### Luci Politics, Then Swings With Midway

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) — Luci Baines Johnson, the President's younger daughter, moved from barbecue pit politicking to the natural role of excited teenager in a whirlwind visit during the weekend.

Miss Johnson, 17, appeared at ease with all company. However, there was little question that she enjoyed herself the most during a visit Sunday to the Wisconsin State Fair.

Although she attracted more attention than any fair exhibit and was closely guarded by Secret Service agents and police, Luci had a gay time as she mingled with the huge crowd at the fairgrounds.

The high spot was the midway, which was not on her schedule. After some pleading, she was granted Secret Service permission to take a ride on one of the fast-moving amusements.

She wound up by taking rides on the calypso, the zig zag, the tilt-a-whirl and the octopus. Miss Johnson flew into Milwaukee Saturday and toured the Marquette University campus. Later she gave her support to the barbecue pit style of politics popularized by her father.

She mingled with 850 diners, who paid \$10 per person to attend the LBJ barbecue at the North River Racquet Club. Officials said 993 tickets were sold, plus other contributions.

The barbecue was the third of six being held throughout the country by the Young Citizens for Johnson Committee. However, Luci denied she was campaigning.

### Lyndon Pleads For Space Off-Limits To Aggression

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has voiced the hope all nations will join "to place the peaceful realms of space off-limits to the designs of aggressors on earth."

This hope, and the suggestion that it be accomplished through the United Nations, was contained in a statement Sunday announcing he was sending to leaders of 110 nations photographs of the moon taken by cameras of Ranger 7 before it hit the moon July 31.

He said he was sending the pictures in the name of the people of the United States as an expression of the desire that human knowledge be used for human betterment.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John Sparkman, D-Ala., reports that in 1952 Adlai E. Stevenson rejected as "demagogic" a suggestion that he promise to go to Korea in the presidential campaign.

Sparkman, who was Stevenson's vice presidential running mate that year, gave his footnote to history Sunday in a recorded radio program. He recalled that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower promised "I shall go to Korea."

The Alabamian went no further with this, but commented: "By the way, I think it may be an interesting point to note that this suggestion had been made to Gov. Adlai Stevenson, that is, that he promise that he would go to Korea and he said that it is demagogic and he would not indulge in it."

Eisenhower defeated Stevenson in 1952 and again in 1956.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. William E. Miller will launch his Republican vice presidential campaign Sept. 5 in his hometown of Lockport, N.Y., — with an assist from his presidential running mate, Sen. Barry Goldwater.

The Republican National Committee, announcing the campaign date today, said it will be "Bill Miller Day" in the western New York town where Miller was born and later practiced law.

Miller is scheduled to deliver a major speech, and Goldwater will appear on the program with him, the committee announcement said.

The Miller kickoff will follow by two days Goldwater's formal campaign launching at Prescott, Ariz. Miller will take part in that rally, the announcement said.

### Communications Rocket Delayed

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The launching of the Syncom 3 communications satellite has been delayed one day, until Wednesday morning, because of

a faulty electrical connection in the booster rocket. The satellite is to be rocketed into a stationary orbit above the Pacific Ocean, where it would be in position to televise to the United States the October Olympic Games in Japan.



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## Johnson Women Carry LBJ Campaign Across Country

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's wife and daughters are carrying the LBJ banner across the land while she awaits the formality of nomination before hitting the campaign trail himself.

This past weekend, the family operation swung into high gear. Lady Bird was traveling in the Rocky Mountains to focus attention on conservation and reclamation — and, obviously on the man in the White House.

Daughter Lynda Bird, 29, ate ribs at a barbecue Sunday at Church before taking along an assistant, Horace Busby. "I'm just here to thank people who have been working for someone I'm very fond of," Luci said in Milwaukee.

The President was more to the point Saturday when he was asked at a news conference if he expects his wife to be campaigning this year.

"She is and will be," he said.

