The accelerating increase in use of on granting future appropriations for Texas' state parks confirms the wisdom of current planning to expand and improve that system, including adding recreation facilities at reservoirs created under the statewide water - resources development program. The 58 state parks drew more

than 9.8 million visitors last year, a 24.5 per cent increase over the previous year, which had only a 10 per cent increase over the year before that. The statistics also indicate that Texans increased use of their state parks is far outrunning the growth in state population and also exceeds the rise in out-of-state visitors attracted by our booming tourist trade.

deal with the question of the unfit federal judge as it has with the question of presidential succession. In both cases the reluctance arises both from a fear of disturbing tradition and the fear of relaxing the protections of the Constitution.

But it is just possible that Congress will be moved to act in the wake of current hearings being held by the Senate on procedures for removal of unfit federal judges.

"The real question is not whether there should be a change, but what it should be and how it should be accomplished," said Bernard G. Segal of Philadelphia, chairman of the American Bar Association's Committee on Judicial Selection, Tenure and Compensation, in testimony before the

Judge John Biggs Jr. of Wilmington, Delaware, senior judge of the Third Circuit Court, told committee members that there is not the slightest doubt in his mind that the present removal machinery is inadequate.

The Constitution provides only that judges shall hold their offices "during good behavior." They may be re-moved only by impeachment proceedings brought by the U.S. Senate and tried by the House of Representatives. This drastic and cumbersome machinery is altogether inappropriate for a judge who has become senile, intemperate in habits or speech, or lazy. ter method must be found to disci-Least of all is the present machinery capable of dealing with the judge who, upon assuming the bench, is standards of ability and integrity.

Congress has been as reluctant to found to lack a judicial temperament.

The question of removal of federal judges was brought to national attention recently when Federal District Judge Stephen S. Chandler of Oklahoma City was stripped of his powers, but not of his office or salary, by the 10th Circuit Judicial Council. That case seems about to be settled quietly by the eventual retirement of the judge after he has completed action on any cases pending in his court he wishes to hear.

The case for federal reform in removal procedures has been brought to the fore by the success of a California experiment - a similar procedure has been adopted in Texas. There a juidical council made up predominantly of appellate judges, together with lay members, receives complaints of judicial misconduct or intemperance. Most of the cases are disposed of by investigations which reveal a lack of basis for the complaint. He would be the first Secretary of State of Jewish origin and this would appeal to a highly articulate minority deeply concerned with the spread of the war in Viet Nam.

The possibility of this shift comes up against two formidable questions. The first and by far the most important: What is the President's state of mind on Viet Nam? He has brushed aside impatiently the warnings of several veteran members of Congress that the voters in 1966 are threatening the same kind of revenge they took at the height of the Korean war against the party in power.

THE SECOND question is with respect to Rusk's future. He has the complete loyalty of the President, who has said that he is the greatest Secretary of State in this century. His own enduring loyalty is unquestioned. Goldberg is an ambitious man. At the time he left the court, the pinnacle of achievement for a lawyer, there was wide speculation about a higher office beyond the ambassadorship. There was a new bronze plaque attached to the fence, and it bore information that this locomotive was used to bring in the first relief train to the town in 1915 when most of the business section had been levelled by an explosion of a tank of casinghead gasoline.

The Twisting Paths Of Ambition

WASHINGTON-Like his presidential brother before him, Senator Robert F. Kennedy experienced the lucky disappointment of being rejected for Vice President

JFK's photo finish defeat for the secondary office won by Estes Kefauver in 1956 stands beside RFK's teasing rejection by President Johnson to be the latter's running mate in 1964.

NEVER WERE failures more fortunate for being the also-ran. John Kennedy stayed in the Senate and later ran against Richard Nixon instead of against the unbeatable Eisenhower ticket. Bob Kennedy mounted to the Senate, where he now throws flanking attacks against Lyndon Johnson and watches Hubert Horatio Humphrey trying to change his middle name to Hotspur.

Ah, the things that ambitious men must do to become President! Prever expected to see one of the heroic war-going Kennedy brothers turned political peacenik, or anyone so unwarlike as the peace-mongering Vice President turned oratorical eagle.

OPPORTUNITY SAYS to Bob Kennedy: "You are after Johnson's job, so you must never miss a chance to make him look bad. He looked bad by comparison when you went to Latin America last autumn and drew the cheers that only a Kennedy could draw. You have made him look still worse by poking a hole in his highly conditional 'unconditional' approach to peace in Viet Nam.'

