Texas Grants In 'Head Start' Plan Approved

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Office of Economic Opportunity announced today 383 additional grants, including 73 to Texas sponsors, for Head Start programs to train children of pre-school age.

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NAACP Declares Existence Periled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People told the Supreme Court today its very survival — and that of the entire civil rights movement — may have been imperiled by a recent decision to let an \$85,793 Georgia picketing judgment stand.

Rights Bill's Future Clouds

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House Judiciary subcommittee hopes to complete its hearings on the administration's civil rights bill today, but the legislation may have a cloudy future.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, who has been able to provide crucial Republican votes in past civil rights battles, suggested Tuesday that the 1966 measure might well be "put on the hook until next year."

Dirksen told a news conference this would give Congress more time to study the constitutionality of the measure's open housing provision and its section designed to prevent discrimination in the selection of state and federal juries.

The Illinois Republican stood firm on the position he previously had taken that the proposed ban on racial or religious discrimination in the sale or rental of housing is "absolutely unconstitutional."

Republican leaders in the House, however, have indicated they do not share Dirksen's views.

While they have not committed themselves, subcommittee members appear to favor keeping the housing provision in the bill — possibly with some exemptions.

The subcommittee, headed by Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., is expected to start its closed drafting sessions after Congress returns from the Memorial Day recess.

Senate hearings on the bill are scheduled to start June 2.

Organizers of next week's White House conference on civil rights, in a report issued Tuesday, called for immediate and long-range state and federal action to bring the Negro into equal status in housing, education, economic and job security, and the administration of justice.

The report, described as a blueprint for sweeping action at all levels to improve the Negro's lot, urged "an absolutely open, racially unrestricted market in which housing is affirmatively merchandised to families and persons of all racial groups."

It called for an end to de facto segregation in public schools and more action by private employers, unions and government to provide Negroes with jobs.

Pooh Rewrite Books Appear

LONDON (AP) — They're rewriting Winnie the Pooh — for children.

For 42 years — since the late A. A. Milne wrote the first Winnie the Pooh books — many literate persons have been under the impression that Milne wrote for children.

In fact, he wrote with one particular child in mind, his son, Christopher Robin Milne.

Now 45, Christopher Milne says: "I was five when the first book came out. I had no trouble understanding it."

Responsible for the rewrite is a British publishing company, Young World Products. It is bringing out eight Pooh books — six of them rewrites — to "provide an opportunity for the mass market to meet Winnie the Pooh."

The new editions will be, officially, books from the film in which Walt Disney made Winnie a movie star.

... ruling that the national association can be held liable for picketing ordered by its Savannah branch.

The 5-4 ruling produced a furious dissent by Justice William O. Douglas, who warned that "juries might run pell-mell" to destroy "unpopular groups" like the NAACP.

The NAACP had argued that it had no control over the picketing of a Savannah grocery store whose owner sued it, the local branch and local offices for damages.

Since the decision was announced, the NAACP said in a brief filed with the high court, it has been named a defendant with the local branch in a similar suit in Virginia and has been threatened with a third such suit in Philadelphia.

The NAACP brief gave no details of the cases, but an official told a reporter that in one the owner of a Victoria, Va., department store is asking \$100,000 in punitive damages as a result of pamphlets passed out in front of his store.

In the Philadelphia suit, the official said, nursing homes which were picketed have threatened to sue for \$100,000 in damages.

"If, in less than a month," the NAACP brief said, "petitioner has already incurred the onerous obligation of defending two such actions involving activities of its local branches, the course of future events is not difficult to anticipate."

A LOVELIER YOU Wrinkle 'Network' Is Sign Of Neglect

In this era of enlightened skin care, a network of wrinkles is a sure sign of neglect or mishandling. And, of the two errors, mishandling may do the greater damage.

Treatment and make-up products must be applied and removed with gentle upward strokes, so as not to work against the grain of the facial skin and muscles. Never, but never use scrubbing motions — not with the fingers, cleansing tissues, powder puffs, or wash cloths.

Furthermore, give thought to how you handle your face when it is not under treatment. Are you in the habit of rubbing your forehead when you are in deep concentration? Do you prop your chin on your hand? Tug at an earlobe? Press your fingers against your cheek?

