PLAUDITS TO the P-TO. They did it again, with an outstanding program last Monday night at the Community Center.

Art Linkletter was everything we expected him to be—maybe even more. About halfway through the speech we found ourselves wondering—"I can't believe it—that's really Art Linkletter, and he's giving a great performance, and right here in Friona."

The former star of "People Are Funny," and "House Party" told the men in the audience "I've probably spent more time during the day at home with your wives than you have—and I know I've had them more when they were listening."

Linkletter, who spent almost 40 years interviewing people on his radio and television programs, said the best types of interviews were the ones done "live," completely unrehearsed, where you didn't know what was going to come out.

"There are two groups who are better than all others to interview," Linkletter said. "One is women over 70, and the other is children under 10. Women over 70 don't mind what they say—they just let it all out. Children don't know what they're saying," the longtime show business personality said.

Concerning his practice of interviewing children on his programs, which resulted in a best-selling book, "Kids Say the Darndest Things," Linkletter pointed out that parents finally "wised up" and coached their children on some things not to say on television. He would get around that by purposely asking "What did your parents tell you not to talk about?" And the answers were usually provocative.

One youngster said his parents said he could say anything he wanted to on television, "Just don't scratch certain parts of your body if you itch," was the admonition.

Linkletter, whose 19-year-old daughter jumped to her death while taking LSD six years ago, has been on tour for the past four years, acting as an international spokesman for drug abuse prevention.

He said that following his daughter's tragic death, he was faced with the decision of whether to do the natural thing—withdraw from society and suffer alone, or to use the tragic event for good purposes.

"I decided to use the platform I had built up over the past 40 years to do whatever possible to fight drug abuse," the entertainer said.

"I've discovered that we don't really have a drug problem in this country. We have a people problem," Linkletter said.

Some other remarks he made relative to the drug situation, which he said "peaked out" around 1968, included:

"The drug problem isn't new. It always breaks out following a big national upheaval. It first happened following the Civil War. In the early 1960s, we were having a revolution in America, although we didn't know it. We were having riots in the streets. The country was split on the Vietnam issue.

"You are all drug users—there are millions of 'coffee-holics' in this country. There are also the smokers, the drinkers, and the women who take tranquilizers or sleeping pills.

"Liquor is also a drug (ethanol). It is one of our biggest drug problems, having become a universal crutch for people to lean on.

"Parents need to be understanding with their children. They need to be loving. Talk to your children, and listen to what they say. Try to understand them and their problems.

Linkletter said that one major problem in dealing with drugs is to "over-react." He said he was guilty of this when he first began to speak on the subject, being bitter about the death of his daughter.

He said he believed that the marijuana violations, now punishable as a felony, should be reduced to a misdemeanor.

"I'm definitely not in favor of legalizing the use of marijuana in this country, but neither am I in favor of busting young people and equating them with hardened criminals for a violation of this sort," he stated.

"Even though a small percentage of youngsters go on to hard drugs from their 'experiments,' we can't afford to lose even ONE, especially if it's your youngster," Linkletter said.

"There will always be drugs, and a drug problem. Drugs can be used for good as well as bad. But just because the problem will reoccur, we shouldn't give up on it. You don't quit weeding your garden just because you know you're going to have weeds again next year," Linkletter said in concluding his talk.

Drive Underway To Raise \$150,000

A whirlwind campaign designed to raise \$150,000 to equip the proposed nursing home for Friona was kicked off Friday by a 28-member fund drive committee.

The fund drive committee was announced this week by Percy Parsons, chairman of the steering committee for the nursing home.

"We had 100 per cent acceptance from every one we asked to serve on the committee. That's the way it has been ever since we started to work on the project—like the night we had the first meeting. Eighty-four people were called, and 84 turned out in bad weather," Parsons commented.

Serving on the drive committee are Wesley Barnett, Jerry Loflin, Charles Allen, H.K. Kendrick, Hollis Horton, M.C. Osborn, Dr. Paul Spring, Dan Ethridge, A.L. Black, Paul Fortenberry, Andy Hurst, Dr. Lloyd Shackelford and Carl Schlenker.

