The story of Khrushchev's remarks was related by Aiichiro Fujiyama, former foreign minister and a leading contender for the Conservative party leadership in Japan who said he talked with the former Soviet premier at a small town near his Black Sea resort.



The change of leadership in the Soviet Union proved two things: (1) That the Communist party has be come stable enough in Russia that blood purges are no longer necessary. and (2) the offices of premier and party secretary are not figureheads, but are continually subject to examination and evaluation by the ruling

During Joseph Stalin's reign the dictaiorship was absolute. Anyone who fell from favor, or who was even suspected of opposition, was liquidated. When Stalin died the only one potential dictator, the secret police chief Lavrentia Beria, was put to deathreports suggest that he had mobilized his private army and was contemplating a coup d'etat. Since then many men have fallen from power-Georgi M. Malenkov, Nikolai A. Bulganin, V. M. Molotoy, to name but three of the most prominent ones - but none of them was liquidated. There has been little to suggest that Nikita S. Khrushchev will suffer anything worse than losing his posts as premier and party secretary.

The Central Committee of the Communist party has again reasserted its primacy in all matters affecting Soviet policy. In the nature of things it is not equipped to rule-just as the President, not Congress, is able to administer the affairs of the United States. The Central Committee sets broad policy outlines, leaving administration to the premier and lesser officials. But it constantly supervises the work of all echelons and stands prepared to make any changes it deems necessary.

This is a long, long way from democracy as we have experienced it and as it is generally understood. But the Communist regime in Russiahas mellowed with the years. While watching with an ever-alert eye, it is to be prayed that the process may continue as the Russian people acquire a taste for even small bits of freedom until someday they may find that the hunger for freedom is insatiable, and thus move from under the shadow of dictatorship, whether it is by individual or by committee.

Don't Dally About Absentee Voting

Turning A Pest Into A Product

Ever wondered if all the clumps of mesquite wood in western Texas could be put to worthwhile use?

One Texan wondered this and set about figuring out a way to do so. Since World War II the practice of eradicating mesquite and other brush from West Texas range country has left masses of dead plants to be seen in portions of the ranchland. In other places, trees chemically killed can be seen left standing.

SO A YOUNG rancher near Throckmorton decided that the effort to provide more grass for livestock on Texas oft-parched rangeland could also be an offshoot for other productive activities. He had heard many times during

his lifetime in the Texas cattle country that the old-time chuckwagon cooks chose mesquite wood in preference to any other material for their It seems that mesquite has several reputed advantages in this respect-

than charcoal, burns hotter and thus makes meat cook faster and vet leaves meat with a natural red color. SO WITH all the dead mesquite available on ranches, the rancher, a

college graduate in animal husband-

ry, formed a company in 1963, constructed a metal warehouse and organized his own crews to start cutting mesquite wood. Cutting mainly 10 or 12-year-old mesquite, he has the logs sawed into two - inch pieces which are chopped into four chunks. The wood is then put into 10-pound paper bags for sale

THE PRODUCT was first sold in the Houston area but has since been expanded to some other Texas cities His ideas haven't stopped with just the wood for back - yard cooks, however, as he plans to sell larger sticks of mesquite in camping areas and to

make the sawdust into packages for use in place of moss in flower beds. Although mesquite has been used before as chips to toss on charcoal in back-yard cookouts for flavoring purposes, apparently this may be the first attempt to launch a company to process the wood for full commercial purposes.

