



Bandy Bags Star's Football Contest

Clay Bandy won the Friona Star's 1976 football contest going away. with a score of 198 points. He was five points ahead of his nearest opponent. He is to receive \$100 cash for his winning effort.

Don Fortenberry and Michael Means tied for second and third place five points behind Bandy with scores of 193. Fortenberry and Means each were awarded \$20 for their efforts

Bandy's winning margin was the largest ever in the long history of the contest. Many contests have ended in a virtual tie, with some tle-breaker method having to be employed to determine the champion.

Bandy put the finishing touches on his good year of picking football games by posting a score of 18 in the last regular week of the contest. It was the best score recorded for the week, and earned him the weekly third prize on the basis of his tie-breaker score.

Pheasant Season Begins Dec. 11

The 1976 pheasant season in Parmer County will get underway Saturday, December 11, and continue through Sunday, December 26, spanning three weekends this year as it has in the past three years. No official word has been received as to the type of hunt that may be expected this year, although recent pheasant seasons have produced

excellent hunts. It will mark the 13th annual pheasant season for hunters in Parmer County.

More than 2000 pheasants were released in Parmer County by the game association in 1962 and '63 with

since that tir The more colorful male pheasant is the only legal game for hunters with the hens being protected by state laws.

The limit this year will be two cocks per day with four in possession, the same as the past several years. The season and rules are set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The later season for hunting pheasants has proven popular, especially with college students. Although a large number of hunters will be in the fields throughout the season, most of the hunters will be stalking the colorful bird the opening weekend of the season.

Tailfeather contests will be conducted in Friona, Bovina and

Farwell again this year with three cash prizes offered for the longest tailfeathers.

The hunter turning in the longest feather in each town will receive a \$15 cash prize with second place awarded \$10 and third place \$5. The hunter with the longest tailfeather in the county will receive an engraved plaque from the Parmer County Game Management Association.

Further details concerning the local contest will be printed in next week's edition of The Friona Star.





TIME after crops mature in the fall is an ideal time to take soil samples. Once plants reach maturity, they virtually stop taking up nutrients. Therefore, the soil's nutrient state will remain about the same until planting time next There are many advantages to soil testing at this time. For one thing, you can now readily identify problem acres in a field. If you think fertility caused re-

duced yield or unusual symptoms in some areas. sample these areas separately so that a comparative evaluation can be made. Other reasons for soil

testing this time of year include pleasant weather and more favorable soil conditions.

Although overall shortages of fertilizer are not anticipated, there can be a big advantage in having time to make plans with your dealer for the material needed.

The possibility of fall application of all or part of next year's fertilizer soon after harvest is another important consideration.

ples can be obtained from my office. It is important to provide

the soil chemist with information about your land use plans for next year so that fertilizer-use suggestions can be made on your soil test report. A choice can be indicated on the information sheet accompanying soil samples whether regular tests or regular tests plus the micronutrients iron, zinc and manganese are desired.

PORK TO BE PLENTIFUL--There will be plenty of pork available for the dinner table the remainder of the year. The pork supply has been boosted by increased farrowings, thus upping the number of hogs moving to market. Market barrows should bring \$32-\$37 per hundredweight for the remainder of the year provided other meat situations remain similar to last year. Some 16-18 per cent more hogs will be marketed during the last quarter of this year than a year ago.

Chieftains Capture Fifth Straight Win


The Friona Chieftains won their fifth straight basketball game by defeating the Vega Longhorns last Tuesday night in Vega, 43-38.

Mark Neill was the high point man with 10, followed by John Jarecki and Koty Kothmann who both scored eight. Keith Martin was next with seven



Br-r- Temperatures **Hit Record Lows**

Cold enough? According to the Weather Bureau, most records, some as far back as 1898, were demolished across the High Plains between Friday and Monday of the past week.

No blizzard conditions materialized, although area residents had been advised by weathermen to protect livestock to the best of their ability against the intense cold

There were no reports of roads being absolutely blocked in Friona. but dangerous conditions prevailed. Travelers' warnings were out and residents were advised to stay home, if possible. On Saturday morning, less than an inch of snow had fallen where it had been snowing since Friday night.

Wind velocities were about 35 miles an hour here early Saturday morning, with higher gusts. The recent snow storm was the third of a very young winter and those predicting difficult times weatherwise could be right.

November, 1976, has been the coldest November on record, with the daily temperature reading some nine degrees below average.

On the cotton harvest, sources say the October 8 freeze cut the crop by 30 to 35 percent. The storms of November had little significance other than to delay harvest three to four days on each occasion. The last such early heavy freeze that can be recalled occurred in 1957

Cotton acreage is said to be way

down and, with approximately 80 percent of the crop harvested, very few farmers have reported as much as one bale per acre. Greater acreage is expected to be planted next season, as prices have been excellent.

The corn yield has been generally large, easy to handle and the weather has presented no real problems. There are reports of 11,000 to 12,000 pound yields (wet weight) per acre, and about 9,700 pounds dry weight.

Price for corn is lower than cost of production and farmers for the most part are holding their crops, hoping for far better prices.

According to a local spokesman, the following is pertinent to the cotton situation:

"Recent snows have delayed the cotton harvest again, but the hard freezes have been beneficial to the opening of the late bolls on cotton hurt by this year's unseasonable early freeze.

Cotton acreage has been low for the past few years, but a favorable price and the control of 2-4-D herbicide have created a new

interest in cotton as a major crop. Several area farmers are harvesting in the neighborhood of a bale to the acre with a per-acre return in the \$225.00 to \$350.00 range. Micronaire has been very good this season.

Prospects for a good price for cotton in the 1977 crop year are very good, since world consumption is projected to exceed production by about two million bales this year. thus creating an even smaller carry-over for 1977 than in 1976. Some area farmers are contracting their 1977 acreage in order to lock in a profit. The 1977 loan has been announced as being 5.46 cents a pound higher than the 1976 loan, which is another factor creating interest in cotton.





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SCS Report

Yes, it is time again to report wind erosion damage in Parmer County according to Herb Evans.

The reporting period beginning first of November and ending the last of May each year. Three reports are to be made during this period of time.

The first report covering November and December, second covering January and February, third covering March, April and May. It is hard to realize the amount of damage wind can cause to agriculture.

(1) The tons of top soil loss per acre.

(2) The damage to young grass and wheat during establishment.(3) Damage to fields and

dirt roads.

A good way to prevent some damage is to have a good crop residue management program on your farm. That is, leaving crop residues on the soil surface for long as possible during the wind erosion period.

This residue will not only prevent wind erosion, but also provide organic material for future crops. For more information to prevent wind erosion contact Soil Conservation Ser-





Friona Receives Sales Tax Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday that Texas cities received a total of \$302.8 million in city sales tax rebates during the 1976 calendar year, a 14.4 per cent increase over 1975.

"The jingling of those cash registers has been music to ears, both at the state and city level," Bullock said.

Bullock said his office mailed checks totaling \$50.6 million today to 864 Texas cities as their December rebate of the one-cent city sales tax. The December rebate was \$9.8 million over that for the same month a year ago.

The biggest check--\$10.3 million-went to the City of Houston. Tiny Bloomburg will receive the smallest--\$4.42.

The city sales tax is collected by retailers along with the four per cent state sales tax. The Comptroller's Office rebates to the cities their share on a monthly basis.

Friona received a check for \$8,766.04.


Star To Skip On January 1
