

One Reported Dead, Fifteen Still Missing

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) - The Coast Guard said 469 passengers and crew members were rescued today from the cruise ship Vikiny Princess after it was swept by fire off the eastern tip of Cuba. The ship carried a total of 485 persons.

The Coast Guard said the German freighter Cap Nort had picked up 376 survivors and one body. The Liberian tanker Navigator had 80 survivors and the Chunking Victory, a Nationalist Chinese freighter, 13.

Among the survivors were the cruise ship's captain, chief navigator and chief officer, the Coast Guard said.

"All are in good shape," a Coast Guard spokesman said. We have not been able to determine whether there are any more casualties.

Rescue ships saved 370 persons from that disaster, which set off a lengthy Coast Guard probe and congressional hearings on the safety of cruise ships sailing from U.S. ports.

The Coast Guard investigation concluded that the captain of the Yarmouth Castle, which flew the Panamanian flag, was negligent and failed to cope with the fire.

That men should appreciate the need for religious unity is commendable. To read the Scripture is to see that unity is taught therein. Christ prayed for unity and for it He died. Religious leaders have too long tried to justify their religious division of denominationalism. But more and more

they are coming to acknowledge the fallacy of such thinking. Thus we see a definite trend toward consolidation, or union, of some segments of Christendom.

Churches of Christ recognize the need for unity and the harm of religious division. Unity has always been our plea. It is our plea now. We are vitally interested in the plan that would fulfill the desire expressed by the Lord to God the Father when He prayed, "That they all may be one; as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be one in Us; that the world may believe that Thou hast sent Me." (John 17:21). This plan is clearly defined by Paul's letter to the Corinthian Christians in these words: "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment." And then added, "Now these things, brethren, I have in a figure transferred to myself and Apollos for your sakes; that in us ye might learn not to go beyond the things which are written . . ." (I Corinthians 1:10 KJV; 4:6 ASV). We are ready and anxious to join in any effort to effect this kind of unity. We have no interest whatsoever in

can agree. Surely this would be the Bible and the Bible only which one already claims to accept now. If Catholicism would surrender their Church Laws, Mormonism their Book of Mormon, Christian Science their Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, and the Protestant Denominations their separate creeds, there

could be unity. But until this is done and all go back to

the Bible, and to the Bible only, unity meetings, whether

Ecumenical or Local, will indeed be a farce and a mockery of the Divine plan given unity by the Lord. All that is needed to effect unity among professed followers of Christ today is simply to RETURN TO THE SCRIPTURES and accept the plan given by the Lord. For this we are pleading and praying, just as did the Savior before such division ever came about,

any plan or effort based upon consolidation, compromise or coercion. Unity undertaken on any basis other than to accept Protestantism. If either did agree it would be only compromise, not unity. To be more realistic and specific, would the leaders of Christian Science movement accept Mormonism, or the Baptists accept Methodism? We know that this is unthinkable. So, if there is ever to be unity there must be a common ground somewhere upon which all

What prompted the motion by the attorney general's department for the extension is not clear, although some state politicians have pressed the point as something to get attention to their campaigns.

To go beyond this is to intrude into regulation of a state's election mechanics when it has nothing to do with constitutional rights.

Certainly this calls for some checking to see if the facts are as Secretary Conner said, and if they are, to take vigorous punitive action against those who are responsible for this gap.

Professional Performance

SAN JOSE, Calif.—In the scrambled politics of this fantastically growing state, Ronald Reagan, the actor turned politician, gives a smooth, professional performance. He is straight out of Central Casting, a crusader seeking to put idealism into government-the kind of role played in another time by Jimmy Stewart in "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington."

"I am not a politician," he tells every audience as he barnstorms through the San Francisco Bay area and this news seems to please

HE IS NOT opposed to the goals of the Great Society, he tells them, but those goals must be achieved by "compassion and not by compulsion." The people in their own communities must with their own good common sense make decisions for themselves and not leave it to Washington or Sacramento, Reagan says. Centralized government, that is the great evil of our-time.

