even par 70 for 207. Casper, who won the Open in 1959, fell four strokes back at one stage, cut the margin to one and then slumped again for a 73

Nicklaus, still furning over a slow play feud with PGA officials, snapped back with his first sub-par round - a 69 and went into third place at 211, four back.

So it was Palmer, Casper and Nicklaus, three of golf's top performers, going into Sunday's climactic round over the tight, tree-framed Olympic lakeside

The others were relatively far back after a day of wrangling with the par 70, 372 acre course in almost perfect weather sunny, temperatures in the 70s and negligible wind.

Tied at 213 were Dave Marr, the PGA champion, who recorded the best round of the day with a 68, and chubby Phil Rodgers, winner of the Buick Open a week ago, with 73. Then came Rives R. McBee,

the unknown assistant pro from Midland, Tex., whose 64 Friday tied the open record, scrambling in with a third round 74 for

Three were tied at 215 - Al Mengert, the first day leader

Goalby, and former British Open king Tony Lema.

John Miller, the 19-year-old San Francisco amateur, refused to be shaken by a pairing with Nicklaus and fired a steady 74 to finish at 216.

No one was in apparent contention as America's 71-year-old classic neared a showdown.

Defending champion Gary Player of South Africa continued to find his putter ice cold and shot a 74 for 224. Gene Littler, who took a horrendous nine Friday for an 83, rallied for a 72 which placed him with a group

Ben Hogan, seeking his fifth Open crown over a course where he lost a bid 11 years ago in a playoff with Jack Fleck, tired visibly in the heat, shooting a 76 for 221.

Palmer, booming the ball down the middle of the hourglass fairways in what he said was his best driving exhibition in years, jumped into the lead quiekly with a 15-foot birdie putt on the first hole.

He added another bird with a 35-footer at the fifth and moved four strokes ahead of Casper, his playing partner who was struggling with errant irons.

But at the short length, Arnie

drove into a trap and missed

for a bogey 4.

At the 12th, he drove into therough, bounced a ball off a tree. hit his third into a bunker and took three to get down for a double bogey 6. He missed another drive at the 14th, bogeying, and got a bit edgy.

"I thought my driving might have become unhinged at this point," Palmer said. "I have been driving so superbly in this tournament that I was afraid I might lose it."

However, the millionaire from Latrobe, Pa., hit another tremendous drive on the 14th and got a birdie from eight feet. At the 604-yard 16th he pitched the ball to the green and rolled in a birdie from 30 feet. Most of the pressure was off.

Casper said he had a very exciting round. "It seems I was in the rough all day," he said. "I was in the rough seven times and three times landed in

Casper bogeyed the short third when he drove into the crowd back of the green and lost another stroke at the fourth where he missed his drive and approached short.

He collected his first and only birdie at the 10th, where he sank a 13-foot putt, but bogeyed hit into the heavy fringe, chipped out to within 15 feet and missed the putt.

Casper, in the last two years, has reduced from 210 to 165 pounds through an unusual diet but recently put on a few extra

pounds to get back up to 180. Nicklaus, always fighting the fat man symbol although he is a fairly solid 210-pounder, started with a birdie at the first hole and got only two other birds on the round. At the 16th, he sank a 25-footer. He had bogeys at the fifth where he hit one of the 34,-000 trees, and at the ninth, where he three-putted from 40

Nicklaus complained after Friday's round that the tempo of his game was shaken by U.S. Golf Association officials foreing him to hurry his play. He said five officials prodded him around most of the course.

"It made me really mad," he said. "I think it is ridiculous."

Warming Up Again

A year ago there were overtures concerning the possibility of Scurry County becoming a part of the local junior college district. For various reasons, among them representation and valuations, the exploration cooled in the interest of another try at a purely local district within Scurry County. This did not materialize, and now there is some speculation that the matter of enlarging the district confines may be warming again. At last there have been public statements from Scurry County concerning this. Moreover, another county, Nolan, has now expressed an interest.

What, if anything, will come of these feelers is yet purely conjectural. There are certain advantages to be gained through a broader operation. Obviously the base of support would give promise of more resources, and impose less restrictive re-

sponse to physical and other needs This also offers the potential of reaching vastly more students, the evolvement of a system that promises to fit into state trends. This might call for the yielding of some of the flexibility of purely localized direction, and it might bring on some prob-lems of distribution of facilities. Of course, there are numerous other angles to the matter.

At this stage, there are two things that all concerned will do well to keep in view - one is to keep an open mind, the other is to keep the good of young people, yes even po-tential adult students, uppermost.

Meanwhile, we can be grateful that the leadership of this community had the vision and courage 20 years ago to take the steps that led to establishment of the college here.

Garbage Can Campaign

The city and the health unit are launching a campaign for better containment of garbage and trash. The starting point is tagging non-regulation containers, noting on a check list some of the things which are not in conformity to regulations,

Presumably, residents will remedy these points. Practically, the city and health officials likely will have to check back and crack down where there is not an honest effort at com-

This campaign is a welcome one, and even those who get tagged ought to support it. There is no arguing that by and large we have grown careless about this. Look at almost any alley in town - either littered with garbage from overturned and uncovered cans, or stewn with trash. It's unsightly, and it may be un-

Mergers And Prices

WASHINGTON - Contradictions in the news are sometimes significant. One branch of the government says that the poor are paying more for food than are other people in the same town or city, and that some-thing should be done to encourage the chain stores and supermarkets to do business in low - income neighborhoods. But six justices of the Supreme Court of the United States have decreed that a merger of two chains doing only seven and one-half per geles area is a Violation of the antitrust laws and constitutes an "incipjent" monopoly.

