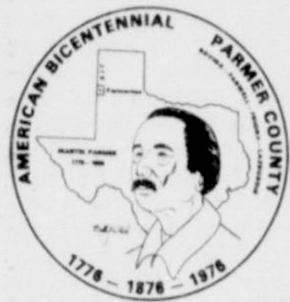


REEVE LAKE...Having almost dried up to a puddle status, Reeve Lake in northwest Friona began to fill up with water early this week as good rains were received in the

YOU'VE NO DOUBT heard many people take credit for the nice rain which the area finally received earlier this week, so we just wanted to take a minute and set them all straight.

You'll recall that it was in this space exactly a week ago that we were praising the area's farmers for having such nice looking crops and also pointing out that they had achieved this with virtually no help from the elements.

We have always prided ourselves with the fact that EVERYONE reads the Star. We just apologize to the farmers for not calling it to His attention sooner.

WITH THE ARRIVAL of August, summer heads into its stretch run, and it will soon be school time once again.

Seems that the summers get shorter and shorter all the time. My two school-age kids agree with me in that statement.

IF YOU THINK we have had hot weather this summer, maybe you're right, but it could have been worse. Last Saturday we were in Fort Smith, Arkansas, when the temperature reached a high of 107 degrees. And none of the natives seemed to think it was anything out of the ordinary.

That tied the highest temperature reading we have ever been involved in, although the other 107 reading felt cool in comparison. Several years ago we were in Amarillo when that city set a record with a 107-degree day.

Memory fails, but it seems that Friona stopped at 105 degrees that particular hot day. But our 100-plus readings in this part of the country are few and far between. And when they do occur, they still are not nearly as uncomfortable as the weather we experienced last weekend, due to the humidity factor.

Arkansas, of course, does not have the monopoly on hot, humid weather. We have been to Houston and Dallas when the only way you could have the weather was to stay in under the refrigerated air conditioning.

The climate in this section of the country is, after all, one of the best you could find anywhere. Our extremes are not too extreme. The good factors far outweigh the bad, at least to our way of thinking.

Date Announced For School Registration

The 1976-77 school term begins in Friona schools on Friday, August 20, with registration for students in grades 6-12, it was announced this week by Superintendent of Schools, Tom Jarboe.

Monday, August 23 will be the first full day of instruction for the 1976-77 school term.

"All students who are new to this school system are asked to bring their report cards and check with their respective principals for pre-registration during the week," Jarboe said.

The principals will be in their offices during regular office hours every day except Wednesday when they will be attending a workshop in Amarillo.

Students in grades 6-12 should check with Freeman Melton at the Primary School, five through eight should check with Cecil Maddox at the Junior High,

Final registration for grades six through twelve will take place Friday, August 20.

High School students will register in the high school auditorium at 9 a.m.; grades seven and eight will register in the junior high auditorium at 10:30 a.m., and sixth grade is to register in the junior high auditorium at 9 a.m.

The teacher-in-service week will be held August 16-20.

Several new teachers have been hired for the new school year. Those employed for the high school include Harvey L. Haynes, industrial arts; Scott Houston, band

physical education; Lonnie Phillips, head football coach and athletic director; Jimmy Pope, Jr., head basketball coach and government; and Gary Rambo, assistant football coach and junior high science.

New teachers in the junior high are Rosemary Melton, fifth grade; Wes Bradshaw, junior high coach and physical education; Ann Graves, sixth grade reading and social studies; and Steve Rhodes, junior high band director.

Those hired for the elementary school are Freeman Melton, Jr., elementary principal; Jean Ann Faver, fourth grade; Judy Houston, fourth grade; and Kim Gober, third grade.

The best general rain of 1976 was received in the Friona area the past week, with from 1.85 inches to up to five and one-half inches reported across the area.

The bulk of the rain was received Tuesday morning, between the hours of midnight and 10 a.m. Parts of the area had received around an inch of rain on Monday afternoon, including the Rhea community, and the additional rainfall of Tuesday caused their totals to bulge.

The Rhea community, which features dryland and partial dryland farms, was the virtual champion for the entire county. Reports of 4.5 inches were received from Floyd Schueler and the Bovina Wheat Growers elevator at Rhea.

Carl Schlenker said he received an inch of rain Monday afternoon, plus another four and one-half early Tuesday, for a two-day total of 5.5 inches.

