and I were wearing badges. His was a security pass. I wore two emblems, one to get into the plant and the other a Convention Press pass that I'd left on my lapel. The idea that our "freedoms" were infringed by being forced to wear these tags as a condition of employment seemed far-fetched, but it's a fact that many Americans are annoved or outraged by any sort of control or compulsive membership and it's part of our libertarian code to respect these sensitive feelings.

WELL, IN philosophy more so than in physics, there is always the theoretical chance of an irresistible force meeting an immovable body. Something had to give when the company's Industrial Relations team bumped head on into the Union bargainers for the International Machinists and the United Auto Workers. The company stood on its principle-no compulsion. The Unions, sparked by Walter Reuther, contended that nonmembers got all the benefits of "Union security" and were "free riders, but the decisive phase of the battle was played out in Washington. Arthur Goldberg, now a Supreme Court Associate Justice, was Secretary of Labor and had been this generation's most brilliant, forceful Labor lawyer with a long winning streak of contracts for compulsory Union membership. At Reuther's shoulder stood President Kennedy who captained the American missile race against Russia. The practicalities were that the company didn't want to give up business to the rest of the industry, didn't want

Union membership, didn't want to risk a directed verdict from the government, but didn't want to retreat from a principle, either.

OUT OF THE soul-searching came the "agency shop" contract, the first of its kind in the aero-space industry. There was some give and take, but the "immutable" position of the company and the Unions held firm. The company protected the conscience of the minority of workers who refused to "wear a badge" of unwilling membership. Instead of joining a Union, these workers paid a fee for benefits received. But the service fee did not bind any worker to follow the political or ideological rule of the Unionmajority, nor to join picket lines, nor to be subject to fines, assessments or discipline of any sort. The Unions won out by getting the extra money and retaining their bargaining position.

THE WORLD OF labor-management is not perfectly comparable to the realm of politics, vet there is much in common. We can be grateful that 'morality" is still such a strong factor in our American affairs. Every form of compulsion is repugnant to us as a nation. Every minority deserves our serious and diligent protection, even though we believe in majority rule. And some of the timeperhaps, most of the time-we have the wisdom to find a third solution rather than stand by and watch the smash-up of two absolute forces rushing together on an "either-or" colli-

Innocence And Technicalities

I have had attorneys explain it very glibly, but I am still unable to understand how the conviction of a felon, found guilty of having perpetrated a crime, should escape the punishment society has levelled against him because of some techni-

THIS IS especially so if those technicalities have no direct bearing on the crime itself. The John Edwin Myers conviction in the court at Rusk is an example-no issue was raised whether Myers was guilty of the murder charged against him; he won a reversal of the trial because the jury "misconducted" itself in deliberating the case. As I understood the misconduct allegation some of the jurors were alleged to have made disparaging remarks about some of the witnesses and to have implied they did not regard the testimony of these witnesses very highly. In no way, insofar as I could figure out, was the basic issue of whether or not Myers had shot to death Arthur DeKraai changed by these remarks.

THERE IS THE old classic Texas case concerning the murderer who escaped punishment because it was alleged in the indictment that he stomped his victim to death but did not specify that the stomping was done with the defendant's feet. I cannot quite visualize a stomping with any other members of the body than the feet and legs but apparently the high court could.

Or the other classic where the defendant was indicted for maliciously drowning another person but in which whether case the indictment neglected to assert the killer used wine, water or some other liquid. The high court held that it was imperative the liquid involved be included in the indictment

INDICTMENTS here are simpler than the complaints I used to encounter in Oklahoma. In murder cases in that state, the slayer is charged in the

I RECALL one case here where a misplaced comma in a indictment resulted in the acquittal of a confessed drunken driver. We have had a number of instances where a slight miswording of the copied indictment has made it essential to recall the grand jury and reindict the defendant for the offense No one wants to deprive a person

of any right that is provided him by the law and by the Constitution regardless of the offense he has committed against society. No man should be found guilty of a crime when in reality the jury so finds him guilty more because of his prior bad reputation and earlier offenses rather than because of the strength the evidence in the case on trial Everyone should be accorded the American privilege of being held innocent, until proven beyond a reasonable doubt to

BUT, BY THE same token, it seems to me that in cases where the proof of guilt beyond the reasonable doubt limit is established that the ends of justice should not be thwarted because of some technicality which has no real bearing on the offense itself. Society needs protection from the evil doer as much as the evil doer is entitled to the protections the law and the Constitution afford him.

