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LBJs Will Get Returns At Ranch

President Johnson makes a final campaign stand on home ground today, and then retires to the semi-sanctity of his ranch to await Tuesday election returns which will end a big political year for Texas.
He visits Houston and Austin in his first official campaign stops in Texas, following by barely 48 hours an appearance in San Antonio of Sen. Barry Goldwater, his Republican opponent.

Johnson was in El Paso some time ago for a meeting with the Mexican president and at Texarkana to dedicate a memorial for the late John F. Kennedy. But his Oct. 19 campaign swing across Texas was cancelled.

NATIVE SON
Thus, Johnson's election eve arrival in the state keeps the attention where it has been all during the campaign—on a presidential race involving a native son and 25 electoral votes.

The President, Mrs. Johnson and their two daughters will fly from Washington and motor through downtown Houston this afternoon for the first of three speeches in Harris County.
An outdoor night rally is scheduled for Johnson in Austin. Then the family heads for the ranch to await the nation's decision Tuesday.

Tight security measures have been laid for Johnson's visit.
For the Houston motorcade, Johnson will use the 10,000-pound limousine, now armored, in which President Kennedy was assassinated last Nov. 22 at Dallas.

BE RESTRICTED
Commercial and private flying will be restricted during a four-hour period while the presidential helicopter is in use or standing by.
Accompanying the President will be members of the Texas congressional delegation, including Sen. Ralph Yarborough, who faces what some polls indicate may be a close race with Republican George Bush.

Yarborough toured South Texas Sunday with television actor Dan Blocker and was in San Antonio for a torch light parade to the Alamo. Yarborough also addressed a rally, and visited Brownsville, San Benito, Harlingen, and McAllen.

Bush, with an open schedule Sunday, took note of the presidential visit by calling upon his supporters in Houston and Austin "to be respectful of the President and to extend him every courtesy befitting his high office."
Bush said it was "most understandable" that Johnson was closing his campaign in Texas because, Bush said, Goldwater has made remarkable strides in the state.

NEW ASPECT
A new aspect of campaigning for Goldwater developed in Texas, as well as other sections of the country, Sunday.
Western Union offices in Fort Worth, Odessa, Midland and San Angelo reported receiving

recently returned from Saudi Arabia said ailing Saud will be free to keep his royal allowance and go to a European capital, possibly Vienna.
If he wishes to remain in Saudi Arabia, he will be permitted to do so, they added, but with almost no contact with anyone.
Saud has been treated in Switzerland and the United States in recent years for eye trouble, a stomach ulcer, high blood pressure and general debility.

EYES EUROPE
The broadcast said nothing about Saud's future plans, but reports circulating in the Arab world the past few days said the ailing ex-monarch, who had been king since his father's death in 1953, may go to live somewhere in Europe.
Reports of the impending change had swept the Arab world for several days in the wake of meetings of princes and religious leaders in Saudi Arabia.
Faisal was real ruler of the country since ailing King Saud was forced from power in late 1962.

Services were set for 4 p.m. today at the River-Welch chapel and the remains will be sent to Jenison, Ala., for final rites and burial.
He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary J. Collins, Mobile Lodge Trailer Park, Big Spring, and his mother, Mrs. Ruby M. Burnette, Clanton, Ala.

Webb Airman Dies In Crash
Airman 2.C. Benny Joe Collins, 21, 3560th Field Maintenance Squadron at Webb Air Force Base, was dead on arrival at Crockett County Hospital, Ozona, following a two-car collision nine miles north of Ozona at 10:45 p.m. Saturday.
Driver of the car in which Collins was riding, Wesley C. Hendricks, 22, of Big Spring, was not seriously injured, but was taken to the hospital.
Jesus D. Richarte of Ozona, driver of the second car, was not injured, but five passengers in his car were taken to the hospital for treatment.
Highway patrolmen, who investigated the accident, said it was a head-on collision on Highway 163.
The airman, a native of Alabama, entered the Air Force in July, 1961, and was assigned to Webb in September of that year.

SAUD DETHRONED, BROTHER SEATED
DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Saudi Arabia's King Saud was dethroned today and his brother, Crown Prince Faisal, was proclaimed king of the oil-rich desert state, Mecca Radio announced.
Information Minister Jamil Al Jufailan read a statement over Mecca Radio saying Cabinet ministers and religious consultative council, in joint session this morning, approved the dethronement of Saud, 62, and the proclamation of Faisal, 58, as the third monarch of Saudi Arabia.
The broadcast announced after the minister's statement that Faisal had accepted the decision.

REFORMER
Faisal, a reformer, claimed that Saud was too lavish with Saudi Arabia's oil income and that the money should be poured into projects to improve the lot of the nation's six million people.
Faisal became the real ruler last February after he defeated Saud in a power struggle. Immediately, Faisal imposed austerity in the desert kingdom. Gone were Saud's fleet of cars—he was permitted to keep one—and the Saud palace household of 5,000 slaves, pensioners, princes, courtiers and guards.
Sources close to Faisal say he had expressed fear that if Saud remained in power two more years the Socialist tide in the Arab world would have swept Saudi Arabia.

YOUTH INJURED IN KART MISHAP
Billy Sullivan, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Avon W. Sullivan, 809 E. 12th, is in Malone-Hogan Foundation Hospital after suffering a crushed left foot and ankle in a go-kart accident Saturday. His ankle was caught in a part of the mechanism.
His physician said his condition was satisfactory this morning, but that a three to four months recovery period would be necessary. Billy is a city route carrier for the Big Spring Herald.

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Base Attack Feared Only Start By Reds

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. military sources said today the disastrous Communist attack on the key U.S. installation at Bien Hoa could be repeated at a dozen or more bases in South Viet Nam.
"What's surprising is that the Viet Cong did not strike sooner," an American major at Bien Hoa said. "When it suits them, I am sure they will do it again."

The Viet Cong plastered the air base 18 miles northeast of Saigon with 100 81 mm mortar shells just after midnight Saturday, killing 4 Americans and wounding 31. A fifth American was killed a few hours later in another mortar attack about five miles north of Bien Hoa.

NEXT TARGET?
Some predicted that the sprawling Tan Son Nhut airbase in Saigon might be the next Viet Cong target.
The 30-minute attack on Bien Hoa destroyed or damaged 27 planes, including 20 U.S. Air Force B57 jet bombers. It also killed two Vietnamese and wounded five.

Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in Viet Nam, said elaborate measures had been taken to protect aircraft at Bien Hoa and other key bases.
Some U.S. military sources, however, believe that given the security situation in the countryside and the Viet Cong's proven ability in swift night attacks, the Bien Hoa victory could be repeated.

THREE BASES
The three biggest bases — Bien Hoa, Saigon, and Danang — have a number of things in common, all favoring the Viet Cong.
Each is surrounded at least in part by countryside where the guerrillas can find good cover. Large Red forces operate in the general area of all three despite repeated government operations against them.

"Air bases can't move and the Viet Cong literally can come in and survey the base from mortar position and drive marking stakes," an American artillery officer said.
Defenses around the bases are in the hands of Vietnamese forces, not Americans.

PATROLS ERRATIC
Patrolling is sometimes erratic and Viet Cong infiltration to within a few hundred yards of the base perimeter is not considered difficult.
Vietnamese artillery opened up on suspected Viet Cong positions but the gunners fired by guess work. The Viet Cong apparently escaped unscathed, eluding three battalions that were sent out at dawn.

JOHNSON HOPE
Although he made no predictions on the extent of the victory he confidently expects, President Johnson obviously hoped he would roll up more than the vote's record 60.8 per cent of the vote registered for Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1936. This would give him a massive victory in the 538-vote Electoral College.

GOP PRESIDENTIAL NOMINEE
Barry Goldwater was predicting the "upset of the century" would make him the winner despite the poll indicators against any such result. Privately his aides were conceding only Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Alaska and Hawaii to President Johnson.

About 100 persons were at the airport visit. W. J. Shepard, county GOP chairman, reported. Hayes left by plane for Andrews after the visit here. He has visited Midland, Odessa, San Angelo, Brownwood and Temple on the West Texas tour.
Hayes was a candidate for lieutenant governor four years ago on the Republican ticket.

Seventy Million Voters Will Choose President

WASHINGTON (AP) — The long, strident election campaign comes to a close today with every indicator of a computerized, poll-conscious era pointing toward victory for President Johnson.
In 27 hours of elapsed time, beginning at 12:01 a.m. EST Tuesday in some New England towns and winding up with the closing of polls in western Alaska, some 70 million Americans will choose a president, 25 governors, 435 House members and 35 senators.

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mate, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, will appear on a pre-taped program arranged for 9 to 9:30 p.m. Big Spring time on the NBC network.
Goldwater and his running mate, Rep. William E. Miller, will appear on a pre-taped 8:30 to 9 p.m. Big Spring time program to be carried by CBS.
Johnson heads for Texas this afternoon for election eve campaigning in Houston, Pasadena

and Austin. Then he will fly with his family to their Johnson City home to await Tuesday's returns.
TO PHOENIX
Goldwater, battling to win vital California, speaks today in San Francisco. Tonight he ends his vote-hunting travels in the little Arizona town of Fredonia, where he wound up both of his Senate campaigns. Then he flies to Phoenix to spend election

day with his family at their home overlooking the Arizona desert.
Miller spent Sunday in Washington and plans to remain in the capital today before going to his Lockport, N.Y., home Tuesday.
Humphrey scheduled rallies today in Los Angeles and Salt Lake City before winding up in Minneapolis. He will be at his Waverly, Minn., home Tuesday.

Election Judges Pick Up Supplies For Big Vote
Election precinct judges were picking up their ballot boxes and election supplies today at the office of Pauline Petty, Howard County clerk, for use in Tuesday's general election.
Nothing has developed to cause any change in the estimated heavy vote prediction for the day. It is agreed by competent observers that as many as 9,000 ballots will probably be polled. If this is achieved, it will set an all-time high for the county. The previous record was in 1960 when 8,277 votes were cast for the presidential candidates.
This year, with more than 11,000 poll tax and exemption certificate qualified electors on the

rolls, there is every reason to anticipate a large vote.
There will be 16 voting places in operation—the same voting places which have operated for many years. (It is not until 1965 elections that the four new election boxes proclaimed this fall by the county commissioners will be put in use. For this election, the old lineup of voting boxes will prevail.)
The polls open at 8 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m.
All election precinct judges are asked to report their results to the office of the county clerk or to the Herald as soon as they are completed. Most of the precinct judges will bring their ballot boxes and tabulations to the clerk's office. It is possible some of the more remote rural boxes may not be able to bring the box back to the clerk Tuesday night.
In such instances, the judges are asked to report to the clerk's office or the Herald by phone.
Voters will signify their choice in the election by scratching out the names of all candidates they vote against.
A voter can vote a straight party ticket by marking out all of the other party slates on the ballot.
There are three constitutional amendments on the ballot. To vote for these the voter strikes out the "against" proposition in each instance.
Voters who hold the limited "non-paid poll tax receipts" will

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be allowed to vote for the races shown on the ballot above the heavy black line. These are the presidential, vice presidential, U. S. senatorial and congressional races.
MORE VOTES POURING IN
Sixty-eight absentee ballots were received in the Monday morning mail by the office of Pauline Petty, Howard County clerk. Ballots received by mail which bear a postmark not later than midnight tonight will be accepted Tuesday and placed in the ballot box, Mrs. Margaret Ray, deputy, said.
She added that the 68 ballots in today's mail did not alter the total potential absentee ballot for Tuesday's election. The 788 announced Friday at 5 p.m. included the applications for ballots which had been filled. The ballots being received now from Howard County residents temporarily in other counties or states, are those for which the voters made mail applications earlier.
The special canvass board, with George Elliott as judge, will begin its difficult tabulation check early Tuesday.
The absentee ballot results are usually the first to be announced by the clerk. However, with so many ballots and so large a list of candidates, the count this time will be tedious. The special canvass board regular working force will be augmented by three workers who have been trained and provided by the County Republican organization, Elliott said.