BUT, AS Kennedy must know, there is a mockery in it all. To oppose

Johnson's Viet Nam policy in Viet Nam is to oppose the armed intervention that President Kennedy commenced. President Kennedy could have accommodated the Viet Cong, and have undermined the Saigon government, but he sent his "military advisors" to do just the opposite of what Bob now proposes. No amount of hedging on Bob's part can change the fact that he is for dismantling, and Johnson is for continuing, the policy of JFK.

OPPORTUNITY says to Humphrey You can only become President through Lyndon Johnson, living or dead, so you must never miss a chance to make him look good. You know by this time, no matter what anybody says, that the vice presidency is a chamber of echoes through which his voice, not yours, must resound. During your time in the Senate, there never was anybody who talked more about peace and disarmament, and about getting along with the Communist World, than you did. Were you still in the Senate, and not obligated to the White House, you would be winging it in the first flight of doves, right up there with the Americans for Democratic Action, and probably with the Students For A Democratic Society. But given your ambition to be President, you have no choice except to go all the way with LBJ, however much your conscience leans toward the present position of RFK.' Sometimes he must envy those



No Time To Skimp

The accelerating increase in use of on granting future appropriations for Texas' state parks confirms the wisdom of current planning to expand and improve that system, including adding recreation facilities at reservoirs created under the statewide water - resources development program.

The 58 state parks drew more than 9.8 million visitors last year, a 24.5 per cent increase, over the previous year, which had only a 10 per increase over the year before that. The statistics also indicate that Texans increased use of their state parks is far outrunning the growth in state population and also exceeds the rise in out-of-state visitors attracted by our booming tourist trade.

All this suggests strongly that the Texas Legislature should not skimp

the expansion and improvement of the state parks' system and related recreation facilities

It may be conceded that this program must be accorded a budget priority below such urgent matters as education and urban problems. However, President Johnson has not hesitated to call on this Congress to begin a vast program of expanding the national parks system, despite the pressures of the Viet Nam war and the anti-poverty program. Parks, recreation, conservation and beautification are being accorded a rising priority in national policy, and that should be matched, we believe, at both the state and local levels.

Need For New Machinery

Congress has been as reluctant to deal with the question of the unfit federal judge as it has with the question of presidential succession. In both cases the reluctance arises both from a fear of disturbing tradition and the fear of relaxing the protections of the Constitution.

But it is just possible that Congress will be moved to act in the wake of current hearings being held by the Senate on procedures for removal of unfit federal judges.

"The real question is not whether there should be a change, but what it should be and how it should be accomplished," said Bernard G. Segal of Philadelphia, chairman of the American Bar Association's Committee on Judicial Selection, Tenure and Compensation, in testimony before the

Judge John Biggs Jr. of Wilmington, Delaware, senior judge of the Third Circuit Court, told committee members that there is not the slightest doubt in his mind that the present removal machinery is inadequate.

The Constitution provides only that udges shall hold their offices "during good behavior." They may be removed only by impeachment proceedings brought by the U.S. Senate and tried by the House of Representatives. This drastic and cumbersome machinery is altogether inappropriate for removal are appropriate only for for a judge who has become senile, inperate in habits or speech, or lazy. Least of all is the present machinery capable of dealing with the judge who, upon assuming the bench, is standards of ability and integrity.

found to lack a judicial temperament The question of removal of federal judges was brought to national attention recently when Federal District Judge Stephen S. Chandler of Okla-homa City was stripped of his powers, but not of his office or salary, by the 10th Circuit Judicial Council. That case seems about to be settled quietly by the eventual retirement of the judge after he has completed action on any cases pending in his court he wishes to hear.

The case for federal reform in removal procedures has been brought to the fore by the success of a California experiment - a similar procedure has been adopted in Texas. There a juidical council made up predominantly of appellate judges, together with lay members, receives complaints of judicial misconduct or intemperance. Most of the cases are disposed of by investigations which reveal a lack of basis for the complaint. But in other cases the council has persuaded judges to retire, without the necessity for a public hearing. But an avenue of appeal to district and appellate courts is held open for those who wish to fight, at which point the proceedings become public. Reports indicate that a number of other states are planning to adopt a similar procedure.