Also, Raymond Schueler, A.W. Anthony, Jr., Floyd Reeve, Arthur Drake, Robert Neelley, George Rushing, J.W. Gammon, Jim Roy Daniel, Ralph Roden, Percy Parsons, Hoyt Smith, J.G. McFarland, Raymond Fleming, Jo Buchanan and Gary Brown.

Teams of those on the committee are to call on residents of the area within the next several days in their attempt to raise the money. It was pointed out that if an individual is not contacted that wishes to give to the drive, they may contact any member of the committee.

The fund drive also is designated to arouse interest in the April 22 bond election, in which Friona voters will be asked to approve bonds in the amount of \$350,000 for construction of the rest home.

The steering committee is proposing a 60-bed nursing home to be built in Friona, and has cited figures showing that there are practically enough residents of the area in the "senior citizen" category (684) to assure the success of a nursing home.

Also, there are at least 50 elderly citizens from the Friona area who are residents of nursing homes outside of Parmer County, and a number of Friona area residents with aging parents who live outside of the area.

Absentee Vote Starts On Issue

Absentee voting for the special city bond election, set for April 22, is underway at the City Hall.

The special voting period will continue through April 18, according to City Manager Jake Outland.

Absentee voting is now underway in County Clerk Bonnie Warren's office at Farwell for the special Constitutional amendment election set April 22. Voting goes through April 18, 5 p.m.

Absentee voting for the election this week in City Manager Jake Outland's office, and will continue through Friday, April 18.

It has been pointed out that no increase in taxes, at least for the

1975-76 fiscal year, will be necessary in the event the bond issue passes.

The tax situation beyond that will depend to a large extent on receipts from the one-cent municipal sales tax and the continuation of the federal revenue sharing checks.

Steady Rain Soaks Area

They used to call it a million-dollar rain when the area received a rainfall like it did Thursday—but due to the inflated price of natural gas, electricity, etc., it might be more in the category of a \$2 million-dollar rain nowadays.

At any rate, it was just "what the doctor ordered," coming when it did, and falling as it did. The rain began in the pre-dawn hours Thursday, and fell fairly steadily throughout the day, and continued at a lighter pace after nightfall.

Official measurement by the City of Friona revealed that a total of 1.41 inches had been measured up to 8 a.m. Friday. Indications were that it was perhaps heavier toward Hub, and to the west.

With the temperatures hovering in the high 30s all day Thursday, the rain changed to snow at times, and at one time in the early part of the morning, large snowflakes were falling amidst the heavy rain.

At Rhea, from four to six inches of snow stuck to the ground, as apparently the temperature was somewhat colder in that area.

With spring planting just around

the corner—in fact, already begun by some—the soaking rain couldn't have been better timed. And the wheat farmers—both dryland and irrigated, hailed the moisture as virtually assuring a good crop, depending on how much dry wind the area might have before harvest.

Area farmers, facing inflated prices on the production phase of their crops for 1975, hailed the moisture as a "God send."

The rainfall came after another week of varying spring weather in the local area, which ranged from a beautiful spring weekend to a day of gale-like winds on Monday, which produced a smattering of hail and reports of funnel clouds in the area.

Record Crowd Hears Linkletter Speech

A record crowd of around 1100 people attended the "Teacher Appreciation" program in Friona Monday night, which featured Art Linkletter as principal speaker.

It was the largest crowd to date for a function in the new Showbarn-Community Center, and the program was very well received by all attending.

"I never thought I'd get to see Art Linkletter in person, without having to leave Friona," commented one old-timer following the program.

Others commented that Linkletter was "just plain folks" in person, just as he has always appeared on radio and television.

People attended the speech from several neighboring communities, such as Bovina, Muleshoe, Dimmitt and Hereford. A block of tickets was sent to Bovina, and lacked only four tickets selling out.

I'm basically a small town product," Linkletter said in his preliminary remarks. "I was born in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. Why, I hear they are even planning to re-name the town in my honor. They are going to call it Loose-jaw," Linkletter said, getting into a round of rib-ticklers, before launching into a serious discussion on the perils of drug abuse.

The popular entertainer lost his 18-year-old daughter six years ago due to L.S.D., and has pledged to do his best to make the public aware of the dangers involved in using drugs.

Three Elected In School Board Race

An "average" turnout of 421 voters re-elected the two incumbents, Wesley Barnett and Ronald Smiley, and elected Floyd Reeve to a one-year term in the annual Friona School Board election last Saturday.