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Showdown For U.S., Reds Seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Communist raid on a U.S. air base near Saigon early Sunday has stirred up new talk here of enlarging the war in South Viet Nam.
U.S. officials said today that events seem to be moving toward a confrontation between the United States and Communist North Viet Nam, backed by Red China, on the issue of security and peace in Southeast Asia.

The whole situation seems certain to get urgent attention from President Johnson and his top military and diplomatic advisers in the weeks following Tuesday's presidential election.

DECISIONS LOOM
Officials said the course the war actually takes in the weeks ahead will depend primarily on decisions to be made by North Viet Nam and Red China.
If the Communists decide to step up their support for the Viet Cong forces in South Viet Nam, these officials said, there is every prospect of very serious trouble ahead.

If they choose not to increase their efforts, it was said, the United States probably will follow about the same basic policy it has in the past — that is, supporting within South Viet Nam the efforts of that country's leaders to gain the upper hand in the long struggle with the Viet Cong rebels.

LEADERS HUDDLE
President Johnson met Sunday with Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara and other policy makers and experts on the Southeast Asian situation. The principal concrete action announced after the meeting was that the aircraft which were destroyed by the raid on Bien Hoa airfield near Saigon had been replaced.
Officials virtually ruled out any immediate retaliatory action against the Reds by U.S. forces. They said this was an incident within the war in South Viet Nam and not comparable to the North Vietnamese torpedo-boat attack on U.S. destroyers patrolling in the Gulf of Tonkin last August. In that case the United States made destructive retaliatory air strikes on torpedo-boat bases in North Viet Nam.

VENGEANCE ACT?
Some officials here speculated that the Viet Cong attack on the airfield may have been a delayed retaliation for the U.S. assault on the torpedo-boat bases. The airplanes which were destroyed had been stationed in Bien Hoa following the Tonkin Gulf affair.
Other possible elements in the timing, cited here, were the fact that this is the anniversary of the overthrow a year ago of the Diem regime and it is also a time when the South Vietnamese are forming a new civilian government which U.S. authorities hope will intensify the struggle against the Viet Cong.

Washington authorities said that there was no evidence indicating any link in timing between the raid and the U.S. election in which the South Vietnamese war has been a controversial issue.

Negro Leader Sees 'Plot'
ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said today a write-in campaign for him in the presidential race has been uncovered. He repudiated it and said it is a Republican maneuver.
The Negro integration leader, who indirectly has endorsed President Johnson, called a news conference to disclose what he called a plot to cancel Negro votes which he said would go heavily for the Democratic ticket.
"This is a cruel and vicious attempt to confuse Negro voters and nullify their votes," King said.

ANSWERS TO BRIDGE QUIZ

Q. 1—As South you hold:
 ♠K6 ♠642 ♠KQ3 ♠J9874
 The bidding has proceeded:
 South West North East
 Pass Pass 1 ♣ Pass
 ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—This hand is a little too good for a simply raise in clubs. Some mild effort should be made to encourage partner to go on, and the best choice is one no trump which, over a club, indicates from 9 to 11 points.

Q. 2—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
 ♠Q5 ♠72 ♠A93 ♠KJ10983
 The bidding has proceeded:
 West North East South
 Pass 1 ♣ 3 ♣ ?

What do you bid?
 A.—East's preempt has jammed up the bidding and your best action is somewhat of a guess. Three no trump seems a reasonable choice on the ground that 9 tricks should be easier to win than 11.

Q. 3—As South you hold:
 ♠Q83 ♠AK ♠108654 ♠KJ3
 The bidding has proceeded:
 South West North East
 Pass Pass 1 ♣ Pass
 ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—Two no trump. Normally a count of 13 points is required for a jump to two no trump, but after a previous pass this action may be taken with 11 or 12. A jump to three diamonds is not recommended, because partner with a doubtful holding in the major suits may not be able to bid no trump, and your hand, despite five diamonds, is of the balanced type.

Q. 4—You are vulnerable, the opponents have a 30 part score and as South you hold:
 ♠AKJ10965 ♠AK ♠K1093
 The bidding has proceeded:
 North East South West
 Pass 1 ♣ 2 ♣ Pass
 2 ♣ 3 ♣ 3 ♣ 4 ♣
 Dble. Pass ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—Four spades. While we are disinclined to override a double at this level, we feel that partner in this sequence might not visualize a seven card spade suit. If he has so much as the jack of diamonds for

us, we can score a vulnerable game. On the other hand it is possible that the opposition can be punished by more than 100 points.

Q. 5—As South you hold:
 ♠632 ♠84 ♠10973 ♠AQ64
 The bidding has proceeded:
 South West North East
 Pass 1 ♣ Dble. Pass
 2 ♣ Pass 3 ♣ Pass
 ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—Four hearts. Two small trumps are not considered adequate support on which to offer a raise, but North's bid shows at least a good six card suit and our six points should be enough to produce a reasonable play for game.

Q. 6—As South you hold:
 ♠AQ1063 ♠4 ♠KQ852 ♠32
 The bidding has proceeded:
 North East South West
 1 ♣ Pass 1 ♣ Pass
 2 ♣ Pass 2 ♣ Pass
 2 ♣ ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—We would advise you to quit while the quitting is good. This is obviously a misfit and the best place to play such hands is at as low a level as is convenient. One more bid by you may start a barrage of doubles from the enemy. Remember four suits do not necessarily spell three no trump.

Q. 7—As South you hold:
 ♠542 ♠AK3 ♠10865 ♠AK
 The bidding has proceeded:
 South West North East
 1 NT Pass 3 ♣ Pass
 ?

What do you bid now?
 A.—Generally in this situation a raise is offered to partner, but with all our values located in the other suits we would prefer to bid three no trump and await developments. If partner's hand is highly unbalanced, he may take control of the situation himself.

Q. 8—As South you hold:
 ♠862 ♠KJ7542 ♠8 ♠AQ83
 The bidding has proceeded:
 West North East South
 1 ♣ 2 ♣ ?

What do you bid?
 A.—Pass. A two heart bid is not recommended. Partner has described a hand whose virtues are to be found principally in the diamond suit. If he were interested in hearts, he would have doubled first and then shown his diamonds.

Rocket Blastoff Complex Readied

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Included in the new \$156-million Air Force Titan 3 complex at Cape Kennedy is a long, electrical extension cord with a big-plug at one end.

Somebody has to plug the cord into a huge socket before a mighty Titan 3 rocket can blast off from its pad.

Lt. Don M. Spradlin, Air Force launching pad construction officer, grins about this extension cord rocketry.

"I get a big kick out of it. Seems incredible that an old-fashioned extension cord would play such a role in the space business," he said.

The cord and plug aren't the ordinary household types found around most housewives' ironing boards. They are a monstrous cable and a huge drum powered by a winch.

MONEY SAVER

The Air Force said the cord saves a big chunk of money in wiring costs.

The new rocket launching complex is nearly finished and a Titan 3 rocket is scheduled for firing next spring.

Tall buildings and 250-foot high service towers sit naturally on islands built of shell and sand pumped up from the Banana River.

Building the complex in the middle of the Banana River wasn't the only startling move made by the Air Force.

The concept of putting a rocket together for space flights in buildings instead of on the pad is another.

Putting the control center on the third floor of the 23-story Vertical Integration Building—VIB—instead of a traditional blockhouse is another.

The Air Force calls its new program Integrate Transfer Launch—ITL. The theory looks so good the National Aeronautics and Space Administration is patterning its Merritt Island Apollo facilities after the Titan 3 complex.

Air Force Brig. Gen. Joseph S. Bleymaier, deputy commander for manned systems, explains the new spaceship philosophy:

"If we continue to tie up launching facilities for weeks at a time for each payload, it will not be long before present facilities are saturated and more must be constructed."

A LIMIT

"Since there are few areas in this country which fulfill the re-

quirements for launch sites, there is a limit to the number of launch complexes that can be built."

The Air Force would bring a Titan 3 rocket into the VIB and install all the instruments, payload and equipment needed for a flight. The rocket would be mounted on a mobile launcher and taken to the firing pad seven miles away.

Four Titan 3 rockets can be assembled at once in the gigantic VIB.

Two launching pads are being constructed, each independent of the other.

Three launch control centers are located on the third floor of the VIB, with platforms for spectators to watch the firing three miles away.

Gone is the familiar equipment associated with a launching. No more periscopes, or rows of television sets. The control room is so bare of equipment that it seems austere.

Most of the monitoring instruments are in four rooms away from the control center.

The Titan 3C is the booster the Air Force plans to use to orbit its manned orbiting laboratory.

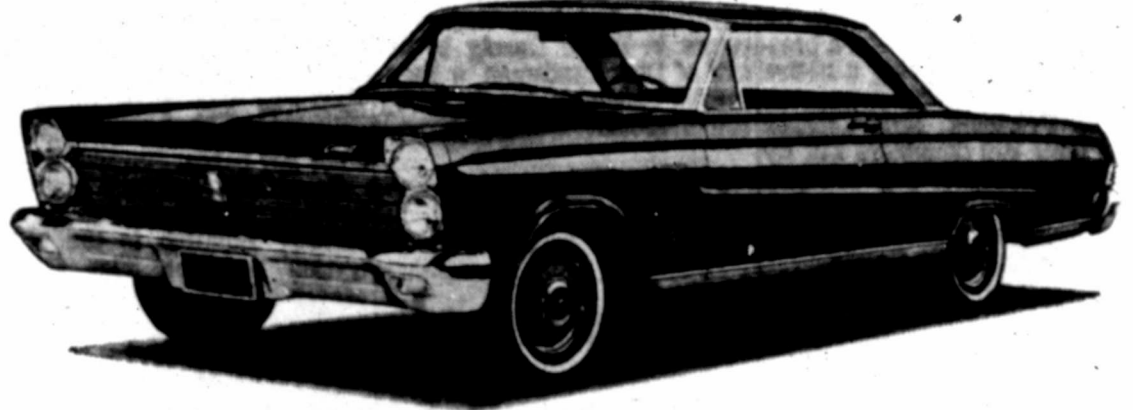

Beef Exports To Europe To Remain High

WASHINGTON (AP)—Continued high levels of beef and cattle exports to Europe are expected in 1965, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman reported today.

Particularly in demand for the export business, he said, will be feeder cattle and veal calves.

The favorable export forecast was based on continued high demand for meat in Western Europe, coupled with short supplies in most producing countries other than the United States.

Strong consumer demand has minimized the drop in prices that had been expected in Europe this fall, Agriculture Department economists said.

Instead of price drops of as much as four cents a pound that had been expected earlier, they said prices have dropped only about one or one and a half cents since mid-August.

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Congress Call On Medicare?

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress may be called by President Johnson for a post-election session to act on increased Social Security benefits and medical care for the elderly, says Sen. Stephen M. Young, D-Ohio.

There's a "good possibility," Young said in a newsletter to Ohio constituents that Johnson will call the session for Nov. 16 and that the President will appear before a joint session to urge immediate passage of the legislation.

Plane Ditched; Pilots Rescued

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—A U.S. cargo plane from the Philippines with two pilots aboard developed engine trouble Sunday and the pilots ditched it in the Formosa Strait about 15 miles south of the Pescadore Islands.

The U.S. Taiwan Defense Command said Chinese Nationalist and U.S. search planes located the pilots and a ship picked them up unhurt less than three hours after they ditched.

Voting Records Expected To Fall In Dawson County

LAMESA (SC)—A new absentee voting record was set here this year with 267 ballots cast prior to the deadline. The old mark of 180 was set in the 1960 presidential election race.

If past voting records are any indication of how Dawson County will ballot Tuesday, the trend should go Democratic and most political observers feel that a record turnout mark will be established in the process.

Estimates on the possible turnout range as high as 5,000.

