





# Prisoners Moved From Death Row

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Overcrowded conditions have forced Texas prison officials to transfer 11 prisoners from the death row at Huntsville to a nearby institution.

Nineteen men are now awaiting execution in Texas, and the Huntsville death row can accommodate only eight.

Dr. George J. Beto, prison director, said Monday the other 11 had been housed in temporary quarters, but that this caused personnel and work load problems.

He said that since some were receiving repeated stays of execution, he made the decision to transfer them to a maximum security unit at the nearby Ellis installation.

Texas has not executed anyone since July, 1964.

Those transferred to Ellis were Edwin M. Bertsch, Fayette County; James Lee Marion, Lubbock County; John Franklin Burns, Melvin Alexander Payton, and Walter Lee Sims, Harris County; Leon Spencer, Jefferson County; Harold C. Hintz and Clifford D. Carroll, Tarrant County; Johnny Clemons, Gregg County; Kenneth Bruce Martin, Dallas County; and Eddie Robert Jackson, Newton County.

Those who will remain on death row at Huntsville include Joe Edward Smith, Melvin Lee Dixon and Calvin Sellers, Harris County; Eugene Welch, Grayson County; Benny Longor-

Whatley, 45, was shot early Friday in a parking lot at the Choctaw County Fairgrounds. Mrs. Kizer, 44, was wounded.

Charges were filed against Kizer later Friday.

## Representatives Of Birch Society Contact Chapter

Two representatives of the John Birch Society met with local chapter officials here Monday evening.

Rex Westfield, Dallas, regional public relations representative and spokesman for the society on position matters, and Melton Brewster, Slaton, area coordinator, said they talked about expansion plans.

Westfield said plans were to increase the number of field coordinators from 80 to 320, and that experience had shown that each time a coordinator was added membership increased by a thousand in that particular area. He predicted an increase in society projects such as getting the ULS out of the UN, impeachment of Chief Justice Earl Warren, educational projects to promote racial understanding, exposing professional agitators.

Only 3 Counties Get Hay Rights

WASHINGTON (AP)—Only three Texas counties, Deaf Smith, Oldham, and Randall, qualify for grazing and haying privileges under an order issued last week, the Agriculture Department said Monday.

An earlier report erroneously indicated the order applied statewide.

Livestock growers may use crop lands taken out of production under price support programs for grazing and haying rights under the order, due to adverse weather recently in the counties.

## Ranges In Some Texas Areas Dry

AUSTIN (AP)—Texas pasture and range grasses, though generally in good condition, "are beginning to need rain in some areas," the U.S. Department of Agriculture said Monday.

Wheat combining is at 54 per cent, compared with 44 per cent last year. Cotton planting moved to 98 per cent completion, compared with 97 per cent a year ago.

Although Rio Grande Valley cotton is nearing maturity, no gins have reported their first bales. The first bale was ginned on June 16 last year.

Harvest of Lower Valley tomatoes, cantaloups, watermelons, honeydews and peppers continued last week in moderate to heavy volume.

Peach and plum harvest was active in central and eastern counties.

Bid Opening Date Pegged For Ackerly Post Office

ACKERLY — Ackerly's new post office building is one step further along.

The post office department, according to Travis Russell, postmaster, has announced it is seeking competitive bids for the building. The department asks for bids to "build and lease."

The purpose of the competitive bidding, according to information given Russell, is to encourage the most attractive and economical offers to the government in line with the president's economy program.

Under the department's lease construction program, the site selected at the east side of First Street between Avenues G and H, will be assigned to the successful bidder who will purchase the property. He will then construct a building according to the departmental specifications and lease it to the post office department for a basic period of 10 years with options to renew for an additional 20 years.

The department's initial capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

Bidding documents are available at the office of V. E. Bell, real estate officer, P. O. Box 1288, Lubbock. He will supply bidding forms, building specifications, lease provisions and other information.

Bids must be submitted to Bell at Lubbock before 2 p.m. July 20, Russell said.

Proposed site of the new post office is just a few steps from the old building which has housed the office for many years.

An option on the land selected by the postal officials has been posted and will be turned over to the successful bidder.

Appointed as acting postmaster some months ago, Russell was installed two weeks ago as full time head of the post office. Mrs. Russell, who had been acting postmaster, is now a clerk in the office.

