City Receives Sales Tax Cut

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced that his office mailed checks totaling \$13.2 million Monday to 640 Texas cities as their November rebate of the one-cent city sales tax.

The City of Friona received a check in the amount of \$4,188.79. Bullock said this raises to \$252.2 million the amount that the cities have received in rebates this calendar year, an increase of \$28.5 million—or nearly 13 per cent—over the same period a year ago.

"This increase in consumer spending is a good sign that the Texas economy is on the right track," Bullock said.

The rebate checks ranged from \$501.38 to Springtown.

Mahon Attends Conference With Carter

George Mahon, U.S. Representative, accepted the invitation of president-elect Jimmy Carter and met with him on Wednesday of last week at madge's farm near Atlanta.

About six or eight members of the House and a similar number from the Senate were invited to the Carter meeting. This was the first meeting with president-elect Carter with congressional leaders since the election.

Mahon said he welcomed this opportunity to express his views and the views of West Texas in regard to major issues confronting the Congress and the country.

The meeting with congressional leaders lasted for several hours. "I am quite hopeful," said Mahon. "That the exchange of views will be helpful to Mr. Carter and members of Congress who attended. I was happy for the opportunity to participate."

Xmas Project Kicks Off Here

Modern Study Club announced this week that it would once again sponsor "Project Christmas Card," a program which benefits Parmer County Community Hospital, during the Christmas season. It will be the 21st year for the project.

Residents of the area are requested by the club each year to donate to the fund rather than mailing Christmas cards to local friends. Names of those contributing are published on a full page in the Christmas edition of the Friona Star, as a community-wide greeting to everyone in the Friona area.

Deadline for donating and being a part of the fund this year will be Friday, December 17.

Donations may be left at the Friona State Bank. The club members will also place containers at several local businesses, where residents may leave their donations.

There is no set amount for the donations. Each person or family is requested to donate approximately the amount they would normally spend on Christmas cards and postage to local friends.

Mrs. Ralph Wilson, who is chairman for the event this year, says that the drive will be made to furnish a monitor for the hospital's surgery room. This equipment will

cost around \$4,500. This amount will be the club's goal for Project Christmas Card 1976.

Mrs. Wilson and her committee, consisting of Mrs. Zona Bass, Mrs. Faye Reeve, Lora Mae McFarland and Dora Nittler, were busy meeting this week to make posters and put out containers in the stores.

Project Christmas Card was started in 1956, and in the 20 years since its beginning, has contributed to making Parmer County Community Hospital one of the most modern and well-equipped medical facilities in the area.

In recent years, the fund has purchased a heart monitoring unit, automatic beds for the new wing, heating and air conditioning for the emergency and surgery rooms, fire alarm system for the building, an anesthetic machine, and a coultier counter.

Beginning in 1970, the project selected a particular object or need for its funds, and has purchased equipment valued at over \$20,100 since that time.

Project Christmas Card has become a fine way for residents of the area to say "Merry Christmas" to their friends, and at the same time assist the local hospital.

Bandy Keeps Lead Into Final Week

Clay Bandy held onto his four-point lead in the Friona Star's football contest, and was in a position where he could more or less "play it safe" going into the final weekend's contest.

Bandy's score dipped to 10 for week number 12, giving him a total of 180 points, but it didn't affect his lead any, as nearest contender Bobby Wied likewise scored a ten.

Final Clinic Set For Flu Shots

Friona area residents are reminded of the final clinic for free swine flu shots, to be held Sunday, November 28, from 2-5 p.m. at

laid. Residents who have not already had their shots might be influenced by the case of swine flu which was verified earlier this week in Missouri.

The nation's health officials made provisions for the free availability of the inoculations, in order to ward off what they feared might be an epidemic such as the one that swept the nation in 1912 and killed over half a million people.

The county, which originally had only a small amount of the vaccine, now has an abundant supply. The shots are given only to residents over 18 years of age, unless they have a chronic illness. No one who is running a temperature, has cold

symptoms or is allergic to eggs should take the shots, officials say.

Residents over 65 are recommended having a series of two flu

the swine flu strain and the regular flu.

Clinics are also scheduled Sunday at Bovina, Lazbuddie and Farwell. The clinic at Bovina is to be held at the Bovina School Cafeteria, between the hours of 2 and 5 p.m. The Bovina Jaycees are sponsoring the clinic there.