Interest in this presidential election year has steadily gained momentum during the past few days. Both parties have been active, plugging their respective candidates in view of the lack of contested races locally.

Switching from a Democratic trend, Dawson voters helped Dwight D. Eisenhower carry the county in 1952. Four years later, however, the county voted Democratic. The John F. Kennedy-Lyndon B. Johnson slate lost by a slim 100 votes in the 1960 election, although the Democrats carried 10 of 18 boxes, losing in the big city precincts.

If that trend is followed again, the Democrats should win handsily here. In the precedent-shattering 1952 election, Dawson voters went to the polls in record-breaking number. A total of 4,488 persons balloted and the record still stands.

Because the county now has more registered voters than ever before, political observers forecast a new mark in 1964. A total of 6,157—plus an additional 37 unpaid poll tax holders—are eligible to vote.

Private School Lunch Provides Farm Mart

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lunches for pupils in private schools provide a \$75 million a year market for American agricultural products.

The economic research service of the Department of Agriculture reported the figure today and said the market could be expanded.

A survey of 15,300 private elementary and secondary schools—the bulk of them nonprofit church schools—provided the basis for the figure. It showed that about 3 million children, about half of the total enrolled in private schools, attended institutions participating in the national school lunch program.

On an average day, the survey showed, about 2 million of the pupils participated in the lunch program.

London-Berlin Flights Started

BERLIN (AP)—British European Airways has started daily service between London and Berlin despite East German protests that civilian flights to the Communist-surrounded city are illegal.

A Viscount turbo-prop plane carrying 35 passengers made the initial flight from London Sunday without incident.

Gains Seen For Alliance

WASHINGTON (AP)—This has been "a good year for political freedom" in the Western Hemisphere in the opinion of President Johnson's top adviser on Latin-American affairs.

Thomas C. Mann, assistant secretary of state, said in a report to the president on Latin-American policy that 1964 has seen "a new unity of purpose in making the Alliance for Progress not just a statement of goals but a reality."

More Alliance for Progress loans were made in the first six months of 1964, he said, than in all of 1963. High growth rates in Venezuela, Mexico, Central America and other countries reflect a new confidence in Latin America, he said, and this is reflected in an increased flow of foreign investment. "United States investors are investing in Latin America at about twice the rate they did in 1963," he added.

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Embezzlement Case Banker Free On Bond

VALENTINE, Neb. (AP) — Banker Richard Davenport, free under \$50,000 bond, was going back to his office today to help auditors untangle records of the State Bank of Valentine. County Atty. Richard Splitler said the figuring was expected to turn up manipulations involving as much as \$4 million.

Splitler, who filed an embezzlement charge against the 45-year-old bank president, said actual loss was not expected to exceed \$1.5 million.

The bank is the largest of two in the Cherry County community of about 3,000 population, hub of Nebraska's most extensive ranching and cattle feeding area.

The bank was taken over by the state Thursday. The next day a state charge of embezzlement was lodged against Davenport, one of Valentine's most respected citizens.

Two federal counts of making false entries were filed against Davenport in U.S. District Court in Omaha.

NEW YORK (AP) — It has been a long rocky road to the voting booths. And after this final rugged weekend I'm still undecided. I don't know whether I'm for Chet or Walter, for David or Howard, for Edward or Eric.

I do know, however, that like a lot of other voters-to-be I am eye- and ear-weary after eight weeks of campaigns and listening to political oratory in news shows and paid political broadcasts. The repetition got me down. I am also weary of the networks' constant promotion of their upcoming election night coverage.

The 1960 presidential year had excitement and drama for television viewers, largely because of the so-called "great debates." There seems to be a general feeling this political season that our campaign periods are just too long — for candidates and voters.

Trade rumors persist that CBS is on the verge of some drastic activity relating to some of its expensive dramatic shows which are having audience troubles.

Two of them — "The Reporter" and "Mr. Broadway," the creative children of Jerome Weidman and Garson Kanin respectively — continue to limp along with silly clichés of stories.

Friday night's "Reporter" was a routine retreat about exposing a fake charity. "Mr.

Broadway" on Saturday told a predictable tale about the glamorous, temperamental actress who throws things when irked. Even Tammy Grimes couldn't do much for the script.

Three Cities Shake Off Tag Of High Joblessness Areas

NEW YORK (AP) — What does a city do to rid itself of the government's "substantial unemployment" designation?

The Department of Labor recently lifted this tag from Pittsburgh, Pa., Chattanooga, Tenn., and San Juan, Puerto Rico.

A survey of these three cities indicates that enterprising self-help, bolstered by generally improving business, made the accomplishment possible.

In Pittsburgh, a spokesman for U.S. Steel Corp. attributed the increase in employment to "just plain good business."

MORE JOBS
Jones & Laughlin Steel Co. said employment in its plants in the Pittsburgh area has increased by about 1,000 over the past year.

Part of the increased employment in the steel industry was due to the 13-week vacations for long-time employees provided by the current contract with the United Steelworkers.

Another factor, said Dr. Edgar M. Hoover, director of the

University of Pittsburgh's Center for Regional Economic Studies, was substantial migration from the Pittsburgh area since 1950.

The Chattanooga Chamber of Commerce attributed the pickup in employment to \$88 million in new industrial construction, most of it expansion of existing industry. The largest project is a \$20 million expansion of the Du Pont nylon plant.

Tom Spurlin, labor statistician for the Tennessee Employment Security Commission, said the primary factor has been the revising of the old Peerless complex in suburban Rossville.

In 1961, Burlington Industries announced it was closing Peerless Woolen Mills with a payroll of 1,700 persons earning \$5 million annually. It broke Rosville's economic back and hurt the entire economy of the Chattanooga metropolitan area.

Then a group of business men in the Rossville area formed the Rossville Development Corp. It purchased from Burlington the Peerless plant building and has

succeeded in getting a payroll of about 1,000 persons in several diversified industries to move in.

Air Crash Killing 44 Laid To 'Man In Debt'

WASHINGTON (AP) — A passenger deeply in debt and insured for \$105,000 pumped bullets into the two pilots of an airliner during a flight last May, the Civil Aeronautics

Board said today. The plane crashed into a low California hill killing 44 persons.

"As the Pacific Air Lines plane was going down, a high-pitched voice cried into its radio system:

"Skippers shot! We're been shot I was try 'in ta help'" (sic).

FINAL WORD

The somewhat garbled message, recorded on tape and made public earlier, was the last word from the plane before it crashed and exploded.

In reporting today on its investigation of the tragedy, the CAB said that its crash experts, working with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, had concluded that the probable cause of the May 7 crash was "the shooting of the captain and the first officer by a passenger." Francisco Gonzales, 27.

Gonzales was a native of the Philippines who was working for a San Francisco department store. Along with his 40 fellow passengers and three crew members, he died in the crash near San Ramon — only 21 miles from the Oakland Airport. The plane was bound from Reno, Nev., to San Francisco.

BOUGHT PISTOL

The CAB said Gonzales bought a revolver and ammunition on the evening of May 6, showed the gun to numerous friends, told one of them he intended to shoot himself, told others he would die May 6 or 7. It also said he bought insurance policies at the airport. Their total: \$105,000.

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Vatican Meet Set To Voice Two Decrees

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican Ecumenical Council is reported ready to proclaim two major decrees before it recesses Nov. 21 even if its declarations on the Jews and on religious liberty cannot be made ready by then.

Council sources said the three weeks remaining before the session ends probably would be insufficient to complete revision and voting on the two brief declarations.

The documents which Pope Paul VI and the Roman Catholic bishops are expected to promulgate are the schema on ecumenism — Christian unity — three chapters long, and the schema on the nature of the Church, which runs eight chapters.

ALREADY VOTED

The Jewish and religious liberty declarations have been handled as annexes to the ecumenism schema which has been voted and accepted chapter by chapter. The sources felt it unlikely that its final promulgation would be delayed until the next council session — which may not come until 1966 — for the sake of the yet unvoted declarations.

It appears that the two declarations will end up as separate documents, their importance thus perhaps heightened even if adoption is delayed.

Both the declaration on the Jews and the declaration on religious liberty caused trouble when the council debated them a month ago as annexes to the ecumenism schema.

ON UNITY

The Jewish declaration, formerly a chapter within the schema on unity, had been reworded between the 1963 and 1964 council sessions. A statement exonerating Jews from blame for the Crucifixion is due to state only that Jews of today could not be linked with the events of Christ's execution.

Many bishops, including prominent American prelates, argued the council must absolve Jews from any notion of deicide. Other council fathers, especially from the Middle East, said that too strong a statement could cause trouble for Catholicism in Arab nations.

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

The debate on the religious liberty declaration centered on whether all men have the right to worship God according to the dictates of their conscience.

Progressive prelates argued they do. Conservatives said persons who hold erroneous religious beliefs, are worthy only of tolerance.

The Vatican's Christian Unity Secretariat is revising the two declarations on the basis of the debate.

Heart-Test Dog Dead

Freeman, 34, a former Air Force test pilot, was killed Saturday when his T38 jet crashed on a routine training flight.

An autopsy performed at the city-county hospital Sunday showed Freeman suffered a skull fracture and severe chest injuries.

Funeral services are scheduled for 10 a.m. Tuesday in the Seabrook Methodist Church, with the Rev. Conrad W. Winborn, pastor, officiating.

Fellow astronauts and neighbors will serve as pallbearers. They are Dr. Clifford Duncan, and astronauts Charles Bassett, Michael Collins, David Scott, William Anders and Frank Borman. Duncan is director of the guidance and control division at the Manned Spacecraft Center.

The body will be flown to Washington by commercial airliner Tuesday.

Device Abandoned In Farm Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Kennedy-Johnson administration has abandoned a so-called self-help mechanism which it had planned to employ in assisting farmers to obtain stable prices and production.

This mechanism is the marketing-order program. It ranked high among farm program proposals advanced by the Democrats during the 1960 presidential campaign and recommended to Congress during earlier years of the administration.

The marketing-order mechanism was started back in the 1930s, but never had been used extensively except in the case of fluid milk.

SET PROCEDURE
The orders set up procedures under which producers of a given commodity, operating through handlers, regulate the quantities moving to market. Originally, legislation authorizing such orders provided that regulations be limited largely to grade, size and quality. It did not authorize controls on marketings by quantity.

The orders were established only if approved by at least two-thirds of the producers voting in a referendum. Producer administrative committees issued regulations on shipments, subject to approval by the secretary of agriculture.

Other than for milk, the main purpose of the orders is to keep low quality products off the market where they tend to pull down producer prices and income from the whole production. In the case of milk, the orders set minimum prices which handlers must pay dairy-men.

MADE PITCH
In legislative proposals laid before Congress in 1961, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman made a pitch for legislation which would permit use of marketing orders on a larger list of farm commodities and on a national scale rather than the limited regional use previously allowed.

Freeman urged also that the legislation allow use of rigid marketing quotas.

"If marketing quotas are authorized," he said at the time, "an industry would be able to plan the production of a commodity before the beginning of the marketing season, instead of taking action to divert the excess only after a surplus is created and resources are wasted."

But Congress did not go as far in broadening the possible use of such orders as Freeman had urged. Neither did it grant authority for marketing quotas. This congressional action tended to lessen the administration's interest in this stabilization mechanism.

