



Seeks Money For Warship Restoration BALTIMORE, Md.-The Con-

stellation Restoration Committee today is seeking \$225,000 to restore rigging, bulwarks and main deck of the Navy's oldest warship afloat.

The, historic, three - masted sailing vessel, launched here on Sept. 9, 1797, several months earlier than the USF Constitution, has served in nearly all major wars involving the United States. During World War II she was flagship of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet. In 1955, Constellation was

loaded aboard a floating drydock and towed to Baltimore where a group of volunteers have been struggling to raise money and restore the ship.

Four years ago, July 4, Constellation was dedicated a National Shrine. On May 24, 1963, she became a National Historic Landmark.

Since March, 1964, Constellation has undergone major repairs to her hull and bow which are now completely restored and painted. Last week her main mast was "stepped" in place. Although some 400,000 has al-





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
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









LAKE OSWEGO, Ore. (AP) - In October, a scrub-faced teen-ager, Don Schollander, swam away with the 1964 Tokyo Olympics, winning four gold medals.

Eight months later, he collapsed in Switzerland with mononucleosis, exhausted after his first semester at Yale, three trips to Europe, two to the White House and dozens of banquets and parades across the country.

Mononucleosis - sometimes called glandular fever - is a disease bringing on fever, general weakness, and swellings of the lymph glands. It probably is caused by a virus. It usually affects young people and rest is the main treatment. It's fatal only in rare cases when complications occur.

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We spend our summers by the Inlet. Eddie and I love to walk the beach, watching with fascination the wild churning of the water where the ocean waves meet the strong river current.


"That's my name," he said, when I told him the churning water was called an "eddy."

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

## **Right Of Privacy**

Quite a little attention has been focused lately, on invasion of privacy by units of the federal government. The public has been made aware that thousands of government employes are given "lie detector" tests or psychological tests featuring intimate personal questions, that the Post Office pries into who gets mail from whom, that there is a lot of authorized and unauthorized listeningin on phone talk in government of-

fices, and so on. Congressional committee probes have brought most of these disclosures. That is the first half of a pattern that has emerged. The second half, more often than not, is a promise by the offending agency that it will be less snoopy-less in violation of the basic American right to privacy -than in the past.

The State Department, for exam-

ple, has been reviewing use of psychological tests, and may modify its practices. Postmaster General Gronouski, after admitting that the socalled mail covers "do to some degree invade individual rights," has issued new administrative rules intended to keep this extra-legal practice under better control.

This is an unsatisfactory way to deal with a problem that touches closely on a constitutional right we should be zealous to preserve-the right to live our private lives without government prying. The pattern of disclosure followed by promises to do better in the future is not adequate. What is needed is congressional action to reaffirm the principle of individual privacy, and to keep the actions of government agencies firmly in check.

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

Sooner or later it will be recognized that the executive system of today has outlived its usefulness and needs a few of those mature minds from the business world to formulate a system of operation that will not only be efficient in administration but effective in making policy.

FOR ONE THING, "the President's cabinet" is a misnomer. It is, in fact, a group of managers of departments, every one of which could be supervised by career executives so as to leave the secretary in each case free to give virtually his entire time to the task of advising the President on all manner of subjects.

No President can know all the answers to all public questions, and he is necessarily dependent on advisers of some kind. But it is this very phase of the present system which is weak. The unofficial advisers to a President today are handpicked as a sort of personal entourage, responsible only to the man who can fire them overnight. There is no sense of responsibility to the public such as is vested in a cabinet officer who is confirmed by the Senate.

MANY OF THESE personal advisers-as, for instance, McGeorge Bundy-are capable of holding cabinet posts. But there can hardly be two Secretaries of State. It would be much better if Secretary Rusk had the services of as many personal advisers as he wished and could give to the President and the entire cabinet the "consensus" which he found in the reports from abroad and from the interpretation of such reports by experienced men around him.

#### **THE UNITED STATES government**

is the largest in the world. Some decentralization on a geographical basis may become necessary to take care of the federal government's newly assumed responsibilities for handling regional as well as local problems that range from economic to educational and sociological fields. But a new operating formula for the departments, in the national capital is essential, together with the establishment of a cabinet in which each member would give his entire time to the President and occupy offices in a building along with him.

Such a group of advisers would be much more likely to help steer a resolute and steady course in foreign policy than is possible under the hitor-miss system of today which results in so many improvised and spur-of-the-moment decisions. Certainly it is time that the weakness in the present system of presidential operations was remedied.



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

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