A lapse at the opening gun by West proved fatal to the defense despite his valiant attempts to recover subsequently. North and South arrived at a four heart contract without a wasted motion. North's holding revalued to 14 points in support of hearts and, when South made his rebid in that suit, North proceeded directly to game.

West opened the ace of clubs and declarer unblocked in dummy by playing the king, so as to gain an additional entry to his hand. The switch was to

a trump. North put up the king of hearts to play the ace and nine of spades. East covered with the ten which South ducked; however, West alertly overtook with the queen to lead another trump.

South won the trick with the jack of hearts and ruffed a spade in dummy with the nine of trumps as East discarded a club. Declarer came back to the queen of clubs to trump out West's king of spades with the ten of hearts. A diamond was led to the king and West's ace. Declarer ruffed the club return, drew the last trump, and cashed his long spade. He lost one trick each in spades, diamonds, and clubs.

West began leading trump one trick too late. If he opens a heart originally, declarer cannot prevent him from getting in twice more to complete the sabotage. The spade suit provides one entry and, when South tries to come off the dummy in either diamonds or clubs, West regains the lead to play a third heart. Declarer obtains only one spade ruff and must, therefore, lose two spade tricks.

North's jump to four hearts and West's holding in spades should have made it apparent that dummy would be short in declarer's first suit. A trump lead to prevent ruffs therefore becomes the obvious choice.

## Rash Of Thefts Continues

The rash of thefts, mostly petty but sometimes costly, continued through Monday, according to reports to police.

Two typewriters and a folding cot and mattress were stolen from the library of Big Spring High School, John F. Smith, principal, told officers Monday.

The plate glass door of the library had been broken to gain entry, police said.

One of the typewriters is electrically operated, Smith said, and is valued at \$273.50.

Someone stole her purse from the kitchen, and then threw the purse on the front porch of her home, Mrs. J. A. Magee, 707 Douglas, told officers Monday.

Officers said neighbors of Mrs. Magee reported a theft of \$200 under similar circumstances three weeks ago.

Mrs. Rosabelle Curtis, of Curtis Book Store, 112 E. 2nd, told police Monday that someone stole her new black wallet from her purse during the store's open hours. The wallet contained about \$35, she told officers.

A transistor radio and a .38-caliber revolver were stolen from his home Monday. Tommie Lee Hutchinson, 1006 NW 3rd, told police. He valued the items at \$75. Entry was by way of the den window, officers surmised.

## Police Report Fewer But More Baffling May Cases

Fewer than one-tenth of the 52 reported offenses during May were reported cleared by local police, according to monthly figures of the force. Permeal cost in the jail jumped by more than eight cents, but there were fewer meals.

In April, a third of 64 offenses were cleared.

Cleared in May were four cases of aggravated assault, and one of 16 cases of larceny over \$50.

Of 12 cases of burglary, none were marked off the slate. There were 19 cases of larceny under \$50 and none was cleared.

City jail prisoners received 664 meals, compared to 725 the previous month and 584 in March. Each meal cost 19.16 cents, well above the 11.36 cents in April. Total food cost for the month was \$127.24, compared to \$82.34 in April. In March, the cost was \$69.85.

The communications room handled 925 items by radio or telephone, above the 874 handled during the previous month, but below the 983 in March.

Juvenile cases were far below the April figure. During May, only 16 juvenile offenses were noted, compared to 35 the month before.

Seven juveniles taken into custody were released to Juvenile Officer Bob Wakefield. Two were counseled or warned, and four were released to their parents or others.

A total of \$4,042.15 in stolen property was reported to police during May, a far higher figure than the \$2,999.50 in April. On the whole, however, not much was stolen during the first five months this year, a total of \$7,041.65, compared to \$18,073.25 in the first five months of last year.

Of the \$4,042.15, officers recovered \$353.95. This compares to \$794.25 recovered in April of a lower total of about \$3,000.

There were 208 arrests, compared to 191 the month before. Of these, 22 were transferred to the county jail; 21 released to other jurisdictions; and 15 released with no charge. During the first five months of the year, there were 399 arrests made, compared to 431 during the same period of 1965.

