At that time Frye was in Vienna, Ill., at the opening of a new state prison without bars. He had taken 15 prisoners from Menard to be the first ones at the new facility.

State troopers and sheriffs' deputies from a 50-mile area were summoned to the prison. as were doctors and ambulances. Menard is a brownstone prison 89 years old, east of the Chester business district but inside the city limits of the town of about 5,500 population.

Listing Also Marks Peak SAIGON, South Viet Nam

(AP) - The battle of the Ia Drang Valley pushed American casualties in Viet Nam last week to 240 killed in action, the U. S. military announced today. It was nearly three times the highest total announced for any previous week.

The U. S. Command also reported 470 Americans were wounded during the week ending at midnight Nov. 20 and 6 were missing action.

COMMUNIST TOLL

A record number of Communist casualties also was reported - 2,262 dead and 136 captured. South Vietnamese forces reported 357 dead and 807 wounded, more than double the previous week.

The report today brought the total of U. S. casualties reported in nearly five years of fighting in Viet Nam to about 1,300 dead and about 6,000 wounded. Haif the dead and a third of the wounded were cut down in the past three months as U.S. combat troops who began arriving in Viet Nam in February took a bigger and bigger part in the

Before February the American role in Viet Nam was an advisory one, coupled with providing helicopter and other air support for South Vietnamese

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Belgian Court Mourns Death Of Queen, 89

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The Belgian court went into mourning today for Dowager Queen Elisabeth, a heroine in two world wars and one of Europe's leading patronesses of the arts.

The 89-year-old queen suf-fered a heart attack Nov. 4. She had another serious attack Tuesday night and died within a

Elisabeth was the widow of King Albert, the mother of former King Leopold III and the grandmother of the reigning monarch, King Baudouin. Former Queen Marie Jose of Italy is her daughter, and Grand Duchess Josephine-Charlotte of Luxenbourg is a granddaughter.

TWO WARS Although born a German princess, she won the hearts of the Belgians during the two wars in which her native country was

"An iron curtain has fallen between my country and me," she said when German troops invaded Belgium in World War I. She nursed the wounded in the trenches and was awarded the French War Cross for her "courage and devotion under

In World War II she defied the Nazis and succeeded in staying in Belgium when the retreating Germans removed the royal family to Germany.

In 1900, she married Albert, heir to the Belgian throne. The







Girl Assault Trial Defense **Nearing End**

EL RENO, Okla. (AP) - The second-degree rape trial of John Shapard moved into its third day with defense lawyers saying they had only one or two more witnesses and four deposi-

Shapard, 17, is the first of six Oklahoma City area youths to fact trial for the alleged mass sex attack on a 15-year-old girl last July 7.

Two youths, both 19, told Tues-day of picking up the alleged victim and her cousin shortly after midnight July 3 and staying at Lake Hefner, just north of Oklahoma City, with them until dawn.

Other witnesses Tuesday included Gayle Garis, 17, a neighbor of the alleged victim's cousin, and Daniel Webster, a newsman.

Miss Garis testified that the alleged victim told her July 3 that she got in "real late last night." Miss Garis said the alleged victim said she and her cousin didn't get in until 5:30 a.m. after drinking some beer and going out to Lake Hefner with two boys.

During the alleged victim's testimony Monday, she denied being picked up by two boys July 3 and denied that she drank

Depositions from the principal of St. Theresa's Academy in San Antonio, Tex., the girl's former home, and a San Antonio youth were read into the record. The principal, Mother Leone, said the alleged rape victim formerly attended the school and had a reputation of being untruthful.

He also is accused of giving false testimony when he said he delivered two photographs to Sheriff Walter Welch on Jan. 13, a week after the attack, showing a footprint near the crime

Sparks likewise is charged with lying when he said he made a photograph of a shoe heel print in the driveway of the Hallmark home

HIS TESTIMONY During the Lana trial, Sparks said he examined the pictures of the footprint in the pasture with one taken in the driveway and told the court they ap-

peared similar. Deputy Sheriff Charles Barnard said Tuesday he had pictures of the Hallmark driveway and testified it was unlikely any footprint would show up enough on the concrete drive to be seen in a picture.

Welch testified Sparks never delivered him the pictures as the defendant claimed.