At Lakeview, Otho Whitefield said he received 1.1 inches of rain Monday afternoon, and another 2.65 inches on Tuesday, for a total of 3.75 for the two days, added to another half inch a few days earlier, for a week's total of 4.25 inches. "It was a good rain. One of the best we've had in a long time," Whitefield said.

The state line vicinity, from Rhea southward to Pleasant Hill, received from four to five inches. So much water fell Monday and Tuesday, even though it fell at an acceptable rate for the most part, that draws throughout the area were running most of the day Tuesday.

Water was reported "hood deep" at the Friona-Bovina crossroads 10 miles west of Friona Tuesday morning. Running Water Draw got up to the bottom of the U.S. Highway 60 bridge west of Bovina, and did likewise at the Highway 214 bridge south of Friona.

would have been over the highway south of Bovina and south of Hub, had not the Running Water Draw dam north of Clovis been completed just a few months ago.

No reports were available as to the amount of water collected at the Clovis dam.

The Running Water Draw damsite number 2, near Bovina, which actually is located on Catfish Draw, ran water from its drain pipe for the first time, running a fair-sized stream from the four-foot diameter pipe.

North and west of Friona, good amounts of rainfall caused the Tierra Blanca creek to run fairly deep. By late afternoon Tuesday, the

creek came up just west of Hereford, enough to thwart traffic. Billy Wayne Sisson reported four inches north of Friona in Deaf Smith County.

Hereford also hit the jackpot in the rainfall category, receiving 2.5 inches Monday afternoon in a 30 minute period, and then collecting another three inches on Tuesday.

Clovis apparently received some four inches of rain Monday and Tuesday, with underpasses in that city reported flooded and closed.

Reports from around the county included three inches at Black, three to 3.5 inches at Hub; 3.75 inches at Lakeview; 3.6 inches at Lazbuddie; 3.5 inches at Bovina; and 4.5 inches at Rhea.

The moisture was most welcome by area farmers who have been hard-pressed the past several weeks for enough irrigation water for corn and milo crops, and were having

trouble "getting over their crops." It also was hailed by gardeners and lawn buffs, who have been forced to water their yards and gardens almost constantly this summer.

Council To Hold Budget Hearing

The Friona City Council will hold a public hearing on the annual city budget during the regular meeting of the council beginning at 7:30 p.m. Monday, August 9 at the Council Meeting Room, 623 Main Street.

City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland says he will recommend that the city's tax rate remain the same for the 1977 fiscal year as it was for 1976-\$1.40 per \$100 valuation.

"In order to accomplish this, expenses and a reduction of monthly disbursements will be necessary," Outland says.

The city manager says that the budget he will propose will be a balanced one, but that the success in maintaining a balanced budget depends largely upon the continuance of the Revenue Sharing program and the state sales tax receipts.

Friona is expected to receive approximately \$38,633 in Revenue Sharing Funds and \$65,000 in municipal sales taxes during fiscal 1977. The ad valorem tax roll is expected to amount to \$142,497, with franchise taxes bringing in another \$25,000.

Estimated expenditures for the city for 1977 are set at \$492,219, which is a 3.3 per cent increase over last year's expenditures of \$477,052.

The proposed tax roll of \$142,497 is very similar to the actual receipts of the current fiscal year-\$141,085.

Main items proposed for capital outlay expenses in the budget are \$4,500 for a Plectron alarm system for the fire department, and \$3,500 for an automobile (exchange) for the police department.

Scott Houston, the new band director at Friona High School, has called a meeting of all high school band members for Thursday, August 12 at 7:30 p.m.

The meeting will be a "get acquainted" meeting, Houston says. "We will play a little music, and discuss a series of three meetings for the following week," he said.

