

CONDEMN LEADERS

Communist party speakers at mass gatherings condemn President Eduardo Frei of Chile, and ridicule the "gorilla govern-ment" of Humberto Castello Branco of Brazil. They envisage ties between imperialism and Raul Leoni of Venezuela, and tell of "the vacillations by weak-willed President Arturo Illia of Argentina.

Much of the vilification is thought to be angry reaction to sharp protests and criticism by Latin leaders of Tricontinental Conference resolutions in sup-port of armed "liberation struggles" throughout the hemi-

Biting Hand That Feeds Them

It may be that the South Vietnamese people do not know what they are doing. It is even possible that they do not care. But the rising anti-American demonstrations, culminating in the loss of a U.S. observation plane from South Vietnamese "rebel" gunfire, has already had seriously adverse effects on U.S. public opinion.

Christ's name we pray. Amen.

Until recently the prevailing public consensus supporting our effort in Viet Nam had been well established by President Johnson and the majority of Congress. The people generally are much less than enthusiastic over the loss of life and treasure. But they have accepted and supported the administration argument that since we are in Viet Nam, we must see it

But the American people share a very human trait: They want their sacrifices in men and money to be appreciated. If they feel, as many of them do now, that our efforts are not being appreciated, then public revulsion can come very quickly indeed.

If public opinion no longer supports the operation in Viet Nam, the

pressure for us to get out may prove to be irresistible, no matter what the sequences are. The shift of public opinion, too, could have an almost opposite effect, one enunciated recently by Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia, one of the most powerful and respect-ed men in the Senate. Russell suggested that the time had just about come for the U.S. to win in Viet Nam or get out. The danger of "either, or" is the massive widening of the conflict to North Viet Nam, risking eventual war with Red China.

It is quite probable that most Vietnamese cannot imagine the effect of public opinion in a democratic socie-ty. Certainly public opinion—if such ever existed in Viet Nam—has had precious little expression in the history of that country. Therefore it may be useless to try to persuade them that the U.S. war effort in Viet Nam can be brought to a halt by simple, unarmed citizens in the United States. But it should be worth a try. They should realize that their cause is in grave jeopardy.

If there's any difference in the infringement upon our right to travel, the senator is the liberal in his discretionary approach, and the secretary is the reactionary in his reliance upon discredited legislation.

EASTLAND WOULD provide a law under which the President could name certain areas of the world where it would be against the national interests for Americans to travel without "written authorization" of an exit permit. If the Americans were reporters, scientists or legitimate businessmen, they would not be denied permission. If they were agitators against our foreign policy in time of interna-tional crisis, they would be restricted and punished for any violation.

RUSK WOULD accomplish the same necessary restriction by another approach. His bill would spell out limited circumstances under which a passport could be denied or revoked, and would provide punishment for violation. The chief difference is that Eastland would prevent undesirables from goiing into trouble spots by requiring the use of an exit permit, and Rusk would do it by revising the passport laws.

The difference is slight, but the reaction makes the story. When Eastland bites a traveling subversive, that's news-but the secretary can chew on the same leg and nobody seems to notice. (Distributed by McNought Syndicate, Inc.)

Boom In Spring Lull

living is out of step with other economic signposts. Just when everyone is being assured that most indicators point to a slowing down of the economic boom, the consumer price index takes off on its own. And the direction is upward at a pace un-equalled in 15 years.

SUCH THINGS as new orders for manufacturers of durable goods may be down from earlier in the year-the cost of living isn't. The index of industrial production may be advancing at a less hectic pace than a couple of months back. What matters to most families is that its dollars don't buy as much. Economists are quick to point out

that the course of the economy, as measured in industrial statistics, changes well before prices of consumer goods and services are likely to. But many a nonstatistician will be wondering if that's any assurance that the cost of living is going to turn down if you just give it time.

AND THE statisticians and the econonmists aren't too sure that it is. They also aren't too sure that the business boom is really turning down now, instead of just having a passing spell of spring fever. Or the economy might, for all they know, be having another of its rolling recessions. That is, auto sales may be off from their peak right now, but the sales of other consumer industries may keep rolling along at high speed.

They probably will as long as the public goes on buying in quantity. And despite some fluctuations in retail sales which could be temporary and seasonal, the public still seems to be spending freely, if switching from some products to others.

HIGH-SPENDING consumers, high employment, rising production costs, and the increasing demand of defense and civilian industries for materials and goods and services—all contribute to the trend toward higher living costs. The cold statistics from the Bureau

of Labor Statistics show that its consumer price index in April rose to a record 112.5 per cent of the 1957-59 average. The jump over the March figure was four-tenths of one per cent. But the eye opener was that the threemonths advance was 1'4 per cent, the

ONE MONTH doesn't make a trend -whether it be in the cost of living or the statistical course of the economy. And right now this is especially true because so much of the current picture could be changed-or could be already in the process of changingbecause of the Viet Nam war.

But for most people the sad fact may just be this: the dollar doesn't go as far as it did only a while back.


NEEDHAM, Mass. (AP)-Its computers, fast as they are, can be made to go faster, says Sylvania Electric Products Inc.