Barnett and Smiley received an identical number of votes—363, which was quite a coincidence for the number of voters casting ballots. Leroy Lundy, the third name on the ballot for a three-year term, received 84 votes.

The seven-man race for the one-year unexpired term turned into a close race between Floyd S. Reeve and Dr. Jon Mack Roden. Reeve won election with 136 votes, and Dr. Roden polled 129 votes.

After the top two, the votes fell off

to 45 for V.R. Wilcox, 40 for Kenneth McLeelan, 33 for Clarence Monroe, 23 for Charles Hough, 11 for Norman Kothmann, and one for Jack Hamil (write-in).

Six people received write-in votes for the three-year term, although two votes were the most received by any one person, Glenda Adkins.

In the county school trustee portion, J.L. Shaffer received 281 votes, and there were six write-in votes.

The votes will be canvassed, and the new member of the board will be installed at the regular meeting of the school board Monday night, beginning at 8 p.m. The board will also elect its officers for the coming year at that time.

 A deal was completed last week whereby E.V. Rushing transferred his grocery and dry goods store on Main Street to R.F. Fleet, until recently of Ada, Okla. This is the store originally established by J.G. Weir, now of Hereford. Mr. Weir selling to a Mr. Warren, who in turn sold to Mr. Rushing.

40 YEARS AGO—APRIL 12, 1935
 Winners in the County Meet held in Friona last week for high school literary events were: Friona, first with 84 points; Oklahoma Lane, second, 49 points, followed by Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie. In the track events, Friona won in Class A. Oklahoma Lane won the Class B division, followed by Lazbuddie, Bovina and Farwell. Rhea was the winner in rural school division with Lakeview second in Literary, and Jesko second in track.

35 YEARS AGO—APRIL 12, 1940

Demonstration Slated At Two County Schools

Uses of atomic energy will be demonstrated April 14 and 17 at Friona and Lubbock High Schools.

A program titled "This Atomic World" will appear

first at Friona. It will acquaint students with principles and sources of nuclear energy and the power source's role in agriculture, industry, medicine and research.

Orlan L. Ihms will conduct the 40-minute program sponsored by Texas A&M University's College of Engineering.

Using student terms, Ihms will explain structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts such as radiation, fission and fusion.

He will employ special electronic equipment to show how nuclear energy is harnessed to generate electricity, plus other applications. Use of radioisotopes in life process and plant growth studies and disease diagnosis and treatment will be depicted.

Chalkboard talks to the school's science classes will go into more complex areas, such as atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers.

Specially trained in nuclear science, Ihms (rhymes with seems) has bachelor and master's degrees from Texas A&M. He has taken the program to Texas schools nearly four years.

Said City shall constitute a single election precinct for said election, and the following election officers are hereby appointed to hold such election:

Presiding Judge: Nelson Welch; Alternate Presiding Judge: Mrs. Ralph Roden

2. That the Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

3. That by approving and signing this Ordinance the Mayor of said City officially confirms his appointment of the aforesaid election officers to serve at said election; and by passing this Ordinance the governing body of said City approves and concurs in the appointment of the aforesaid election officers.

4. That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, to-wit: one election at which only the resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote, and another election at which all other resident, qualified electors of the City shall be entitled

to vote. The votes cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded, returned, and canvassed separately. It is hereby declared that the purpose of holding the election in such manner is to ascertain arithmetically, with respect to a submitted PROPOSITION, (a) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against the PROPOSITION by resident, qualified electors of the City and also (b) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against the PROPOSITION by resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation. Each elector shall be entitled to vote once, in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.

5. That notice of said election shall be given by posting a substantial copy of this Ordinance at the City Hall and at two other places in said City, not less than 15 days prior to the date set for said election; and a substantial copy of this Ordinance also shall be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than 14 days prior to the date set for said election.

Kite Flying Season Calls For Safety

Kites should be added to the list of toys that were not made to cause damage, but have a potential danger. Kites containing metal, strings with metal content

for strength, or strings that become wet are all potential conductors of electricity when a kite comes in contact with a power line.

According to James Hull, manager of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, these conditions can pose a serious threat to those who fly kites around power lines.