All such habits are a drag on the face, its immediate and future good looks. Obviously this kind of handling must be avoided. Otherwise you have to expect lines, and sag, too.

The hardest habit to break is that of propping up the chin. It helps to make an exercise of it. Simply raise the chin high and rest it lightly on the backs of the fingers of one hand. Support the hand by placing the elbow on the arm of the chair. This position acts to keep the chin and throat lifted. It's particularly comfortable, but it will do no harm while you learn to do without a chin crutch.

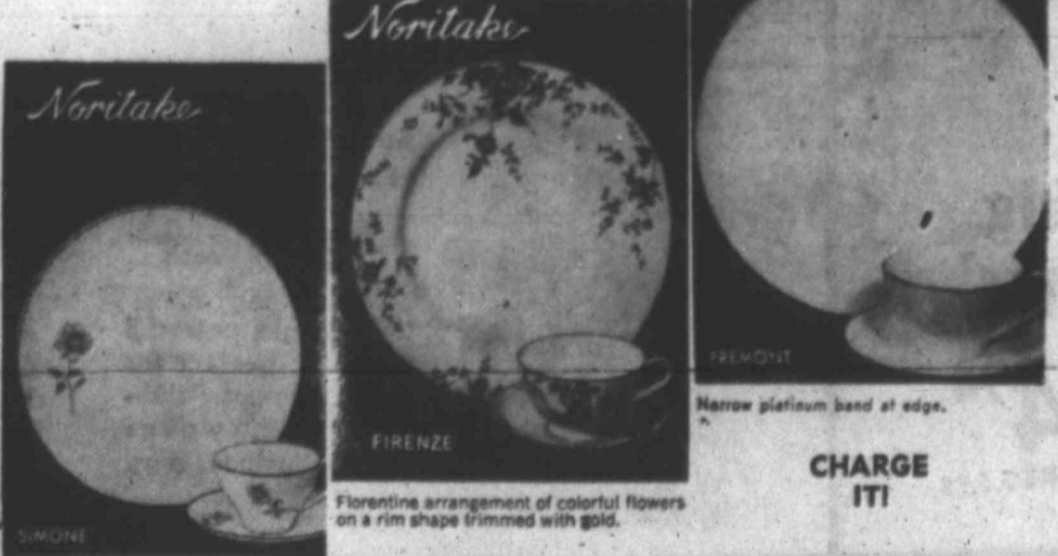

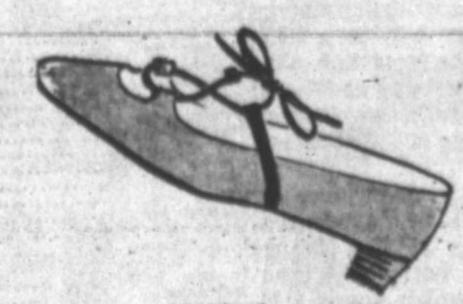

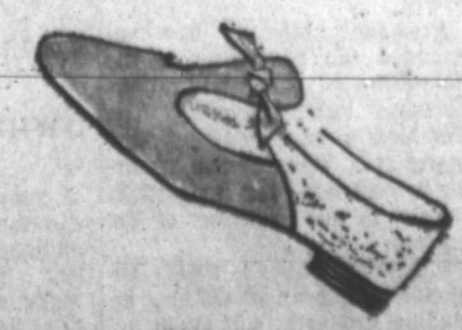

Senate Takes Up Military Construction

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate takes up today a \$975 million military construction bill that includes a provision intended to prod Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara to start work on some old projects.

The Senate Armed Services Committee cut \$75 million from McNamara's original request for \$1.05 billion and tacked on the provision ordering the secretary to give priority to some \$620 million in projects approved by Congress last year and then halted by McNamara.

Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., floor manager for the bill, said a new project could be started ahead of those approved last year if the secretary informs the Senate and House Armed Services committees in writing that the project is urgently needed.

In recent years, Congress often has authorized various projects only to have them canceled by cutbacks or base closings ordered by McNamara.

This year's bill includes 646 projects at 262 bases in the United States and overseas.

