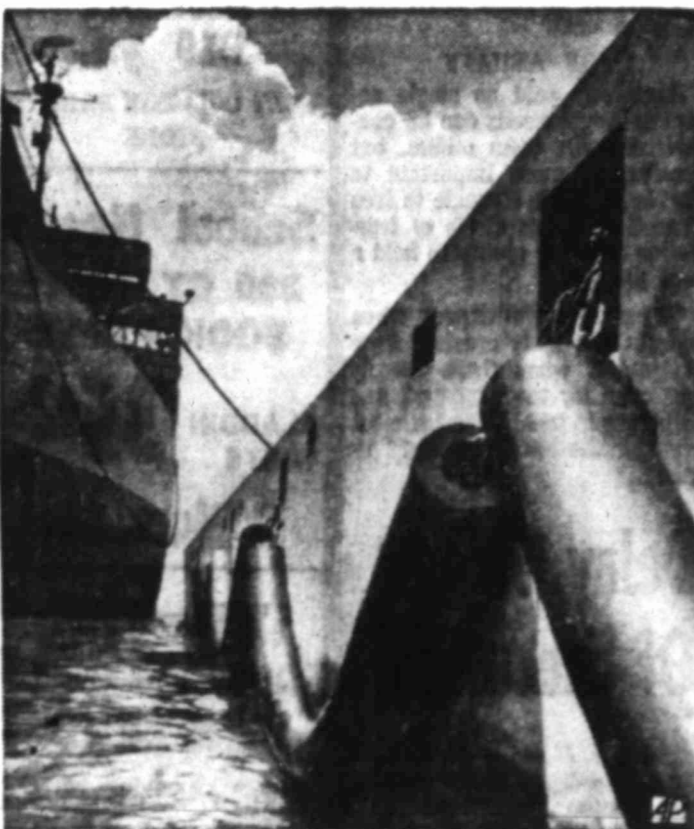

**THE CAPITOL**—In this building in Washington, D.C., are enacted the laws of the United States. The "House" side is on the left and "Senate" side on the right.



