None seemed worried until the early 1930's when it became apparent that this steady, relentless flow of salt water was polluting the area, a creek and even the Colorado River in that

Scrutinizing The Draft

Public opinion in the United States is beginning to swing strongly against the Selective Service system. So-called draft tests given students and the general uncertainty over the status of student deferment have begun to crystallize opposition to the system as presently constituted.

A modified universal service proposal made by Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara has aroused considerable interest in Congress and the country. In a speech in Montreal to a incheon meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, McNa-mara proposed that young persons in the United States be asked to give two years of service to their country, either in the amilitary, the Peace Corps or in some other voluntary

The present draft law cannot be administered with complete fairness except during a major war when most of the nation's young manpower must be mobilized. The unfairness of the law first became evident during the Korean War when only a limited number of men were required. Most men were never called upon to bear arms for their country.

There is something fundamentally wrong with a system which bears most heavily on the poor and disadvantaged. Yet military authorities have consistently opposed universal military service on the grounds, among others, that it would be tooexpensive and wasteful.

There are many pitfalls in a system of universal military service, for to take in physical and emotional liabilities for the sake of totality would not be prudent. I heard of a theologian who wrote a book on the subject, "The Death of God." I have heard a lot about God being dead lately. Have you heard about it? B. R.

S. Butz Jr., writing out of Saigon.

TAKING THE seven big battles of 965, Butz shows by the number of U.S. sorties flown and by enemy casualties that the results would hardly have been the same without air support. For example, in the six-day siege of Plei Me last October, two hostile regiments tried to overrun an outpost of four friendly companies. Of-ficial releases tended to show that it was a ground troop action on our part, but we flew 700 sorties and the American ground commander, Captain Harold Moore, said: "In my opinion, the Air Force saved this camp."

BUTZ POINTS out that discussions of air power are often commingled with "massive dialogues on morals and policy," so that such columnists as Lippmann, Pearson and Sevareid end up telling their readers that air power is a "failure" in Viet Nam because it hasn't driven Hanoi to the conference table. But Butz offers the real reason why Hanoi hasn't negoti-

"LITTLE REAL military pressure has been placed on the Hanoi government because there have not been enough aircraft applied to the job, and they have been severely restricted to the least lucrative targets . .

Secretary McNamara hasn't insisted upon mobilization and hasn't thrown our Sunday punch at North Viet Nam. He should answer these neglects.

Around The Rim

Discoveries That Change History

The important things are the basic things, and for the most part they are the simple things. Yet civilization moves forward on them and their

There are doubtless far better, more thoughtful and more complete lists. but let me enumerate several inventions or discoveries which seem to me to loom most important in human history.

MOST OBVIOUS is the wheel. None knows when or how primitive man first discovered the principle of the wheel and began to put it to work. But our world practically moves on it - the wheel itself, cogs, gears, cams and hundreds of adaptations.

Another remarkable discovery is the ball. There are numerous applications, none more remarkable than bearings which add to speed, efficiency and

Faith In U.S. Economy

NEW YORK (AP) - The official forecasters for Congress have a much rosier view of the economy's future than do many stock traders.

THE CONGRESSIONAL staff sees business booming and personal incomes soaring even more than the Johnson administration predicts. And the staff ignores the recession signs that some in Wall Street say they've

Rather, the professional staff of the Joint House-Senate Committee on Internal Revenue Taxation puts more faith in the combined forces of the and a continuing rise in prices.

THE THREE guesses-those of the administration, of the congre forecasting staff, and the Wall Street bears-may be only that, guesses. But for the taxpayer, whether an

individual or a corporation, the important thing about the disagreement of the administration budget makers and the congressional predictors lies in the likely result that Congress will be even less inclined to raise taxes

ACCORDING TO the joint committee's staff, the Treasury might even end up fiscal 1967 with its first surplus since fiscal 1960. Since Treasury surpluses are regarded as deflationary, the argument will be that a further brake on the economy through a tax hike would be unnecessary. The staff further predicts that when the books for fiscal 1966 are balanced June 30, the deficit will be much less than the administration now is predicting.

ALL OF these rosy predictions are based, not on any expectation that government spending will be cut or even held steady, but on the view that the economy is so strong and growing so steadily that tax revenues ill soar, even at the present rates

Part of the staff's forecast is based on rising incomes sending more tax-payers into higher brackets. And part is based on the belief that price and wage increases will carry the dollar figures for the economy higher than the administration is yet willing to

BUT THE predictions flatly reject the qualms that have been shaking the stock market. The congressional soothsayers see the economy overcomin any current hesitations. And, of course, the stock market's jitters have been due in large part to recurrent fears of higher taxes. This the staff report seemingly would dismiss as unwarranted.

Nuclear War Nearer

War III? Will it be a nuclear war? Will it be confined only to Europe, or will America quickly get into the

Whatever may have been the relatively comfortable feelings of a year or so ago that nuclear war is inconceivable, the answers to the above questions are different today. Whether or not General de Gaulle intended his withdrawal from NATO to precipitate the "agonizing reappraisal" that's going on now, the fact is the outlook is grim, and the sooner the peoples of the world understand the implications of the current discussions between the Western powers, the earlier perhaps can come a world-wide recognition of the growing danger and the imperative need for preventative

INDEED, THE breakup of the system of land-army protection only against an invasion of Western Europe is a reality now. Instead of assuming that an invader would fight just a conventional war, it is being taken for granted that nuclear weapons will be used.

If any kind of war breaks out, if is being openly hinted that within 24 or 48 hours, the defending nations possessing nuclear weapons will decide when or whether to use them and what limit, if any, shall be placed on

A NUCLEAR BOMBING of some kind is fully expected if a land war begins, whether the decision is made General de Gaulle in respect to the defense of France alone or whether all the NATO powers enter the battle as a means of protecting themselves, too, against enemy initiative in nuclear warfare."

MEETINGS ARE going on this week between the NATO powers, and it is expected that Brussels will be the new adquarters. The United Press International in a dispatch from London tells of the NATO conferences and says that NATO is likely to "base its strategy on the premise that there is no way of avoiding recourse to nu-

WASHINGTON-How near is World clear weapons in the event of a massive Communist attack" and that "It can only be a matter of days-perhaps only one or two days-before NATO would have to use nuclear weapons, presumably nuclear tactical weapons, to defend Europe."

> SUCH STRATEGY would require quick communication, and the non-nuclear powers in NATO would be consulted. It isn't clear how such a momentous decision can be made in a few hours, but it is probable that agreements would be reached in advance on a set of hypothetical circum-

Former President Eisenhower, in letters to two congressional committees just published, says he would like to see the existing law amended to permit the sale of nuclear weapons to other governments "under spe cial conditions and arrangements-to be approved by the NATO organiza-tion—that could operate effectively in the defense of Europe." He appar-ently favored selling France such weapons when he was in the White House, but Congress objected.

THIS TYPE OF proposal, of course, assumes that "proliferation" is inevitable anyway and that better control, at least on the free-world side, would be achieved through prompt allotment of nuclear weapons to our allies. But in Geneva an international conference is at present trying to prevent "proliferation," and the Soviets say they want to see this accomplished by mutual agreement.

SO IT LOOKS now as if all land forces in Europe may be considerably reduced, and almost complete dependence for world peace then will be placed on nuclear weapons. Only a true appreciation of the implications of these various moves can mobilize world opinion to prevent the gradual escalation of nuclear power on all sides. For the big risk still is that a miscalculation will occur and an irresponsible government will take a chance. This could bring on the dreaded holocaust;