The following safety rules were suggested:

1. Do not use wire or metal in kite strings.
2. Avoid using wet string and do not fly kites in the rain.
3. Stay away from any type of tall structure that a kite might fall into. Also avoid busy highways. One might cause an accident if the kite obstructed someone's view.
4. Do not fly kites around power lines. If a kite becomes hung in a power line, do not try to pull it down, or climb the pole and get it. Call Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, if this occurs, and they will help.

Local I-H Dealership Has Colorful History

Parmer County Implement Company, which is celebrating open house in its beautiful new location on West Highway 60 this week, was originated in 1942 by J.G. McFarland.

However, the local International-Harvester dealership traces its origin back more than 50 years. The late R.H. Kinsley, a Friona pioneer, was the first I-H dealer in Friona.

In fact, Kinsley handled all brands of implements in the early days—I.H. John Deere, J.I. Case and what-have-you.

A few years ago, Kinsley's widow, since deceased, recalled that W.E. Goodwine had purchased the first International-Harvester combine from her husband's dealership in Friona.

In the 1920s, Kinsley sold the International-Harvester dealership to J.C. Wilkison, who had been the Santa Fe railroad agent in Friona.

Wilkison operated his implement store in the Warren Building, a portion of the building currently occupied by Nobles TV & Appliance.

In 1928, Wilkison sold the I-H dealership to the "RBR" partnership, composed of Rosson, Buchanan and Ramey. This partnership operated the implement house in the brick building at the corner of Sixth and Euclid, which later housed a movie theatre, and most recently a used furniture store.

This ownership lasted until 1931, when the "RBR" partnership dissolved, with Rosson taking a dealership in Hereford, Jerome Buchanan keeping the Friona business, and Ramey having the franchise in Dimmitt.

Actually, Buchanan became a partner with Howard Morris locally. Buchanan and Morris moved the agency into the Parr building sometime around 1939, between Main and Euclid on Fifth Street, a location it kept for 24 years.

J.G. McFarland and Jack Yokely bought the I-H dealership from Buchanan and Morris on 1942, and they originated the company name "Parmer County Implement Company."

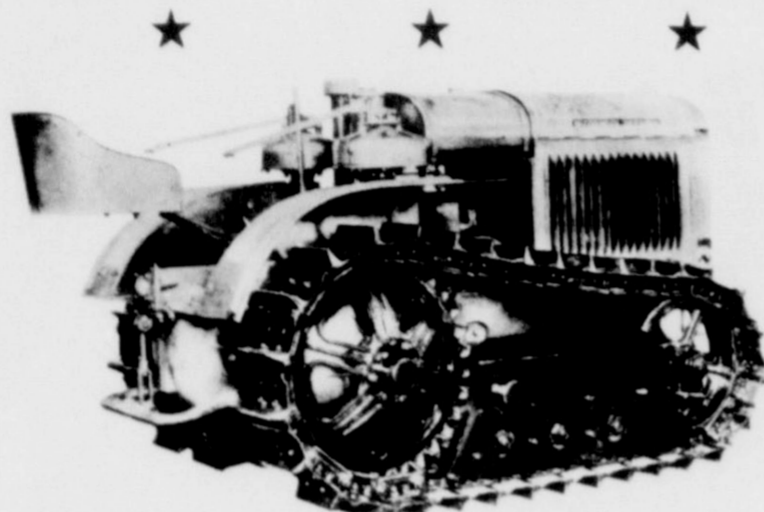
A year later, McFarland purchased Yokely's interests in the business, and was the sole owner

until 1964. At that time, a combination of Andy Hurst, Rene Snead and Newman Jarrell, Jr. bought the business. Hurst bought the interests of Jarrell and Snead a year later.