REGARDLESS of how the idea turns out in terms of profit, it does show how someone with a strong dose of ingenuity can take something we all usually take for granted and turn it into a new usefulness. So maybe someone can think of a

THE INTELLIGENCE services functioned well on China. They not only pinpointed the atomic test site but they detected the buildup in intensive activity at the site. That made it possible for Secretary of State Dean Rusk to announce the forthcoming explosion well in advance, to the evident annoyance of the Red Chinese. But to take any comfort in the like-

lihood that a delivery system is 10 years or more away is Operation Head-in-the-Sand It overlooks the sneak methods the Chinese Communists can use if they should decide to start a nuclear war. A crude device can be concealed in the hold of a freighter and set off in a crowded arbor, and there are a dozen other ways to cloak the origin of an explosion of at least the magnitude of Hiro-

FICTION WRITERS have shown the drama of this possibility. With the origin of the explosion obscure the machinery of retribution would move with electronic speed. This is the peril in the proliferation of nuclear powers-from the present five to, say, ten -underscored by President Johnson in his sober and carefully reasoned tele-

> AT ONE POINT it appeared that American reporters would be admitted to China. The proposal foundered over the nature of Peking's demands for reciprocal admission of alleged reporters. There is excellent reporting out of China today, an outstanding example being the series by Robert Guillain of Le Monde, one of the most knowledgeable correspondents in the Far East, currently running in the Washington Post. But it is not reporting from the American viewpoint.

> Those resisting any change in the nonrecognition policy-even the "two Chinas" proposal-argue that recognition has meant little to the Western powers with missions in Peking. Diplomats live within a bamboo com pound. But this is not entirely true. and regardless of the practical gain that might come from recognition the policy of the past decade is today hopelessly outdated.

EVEN MORE deeply troubling questions must be answered as the United States pursues a confused nuclear policy with the right hand seeming not to know what the left hand is doing. Although official policy is opposed to proliferation of nuclear weapons, the Department of Defense approved the sale of tanker planes to France. Without these refueling planes the French could not deliver the atomic weapons they are creating to a target in the Soviet Union. The French nuclear potential is at best a second-class membership in the nuclear club and at worst a dangerous nuisance.

MORE SERIOUS is the American proposal for a multi-nation nuclear force. The French will have none of it. Britain's new Prime Minister, Harold Wilson, has declared against it. This leaves Germany, with possibly a reluctant Italy, as the only partner ready and willing.

The Wound That Never Healed

must be one of the fairest prospects in all the land. It nestles almost untouched by time in the gentle, rolling farmland that rests in the embrace of the continent's two mightiest rivers. Bertie Hoover, orphan, aged 10, left West Branch 80 years ago, and he is to be brought back there now, to abide forever in peace on a hillside overlooking the tiny white cottage and his father's blacksmith shop.

WASHINGTON-West Branch, Iowa,

STANDING, as I did two years ago. in the little house and the blacksmith shop, it is possible to know what it must have been like with the little boy sitting on an upturned peach basket watching his father fashion and temper a moldboard, watching a gangling apprentice work the long sweep that drew air into the bellows, digging his bare toes in the dust of the smithy floor, and loving the smells and the clang and noise of the place.

How many times did his pa warn Bertie to look out for chips of hot metal with those bare feet, and how many times did the little boy forget? Once too often, anyway, for Herbert Hoover carried to his grave the scar left by a scrap of red-hot metal he trod upon

HE CARRIED another scar away from West Branch, one that stayed with him all the way down through the rich, tumultuous years. Tell a little boy that his adored and adoring parents are dead and you tell him that the world has ended. When he was 88 years old and preparing to go to West Branch for his birthday and to dedicate the Herbert Hoover Library, Mr. Hoover revealed to me, quite in advertently, just how cruel a hurt it had

en from him within a year. I had gone to his Waldorf Towers suite in New York to chat with his dedicated and devoted secretary, Bunny Miller, to get some background on the West Branch trip, which I was to cover. Mr. Hoover had long since spared himself the burden of granting interviews. but when he found out I was there he said he would like to see me.

SO WE TALKED for a few minutes and one of the questions I asked him was what he felt was the greatest change in human existence during his long life. I was, of course, expecting something dramatic having to do with war, or peace, or the philosophy of government. Instead, Mr. Hoever spoke simply and eloquently about advances in public health and medical science. People, he said gently, did not die in their prime years as they once had. It was the brokenhearted little boy, leaving his father and mother buried on a beautiful hillside in West Branch, and going to Oregon to live with a country doctor uncle, who was talking.

