# School Race Draws Ten; City Has Five

HUNDREDS OF residents of this area had the opportunity of hearing the newest star in the recording industry, Olivia Newton-John at her concerts of last weekend.

Olivia presented concerts last Saturday night at West Texas State University in Canyon, and then Sunday night she packed 'em in at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. We were fortunate in being able to catch her latter show.

Miss Newton-John, winner of four "Grammy" awards presented in Hollywood recently for outstanding work in the recording industry during 1974, wowed the crowd of 6,000 people Sunday night, with a full hour's concert.

Recordland's new Queen caused the audience to be a bit uneasy by being 10 minutes late from her scheduled starting time (it was already past 10 p.m. Texas time).

Olivia apologized for being late, explaining that "My zip-puh broke," in her delicate British accent, and an hour later the big throng of folks forgave the Australian transplant with a standing ovation.

THE RAVEN-HAIRED beauty thrilled her audience, made up mostly of college-age youngsters, with all of her hits, such as the song that first gained her fame, "If Not For You," to other million-sellers like "Let Me Be There," "I Honestly Love You," and "If You Love Me, Let Me Know."

The starlet, who was completing two weeks of personal appearances which took her all the way across Texas in a series of one-nighters, drew a round of applause at the beginning by chirping "Hello, How Ya'll doin'?"

Although still new at this "show biz" stuff, Miss Newton-John showed Sunday's audience that she has the stuff of which stars are made. In between songs, she kept up a lively banter. Concerning her unusual name, Olivia said "I went to register in a motel, and they reserved me three rooms."

Unlike stars of many concerts who let their preliminary show fill in the major part of the program so they can run out, do a few songs and leave, Olivia Newton-John gave her audience their money's worth, including a couple of "curtain call" numbers.

She may be British-born and Australian-raised, but Miss Newton-John looks very much the part of the All-American girl, and her tiny almost whispering singing voice is a pleasant change from the screaming no-lyric styles that have dominated the scene the past several years.

Miss Newton-John shared the ENMU billing with a preliminary group, headed by Albert Hammond, folk singer and writer known for "I'm A Train," "Little Arrows" and "Oklahoma Homeward Bound."

On most any other occasion, Hammond would have been sufficient entertainment, but with 6,000 West Texas and Eastern New Mexico folks anxious for their first look at Olivia Newton-John, it little mattered who the preliminary show was, or how talented.

If you missed seeing ON-J, you missed a good show. We were surprised that she was brought this close to home, right at the zenith of her popularity. However, if her reception this past week was any indication, Miss Newton-John's stay in the spotlight may be a long one.

Ten candidates announced for three places on the school board, with five announcing for three spots on the Friona City Council as of the deadline Wednesday, March 5.

In the school board race, Leroy Lundy announced as a challenger to incumbents Ronald Smiley and Wesley Barnett for one of the three-year terms. The two spots currently held by Smiley and Barnett are expiring.

Seven men have announced for the one-year unexpired term being vacated by Ann Porter. They are Norman Kothmann, Charles Hough, Dr. Jon Mack Roden, Floyd S. Reeve, Kenneth McLellan, V.R. Wilcox and Clarence Monroe.

In the city council race, where three seats are expiring, incumbents Glenn E. Reeve and Martha Bates announced for re-election, but Dr. Robert Alexander, who has served two terms, declined to run for re-election.

Three challengers announced for the city ticket. They are Steve Struve, Patrick Pace and Kenneth Neill.

In the city election, City Manager Jake Outland said that the drawing for place on the ballot would be held at 10 a.m. Monday at the City Hall.

Absentee voting for both the city and school races will begin on Monday, March 17, and run through

Tuesday, April 1.

Absentee voting in the school board race will be conducted in

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe's office. Special voting in the city race will be at the City Hall.

## Ticket Sales Begin For Linkletter Talk

Tickets for the Friona appearance of Art Linkletter, slated for April 7, will be placed on sale next Wednesday, March 12 in the office

Linkletter, a television and radio star for more than 30 years, has performed in two of the longest running shows in broadcasting history, "House Party," a daytime television show on CBS for 25 years (five days a week). He also starred on "People Are Funny," a night-time NBC television show and prior to that a weekly radio show for 19 years.