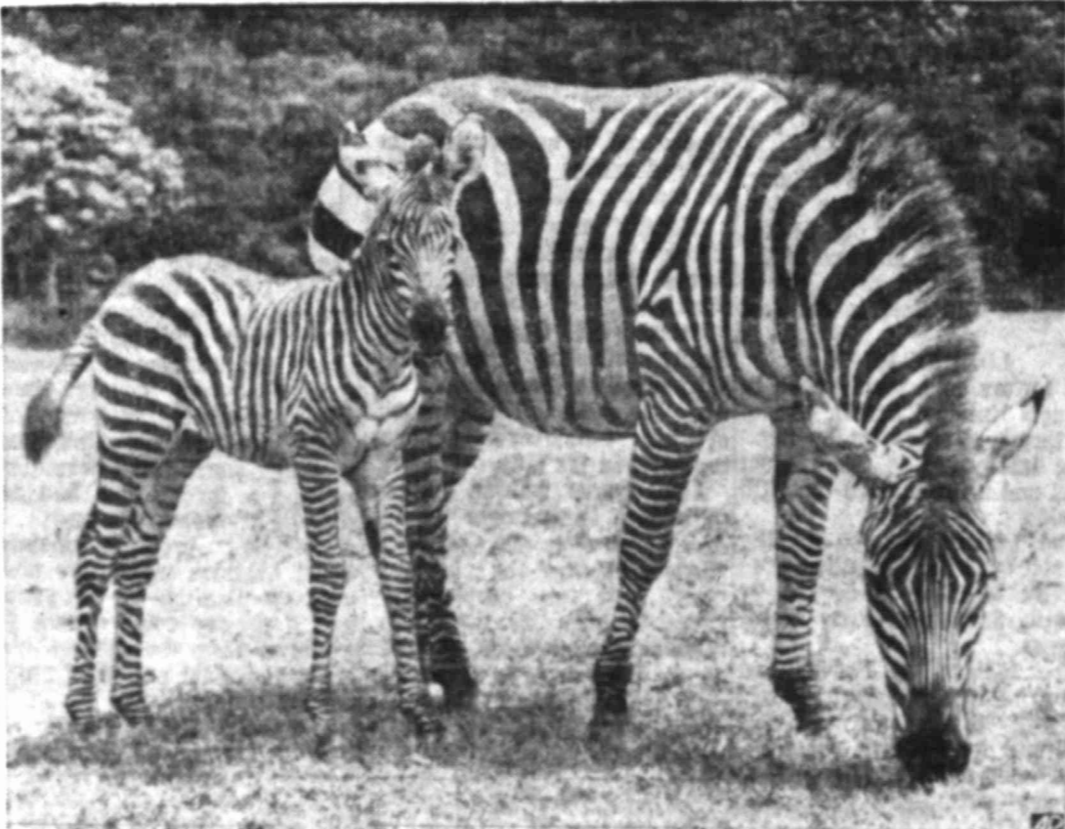

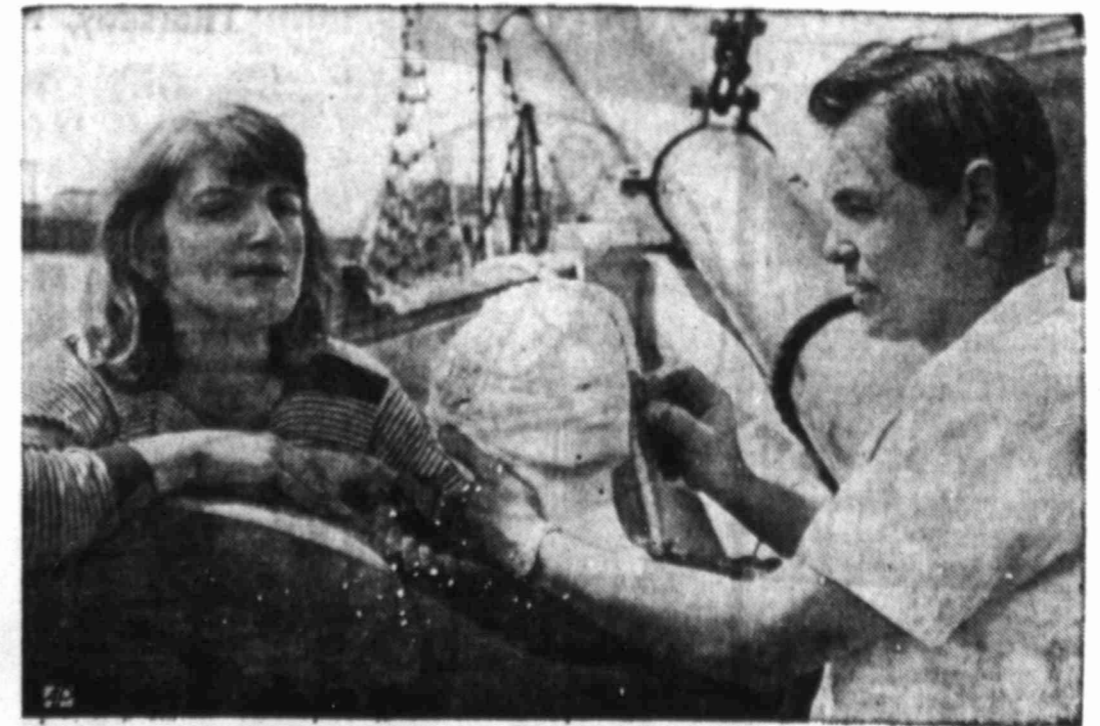

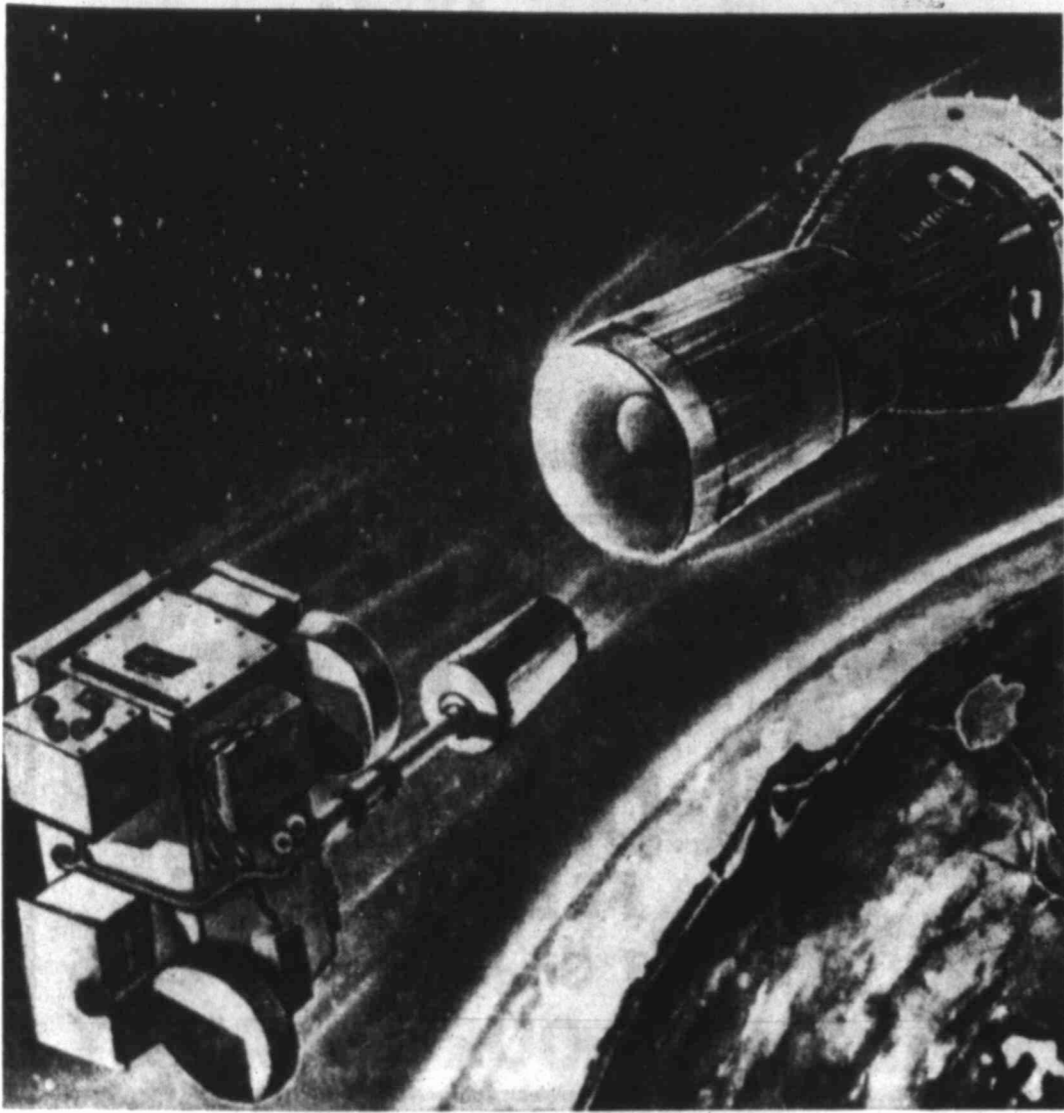

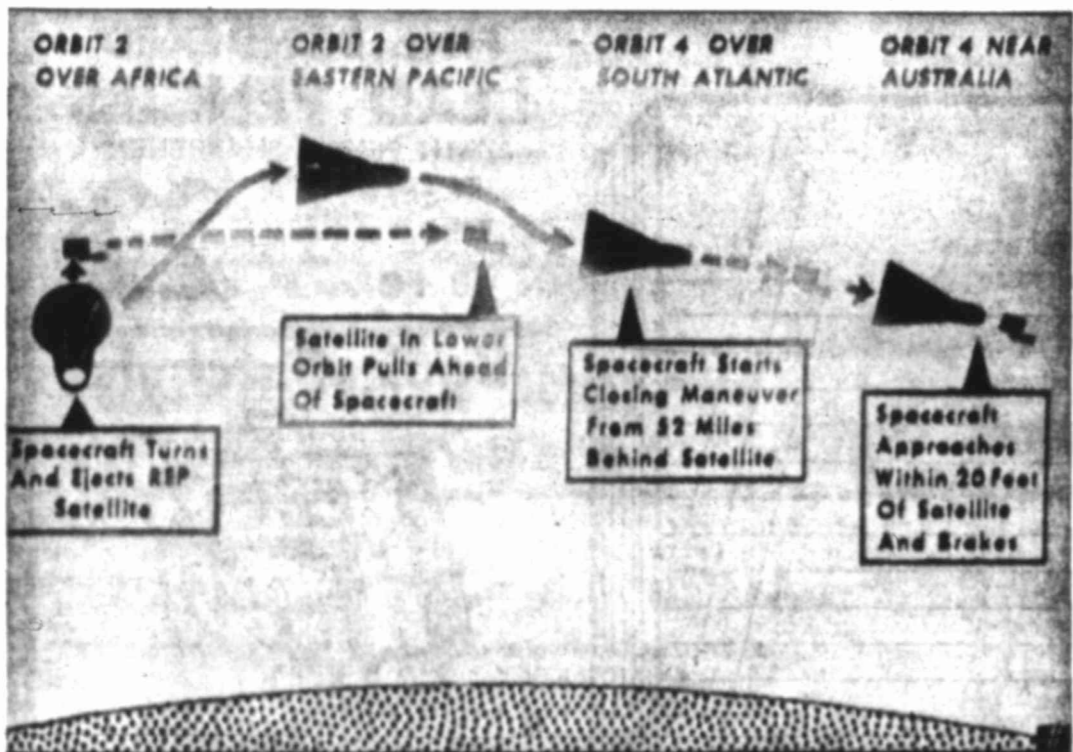

Conrad Known For Congeniality

Actress Unruffled In Studio Melee With Stockholder

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actress Lucille Ball remained unruffled in a melee at the annual stockholders meeting of Desilu Productions, Inc., which she heads.

John J. Gilbert, a stockholder, demanded answers Wednesday to questions about company policy, profits, management, lack of dividends and about salaries paid to executives. Management asked that he be ejected and he resisted.

Gilbert asked why Miss Ball received such a high figure — \$232,172 — as actress and president. Miss Ball intervened on his behalf and Gilbert was allowed to stay in the meeting.

Vandals Hurl Fire Bombs

EAST PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — Vandals hurling fire bombs from moving cars set a series of fires in East Palo Alto and nearby Menlo Park Wednesday night and today, damaging two supermarkets and burning three cars.

The sheriff's office said eight fires were reported, all involving arson.

It was the second night that youths set fires in a one-mile radius in the predominantly Negro residential areas of the two towns, deputies said.

Sheriff's Sgt. Gerald Fitting said five Negro youths, aged 21 to 17 years, were arrested as suspects in Tuesday evening's fires.

Parks Board Concerned About Growing Vandalism

Park and Recreation Board members, concerned about what they termed growing vandalism at city park and recreation areas, Wednesday instructed Johnnie Johansen, park superintendent, to invite local law enforcement officers as well as the city attorney and city judge to the next regular meeting to discuss juvenile law and possible remedial actions. The decision came at the end of a regular two-hour meeting at City Hall.

During the vandalism discussion Johansen said "everyone in other cities with this problem report the solution is to put only unbreakable equipment in the park area—but I don't know what vandals can't tear up if they try."

"Maybe the judges could make vandals do work in the park, repair their own damage," Jack Watkins said.

"If the newspaper would publish their names, these kids and their parents, might think twice about destroying property," Mrs. H. W. Smith said.

Don Newsom suggested an educational program informing parents about their responsibility for their children, and showing the public that vandalism of city park facilities is the same as destroying their own.