Accused Slayer Of Rodeo Star Due For Tests

HUGO, Okla. (AP)—The accused slayer of rodeo star Todd Whatley was committed to a mental hospital Monday for observation.

Edward Kizer, 46, was sent to Central State Hospital in Norman for up to 90 days. The observation is to determine if he can assist in preparing his defense.

Defense lawyer Sam Sullivan asked for the commitment at a hearing which was called to receive a petition for a writ of habeas corpus. Dist. Judge Howard Phillips approved the commitment.

## Women Reveal Age By Droopy Chinline

A lovely asks: Would a chin strap be of value in lifting a sagging chin? There's a difference of opinion on the subject in my crowd.

The answer: Of itself, a chin strap will not lift the chinline. But it can be used as an auxiliary to the process.

To improve the line, the skin and muscles in the area must be firmed and toned. This is accomplished through astringent emollients, improved posture and corrective exercise.

It is in connection with exercise and posture that straps may be used with good effect. Wear one while reading and it will remind you to hold up your chin. Doing so helps to tighten the muscles. Or wear a strap while exercising and it will provide resistance, so that you work harder. Of course the hard-



er you work, the more successful your effort.

An effective exercise for a strapped chin is: a) Sit erect with head high. By opening mouth, press chin against strap so that muscles tense. b) Alternately purse lips and smile. Work about one minute in all.

For maximum improvement in the chinline, there is need for an astringent lotion or cream and molding massage. The astringents are stroked onto the face and throat with upward motions and allowed to set. Then an oil-rich emollient is worked into the chin and face with contour-molding strokes.

After 30 minutes, the treatment is removed. Repeated weekly, applications help to lift the line.

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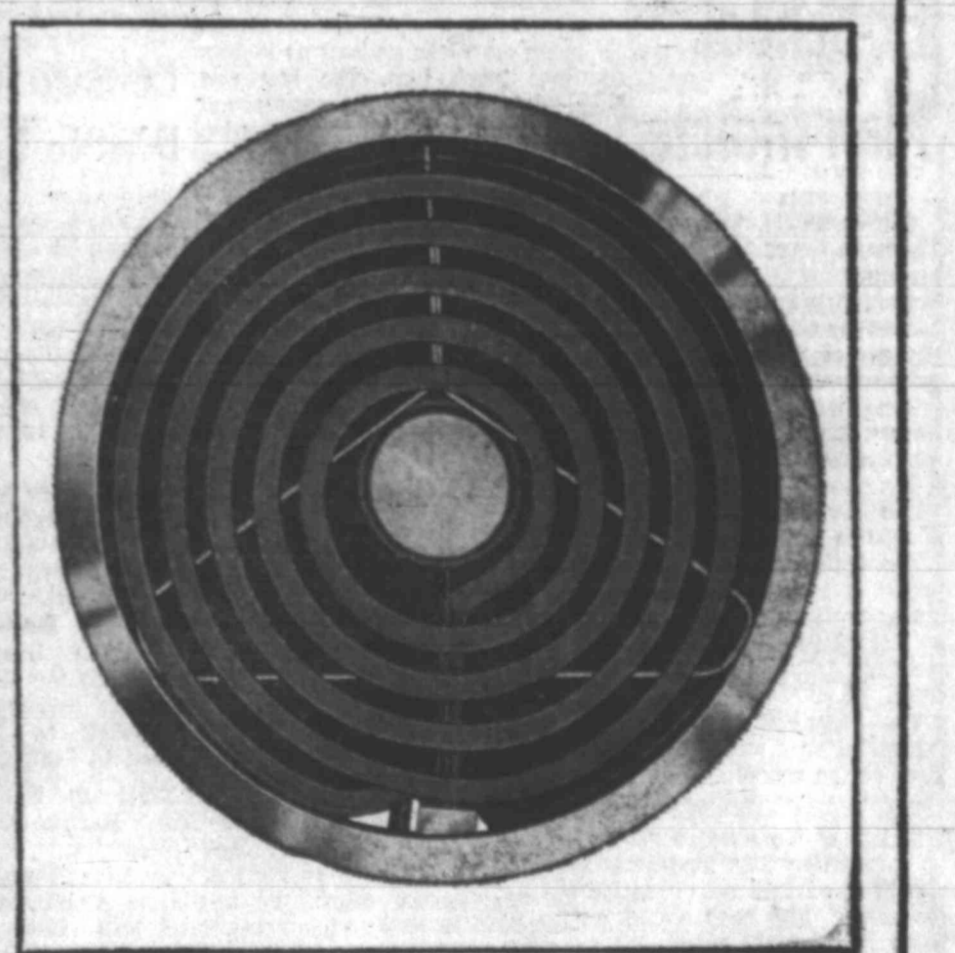