Daughter Luci Baines, 17, fully recovered from the 24-hour flu that decked her while she was campaigning a week ago in San Francisco, was in Wisconsin over the weekend for the state fair Sunday and a \$10-a-person LBJ barbecue Saturday in Milwaukee.

Until Luci flew back to Washington Sunday night, Johnson had been alone in the White House all weekend. For services at the National City Christian Church he took along an assistant, Horace Busby.

"I'm just here to thank people who have been working for someone I'm very fond of," Luci said in Milwaukee.

The President was more to the point Saturday when he was asked at a news conference if he expects his wife to be campaigning this year.

"She is and will be," he said.

For himself, Johnson has charted a special course, and it was evident again at the same news conference.

Asked about debating Sen. Barry Goldwater, the Republican presidential candidate, Johnson said, "After the convention, if I am the nominee, we will go into all manner of how we will conduct the campaign."

Not that the President thinks it would be premature at this point to trade political barbs with Goldwater and his running mate, Rep. William E. Miller of New York. He tossed several of them at the session Saturday.

It's just that he is studiously avoiding speaking as the Democratic candidate because even though everyone knows he is going to be it, he isn't yet. All this will change after the Democrats convene next week in Atlantic City.

Meanwhile, much as the late President John F. Kennedy made politics a family operation, Johnson has put wife and daughters to work. Mrs. Johnson, an active campaigner for her husband through his long political career, is on the last leg of a 4,200-mile four-day swing through territory where Goldwater sentiment is strong.

### Barbecue Links Socially Elite With Lynda Bird

WATER MILL, N.Y. (AP) — When you weren't shaking hands with stately Lynda Bird Johnson, you were eating prime ribs cooked with a special sauce and ears of corn dripping with butter.

Even for the socially elite

summering in the fashionable Hamptons on Long Island — and a sleek, calorie-conscious crowd they looked, too — the combination was irresistible.

It happened Sunday night at the Henry Ford II mansion when the President's 20-year-old daughter in a cerise-colored dress and pearls was guest of honor at a Texas-style barbecue.

More than 1,000 persons paid \$15 each or \$25 per couple to attend the affair. They left — some long after Lynda Bird had retired for the night — looking pleased and well-fed.

They had consumed 200 fried chickens, 400 pounds of prime ribs and most of 6,000 to 7,000 pounds of barbecued beef, plus corn, cole slaw, baked beans, sourdough biscuits and hundreds of fried apple turnovers, all prepared on the spot under the direction of Walter Jetton, President Johnson's favorite barbecue chef.

Tonight, still on the barbecue trail in pursuit of votes for her father, Lynda is appearing at a second chuckwagon cookout at Gracie Mansion, official New York City residence of Mayor Robert F. Wagner. Robert Wagner Jr., will be host along with Charlotte Ford, 23-year-old daughter of Henry Ford II.

Miss Ford, a beautiful blonde with a Riviera tan, shared host honors in her own summer home Sunday night with actor Paul Newman.

### Chicago Cops Probe Bombs

CHICAGO (AP) — Investigators were seeking clues today to two more attacks on Chicago area businesses—the latest in a long series of bombings and arson.

A gasoline-fed fire at a west suburban restaurant and the bombing of a south suburban tool and die plant Sunday came two days after a special grand jury was called to probe the wave of attacks.

The bombing and fire brought the total to 71 in the Chicago area since January 1962. None has been solved.

The fire charred the rear section of an old farm house in Hillside being remodeled to open later this month as an eating place — Lulubelle's Restaurant and Cocktail Lounge.

Directly across the street from Lulubelle's stands the burned-out remains of another restaurant, the Lilac Lodge, which closed in May after arsonists apparently touched off a blaze there. Both places are owned by Joseph Wilkos and his son, Robert.

The elder Wilkos testified in 1958 before a congressional committee investigating possible union racketeering in Chicago area restaurants. However, Robert Wilkos said he does not believe the testimony figured in either arson case.