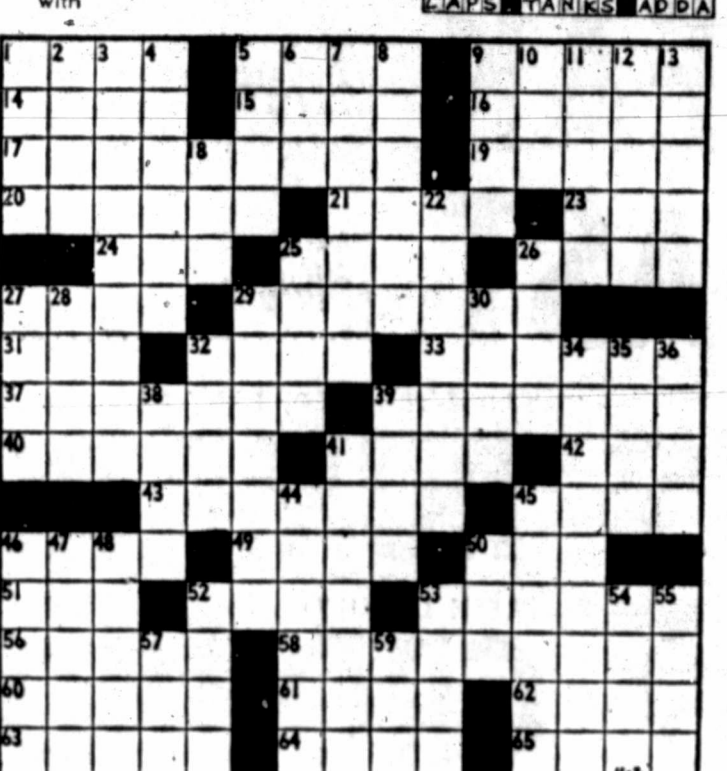
United Fund Inches Ahead

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The nagging question when you see Jane Fonda these days is: Is she becoming another Brigitte Bardot?

Jane's honey-hued locks swirl as hip-length as Brigitte's. Her full lips have a naturally pouty look.

She has been the toast of France for nearly two years. Even her best beau is Brigitte's ex-husband, Roger Vadim, one of France's top, young new wave film makers.

At 26, Jane is four years younger than Brigitte, who turned 30 this year.

"I don't think I've changed much," says Jane, back in Hollywood to make her first Western, "Cat Ballou." "About the only thing I enjoy now I didn't enjoy two years ago is traveling."

Then her eyes light up as she tells about a recent trip to Moscow.

Roger is almost always around, too — when he isn't commuting to Paris from Hollywood.

Jane already has appeared in a remake of "La Ronde" which Vadim made in France.

When she finishes "Cat Ballou," Jane and Roger will fly back to France, where she bought a farm house outside Paris near Versailles four months ago.

Nixon Says Pentagon Had Warning On Raid

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) — The Pentagon had a two-day advance warning that its Bien Hoa air base in South Viet Nam was exposed to Communist attack but apparently took no action, says former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

"Two days before the attack the Pentagon was warned there was danger, but there was no dispersal of the bombers," Nixon told a news conference Sunday night. "They were knocked out on the ground like sitting ducks by mortar fire."

Nixon blamed "too much civilian interference" with the U.S. military commander for the Viet Cong attack which left 4 Americans dead, 36 wounded and 27 aircraft damaged or destroyed.

He called the raid "the worst military disaster since Pearl Harbor," and said it was "a great reflection on the command structure."

In Washington, the Pentagon said there would be no immediate comment on Nixon's statement.

Two European Votes Crucial

BONN, Germany (AP) — The future of America's alliance with Western Europe depends on two elections next year — in France and West Germany.

The French polling date probably will be set in the late fall of 1965. It is expected that President Charles de Gaulle will run again, and he should win easily against any opposition now in sight.

In West Germany, Chancellor Ludwig Erhard is already deep in the campaign for the election, also due next fall. Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin hopes to put him out and give West Germany its first Socialist government.

Stock Mart Opens Mixed

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was mixed in moderate trading at the opening today. Charges of most key stocks were narrow.

Opening blocks included: Chrysler up 1/4 at 88 1/2, 4,000 shares; General Motors off 1/4 at 99 1/2 on 3,800; and Ford, unchanged at 88 1/2 on 2,000.

German Clans In Reunions On Big Scale

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — The Communists for the first time let large numbers of East Germans visit the West today for tearful reunions with relatives. The visitors are old persons who no longer work.

The first group of pensioners arrived by train in central Germany from Leipzig shortly after midnight. During the next year as many as 3.2 million of them are expected to enter West Germany in the largest East-West crossing since the Iron Curtain came down at the end of World War II.

East German Communist leader Walter Ulbricht approved "Operation Oldster" last August in an apparent bid to improve relations with the Lutheran Church, which reportedly suggested the visits. The East German press hailed the arrangement as proof of the Communist regime's "humanitarian attitude."

STAY MONTH

The pensioners, men over 65 and women over 60, had permission to remain in the West a month. The Red regime did not appear concerned over the possibility of defections, presumably because the old people are no longer a factor in East German production.

Previously, elderly East Germans were permitted to leave only if they renounced their pension payments. Now if they defect they can get West German pensions. West German officials said all who wanted it would be given asylum, but no official effort would be made to get any to defect.

GREET VISITORS

Residents at Wolsburg, the first train stop in West Germany, greeted the tired but happy travelers from Leipzig. Red Cross nurses gave them refreshments.

Meanwhile, hundreds of thousands of West Berliners are going through the wall to visit relatives in the Soviet sector of divided Berlin. Nearly 100,000 with the necessary permits made the crossing Sunday.

The Communists opened the wall last Friday for the second time since it was erected in 1961. It will remain open until Nov. 12 in the first of four visiting periods during the next year.

Mrs. Hoover Reinterred

WEST-BRANCH, Iowa (AP) — The body of Mrs. Herbert Hoover was buried beside that of her husband in a brief ceremony Sunday.

About 80,000 persons were present a week earlier for the burial of the former president. There was no crowd Sunday. At the family's request, details of the transfer of Mrs. Hoover's body from Stanford, Calif., to its resting place overlooking Hoover's birthplace here were not announced.

The Rev. Thomas Helm of Grace Episcopal Church in Cedar Rapids conducted the interment service. The group present included the couple's two sons, Herbert Jr., and Allen.

Mental Tests In Poison Case

GREENLAWN, N.Y. (AP) — A 47-year-old mother has been committed for psychiatric observation after allegedly handing out ant poison pellets to Halloween trick-or-treaters.

Helen Pfeil, Long Island housewife and mother of two teenage sons and a married daughter, was arrested Saturday after a parent spotted the pellets in a candy bag his youngster brought home.

Mrs. Pfeil, charged with endangering the health of a minor, was ordered committed Sunday to Central Islip State Hospital by District Judge Victor J. Orgera.

Police said Mrs. Pfeil told them she gave out a dozen pellets as a prank. Suffolk County police continued to alert parents in the area, although 12 pellets were recovered.

Crash Of German Trains Kills 39

BERLIN (AP) — Two trains collided Sunday night in Communist East Germany, killing 39 persons and injuring more than 100 others, some seriously.

The official East German news agency ADN said the accident occurred at Langhagen, 40 miles south of the Baltic port of Rostock. A freight train overran a stop signal and crashed into the Berlin-Rostock express.

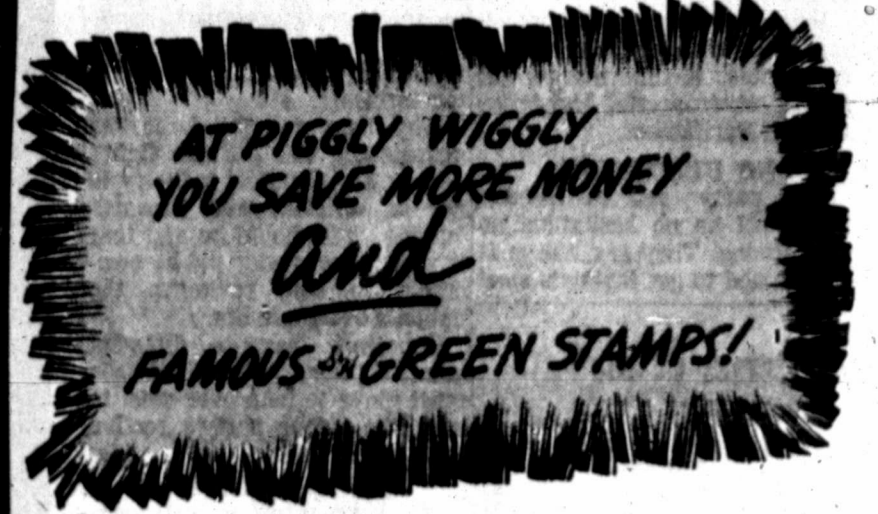

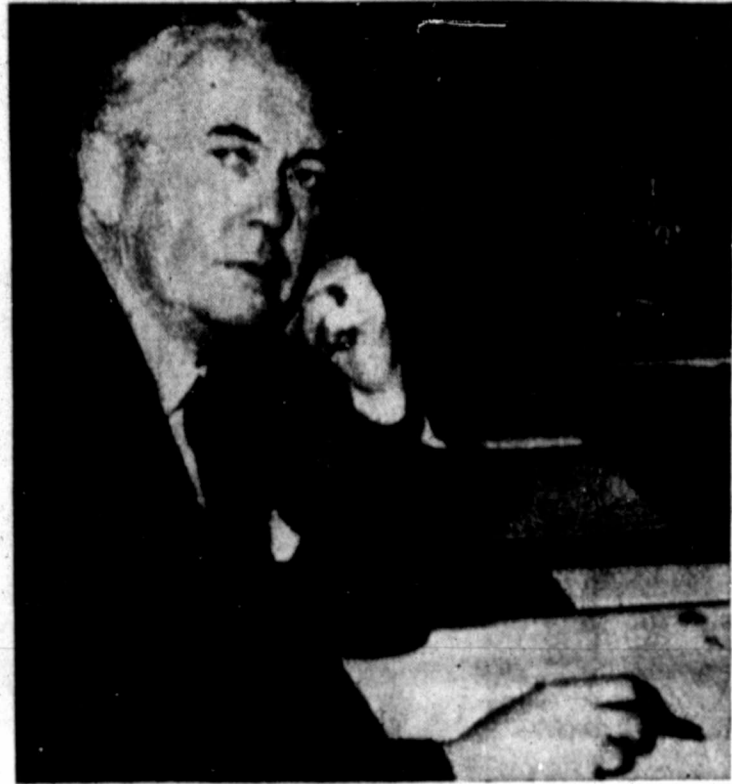
Bill Hayes Optimistic

British Leaders In Ironic Tieup

LONDON (AP) — Patrick Gordon Walker fought Harold Wilson on practically every major policy issue since Britain's Labor party lost power in 1951.

Yet when Wilson was elected party leader last year he at once chose his longtime antagonist for the post of foreign affairs spokesman.

When the Labor party squeaked through to victory in last month's general election, Wilson's first Cabinet call went out for Gordon Walker, to be his foreign minister. The measure of Wilson's desire to have Gordon Walker with him was demonstrated by the fact that Wilson will have to arrange a special bye-election to achieve it.

Gordon Walker lost his own seat in Parliament in the election. He cannot serve in the Cabinet unless he is a member of Parliament.

"Neither the House nor the nation can afford to be without your service," Wilson wired Gordon Walker. It will be arranged that a seat in a safe labor constituency will be vacated and Gordon Walker will run for it and be elected.

One of Gordon Walker's main jobs will be to maintain Britain's relations with the United States. What are his views on this?

"We don't want a special or privileged relationship with Washington," he told an interviewer early this year. "Naturally we expect a close understanding to exist. Outside the NATO area we are the only major, allied powers with global interests."

HAVE RESPECT

Several factors lie behind the irony of a partnership between Wilson and Gordon Walker — two men whose only shared interest seems to be their inveterate pipe-smoking.

Mississippi 'Abuse' Cited By Negroes

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Leaders of a mock election among Mississippi Negroes said today they were up against intimidation that included two church burnings and 23 arrests.

FBI agents were assisting in the investigation of the church fires — some 200 miles apart. Over 30 Negro churches have gone up in smoke or explosions in the past few months.

James Farmer, head of the Congress of Racial Equality, said the church fires were among "at least 40 separate instances of harassment, in addition to campaign workers arrests."

Farmer was in the state to help the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party — MFDP — try to turn out a big vote in a mock election preceding Tuesday's real election.