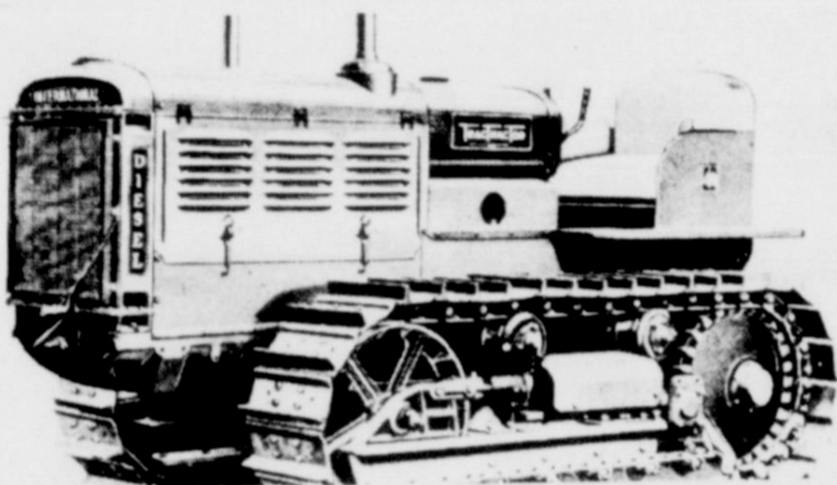
Bill Wooley became a partner in Parmer County Implement Company in 1969, and in June of 1971, the partners purchased the I-H dealership at Muleshoe, re-naming it Wooley-Hurst. Wooley manages the Muleshoe business.

In September of 1963, the company moved into a new headquarters, after occupying the Fifth Street location for 25 years. Then, last month, the moving process began again, for the re-location in the spacious new building on West Highway 60.

Hurst, the local co-owner, first came to Friona in April of 1955. He owned and operated Hurst Department Store until 1965, when he sold it to a group of stockholders.

In 1933, the first International tractor with a diesel engine was introduced. This model was called the TD-40 Tractor.



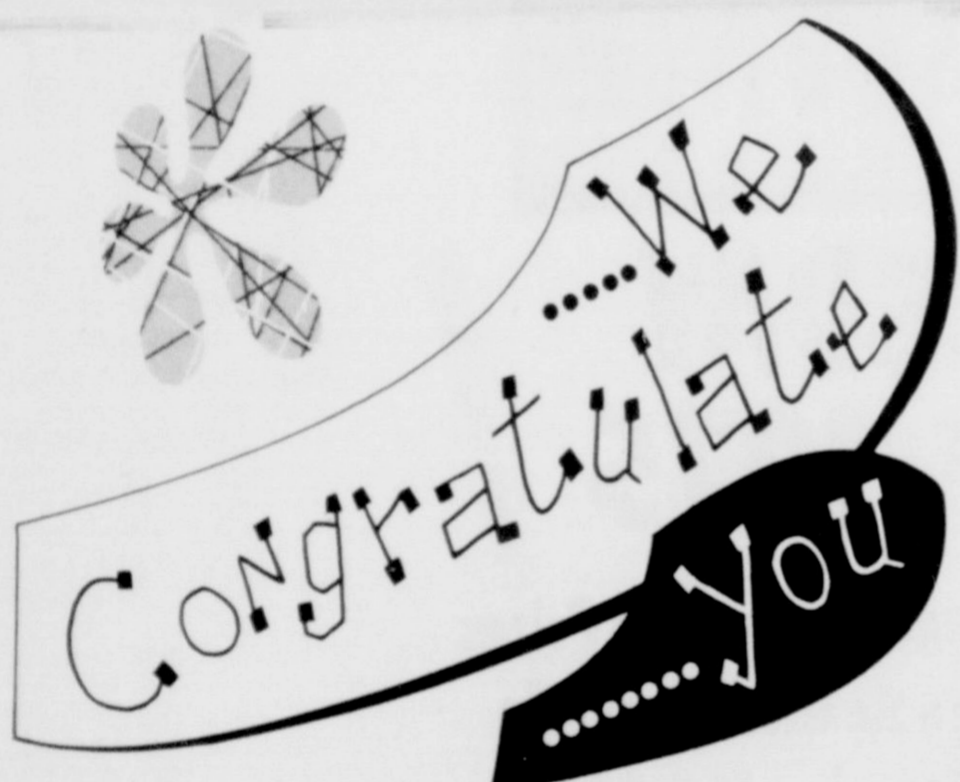

Agricultural Equipment Division.) On November 1, 1974, he was elected a vice president of the Company.