The \$1.6 billion program approved by Congress last year included 1,372 projects at 427 bases.

Dirksen Demands More Information On Viet Nam

WASHINGTON (AP) Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen has given President Johnson firm notice that Congress wants more answers to what's happening in Viet Nam.

After hobbling into the Senate on crutches Tuesday — his first appearance there since he broke a thigh bone in a fall May 10 — Dirksen told a news conference he had discussed Viet Nam with the President when Johnson visited him at Walter Reed Army Hospital.

The Illinois Republican said during "a reasonably lengthy talk" with Johnson he proposed a bipartisan White House briefing for congressional leaders.

Dirksen's prodding — coming as it does from an opposition party senator who has backed the administration's Southeast Asia action — may well produce a briefing at which Johnson would answer some plugging questions about political stability and military progress in South Viet Nam.

At the White House deputy press secretary Robert H. Fleming said he had no comment on Dirksen's proposal.

But the mere fact that the GOP leader disclosed he had suggested it personally to Johnson indicates Dirksen believes congressional leaders need to have more background information to cope with the deterioration in popular support of the war effort.

Johnson has not met with the congressional leaders for several months.

Cardinal Cites Duty Of Church

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — Lawrence Cardinal Shehan says the church must forcefully speak out on the moral aspects of modern life.

In an address to an ecumenical assembly, the cardinal said the church should "point out man's duty to work for their solution and the moral principles then must be followed."

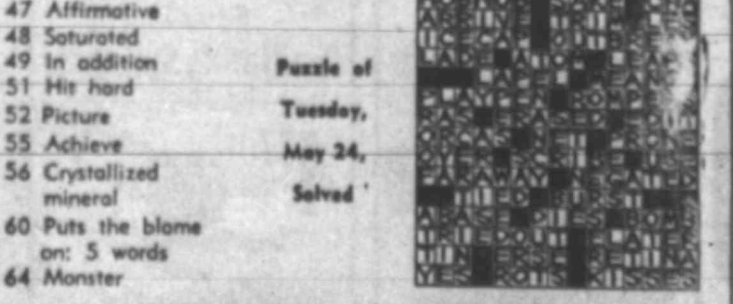

DETROIT (AP) — The Southern Baptist Convention was urged today to present its message better in radio and television programs and in Hollywood movies.

Dr. Ray Roberts, executive secretary of the state convention of Baptists in Ohio, suggested the 15,000 delegates (messengers) take note of the success of the Rev. Dr. Billy Graham on television.

The Ohio minister said: "If one man can have faith to buy prime time and have an undiluted evangelistic service on television on a nationwide hookup, where without apology he takes his Bible, preaches the gospel and pleads with people to be saved, the 11 million Southern Baptists ought to be able to do it."

"We are not facing our obligation to preach the gospel through the medium of television by telecasting religious operas."

Challenged Boxes Must Be Counted In Alabama

SELMA, Ala. (AP) — Wilson Baker, former Selma public safety director who urged a moderate approach in police action during last year's voting demonstrations here, apparently has won the Democratic nomination for sheriff of Dallas County.

U.S. District Judge Daniel H. Thomas, in a ruling on a suit brought by the Justice Department—the first under the 1965 Voting Rights Act, held Tuesday that six boxes challenged by incumbent Sheriff James Clark must be counted.

The six-man steering committee of Dallas County Democratic Executive Committee meets late today to tabulate the vote and to prepare for a hearing of May 3 primary voting in Dallas County.

As sheriff, Clark jailed thousands of Negroes during the demonstrations which led to passage of the Voting Rights Act. He and Baker often differed on how the demonstrations should be controlled.

Dallas County Democratic chairman M. Alston Keith said the committee would accept the Justice Department's tabulation, which would give Baker a majority of nearly 600 votes over Clark and two other opponents. He added that there would be no runoff May 31.

"We would have to consider the ballots in those six boxes anyway, in considering our contest," Keith said, referring to Clark's over-all challenge of the election.

Hunt For 2 In Boat Ends

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (AP)—A Coast Guard search has failed

to find any trace of the rowboat "Puffin" and its two-man crew. John Hoare, 23, and David Johnston, 34, left Virginia Beach Saturday in the 15-foot craft to row the 3,000 miles to England. They hoped to make the trip in 50 days.