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The excitement starts ahead of the convention's opening, August 24.

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# GOP Efforts Under Study As Labor Forces Convene

BROWNSVILLE (AP) — Organized labor forces opened a state convention today with Republican efforts for union support the major topic of discussion.

The annual meeting of the Texas AFL-CIO continues through Thursday.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D. Tex., warned in his keynote speech that Republicans are making a special effort to woo the Texas working man.

Backers of GOP presidential nominee Barry Goldwater have said recently Texas may be one of the deciding states in November.

"Are you listening to the battle cry of the dinosaur Republicans who are out to take over Texas and the nation?" Yarborough asked.

"Are you listening when the Republican party says that extremism is all right? Aren't they really saying that union busting is all right? . . . These 1964 style Republicans don't want your support but they are putting a bounty on your scalp and they are willing to spend millions—they are spending millions, right here in Texas between now and November. . . If too many wage earners fail to wake up in time, we are not more than four years from the death of the present American economic system that you helped to build, the system that respects the rights of labor."

Yarborough referred several times to his November opponent, GOP senatorial nominee George Bush, Houston oilman and son of a former Connecticut senator.

"We will not be frightened, intimidated nor slowed down by the \$4 million of Wall Street investment banker money now on the line for my opponent in an effort to buy from Texas a seat in the U.S. Senate for Connecticut and Wall Street," he asserted.

Yarborough spoke after a special filmed message to the convention from President Johnson was delivered.

In pre-convention action Sunday, the state AFL-CIO executive board adopted a resolution praising President Johnson's war-on-poverty legislation.

The Texas State Industrial Union Council, representing 50,000 industrial labor union members within the State AFL-CIO, ended its annual meeting with passage of a resolution calling for defeat of all political candidates "who support extremist philosophies."

No candidates were named but the resolution referred to the John Birch Society and said the council "fears for the welfare of this nation because of the takeover of the Republican party by these extremist groups."

The council asked the State AFL-CIO to join with Mexican labor unions in an organizing drive throughout the Rio Grande Valley—"the worst pocket of poverty in Texas."

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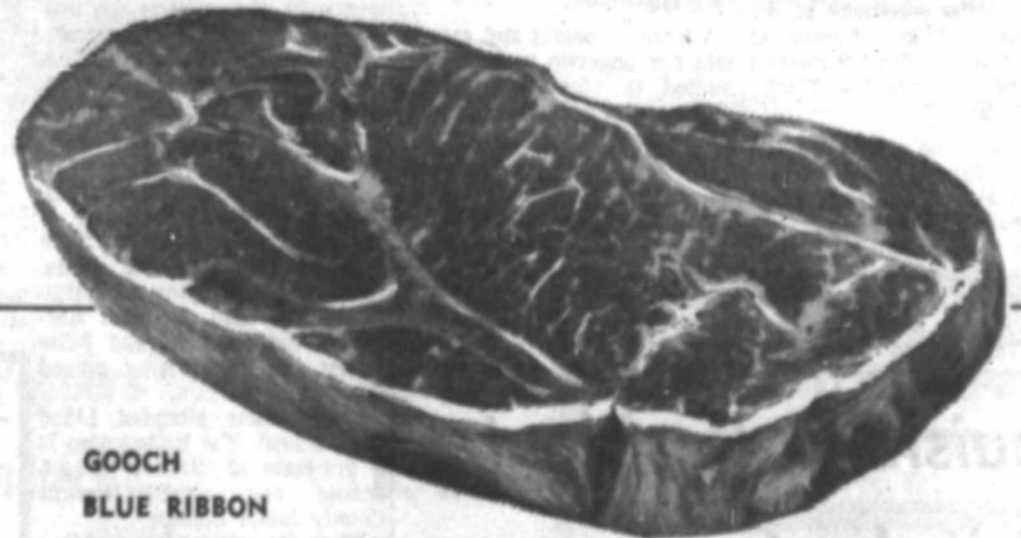