THE BUREAU of Labor Statistics sent out its agents to do comparative shopping in poor and higher-income neighborhoods in six big cities, and has just made public a report urging that special steps be taken to persuade the chain - store companies to open up more supermarkets in the low-income sections.

A check-up of the prices of 18 commodities showed that the poor are being subjected to higher costs. The chains, of course, are reluctant to enter the poor areas with individual stores which would make little profit. But Mrs. Esther Peterson, President Johnson's special assistant for consumer affairs, declares that "each food chain should immediately re-examine its expansion plans, on a cityby-city basis, in the light of the Bureau of Labor Statistics study," and says also that, if supermarkets can't make a profit in poor neighborhoods, the government should consider taking "positive steps" to improve the

had upheld a merger in California. The combined sales of the two chains amounted to only seven and one-half per cent of the total of the retail groceries sold in the Los Angeles market. But the high court said that the consolidation was nevertheless a violation of the anti-merger law, and that it was therefore prohibited.

JUSTICES STEWART and Harlan, who dissented, noted that the court had previously declared that every corporate acquisition should be judged in the light of the contemporary economic context of the industry concerned, and then added that the Court has turned its back on basic principles and on all the decisions of recent years that have followed those principles. The dissenting opinion

"No action by this court can resurrect the old single - line Los Angeles food stores that have been run over by the automobile or obliterated by the freeway. The transformation of American society since the second world war has not completely shelved these specialty stores, but it has relegated them to a much less central role in our food economy.

"TODAY'S DOMINANT enterprise in food retailing is the supermarket. Accessible to the housewife's automobile from a wide radius, it houses under a single roof the entire food requirements of the family. Only through the sort of reactionary philosophy that this Court long ago rejected in the due process clause area can the Court read into the legislative history of Section 7 its attempt to make the automobile stand still, to mold the food economy of today into the market patterns of another era."

ON THE WHOLE, much can be learned by reading the minority opinion of the Supreme Court about chain stores and their future. WASHINGTON - Anyone who has been keeping up with Sen. Edward Long's invasion-of-privacy hearings is cutraged to discover how much bug-ging and wiretapping has been going on in the United States. It appears that nobody is safe anymore from the big ear" and it is hoped that some legislation will be passed soon to protect the rights of the American citi-

I discussed this subject with Sampson Klutznick, a private detective who assured me that most private detectives were as much against bugging as their victims

HE SAID, "They should pass streng laws making it a crime to bug or wire tap any American citizen."

"That's for sure." I said.

"Of course, we'll have to exempt the FBI, because they must tap wires and bug people to find out who the criminals and Communists are in the

United States." "Yeah, I guess so. "And we should let the Internal Revenue Service continue bugging Americans so we know who aren't paying their taxes."

"Naturally," I said. "AND THEN we can't forbid the Post Office from listening in to find out what people are writing dirty

books. "That's for sure," I agreed. "And the CIA can't be included in the law because there has to be counterspying. And the local police must be permitted to bug college campuses

"THEN IT'S ALSO very important that big companies be allowed to bug other big companies."

Labor And Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON - The American labor movement has once again cut across America's declared foreign policy with an act bewildering to organized labor in the rest of the non-Communist world. The AFL-CIO delegates walked out of the International Labor Organization conference when the head of the Polish delegation was elected president by a vote of 184 to

AMERICAN BUSINESS representatives stayed on, as did those from government. But following the George Meany line, American labor, of all the 106 nations represented at Geneva, refused to abide by the outcome of a free election to an office largely formal and procedural. While the move was made without Meany's sanction. it is of a piece with the dictates of the man who sits behind him and calls the foreign policy moves.

JAY LOVESTONE is a figure as remote and mysterious as the great Khan and on the issues of foreign policy almost as absolute in the labor movement. Once a Communist, he became, as have so many others, a professional anti-Communist. His hold on the 72-year-old AFL-CIO president and the hierarchy of aging moguls around him is so strong that no interference or even criticism is toler-

An important initiative of the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations is the opening of new avenues to the Communist bloc countries. This is in the belief that Moscow's grip is weakening and signs of independence should be encouraged. It is recognition of the fact that America's allies in Western Europe are drawing closer to the East through greatly expanded trade and cultural exchanges.

THE AFL-CIO has often tried to frustrate this initiative. The International Longshoremen's Association announced they would not load ships with wheat for the Soviet Union and the Communist bloc countries. It took prolonged effort at the highest level to reach a compromise that made some shipments possible. The longshoremen have repeatedly proclaimed their refusal to unload cargos from Communist countries, no matter how small and negligible in the total of American trade these shipments

MOST OF THE AFL-CIO chiefs couldn't care less about the International Labor Organization. It has nothing to do with the hard facts of wages, hours and fringe benefits that absorb their time and energy. But, as Walter Reuther and others know, the symbolic value of the ILO and the role American labor could play is extremely important in the picture this nation presents to the world.

The conduct of foreign policy in a democracy is, for the unhappy conductors, like running a race in which every conceivable obstacle is thrown in the way. President Johnson, seeking avenues to the East, recommended changes in the Tariff Act that would give satellite nations that do not now have it favored-nation treatment. This was a bold move in marked contrast to the timidity of only a few

IT WAS VETOED by chairman Wilbur Mills of the House Ways and Means Committee and is apparently dead for this session of Congress. That is "one man, one vote" with a vengence. It comes just as Italy, France and Britain are making big trade deals with the Communist bloc coun-

The widening conflict in Viet Nam is the obvious reason for the failure to make some progress in easing tensions between East and West. The President sent to the Senate a consular treaty with the Soviet Union which had obvious mutual advantages for both powers. The treaty was "vetoed" by J. Edgar Hoover. 




