City Sends Big Delegation To Municipal League Meet

Ten Big Spring city officials will be among almost 2,500 delegates representing city governments throughout Texas attending the Texas Municipal League's annual conference Sunday through Tuesday in San Antonio, according to Larry Crow, city manager.

The 53rd annual conference will be held at the Granada Hotel, where delegates representing 13 departmental groups will meet for three days of talks and programs.

Representing Big Spring will be Mayor George Zachariah; city commissioners, John Stanley, W. L. (Squeaky) Thompson and Arnold Marshall; Ernest Lillard, director of public works; Larry Crow, city manager; Roy Anderson, assistant city manager; C. L. McClenny, city secretary; Jay Banks, police chief; and John Burgess, city attorney.

City Attorneys' Association gathering on "Municipal Contracts as an Inducement to Industry." His talk will center on the present "friendly" lawsuit between the City of Big Spring and the local state hospital over water rates. He will point to the 1937 city government's decision to sell water, in effect perpetually, at the then cost of production as an example of what not to do when city governments attempt to induce industry to pick their towns as sites.

Wednesday morning, Burgess will journey to Austin to appear before the state Supreme Court for final presentation of the appeal on the water-rate suit. Crow will accompany him. Both will return to Big Spring Wednesday evening, as the court's decision on the case may take weeks, if not months.

The other eight city officials will return following the Tuesday meetings of the TML conference.

TML President Hank Avery, Midland mayor, will keynote the conference with his Monday address emphasizing the current condition and the current needs of cities. Other headliners will include Earle Cabell, congressman from Dallas; Texas Lt. Gov. Preston Smith; Speaker of the Texas House Ben Barnes; and William P. Hobby, executive director of the Houston Post.

the closest look yet at alternatives involved in federal programs affecting cities; timely analysis of the most pressing current problems facing Texas city governments; and technical, specialized inquiry into more than 50 current problems peculiar to municipal government.

Though Big Spring will not have representatives in all of the 13 city departmental groups affiliated with the TML, the conference will be well represented by Big Spring, Crow said.

The 13 groups meeting at the conference will be mayors and commissioners, city managers, Municipal Utilities League, the Municipal Financial Affairs, Personnel and Civil Service Officials, the Public Works Association, City Clerks and Secretaries, the Police Chiefs' Association, the Texas Fire Chiefs' Association, Assessing Officers, and the Parks and Recreation Association. Big Spring will have delegates to six of the departmental groups.

CIVIL RIGHTS

Among the specific subjects the 13 groups will discuss will be effects of the new Code of Criminal Procedure, civil rights, urban renewal, poverty and the Economic Opportunities Act, housing, right-to-work laws, water development and stream pollution, and the Texas House of Representatives in 1965 — and 1967.

Finally, a statement of municipal policy will be developed. There will be presentation of annual awards for outstanding debt administration and for the best annual reports issued by cities to their citizens during the past year.

Catholicism On Path Set By Pope John

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The five new decrees proclaimed by the Vatican Ecumenical Council put the Roman Catholic Church firmly on the road to 20th century renewal, Pope John XXIII charted when he called the council together.

The council's action Thursday in a public session presided over by John's successor, Pope Paul VI, formally bound the Church to new attitudes that represent notable changes from the past.

NEW APPROACH

Pope Paul and his bishops decreed a new approach to non-Christians: Jews, Moslems, Hindus, Buddhists and others.

Last year, the council decreed guidelines for Christian unity efforts, a move toward the believers in Christ whom Roman Catholicism calls "the separated brethren."

The council Thursday did what no other general council of the Church has done. It held out a hand of friendship to the great mass of the world population that is not Christian.

The Pope and his bishops told Roman Catholic teachers of religion they must never charge the Jews as a whole with the crucifixion of Christ.

Officially, Roman Catholicism never taught that. But through the centuries the belief, with the word "decide," had become planted in the minds of many men.

