



LAKE FOREST, III. (AP) -Bill Triplett's return to health and the maturing of Charley Johnson make the St. Louis Cardinals a formidable threat to win the Eastern Conference title in the National Football League. The Cards haven't won the crown since they moved to St. Louis in 1960. They hadn't won at Chicago, either, since 1948 when they swept the division crown but lost the championship game.



#### Keystone Of Policy

A minor tempest may have been stilled by a joint clarification from President Johnson and Henry Cabot Lodge of what Lodge didn't say. Both agree that Lodge didn't say that the United States would keep its forces in South Viet Nam even if their withdrawal was requested by the Saigon government.

Johnson, witnessing President Lodge's oath as our new ambassador to South Viet Nam, said that the United States never would undertake sacrifices in that country "if its help were not wanted and requested."

Lodge told a reporter earlier: "I didn't say that, I'll tell you that," referring to the statement attributed to him.

It is difficult to believe that Lodge

could have made such a statement. He knows the score in Viet Nam. Even if he thought the United States would remain in South Viet Nam even if the Saigon government asked us to leave, he is surely enough of a diplomat not to say it out loud.

After all, the keystone of our policy in Viet Nam is based on a cry for "help" from South Viet Nam. Without that warrant, we would have no business in that country in the role of the white man fighting Asians, of the most powerful nation on earth picking on one of the smallest and poorest nations on earth.

If the time should ever come when the Saigon government asks us to leave, it would be difficult indeed to find an excuse for remaining.

#### **Problem Of Parking**

WASHINGTON - Dr. Martin Luther King will hardly be blamed for evidently not knowing about the Logan Act when he announced that he would get in touch with the North Viet Nam government to try to persuade it to enter into peace negotiations - for very few people are aware of what this little-used statute means.

IT WAS DESIGNED, of course, to prevent American citizens from interfering with the foreign-policy operations of their own government. Once, however, our own government approves or says it has no objectiona rare occurrence - a citizen may

### Around The Rim When You're Dead You're Dead

In recent weeks, many have turned their pens to the anniversary dates of the first atomic bombs dropped on Japan-the so-called birth of the Atomic Era.

Checking a multitude of newspaper articles, magazines, electronic commentators, I believe most of them are joined in hand-wringing aimed at supporting the latter day theory the A-Bomb should never have been used. Our nation and its leaders have been the subject of much abuse for using the weapon.

THERE ARE some corollary facts concerning the decision to drop the bomb that are not included in some of the second-guessing I have read. For instance, the bomb dropped on Hiroshima was rated at 20,000 tons of TNT. Had our military people hauled that much TNT over the city and dropped it, apparently the dam-age would have been the same. Is death any the more dreadful because an atom was split to cause the explosion rather than TNT?

THE NUMBER of people killed is most often used to illustrate the terrors of the A-Bomb. This figure is now pegged at considerably less than 100,000, or a little more than that number in both drops-Hiroshima and Nagasaki. This was peanuts in human death,

when compared to a fire bomb raid on Tokyo several months before when the death toll was pegged at 125,000 in one fell swoop.

THE ALTERNATIVE to dropping the A-Bomb was a continued prolonged war. American soldiers were dying at the rate of 250 every day of the war at that time. Our military leaders predicted it would take up to 1,000,000 American lives to storm the shores of Japan. The loss in Japanese life would be much higher, it was predicted.

There seems to be no doubt that Japan could have been defeated without the A-Bomb, but the alternative was pouring many more lives into the wasteful cauldron of war. Far from being needless destruction, the dropping of the A-Bomb likely saved many more lives than it snuffed out.

THE MORALITY of the A-bomb appears a moot point. What difference is there in killing a man with a knife, a bullet or a hatchet? Perhaps, the spectacular atomic explosion has since urged nations to head for the conference table, rather than the weapons shed. If so, then it has served a second useful purpose. Back in 1945, it saved lives and end-

ed a terrible war. -V. GLENN COOTES

He did so by consulting, not the interest of labor leaders alone, which President Johnson has done, but the interests of management and the general pub-

Now comes the 14-B repealer before the U. S. Senate, whose members are walking around it as if it were a coiled rattlesnake.

IOWA'S JUNIOR Republican senator, Jack Miller, as sharp a reasoner as there is in the Senate, thinks that all labor laws should contain four basic safeguards. They are: a "dropout" clause for any worker who decides to quit a union, a "grandfather" clause to exempt workers with more than one year's longevity from being forced to join unions, a twin prohibition against blackjacking management into compulsory membership agreements and against the spending of union dues for political purposes. An administration bill, inclusive of the Miller safeguards, might make repeal of 14-B acceptable to most Senators. But the administration seems not really to be seeking a "consensus" on this one. There have been few instances in which the Logan Act has been enforced, though its objectives have been in part attained by the withholding of passports or the refusal to give visas for travel when individuals wish to enter countries, like Red China, with which friendly relations do not prevail.

DR. KING WON the Nobel Peace prize in 1964, and he doubtless thinks as a matter of prestige and responsibility, that he is eligible to take the initiative in influencing governments to settle their disputes with this country.

But in the minds of many people here Dr. King's proposal to help make peace by talking with or writing to the officials of the North Viet Nam government may be misinterpreted as in some way related to the "civil rights" controversy.

IT IS UNFORTUNATE that the text of the Logan Act is not more widely known and that rigid enforcement has been neglected. Some misguided Americans, with sympathy for the Communist cause, are members of organizations which are directly or indirectly aided by a foreign government. The activities, for example, of the Communist party in this country are regularly reported to - if not directed by - agents of the Soviet government. All such transactions are unlawful acts on the part of those who contact foreign governments in person or by letter.

It is important for the American government to make sure that even business parleys do not include any activities which could be construed as an "intent to influence the measures or conduct of any foreign government or of any officer or agent thereof, in relation to any disputes or controversies with the United States."

IF THE LOGAN Act needs clarification, this should be done by Congress. If the law is valueless, it ought to be repealed. Otherwise, its prohibitions should be enforced so this can have a deterrent effect on some of the irresponsible groups which organize "demonstrations" around the White House and the capitol. They thus arouse the hopes of foreign governments that continuation of their opposition to American policies will eventually gain the support of public opinion in this country. # **Drouth Loss** Loans Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Farmers Home Administration has been authorized to make emergency loans to farmers in seven Texas counties because of drouth damage in previous years from which they have not recovered and adverse weather S conditions in 1965.



# Old-Timer Tells Memories Of Indian Days, Old Recipes

By JO BRIGHT One of the people who great-ly influenced the childhood of Anton Mike Ripps, 1509 S. Main. was what he calls a "mocco. a 90-year-old man who had an Indian mother and a father who had been a Spanish soldier. Ripps remembers that the old gentleman worked on their farm at Espada Mission in the 1880's. The boy followed the "mocco" every day as he did his chores. They talked of many things how to snare a rabbit, trap scavengers that ruined crops, and how to tell which crow eggs would be roosters and which would be hens.

For centuries, the Indians had used their wits against the wilderness to survive with as little discomfort as possible. Their wisdom came from observing nature and adopting the instincts of wild creatures as their own, and many of these simple truths were learned and practiced by the Ripps family while the old man was in their employ. One of his main chores was to look after the youngsters in the family.

A. M. Ripps, 81, was born in San Antonio in 1883, one of the 11 children born to Mr. and Mrs. Anton J. Ripps. He was reared there, later seeking his fortune as a "boomer fireman" with the International and Great Northern Railroad when he was 17 years old.

"Those were the days of wooden machines and iron men," recalled Mr. Ripps. "You might say, too, that we had strong work like that!"
