An Unique Document

No one expected that the Warren Commission report would lay at rest all speculation over the assassination of President Kennedy.

All a straight

The commission report, however, has accomplished its primary task of assembling all available information pertaining to aspects of the tragedy, then sifting as much of the unsubstantiated and irrelevant chaff from the wheat.

The report speaks for itself as to the painstaking care with which it was compiled and the attention to the smallest detail. Both the calibre of the commission itself and the staff, and the prompt but unhurried checking of rumors and rumor of rumors have contributed to as thorough a document on the case as could be assembled now.

This is a document unique in Amer-

ican annals, but it will serve a useful purpose. As noted in the beginning. any tragedy of such dramatic and universal proportions always lends itself to elaboration and to conjecture. But for now and for the years to come. the commission report will be the basis of answering in advance idle rumors and of furnishing a guide for e"aluating future evidence. In short, histories of the event will have to be a lot more meticulous in their analysis of the event because of the documentary detail of the report.

One of its greatest strengths, however, is in its recommendation for steps to help avert any such happening. Even security personnel grow careless and they assume too much, and a prodding now and then is needed.

Problem Of Immunity

Congress, which has persistently refused to pass a code of ethics or conflict-of-interest law applicable to itself, had a pointed judicial reminder recently of its responsibility for the behavior of its membership.

The reminder came from the United States Fourth Court of Appeals in the case of former Rept. Thomas F. Johnson of Maryland. Johnson had been convicted in trial court for conspiracy in connection with the savings-and-loan scandals in his home state. The federal appellate court recognized evidence "sufficient to support a guilty verdict on all counts," but ordered a new trial for the former congressman because a speech he made in the U.S. House of Representatives was introduced in evidence and might have prejudiced the jury.

The Constitution states, in reference to senators and representatives, that "for any speech or debate in either House they shall not be questioned in any other place." That provision was designed to assure free and fearless debate in Congress, by immu-

nizing its members from intimidation by other branches of the government or any private groups. And the U. S. Supreme Court has held, in an opinion by Justice Frankfurter, that "the claim of an unworthy purpose does

nct destroy the privilege." That strict construction of congressional immunity - absolutely free speech for legislators-is, we believe, essential to democratic self-government. But it imposes several responsibilities. There is the responsibility on each member of Congress not to abuse the privilege for self interests. There is the responsibility on both hcuses of Congress to set standards for its membership's behavior-and enforce those standards. There is the responsibility of the press to expose abuses of the privilege. And there is the responsibility of the electorate to hold members of Congress accountable for any misuses of the immunity. Meanwhile, former Rep. Johnson will get a new trial. And Congress next session will have another opportunity to set up a system of selfdiscipline to meet a constitutional duty far too long neglected.

Modern Mystery, That's What

They tell the story about the three football players telling how tough their scholastic work was. The boy from Tech complained that calculus was getting him down. This, said the lad from Texas, was child's play compared to differential equations.

"Boy," said the Aggie, "wait until you guys get to that long division."

WELL, I CAN feel for this old boy. For one who always had trouble with two times two and two plus two, and as one who would still be struggling in school had not a compassionate professor forgiven my mathematical sins, I have now come face to face with the mystery of mysteries. It is called Modern Math.

I SHOULD SAY we have come face to face with it, for this new acquisition has become a family affair ever since No. 3 boy brought home a fat, geography-size book bearing the obvious ti-tle of "Modern Math." This, explained the authors, is a logical and simple approach to the mastery of mathematics and a means to teach the student how to reason his way to conclusions

FAIR ENOUGH, so we turn the pages. There are simple little charts about how the Egyptians counted by using symbols which stood for one, two, a thousand, a million and so on. Then came the marks employed by the Babylonians, who like their brothers along the Nile, ascribed value only to the symbol. How it was placed in a sequence made absolutely no difference. Then came the Romans with their letters (I, V, X, L, C and M), and then sequence assumed significance. And so it progressed to cuneiform, Arabic numerals, with an extra symbol for zero.

AT THIS POINT the author began making statements, and noting smugly that "by agreement, so and so is such and such." Well, it takes two to

make an agreement, and this is where he began to lose me. With amazing rapidity he talked about whole numbers, closure, units, digits, decimals, factors, exponents, dividends, divisors, quotients, results, sums, products, integers, etc.

Nor was he content to let well enough alone, for instead of simple numbers, he began talking about base five numbers, how to write expanded numbers, how to reduce expanded numbers to base five numbers.

AFTER WEARING out two pencils, a ream of paper and all my patience, the light began to break through. At this juncture, however, the professor suddenly began making jibberish about how to work out expanded numbers when the given number has a decimal point in it. The tail in such a mess seems to go left to right in-stead of right to left, or vice versa. If this is not totally confusing, then the book hastens to plunge us into base six, seven, eight, etc., and into something skirting on the edge of algebraic equation.

TO FIND OUR WAY out of this morass, Mama acquired a book which proclaims itself to be "Modern Math for Parents." The introduction leaves you with the impression that this book will be as helpful as a Latin pony. This is cruelly misleading. Whereas we got to page 18 in Wiggy's text before we bogged down, I could not get through the first page of this simple explanation.

We had despaired, but then on the back page of a certain Sunday supplement, I noted an advertisement which said, "You can become a mental wizard in 24 hours." Memory, dynamic grasp on facts, comprehension, persuasion are all tricks, it added. just reading the ad has made me smarter already, because I'm not sending for it. Or maybe my Modern Math has wised me up.

FBI's Report On Street Violence

WASHINGTON - The Federal Bureau of Investigation-a subdivision of the Attorney General's Departmentmust have had a difficult time writing the report ordered by President Johnson on the subject of the recent riots in nine cities. The origin and causes of these disturbances have become a topic of debate in the current political campaign.

Considering the overtones of politics and the general sensitivity at this time about government-written reports on controversial issues, the FBI did a good job, and left it to the public to read between the lines.

THE REPORT says there was "no discernible pattern of organization of the riots from city to city," but that in each case "as mob spirit swept through the crowd it became increasingly unruly, began stoning police officers and civilians and the ominous surge of a mass of violent people bent on destruction spread through the streets."

"A common characteristic of the riots," says the FBI report, "was a senseless attack on all constituted authority without purpose or object. While in the cities racial tensions were a contributing factor, none of the nine occurrences was a 'race riot' in the accepted meaning of the phrase. They were not riots of Negroes against whites or whites against Negroes. And they were not a direct outgrowth of conventional civil rights protest. Victims of the rioting were often Negro store owners as well as white. Their assaults were aimed at Negro as well as white police officers struggling to resore order."

The FBI faced a dilemma also in writing its report about alleged Communist activities in connection with the riots. The FBI says:

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A NUMBER of charges have been made that various organizations instigated the riots in one city or another. These charges have been carefully investigated. The evidence indicates that, aside from the actions of minor organizations or irresponsible individuals, there was no systematic planning or organization of any of the city riots."

The report goes on to say that "the Communist party U. S. A. does not appear to have officially instigated these riots, though its members were observed taking part in some." Two examples are then cited, and the report says that "two individuals with histories of Communist affiliation were instigators and leaders of the riots in at least two of the cities in New Jersey." It is further stated that "neither of them started the riots but they capitalized on them and tried to continue them."

ONE AGITATOR with a radical background was found 11 separate times haranguing crowds in a riot area, shouting falsehoods about abuse of the people in the neighborhood and inciting further and more violent riot action."

It doesn't matter whether the individual himself was officially ordered to do this by the party leaders. The fact remains that incidents like these stirred the crowd and encouraged the hoodlums to join with the angered mob in an orgy of looting and violence.