Now the Roman Catholic Church, 20 years after World War II in which millions of Jews were exterminated, has acted to remove that seed.

Going further, it has tendered a hand to the Moslems and others whose view of Christianity is often clouded by bitter thoughts of long-dead crusaders and missionaries.

The Church did not renounce missionary work. It reaffirms such activity in a document still before the council. But it has made clear that the missionaries must seek to spread the message of Christ by demonstrating its values, not by denigrating other religions.

Episcopalians Begin Work On New Addition

The congregation of St. Mary's Episcopal Church, Gollad and Tenth Streets, has started construction of a new church building, or sanctuary, at the east end of the present building.

The \$125,375 addition is being built by Kasch Bros., Inc. of Big Spring, and is to be completed in 270 calendar days. Foundation work is well along, but is being slowed because of rock formation in the ground.

Rev. Don Hungerford, rector, said the new section of the building, to rise about one-third above the present structure, will contain about 6,000 square feet. It will house the nave, or sanctuary, on the lower level, which will seat about 300 persons; the second or choir level, and the third, the chancel; offices, store and mechanical rooms, and choir rooms. The seating capacity can be raised to around 500 because wide center and side aisles, and roomy entrance area at the rear, will provide space for chairs or extra seats.

J. C. Collier, superintendent of construction, said the same masonry finish would be used in the new section of the building. Recessed glass tile, in the outside walls, will provide filtered daylight into the building. Hanging lights, from the high ceiling supported by laminated and exposed beams, will light the interior. A stained concrete floor will cover the building.

"We will use the present sanctuary, built in 1958, for the parish hall, where suppers and meetings may be held," Rev. Hungerford said. "The church now has about 600 members with 350 adult communicants, requiring more space."

St. Mary's Episcopal Church also operates a school, from the nursery age through the fourth grade, and has about 145 enrolled.

Absentee Vote Light In State

AUSTIN (AP) — Democratic party officials report a survey of 26 metropolitan areas shows absentee voting very light for Tuesday's balloting on 10 proposed state constitutional changes.

Absentee voting ends today. State Democratic Chairman Will Davis said the check showed only 2,010 absentee voters in the 26 big city areas which have qualified voters totaling almost 1.4 million.

Dog Field Trial Is Slated Saturday

The Graves Flying G Hunting Resort, located near Vincent 27 miles northeast of Big Spring, will be the scene Saturday of the Permian Bird Dog and Sportsman's Club fall "Shoot to Kill" field trial.
The three dogs judged tops in the meet will be awarded trophies.
Entry fee will be \$5 per dog for club members and \$7.50 for dogs whose owners are not affiliated with the organization. The club will furnish three equal per entry. Other birds used will cost entries \$1.25 each.
Each dog will be awarded 50 points for productive pointing, 25 points for each time the animal backs or honors another dog's points and 25 points for each retrieve. Dogs can be penalized for failing to honor or back their brace-mates.
After three finds or successful points, a handler can elect not to shoot or kill any other bird that his dog would point and still receive 50 points credit for all productive points his dog makes.
Dogs will receive no credit for marking and pointing the same bird twice in succession.

During the past three seasons, Edison has beaten the Mavericks by scores of 55-6, 55-0 and 40-0 and the Crimson Tide won 19 games straight going into this year.

PITTSBURG, Kan. (AP)—The uniform of the day for Capt. Bill Week's freshman military science class at Pittsburg State College is khaki, but three students wear black skirts.

The Reserve Officers Training Corps on the campus has been invaded by three senior coeds who plan to enter military service after graduation. Since the school could not issue them uniforms, they made their own.

"We decided ROTC would help us when we get into Officers Training School," said Mary Hunker, a biology major from Muscotah, Kan.

OTHER COEDS

The other coeds are Linda Searcy, a premedical student from Iola, Kan.; and Kay Courtner, a history major from Olathe, Kan. Each is 21 years old.