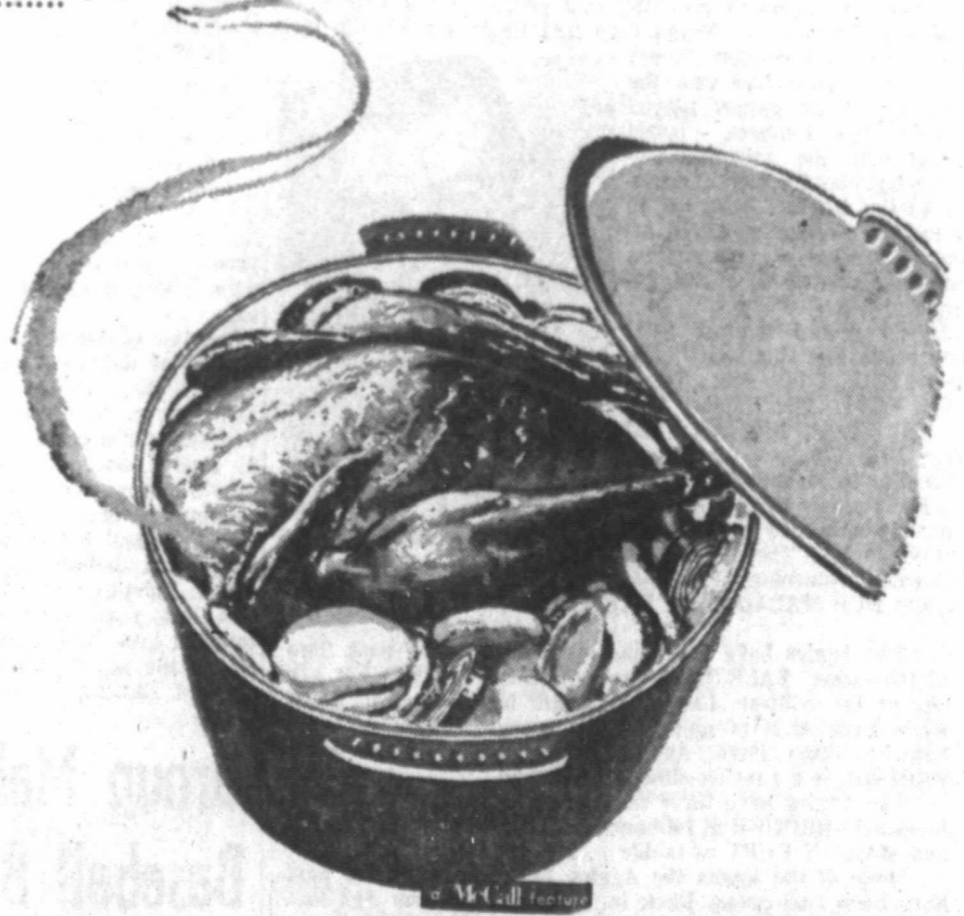

A Negro, idly drumming his knuckles with a pencil, frowns in concentration over an algebra problem. One is from a windswept reservation on the Great Plains, the other from the slums of Harlem.

## New Beltway Encircling Capital Open To Traffic

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new 65-mile beltway encircling the nation's capital is opened to traffic today. The \$189-million high-speed artery bypasses the traffic clog of the inner city and cuts through the sluggish crawl of the urban sprawl. It is designed as a boon to distance travelers seeking to avoid involvement in the metropolitan morass. It brings into closer relationship the business and social interests of the capital's satellite communities. It already has generated shopping centers and service establishments and enhanced property values along its route.

## Two Injured In Weekend Affrays

Two men went to hospitals with knife wounds, and two others were arrested by Big Spring police early Sunday morning following affrays at Gomez Ballroom on Northwest Fourth.