'Two-Chinas' **Policy Eyed** By Leaders

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(AP) - U. S. officials are reliably reported to be taking a careful look at the possibility of switching to a "two-Chinas" policy because of the growing movement to seat Red China in the United Nations.

One authoritative U.S. source has suggested that an alternative will have to be found by next fall to the 16-year-old policy of trying to keep the door shut to Peking. This source added that the seating of both Red China and the Nationalists might be the only practical course for the United States.

BANNER TOPPLING It is generally conceded at the United Nations that the Chinese Communists have been barred for the last time. The General Assembly voted 47-47 on the question last week and the pro-Peking trend is expected to continue. It is also doubtful if the United States will be able to win enough support next year to require that Red China's supporters muster a two-thirds majori-

ty to get Peking admitted. The question now is no longer how to keep the Peking government out, diplomats say, but what to do about the Nationalist government which rules 12 million people on Formosa. Some delegates have been trying to launch a two-Chinas movement for several years but without

success. The idea is that the Peking government, representing the huge mainland population, would be given the seat now held by the Nationalists and that Formosa would be admit-

ted as a new member. The main obstacles so far have been the substantial oppo-sition to seating Peking and the rejection of the two-Chinas concept by both Peking and Taipei.

PREVENT EXPULSION Since Red China says it won't join the United Nations unless Nationalists are expelled, United States and other backers of Chiang Kai-shek's regime may be faced next year with the problem of preventing the expulsion of the Taipei go ernment. This apparently is causing a number of countries

to re-examine their policies. J. S. Ambassador Arthur Goldberg recently pointed out that Formosa has a larger population than 85 of the world organization's 117 members. He said it would be a violation of the idea of universality to expel such a government.

Many diplomats believe that the United States could persuade Chiang to apply for Formosa's admission as a new member, but no one has found a formula to avert a Communist veto. The admission of new members must first be recommended by the Security Council, where the big-power veto ap-

plies.
The successful implementation of a two-Chinas policy probably would have to be part of a deal agreed to in advance so that beking would get in and the Nationalists would get a new seat without facing a veto.

One question being asked is whether it is not too late for such a deal now that Peking virtually has a foot in the door.

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

Johnson Girds To Cope With **World Issues**

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)

— President Johnson, busy at shaping fresh domestic programs, is laying the groundwork for broadened attention next year to world problems.

Because Viet Nam has demanded so much concentration on his part, Johnson has not had the time in the last few months to grapple in depth with the threat of the weakening of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization posed by French President Charles de Gaulle's nationalistic policies.

RELEGATE ISSUES While there can be no presidential relaxation of supervision of the Viet Nam effort, on the basis of the massive legislative program passed by the first session of Congress, it appears the President may be able to relegate some domestic issues to lower priorities.

The signs now point to a de-termined effort by the President in 1966 toward recementing Western Europe's defenses, im-proving East-West relations and halting the quarreling between India and Pakistan.

The White House announcement Tuesday that Johnson will meet with British Prime Minister Harold Wilson Dec. 17, following a Dec. 2-3 conference with West German Chancellor Ludwig Erhard, put European problems at the top of the list in this ground-laying period.
SHASTRI COMING?

Press secretary Bill D. Moyers had only a "can't say" to reports in Washington diplo-matic circles that India's Prime president Lal Bahadur Shastri might come to this country about the third week in January and President Mohammed Ayub Khan of Pakistan about mid-

Moyers made it clear that the two leaders are welcome but the timing of their visits is largely up to them.

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

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

Antidote Of Stronger States

Delegates to the annual national conference of state legislative leaders at San Juan, Puerto Rico, perhaps expecting a happy time in that island paradise, were treated to some hard, critical facts by a variety of speakers. It may be hoped that will stimulate some objective introspection that will lead to improvement in state gov-

Sen. Roman Hruska, R-Neb., lamented Washington's tendency to bypass the states to cope with urban problems and U.S. Supreme Court decisions that have "usurped" state legislative responsibilities. But other speakers emphasized that the weakened status of legislatures is largely their own fault.

State legislatures in general have failed to modernize their organization and procedures for effective functioning in a vibrant, complex, growing society. Too many state legislatures,

more so in a number of other states than in Texas, are so grossly underpaid that high-caliber citizens are not attracted to that public service.

The compelling reason why federalcity relations are by-passing the state governments is that state legislatures simply have not adequately faced up to urbanization problems themselves.