They have tentatively picked the Navy for their service, but Miss Courtner said, "It depends on which offers the best courses in my field." She wants to do historical research.

"I want to study for a master's degree while in the service and I hope eventually to get into parapsychology," said Miss Hunker.

Parapsychology is the study of events not accounted for by natural law, for example, mental telepathy.

MEDICAL SCHOOL

Miss Searcy wants to become a physician before joining the service and plans to enroll in the University of Kansas Medical School next fall.

Kay and Mary plan to enlist following graduation in June.

They say they plan to make the service a career.

"We're happy to have them in the class," said Capt. Weeks. They only monitor the course and get no credit, but "the boys enjoy their presence and the girls seem very interested in the classwork."

"We thought having our own uniforms would be appropriate," Miss Hunker said.

"We wear a black skirt and white long-sleeve blouse with a black tie," she said.

Border Trade Bill Offered

EL PASO, Tex. (AP)—Rep. Richard White, D-Tex., said Wednesday a measure he offered in Congress last week would encourage border trade expansion by increasing to \$200 the value of duty free imports allowed from Mexico and Canada.

White said he hopes to get the resolution before a House committee early next year.

Called the Border Trade Areas Act, it also would allow importation of one gallon of duty-free liquor.

The \$200 exemption would apply, however, only to tourist-purchased goods bought within five miles of the borders.

Legislation passed this year imposes duty over a \$100 retail value and on more than one quart of liquor.

Baltic Channel To Be Revived

NUIJAMA, Finland (AP)—A unique real estate deal with the communists slowly is bringing back to life a once-flourishing waterway in this Finnish-Soviet border region.

Now on both sides of the border here Finnish workmen are busy clearing and widening the channel and rebuilding locks that fell into disrepair during 20 years of idleness. The job is scheduled to be finished by 1968.

The pact, in which the Kremlin cedes for the first time Soviet territory for use by others in exchange for money, was signed in September, 1962. It

has been claimed as one of the proudest successes of Finland's policy of strict neutrality.

YIELDED PORT

Before the war, the Saimaa Canal, which links the Karelian Lake district with the Baltic port of Vyborg, was on Finnish territory. But under the 1947 Treaty of Paris, defeated Finland had to yield part of Karelia, including the port of Vyborg and half of the canal, to the Soviet Union.

The 1962 agreement will enable Finland's and other non-Soviet vessels to use the canal in return for annual payment of at least \$200,000. The sum will be upped if traffic exceeds one million tons annually.

Finland must pay \$57 million for modernizing and widening the canal on a project that employs thousands in economically underdeveloped Karelia.

The Soviet Union has opened the watch-tower studded Iron Curtain border just wide enough to permit the Finnish workers to reach their construction sites on Soviet territory.

GRIM REMINDER

Only a few hundred yards from the border, with its no-man's-land on the Soviet side, is the Nuijama cemetery where a stone monument and graves marked with wooden crosses remind the Finns of Karelia's bloody toll in the wars of 1939-1940 and 1941-1944.

The fighting ended a boom for shippers. In 1939, the last year of peace, 84 per cent of the freight that moved through the Saimaa Canal was timber destined for export.

When post-war border adjustments cut off the canal, roads were built and timber has been moved by more costly truck transport.

Not surprisingly, truck bosses are not enthusiastic about reopening the canal. And nationalists have expressed some criticism. They regret that Finland has had to pay rent for a canal which they say had been "stolen" by the Soviets.

Guard Needs More Men

AUSTIN (AP)—The state adjutant general, Maj. Gen. Thomas Bishop, said today priority is being given to Texas National Guard enlistees with prior military service.

"This just saves us from waiting until they have six months basic training," he said. "However, at the same time I want to stress that we are still accepting enlistments throughout the state by persons without prior military service."

Bishop noted that each guard unit has a certain strength and when that strength is reached the local unit may stop its local recruiting efforts.