In other business, Watkins told the board that he had estimates of the cost of five metal signs identifying the new overnight rest park on US 87 south

at \$22.50 each, not including mounting posts. The 4 by 6-foot signs had been recommended at the last meeting for installation on the major access routes to the city.

Watkins said that although service stations have been doing an excellent job of directing campers to the park, he felt that signs giving the location, facilities furnished, and the fact that the park is city-sponsored would be of aid to campers. The Board recommended purchase of the signs from money already allocated for the overnight park.

A group of persons interested in competitive swimming, headed by Lt. Col. Robert H. Tyldesley, Webb AFB, appeared at the request of W. D. Broughton and suggested enlarging the City Park pool from 50 yards length to regulation size (50 meters). Broughton said he had sent out questionnaires to swim enthusiasts asking them what improvements they felt the pool needed, and said most replies were that the shower rooms needed improvements, the pool needed enlarging, and that the water conditioning system needed replacing.

City Manager Larry Crow said the pool, especially the fluoridation equipment and the shower rooms, was badly in need of improvement, but recommended a study of the number of people using the pool and whether enlarging it to 50

Cooper's Space Prayer Still In Little Church

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Stormy weather and trouble in fuel and telemetry systems forced postponement of the Gemini 5 space mission today.

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — In a small Methodist church in the small town of Seabrook, Tex., there is a copy of a prayer once said in space.

It is written in the bold script of astronaut L. Gordon Cooper Jr., 38. Flanking the prayer are a Christian flag and Old Glory.

1963 FLIGHT

The flags were carried by Cooper on his 22-orbit space flight May 15-16, 1963. The prayer is the one he uttered during the 14th orbit.

received a flying license while a teen-ager in Oklahoma. His mother, Mrs. Leroy Gordon Cooper Sr. of Carbondale, Colo., said she worried about her son flying in the early days, but then came to realize "God's up there the same as on the ground."

After graduating from high school in 1945, Cooper joined the Marine Corps and entered the Naval Academy Preparatory School. He was discharged in 1946 and attended the University of Hawaii. It was there he met and married the former Trudy Olson of Seattle, Wash.

Religion is a big factor in the Air Force lieutenant colonel's life. He has delivered the sermon at his church several times. The name of his Mercury spacecraft was Faith 7, a name he deliberated over a long time.

"The dictionary gives three definitions of faith," he said. "They are belief, loyalty and confidence. I wanted the world to see those things."

BOAT RACES

Another side of the astronaut's personality is a love for speedboats. He has entered several national speedboat races and owns a boating company on Galveston Bay.

He and his wife, Trudy, are excellent pilots and have their own plane. They fly all over the country, taking their two daughters, Camala 16, and Janita 15, with them.

Cooper, a native of Shawnee, Okla., is a quiet, thoughtful man.

He does not talk any more than is necessary. In this regard, he and his Gemini 3 partner, Navy Lt. Cmdr. Charles Conrad Jr., complement each other.

Gordon—as his friends call him—is one of the seven original Mercury astronauts. Only three members of the Mercury team still are considered able to make a space flight. They are Cooper, Air Force Lt. Col. Virgil I. Grissom and Navy Capt. Walter M. Shira Jr.

## Marines Rip Cong Camp

CHU LAL, South Viet Nam and naval gunfire pounded the Viet Cong as the Marines fought their way across the peninsula. The fighting went on through the night and much of today as the Leathernecks drove the Viet Cong from bunkers, tunnels and caves.

The Viet Cong attack that began Wednesday night on the town and special forces camp at Dak Sur, 200 miles north of Saigon, had been expected for several weeks. Two agents of the district chief had vanished, and the Viet Cong had threatened that the area would be hit.

The attack began shortly after dark. Heavy fighting was reported about three hours later and communications with the district headquarters were lost, U.S. briefing officers said.

**BUNKERS EXPLODING**  
U.S. special forces personnel in their camp reported a short time later that the district headquarters was burning and ammunition bunkers were exploding.

At about that time, spokesmen said, the special forces camp itself came under small arms fire and later Communist markers opened up.

The defenders — said to consist of three companies of irregulars and their American advisers — fought on until about 4:30 a.m.

At that time, the advisers reported the camp had been fully penetrated, they had carried out the camp destruction plan and were abandoning the area.

The briefing officers said about midmorning eight Americans who had been in the camp were spotted about a mile south of the campsite and were picked up by helicopters. They were taken to Dak Tu, and their condition was not known immediately.

The Marines opened their operation on the Van Tuong Peninsula, 200 miles north of Saigon, early Wednesday, landing troops by helicopter and landing craft. They met heavy resistance.

## Most Viets Anti-Red, Taylor Tells Senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor told investigating senators today he is convinced that the great majority of South Vietnamese are anti-Communist.

The former ambassador to Saigon said "they have resisted the Viet Cong for 12 years, and I see no disposition on the part of the people to capitulate."

Taylor, testifying before a Senate Judiciary Subcommittee, added that "the increasing brutality of the terror tactics of the Viet Cong" has helped to produce a sharp rise in the flight of refugees into South Viet Nam.

Taylor told of recent reports of incidents of Viet Cong terrorism "with no apparent reason that to force people from their hamlets and villages" to swamp relief agencies in the south.

He added that there was no conclusive evidence the Viet Cong have adopted this tactic on any systematic, nationwide basis, but "we will continue to be alert to any development of this kind."

## Youth Not Death Pilot

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Civil Aeronautics Board said Wednesday it had made a mistake in an Aug. 12 report identifying the pilot of a plane that crashed March 12 near Tomball, Tex.

All four occupants of the plane were killed.

The federal agency said it initially listed David Books of Tomball as the pilot and J. D. Bull, H. L. Sandlin, and John Steen, all of Houston, as passengers.

## California Will Recruit Pickers

STOCKTON, Calif. (AP) — California growers have agreed to recruit workers from Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma in an attempt to save tomato crops in danger of rotting in the fields.

From 20 to 30 million pounds of tomatoes may rot in the fields if workers are not found to pick them.

In answer to growers' complaints, the Federal Labor Department asserted the growers had taken no steps to recruit the 5,000 Mexican workers available and about 4,000 American workers in Western states.

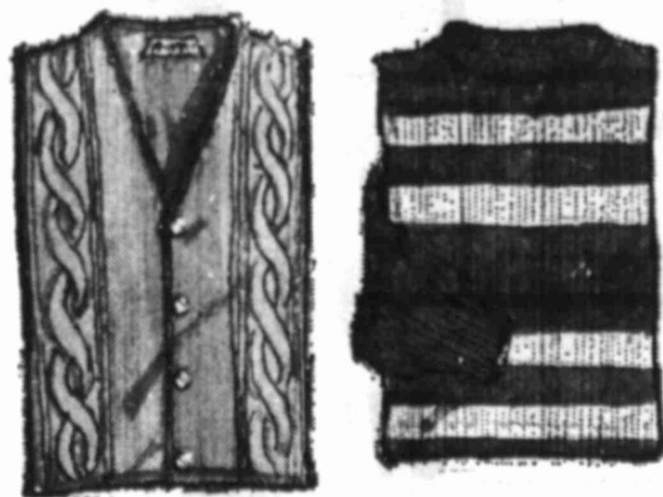

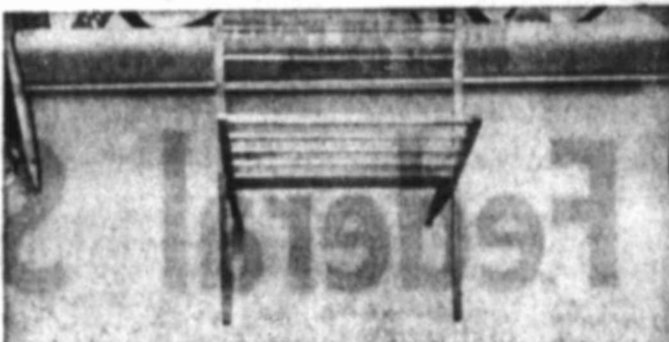

# Robinson Is On Rampage

Brooks Robinson must be the only man in baseball who could consider hitting into a triple play a lucky omen.