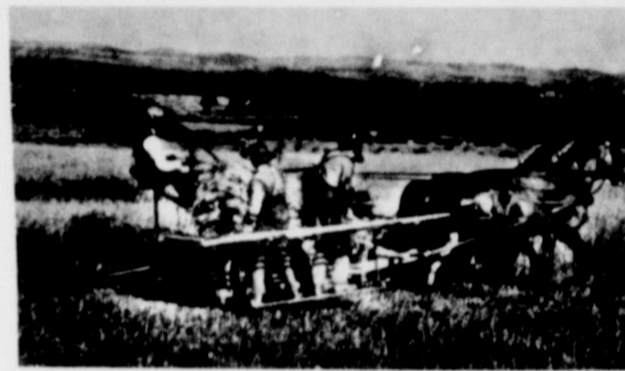

IHC Traces History To Cyrus McCormick

During the latter part of the nineteenth century, the farm equipment industry, influenced by the rapid expansion of agriculture for which it was so largely responsible, grew into one of the most highly competitive businesses in America. This period of severe competition had a restricting effect—so many companies entered this market that no single enterprise could muster up enough capital to engage in normal development or expansion.

At one time, it was estimated, more than 2,000 concerns were manufacturing one or more lines of equipment. Most were barely able to keep abreast of the times—much less anticipate the farmer's needs. Meanwhile, the foreign market, which had first been opened by Cyrus Hall McCormick in 1851, remained a fertile and virtually untouched field of operations. Few companies had either the capital or the expert organization necessary to develop a satisfactory export business.

The two leading manufacturers of harvesting machinery at the turn of the century were McCormick's organization and the Deering Harvester Company, also located in Chicago. This company had been founded in 1869 by William Deering, another pioneer in the development and perfection of agricultural implements. In 1902, the two companies combined with three smaller concerns—the Milwaukee Harvester Company; Warder,

Bushnell and Glessner Company; and the Plano Manufacturing Company—to form the International Harvester Company.

The prime reasons behind the organization of the new Company were to develop new products, to bring about a more diversified line, and to give more attention to the foreign market.

Cyrus H. McCormick, son of the man who had perfected the reaper and head of the McCormick Harvesting Machine Company at that time, became the first president of the International Harvester Company the day after its formation.

With the exception of the Warder, Bushnell and Glessner plant at Springfield, Ohio, now Springfield Works; that of the Milwaukee Harvester Company, the present Milwaukee Works; and a Deering factory at Hamilton, Ontario, all the manufacturing properties acquired by the consolidation were located in or around Chicago. The plant of the Plano Manufacturing Company on Chicago's south side became the Company's West Pullman Works.

The Company also established its General Offices in Chicago, where they have remained ever since. In addition, the Deering Company, which had reached the forefront in its field largely through its manufacturing sagacity, contributed to the corporation coal, iron, and timber lands and a steel mill in South Chicago, now Wisconsin Steel Works, giving the Company a source

of raw materials sufficient to provide for expansion and product diversification.

The effect of the merger upon foreign trade became apparent almost immediately. Spurred on by new capital, new resources, and a larger organization, the Company's foreign business doubled within five years, and within ten had increased fivefold with the extension of trade, particularly effective in Great Britain, Western and Central Europe, Russia, South America, and Australia.

By 1909, factories had been established in several European countries, and sales outlets had been set up in most of the civilized countries of the world. The International Harvester Company's worldwide character had become firmly established.

All the companies entering into the new corporation were engaged in the manufacture of grain harvesting equipment, binders, hay and corn harvesting machines, and twine, but it was soon realized that the industry's tradition of service to the farmer and the nation, which had begun with the invention of the reaper, could not be maintained solely by further development of these machines but must include expansion into all lines of agricultural implements and excursions into types of machinery that were then merely in the planning stage.

Ever sensitive to the needs of the farmer, the directors of the new corporation made plans to incorporate into the International Harvester line implements that would serve every purpose of the farm—many of which had not even been dreamed of a few years before. It was felt, too, that a more diversified line of products would remove the seasonal character from the harvesting machine business and provide employment on a year-round basis to the thousands of International Harvester factory employees and dealers.

The addition of new products would require production at a plant during the periods it was not ordinarily manufacturing harvesting equipment.

In 1904, the purchase of the Keystone Company, at Rock Falls, Illinois, added a historic line of tillage and haying tools. This

factory, subsequently sold, became known as Rock Falls Works. About this time the Weber Wagon Works of Chicago became an International Harvester property.

The Company's line of farm implements became complete with the acquisition in 1918 of steel and chilled plows through the purchase of companies which operated the present Canton Works at Canton, Illinois, and a plant at Chattanooga, Tennessee, and the addition of a line of seeding machines manufactured at Richmond, Indiana.