"House Party" won an Emmy award for the best daytime show on television. "People Are Funny" won three Emmy nominations.

Seven honorary doctorate degrees from colleges and universities have been awarded to Linkletter for his humanitarian work and his interest in youth. He was named "Speaker of the Year" in 1969 by the International Platform Associates.

He has also been named "salesman of the year," "grandfather of the year," and has served as chairman for National Heart Week, Cancer Week, Arthritis Foundation, Foster Parents Plan, Goodwill Industries YMCA and Boy Scout leadership.

Linkletter has been writing books since 1950, and has now published 13, of which "Kids Say the Darndest Things" is one of the 15 best sellers in American publishing history, and was number one for two straight years in the non-fiction list.

## Shooting Here Leaves Friona Woman Dead

An apparent argument at the Chateaux Apartments last weekend left one person dead of gunshot wounds, and another in serious condition.

Dead was Guadalupe Hernandez Woodall, 21, who was discovered by officers lying in the hall of the apartment at 910-B West Ninth. Mrs. Woodall had been shot through the mouth. A .38 calibre pistol was discovered at her feet.

Seriously wounded was Robert Jeffrey Harben, 19, originally from Dumas. Harben was employed as night security guard at Missouri Beef Packers.

Harben was struck in the arm by a .38 calibre bullet, and the wound severed an artery and caused him to lose a large amount of blood. He was treated at Parmer County Community Hospital and transferred immediately to Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital.

According to police officers, Harben ran across the courtyard at the apartments around 1:15 a.m. last Saturday, and aroused a neighbor, Joe Pearson, telling him Mrs. Woodall had shot him, and

asking that he call the police.

Members of the Friona Police Department, along with County Deputy Sheriff Bill Morgan arrived at the apartment, and found both Mrs. Woodall and Harben lying in the hall. Harben was semi-conscious.

The two gunshot victims were taken to Parmer County Community

The annual meeting for Production Credit Association, which was cancelled February 22 because of a blizzard, has been re-scheduled for Saturday, March 15, it was announced this week.

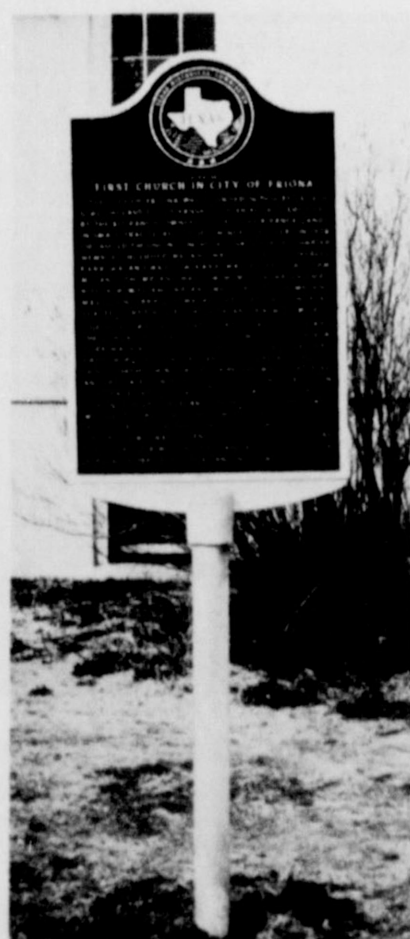

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

## 45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 14, 1930

Postmaster J.A. Guyer received word this week from the post office department in Washington, D.C. that the application for a new rural route out of Friona to the northwest had been granted by the department, and that the service will begin on July 1 this year. The route will be a little less than 62 miles, and will be carried just three times a week, on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

## 35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 15, 1940

Dr. Mann will be here during the Easter Holidays, and will repeat the tonsil clinic such as he conducted in December. The work done here during the Christmas Holidays resulted in 16 tonsilectomies and four or five circumcisions. Fees are \$15 for a tonsilectomy, and \$5 for a circumcison. The work is sponsored by the health committee of the Parent-Teachers Association.

## 30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 16, 1945

The Friona Squaws district basketball champions for the past two years, won third place in the girls' state tournament at Hillsboro last week, chalking up three victories to one defeat.