The state legislative leaders meeting in the bustling Puerto Rican com-monwealth probably did not relish hearing these harsh truths. But they should have come away from that conference persuaded that the most effective way to curtail excessive cen-tralization of American government at the national level is to build stronger state governments in all their branches, and especially in the outmoded, unimaginative legislatures, which too often are dominated by special in-

Lived In Two Worlds

If he had a choice, Henry A. Wal-ace probably would have wanted to a glut of pork. In his public life he oflace probably would have wanted to be remembered for his private contributions to agriculture. Certainly few men in our history have influenced corn production more profoundly than he did with the development of highyield hybrid strains.

But history will probably accent his. public service as secretary of agricul-ture, 1933-40, as vice president, 1941-45, as secretary of commerce, 1945, and as an unsuccessful candidate for president under the Progressive Party banner in 1948. As secretary of agriculture he is best remembered for a program to plow up cotton to ease a agriculture.

WHEN ANY GROUP of individuals puts the largest amount of capital in a corporation, they are usually given the biggest share of the stock and the voting power. In the 20 years since the U.N. was organized, the United States has contributed \$2,418,000,000 out of the total of \$5,372,000,000 col-lected, which includes all assessments and voluntary payments. Thus America's share of the expense has been 45 per cent. Yet the Soviet Union in the same period paid only \$233,000,000, or less than 5 per cent of the total.

WHAT BRINGS UP this question is the peculiar vote recorded in the United Nations General Assembly last week when 47 members voted to admit Red China and 47 voted against the admission, while 20 abstained. An examination of the way the votes were cast reveals that the group of 47 for Red China was made up almost entirely of countries in Africa, Eastern Europe and Asia which are engaged in trade with the Communists.

Finland, Denmark and Sweden are friends of the United States, but they lie close to Russia on the Baltic, and it is presumably expedient to avoid friction with their powerful neighbor. The United Arab Republic has been receiv-

I can understand the qualms of a mother's heart when her boy's life is endangered.

But you can thank God that your son is not one of those pitiful, purposeless, youths who tear up their draft cards, demonstrate against the best judgment of our national leaders, and jeopardize the morale of our armed forces.

General de Gaulle can, of course argue that he recognized the Red China government a year or so ago because the British had done so. The difference, however, is that Great Britain gave its diplomatic recognition prior to 1950, when the Red Chinese brazenly attacked the United Nations forces in Korea. Also, the British hold Hong Kong, an important trading center on the Asian mainland, and they don't want the Red Chinese to deprive them of that source

BUT HOW LONG is the United States going to be subjected to the menace of a voting combination wherethe Soviet Union, though sometimes quarreling with Red China outwardly, manages nevertheless to work with the Peiping regime against the United States?

Fifteen different systems of "weighted voting" in the U.N. have been studied in vain by the Department of State. Some are based on population, some on financial contributions to the U.N., and some on companisons of gross national product. But none of these plans has as yet been formally advocated by the United States.

THE UNITED STATES in 1965 is paying 37 per cent of the total assessments of the U.N. This is much larger than any other nation's contribution. In fact, more than four-fifths of the 117 members are assessed at less than one per cent each. Indeed, more than one-third of all the members pay the minimum assessment of less than four-tenths of one per cent.

The realistic fact is that the money contributions to the U.N. are heaviest on the United States. Sooner or later the American people are going to be urged to withdraw from an organization that is controlled by many small nations which happen to be influenced by imperialistic regimes.

THE PROBLEM will ultimately have to be settled on a practical basis -that the policies of the nation which puts up the most money and furnishes the largest amount of economic aid to the other nations of the world shouldn't be subjected to a majority vote by a bloc of members whose votes are manipulated or intimidated by Communist imperialism.

The Day Pages Were Made Over

It was one of those dull days, Nov. 22, 1963, on the soap opera, "As the World Turns," and Grandpa was carrying on dialogue intended as periodic review. My wife and I were eating lunch, mentally shutting out

SUDDENLY GRANDPA wasn't talking. The new voice said there had been reports that shots had been heard or fired on the presidential procession in Dallas where John F. Kennedy was scheduled in minutes to make an address. As I recall, Grandpa's sound came back momentarily, and then the voice was back confirming the earlier report and mildly amplifying it. I dialed the office got Glenn Cootes, our city editor, and told him to go back to the composing room and hold up the front and jump pages, which were ready to be turned in.