Baltimore's classy third baseman battered into one a year ago — while in a hot streak — and wound up the American League's Most Valuable Player.

He started another triple play with a grounder in his first at-bat Wednesday night but wound up leading the Orioles to a 3-2 victory over Boston, climbing nearer the league batting leadership, and improving his

chances for a second MVP award.

Robinson singled on his second trip to the plate and scored, then drove across the winning run with another single in the eighth inning. His two hits raised his average to .327 — a climb of 31 points this month — and left him just one point behind Boston's Carl Yastrzemski, who was 1-for-4.

In other AL action Johnny Romano and Pete Ward powered the Chicago White Sox to their sixth straight victory, 8-2 over Washington; the Los Angeles Angels beat the New York

Yankees 7-3 with a four-run eighth inning; and Cleveland split with Kansas City, winning 4-1 after a 4-2 setback. Detroit had a 1-0 lead over Minnesota's first-place Twins when their game at Detroit was rained out in the fourth inning.

Robinson, who has hit .456 this month with 33-for-71 in 18 games, came up in the first inning with one run in and men on first and second. His grounder to third went from Frank Malzone to Felix Mantilla to Tony Horton for two outs, and Horton's return to Malzone caught

Paul Blair, who had slipped rounding third.

But in the fourth, Robinson beat out an infield hit, was sacrificed to second, and scored on Jerry Adair's single. Eddie Bressoud tied it at 2-2 with a pinch two-run homer in the seventh, but Robinson untied it in the eighth with another single, following a walk to Blair and a wild pitch.

Romano batted in four White Sox runs with a homer and single, while Ward knocked in three with a homer and single. Bruce Howard blanked the Senators through eight innings,

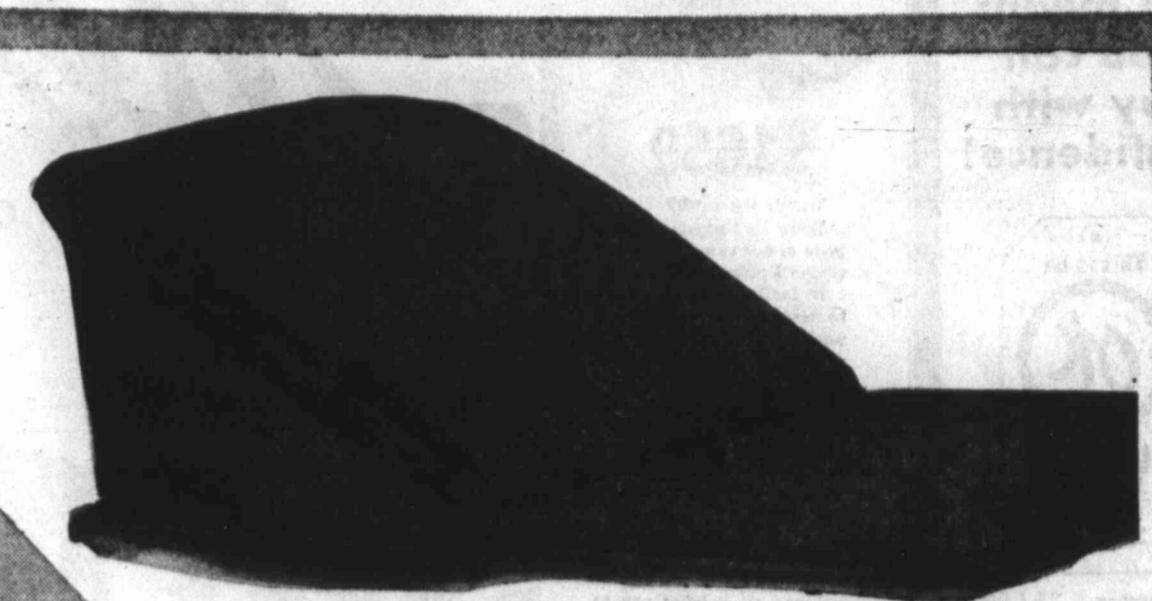

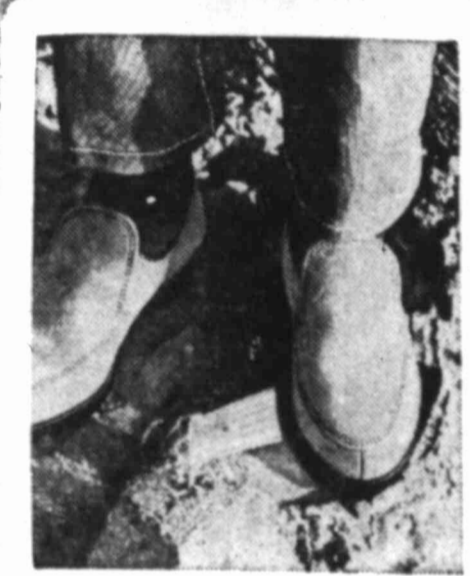

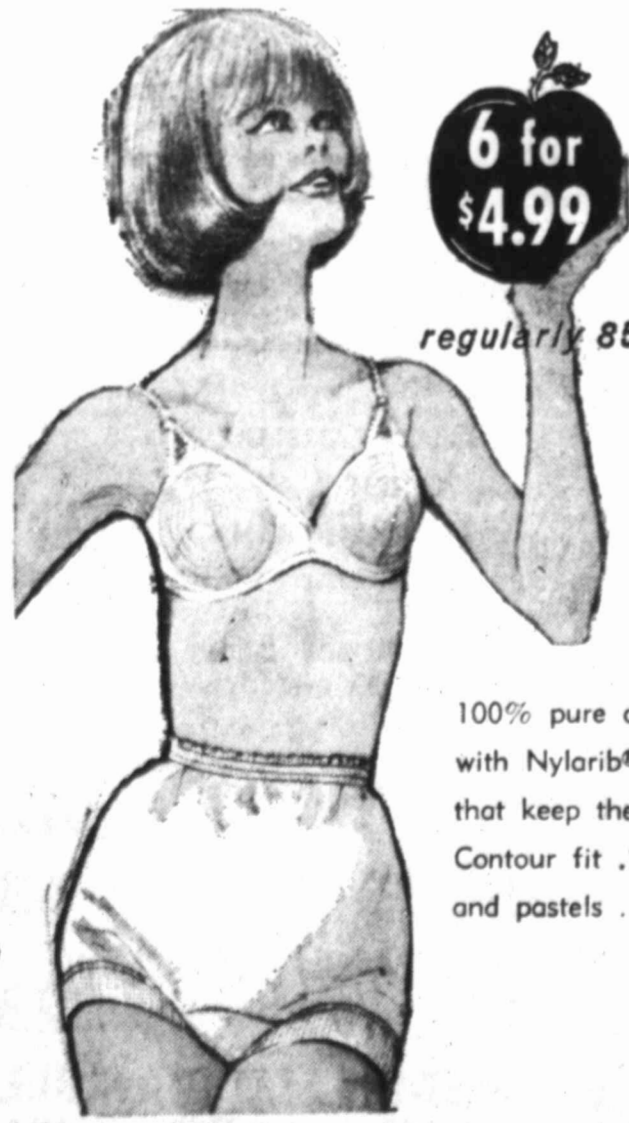

## Church Organist At 12 Serves Baptist Temple

A church organist at 12 is unusual under any circumstance, but when the organist is converted impromptly from a casual pianist and serves a large church, that's something else again.

This is the case with Mark Milosevich, who is now the regular organist for the Baptist Temple and will be the accompanist for the church's revival meeting Aug. 22-29.

Mark actually never had organ lessons. For two and a half years he had studied piano under a Mrs. Keen on Okinawa when his father, Edward Milosevich (Ma), USAF Ret., was stationed there, and under Mrs. H. M. Jarratt after the family moved here. Last October when Ruth Ann Snodgrass, the organist, moved to San Antonio, Mark was asked if he would like to try his hand at the organ. At first he stuck to one keyboard, but now he usually moves over two manuals and employs his footwork.