Four days of balloting — conducted in Negro cafes, churches, stores — ends tonight.

It was an effort to "give disfranchised Negroes a chance to make their political views known," Farmer said.

It also was to form the basis of a possible MFDP challenge to the Democratic party credentials of the state's congressional delegation.

Lovetere May Be Out For Season

NEW YORK (AP) — John Lovetere, right defensive tackle for the New York Giants, may be lost for the season due to a torn ligament in his right knee suffered in the final minutes of Sunday's National Football League game with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Lovetere was carried off the field and taken to St. Elizabeth's Hospital.

Hope And Promise For Lame Orphan

BOSTON (AP) — Seven-year-old Maria Elena Jijon of Quito, Ecuador — born with a crippling deformity and orphaned by tragedy — today has a big smile that was a long time coming.

A doctor at Massachusetts General Hospital told Maria she will be home by Christmas and, better still, she'll be able to walk and run like other children.

"GOOD FROM EVIL"

Dark eyes flashing, Maria turned to her guardian-uncle, Luis del Camp, of Quito, and agreed with him that "No hay mal que por bien no venga" — There is no evil from which good does not come.

Several doctors, headed by Dr. J. Drennan Lowell, assistant in orthopedic surgery at the hospital, donated their services for two operations that corrected the dislocation of both hips with which Maria was born.

Three prominent Bostonians, touched by the child's deformity and the loss of her parents in a Boston hotel fire, raised \$12,000 to pay other medical costs.

Insurance executive George Swartz said any money left will go for Maria's education.

DAD SCRIMPED

Her uncle said Maria Elena's father had scrimped and saved to take her to Florida for two operations four years ago. But the hips did not stay in the sockets.

After raising more money, said Del Campo, Fabian Jijon, 39, and his wife, Lola, 34, brought their only daughter to Boston. For 10 days the three lived in the Sherry Biltmore Hotel while Maria underwent daily tests at Massachusetts General.

On the 11th day, the child was admitted for surgery. That evening — March 28, 1962 — Mr. and Mrs. Jijon died in the fire, which also killed two others.

Swartz said he read about the tragedy and "I immediately got on the telephone to solicit financial help."

Khrushchev Said Ailing

COPENHAGEN (AP) — Denmark's Communist party leader returned from Moscow today and said he understands Nikita Khrushchev is suffering from sclerosis.

Knud Jespersen, chairman of the Danish Communist party, added that the former Soviet premier is not receiving visitors because of his illness.

Jespersen made his remarks in a radio interview shortly before holding a news conference to announce the results of his fact-finding mission to the Soviet capital.

neuroglia (tissue which fills the interstices and supports the essential elements of nervous tissue, especially in the brain, spinal cord and ganglia)."

Khrushchev is 70.

Jespersen was vague on the precise nature and gravity of Khrushchev's reported illness. He described it only as sclerosis, a term which is medically very broad.

The most severe form of this disease is disseminated sclerosis, which damages the brain and can lead to total paralysis. Other milder forms of sclerosis reduce control over physical movements, a Danish medical authority said.

Jespersen was one among many leaders of Communist parties in Europe who went to Moscow to find out what was behind Khrushchev's ouster last month. The first reason given out in Moscow was that the Communist party Central Committee and the Supreme Soviet Presidium "granted N.S. Khrushchev's request to be relieved of his duties because of his advanced age and deteriorating health."

AGE 70

The dictionary definition of sclerosis is: "induration (hardening) produced in an organ by increase of its interstitial connective tissue; also degenerative replacement of tissues of the spinal cord or brain by

LOOKED WELL

To most who had seen him just prior to his descent into oblivion he had appeared in fairly rugged health.

Later, however, the word began to spread that Khrushchev had been ousted because of bad handling of the Cuban affair, Soviet agriculture, the dispute with the Chinese Communists.

Whether the word that Jespersen brought from Moscow was intended to back away toward the original line could not be determined at once.

Hill Ahead For 'Wagon Train'?

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — How long can "Wagon Train" keep rolling along? Scout Robert Fuller hopes it will go on and on, but he admits that this may be the critical season.

"Eight years is an awfully long time for a series to be on television," he conceded. "And we're up against some powerhouse competition this season. I must say that we haven't let up at all. The scripts this year, when we're an hour in black and white, have been better than last season, when we had 90 minutes in color."

"Still, you've got to get the ratings if we don't come up with them, ABC is liable to say 'This is it' after we do the next six shows."

Somehow television wouldn't seem the same without good old "Wagon Train," which has weathered death — Ward Bond, original wagonmaster; defection — Robert Horton, original scout; and uncounted perils, including periodic Indian attacks.

There's a feeling in television circles that if only the Train can make it over the next hill, it

might go on forever. Industry observers opine that the Western is due for a rebirth following this season's inundation of situation comedies.

Unlike some television cowpokes who could hardly wait to get out of the sagebrush, Bob Fuller likes it where he is. He's not exactly a newcomer to the field, having gone for four years in "Laramie" into "Wagon Train" last season with only a 30-day breather.

"I like Westerns; I like the people I work with and I like working outdoors," said Fuller, who spends every weekend camping with his wife and 6-month-old son.

"I like the way the public reacts, too. When I go out on tours, people have immediate recognition, and they talk to me like an old friend. They tell me, 'The next bad guy you meet, get him for me.' It makes you feel like a million dollars."

What would he like to do if "Wagon Train" does vanish into the sunset?

"Another Western series," he replied.

Top Politicos Watch Illinois

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Illinois, a bellwether state in the past 10 presidential elections, has drawn concentrated attention from both President Johnson and Sen. Barry Goldwater.

Straw polls indicate Johnson has built a substantial lead in the battle for its 26 electoral votes. But this hasn't daunted the bustling door-to-door activity of Republican nominee Goldwater's hard core of workers.

Both Johnson and Goldwater have swung into the state several times, laying out what they term the bread-and-butter issues for the "heartland of America."

Four years ago John F. Kennedy carried the state by a slim 8,858 votes.

Coattail riding may play a part in the result of the presidential and gubernatorial races.

One Democratic state candidate, in predicting victories for Gov. Otto Kerner and the rest of the state ticket, says Johnson will be fully responsible if it happens.

In 1960, Kerner won his race by more than 50,000 votes — six times better than Kennedy's margin.

Kerner currently is matched in a down-to-the-wire contest with Republican Charles H. Percy, who is running well ahead of Goldwater in straw votes. Kerner, on the other hand, trails Johnson in the straws.

RECORD HIGH

Although registrations have set a record high in Illinois, state election officials predict the turnout of voters will fall below the 4,746,000 who voted for president in 1960.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, which conducted a registration drive, estimates nearly 500,000 Negroes will vote in Chicago. This would be an increase of about 100,000 over two years ago.

Records going back to Calvin Coolidge's victory in 1924 show Illinois has been on the winning side in presidential elections every time.

DENIES CHARGES

Percy vehemently denies charges he is not wholeheartedly supporting Goldwater.

Although he differs sharply with Goldwater on some issues, notably civil rights, Percy notes he has given more than 80 speeches for the GOP standard bearer.

During his Illinois tours, Goldwater has plugged hard for Percy and other Republican candidates.

COOK COUNTY

Cook County, with a little more than half the state's population in Chicago and the suburban areas, also has been an accurate barometer.

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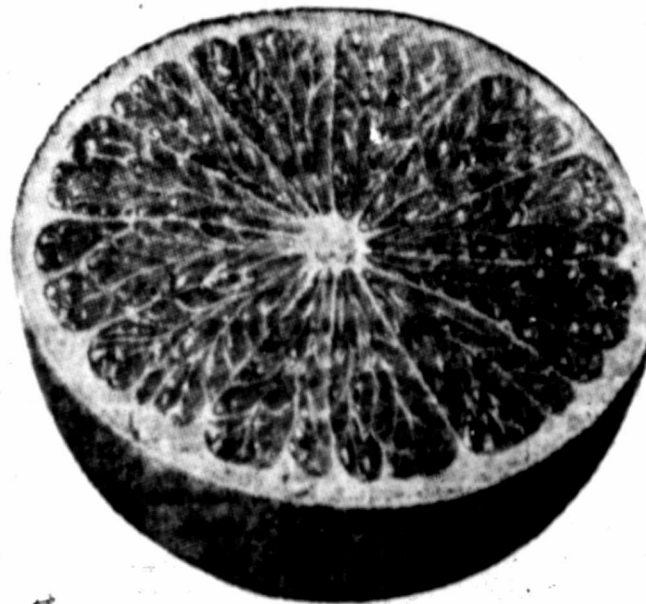

Viet Council, Ex-Premier In Growing Rift

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Potentially dangerous friction appeared to be growing today between South Viet Nam's civilian High National Council and the nation's ex-premier, Maj. Gen. Nguyen Khanh. Khanh stepped down from the premiership a week ago after nine months of rule. The 17-member council was appointed two months ago to set up the new government.

The council so far has chosen Phan Khac Suu chief of state and Tran Van Huong premier. No Cabinet has been formed.

Reliable informants said the council wants some general other than Khanh to head the armed forces. Maj. Gen. Duong Van Minh, former chief of state, and Tran Van Don, both rivals of Khanh, have been mentioned.

The council is reported to be deeply concerned about continued American support for Khanh. Reliable sources said the council has made unofficial overtures to the United States seeking assurance that Washington would not intervene if Khanh were ousted from command of the armed forces.

Khanh sees himself as the logical leader of the armed forces and is not likely to give up the job easily. On Oct. 24, the day after he resigned, Khanh summoned all his generals except his rival Minh to Cap St. Jacques.

DETROIT (AP) — Final figures on 1964 model output showed Saturday that Michigan retained its place as the heart of the U.S. auto industry, with 17 other states as supplying arteries.

Michigan's share of the '64 U.S. passenger car output climbed to 2,759,047 units, or about 35 per cent of the total. This compared with 32.2 per cent of the 1963 model run.

Missouri continued to hold down the No. 2 spot, which it took over last year, while California moved into the third spot among auto producers, replacing Wisconsin.

Death Case No-Bill Made

DALLAS (AP) — Larry Earl Reno, charged in the death of Times Herald reporter James F. Koethe, was no-billed by a Dallas County grand jury today.

The grand jury refused to indict the 23-year-old former Alabamian for the slaying of the reporter.

Koethe's body was discovered in his East Dallas apartment Sept. 21 and an autopsy indicated he had been choked to death.

Several weeks ago Justice of the Peace Charlie Davis, after an examining trial, ordered Reno released without bond on the murder charge. He said the state had failed to connect Reno with the crime.

Reno, however, remained in jail on a previous burglary charge and a fugitive warrant from Alabama.

NEW YORK (AP) — The polls are unanimous. They point to victory for President Johnson Tuesday.

But Sen. Barry Goldwater says he'll win.

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"I know the polls don't agree with me, but they never have," he said Friday night.

A nationwide Associated Press survey of polls showed figures indicating Johnson's percentage of the popular vote might approximate the 20th century highs.

The 20th century record is Franklin D. Roosevelt's 60.8 per cent of the vote in 1936 against Republican Alf Landon. Republican Warren G. Harding got 60.4 per cent in 1920. Dwight D. Eisenhower got 57.4 per cent in 1956.

A RUNDOWN

Here's a rundown on the latest national polls:

Gallup Poll — A semifinal poll by Dr. George Gallup gave Johnson 64 per cent, Goldwater 29 per cent and undecided 7 per cent.

Louis Harris Poll — Johnson 60 per cent, Goldwater 34 per cent, undecided 6 per cent.

Popcorn Poll — Johnson led 78-22 among purchasers of popcorn in movie theaters and supermarkets. They picked Harry S. Truman in 1948.

Newsweek magazine — A poll of 50 Washington correspondents showed 49 predicting a Johnson victory. Their consensus gave Johnson 454 electoral votes to 84 for Goldwater.

Samuel Lubell — His latest summary of nationwide findings: "Landslide victory for President Johnson."