One of the arrested was a 15-year-old boy who is being held for the juvenile officer. Aggravated assault charges are pending against a 20-year-old man who is also in the city jail.

Joe A. Gonzales Jr., who lives on the Lamesa Highway, was treated for stab wounds at Medical Arts Hospital and released. Salvador Sanchez, living in the 300 block of Northwest Third, was treated and released at the Howard County Hospital Foundation.

## Italy President's Condition Grave

ROME (AP) — President Antonio Segni's condition still is grave, his doctors reported today. "There was no significant change during the night in the president's condition, which remains grave," the doctors said. Presumably Segni, 73, was in a coma for the third successive day. Little hope was held for his recovery from the stroke he suffered 10 days ago.

## Picketing, Riots, Looting Spark New York Weekend

NEW YORK (AP) — The city had a noisy weekend of unrelated demonstrations — some peaceful, some not — plus youthful rioting and looting after a dance.

SATURDAY: Police battled demonstrators protesting U.S. involvement in Viet Nam, and there was a protest against alleged police brutality in the Bronx.

SUNDAY: Greek-Americans staged a protest parade and hunger strike against Turkish military activities in Cyprus; several Broadway store windows were smashed and looted by teenagers; Harlem churches staged a peaceful rally to repudiate racial violence.

The Viet Nam demonstration flared into a pitched battle with police. Several of the 250 demonstrators were knocked to the ground — to the cheers and taunts of spectators. Police arrested 40 persons, including four just returned from an illegal trip to Cuba.

The marchers, members of a self-described "May 2" movement, named for the date it was formed, tried to demonstrate in Times Square. Rallies have been banned there since the spring of 1962 when 42 persons were arrested while protesting the late President John F. Kennedy's decision to resume nuclear testing in the atmosphere.

Police told the group they could rally at Hammarskjold Plaza, across from the United Nations seven blocks east. The marchers reluctantly headed east, but scuffles with police broke out at three intersections and at the Plaza.

Police described many of the participants as members of the Progressive Labor Movement, the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, and other organizations. About 25 members of the Congress of Racial Equality picketed a Bronx police station protesting the shooting of a Negro youth and a Puerto Rican youth by a white police officer.

For about five hours pickets distributed leaflets calling for the suspension of the patrolman. Police said the Puerto Rican youth was involved in a stolen car incident and the Negro teenager was fleeing from the scene of a supermarket robbery. Neither youth was hurt seriously.

Near the United Nations Sunday, 18 young men and women, many in the second day of a hunger strike, led a parade of 750 Greek-Americans protesting Turkish military activities in Cyprus. About 3 a.m. Sunday, a dance broke up at the Palm Gardens on West 52nd Street, and from 1,000 to 1,500 patrons emerged.

About 500 of the patrons, mostly teenage Negroes, roamed Broadway, smashing several store windows and looting the window displays a few blocks north of Times Square. Metal trash baskets were heaved through the windows. Police said the youths dropped most of the items taken from the shops as officers arrived.

Five youths were arrested, and the rest scattered. One youth's arm was almost severed by broken glass.