The possibility of this shift comes up against two formidable questions. The first and by far the most important: What is the President's state of mind on Viet Nam? He has brushed aside impatiently the warnings of several veteran members of Congress that the voters in 1966 are threatening the same kind of revenge they took at the height of the Korean war against the party in power.



No Time To Skimp

The accelerating increase in use of Texas' state parks confirms the wisdom of current planning to expand and improve that system, including adding recreation facilities at reservoirs created under the statewide water - resources development program.

The 58 state parks drew more than 9.8 million visitors last year, a 24.5 per cent increase over the previous year, which had only a 10 per cent increase over the year before that. The statistics also indicate that Texans increased use of their state parks is far outrunning the growth in state population and also exceeds the rise in out-of-state visitors attracted by our booming tourist trade.

All this suggests strongly that the Texas Legislature should not skimp

on granting future appropriations for the expansion and improvement of the state parks system and related recreation facilities.

It may be conceded that this program must be accorded a budget priority below such urgent matters as education and urban problems. However, President Johnson has not hesitated to call on this Congress to begin a vast program of expanding the national parks system, despite the pressures of the Viet Nam war and the anti-poverty program. Parks, recreation, conservation and beautification are being accorded a rising priority in national policy, and that should be matched, we believe, at both the state and local levels.

Need For New Machinery

Congress has been as reluctant to deal with the question of the unfit federal judge as it has with the question of presidential succession. In both cases the reluctance arises both from a fear of disturbing tradition and the fear of relaxing the protections of the Constitution.

But it is just possible that Congress will be moved to act in the wake of current hearings being held by the Senate on procedures for removal of unfit federal judges.

"The real question is not whether there should be a change, but what it should be and how it should be accomplished," said Bernard G. Segal of Philadelphia, chairman of the American Bar Association's Committee on Judicial Selection, Tenure and Compensation, in testimony before the

Judge John Biggs Jr. of Wilmington, Delaware, senior judge of the Third Circuit Court, told committee members that there is not the slightest doubt in his mind that the present removal machinery is inadequate.

The Constitution provides only that judges shall hold their offices "during good behavior." They may be removed only by impeachment proceedings brought by the U.S. Senate and tried by the House of Representatives. This drastic and cumbersome machinery is altogether inappropriate for a judge who has become senile, inin habits or speech, or lazy. Least of all is the present machinery capable of dealing with the judge who, upon assuming the bench, is standards of ability and integrity.

found to lack a judicial temperament The question of removal of federal judges was brought to national attention recently when Federal District Judge Stephen S. Chandler of Oklahoma City was stripped of his powers, but not of his office or salary, by the 10th Circuit Judicial Council. That case seems about to be settled quietly by the eventual retirement of the judge after he has completed action on any cases pending in his court he wishes to hear.

The case for federal reform in removal procedures has been brought to the fore by the success of a California experiment - a similar procedure has been adopted in Texas. There a juidical council made up predominantly of appellate judges, together with lay members, receives complaints of judicial misconduct or intemperance. Most of the cases are disposed of by investigations which reveal a lack of basis for the complaint. But in other cases the council. has persuaded judges to retire, without the necessity for a public hearing. But an avenue of appeal to district and appellate courts is held open for those who wish to fight, at which point the proceedings become public. Reports indicate that a number of other states are planning to adopt a similar procedure.

The U.S. Constitution's procedures for removal are appropriate only for cases of gross improprieties. A better method must be found to discipline or remove federal judges who do not measure up to the highest

Marquis Childs A New Secretary Of State?

WASHINGTON - No one has ever accused Lyndon Johnson of failing to recognize the political realities. He can spot trouble on the horizon when it is no bigger than a man's hand.

In this light those who have followed his career foresee certain coming events in an election year in the midst of an unpopular land war in Asia. The President, so this reasoning goes, is too thorough a pro to go into the campaign next fall without making important changes in the Johnson team calculated to give a new - and more hopeful - look to the struggle in Southeast Asia.

THE SPECULATION is that Arthur J. Goldberg, currently Ambassador to the United Nations, will replace Dean Rusk as Secretary of State. The guessing is that this will happen before the end of the summer. Goldberg will then direct a new peace offensive coinciding with a buildup in American forces close to 300,000.

The logic behind this is plain enough. As Ambassador to the U. N. Goldberg has more than any single figure in the administration identified nimself with the drive for peace. In the peace offensive in December and

I am a devout Christian and am studying to become a scientist. What worries me is that there seems disagreement between the Bible and science.