Besides his instrumental talent, Mark is a talented young vocalist, a field he broke into in the third grade when he sang "The Old Rugged Cross" for the Grace Baptist Church in Harlingen. Mark takes his assignment seriously as he does

other things. He says he doesn't dance because he doesn't feel he can glorify God in it; he plays the organ because he feels he can.

He is one of five children of Mr. and Mrs. Milosevich, who live at 2801 Apache and who are deeply committed to religious service. The children all made their profession of faith at around six years of age. Mrs. (Pauli) Milosevich spends much time praying for others and frequently receives written requests for prayers.

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Dr. Duane E. Graveline, 34, resigned Wednesday as one of the nation's six new scientists-astronauts, the Manned Spacecraft Center announced.

The resignation was for personal reasons, a center spokesman said. He will remain with the center as a flight surgeon.

Graveline's wife sued him for divorce in July at San Antonio, Tex., where he and his family lived until his selection as a scientist-astronaut June 29.

The divorce suit is pending.

## Shrieking Teen Houston Mob Greets Beatles

HOUSTON (AP) — Shrieking teenagers stormed through police lines in a wild welcome to Great Britain's Beatles today.

They surrounded the shaggy haired singers' chartered airliner at the Houston airport moments after it arrived from Atlanta, at 1:05 a.m., making it impossible for the occupants to alight.

Finally a driver backed a big caterer's truck to the plane's door, took the entertainers aboard and outraced the pursuing mob to waiting limousines.

## Nazis Given Life Sentence

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — Six former Nazi SS guards and functionaries of the Auschwitz concentration camp were sentenced to the maximum term of life in prison today on charges of mass murder or aiding in the wartime mass murder of Auschwitz inmates.

Eleven others drew prison terms ranging from 14 years to 3 years and 3 months. Three were acquitted.

### LONGEST TRIAL

The verdicts came after a 20-month trial, the longest and largest in German legal history. Several Auschwitz survivors were in the audience that listened tensely as presiding Judge Hans Hofmeyer read out the sentences.

### MILLIONS DIED

Millions of people died at Auschwitz, the huge sprawling camp complex the Nazis set up in southern Poland during World War II to exterminate "racially undesirable." Most of the victims were Jews. But many Poles, Russians and others also were gassed, shot, hanged, burned, starved or tortured to death. Auschwitz was the largest of Nazi extermination camps.

## Loyal Polynesians' Mutiny Saves Film Director's Job

HONOLULU (AP) — Out here they're still talking about the "Hawaii" mutiny.

Some islanders believe this one puts other mutinies to shame. The Bounty? A trifling affair — and who needed all those breadfruit trees, anyway? The Calne? Much ado about some stolen strawberries.

Now the mutiny on "Hawaii" was another matter entirely. There was no Bligh, no Queeg. It was simply a clash between high-powered corporate thinking and the gentle spirit of Polynesia. The pawn: an investment of 10 to 20 million dollars.

Here is the picture of the mutiny I drew from the survivors: After filming in Norway, New England and Hollywood, the "Hawaii" company came to Oahu with high hopes and budget to match. Back at the office, the movie's backers watched the budget climb higher and higher. Finished film was returning to Hollywood at a sluggish rate.

### FIRE DIRECTOR

United Artists and Mirisch Brothers brass arrived at the classic solution for such affairs: fire the director.

George Roy Hill was being sacked, said the bosses. Arthur Hiller, who was waiting in the plush bullpen of a Waikiki hotel, was to replace him.

What had gone wrong?

Said star Max Von Sydow: "There were three problems — we ran into a lot of rain; working on the sailing ships consumed a lot of time; and the number of unprofessional actors required time and patience on George's part."

"There was never a question about the quality of the film," added Julie Andrews. "When the trouble arose, we asked to see what had been shot, and we found it excellent."

But the corporate minds saw the tab pushing from \$10 million to \$12 million and perhaps beyond. They decided Hill must go.

### IMPOSING FIGURE

An imposing figure among the amateur actors recruited for "Hawaii" is Jocelyn Lagarde, a 300-pound Tahitian who has signed to play the Hawaiian Queen Malama. She knew no English before the film, and Hill had directed her with infinite care.

## Soviet Defense Missiles Down Planes Of U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara says that in the past several years Soviet air defense missiles have shot down several American U2 reconnaissance planes.

"These (the Russian missiles) are the types that were deployed in Cuba by the Soviets which shot down a very high altitude U2," he added during a closed door Appropriation Committee hearing last Feb. 25.

McNamara testified then in support of his endorsement of missiles rather than bombers or manned aircraft for future U.S. defenses. The testimony was released Wednesday.

The defense secretary did not elaborate, beyond the 1962 missile attack over Cuba, as to

where or when other U2 incidents might have occurred.

A U2 was shot down over Russian territory by a Soviet missile in 1960. The pilot, Gary Francis Powers, was later exchanged for a convicted Soviet spy.

## Work-Study Grant Allocation Made

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House says more than 100,000 students from low-income families will receive federal work-study grants while attending college this fall. It announced allocation of more than \$27.5 million to 1,056 colleges and universities under the Economic Opportunity Act.

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Missouri voters have approved by a wide margin a constitutional amendment which allows a governor to succeed himself.

The first governor who could benefit from it is Gov. Warren E. Hearnes, 42, a Democrat, who sponsored the measure.

FALL RIVER, Mass. (AP) — The battleship Massachusetts, painted and polished, has been dedicated as the state's World War II memorial. The dedication culminates a three-year effort by a fund-raising committee that included many of those who served aboard her.

# Common Market Crisis Approaches

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Europe's Common Market is moving toward a crisis at the end of this year. Charles de Gaulle's current boycott is only a symptom.

European Common Market officials and the ministers of the six member nations — France, Italy, West Germany, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg — have packed up for a long summer vacation.

While lingering on sunny beaches they will wonder what France's president will do about the market's future when he speaks at a news conference Sept. 9.

Speculation differs as to what methods De Gaulle will use in seeking to stave off growing European integration or even undo some of the power of the top leaders of the Common Market.

### NEW POWER

The issue is called supranationalism — meaning creation of new power to be exercised by political leaders not belonging to any national government. De Gaulle is its chief opponent.

Its chief supporters are the nine members of the market's Executive Commission, led by Chairman Walter Hallstein, and his top man for agriculture, Sicco L. Mansholt.

It is no secret that De Gaulle is after their political skins.

At the end of the year the Common Market is due to pass new milestones.

# Store Reopens In Rebel Zone

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — La Opera, the nation's largest department store, has reopened in the rebel zone of Santo Domingo. The owner explained that he was not joining the rebels, but simply facing reality.

"We had to do something," he said. "We cannot sit at home all day, week after week, and let our business fall apart. We have employees who want to work, even if we can't sell much."

Many Dominicans are making similar adjustments to the 15-week-old rebellion, which has divided this city into enemy camps. One automobile dealer, for example declines to open his agency in the rebel zone. Instead, he sells cars from the yard of his home.

**40 BLOCKS**  
The rebels occupy 40 square blocks in the business, shopping and harbor area of Santo Domingo. A barbed wire and sandbag wall — guarded by U.S. and Latin-American troops — encircles them and separates them from the rest of the city.

In daylight thousands pass through three entrances in the wall. At night these gates are closed and men face each other nervously from gun emplacements only a few yards apart.

Boredom is a major problem as the negotiations for a peace settlement drag on. The city's night life outside the rebel zone has been reduced to a few restaurants, a hotel bar and a

drive-in movie theater — for those who risk driving at night.

The rebel regime has a special problem. It must find something to do for more than 5,000 young men cooped up in the rebel stronghold.

Nearly 1,000 have enrolled in a makeshift warfare training school set up in a park. A music and comedy team goes among the rebel command posts giving performances. The rebel government opened two movie theaters this week.

It also sponsors a cultural program of art shows and poetry readings.

Outside the capital, life does not appear to have changed much on the surface, although troops of the civilian-military junta have been accused of brutality and arbitrary arrests in suppressing rebel sympathizers in the countryside.