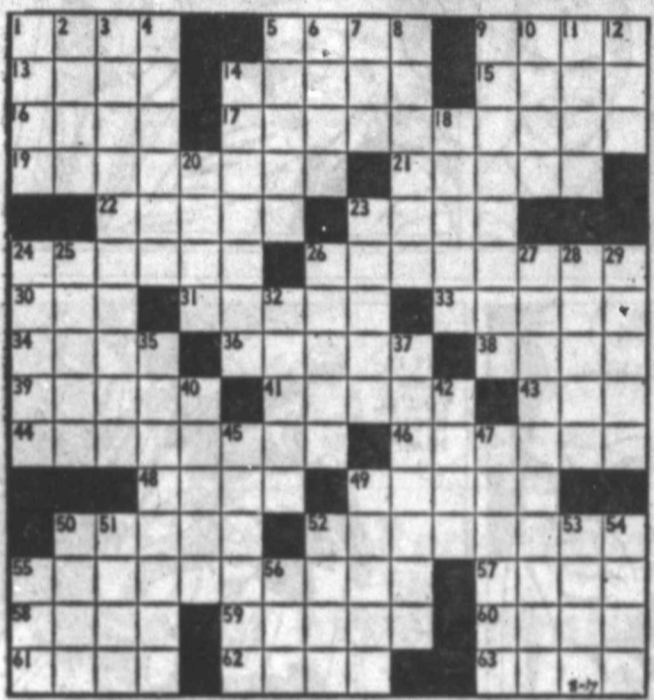

## Connally Scores Triumph In Mexico

VICTORIA, Mexico (AP) — Texas Gov. John Connally scored a hit with Saltillo residents and moved on to Victoria today on his good will tour of neighboring Mexican states.

His busy schedule called for placing wreaths at monuments of former Mexican Presidents Venustiano Carranza and Benito Juarez, a luncheon with Victoria business and civic leaders, and a tour of the state museum, a textile mill, a school and a hospital.

Connally and Gov. Praxedes Balboa of Tamaulipas scheduled an afternoon meeting followed by a news conference. Tonight Gov. and Mrs. Connally will have dinner at the governor's palace. A fireworks display in their honor also was planned.

The Connallys will complete visits to four Mexican states Tuesday when they go to Monterrey. The first stop was Chihuahua.

Several hundred Saltillo government and civic leaders at a luncheon roared approval Sunday when Connally joined the festive Mexican spirit to show appreciation for the smashing performance of an attractive, colorfully costumed girl singer.

Taking her microphone, Connally shouted: "Viva las mujeres de Saltillo."

Later the singer presented him a blue carnation she wore in her hair. The audience laughed as the grinning Connally placed it behind his left ear.

His fast paced Sunday began with an airport reception by Gov. Braulio Fernandez Aguirre. Together they laid a wreath at a monument to Gen. Ignacio Zaragoza, a reform movement leader in the 1850s and 1860s, at a downtown park.

The Texas governor then addressed the Coahuila state congress, emphasizing the two states' position, historical ties of revolution and efforts to achieve "freedom of the individual."

The Coahuila governor told Connally his visit "means to us a demonstration of thoughtfulness that promotes one of the most important tasks of the modern world — friendship among men to obtain harmony and peace."

Connally reviewed tourism projects in Coahuila and Texas and said: "A strong tourist program in Texas benefits Coahuila and your program in Coahuila benefits Texas."

The two governors spent almost two hours touring a federal social security hospital, where Connally handed out to children in a drawing class ball point pens inscribed with his name.

The Saltillo governor entertained the Connallys at a lavish evening dinner.

## Rusk Lashes Recklessness

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk warned today against "reckless words or deeds" while telling Democratic platform writers "we do approach our problems soberly and responsibly."

With this claim of balance in the pursuit of foreign affairs, Rusk launched the platform committee's formal work of writing a party declaration for the presidential campaign.

A roaring debate over foreign policy seems assured. The Republican platform charges the Johnson administration with "weakness before communism" while some Democratic spokesmen have said a Goldwater administration foreign policy would be dangerously impulsive.

Rusk never mentioned Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, the Republican presidential nominee, in his prepared testimony.

"President Kennedy faced the missiles in Cuba and President Johnson in the attacks on American naval vessels in the Gulf of Tonkin," Rusk said. "We do not draw back from the confrontation between the free world and the world of coercion."

He went on: "Only once in history, in October 1962, (the date of the Cuba missile crisis) have nuclear powers come face to face with imminent possibility of nuclear exchange.

"It is not an experience to be lightly repeated."

Insisting that "our basic national policies are producing good results," Rusk said: "This is no time either to quit, or to indulge in reckless deeds or words which would cost us the confidence of both allies and other free nations and stimulate irrational action by our adversaries."