It was his misfortune to dwell in the White House during a time of depression and despair, and a generation of political hatchetmen feasted off his ill luck. But bitterness was not in the man; twice he came out of retirement to head commissions on the reorganization of the government (whose toil has saved taxpayers an estimated \$4 billion), and under President Truman he again organized relief for millions of humans caught in the staving backwash of war, as he had done under Wilson in World War I.

That glorious day on which Christ's church or king-dom had its beginning is fully and plainly described in the second chapter of Acts, the fifth book in the New Test-That single day in history - on Pentecost in Jerusales exactly 50 days after the crucifixion of Christ - was filled with marvelous demonstrations of the power of God and

the fulfillment of divine prophecy and promis

You will remember some of the background for this mighty event:

(1) Old Testament prophets had foretold of the coming of a kingdom, which would have its beginning in Jerusalem (Isaiah 2:1-3) during the days of kings and would stand forever (Daniel 2:44).

(2) Jesus himself promised to build his church or kingdom and promised that Peter would be given the "keys to the kingdom," thereby granting to Peter the privilege and authority to announce the terms of admission into the kingdom (Matthew 16:18,19).

(3) Christ had told his apostles that the kingdom would come "with power" (Mark 9:1) during their lifetime, and then after his resurrection he instructed them to wait in Jerusalem for the coming of the Holy Spirit with power, which would inaugurate the grand occasion (Luke 24: 46-49; Acts 1:5).

Clearly, the establishment of the church would be accompanied by the coming of the Holy Spirit with power from on high. This is exactly what happened. These promises and prophecies and others were all fulfilled on

The Holy Spirit did come with power and moved the apostles to preach in different languages for the benefit of the Jews who had gathered from "every nation under heaven" (Acts 2:5). Peter publicly declared the divinity of Christ and pointed out that Christ had ascended to the spiritual throne of David and was now reigning over his kingdom (Acts 2:29-33).

And, significantly, in fulfillment of Christ's promise, it was Peter who first announced terms of admission into the kingdom. To those hearers convicted of Christ and their own sins, the apostle commanded:

"Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost' (Acts 2:38).

And a few sentences later, we read of the results:

"Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls" (Acts 2:41).

Yes, three thousand conversions on that first day! How were they converted? It was simple, not mysterious. They heard the gospel preached in its purity to have faith, they were convicted of their need to be saved, they repented of their sins, and they were baptized into Christ for the remission of sins. They then began growing in grace and knowledge.

Times have changed, but man's need for a Saviour is just as great today as it was for the multitudes of Jews gathered in Jerusalem on that day long ago. If you are convicted of Christ as the Son of God, and if you are also convicted of your own sins, the same divine instruction applies to you today -- no more, no less. When you are converted to Christ, the Lord in the same process adds you to his church (Acts 2:47). By becoming obedient to the same teaching, you will be added by the Lord to the same

"Disciplined Christian Liv-ing" is the title of the International Sunday School Lesson for Oct. 25, Paul writes to Timothy in I Timothy 3:14-16; 4:4-12, 16, urging the young man to take heed of his conduct.

The temperance lesson notes that one of the char-acteristics of this age is a widespread aversion to discipline as being undemocratic, tyrannical, and opposed to the free development of per-sonality. But Paul indicates there can be no improvement in any skill without discipline. The disposition of the present generation to scoff at discipline and deny its value fails to take heed of Paul's admonition to Timothy in saying "how thou oughtest to behave thyself."

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican Ecumenical Council committed itself today to producing a Roman Catholic policy statement on modern world problems such as birth control and nuclear disarmament, and Pope Paul VI dis closed his decision to hold an other council session.

The council prelates, after three days of debating a controversial schema on the church in the modern world, voted 1,579 to 296 to go on with discussion of the topic using the schema as a basis of further deliberation.

Now they must move into detailed debate on such probems as birth control, nuclear armament and world huffger.
Out of the debate an entirely
new schema is likely to emerge. The current document has been criticized by both conservatives and progressive prelates.