**FOOD COMES**  
Food continues to flow easily into the capital. Unemployment has risen, partly because lack of bank credit has cut back some farming operations and partly because Dominicans are purchasing only essentials.

In this underdeveloped nation of 3.5 million people the unemployment rate was more than 30 per cent of the labor force before the rebellion began.

An Organization of American States mediating team is trying to set up a compromise provisional government to run the country until elections are held.

# Nuclear Ship To Sail Again

GALVESTON, Tex. (AP) — The Savannah, the nuclear power-

ered merchant ship tied up for a year with labor troubles, will be put to sea again Friday. The vessel is due in Norfolk, Va., Aug. 25; Baltimore, Aug. 27, and New York, Aug. 30. It will leave for Europe Sept. 3, carrying cargo to Spain, Belgium, France and Germany.

# U.S. Sections Warm, Wet

Wet, warm and humid weather covered broad areas of the nation today after another outbreak of severe storms in many sections Wednesday.

Highest humidity was in most of the Atlantic Coast states but sticky weather also clung to areas in the Southwest desert region, which normally has clear, dry air.

### HUMIDITY HIGH

The high humidity belt extended from the Gulf of Mexico to New England and the Ohio Valley.

Tornadoes, hail and wind

storms pounded several states Wednesday, with thundershowers reported in most of the nation.

Twisters struck the airport at St. Clair, Mo., near St. Louis, damaging three airplanes, and toppled a water tower near Buffalo, in southwestern Oklahoma. No injuries were reported. Funnel clouds were spotted in parts of Missouri, Iowa and Wisconsin.

### 5-INCH RAIN

More than five inches of rain drenched Columbia, S.C., in a thunderstorm. Most of the rain fell during a two-hour period. Wind gusts of 71 miles per hour swept the area. Heavy rain also doused Vichy, Mo., Dahlart, Tex., and Tucumcari, N.M.

Violent winds lashed many areas during the thundershowers, including Washington, D.C., Columbus and Sandusky, Ohio, and Putnamville, Ind., 35 miles west of Indianapolis.

Temperatures Wednesday again were near or above normal in most of the nation. Early morning readings ranged from 44 at Marquette, Mich., to 87 at Needles, Calif.

## Bond Vote For College Oct. 9

KILLEEN, Tex. (AP)—A bond election for a junior college to serve Killeen, Copperas Cove and Nolanville will be held Oct. 9. The total bond issue has not been determined. Voters approved a proposal July 10 to create the junior college district.

## Queen's In-Law Refused In Photo-Taking Request

LONDON (AP)—Two London newspapers gleefully reported today that Queen Elizabeth's brother-in-law—who works for a rival paper—was not allowed to take pictures which might have included a bird's-eye view of Buckingham Palace.

The Daily Mirror and the Daily Express reported that the Earl of Snowdon, Princess Margaret's husband, was turned down when he asked to shoot some pictures from one of the tall new buildings near the palace. Snowdon is employed by the Sunday Times as a photographer.

The Mirror reported: "The photographer-earl, who has a 135-pound (\$378) a week job with the Sunday Times, wanted to snap views of London from the new 21-story Westminster City Hall. But a receptionist told him: 'We're sorry. Our instructions are that no one representing an unofficial organization, such as the press, may take photos which might include the palace.'"

"Buckingham Palace officials have been fretting for some time about the possibility of intrusion on the queen's privacy by long-range cameras operated from tall new buildings nearby. The queen has had a row of trees planted. But the palace insists that no official appeal or instructions about photographs has been issued."

## Swindling Of Elderly Told

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Harrison A. Williams, D-N.J., says he has received reports that con men claiming to represent the Social Security administration are swindling elderly persons in the Dallas, Tex., and Buffalo, N.Y., areas.

According to Williams, the men are signing up persons for the new federal health insurance program by telling their victims they can get a discount by signing and paying up early.

The program goes into effect next July 1, but enrollment can not start until after Sept. 1, Williams said Wednesday.

## Sale Of Former Cuban Liner Due

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—U.S. Dist. Judge Roszel C. Thomsen has ordered the sale of the former Cuban luxury liner Ciudad de la Habana, which has settled to the bottom of its shallow anchorage in Baltimore harbor.

The liner has been involved in litigation since 1958. Cuba, through the Czechoslovakian ambassador, has fought for custody of the vessel.

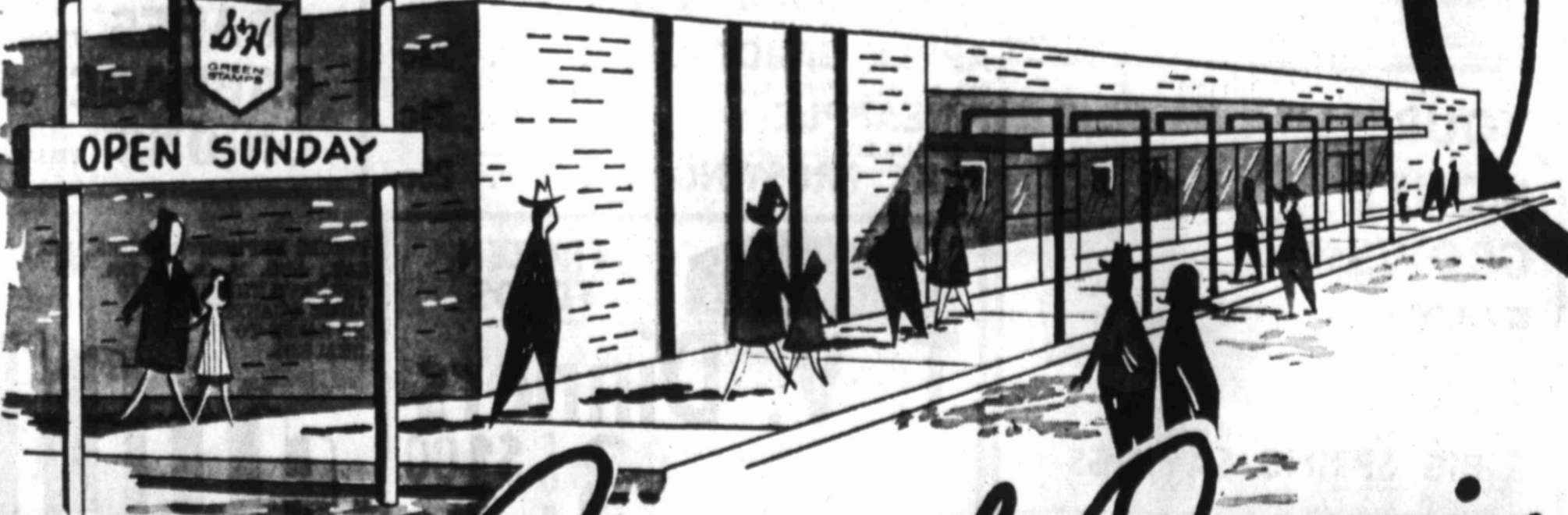

# Ideas For International Fiscal Systems Plentiful

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Plans for improving the world's money and credit arrangements are sprouting fast these days. And a real but polite Donnybrook may develop behind doors at the September meeting in Washington of the members of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund.  
 Some ideas on how to finance world economic growth are pretty far out from Uncle Sam's point of view. Proposals range from letting matters work themselves out — sometimes called muddling through — to setting up an entirely new kind of monetary reserve just for use when financial dealings between nations and foreign traders get sticky. This new species of international money would supercede the present way of paying bills in gold, dollars, pounds or other national currencies.  
 Here are some of the plans, likely and unlikely, from the conservative to the radical:  
**French President Charles de Gaulle** proposes the world go back to a full gold standard, abandoned in the early 1930s. Opponents contend there isn't enough gold available to back the money and credit needed in today's greatly expanded world economy.  
**GOLD COVETED**  
 Although no longer freely exchangeable for dollars or other currencies held by individuals, gold is coveted by most nations as a reserve asset, along with the currencies most in demand in financial dealings. One of the more radical suggestions is to remove gold from even this smaller role and just make a bigger supply of currencies available to handle the world's financial needs.  
 Another proposal is to make foreign exchange rates flexible, so that a currency can expand or contract in line with deficits or surpluses. Some would swell all nations' reserves at once. Others would expand a nation's reserves only when its needs are obvious.  
 The above proposals have little effective backing so far.