Richard Starnes Here We Go Again-In Debt, That Is

A survey shows that old Sucker Comearly and his bride, Patsy, are gleefully preparing to golf away a lot of money buying what economists, but not repairmen, call "durable

New car purchases are in the works for 9.8 per cent of American families, and 7.6 per cent told surveyers they were in the market for used heaps. More are fixing to buy household appliances than was the case a year ago. Lots more young married couples plan to do their billing and cooing in houses of their own.

tered, in shocked disarray, the moderates and liberals in the Republican party have not even begun to consider how they are to save themselves. Not only in the convention but in

the organization being put together under the orders of candidate Barry Goldwater, they have been ruthlessly shoved aside. Not much pity is in evidence for those whose uncertainty, amateurishness and, above all, their failure to understand what was happening in their party and in the country has left them in outer darkness.

UNITY IS a word invoked in speeches meant to bridge the great divide. In practice it has little place as Goldwater leaders prepare to take over the Republican National Committee and work through the separate Goldwater committees operating in almost every state.

For the present, the cry is, "Save yourself if you can." Republicans running for re-election-Senators, Governors, members of Congress, state legislators-in at least a dozen states must set their own course and try to persuade the voters they have views quite different from the two men who head the national ticket.

THE CASE in extremis is that of Sen. Kenneth B. Keating of New York. Two months ago he was rated a sure thing for re-election to a second term. Today he seriously questions whether he should run or not,

His position is complicated by the fact that a Conservative party will have a place on the ballot in November with several Goldwater types eager to run. Against Rockefeller in

BEFORE HIS nomination Goldwater was asked at the press conference about Keating's chances as a liberal. His answer was that the New Yorker had better look out or he would find a conservative Republican eliminating. him-a gun pointed at Keating's polit-

But now, in this cruel pinch, joking does not cover the fundamental split between Keating and the Congressional moderates and Goldwater. On 25 major votes in the Senate involving positions taken by the 1960 Republican platform, Keating voted 24 times in support of the official GOP position. Goldwater voted 25 times against the official party platform of four years ago and twice he was the only Republican to vote "No." That is a measure of the ideological divide.

SEN. HUGH SCOTT of Pennsylvania, the manager of Gov. William Scranton's too - little - and - too - late effort to stop Goldwater, is also up for re-election. But he is in a more fortunate position since the Democrats have had a furious dust-up in their own primary and the resulting bad feelings may carry over into November.

Gov. George Romney in industrial Michigan, Charles H. Percy, the attractive gubernatorial candidate in Illinois-these men and others like them who consider themselves moderates are in trouble. They cannot repudiate the national ticket. But neither can they run on the Goldwater

First Rights **Rulings Soon**

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) - Rulings on the constitutionality of the controversial Civil Rights Act of 1964 will be made by a three-judge federal court.

Presiding Judge Elbert P. Tuttle of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said Monday that the earliest time rulings can be given in the two landmark cases is Wednesday. A delay beyond that day would result in indefinite delay because the judges would be tied up.

In one case, an Atlanta restaurant owner contends that the public accommodations section of the 19-day-old law is illegal and that it does not cover his establishment anyway. The court completed hearing this case Monday.

A second case-hearing of which ended Friday-concerns an Atlanta motel owner who wants to enjoin the government from enforcing the civil rights law. The government has filed a countersuit to force the owner to

Tuttle and District Judges Frank A. Hooper and Lewis R. Morgan are sharing the bench for the tests of the law. Their decisions can be appealed directly to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The suit against Lester Maddox, the segregationist restaurant owner, was brought by three Negroes who were turned away from his establishment July 3-the day after President Johnson signed the civil rights