There is no contradiction between true science and the Bible. Scientists are supposed to be searchers after truth, and the Bible is concerned with

Though some scientists reject the idea of God, it doesn't follow that this is the position of scientists generally. In fact, some of our greatest scientists were and are devout Christians. Had there been any serious conflict between religion and science, these men couldn't have so wholeheartedly embraced both.

I would say that being a devout Christian would enhance your chances of being a good scientist. In fact, I can think of no field where men come into such intimate contact with the mysterious forces of the universe. Reverence for God would certainly be no hindrance - while irreverence could prejudice a man against that which he does not know - and scientists are now aware that they have not begun to unravel the mysteries of the universe.

He would be the first Secretary of State of Jewish origin and this would appeal to a highly articulate minority deeply concerned with the spread of the war in Viet Nam.

The possibility of this shift comes up against two formidable questions. The first and by far the most important: What is the President's state of mind on Viet Nam? He has brushed aside impatiently the warnings of several veteran members of Congress that the voters in 1966 are threatening the same kind of revenge they took at the height of the Korean war against the party in power.

THE SECOND question is with respect to Rusk's future. He has the complete loyalty of the President, who has said that he is the greatest Secretary of State in this century. His own enduring loyalty is unquestioned. Goldberg is an ambitious man. At the time he left the court, the pinnacle of achievement for a lawyer. there was wide speculation about a higher office beyond the ambassadorship, As Secretary of State directing a new peace offensive, seeking to avert a massive military attack, he would be front and center on the world stage. The Twisting Paths Of Ambition

WASHINGTON-Like his presidential brother before him, Senator Robert F. Kennedy experienced the lucky disappointment of being rejected for Vice President.

JFK's photo finish defeat for the secondary office won by Estes Kefauver in 1956 stands beside RFK's teasing rejection by President Johnson to be the latter's running mate in 1964.

NEVER WERE failures more fortunate for being the also-ran. John Kennedy stayed in the Senate and later ran against Richard Nixon instead of against the unbeatable Eisenhower ticket. Bob Kennedy mounted to the Senate, where he now throws flanking attacks against Lyndon Johnson and watches Hubert Horatio Humphrey trying to change his middle name to Hotspur.

the things that ambitious men must do to become President! I never expected to see one of the heroic, wargoing Kennedy brothers turned political peacenik, or anyone so unwarlike as the peace-mongering Vice President turned oratorical eagle.

OPPORTUNITY SAYS to Bob Kennedy: "You are after Johnson's job, so you must never miss a chance to make him look bad. He looked bad by comparison when you went to Latin America last autumn and drew the cheers that only a Kennedy could draw. You have made him look still worse by poking a hole in his highly, conditional 'unconditional' approach to peace in Viet Nam."

BUT, AS Kennedy must know, there is a mockery in it all. To oppose

Johnson's Viet Nam policy in Viet Nam is to oppose the armed intervention that President Kennedy commenced. President Kennedy could have accommodated the Viet Cong. and have undermined the Saigon government, but he sent his "military advisors" to do just the opposite of what Bob now proposes. No amount of hedging on Bob's part can change the fact that he is for dismantling, and Johnson is for continuing, the policy of JFK.

OPPORTUNITY says to Humphrey: 'You can only become President through Lyndon Johnson, living or dead, so you must never miss a chance to make him look good. You know by this time, no matter what anybody says, that "the vice presidency is a chamber of echoes through which his voice, not yours, must resound. During your time in the Sen ate, there never was anybody who talked more about peace and disarmament, and about getting along with the Communist World, than you did. Were you still in the Senate, and not obligated to the White House, you would be winging it in the first flight of doves, right up there with the Americans for Democratic Action, and probably with the Students For A Democratic Society. But given your ambition to be President, you have no choice except to go all the way with LBJ, however much your conscience leans toward the present position of RFK.' Sometimes he must envy those



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



'I'm referring to what every experienced basketball player knows,' writes Larner, 'that if a Negro and a white player are the same height, the Negro is likely to have longer arms and legs, bigger feet and hands, narrower hips and the ability to jump higher . . . The difference is exactly the matter of style. Negroes want to win as much as any other racial group, But victory doesn't count unless it is won with style. The desire is not to win, but to win and be beautiful. It is unforgiveable gauche to win by taking advantage of height and weight. Victory is also tainted if the winner gets it in a manner strained and ugly."