"However, we are authorized about 17,000 Guardsmen throughout the state and we only have about 16,000 now," he said. "Many of these vacancies are in the smaller towns and cities and we certainly will accept those without previous military training although we would favor the trained enlistees."

United States Warning To Red China Revealed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States privately warned Red China to stay out of the India-Pakistan conflict during a critical phase of that crisis, U.S. officials said today.

The American warning may have had a salutary effect on Peking, the officials said. They noted that the Communist Chinese, after serving an apparent ultimatum on India, declared the Indians had dismantled alleged fortifications on Chinese territory.

The diplomatic means of the U.S. warning to the Chinese was not disclosed. It was understood that Washington made its position

known at the Sept. 15 meeting between the U.S. and Red Chinese ambassadors at Warsaw. The Warsaw ambassadorial conferences are a regular point of U.S.-Communist Chinese contact.

The United States and Russia both were pressing for an India-Pakistan cease-fire under United Nations auspices. A cease-fire was finally achieved despite Peking's spoiler attempt.

Editors and broadcasters attending a foreign policy briefing at the State Department were told of the private U.S. communication to the Chinese.

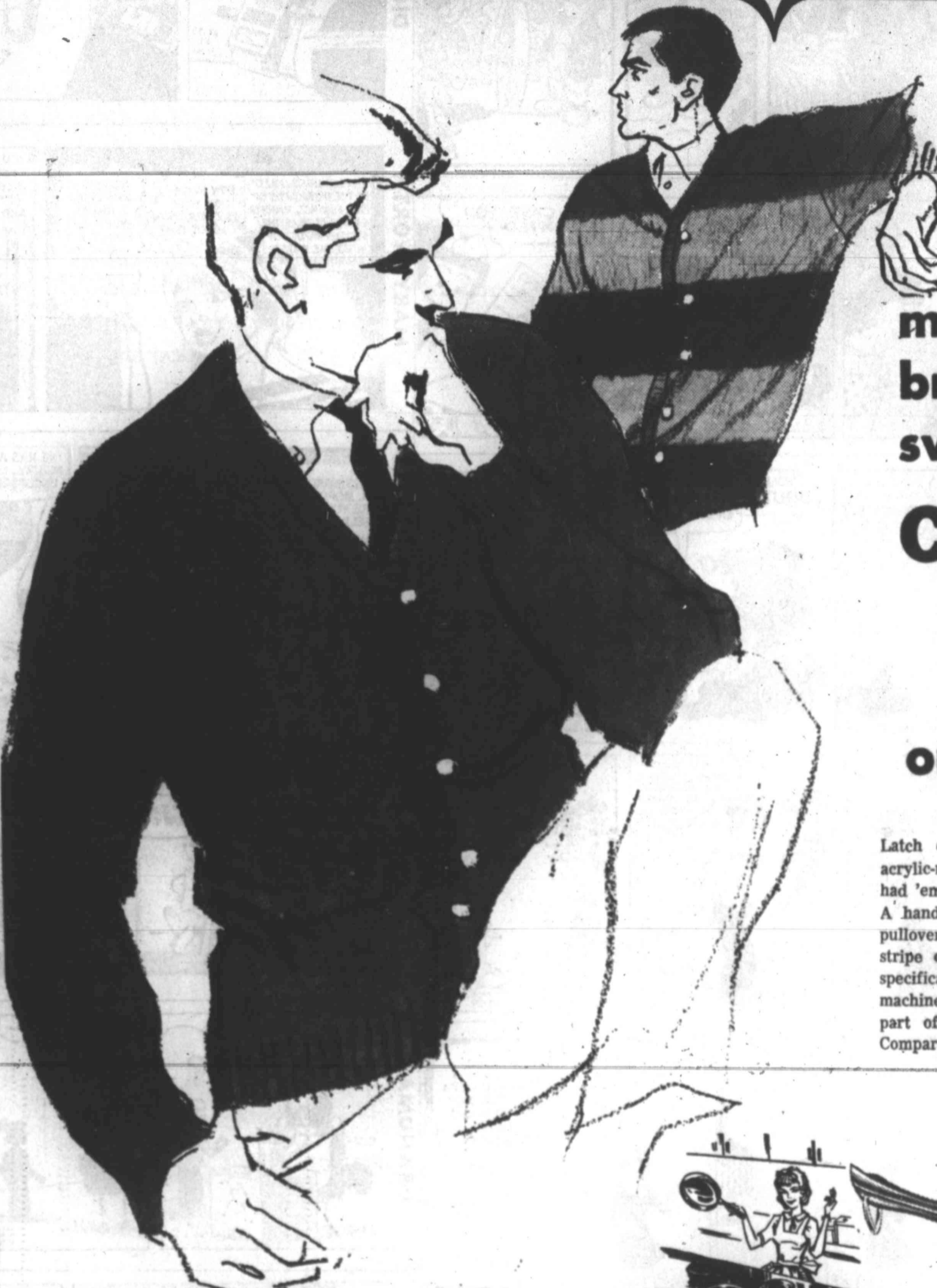

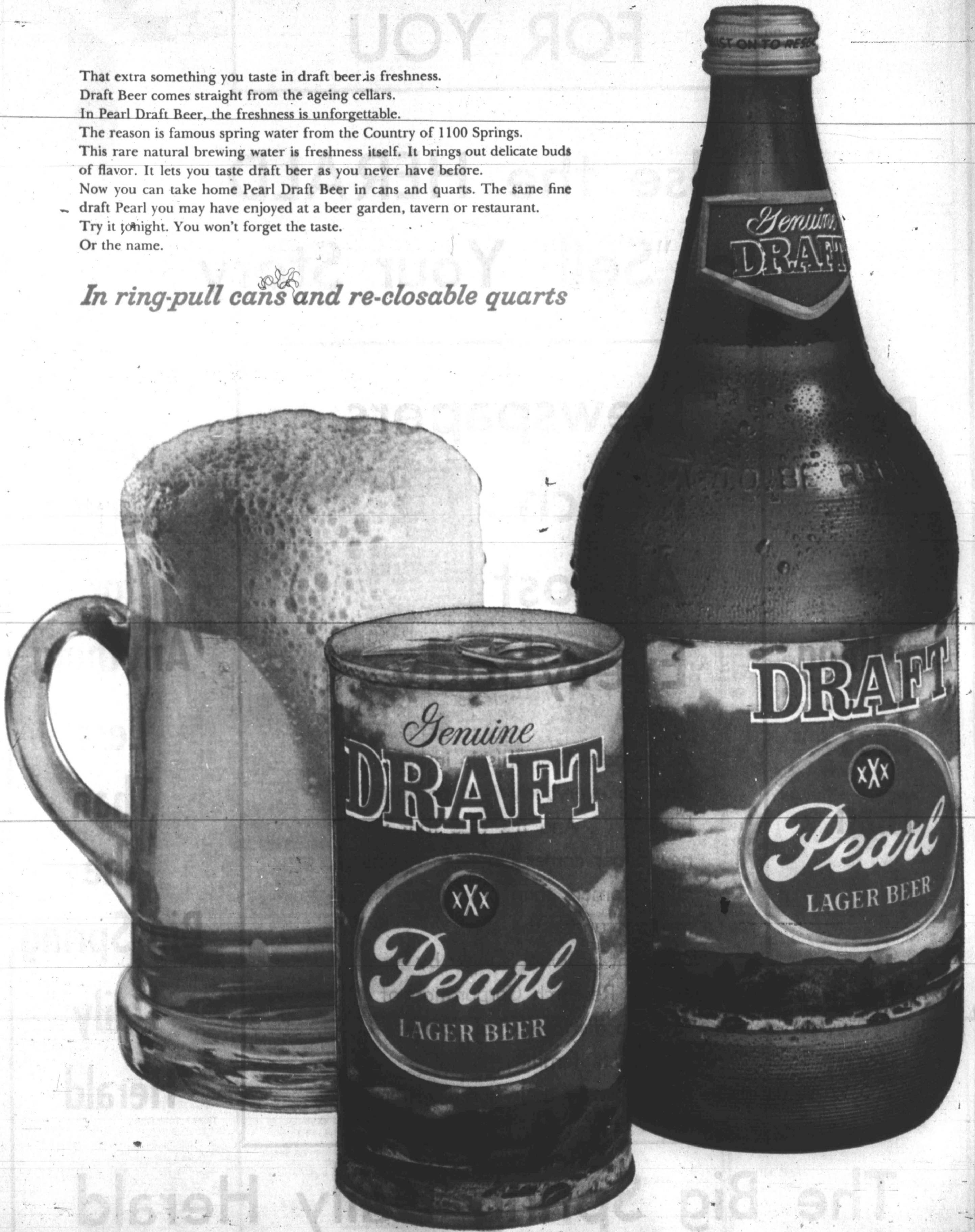

No Longer Flamboyant And Boisterous, Texans Assert