At Lazbuddie, the shots will be given at the school cafeteria also between 2 and 5 p.m. The clinic at Farwell is under the direction of Dr. Jerry Gregory.

County health officials were hopeful of administering around 1,000 shots at the four special clinics, which will be the last of their kind to be held this season. Just over 2,000 county residents had already secured the inoculations.

United Fund Nearing Goal

The Friona Area United Fund Drive for 1976 was inching closer to its goal of \$10,325.00 this week, according to Fund Chairman Patrick Pace.

As of Tuesday afternoon the UF had received \$9,739.41 in contributions. The money from the Hub-Lakeview-Lazbuddie area had not come in as of press time this week. It was felt that the added contributions from this area would more than put the fund over the top of the 1976 goal. Pace urged those with money for the drive to turn it in at their earliest convenience.

"We are now into the closing process of the drive," states

Chairman Pace. "We are well pleased with the response this year, considering that corn prices are down \$1.00 from last year. We've reached 94 per cent of our goal thus far and we feel the people have been very generous."

Among the local and area organizations which will be benefited from the United Fund are the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Friona 4-H, USO, United Cerebral Palsy Fund, emergency fund, Texas Mental Health Service, United Community Services and the Sheltered Workshop.

REMEMBERING...

Lightning Rod



LIGHTNING ROD

Roof tops of the finer, more stately homes used to be adorned with lightning rods. The specific purpose of the rods was to protect the structure from the devastation of bolts of lightning. I am told that our own Benjamin Franklin (you might know) thought up the idea and it became fashionable during the early 1900's.
Metal rods about four to six feet tall were fixed to the high points of the roof. Several were used, depending upon how many gables or ridges the particular house had. Heavy wire cables led from the rods down to rods driven deep into the ground.
Some folks believed the rods would keep lightning away but actually the opposite was true. The rods actually attracted bolts of lightning. The theory was that the electrical charge would strike the rod instead of the structure, pass through the cable and discharge harmlessly into the ground. The systems were apparently useful because there were government booklets and

guide lines available which told exactly how to install them.
An interesting thing about lightning rods, though is that most people didn't install them for lightning protection at all but rather to be in style. The rods added character, grace and beauty to the homes in those days. The rods came in many different ornamental styles. The designs included straight or twisted rods, rods with weather vanes and roosters attached, owner's initials, names or brands were sometimes used. Some rods had special insulating glass balls incorporated into their design which added color and looked pretty.
Not many lightning rods can be seen today even though the houses they once adorned are still around. I suppose that when shingles and other roofing materials had to be replaced the rods were removed and not reinstalled. It is a pity though, for something so beautiful and even more functional to be done away with just because they were a little trouble to put back in place.

Postal Service Advances Xmas Mail Deadline

The Postal Service on November 10 advanced by one week its suggested mailing deadlines of Christmas mail because of higher mail volume resulting from the strike against United Parcel Service.
The suggested deadlines were moved up to December 3 for domestic parcels and December 10 for letters and Christmas cards.
Parcel volume has more than doubled in the 15 eastern and southern states affected by the eight-week-old strike against United Parcel, which is the Postal Service's main competitor.

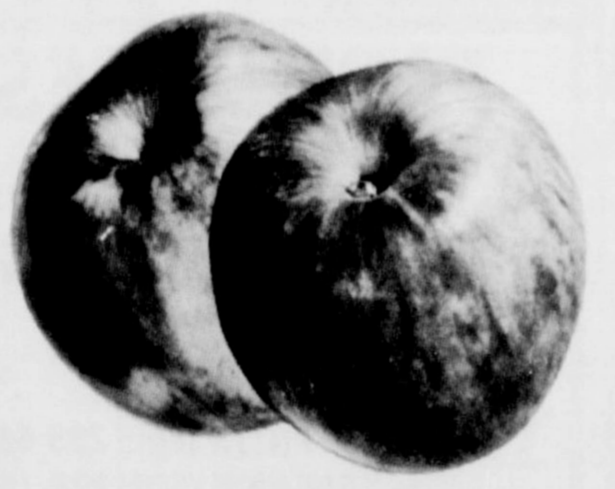

A word to the farm operators. We do have good pheasant population. This is because we had good places for the pheasant to hide and feed in the past. We need to keep this good cover and feed available in the future. Generally more birds are starved to death in a year

than are ever killed by hunters.

Another word to hunters and farmers is that the Friona Evening Lions Club is having a conducted pheasant hunt on December 11.