On Monday, they were spotted 20 miles off the Virginia coast, about 100 miles behind schedule, and Tuesday a Navy pilot reported he saw Puffin about 12 miles east of Virginia Beach, near the Coast Guard's Chesapeake light station.

Pollution In Channel Cited

AUSTIN (AP)—Pollution in the Houston Ship Channel and

Clear Lake received attention again Tuesday from the Texas Water Pollution Control Board. Chairman Joe Moore served notice that the board is still very much concerned over water quality in Clear Lake, although the matter hasn't come

up lately at board meetings. The board also scheduled action beginning next month to require higher purity standards of municipal and industrial waste discharged into the ship channel. Requirements for the 29 firms and 23 cities emptying waste into the channel were set Dec. 2.

Debt Ceiling Too Low?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Although the highest ever, could force the Treasury Department into a financial squeeze during the next fiscal year if all its chips don't fall in line.

That is the belief today of some officials who feel the ceiling voted Tuesday by the House Ways and Means Committee eliminated most of the built-in headroom they allowed for contingencies.

The department requested a \$332-billion temporary debt ceiling for fiscal 1967 which begins July 1, up from the present temporary limit of \$285 billion.

The \$332-billion figure would give the Treasury about \$3 billion headroom. Officials felt this would permit more efficient management of the debt if the added authorization was not needed for contingencies.

NEARLY BUMPED
The Treasury nearly bumped the ceiling in the late 1950s and was forced to stretch out payments of some of the government's bills to remain within the limit.

The lower ceiling, it was reported, also might force the government to sell some of its financial assets prematurely instead of waiting for an ideal time in the money market.

The House committee's selection of the lower figure apparently was based on a report by the staff of the Senate-House Committee on Internal Revenue that the Treasury had forecast too large a budget deficit.

Treasury officials feel the joint committee's estimates are too optimistic.

TOO OPTIMISTIC
The Treasury Department apparently plans no further move until the House acts on the debt ceiling — probably week after next. But it could request the Senate Finance Committee to stick with the original request of \$332 billion.

If the Senate goes along with the higher limit, the outcome could be a splitting of the difference at \$331 billion, a figure some Treasury officials say wouldn't be too hard to live with.

Nobody even discusses the possibility that Congress might refuse to act on a temporary ceiling and permit the limit to drop to its permanent level of \$285 billion.

Congress always has gone along with an increase, although it has sometimes chopped the amount. It did so last year in approving the \$328 billion figure, \$1 billion short of the administration's request.

'Drivers Test' Is Instruction And Also Quiz

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS' second "National Drivers Test" Tuesday night was as much an hour of instruction as it was a quiz, and the lessons covered passengers, conduct and emergency repairs as well as driving techniques.

Probably few women drivers knew before the program that the best way to cool off a motor overheated by stop-and-go driving is to shift into neutral and race the motor. We do now.

What to do when you are caught by a red light on a pedestrian's crosswalk or intersection? Jump the light? Back up? Stand still and make the pedestrians walk around you? You stand still and accept their glares.

If your car gets a flat tire on an expressway where you cannot pull off to the side, do you halt in the right-hand lane to make repairs-or await help, or do you keep riding on that flat until you can get off the road? You keep traveling since a chewed-up tire is not as serious as a deadly pileup of speeding cars.

These were some of the 22 questions and answers posed during the hour. The viewer scored his own answers, and

CBS pretested a national sample of licensed drivers so we could tell how we fared. The average national score was 51 — one point over a rating of "poor."

Practice and experience in turning out this special type of program made this second drivers' quiz much easier to follow. The first show was overloaded with detailed and not very interesting statistical reports on scores made by sample audiences.

With one exception, the demonstrations of poor driving habits on which questions were pegged were clear and concise. Drawings, diagrams and some pretty horrifying filmed demonstrations of bad driving ending in smashups were used.

Two nonscoring "opinion questions" were inserted. One asked whether drivers over 65 should be given physical check-ups and have their driving skills retested each time their license was up for renewal. Sixty-two per cent of the national sample thought they should be.