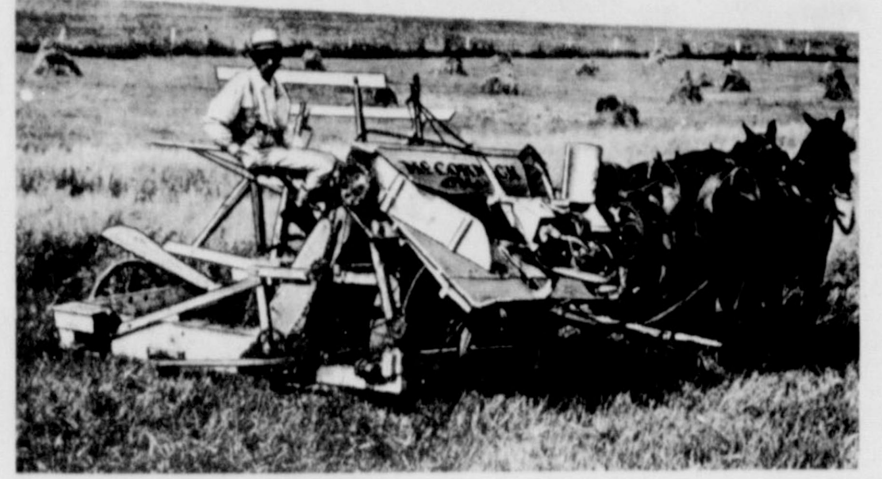
During these years, the International Harvester Company had been rapidly developing and putting into production new lines at its original plants. By 1912, corn binders, ensilage cutters, seeding machinery, harrows, and manure spreaders had been added to the catalog of implements offered to International Harvester dealers. The pioneer light harvester-thresher was introduced in 1914; the stationary thresher, four years later.

Throughout this period there was a general tendency to simplify the various lines of traditional harvesting machinery inherited by the Company, resulting finally in the Company's dropping entirely the Champion, Osborne, and Milwaukee lines of harvesters.

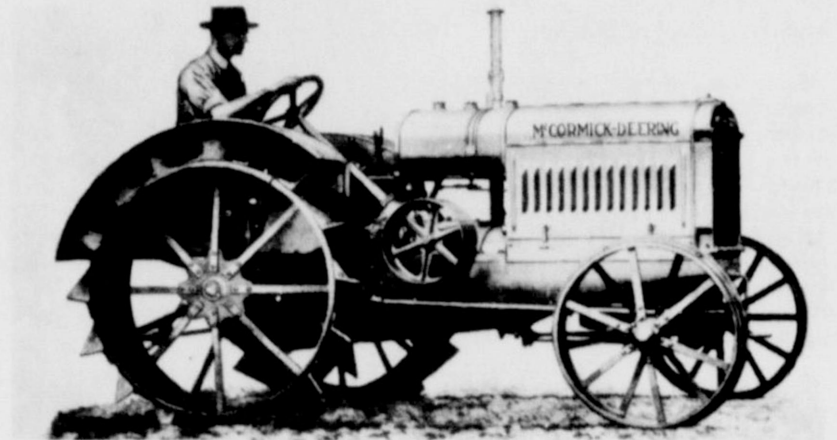
Later the two remaining lines were merged into one—the McCormick-Deering—with the best features of each pioneer machine retained. Consequently, work was simplified for dealers and the Company's sales and servicing departments. This change also served to concentrate experimentation and attempts at improvement upon one identifying line of machinery.

The gradual broadening of the Company's manufacturing field has been in complete accord with Cyrus Hall McCormick's original desire to anticipate and meet the farmer's needs. Every new machine developed has been a response to definite needs of agriculture.

