





### **City Receives** Sales Tax Cut

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced that his office mailed checks totaling \$13.2 million Monday to 640 Texas cities as their November rebate of the one-cent city sales tax.

The City of Friona received a check in the amount of \$4,188.79.

Bullock said this raises to \$252.2 million the amount that the cities have received in rebates this calendar year, an increase of \$28.5 million--or nearly 13 per cent--over the same period a year ago.

"This increase in consumer spending is a good sign that the Texas economy is on the right track," Bullock said.

The rebate checks ranged from \$2,532,776 for the City of Houston to \$501.38 to Springtown.

Residents who have not already had their shots might be influenced by the case of swine flu which was verified earlier this week in Missouri.

### **Postal Service Advances Xmas Mail Deadline**

The Postal Service on November 10 advanced by one week its suggested mailing deadlines of Christmas mail because of higher mail volume resulting from the strike against United Parcel Service.

The suggested deadlines were moved up to December 3 for domestic parcels and December 10 for letters and Christmas cards.


Parcel volume has more than doubled in the 15 eastern and southern states affected by the eight-week-old strike against United Parcel, which is the Postal Service's main competitor.

told exactly how to install

An interesting thing about

lightning rods, though is that

most people didn't install

them for lightning protection

at all but rather to be in

style. The rods added

character, grace and beauty

to the homes in those days

The rods came in many

different ornamental styles

The designs included

straight or twisted rods, rods

with weather vanes and

roosters attached, owner's

initials, names or brands

a little trouble to put back in

Roof tops of the finer, more stately homes used to be adorned with lighting rods. The specific purpose of the rods was to protect the structure from the devastation of bolts of lightning. I am told that our own Benjamin Franklin (you might know) thought up the idea and it became fashionable during the early 1900's.

Metal rods about four to six feet tall were fixed to the high points of the roof. Several were used, depending upon how many gables or ridges the particular house had. Heavy wire cables led from the rods down to rods driven deep into the ground.

Some folks believed the rods would keep lightning away but actually the opposite was true. The rods actually attracted bolts of lightning. The theory was that the electrical charge would strike the rod instead of the structure, pass through the cable and discharge harmlessly into the ground. The systems were apparently useful because there were government booklets and






## **Services Conducted** For Bessie Layman

Friona's Buttons and Bows Square Dance Club held a special square dance November 19 to honor Rev. and Mrs. David Plumb who will be moving from Friona soon.



# **Library Report**

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"Ishi In Two Words," by Theodora Kroeber is available at Friona Public Library.

The life story of Ishi, the Yahi Indian, lone survivor of a doomed tribe is unique in the annals of North American anthropology. It is also a tragic and absorbing drama that forms part of our own heritage of the land.

Ishi stumbled into the twentieth century on the morning of August 29. 1911, when, desperate with hunger and in terror of the white murderers of his family, he was found in the corral of a slaughter house near Oroville, California.

He had wandered in exhaustion from his native hills down to this valley town in search of food. Promptly labeled a wild man by the townspeople, and carried off for safekeeping to the local jail, he was

finally identified as an Indian by an anthropologist from the University. Ishi was brought to San Francisco by Professor T.T. Waterman and lived there the rest of his life under the care of the staff of the University of California's Museum of Anthropology. He was about fifty years of age when "discovered" and ultimately was given the name Ishi his

The first part of the book is a reconstructed life of Ishi in the world he was born into, that same world in which his people lived for centuries before the white man came to dispossess the Indian.

The story this book tells is an unusual and engrossing one and the manner of its telling will surely put it in the forefront of our literature about the American Indian.

# Local Students **Enroll At OST**


Three students from Parmer County are among 3,150 full-time students enrolled for the fall trimester at Oklahoma State Tech. Okmulgee, Oklahoma.