# \$33.6 Million For State Parks Asked

AUSTIN (AP)—A \$33.6 million budget request, including \$7.8 million to improve Texas' often dilapidated state parks, has been submitted by the state Parks and Wildlife Department. A hearing on the request will be held next Monday by the executive and legislative budget offices. Present two-year appropriation for the department is \$19.6 million, including \$2.1 million for park development. The budget request includes salaries for 50 more game wardens, a general pay increase and special salary boosts for top officials, including a jump from \$18,500 to \$25,000 for the executive director. The top job was left vacant by the resignation Monday of J. Weldon Watson. No funds are sought for land acquisition or for purchase and development of Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near the President's ranch. The budget document says there "still remain some 27 recreational and 14 historical parks to be developed to a stable standard, all of which are in a state of complete deterioration or have never been developed to present day standards." A land acquisition plan, without specific recommended dollar amounts, will be submitted separately to the 60th Legislature, said Mark Gosdin, director of parks services. The department urged appropriation of enough park improvement money to take advantage of federal matching dollars under the Land and Water Conservation Act of 1965. Without state matching money, the budget says, "such funds will revert and be allocated to other states, thereby affecting our tourist program as well as not providing additional recreational opportunity for our own population."

## It's Summer, According To Almanac — And Sam

The sun showed up Tuesday and will make its appearance on Wednesday at the same time. Sunset on all three days is 7:36 p.m. That means, Boss, we busy little bees have 15 hours and 16 minutes of daylight to get those chores done. Meantime, get all set. It's summer from 2:33 p.m. today until 5:43 a.m. Sept. 23. Autumn will begin then and continue in happy form until Dec. 22, 1:29 a.m. Then, Boss, it will be winter. And you know what that will mean. ## Oswald Widow Expects Child

DALLAS (AP)—The former wife of Lee Harvey Oswald and her new husband, Kenneth J. Porter, are expecting their first child. The couple was married June 1, 1965, about 18 months after Oswald was shot to death by night club operator Jack Ruby. Oswald was later identified by the Warren Commission as the assassin of President Kennedy. The former Marina Oswald, 24, has two children by her first marriage—June, now 5, and Rachel, now 2. Porter, 25, also has two children by a former marriage, both of whom live with their mother. Porter said Sunday that he has put the couple's brick home up for sale or lease and he has quit his job with a suburban electronics firm. He and his wife have no definite plans, Porter said, but may move to Greenville, 60 miles northeast of Dallas, where he has relatives.

LONDON (AP)—The Archbishop of York, Dr. Donald Coggan, spoke to the 23,000 persons who came to Billy Graham's London Crusade meeting Monday night. Hollywood actor Joseph Cotten was in the audience. Dr. Coggan, the Anglican Church's second ranking prelate, said members of his church in Northern England were backing the Crusade with their prayers. Graham's sermon was based on the contest between David and Goliath. Crusade organizers said more than 1,000 persons declared themselves for Christ at the meeting.

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## Clarification Of Rule Aids College Funds

AUSTIN (AP)—Seven Texas colleges that were shut out of new construction funds by a May 17 attorney general's opinion may now share in new tax money by virtue of an attorney general's opinion Monday "clarifying" the previous opinion. Under the May opinion, West Texas, Texas Women's University, East Texas, Sam Houston, Texas Southern, Texas A&I and Southwest Texas State would see their share of a new 10-cent ad valorem tax go entirely to the payment of their construction indebtedness. The May opinion said all of the state's 17 four-year colleges outside the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems would share the new tax under formulas devised by the College Coordinating Board. Only 12 schools shared the old 5-cent ad valorem tax. Monday's opinion upheld the portion of the May opinion saying all 17 schools must share in the new tax. But the May opinion said those schools that had valid construction indebtedness equal to or above their share of the 10-cent tax would get only enough to pay their obligations. Monday's opinion said existing construction indebtedness will be paid "off the top," and then the remainder of the tax will be shared by the 17 schools.