A sizable following is claimed for a plan to change the International Monetary Fund from a regulating and lending to a money-creating central bank.  
**How Two Texans Voted**  
**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., voted with the majority this week as the Senate defeated 51-40 an attempt to cut \$52.5 million from the \$1.65 billion authorization for the second year on the war on poverty.  
 Sen. John Tower, R-Tex., voted for the cut.  
 Tower also voted for a Republican attempt to restore government's anti-poverty program, which was rejected by a 46-45 vote. Yarborough voted against the proposal.  
 Conservatives stress that the discipline now provided by gold must be maintained. And the United States seems sure to insist that the dollar retain its prominent role.  
 An even more cautious approach is the proposal that rather than a full-dress international parley, the problems of the international monetary supply be tackled gradually. Advocates would have the great powers, and the fund, respond to changing needs as they develop.  
 And the United States, which has dragged its feet on the problem until lately, still favors a long period of private negotiations before an international parley is called.  
 But others who think the international money supply will dry up fast now that the United States has had an initial success in halting its dollar loss, are urging an early start and quick decision.  
**LEADING FACTOR**  
 A more conservative approach, and the one believed favored by U.S. monetary authorities, is to keep the 103-nation International Monetary Fund a dominant factor in any plan. This would make any new kind of reserve, CRU or otherwise, only a supplement to present reserves of gold and dollars.

### Police Official One Of Best Safecrackers

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Happiness is an open safe to Capt. Joseph Dussia.

Dussia, 48, head of the state police crime laboratory, happens to be one of the best safecrackers and lockpickers around.

"I learned at an early age that I had the ability to work with safes and locks," the police veteran says.

"After attending Michigan State University for two years as a premedical student, I contacted Harry Miller in Washington, D. C. Miller was one of the country's top lock and safe experts.

#### A SCIENCE

"We worked out a system of manipulation, which to me is a type of science. It's a way of opening safe locks by a combination of touch, hearing and seeing—plus a thorough working knowledge of the inner part of the lock.

"The safe burglar doesn't operate by science. He just wants to get the contents. But a legitimate safe repair man has to protect the safe, too.

"I still don't have the system perfected, though. I have some locks in my quarters at police headquarters where I stay Monday through Friday.

#### CONSTANT TEST

"At home, I have 500 to 600 more. When I first began practicing at home I taught my wife to change the combinations of locks. It was a way of constantly testing myself."

Dussia is an accomplished lecturer on his favorite subject and teaches at Indiana, Iowa, and Western Reserve universities.

### Fiscal Field Try Defended

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler said today there is no evidence so far that U.S. efforts to wipe out its balance of payments deficit is having harmful effects on the international money supply.

On the other hand, he said, the U.S. program for bringing its payments into equilibrium "is the best guarantee the world has of continued adequate liquidity."

Some economists believe that international liquidity—the supply of money and credit needed for world trade—will shrink if the United States halts the flow of dollars abroad.

Fowler, appearing before the Senate subcommittee on international finance, said, "Nevertheless, we must be alert to the possibility that continued growth of the world's economy together with sustained equilibrium in the U.S. payments position could combine to create an eventual shortage of liquidity."

He described this possible shortage as the only "single real danger" in the international monetary situation.

### More Cotton Usage Urged

LUBBOCK — A multi-national promotional effort now being organized to increase foreign cotton consumption was outlined here Wednesday by Read P. Dunn, foreign trade director of the National Cotton Council.

Dunn told cotton industry representatives attending a joint meeting that increased exports resulting from this effort could directly benefit Plains cotton producers because much of their crop is exported. Increased exports will improve the United States cotton economy in general by helping reduce the 14.5-million-bale carryover.

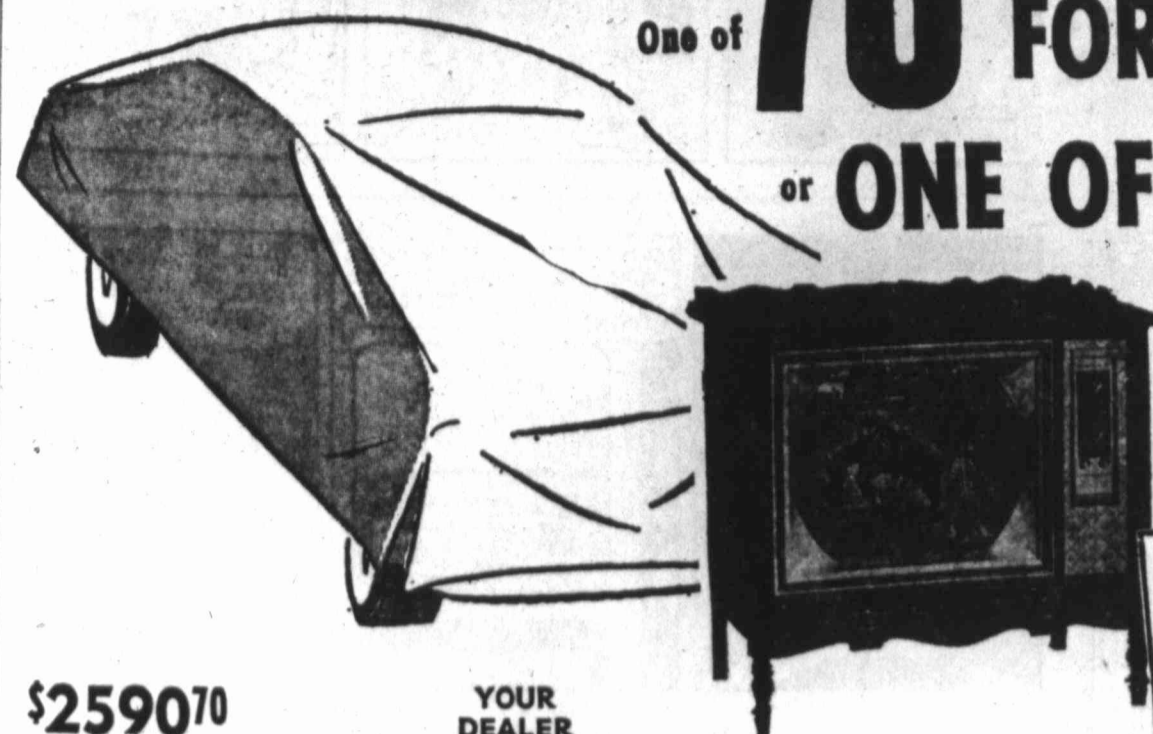
Countries accounting for about two-thirds of the world's cotton exports have tentatively agreed to contribute one dollar for each bale of cotton they sell to markets in Europe and Japan to get the program started, and cotton manufacturing countries are expected to match this amount.

The total program is expected to involve an expenditure of \$10 to \$12 million — five times the size of the current effort being conducted by the U. S. sponsored Cotton Council International, which Dunn has directed since its inception. He said the cost to the U. S. would not be much more than it now spends.

### More Mothballed Ships Being Readied

BREMERTON, Wash. (AP) — The Navy says eight more mothballed ships of the Pacific reserve fleet are being readied for service because of military demands in Viet Nam. Six are here, one in Olympia, Wash., and one in Astoria, Ore.