G.B. (Pete) Buske lost some fingers on his right hand last Friday while grinding feed for his stock. He was taken to the hospital at Clovis for surgical treatment and is reported as getting along all right.

## 25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 10, 1950

Friona State Bank was open for business Monday in its new \$50,000 quarters for the first time, after celebrating a most successful open house last Saturday. Frank A. Spring, cashier and director, said that more than one thousand visitors treked through the new building on Saturday. The moving of the bank from the old two-story building on Fifth Street marks the passing of another era of Friona history.

## 20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 11, 1955

Development of the Whiteway addition in Northwest Friona as an immediate housing project was assured this week by an Amarillo developing group and W.H. Flippin, Jr., who is selling the property to them. To operate here as Friona Building Company, the concern is headed by K.S. Reynolds, Roy Hunnicutt and E.E. Warnick. The property to be developed is north of Highway 60, between the highway and 15th street, and to the north and west of Parmer County Community Hospital.

## 15 YEARS AGO—MARCH 10, 1960

Unleashing a torrid attack that could not be repelled, the Friona Squaws defeated both opponents in the regional tournament held in Chapman Field House in Lubock Saturday, to win a berth in the Class AA state championship playoffs beginning Friday night in Gregory Gymnasium in Austin. The Squaws will meet the Bowie High School girls Friday at 7:30 p.m.

## 10 YEARS AGO—MARCH 11, 1965

This weekend the Friona High School Squaws are competing in the state basketball tournament for the fourth time in six years, and tenth in all. However, this trip will be a new experience for the Squaws, who are for the first time making the tournament appearance as defending champions. Friona downed Spearman, 54-33 and Granbury, 49-45 to gain the state meet.

Many parents will learn much by helping Junior with his school homework.

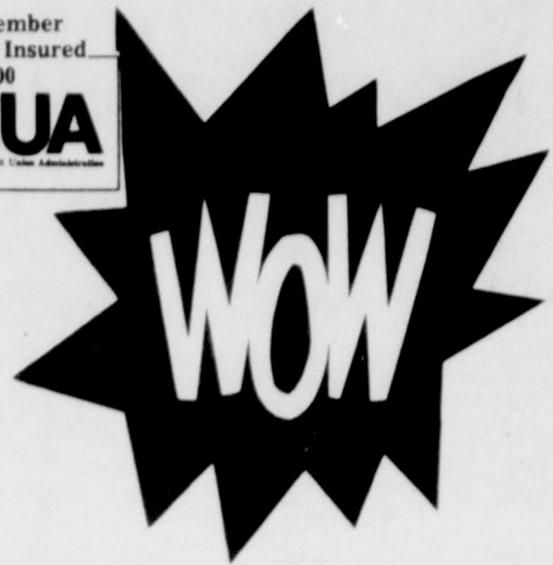

### Irrigation Meet Set In Hereford

Irrigation field tests, underground water supplies and energy for irrigation are among the topics on tap for a High Plains Irrigation Conference in Hereford on March 14.

According to irrigation specialist Leon New of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and County Extension Agent Justin McBride, the one-day meeting will give producers and others a chance to get a reading on the 1975 irrigation picture.

Kicking off at 9:30 a.m., the one-day conference includes a catered lunch and will end about 3:30 p.m.

Paul Fischbach, professor of agricultural engineering at the University of Nebraska, will discuss limited water application with center pivot sprinklers and automated gated pipe irrigation systems.

He'll be followed by Leon New of Lubbock, who will report on the results of grower irrigation field tests in the Panhandle area.

Nolan Clark, USDA-ARS agricultural engineer from Bushland, will provide an update on irrigation research. And Duncan Ellison, executive director, Water Incorporated, Lubbock, will wrap up the morning session with a talk on the status of water importation.

Noon lunch hour speaker will be A.L. Black, a Friona grower and member of the Texas Water Development Board of Directors. Black's topic is, "Action for the Future."

Leading off the afternoon session on the subject of underground water will be Wayne Wyatt of the Texas Water Development Board in Austin.

A panel discussion on

energy for irrigation will be moderated by James Hull, manager of the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative.