STATE, LOCAL

In state and local polls reported by AP bureaus, Johnson's high margins were in New York and Iowa samplings.

The New York Daily News, which has been wrong on a presidential race only once — its first try in 1928 — gave Johnson 74.5 per cent of the New York State vote, an unprecedented showing.

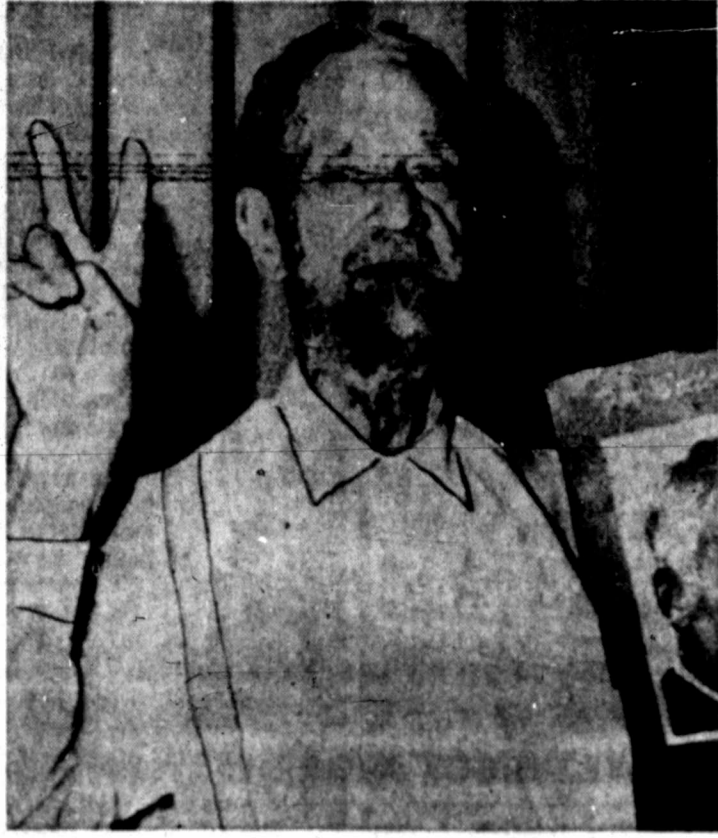
In Iowa, Wallace's Farmer poll, taken Oct. 22, gave Johnson 70 per cent, Goldwater 28 per cent, with 2 per cent undecided.

Times poll gave Johnson 62.63 to Goldwater's 37.37 per cent.

Ohio — A poll by the Cleveland Plain Dealer showed Johnson with 60 per cent. The Akron Beacon Journal gave him 54 per cent, the Columbus Dispatch 56.8 per cent, and the Cincinnati Enquirer 52.2 per cent.

Texas — The Belden Poll in Johnson's home state, for the week ended Oct. 17, gave Johnson 61 per cent, Goldwater 34, undecided 5. Eliminating the undecided, it was Johnson 65-35.

Trafficking In Narcotics Among Teenagers Is Up

CHICAGO (AP) — Narcotics trafficking among teenagers, long a nationwide problem, is getting out of hand in the Chicago area, a police official said today.

Teenagers from all social and economic levels, but predominantly Caucasian, are using

"bennies and Christmas trees" for kicks, Lt. Cornelius Casey said in an interview.

Casey, commander of the narcotics section, said amphetamine sulphate "pep pills" — bennies — and brightly colored barbiturate capsules — Christmas trees — are sold, by and to teenagers, for 10 to 25 cents per pill.

Doctors prescribe amphetamines as stimulants and appetite reducers, and barbiturates as tranquilizers and sleep inducers.

Casey cited two recent cases. One involved a 22-year-old man who attacked three policemen, hauling two down a flight of steps. He admitted using pills. The other concerned a 20-year-old girl who said she walked the streets to support an amphetamine habit started by her sister and brother-in-law, who sold her pills once her habit was formed.

Casey said his unit makes 500 narcotics arrests per year in the 17-to-20 age group and that "a good portion" involve victims of pills.

"You can't tell what the teen-

age user is likely to do," Casey said. "They take three or four at a time, and they take them only for one reason — to get high."

Casey said barbiturates are more dangerous to the user because an overdose can kill. Casey said the danger of amphetamines is that they promote aggressive, antisocial behavior.

Casey said the drugs are too easy to obtain and claimed some pharmacists sell pills without prescriptions.

President Confident On Eve Of Election

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson, confident the country "will choose the leadership of the Democratic party" in Tuesday's balloting, heads today for his native Texas to wind up his campaign.

He scheduled three speeches at Houston and a finale at Austin. Then, accompanied by Mrs. Johnson and their daughters, Lynda Bird and Luci Baines, the President will go to his Johnson City ranch — to wait.

The Democratic National Committee also planned a final NBC television program at 9 p.m. Big Spring time tonight in which Johnson and Sen. Hu-

bert H. Humphrey, his running mate, will make last-minute appeals for votes. Committee aides said the program was pre-recorded.

The President put in a busy day at the White House Sunday after an early morning return from New York where he told a huge, cheering audience at Madison Square Garden that he will win. He said Americans are rejecting "extremism in the pursuit of the presidency."

VIET ACTION

After attending church, the President met for 75 minutes with Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and other top

aides on the situation in South Viet Nam. They discussed means of tightening defenses against Communist guerrilla mortar attacks like the one that hit the Bien Hoa airfield near Saigon early Sunday.

Four Americans were killed in the attack and 21 were wounded. Twenty-seven U.S. aircraft were destroyed or damaged.

The President ordered that the destroyed jets be replaced immediately.

In another action announced Sunday by the White House, Johnson set up a special task force to study means of preventing the spread of nuclear weap-

ons. He named Roswell L. Gilpatrick, New York lawyer and former deputy secretary of defense, chairman of the group which is to report early next year.

Goldwater Demands Demos Explain Raid

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, hunting votes and luck, charged today that the "sheer incompetence" of Democratic strategists has set the U.S.-backed war on communism in South Viet Nam on the brink of disaster.

The Republican nominee for the White House chose his campaign inaugural as the last major address of his race against President Johnson, offering anew in San Francisco the same words he uttered two months ago in Prescott, Ariz.

"FULL EXPLANATION" Goldwater fired off a statement in Phoenix demanding a "full and immediate explanation" from the Johnson administration of the Communist bombardment that killed four Americans and wounded 20 while destroying six jet bombers early Sunday.

"This administration owes every American an explanation," the Arizona senator said. "And it owes the cause of freedom a full accounting for its dereliction of duty in Viet Nam."

Later today, Goldwater planned a good luck visit to Fredonia, Ariz., a butte country hamlet on the Utah border. He explained that he wound up his two winning Senate campaigns

there and said conservatives believe in relying on the lessons of the past to shape the future.

RED ATTACK

Dealing with the Communist attack Sunday on the airfield 15 miles from Saigon, Goldwater declared:

"I charge that the attack against our aircraft resulted because of sheer incompetence on the part of the political soldiers who have been running and ruining the show in Viet Nam."

He hinted in a Sunday interview that Communist guerrillas

might have staged the mortar barrage in hopes of influencing Tuesday's presidential election in Johnson's favor.

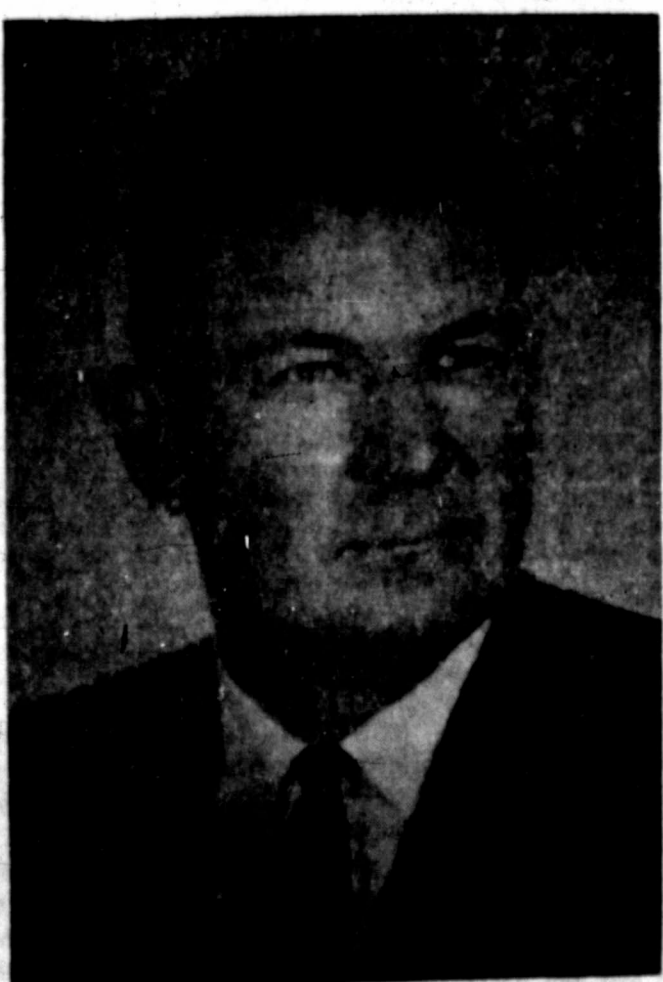

You Have The Last Say

Now that the shouting and the tumult have about died, the individual voter is confronted with the task of performing his duty Tuesday.
Candidates and their partisans have hurled charges and counter-charges, many of them vague and couched in clichés and some of them lacking in propriety and good taste. But everyone is entitled to his say, even though he may use or abuse the right, and it is left up to the voter to decide—if indeed he hasn't already—to try to sift the wheat from the chaff.
Yet you have the final say.

When you go into the ballot booth, you become the sole judge of what is right and best for the nation, state, area and for yourself.
If you don't take the time to go to the polls, someone else has the final say for you.
You can't really be a good citizen by proxy.
So vote Tuesday, vote early.
And be certain to mark your ballot carefully, leaving only the names you wish to vote for. Otherwise, you may not have any vote after all.

The Rate Case

The final verdict is not until the district court decision has been appealed, but as of now it appears there is a strong possibility that the City of Big Spring has lost its suit with the State of Texas to revise its water rate to the Big Spring State Hospital.
For practical purposes, this means that the city is stuck with the 10 cent rate unless there are some legal avenues of relief suggested in the judgment of subsequent opinions.

There may be some practical means of somewhat softening the inequity claimed by the city, particularly if additional services and volumes are required.
And there's nothing to bar future attempts to settle the matter, although new angles of approach may have to be perceived. The ultimate basis may have to be based on legal action, for authority rather than desire is the foundation of action by any governmental agency.

GOP Ends Up With Surplus

WASHINGTON — A revolution in the methods of financing a presidential campaign has just been achieved by the Republican National Finance Committee. A formal report to be filed in Congress by the committee 12 days after the election will show a balanced budget and, in fact, a considerable surplus. This is the first time in many years that either party will present such a record to Congress.

THE REPUBLICANS have spent approximately 70 per cent more money than in any previous presidential campaign—a total this time of around \$12,500,000—but, amazingly enough, this has been accomplished without as much support from persons in business and finance and the wealthier people of the country as in previous years.

In fact, gifts above \$100 were few in number and amounted to much less in total than in the 1960 or 1956 campaigns. But the surprising development is that, while total national contributions of record in the Republican party in 1960 numbered about 37,000, the contributors this year increased to the unprecedented total of

200,000. And even these figures do not include women contributors giving \$1 each.
THE SIGNIFICANCE of this is not wholly on the side of finance because most of the contributors are young in years and, as one Republican leader says, while frequently the voter who gives \$1,000 feels he has done his whole duty, the giver of a smaller sum—ranging from \$1 to \$25—is likely to give his time and energies to working among other voters.