AT THE moment, he had no word on the wire, but by the time I got there, bells had been singaling bulletins, which were rattling off the machine. While these were wrapped in caution, it was apparent that the President had been hit and seriously if not mortally wounded.

BOB WHIPKEY, who had been through similar crises at press time many times before, had the makeup men rip a gaping hold in the front page. Almost every fragment of information went into type. Still there was not definite word, and the deadline was upon us. Alternate headlines were set, one to cover critical

THE STORY had begun to crystal ize. A policeman had been shot and killed; a man had been captured in a theatre and was being held. Lyn don Johnson had taken the oath o office as President of the United States. Big Spring people, as everywhere, were giving expression to their sense of shock.

Thus, we put the final edition to bed with the largest type we had in red letters, again proclaiming: "President Kennedy Assassinated." Then, with the pressure off for the moment, we, too, felt the deep sense of shock and revulsion that this could happen. We felt all washed out.

WASHINGTON-Before you can say platitudinous bureaucratic windbag, the Post Office Department will be chiding all of us to get our Christmas mail dispatched early.

My own advice, however, is not to send any Christmas mail at all. It won't do any good. This is the Christmas that the Post Office will celebrate by breaking down completely.

ALL OVER THE republic blameless tads will awake on Christmas morning to discover that the jolly old elf hasn't been there at all. Tearful moms and rapacious wives will conclude that their helpless male chattels have finally fled to Las Vegas with the pneumatic blonde who redeems soda bottles at the supermarket. It won't be that at all, sad to say. Christmas wi stop this year simply because the Post Office Department has been gathering inertia over since the sorry days of Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield, and this happy Yuletide is when it'll reach a critical mess.

I DON'T WORRY so much about the tads or the moms or the wives. but I do worry like the tunket about all those poor postal chaps wedged into the Gents. What'll they do when all the cigarettes are gone? When the last secret formula for smashing parcel post bundles is revealed? When the seminars on glacial counter service are concluded? When the last triumphantly surly clerk demonstrates his favorite method of snarling at timorous old ladies caught trying to

mail calf foot jelly to a veterans hos-

IS IT POSSIBLE that the audience contains a leavening of dim bulbs who still believe the mail will get through this Christmas? This is nonsense. Post Office will have more than 8 billion pieces of holiday mail to contend with, and the wretched snails can't cope with the routine first-of-the-month laments mailed by the nation's grasping credit merchants.

The last time I played how-long-to-New-York with Post Office (I always lose, of course), the score was 60 hours. Sixty hours from a mailbox in downtown Washington to the desk of the panting consignee in midtown Manhattan.

THE NATION'S Post Office Department is a livid disgrace. It is adept at issuing commemorative stamps at a rate that the most egocentric banana republic dictator might envy. It intercepts, gums over, delays and conspires about mail (especially mail from abroad) that it conceives to be subversive. It worries about pornography in a manner befitting the most neurotic YMCA secretary alive.

Indeed, the Post Office does many things. It can create lunatic enterprises such as the Zip Code at the drop-of a deficit. It can fodder and stable uncounted worn-out political hacks. It can censor and deplore. What it just can't seem to manage, however, is deliver the mail.

War Widows Numerous In **Georgia City**

COLUMBUS, Ga. (AP) Residents of this east Georgia city are reminded often that Columbus is the home of Ft. Benning and the 1st Cavalry, Airmobile, Division.

But it's rot a pleasant reminder. Telegrams arriving almost daily from the Defense Department bring the sad news that soldiers from the base and the division are dying in the war in Viet Nam.

Perhaps no other city in the nation sees more of its population dwindle each week because of the fighting in Southeast Asia. On this Thanksgiving Eve, perhaps no other city is more unified in sorrow for its citizens.

ELEVEN TELEGRAMS Monday the Defense Department sent 11 telegrams to Columbus telling widows and parents their loved ones died in bitter fighting in the Ia Drang Valley last week.

Tuesday six more telegrams told of Columbus soldiers "killed in action." Today . . .?

A week ago Imogene Ferrell read of the heavy fighting by the 1st Cavalry at the foot of a mountain named Chu Pong in Viet Nam.

"He did everything for his family," she said. Then she smiled, "But we were second to the Army. A neighborhood boy called him the 'Old Sarge.'


