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



Three-Way Choice

Unless nuclear disaster strikes or some unforeseen problem limits man's voyages in space, the space program may become the nearest thing to perpetual motion the world has ever

Even before we have succeeded in landing a man on the moon, space scientists have begun to ask: Where after the moon? The question arises from the development of the Saturn 5 with its 7.5 million - pound thrust, capable of sending a 95,000-pound Apollo, three-man moonship to the moon, including the lunar landing craft and enough rocket power for the trip back from the moon. But the Saturn 5 has a number of other capabilities, including an earth-orbit of a 125-ton capsule 500 miles high. It could carry 45 tons toward Mars or Venus, 20 tons to Jupiter. With a hydrogen - fueled Centaur upper stage, a space probe weighing 7.5

solar system.

These are exciting prospects for scientists, of course. Given continued refinement of fuels, rockets and upper stages, and more sophisticated techniques, only the vastness of outer space can triumph over man's effort. Then, too, when we talk of travel beyond the solar system we are not likely to get very far until we have perfected rockets which can sustain speeds approaching that of light, 187,000 miles a second.

Now we have not just the choice between guns and butter, but between guns, butter and space. We hesitate to predict the choice. But it does seem possible that if an effort equal to that devoted to space, in money, brains and time, were used to make the earth itself a better place - including learning to live with the assorted people who inhabit this earth - the future might not be so exciting, tons could be sent clear out of our but it might be more comfortable.

Castro Tarnishes His Image

Asian, African and Latin Communists apparently has had an effect favorable to U.S. interests in the Western Hemisphere. It seems to have convinced many Latin American officials that the international Communist movement is "interventionist," a damning definition in Middle and South America.

The Havana conference pledged stepped-up subversion in the underdeveloped world specifically aimed at toppling non-Communist governments. And that is "intervention," not so alarming in Latin America coming from a discredited Castro but acutely disturbing when endorsed, as it was, by the extra - hemispheric superpower, the Soviet Union.

An Organization of American States resolution, unsigned only by Mexico, condemned the Havana declaration as violating the U.N. Charter. Ingrained tradition holds Mexico to a legalistic-

Fidel Castro's recent conference of ally strict definition of interventionsism. There is good reason to believe that privately the Mexican government's sentiments agree with the OAS resolution.

There is speculation that the Havana declaration may move the OAS to adopt an inter-American antisubversion force, at least a standby one, in its foreign ministers' meeting in Buenos Aires next July. The OAS flatly rejected that U.S. proposal in its meeting in Rio de Janeiro last November.

Deepite the vociferous criticisms of the Havana declaration heard in Latin capitals, it seems unlikely to us that the OAS will fully reverse itself at this stage on the inter-American force concept. communism - whether in the Soviet Union or Red China or in other parts of the world-the constant cry is that n is selfish and inh that social welfare can be achieved in each country only by giving arbitrary power to a small group of men.

BUT TODAY the people of the Com-munist world could learn a lesson if they read the obituaries being printed about the life of Alfred P. Sloan Jr., who died last Thursday at the age of 90. For here was a man who amassed a fortune of more than \$300 million, but gave virtually all of it away for the cause of human welfare.

There have been others like Mr. Sloan in American history, but the stories of their altruism are too often lost in the maze of other happenings in a busy world.

MR. SLOAN was one of the ablest businessmen this country has produced. Men engaged in 'big business" are sometimes pictured as heartless or as materialistic to the extreme. It may come as a surprise to many of the younger generation who lean toward the Communist philosophy to discover that there are far more philanthropists among the successful businessmen of America than there are selfish human beings.

IN 1937 MR. SLOAN created the Al-Billy Graham

Please tell me how I can develop an attractive personality. I am so envious of others who have personality while I have none.

I am not a psychologist, but I can give you a little of what I have observed about people with good per-

First of all, a person with a good personality is natural. We call it being uninhibited, which means unrestrained, unhindered. It is possible for a person like yourself to be so selfconscious that you are unnatural. Be yourself; be natural. Don't try to be someone you are not. God only made one person exactly like you, so you be that person.

Second, don't let things come into your life which you have to hide. It is a sad day for a young person when they have to cover up their actions. Nothing can hinder the personality more than guilt. Many young people are old for this reason. They are young in years, but old in experience; old because their conscience has been overworked. Keep your youth; keep your innocence; keep your ideals. Then smiling will come easy,

Third, if guilt has crept into your life, remember God has said, "Though your sins be as scarlet they shall be as white as snow." Christ died that you might be free-that you might have a good personality. And that is the real meaning of personality: to be a good person. And by God's help we can all be what we ought to be.

The Most Important Ingredient

Two events of the past week, a death and a birthday, have something in common. Alfred P. Sloan, former head of the herculean General Motors empire, died at the age of 90. David Sarnoff, chairman of the board for Radio Corporation of America, ob-served his 75th birthday. Both have played tremendously important roles in the development of huge industrial empires, and in this respect, I suspect they have had correspondingly big roles in the evolvement of our modern

ALFRED SLOAN was the son of a coffee and tea importer in New Haven, Conn. A sharp youngster, he entered Massachusetts Institute of Technology when he completed his high school work, and completed the four year course in three years. He took a job with Hyatt Roller Bearing Company. Industrialists had little use for roller bearings so Sloan looked elsewhere.