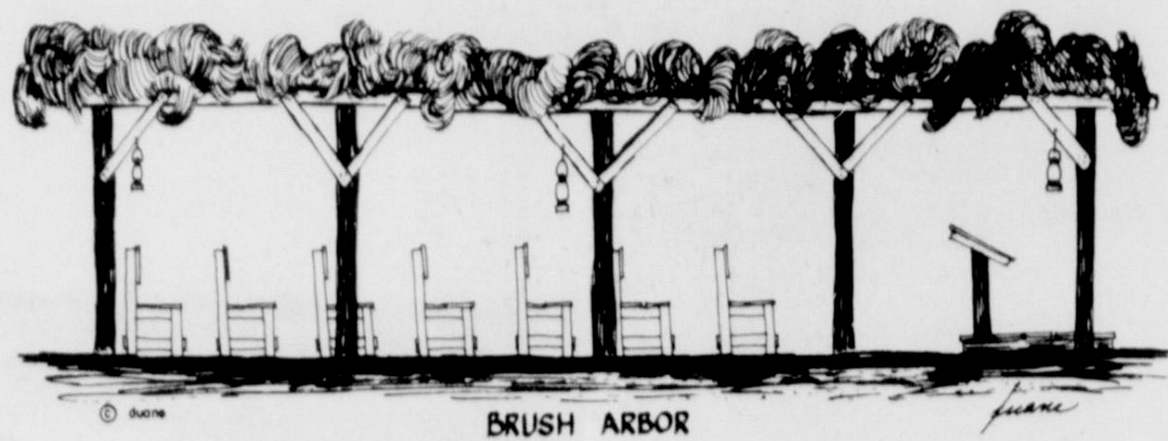

REMEMBERING...

Brush Arbors

Church houses got awfully hot during the summer even with the windows wide open so when the weather started warming up the men in the community got together to re-do the brush arbor.

A brush arbor was a wooden framework built on the top of tall straight poles. The structure was covered over with tree limbs that formed a shade while the sides were left open to allow breezes to blow through. It was an outdoor meeting place that provided the coolness of a shade tree, a joyful diversion from the sweltering church building.

others because it was something different to do for a change.

The hard-packed dirt floor was covered with new sawdust from some nearby mill. Where no sawdust was available hay was sometimes used. When "kneeling" time came the sawdust helped keep the knees of the repenters cleaner.

Most of the time preaching lasted way into the night so the younger children were put down on quilt pallets outside of the arbor where they could sleep through the service or sit and play if they didn't make any fuss.

for several revivals in the course of the summer and the people braved mosquitoes, candle bugs, dim lights and hot weather to hear the gospel preached. In later years the old arbors were replaced with more permanent structures called tabernacles. The tabernacles were built with the

same idea in mind but they had wood shingle roofs and side panels that could be opened or closed to prevent blowing rain from coming in.

Some of these can still be seen in rural communities today but few are used since churches have been air conditioned.

Fireman Attends School

David O. Nelson, volunteer fireman on the Lazbuddie Volunteer Fire Department of Lazbuddie, attended the 47th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School July 26-30. The school, attended by nearly 1,550 students representing about 600 cities from approximately 30 states, is being held on the Texas A&M University campus this year.

Firemen can choose their course at the school from a list including firefighting, fire prevention, fire department officer training, fire department pump maintenance, specialized fire protection and disaster rescue training.

Fireman Nelson was sponsored by Parmer County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies by contributing toward the cost of the school. Since volunteer firemen are interested in attending this school to help do a better job of fire fighting and fire prevention, 100 County Farm Bureaus and the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the statewide program have sponsored 100 firemen at the school.

"The Farm Bureau Insurance Companies believe volunteer fire departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire in rural areas," said President Carol G. Chaloupka of Dalhart. "It is our hope in sponsoring this program that the fireman will help the Lazbuddie Volunteer Department to better serve the residents of Parmer County."

A federal law that has brought about a more stable agriculture, more dependable income, and an improved quality of the environment in the Great Plains is 20 years old this month.

The Great Plains Conservation Act was signed into law by President Dwight Eisenhower on August 7, 1956. Under terms of the legislation since that time, more than 50,000 farmers and ranchers in 10 states have entered into long-term conservation contracts with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Under the contracts, producers agree to carry out all needed conservation on every acre of their farm or ranch. This might include improving rangeland, installing minimum tillage farming systems, terracing, establishing windbreaks, strip cropping, or converting erosion-prone cropland to grass.

USDA's Soil Conservation Service provides technical assistance to producers in planning and installing needed conservation measures. SCS also shares in the cost of installing certain measures.

In 1969, Congress enacted a bill to extend the provision of the program to December 31, 1981. The program is applicable in 123 counties in Texas.

During the first 20 years of the program in Texas, there have been 14,696 Great Plains contracts planned and developed covering more than 18 million acres. Major practices installed to date include range seeding, 1.2 million acres; terraces, 29,000 miles; brush management, 3.4 million acres; cropland converted to grass, 488,000 acres; and rangeland improvement, 7 million acres.

