U.S. Steps Up Air Attacks In North Viet

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Allied troops and air power gave the Viet Cong no rest today, but except for disengagement skirmishes the insurgents showed little inclination to defend any territory.

STEPPED UP

With good weather over North Viet Nam for a change, U.S. Air Force and Navy planes stepped up the attack there and went for roads, railways, storage areas and warehouses in the Vinh area and around Dien Bien Phu.

KILL 61

U.S. 1st Cavalry Division units in Operation White Wing 300 miles north of Saigon recorded another 61 dead Viet Cong in a fight Tuesday following an airborne assault 12 miles southwest of Bong Son.

LAYING AMBUSH

Supporting planes sighted the Viet Cong laying an ambush, hit them with rockets and called in artillery. Four of the Red squad were killed and seven captured.

LOSE TRAIL

Bloodhounds were unable to follow a trail of a person seen walking across a field near the home.

10-POINT APPEAL

A 10-point appeal urged a wide range of measures including admission of Communist China to the United Nations and the inclusion of Communist Viet Cong guerrillas in any South Viet Nam negotiations.

MODIFY POLICIES

It called on the United States to modify its policy of containment of communism and appealed to the Communist nations to stop supporting revolutionary movements.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey today offered Indian farmers American know-how to banish hunger, then flew here to discuss with Indian leaders Red China's expansionist pressure and other problems.

FARM KNOW-HOW

## Union Says U.S. Using 'Pressure'

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—AFL-CIO construction union leaders say that the government may be using racial discrimination charges to pressure them into holding down wage demands.

President C. J. Haggerty of the AFL-CIO Construction and Building Trades Department broached the charge in saying "it is a possibility" that the first civil rights suit against a labor organization was part of the Johnson administration's campaign to bring pressure against what it considers inflationary wage increases.

**"NOT JUSTIFIED"**  
Construction union spokesmen concede there has been trouble

in the past in persuading some local unions to accept Negroes, but said that a Justice Department civil rights suit in St. Louis was not justified.

A high government source said that the suit against the St. Louis AFL-CIO Building Trades Council came "like a bolt out of the blue" while attempts were being made to settle the case amicably.

However, there was no immediate official reaction from the Labor or Justice departments on Haggerty's statement that the St. Louis suit might be connected with a Labor Department effort to impose a national wage settlement plan on the construction unions.

He made the statement at a news conference after hearing a detailed report from St. Louis AFL-CIO officials, who were charged with racial discrimination under the 1964 Civil Rights Act for walking off the job of constructing the St. Louis arch when three Negro plumbers were hired.

**JURISDICTIONAL MATTER**  
The AFL-CIO officials say the dispute is purely a jurisdictional matter because the Negroes belonged to another union.

The Justice Department suit came at a time when Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz was proposing the national wage settlement plan, which Haggerty and the 18 construction union presidents are expected to formally reject Thursday.

The Johnson administration, in its effort to hold down what it considers the threat of an inflationary wage-price spiral, has singled out the construction industry and unions as one of several "problem areas."

Haggerty said that about 25 per cent of workers on the arch were Negroes, mostly members of AFL-CIO unions, and that there was no hint of racial problems until the Justice Department filed the suit.

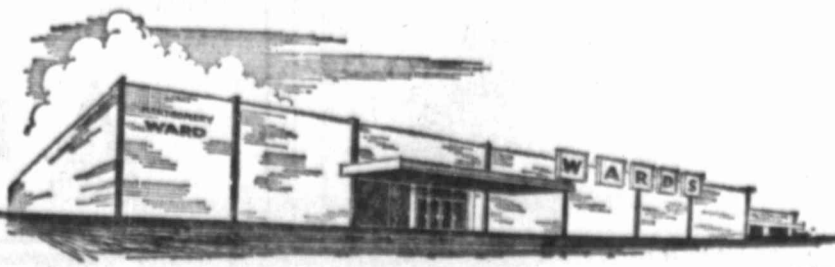

# Firm Buys U.S. Nickel Stockpile

WASHINGTON (AP) — The great nickel ride on the Washington merry-go-round has completed one full spin. It took 13 years.

The General Services Administration announced last Friday it had signed a contract whereby the Hanna Smelting Co. would purchase 39 million pounds of surplus nickel, now stored in Riddle, Ore.

Further, the announcement said, the Hanna company had an option to buy another 25 million pounds stored at Hammond, Ind.

John Harlan, director of the GSA's Defense Materiel Service, confirmed that both stockpiles were originally created by Hanna.

The ore from which the nickel in both stockpiles was processed was mined by the Hanna Coal-Ore Corp., later changed to the Hanna Mining Co.

**U.S. EXPENSE**  
This processing was undertaken by the Hanna Smelting Co., a wholly owned subsidiary of the Hanna Mining Co. in a \$22-million plant built at government expense.

The Hanna Smelting Co. was formed Jan. 15, 1953, and the contract with the government was signed Jan. 16, 1953.

Subsequently, the federal government permitted Hanna Smelting to buy the \$22-million plant for \$1.7 million.

There were in fact four contracts signed with the government by Hanna firms on Jan. 16, 1953 — one for the delivery of nickel ore at \$6 a ton, another for delivery of a minimum of 95 million pounds of processed nickel and a maximum 125 million pounds, a third which made

Hanna Mining the government's sales agency and a fourth, which paid the company \$100,000 for managing all this.

The processing contract called for delivery of the first 5 million pounds at a cost not to exceed 79.35 cents a pound and 60.5 cents a pound on the remainder.