While not a part of the infant au-tomobile industry, Sloan was wise enough to perceive that here was a real market for his company's prod-uct. He convinced R. E. Olds that his bearings were far better for cars than heavily greased wagon axles. He was right, of course, and other car mak-ers had to admit it. Hyatt prospered, and when it was picked up by Will C. Durant, a driving force in creation of GM, Sloan was part of the packageby far the most important part, it

SLOAN WAS A MAN of ideas, and he had a penchant for enlisting men with ideas. He was made president of United Motors, an accessories company formed by Durant, and in 1923 became president of the loosely federated GM system. Sales were less than \$700 million, but within six years he had them up to \$1.5 billion. Under his deft hand the empire grew and it spread until last year sales ap-

proached \$21 billion with profits of \$2.1 billion. Silent Sloan, his associates called him, because he moved quietly but effectively, surrounding himself with such men as Boss Kettering, a remarkable Dane who poked into every nook and cranny because he be-lieved nothing was impossible — that we just hadn't found out yet how to do

SARNOFF was an immigrant lad when he caught the gleam of a new oddity, Marconi's wireless. His first brush with fame was when, as an office boy in the Marconi New York office, he was the only one maintaining contact with the majestic and unsinkable Titanic as it made its tragic and historic dive. Sarnoff became proficient in the technical side of this new and floundering novelty, but he figured the one to get ahead would have to know the office side, too. So he set out to learn this. Like Sloan and his ball bearings, Sarnoff saw that the real future lay in putting wireless to use in commercial radio. After a slow start, the idea flowered like magic, and Sarnoff became head of the RCA.

A QUARTER of a century ago television grew out of radio. If this seemed the ultimate, it was only a beginning, for the explosive developments in the electronic field made it seem that the whole of society was bent on being electronically computerized or programmed.

Both these men were intelligent, they were workers, they were dreamers, they were venturers, they appreciated the necessity of constant research, they knew the value of brains, they were organizers. Yet they were mere human beings-and this is precisely why the individual is still so important; for whether in industry, business or humanity, he may be another Sloan or Sarnoff.

FULBRIGHT CAME close to endorsing the Khrushchev-Kosygin line that the Viet Cong were fighting a "war of liberation," one which was not very different from our Revolution of 1776. The senator was wrong all down the line, but the General could not prove him wrong by military and political rebutted Fulbright were the ones that Billy Graham gave: simply that the USA had drawn the sword against Communist wrong-doing.

Sen. Morse, questioning him a few minutes later, soon had Taylor across the barrel again. Morse wanted to know if we had not violated the Geneva Agreements (though we were not signatories,) which called for an all-Viet Nam election in 1956, and for the neutralizing of all Viet Nam by keeping foreign arms out of there.

TAYLOR SAID that the French lost their Viet Nam war in Paris rather than at Dienblenphu, but Fulbright made him admit that Dienbienphu was a decisive battle. Morse drew forbidden applause from peaceniks in the audience by saying that the President was also losing a war in Viet Nam by losing support of the people at home.

Altogether, Max Taylor made as bad a showing as Billy Graham made a good one. Both were on the right side, but the soldier could not explain with logic what the evangelist eloquently established with an appeal to morality, emotion and faith. (Distributed by McNaught Syndicate, Inc.)

Auto Sales Trailing 1965

NEW YORK (AP) — Auto makers talk of record sales ahead but their output and sales so far this year are trailing 1965.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS make this less contradictory than it sounds. But how quickly cars will be moving off production lines and out of dealers showrooms a month from now will be considered a key indicator of the health of the economy. If Auto plants are busy and motorists are buying freely, most Americans think all's

Output so far this year is about 85,000 cars behind the same date in 1965. This was expected. January and February of last year saw record production and sales while the industry and its customers were catching up after the shortages caused by strikes in the fall of 1964.

THE QUESTION now is: How will the auto industry be faring this spring? Comparison with a year ago. will then be more normal. The springinspired urge to get out on the road should be working its seasonal magic. But some people have less take-home pay now than a year ago. Higher

Social Security taxes are biting both into their pay checks and their em-ployer's cash flow. SINCE MOST people buy a new car on the monthly payment plan, the question is: Will they be feeling the

pinch of keeping up their other month-ly payments out of paychecks smallthan a year ago? There is also the question of car prices. Added safety devices in the 1966 models tend to make for higher total costs. Rising interest rates on

borrowed money also may take a toll.

SALES IN the early weeks after the 1966 models were introduced were pleasing for most auto makers. And that is why they shrug off the comparison just now of sales with a year ago when conditions were special. The early sales returns lead some auto executives to predict that 1966 will see a sizable rise in sales over 1965.

COMPLICATING predictions, in addition to higher Social Security taxes and the proposed rescinding of a small cut in excise taxes on autos, is just how public psychology may swing if the Viet Nam war grows, or if its impact becomes more apparent to Americans.

ALL CONSUMER goods, not just autos, could be affected. If the public decides that prices in general are going to rise, along with interest rates, it might plop for getting up stiffer monthly payments now and buy freely.