WHAT HE SAYS with the skill of the professional—the pause for the laugh at the wisecrack gently dropped in, the timing for the applause-seems to have almost no relevance to what is happening in this crowded, complex society on the Pacific slope. The acrid smog, polluted waters, highway deaths on the freeways, the omnipresent threat of violence in the Negro ghettos of which Watts is only one-these have no place in Reagan's view of the political scene. His is the standard conservative line, cut taxes, cut back government spending, return to the virtues of the past.

REAGAN FACES a large order of chaos in his own party. Unreconstructed Goldwaterites, whom the candidate confronted in the California Republican Assembly here, control most party organizations. Given his allotted time to speak to the Assembly, Reagan blithely chose to call for questions and answers. than on the figures themselves. ACTUAL RESULTS show that in

the final three months of 1966 manufacturers' net income after taxes advanced 19 per cent over their profits for the preceding quarter. The fourth quarter net earnings also were 16 per cent above the fourth quarter of 1964. This year-to-year gain was about the same as set up in each of the first

three quarters of 1965. With some companies advancing as much as 40 per cent in profits last year, what is the reasoning behind the predictions of a letdown?

IN ADDITION to the forces outlines earlier, the statisticians at the First National City Bank, New York, point to the season trends. They say the 19 per cent advance in the fourth quarter of 1965 from the July-September period was only slightly more than seasonal. That is, profits are usually highes tin the final months, while

didn't exactly tell the American people to "eat less!" the other day in Every working man dreamed his first real acknowledgment that price inflation is now a reality. "Eat less!" was Senator Taft's immemorial advice during a cost-rise period of the Truman Administration, but Mr. Johnson settled for "Buy less!"-not

> BUT THE POINT is that the leader of the Great Society today finds himself driven into a narrow corner where he can hear the clock ticking off the successive moments of truth. For several weeks I had hoped to find the handle to a very elusive story about the attitude of the Great Society toward people. I had been told by Administration spokesmen that inflation didn't really exist because 'nothing except food prices" were gov ing up. I was bidden to look at gasoline costs, utility costs, automobile costs. Steady as rocks, they were. Inflation was illusory because, I was told, it had affected "nothing but bread-and-butter items." That from the Democrats, the party of the peo-

MEANWHILE, it was the Republicans, supposedly the party of plutocracy, who kept pointing with alarm to the soaring costs of mere bread and butter. "That fella, Ford!" as the President calls Congressman Gerald Ford (R., Mich.), the House Minority Leader, was always bringing economic conversations around to hamburgers, steaks, bread loaves and canned goods. So was Senator Everett Dirksen, the other half of the Republican leadership team, which we call the "Ev and Gerry Show."

THEN, LATE LAST month, the Republican National Committee put out a 'message" that called inflation "a hidden tax that falls heaviest upon those who have the least." A GOP fact sheet shoowed that the housewife who spent \$10.00 in the supermarket last year would spend \$10.45 for the same purchases this year. The same fact sheet noted that many other American values were shrinking: our gold supply, our international trade balance, our national solvency.

THE ELUSIVE STORY became easier to seize when the attitudes of both Democrats and Republicans toward inflation were examined side by side. The President, and those who bread-and-butter costs wouldn't be meters of carpet a year.

WASHINGTON-President Johnson much noticed-not as long as general prosperity and general stability held up. Indeed, the Administration, up till a few weeks ago, was playing ft that inflation was non-existent (seeing that foods hardly mattered in the big picture).

WELL, THE Democrats might have gotten away with the flimflam if the Republicans hadn't made so much fuss. In the narrow corner where he has had to stop dodging the realities. Mr. President admittedly may be forced to cry, "Tax more!" as well as "Buy less!" in order to prevent inflationary disaster.

CHICAGO (AP) - Science is putting the pressure on many of the diseases that plague mankind. Research in "hyperbarics" indicates that this new technique, involving administration of oxygen to the patient in a special engineered high - pressured chamber, has helped during heart surgery and in treatment of a number of diseases.
