Thurmond, who carried South Carolina today said Thurmond, 61, has decided to become a Republican because he believes "there should be a realignment in American politics — with all liberals in one party and all the conservatives in the other."

Schools are built within certain areas to make them convenient for the clientele to be served. While this may not be altogether ideal, it is considerably better than artifically uprooting children.

#### Big Job Ahead For Goldwater

This could describe the presidential race now under way, provided the current second - place runner really learns in time how to run for the highest office in the land and can evercome the handicaps of publicity against him which benefit his com-

PRESIDENT JOHNSON has had a masterful job of publicity done in his behalf. From the moment he came into the White House on Nov. 22, 1963, the eyes of the nation have been fastened on him. He has had at least seven months of uninterrupted opportunity-through TV, radio and the press-to present a favorable image of himself to the people and to capitalize on the political assets developed by his predecessor, without assuming many of the liabilities.

The Republican party, on the other hand-being disorganized, as an opposition party usually is-did not make use of the same facilities of expression available to it. The oppo sition, of course, does not have the benefit of the vast governmental machine which engages in many a politically motivated action of an official nature and pours out statements on almost every conceivable subject that could affect the voters.

IT IS NOT at all surprising, therefore, that many of the public-opinion polls today show Mr. Johnson in the lead by a substantial margin. The polls have been wrong before-even as recently as the California Republican primary in June-but they do reflect a simple fact of life in politics. It is that whoever occupies the White House has from the outset of a campaign a long lead on any rival candidate and can be dislodged only if there is a strong protest or negative vote. This usually turns out to be more of an accumulation of grievances over things that are being blamed on the incumbent administration than necessarily an expression in favor of the rival candidate.

MR. JOHNSON seems to have a good chance to be elected-he certainly is the favorite in the betting today-but he can't be too sure of


In a discussion of the Lord's Prayer someone said that if one prays it that is enough, as it includes all the needs for everyone and requests that the Lord's will be done. What is your opinion?

The Lord's Prayer is recorded in Matthew 6:9-14 and part of it at least is repeated in Luke 2:2-4. Apparently Jesus never intended that this prayer should be often repeated, but rather that it should be regarded as a pattern upon which we should base our personal praying. This prayer is admirably suited for group praying, inasmuch as all of the requests are of a general nature. In our personal praying we usually pray for specific things. Jesus cautioned His disciples against making use of vain repetition in their praying and urged that our praying as a rule should be done in private. It is interesting to note that Christ always prayed short prayers in public-and long prayers (all night often) in private

When all this has been said, it must be also added that no more beautiful prayer has ever been made than what we commonly refer to as the Lord's Prayer. If the occasional repetition of the prayer does not make it mere form and routine, then it certainly would express the noblest aspirations and desires of the human heart. To make the prayer take on its true meaning one must be able to address God as Father and this can properly be done only by those who have received Jesus Christ as Savior.



# **Two Negroes** Win Alabama **Council Jobs**

TUSKEGEE, Ala. (AP) The first two Negroes elected to public office against white opponents in Alabama in almost a century say they will represent all of the people regardless

A clergyman, the Rev. K. L. Buford, and a college professor, Dr. Stanley Hugh Smith, made that promise after winning seats on the Tuskegee City Council in Tuesday's runoff election.

The heavy Negro vote in this racially conscious city where Negroes outnumber white residents both in population and in registered voters also brought the defeat of Mayor Howard Rutherford, who sought a second four-year term.

CAR DEALER Rutherford lost to another white candidate, Charles M. Keever, a used-car dealer who received the backing of most Negro voters. Keever got 943 votes, Rutherford 732.

Buford was a leading figure in the voter registration drive which, with the help of a federal court order, gave Negroes a voting majority both in Tuskegee and throughout Macon County. He won over incumbent Dr. Riley Lumpkin, 918 votes to

James Brawell, 918 to 704. Buford, waiting outside the National Guard armory where the city's six voting machines were set up, promised to "try to do a good job in representing the total community.











federal controls. Ernest Miller Jr. of Houston said the federal government already is the industry's biggest single customer and at the same time has at least 80 departments which, in some way, control the industry's activities.

"In my book, that makes Sam the most influential partner we have," Miller told Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association members at a meeting of the Arkansas and Louisiana divisions.

"It is incumbent on the petroleum industry to do the things necessary to protect what management control we have left,'

Miller specifically criticized what he called exhaustive statistical demands on the oil and gas industry. Such requirements might be the forerunner of new federal economic controls, he