Final presentation of the day will be by Wayne Keese, Extension irrigation specialist from College Station, talking on the influence of pumping equipment on irrigation costs.

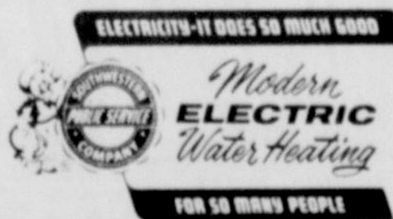

## FHA To Provide Emergency Loans

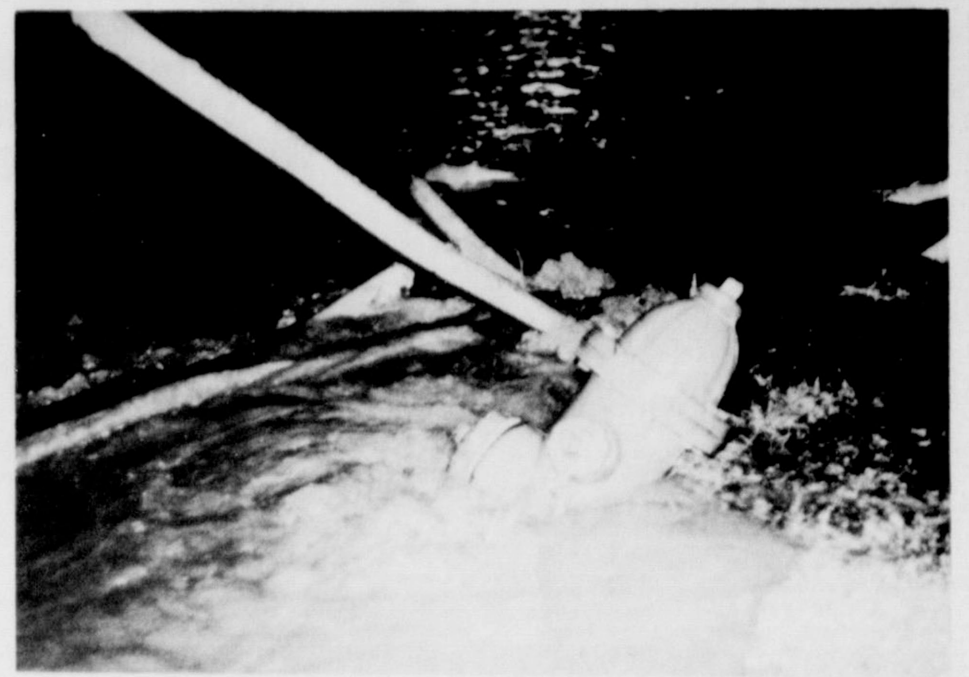
Farmers and ranchers in Parmer County, Texas, who sustained production losses and physical losses as a result of drought to be from October 1973 to August 15, 1974 and to add cold and wet weather August 16 to October 31 and hailstorms June 2, July 25, August 8 and October 4, 1974, may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 207 Avenue D., P.O. Box 196, Farwell, Texas, before close of business April 21, 1975 for physical losses and November 20, 1975 for production losses.

These loan applications

will be taken under the terms of a new law (P.L. 93-237) enacted January 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

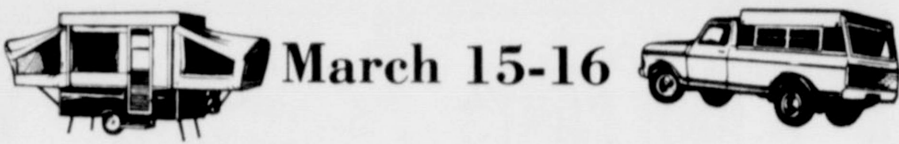
Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975. Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is five per cent and there will be no principal cancellation.

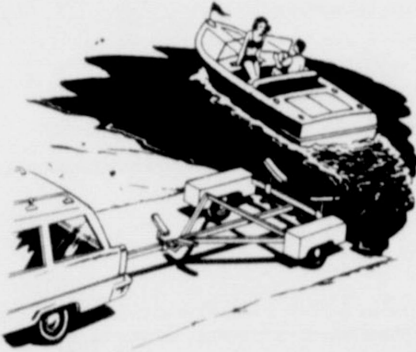

# Terri Patterson Is Girls Scoring Champ

Junior forward Terri Patterson led the Friona Squaws in scoring for the 1974-75 season, with the highest point total for an underclassman in the past eight years.