Much of the money was raised by direct-by-mail solicitation, which resulted in hundreds of thousands of contributions at an average of approximately \$11 each. The official figures to be submitted also will show that the money came mostly from new or previously non-contributing voters.
LARGE SUMS also were obtained by fund-raising rallies, breakfasts, luncheons, dinners and receptions, with admission tickets of varying amounts. These, together with receipts from mail solicitation and appeals over TV, accounted for 25 per cent more money than was received from all sources in 1960.

It is conceded by the Republicans that they did not have as many of the businessmen who usually contribute large sums. Indeed, the Republican party has heretofore had a record of a relatively small total number of contributors, but this was changed considerably in the 1964 campaign.

THE DEMOCRATS, according to the latest information, will wind up their campaign with a deficit, even though they have had advantages which the Republicans do not enjoy. Many government employees who owe their jobs to the Democratic administration have participated directly and indirectly in the campaign, and of course the AFL-CIO has a special organization for political campaigns which gave substantial help to the Democratic party this year.

The Republicans point out that they were at a disadvantage because of the heavier support given the Democrats in publicity channels. The Republicans claim that a majority of the newspapers and magazines, as well as various TV commentators at national and local levels, gave an inadequate presentation of the Republican case. This compelled the Republicans to buy television time, the cost of which was approximately 50 per cent over the 1960 presidential campaign.

THE REPUBLICAN financial managers state that the surplus which they have accumulated is ample to pay all commitments for the year 1964. The financial managers declare that the money-raising will go on in the year 1965 in preparation for future campaigns.

A Sigh Of Relief, And Yet...

WASHINGTON (AP) — With a national sigh of relief one of the most unpleasant, uninteresting, and unenlightening presidential campaigns in history ends today. It was less a campaign than a shouting match.
Still, it was unique in this generation. In every election since 1940 the Democratic and Republican candidates represented only different shades of the middle.

Once President Franklin D. Roosevelt's first two administrations had established the principle of the welfare state — government responsibility for the general welfare — neither party's candidates thereafter suggested undoing it.
The questions were how to continue, faster or slower. For instance, under President Dwight D. Eisenhower, as under Presidents Harry S. Truman

and John F. Kennedy, Social Security benefits were either broadened or increased.
THIS YEAR both President Johnson and Sen. Barry Goldwater envisioned the America Utopia. "The Great Society," Johnson called it; Goldwater called it "freedom."
But their attitudes on achieving Utopia were complete opposites, not only toward the role of government but the presidency itself.

Bland Diet Required For Ulcers

By JOSEPH G. MOLNER, M.D.
Dear Dr. Molner: Please send me a copy of "Lost Secret of Reducing." I enclose the required five cents in coin and a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope.
Would this leaflet be helpful in case I have ulcers and/or an irritated colon? — M. D. H.
Yes, the leaflet is adaptable, although you must use common sense in adjusting your diet.
With ulcers, a bland diet is required, but a bland (non-irritating) one need not necessarily be excessively high in calories. One problem is that of drinking cream. You can hold this to a minimum by not overdoing it or else by substituting milk. Watch the pattern of your ulcer pains. Learn how long you can go, at various times of day, without suffering. Then drink just a little cream (or half and half) at the strategic time which will stall off an attack.
The irritated colon is a different problem. You will have to avoid, as a rule, foods with too much "ash" or residue, and those with strong, resistant vegetable fibers, as well as seedy fruits.

is, eating celery, raw carrots, etc., when they become hungry. Strained, low-calorie vegetables can be a substitute.

Dear Dr. Molner: Should a diabetic who takes insulin drink alcoholic beverages? I have heard that this could cause blindness. — MRS. B. D.
Alcoholic beverages do not of themselves cause blindness in a diabetic. All the same, they are risky from the standpoint of upsetting control of the condition and provoking acidosis when done to excess. If a diabetic proposes to use alcohol at all, he should discuss it with his doctor — and abide by whatever restrictions are specified. Uncontrolled diabetes does, indeed, sometimes cause blindness.

Yes, but you may be a little late, and shoulder braces are not very comfortable.
It's better to pay attention to your sitting and standing posture. Along with this, take exercises to strengthen your back muscles — bending, twisting, leg-raising.
Firm your shoulder muscles with push-ups and arm exercises.
This will require effort on your part, but you can't correct, overnight, habits that have been building for a decade or so.
It would be most helpful to have your doctor arrange for a therapist to coach you in just how the exercises should be done, but it will still be up to you to fix your mind on changing your posture, and doing your exercises every day without fail.

On A Mountain Path

WASHINGTON — I don't know who Jinny Grey was, but I love her for the road they have named after her.

The Jinny Grey fire road is scarcely more than a scraggly track that climbs the mountain from the end of Old Hollow. It roughly parallels the course taken by Piney Run as it laughs its way from some nameless spring high in the Blue Ridge to the great, sorrowing ocean 200 miles to the east.

THE ROAD is closed to all but foot traffic, for which one thanks God and whatever earthly authority He has delegated in this matter. At this season it is the best place on earth to go and to wonder what has happened to all of us, and to despair over where the years have gone, and to watch a little girl wade the icy brook with her hair dappled in the soft autumn sunlight and to feel your heart break when you see how tall and straight she has grown, and you understand that too soon she will be a stylish young woman with other concerns than walking a mountain trail with you.

THE ROAD crosses and recrosses the brook, and each time she removes her shoes and rolls her bright red slacks to the knees before she steps into the water.

There is not much talk. She is high-spirited and immune to the wheezes, rheums, catarrhs and sprung arches that slow you; more often than not she is a dozen rods ahead, a red and gold apparition that seems to touch the earth only rarely. She returns with a rock that holds some ancient secret locked in its flinty heart, but the best you can offer is some uncertain, unscientific speculation.

YOUR NATURE lore meets the challenge of the stick, however. She returns with it and wonders at the strange scars it carries. Beaver. There is authority in your voice. Beaver. Note the marks where it has been cut, like tool marks left by

tiny, sharp chisels. Note also how the bark has been stripped so carefully away. The two things beaver must have are ample fresh water and a profusion of hardwood saplings. Both are available here, so you take the plunge and confidently predict that somewhere near at hand there will be a beaver dam.

We find it, Pokey and I, a black, placid backwater impounded by the artful engineering of the old paddle tail.

NEWS OF A waterfall is brought back by a native runner in red slacks, news that is confirmed by the sighting of a cataract that is in a tumbling, heedless hurry to become a creek, then a river corrupted by cities and, finally an anonymous drop in an ocean that stretches all the way to the Old World.

A question now that shows, maybe, what we have done to our children. Is it good to drink? Here is the shadow of fear and suspicion that blights what should be the perfect relationship between a sunny 10-year-old and a carefree mountain torrent. Good to drink? Why, bless your heart you could wander the face of the earth and not find as good. Thoughtfully you lower yourself prone on a flat boulder and stick your snout into the water. It is cold and it is good to drink. You drink until you almost swallow a leaf, and you arise in wet-faced dignity.

THEN SHE takes a drink, tentative at first but finally with gusto, and you reflect that maybe just a little of the damage has been repaired, and perhaps the little girl may still grow into a person not corroded with the dismal certainty that all streams, however sunny and gay, hide fearful shapes.

Now at once the shadows are long and the way back is at hand. Will we go all the way to the top next time? Bet your life we will; cross my heart and hope to die in a cellar full of rats if we don't.

Tomorrow Will Tell

WASHINGTON — Every voter tomorrow is his own Diogenes, looking for an honest decision.

He won't find it in the sidewalk caricatures where one candidate is lampooned as a crook and the other as a kook. My mail berates me for a truth-in-labeling tag of "garbage" which I attached to the best-selling anti-Johnson books, but bilge is where you find it.

THE CASE against Mr. Johnson is not for being a successful businessman in Austin or for being a loyal friend to Walter Jenkins—such traits are admirable. The honest vote against LBJ would be protest against his suppressive stratagems in Congress and newspaper shops, his power-building at home and the Kennedy-Johnson predilection to be chummy with communism through treaties and trade in Europe, no-win warfare in Asia and the Caribbean.

BARRY GOLDWATER, as the challenger, cannot be fairly censured for carrying the fight to his foe. If anything, he has overreached his innate decency in canceling the filmed morality play against crime in the streets. He hasn't made nearly enough of the rampant homosexuality in Washington and its menace to public safety.

POLITICAL REFORM can be revived without being reactionary. The eternal truths that Goldwater preaches are not obsolete because they're old. President Washington did very well with only four Cabinet officers — those heading the Departments of State, War, Treasury and Justice. It would be an exaggeration to say that Goldwater would abolish the Departments of Agriculture, Interior, Commerce and Health-Education-Welfare, but he could combine or curtail their activities, and many similar ones, with no loss and much gain to the nation. An honest ballot for Barry would be one for frugality and efficiency.

WORLD PEACE today is threatened by no force except communism. Goldwater's foreign policy calls for treating peace-disturbers as the enemies

they are. He would make no treaties that weaken our peace-guarding might. He would offer no trade in wheat or other materials that strengthen the enemy's war-waging potential. An honest vote would be one to sustain Goldwater's belief in American military supremacy and his distrust of communism in all its shapes and shades.

But the American presidency, like the British monarchy, is more important for continuity than for personality. When the king is dead, or when a presidential aspirant is defeated, the morning-after salutations must always be "Long live the King," and "God Bless America."

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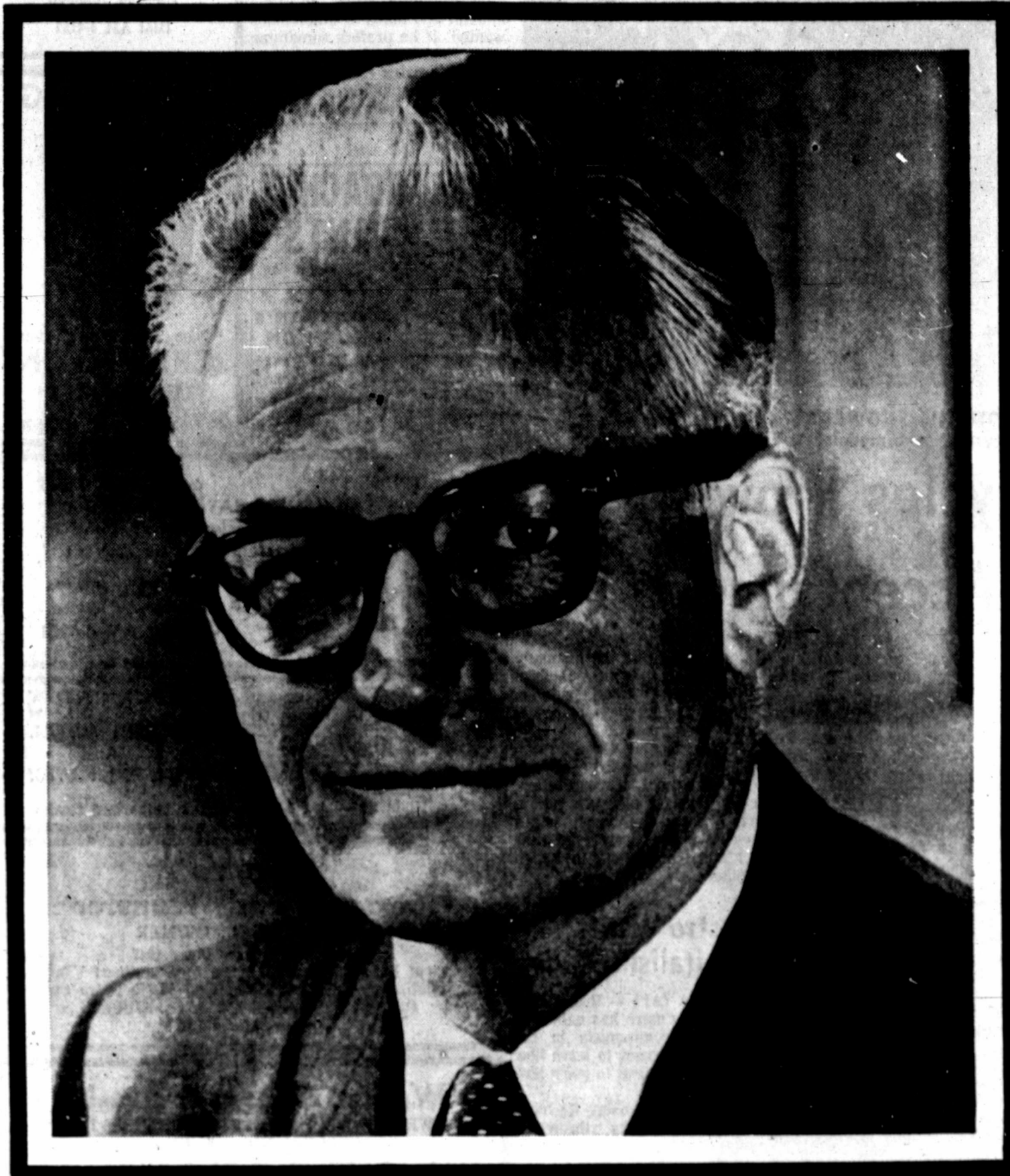