**WORLD PRICE**  
Harlan said Hanna Smelting delivered the 95 million pounds plus about 17 million more pounds.

The current world price of nickel, incidentally, is 77 3/4 cents a pound.

The federal government is now holding 290 million pounds of nickel it doesn't need.

This nickel is only one of 12 metals the government acquired at a cost of \$5.1 billion which are now considered surplus to need and which it is now trying to sell.

From 1946 to 1962 the strategic stockpile of materials was classed as a deep secret. President John F. Kennedy removed the secrecy label early in his administration and invited Congress to investigate the whole business.

**HELD INVESTIGATION**  
The end result was a lengthy investigation by a subcommittee of the Senate Armed Forces Committee, headed by Sen. Stuart Symington, D-Mo., in 1963.

The Symington subcommittee heard testimony from W. A. Marting, then president of Hanna, that the cost of mining the ore was \$1.67 cents a ton. The price to the government: \$6 a ton.

It is likely that a date will be set for the formal opening of the off-street parking lot at Main and Second, which currently is being paved after an extensive

leveling process. Swartz said his organization will continue to work closely with the city on beautification of this area, as well as continuing work toward improving streets, sidewalks and alleys in the downtown business district.

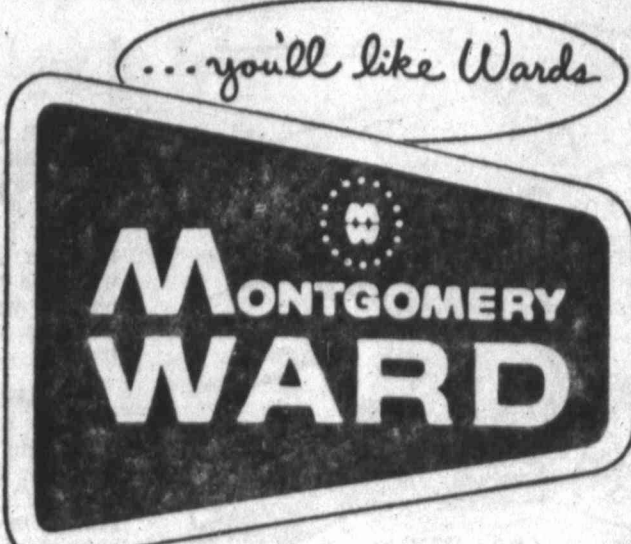

# State Traces Powers' Steps Before Jury

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — State testimony has placed Melvin Lane Powers near the home of his uncle less than six hours before the multimillionaire was slain.

The state currently is directing its efforts toward a complicated but fascinating phase of the first-degree murder trial. It is attempting to prove the element of opportunity — which involves the painstaking retracing of the defendant's footsteps in an effort to show that he was in the vicinity of the crime and therefore could have committed it.

## BLAZING ROMANCE

Powers is on trial for his life with his attractive blonde aunt, Candace Mossler, in the June 30, 1964, slaying of her husband, Jacques, 69, head of a \$33-million banking and loan empire.

Aunt and nephew have been depicted by the state as participants in a blazing, abnormal love affair although he is 29 and she is 10 or more years older. Today, the state was expected to continue tracing Powers' movements surrounding the 1:45 a. m. period when Mossler was bludgeoned and stabbed 39 times.

State witnesses said Tuesday that Powers placed a telephone call to Miami from Houston, Tex., the day before the slaying, impatiently left his business firm, rushed aboard a flight to the Florida city and ended up near Mossler's Key Biscayne apartment with an empty soda bottle — a possible death weapon.

Complicating the case against Mrs. Mossler and her nephew was an unsummoned witness, potentially reluctant to serve the state. He is William Measamer, of Sanford, N.C., who said he became Mrs. Mossler's lover after her nephew was jailed on a murder charge.

## 'Brain Drain' To East Held Myth

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — The so-called "brain drain" of top students from all parts of the nation to the East is a fallacy, according to a leading educator.

Dr. Hans Rosenhaupt, director of the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation, said a study based on 2,500 Woodrow Wilson fellows showed most of them returned home after completing graduate study.

## Records Among District Progress

Pullmans will originate in Fort Worth, Amarillo and Lubbock. Passengers may board at intermediate points along the Santa Fe route between those cities.

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## Rep. Thomas Rites Friday

HOUSTON (AP)—Albert Thomas, a country boy from deep East Texas, considered himself a sure loser when he ran for Congress in 1936.

"I knew I didn't have a chance," he often said. "Even my wife thought I would lose." But the Nacogdoches native won that hotly contested battle and never again faced a major opponent in his nearly 30 years as U.S. representative.

Thomas, credited with bringing the \$250 million astronaut training base to Houston, died Tuesday in Washington. He was 67.

Death was attributed to cancer, from which the respected Democrat had suffered several years.

dummy and, when East put up the ten, he was permitted to hold the trick. A heart continuation was taken by the ace and a spade was led. South played the king from his hand and West promptly ducked.

Altho West's play was highly unorthodox and—at best—a calculated risk, he felt that it was imperative to retain his entry card as the only means of regaining the lead once the hearts were established.

Declarer led a small diamond next and put up the king from dummy. East inaugurated his own deception campaign by playing the six. The closed hand was reentered with the king of clubs and another diamond was led. When West followed with the four, South was confronted with a guess. If he felt that West held the jack of diamonds, then the proper play from dummy is the ten. If he decides that West has the ace, then he should put up North's queen.

South chose to play the queen of diamonds from dummy, and his whole campaign collapsed. East covered the queen with the ace and returned a heart to clear that suit. Declarer led a spade, West put up the ace, cashed his good hearts and the jack of diamonds to register a two-trick defeat.



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