In Parmer County there have been over one-hundred Great Plains contracts signed. These contracts have benefited 50,000 acres in the county.

The program has proven to be very beneficial to all those who have carried their contracts to completion.

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

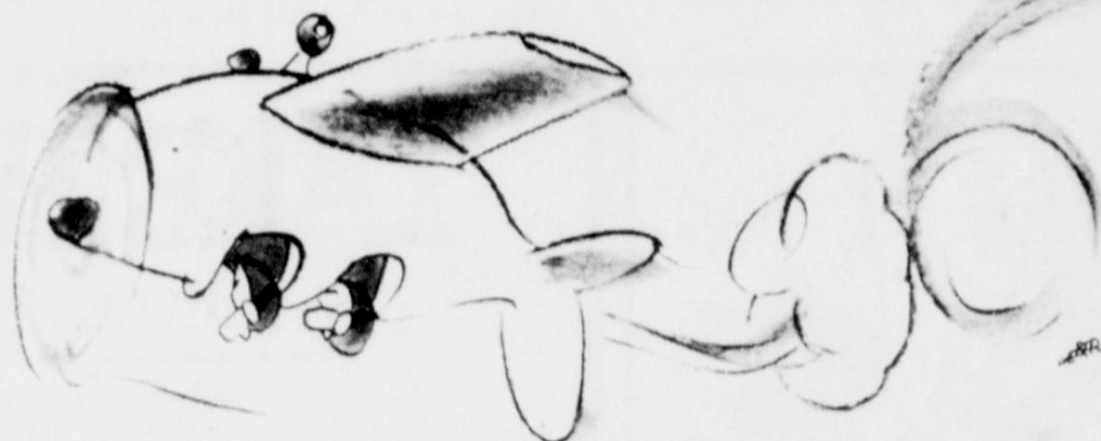

The team's first scrimmage will be at Boy's Ranch on August 19.

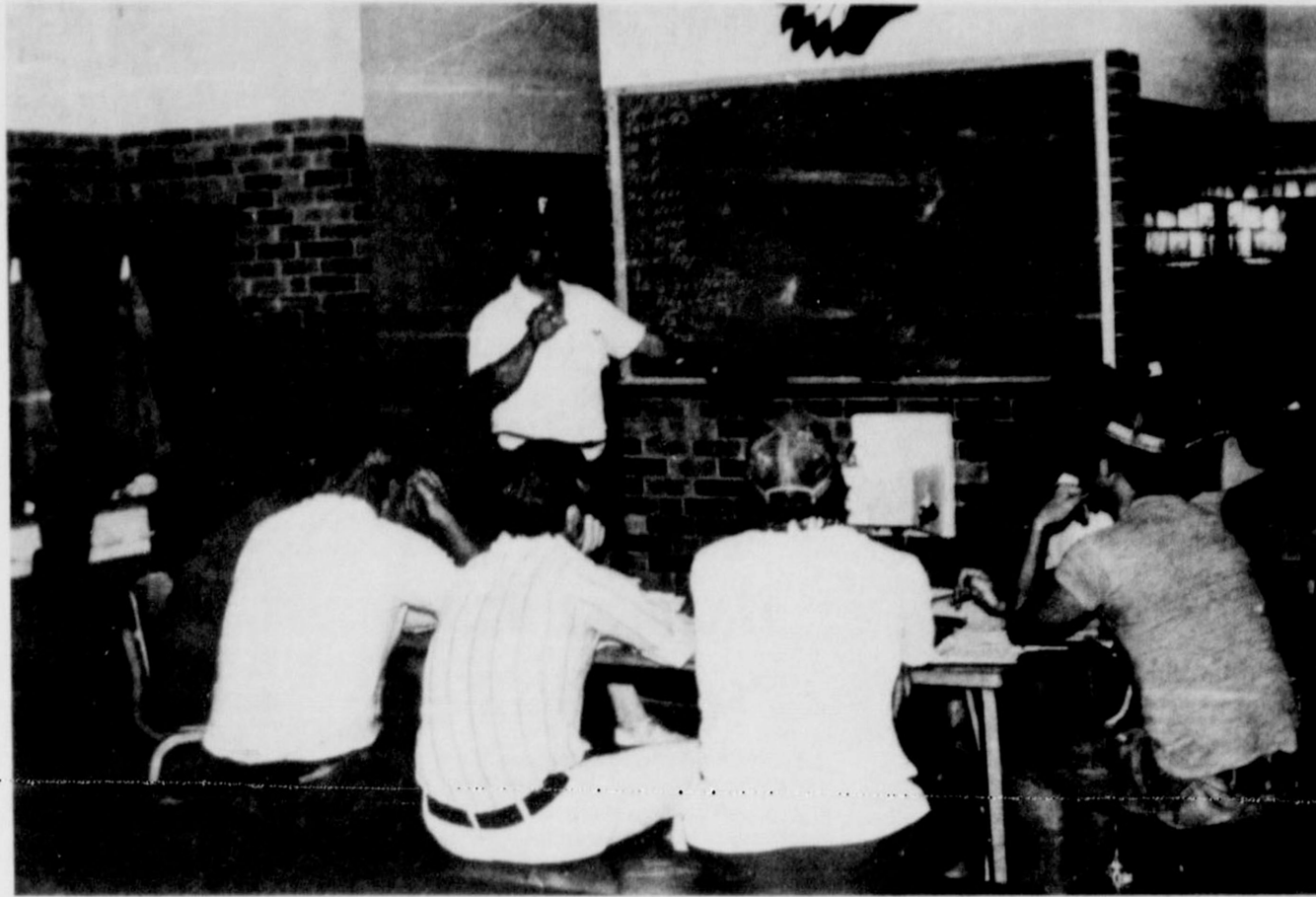
"People will see a new look in our offense and defense this season," Coach Phillips explains. The