## Damage Suit Is Dismissed

Judge Ralph Caton, 118th District Court, dismissed a damage suit styled H. F. Dupre vs. Texas Electric Service Co., when neither the plaintiff nor his lawyer appeared as the case was called for trial Monday afternoon. The suit, stemming from a fire on the plaintiff's property three years ago and which he alleges was caused by a Texas Electric Service Co. transformer, was set for trial before a jury this week. It was one of two cases — the first being a custody case which was settled by agreement before a jury had been selected on Monday morning. Judge Caton then set the Dupre case for 1:30 p.m. At 1:30 p.m. the defendant's attorney, John Richard Coffey was on hand. Neither Dupre nor his attorney, George Thomas, appeared. After waiting for some time Judge Caton excused the jury panel from further service this week. The court then dismissed the action on its own motion for lack of prosecution. Dupre had sued for \$35,000 damages.

# Headwater Detail Plans For State Project Told

AUSTIN (AP)—Detailed summaries for development plans for the Sulphur River and Cypress Creek basins, headwaters of the proposed 980-mile State Water Project, were disclosed Monday by the Texas Water Development Board. The proposals are part of the \$3.7 billion Texas Water Plan, published in tentative form May 30. HEARING SET—A hearing on the Sulphur River plan will be held June 23 in Sulphur Springs. The Cypress Creek basin hearing will be June 29 in Mount Pleasant. The Sulphur River and Cypress Creek basins adjoin one another, extending to the Louisiana and Arkansas borders in North Texas, one of the state's heaviest rainfall areas. Tentative plans call for diversion of water from the area, in excess of reasonably-foreseeable needs, first to the Dallas-Fort Worth area and then south to the Corpus Christi vicinity and the Rio Grande Valley by means of a series of lakes, pipelines, canals and river basins. Chief features of the Sulphur River basin plan are: —Construction of Cooper Reservoir, already authorized by Congress, at an estimated cost of \$18 million, five miles southeast of Cooper. Total capacity would be 409,800 acre-feet. An acre-foot is 325,851 gallons. —Construction, at an estimated \$32.5 million, of Sulphur Bluff Reservoir by 1983. It would be four miles north of Sulphur Bluff on the South Sulphur River. A 635,400 acre-foot capacity is proposed. —The proposed Naples Reservoir, to be built in two stages, one to be completed by 1990, the other by 2010. Total capacity would be 3,111,700 acre-feet. Estimated cost is \$123.3 million. —Enlargement of Texarkana Reservoir by 1995 at a cost of \$13.5 million. The modification would increase the reservoir's conservation storage to 802,900 acre-feet. —Creation, through these projects, of a total water surface area of 229,300 acres. CYPRESS CREEK—The Cypress Creek plan proposes construction of three new reservoirs and enlargement of a fourth at an estimated cost of \$46.2 million. Specifically, the plan calls for: —Construction of Franklin County Reservoir, 10 miles southeast of Mount Vernon at an estimated cost of \$3.2 million. —Impoundment of the Titus County Reservoir 5.5 miles south of Mount Pleasant, at a cost of \$12 million. —Marshall Reservoir eight miles northwest of Marshall in Harrison County, to be built at an estimated cost of \$25.1 million. —Enlargement of Lake o' the Pines by raising its conservation pool six feet at a cost of \$5.9 million. A summary of the Cypress Creek basin plan said the Franklin County and Titus County reservoirs would probably be completed "much" sooner than their yields will be needed for the state water project.

## John Wayne Fired On By Viet Cong

CHU LAI, Viet Nam (AP)—Veteran actor John Wayne, who fought with the U.S. Marines in the movies, narrowly escaped Viet Cong sniper fire Monday while visiting Marines in Viet Nam. Marine officers said Wayne was signing autographs when three to five rounds of rifle fire hit the dirt about 50 feet from the actor. Wayne ignored the shots, officers said, and went on signing his name. Wayne is visiting American troops after completing work narrating a documentary film on Viet Nam. RESERVOIR—The Marshall Reservoir should be completed about 2015, when export yields probably will be required, the summary said. Future navigation requirements also are provided.