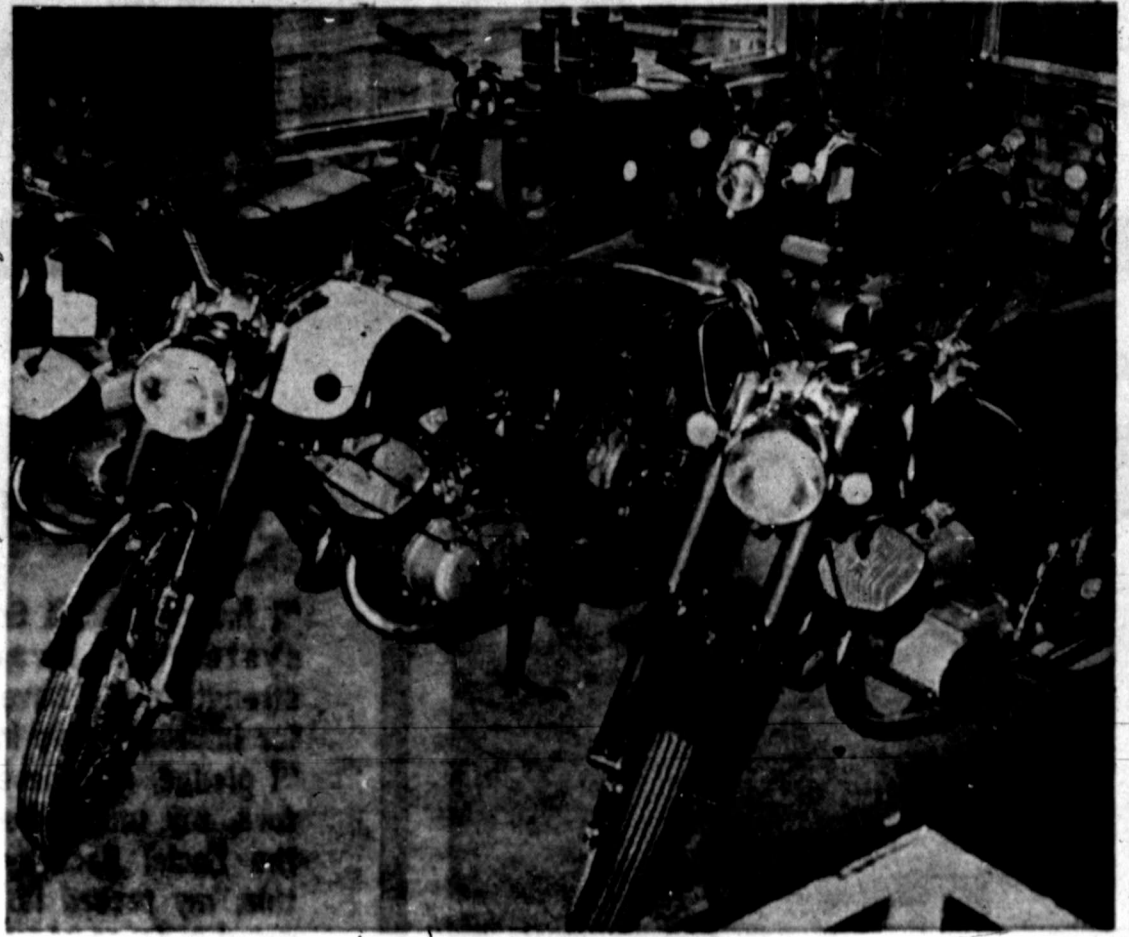

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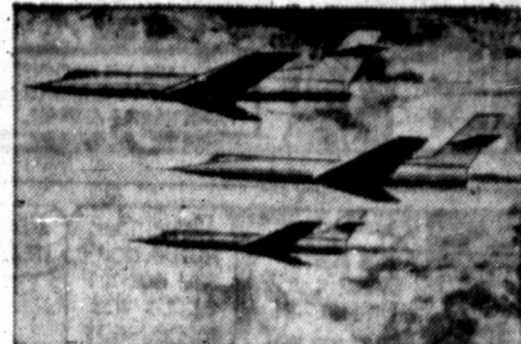

There's More To Note Tuesday Than Election

He even played a hand in bucking the Mexicans, later on, just like other Texans of the time, and for his efforts got accused of treason and thrown in the hoose-gow for several months. He later was freed and took a hand in setting up the new Republic, but may have, in some respects, played second fiddle to old Sam Houston in that regard. Another thing, Sam, it was Stevie's Papa, Moses Austin, a Virginian, who got the original land grant in Texas from the Mexican government and was allowed to send 300 families to the place. It was the son who later took over, which shows you that family connections were important then just as they are today. The city of Austin is named for Stephen F., of course, and a lovely place it is. One might wonder though, if Austin's bones don't creek in dismay on those years when the Texas Legislature is in session. ANOTHER So much for that, Sam. Another thing about Tuesday is that it marks the start of National Dish Cloth Week. If you can find some significance in this, hop to it. As for myself, I would allow as how there ought to be a good market in dish cloths this week, just to clean up the mess left by the campaign. Your studios boss, BOB WHIPKEY

Cigarette Fear Melts For Some

WASHINGTON (AP) — The icy fear which struck the American smoker in January — and filled him with noble resolve — has been melting away. For some smokers, so has the noble resolve. But for others — like Dr. Leonard Schuman of the University of Minnesota — this is not so. He smoked a pack and a half a day until Jan. 12, the day after the U.S. surgeon general's committee condemned cigarettes as a health hazard, and a shor-tener of life. He was one of three cigarette smokers on that committee. One other switched to a new charcoal filter brand. The other could not be reached for comment on the present state of his habit. But Dr. Schuman quit, and at last report stayed that way. He has not taken up cigars or a pipe because he might inhale them. While the report is not a year old, the best indications are that cigarette sales have not totally recovered from the impact of the surgeon general's report. Firm statistics are hard to come by — but perhaps 16 billion cigarettes went unsmoked between January and June of this year. Before the report, cigarette smoking was burning its way to new heights of popularity. In the last six months of 1963, it was running 6 1/2 billion cigarettes ahead of the same six months in 1962. But 1964 became a different story. Even with its erratic recovery, cigarette production may end the year down 3 per cent over all and — according to federal experts — its future uncertain. A real gainer in the wake of the report has been the small cigar — the cigarillo — and cigars in general. They may finish the year with sales up 30 per cent over 1963. Meanwhile, there have been these developments: —The Public Health Service embarked on a long-range education program to discourage smoking. —The Federal Trade Commission set deadlines for cigarette firms to begin labeling cigarette packages and advertisements with danger signs. —The tobacco industry promised a court fight against the FTC ruling. —The industry vowed to set up its own advertising police bureau in New York City and fine violators, but this is still in the organizational phase. —Congress adjourned without bringing up a barrage of bills giving cigarette-controlling powers to federal agencies, and a counter barrage which would deny agencies those powers. —More than nine months have passed since the surgeon general promised "no foot-dragging" in the follow-up to the committee's prime finding: "Cigarette smoking is a health hazard of sufficient importance in the United States to warrant appropriate remedial action." So far, the most concrete action has come from the unilat-

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Criticism On Education Hit As Hindrance

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Public criticism of education has slowed improvements in methods to produce better trained teachers, 300 Texas educators were told Sunday.

Dr. G. D. McGrath, dean of Arizona State University's college of education, said: "Improvement is the price of partnership with the supporting public."

McGrath, who spoke at the opening session of the two-day 17th annual Texas Conference on Teacher Education, said educators have been kept busy trying to "stem the tide of a badly confused public that has been stampeded" with general beliefs about education.

"What a tragedy and manpower wastage, but we dare not let these assumptions go unchallenged," McGrath said.

McGrath said the early 1960s has been a time of re-evaluation and reflection in education. "The dramatic, exciting experimental programs of the late '50s are absent," he said.

Guard For Johnson Up

HOUSTON (AP)—The entire presidential family flies to Houston today to make a last-minute, election eve effort to personally woo voters in the South's largest city.

President Johnson, his wife and their two daughters are to arrive at Houston International Airport at 4:15 p.m. (CST) in the President's special Air Force jet.

The Secret Service said a "security screen" will be in effect from the time Johnson arrives until 8:15 p.m., when the presidential party leaves for Austin.

For the first time in Texas, Johnson will use the now armoured limousine in which President Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas last Nov. 22.

The 10,000-pound car, remodeled to support a permanent bullet-proof transparent top and a heavy sheeting of armor, will be flown here by cargo plane.

Johnson will travel by motorcade and helicopter as he makes three speeches in widely separated parts of the city.

The presidential entourage will go by a 14-car motorcade to the Music Hall in downtown Houston. Johnson is to make a speech in front of the hall at 5:20 p.m. after being introduced by Sen. Ralph Yarborough.

A 10-passenger helicopter then will take the President to Sam Houston High School on the city's north side for an address at 6:30 p.m.

Johnson then will fly to the lawn of a bank in the populous industrial suburb of Pasadena for another speech at 7:25 p.m.

From there he will fly back to the International Airport and leave for Austin at 8:15 p.m.

Johnson will wind up his campaign in Austin at an outdoor rally scheduled for 9 p.m., and then make the brief hop to his Johnson City ranch where he will await the returns Tuesday.

Sen. and Mrs. Yarborough will accompany the President and Mrs. Johnson in the motorcade.

Lynda Bird Johnson will ride with Rep. Bob Casey, D-Tex., and Rep. Albert Thomas, D-Tex., and their wives, and Luci Baines Johnson will accompany Houston Mayor and Mrs. Louie Welch in their car.

Paper Backs GOP Ticket

KILGORE (AP)—The Kilgore News Herald has endorsed Sen. Barry Goldwater and his running mate, William Miller, as "the only logical choice for conservatives and moderates" in the presidential election.

"We will be voting for or against a definite trend in American affairs," the News Herald said, "and it will be the first time since the Roosevelt-Landon campaign of 1936 that there has been a clear choice between liberalism and conservatism."

"A major consideration," the News Herald said, "is the danger of Hubert Humphrey becoming chief executive, either through death of the President or the strong probability of succession by the sheer facts of politics."

"It is difficult," the News Herald said, "to oppose an able native Texan, especially one whose wife is a charming neighbor from Harrison County, but we have no alternative. His views are not the same as when we supported him for the Senate in 1948."

The wooden frame structure was used this summer as a "freedom school" by volunteers of the council of federated organizations.

The church burning was the first in five weeks in Mississippi.

This summer at least 33 houses of worship, mostly rural Negro churches, were damaged or destroyed by fires.

RAGUSA, Sicily (AP) — The toll from a weekend of tornadoes in southern Italy rose today to six dead, with 150 injured, hundreds of homeless and damage that officials said might exceed \$30 million.