The second asked whether built-in safety features should be standard equipment. Seventy-four per cent of the sample said they should be standard equipment in cars at no extra cost, even at the sacrifice of style.

Tykes Who Caught TB Back Home

DETROIT (AP) — Most of the 20 youngsters who contracted tuberculosis in their suburban nursery school last fall are back home.

Maybury branch of Detroit General Hospital reports all but five have left the sanatorium, and Dr. John Romanik said four of those are scheduled for release this week.

"The bulk of them went home since May 7," he said. "They are medically discharged with our approval. These children represent absolutely no danger to the community."

The first TB case at the nursery in Garden City was discovered last December.

In general, Dr. Romanik said, the children will not have to stay at home after their release. He said the children must nap daily and should not be allowed to become exhausted.

Suspect Charged In Girl Slaying

DALLAS (AP) — Police Capt. Will Fritz charged an automobile assembly plant welder with murder Tuesday night in the strangling of blonde folk singer Jill Suzanne Haslett, 18.

The suspect, Frederick P. Semanovich, 23, was ordered held without bond after his arraignment before Justice of the Peace Joe B. Brown Jr. Fritz filed the complaint a few minutes before midnight.

Officers arrested Semanovich 24 hours earlier as he was leaving a cafe three blocks from the apartment where Miss Haslett was slain Sunday. She worked as a bank messenger and lived alone.

ORAL CONFESSION
Fritz said the slim, brown-haired prisoner orally admitted killing her three hours after being taken into custody but would not make a written statement. The homicide captain refused to disclose a motive or give any details. He said only that the case was "in good shape."

Police said earlier a witness whom they would not identify pointed out Semanovich in a headquarters lineup as a man seen leaving Miss Haslett's apartment before dawn Sunday.

J. K. Webb Jr., 26, a friend, found the door ajar and discovered the slaying that evening. The body, clad in shorty pajamas, lay on the floor in the blood-stained room.

Webb told investigators he recalled being introduced to Semanovich by Miss Haslett at her apartment a week ago but did not remember his name.

SPOTS CAB
With the help of his father, Webb searched the neighborhood for a car like that he told of seeing Semanovich drive and found one on a parking lot. He then spotted Semanovich in the cafe and notified arresting officers.

County medical examiner Earl Rose said initial tests indicated Miss Haslett died of asphyxiation caused by injuries to her throat. He said it had not been determined whether she was raped but there were indications she was not.

The slain girl, known to friends as a talented amateur folk singer, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James S. Haslett of Dallas.

Dan Moody Laid To Rest

AUSTIN (AP) — Dan Moody, governor of Texas from 1927 to 1931, was buried in the state cemetery Tuesday after a 90-minute Methodist funeral service.

The former governor died Sunday at the age of 72 after a long illness.

Gov. and Mrs. John Connally were among the mourners at Moody's funeral, held at First Methodist Church, a block from the capitol.

A Texas flag covered Moody's casket.

Viet Situation Direct, Simple, Taylor Says

EDITOR'S NOTE — The conflict in Viet Nam recently has been called "the confusing war." Why is the United States there? What are its objectives? Maxwell D. Taylor has been intimately involved in the Viet Nam question, as U.S. ambassador to the country, as advisor to two presidents, and as director of administrative policies there. The following article, written before the current crisis and developments in Da Nang and Saigon, gives this official's personal assessment of the Viet Nam situation.

There is an impression very generally held about the country that the situation in South Viet Nam is so confused that the average citizen can hardly be expected to understand the rights and wrongs of it. This article undertakes to demonstrate the contrary in minimum words — that in spite of their seeming complexity, the issues in the United States involvement in South Viet Nam are simple, clear and readily explained.

We are involved in South Viet Nam today because the independence of that country is being threatened by the subversive aggression conducted by the Communist leadership in North Viet Nam. Since 1954, that leadership has had the purpose of imposing Communist domination upon the South Vietnamese people against the will of the vast majority.

**British Guiana
Now To Get
Independence**

WASHINGTON (AP) — British Guiana, long a target for Red subversion, is to become the world's newest independent nation on May 26, with a non-Communist government in control.

