The average income of our owners is a little under \$175 a week.







## Excise Tax Overhaul Due

Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon had anticipated the President's announcement. In a speech to a recent meeting of the National Industrial Conference Board, Dillon issued a timely reminder that the next logical step in federal tax policy is to use any opportunity for tax reduction to remodel the hodge-podge structure of federal excise (or sales) taxation.

"By next year," Dillon said, "we should be in a position to undertake an overhaul of the welter of excise taxes remaining from World War II days. We have about 75 categories of such taxes on the books today, and their labyrinthine complexity requires

Campaign debate on the tax issue not the random repeal of a few taxes a comprehensive study of them all ...

There are two basic reasons why federal excise tax reform is needed. One is that the wartime taxes were designed for purposes, or effects, now contrary to national economic policies. The other is that the states are heavily dependent on sales taxation, and federal competition for that source of revenue should be minimized so that the states can finance state-level functions and prevent undue governmental centralization.

Secretary Dillon's tax proposal may be lacking in election-year political glamor, but it makes fiscal common sense. And a realistic expectation is that the 89th Congress' tax action will concentrate on his recommendations for overhauling the outmoded federal excise tax structure which is both a drag on the economy and a cause of federal-state imbalance.

We found one notation, and only one where, in the course of a routine annual examination. Dr. Kober recorded "mental and emotional tension" for which he advised "rest and relaxation." The doctor called it "remarkable" that a man who lived so adventurously in mind and body should show a medical record of frequent and regular checkups "with entirely normal reactions." He added:

"To my knowledge Barry has never had any evidence of nervous breakdown or mental abnormality of any sort. There have been occasional times when he has been fatigued from prolonged periods of work - such as the opening of a store at Prescott in 1938. But never, even at that time, did he require medical attention or even examination."

Dr. Kober carries the highest credentials of his profession. Since 1942 he has been a Fellow of the American College of Physicians, from 1948-57 he was Governor from Arizona for the American College of Physicians; he has been Secretary of the Arizona Medical College and is now an honorary staff member; he's been chief of staff at St. Joseph's Hospital and chief of staff at St. Luke's Hospital, both in Phoenix. He served as a wartime Navy Commander in the medical corps of that service, and was on

# Tax Exemption And Political Activity

WASHINGTON - Many organizations directly or indirectly related to religious or educational institutions have broken precedent in recent weeks by coming out in favor of the election of one or the other of the presidential candidates. They probably do not realize that they may lose their own tax exemption and that individuals who contribute to such organizations may not be able to claim deductions as they usually do when donating money.

THERE HAVE BEEN more such incidents in the present campaign than in any other in history. Many religious organizations, to be sure, which have not announced in favor of a particular candidate have nevertheless become related to the political campaigns in one way or another, or their spokesmen have appeared before members of Congress to influence the passage or defeat of particular legis-

UP TO NOW, it has generally been assumed by many of these organizations that if campaigning or intervention in politics was not a "substantial part" of their activities, they would be immune from any penalty. But a careful reading of the internal revenue code, as enacted by Congress, shows that the definition of such tax-exempt organizations is divided into two parts. One relates solely to propaganda activities or attempts to influence legislation. The other, which is independent of the first, specifically eliminates from the tax-exempt status any organization which participates in political campaigns on behalf of any candidate.

MANY WHITE and Negro organizations involved in the "civil rights" controversy have been getting into the field of public-affairs discussion in recent months, as they have a right to do under the "freedom of speech" doctrine of the Constitution. But they depend for their support on contributions from the public. It is possible for some organizations not to be required to pay income taxes and to be regarded as a nonprofit organization -such as labor, agricultural or business associations of various kinds or private clubs-but contributions to this type of organization are not deductible on the income-tax returns of the

MANY CHARITABLE, religious and educational organizations, however, are dependent on the contributions of companies or individuals who, in turn, can take a deduction for these on their income-tax returns. These organizations are granted by the Treasury Department the privilege of advising prospective contributors that their individual or company donations will be tax-deductible. But if such organizations engage in prohibited activities, they can lose their own tax-exempt status, and this, of course, eliminates also any tax deductions for contribu-

Certainly publications in the religious or educational field may carry on as a consequence of gifts or subscriptions by the general public, and the issue will not arise unless these same publications have had a taxexempt status of their own and have been able to tell their contributors that they would get a tax deduction if they made a donation.

IT COULD, of course, turn out that much of this will be swept under the rug by whatever administration is in power next January. But the fact remains that the law of the land states specifically what are prohibited transactions if tax exemption is to be preserved. Many contributors who have hitherto been permitted deductions on their income taxes for their donations to certain religious and educational organizations may be subject to taxation without any deduction whatsoever for these contributions during 1964 because the organization has come out in favor of the election of Senator Goldwater or President Johnson.




