Ethics Code Prospects Dim

Political realists in Washington seelittle chance that Congress will soon or significantly reform itself by adoption of a code of ethics, personal financial disclosure requirements, or statutory prohibitions on conflicts of interest

This is most unfortunate, for Congress seriously needs such measures to restore its prestige, public confidence, and its check-and-balance power as a coordinate branch of the federal government. The prospect is, nevertheless, discouraging.

Only a few members of Congress are really pushing for meaningful reforms-such as Sens. Paul Douglas, D-III., Clifford Case, R-N. J., and Jo-seph Clark, D-Pa. The majority and minority leaderships of both chambers and key committee chairmen are still adamantly opposed to any such rules of ethical conduct as Congress has imposed on members of the executive and judicial branches.

The Joint Committee on Organization of the Congress, created to consider revision of legislative rules of procedure and committee structure, has done little so far in the way of promoting adoption of ethical standards for the congressional membership. Members have not yet been appointed to the Special Senate Committee on Ethics and Standards which the upper chamber, in an apparently empty jesture toward public demand, established last July.

It may be that the only practical check on a member of Congress' ethical conduct is the ballot power of his constituents. But surely the electorate, as well as members of Congress, need some mutually agreed guidelines on which popular judgments can be fairly and intelligently based. A full disclosure of financial interests is proper, but only an aroused public can bring it about.

Instruments Of Danger

The Food and Drugs Administration has issued a warning about "cracker balls," tiny bits of potent explosive which are wrapped attractively enough to resemble candy. At least one child, biting into a cracker ball, has been killed. Nine others have been injured

Certainly the public should be advised of this new hazard. And while on the subject, it is well

to be reminded of the general hazard inherent in all fireworks. They can be dangerous, and parents who turn their children over willy nilly with a bunch of fireworks are courting disaster. Every year there are reports of youngsters who have their eyes put out by firecrackers. Anything that can inflict a life of blindness or can maim must be considered dangerous.



Around The Rim

Great Problem Of Air Pollution

Southern California is generally considered the most heavily hit by air pollution, a problem of civilization that is growing as fast as water pol-lution. But according to a recent study by New York City officials, Los Angeles is a far safer place to breathe than New York—or for that matter, Washington, D. C., Chicago, or even Denver.

THE NEW YORKERS state air in their city is the most dangerous in the country, and that a resident in one day may inhale as much of a suspected cancer-causing substance as hey would if they smoked a halfdozen or more cigarettes. The city is subjected to a steady rain of sooty dust that exceeds 100 tons per square mile

Worst of all, the city is blanketed by sulfuric acid mist, which eats at the lungs and corrodes monuments. There is practically none of this dead-ly material in the California air.

AIR POLLUTION in two weeks of 1953 was blamed for killing 400 New Yorkers. And worse, many respiratory diseases in that city are climbing rap-

idly. Chronic bronchitis has hit an estimated 100,000 persons, and the death rate from this cause has doubled in the last five years.

Pulmonary emphysema has be-come more common and is named the

leading cause of disability in persons over 50 years of age. The death rate from this disease has also doubled in the last five years.

LUNG CANCER deaths are rising steadily, hitting 2,761 last year. Curiously, even with this fact-filled report, the city fathers are having a difficult time bringing the sources of contamination under control. Apparently, most of the pollution is caused by burning fuel oil and coal, and the city's industry pours tons of this waste material into the air every day. And what goes up, inevitably will come down to be breathed by the city's inhabitants. Natural gas for industry would solve much of this problem, but a changeover would be quite expensive.

AT ANY RATE, the mammoth city has a mannoth sized problem with its poisoned air-and one which continues to grow in seriousness. And scientists prédict we may decimate our own cities with pollution-rather than wait for some future atomic war-if something isn't done to check current trends.

I suspect the problem of air pollution, like water pollution, will reach into all corners of the land and be a universal problem. As in New York, both are problems we cannot delay too long in solving. -V. GLENN COOTES