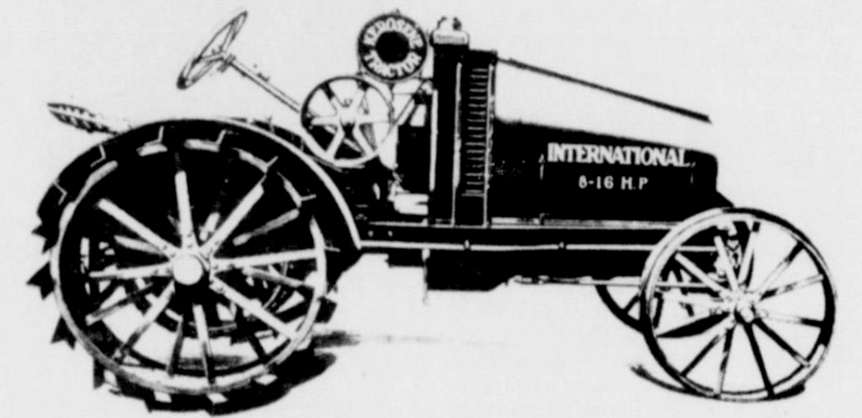
This has resulted not only in a constant bettering of the farmer's standard of living but has also redounded to the advantage of the International Harvester Company by giving its employees more regular employment and its dealers something to sell at every season of the year.



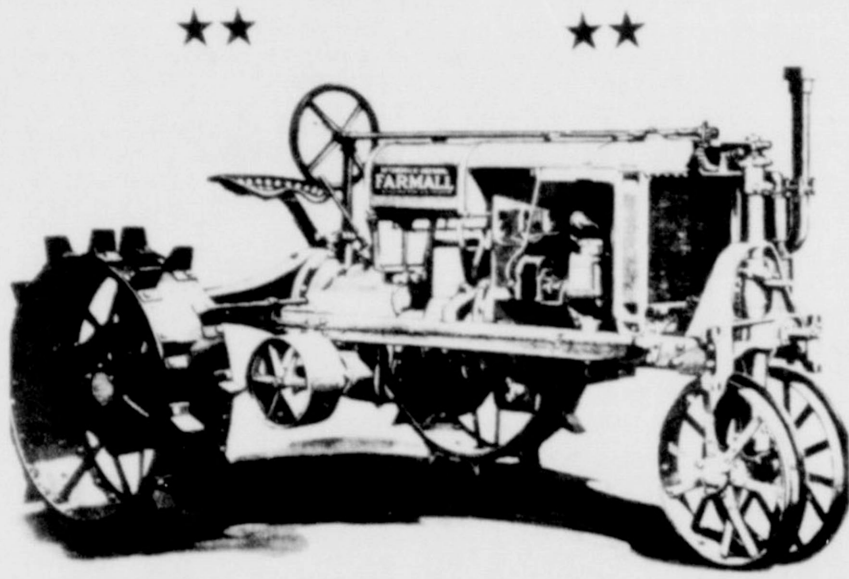
This old photograph shows one of the first of the McCormick twine binders, first manufactured in quantity during the 1880's.

This Kerosene tractor, produced in 1915, was one of the Company's first attempts to design a machine suitable for the smaller farm.



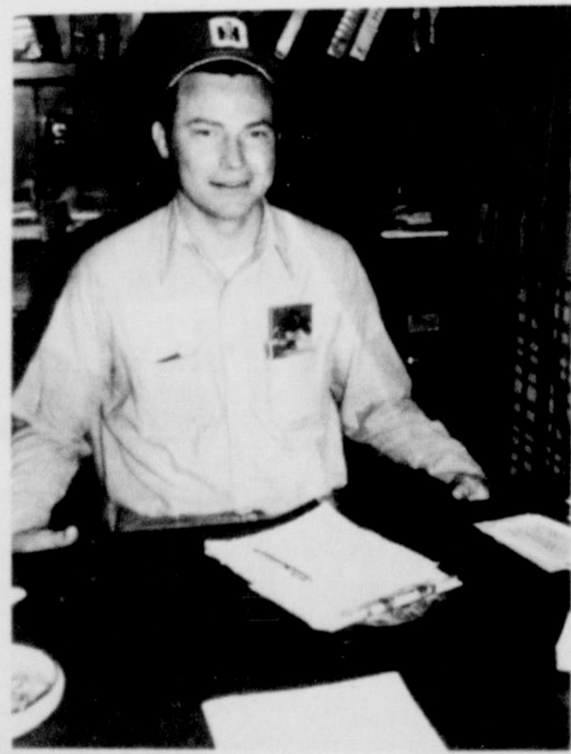
The Farmall, which first appeared in 1922, revolutionized the tractor industry. This was the first successful all-purpose tractor.