Miss Patterson scored 661 points, getting an almost equal number of field goals and free shots, to run away with the team scoring crown.

The point total was the most for an underclassman since Hazel Fallwell scored 764 as a sophomore in 1966-67. However, Miss Fallwell's total was as a runnerup. Back in the 1963-64 season, Tito Jennings scored 692 points to win the scoring title as a junior.

Another junior, Myrna Phipps, had the best shooting percentage on field goal shots, hitting 97 of 183 attempts, for 53.0 per cent. Miss Patterson hit 48.7 per cent of her field shots, 221 of 453.

In free throw shooting, Terri was again the team leader, getting over half of the team's total. She connected on 219 of 335 attempts, for 65.3 per cent.

Miss Patterson's 661 points ran her varsity total to over 1,000—to 1,077 in two seasons. She was runnerup to Darla Rhodes in scoring on the 1973-74 team with 416 points as a sophomore.

On the defensive side of the ledger, Sherri Thorn, another junior, was top rebounder with 137, while classmate Lucinda Aguirre pulled down 99 caroms.

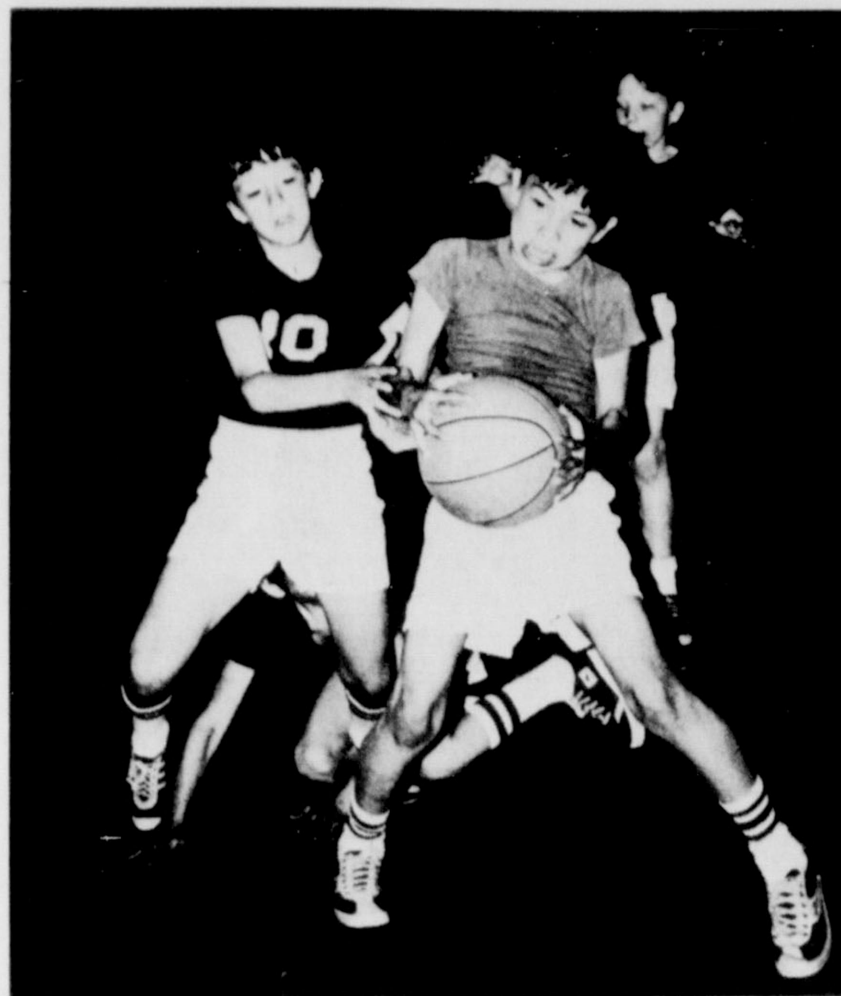
Miss Aguirre committed the most fouls, 97, to Cindy Gammon's 84.