The little nation on South America's northeast coast, where the regime of Marxist Cheddi Jagan was overthrown in 1953 after charges by the London government that it was about to fall into Communist hands, was proclaimed a Communist target by the January tricontinental conference in Havana.

In addition, it faces many of the economic and social problems of underdeveloped countries, plus one not so widespread: Racial strife.

A century or more ago, its sugar plantation owners brought in slaves from Africa, and hundreds of workers from India to work in the cane fields. Racial flareups between the two groups have occurred from time to time but the situation has been relatively peaceful recently.

In October, 1953, a drama was played out with the whole world watching. It was not one of the simple power plays of history, where a great nation sends in troops to quell an uprising among the troublesome natives.

The point raised by the British Colonial Office was that British Guiana was menaced by Communist domination. It didn't happen, but there are indications that the Reds have not "given up."

Whether they do will be one of the tasks facing the government of British Guiana — to be called Guyana after it is independent. Jagan, central figure in the 1953 events, is not in power now — but he has considerable strength in and out of the country. He also is on good terms with Moscow, and with Cuba's Fidel Castro.

Now prime minister of British Guiana is Linden Forbes Sampson Burnham, 43, a Negro who once won a nationwide contest as the brightest young man in the country.

In 1953, the British government sent 600 troops, a cruiser, a frigate and a detachment of airborne troops into British Guiana to meet what it termed a plot to turn the colony into a "totalitarian state subordinate to Moscow."

**Vets Favor VA Hospital,
Solon's Survey Indicates**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Replies to questionnaires distributed by Rep. Olin Teague, D-College Station, chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, indicate that most ex-servicemen are satisfied with the treatment provided at VA hospitals.

Teague's survey also brought out that former servicemen would prefer to be admitted to a VA hospital, rather than to a community hospital under the Medicare plan (assuming eligibility), or to a community hospital at their own expense.

5,942 ANSWER
One questionnaire went to a group of 10,000 veterans now on pension, calling attention to the Medicare program for the elderly under Social Security. Of 5,942 replies received and tabulated, 97.6 per cent, or 5,795, were from World War I veterans.

Those preferring VA hospitalization accounted for 65.5 per cent of the total responding.

**Agency Admits
FBI Agents
Eavesdropped**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department has sent an unprecedented memorandum to the Supreme Court admitting that Federal Bureau of Investigation agents secretly eavesdropped on conversations between a lawyer and his client — a former associate of Bobby Baker.

The client, Washington public relations man Fred B. Black Jr., later was convicted of income tax evasion. But in the memorandum, Solicitor General Thurgood Marshall said Black should be given a court hearing.

Marshall's memorandum to the high court, sent Tuesday, indicated that the FBI apparently acted on its own when it "installed a listening device" in Black's hotel suite in Washington three years ago.

The memorandum said that neither the Justice Department attorneys who prosecuted Black nor "any other attorney of the Department of Justice" — including Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach — knew about the electronic snooping.

FIGHTS CONVICTION
Black now is fighting his 1964 tax conviction and has asked the Supreme Court for the second time to review his conviction. The court denied Black's first request for review May 2.

He and Baker, former Senate Democratic secretary who has been indicted on a number of federal charges, were associated in a Washington vending machine business.

In his memorandum, Marshall said the bugging, which took place between February and April, 1963, "was unrelated to the tax evasion case."

But he added: "The listening device was in operation from approximately two months before until approximately one month after the evidence was presented to the grand jury and the indictment was returned."

LISTENED IN
"During that time the monitoring agents overheard, among other conversations, exchanges between petitioner and the attorney who was then representing him in connection with the tax evasion charges on which he has been convicted."

Marshall said although the Justice Department is con-

vinced "the monitoring of conversations had no effect upon his conviction or the fairness of his trial, we have no doubt that in the circumstances (Black) is entitled to a judicial determination."

Marshall emphasized the entire case against Black was based on investigation by the

Justice Department, Marshall said while the justice prosecutor had access to FBI reports summarizing the bugged information, "these reports did not disclose the manner in which the information had been obtained or that such information reflected discussions between petitioner and counsel."

KEPT SECRET
Possibly indicating FBI practice in reporting to its parent

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