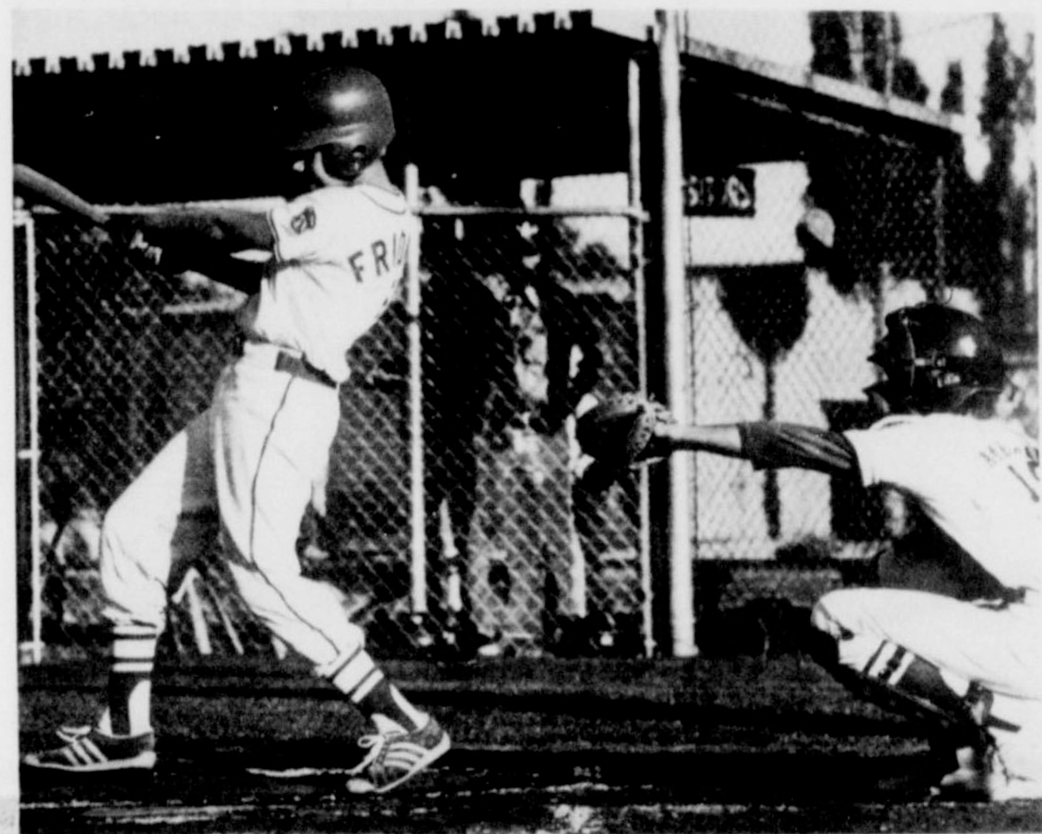