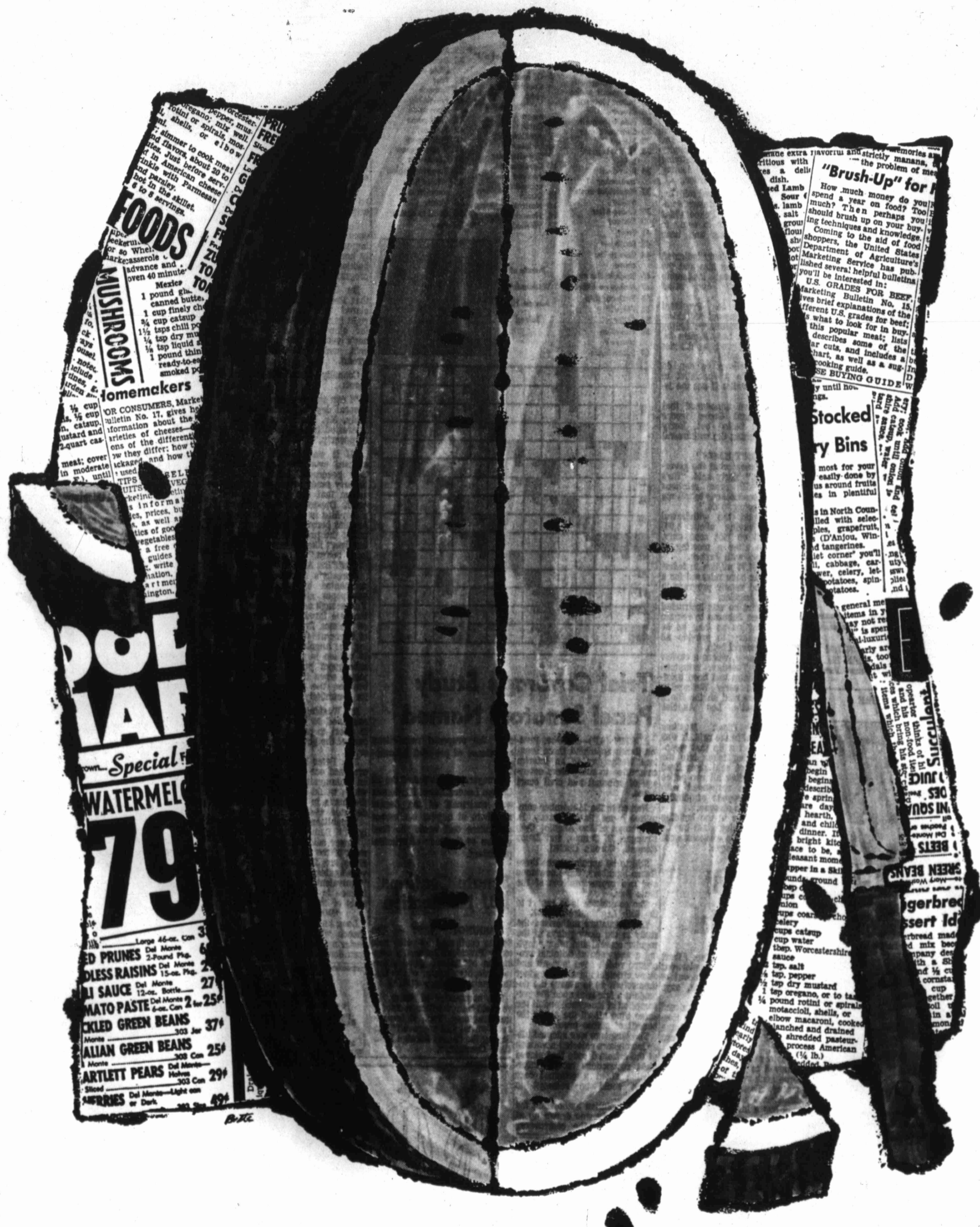

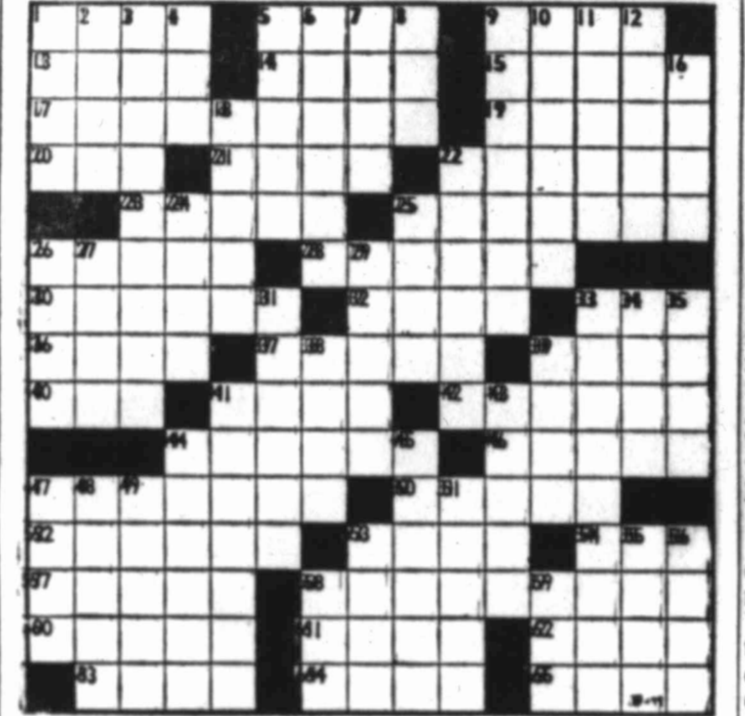

## Trial Coverage Study Panel Senators Named

AUSTIN (AP)—Lt. Gov. Preston Smith appointed three senators Wednesday to an interim committee to study news coverage of criminal and civil court cases.

Named to the 11-member committee were Sens. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo; Culp Krueger, El Campo, and Bruce Reagan, Corpus Christi.

Still to be appointed are three House members, three newsmen and two representatives of the State Bar.

The committee is to report to the 60th Legislature in 1967.

The legislature authorized the study in the closing days of the regular session and after adopting a new code of criminal procedure which says lawyers and other officials must "so conduct themselves as to assure the defendant a fair trial upon the presumption of innocence and at the same time afford the public the benefit of a free press."

The language was adopted after lawmakers rejected a version of the criminal code that placed tight restrictions on the information about a criminal case which could be released to newsmen.

The resolution authorizing the interim study was drawn up at the height of the controversy

## Three Texas Leaders Push Verbal Battle

By The Associated Press

Three top Texas officials—Gov. John Connally and Sens. Ralph Yarborough and John Tower—continued their verbal battle Wednesday over the power of governors to veto anti-poverty programs in their states.

At Austin, Connally denied charges by Yarborough, a fellow Democrat, that he used the threat of his veto power to force local communities to pay less than the federal minimum wage of \$1.25 an hour on poverty projects.

Yarborough "is more interested in politics than he is in poverty," the governor asserted.

Tower, a Republican, enlivened a Senate debate in Washington by insisting that Connally had not in any way played politics with the anti-poverty program in Texas.

Sen. Russell Long, D-La., said that President Johnson had declared that Yarborough was right in seeking Senate approval for elimination of the governor's veto on the federal projects, and that Connally was wrong.

Connally issued this statement: "I can only repeat what I said several days ago: That, regrettably, Mr. Yarborough is more interested in politics than he is in poverty."

"If it wasn't tragic, I'd be amused over these accusations that governors have held up poverty funds when it's become known that the Office of Economic Opportunity has delayed \$22 million in such funds for Los Angeles because the administrator of the program in Los Angeles didn't like the makeup of the local board."

OFFER AMENDMENTS

Connally's remarks were accompanied by copies of two newspaper stories. One stated Yarborough accused Connally of the veto threat; the other quoted Holmes Brown of the Office of Economic Opportunity as saying Los Angeles received almost \$3 million in poverty funds but subsequent programs were rejected when the city refused to broaden the representation on its community action board.

In Washington, Republicans continued to offer amendments in effort to preserve at least a part of the governors' veto power.

Sen. Peter Dominick, R-Colo., proposed one to retain the veto on community action projects which would get almost half of the funds in the bill. This was defeated 43-42.

Republicans clashed frequently with Democrats on the issue. Tower said 33 governors and most of the mayors of the large cities are Democrats and their vote against the movement was "equivalent to a vote of no confidence in state and local officials of their own party."