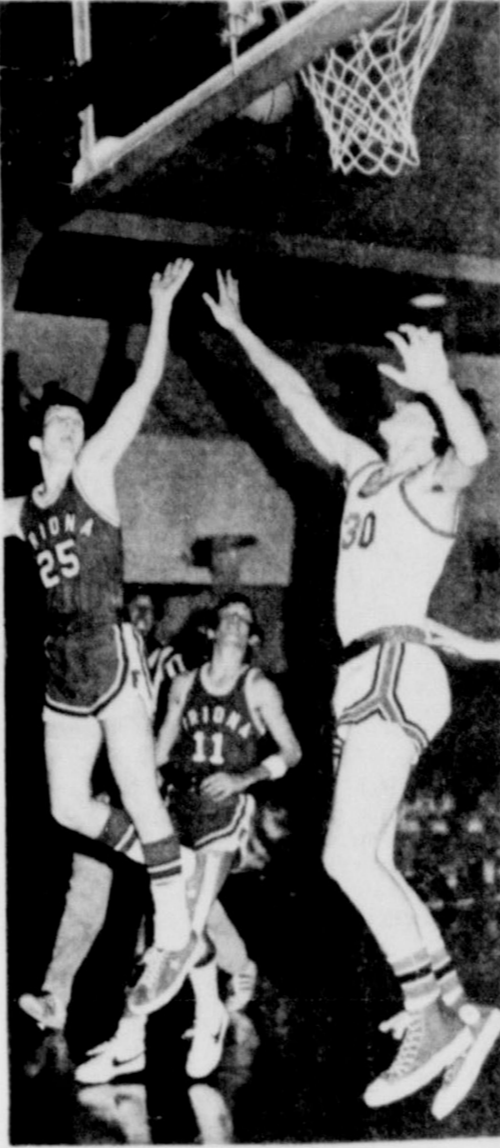

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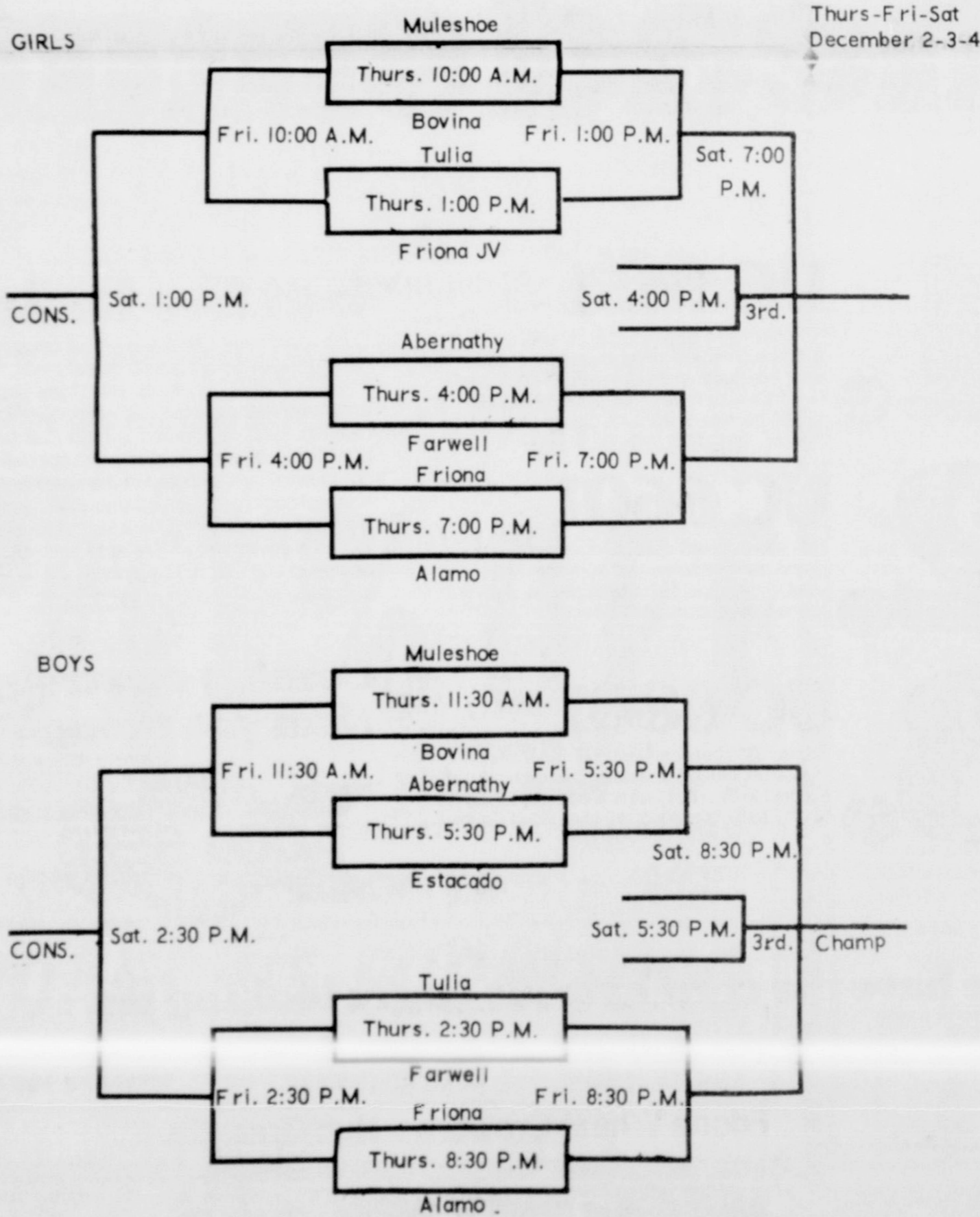
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Square Dance Club Honors David Plumbs