"Under President Lyndon B. Johnson, we are on the right track. Let us keep on it."

## Author-Painter Buried Sunday

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Gerardo Murillo, better known as "Doctor Atl," was buried Sunday. Scores of this country's foremost personalities attended the funeral.

Dr. Jaime Torres Bodet, Minister of education and personal representative of President Adolfo Lopez Mateos, headed the cortege. He was among those who spoke at the graveside in praise of the life and works of the notable painter and writer, who died Saturday.

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## Upstate Legislator Jumps Into Race Against Kennedy

NEW YORK (AP) — Rep. Samuel S. Stratton of upstate Amsterdam has formally announced for Democratic nomination to the U.S. Senate amid more declarations of support for Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy for the nomination.

Kennedy is reported to have the backing of party leaders in counties which have well over a majority of the 1,144 votes in the Democratic state convention here Sept. 1.

Stratton said in his announcement Sunday that nominating Kennedy would give the Republicans a "million-dollar issue" for the campaign.

This was a reference to the fact that Kennedy lives in Virginia and maintains a voting residence in his native Massachusetts. Supporters of Kennedy

say that, under the U.S. Constitution, he would be eligible to run for the Senate if he established a residence in New York state by election day. His opponents contend that New York state laws have stricter requirements, which make Kennedy ineligible.

Stratton said in his announcement on the WBCS-TV "Newsmakers" program that the state should be represented by someone who lives in the state and "who understands its problems."

He said nomination of Kennedy could hurt President Johnson's chances of carrying New York state. Johnson has declared himself neutral in the contest.

Stratton said his supporters will conduct a floor fight at the state convention, if necessary.

Latest declarations of support for Kennedy came from a group of 12 prominent Democrats and from Edward N. Costikyan, Democratic leader of New York County — Manhattan.

The last public word from Kennedy was his week-old declaration that he would not consider running without "express approval" by Mayor Robert F. Wagner, the state's leading Democrat.

Wagner, who has repeatedly spoken favorably of Kennedy as a possible candidate, continued to withhold an endorsement.

President Sends Salute To Sukarno

MEXICO CITY (AP)—President Adolfo Lopez Mateos sent a congratulatory telegram Sunday to President Sukarno of Indonesia on that country's national holiday.

In Mexico City, Indonesian charge d'affaires R. Soeparti, Tijokrono laid a floral wreath at the Monument of Independence.

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## Child Saved After Rape, Being Thrown Into River

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — A 9-year-old girl who was raped and then thrown bound and gagged into a river was rescued from a sandbar Sunday.

The blonde child, her hands and feet tied, was pulled from water up to her chin by a lawyer who heard her cries and rowed to the fog-covered sandbar.

The girl, a minister's daughter, was standing on the submerged sandbar inches away from swift current in the St. Joseph River just across the Michigan state line seven miles north of here.

"It must have been a guiding hand that protected her — that was the only thing that could

have," said Police Capt. Orson E. Harmon.

Police said the girl was abducted near her South Bend home Saturday and was assaulted twice during a night of horror in which she was forced to lie prisoner for hours in the trunk of a car.

A self-employed tree trimmer, Bruce Dishman, 34, was arrested by South Bend police after the grade school pupil described her abductor and his auto. Harmon said the child identified Dishman in a police lineup.

The captain quoted the tree-trimmer as admitting he was in the girl's neighborhood Saturday, but refusing to make any further statement. Harmon said Dishman had served prison terms in Indiana and Michigan and had a record of child molesting arrests.

The blue-eyed girl was taken home after hospital examination. A doctor confirmed she had been raped.

The sobbing child had been in the water for up to half an hour before lawyer Joseph Low, Niles, Mich., and his wife, moving into a home near the river, heard her cries. She had worked loose a gag made of a man's undershirt after being hurled over the side of a bridge 21 feet above the water.

"A few feet east of the sandbar the water would have been way over her head," said Harmon.