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Big D society may not be proper Bostonian, but it insists it's not Wild West wealthy either.

The era of the free-wheeling, big-spending Texas oilman has given Dallas society a bad case of paranoia about its public image.

Its members feel the outside world believes they are all flamboyant, extravagant, boisterous, boasting and uncultured. "They make us sound like such idiots," complains Mrs. Clint Murchison Jr., the blonde wife of a second generation oil millionaire. "There are no Texans like that."

Stanley Marcus, head of the famed Neiman-Marcus department store, acknowledged, "It takes time to get used to money."

However, he said, "the flamboyancy of the early oil days disappeared 10 years ago."

Peter Harris, a florist who has handled the debutantes' presentation for the past 15 years, said that when he first arrived in Dallas, his clients would "order a Rolls-Royce to match their hats. But now the trend is to do things properly, rather than to out-do. They now worry about its being overdone."

ALL "SUBDUED" Even the legend's contributors are subdued.

Jake Hamon, whose costume parties once featured the hostess riding in on an elephant, now declines any publicity and has been known to lecture other oilmen about improving their public image.

D. Harold Byrd is famed for his parties after the Texas-Oklahoma football games. Once up to 1,700 attended, but the parties stopped five years ago.

Although the 65-year-old millionaire still enjoys his fortune, much of it now goes to charities and foundations. He's even trimmed his fleet of airplanes to one.

Dallas still has "some interesting parties," Byrd said. "However, they are well-behaved parties. I haven't seen any drunkenness for a long time. That wasn't true 15 or 20 years ago."

Despite the changes, Dallas society still retains a certain frontier openness with entry based on the individual rather than on ancestry.

Today it includes a Louisiana landscaper, a Yankee mayor, a high school dropout, a clubwoman working on her Ph.D., and the oil millionaires.

ARE ACCEPTED

"You are accepted in Texas until you disprove yourself," says Joseph Lambert Jr., society landscaper.

Lambert came to Dallas from Shreveport, La., in 1937, with two assistants. He now has a staff of nearly 250, lives in an exquisitely furnished penthouse atop Dallas' most prestigious apartment address, drives a Rolls-Royce, talks of buying an Italian villa and has been accepted into the city's most exclusive social club.

A home not landscaped by Lambert is a house half-done. Parents of debutantes vie with one another and plead with Lambert to provide the proper setting for the wedding or coming-out affair.

Tab's for his parties have ranged from \$5,000 to \$50,000. Millionaires are almost taken for granted in Dallas, so money alone is not enough to guarantee entry to society. Conversely, a lack of fortune doesn't bar one. "You don't have to have money, if you look as if you have a promising future," said one social critic.