Library Report

"Ishi In Two Words," by Theodora Kroeber is available at Friona Public Library.

The life story of Ishi, the Yahi Indian, lone survivor of a doomed tribe is unique in the annals of North American anthropology. It is also a tragic and absorbing drama that forms part of our own heritage of the land.

Ishi stumbled into the twentieth century on the morning of August 29, 1911, when, desperate with hunger and in terror of the white murderers of his family, he was found in the corral of a slaughter house near Oroville, California.

He had wandered in exhaustion from his native hills down to this valley town in search of food. Promptly labeled a wild man by the townspeople, and carried off for safekeeping to the local jail, he was

finally identified as an Indian by an anthropologist from the University. Ishi was brought to San Francisco by Professor T.T. Waterman and lived there the rest of his life under the care of the staff of the University of California's Museum of Anthropology. He was about fifty years of age when "discovered" and ultimately was given the name Ishi his own Yahi word for man.

The first part of the book is a reconstructed life of Ishi in the world he was born into, that same world in which his people lived for centuries before the white man came to dispossess the Indian.

The story this book tells is an unusual and engrossing one and the manner of its telling will surely put it in the forefront of our literature about the American Indian.

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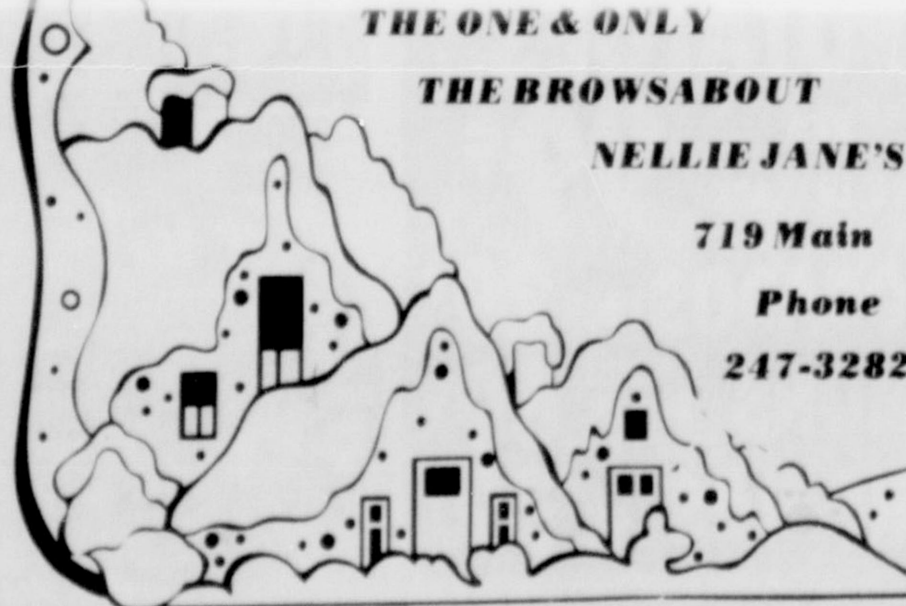
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
