

## America Puts Up 100-Ft. Balloon As Mapping Aid

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) - America's new star in the sky-a silvery 100-foot balloon-orbited the poles today, providing a new way to find out where on earth things are.

PAGEOS, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's earth-mapping project, is a 125-pound plastic balloon coated with aluminum, PAGEOS stands for Passive Geodetic Earth-Orbiting Satellite. The big ball, intricately foled-

ed inside a canister, was pushed into orbit Thursday by a thrustaugmented Thor-Agena-D rocket Combination. Its orbital path is circular, 2,600 miles above

Once in orbit, the balloon was popped out of its protective canister. The big gas bag expanded as the heat of the sun vaporized chemicals inside.

PAGEOS' mission, scientists said, is to act as the world's model, providing a pinpoint of relfected light near the horizon

This pinpoint of light, photo-graphed from several points on earth against a background of stars, will provide the prime reference point for a 5-year study aimed at correcting the world's maps.

The big ball, scientists said, should be visible to the naked eye as it reflects the light of the sun. They said the sateilite would be as bright as the star Polaris (the North Star). Photographs, to be taken from

41 points on earth, will be coordinated to locate, precisely, the continents, islands and other earthly features.

The resulting data, scientists explained, will enable them to locate any point on earth to within 100 feet of its true posi-

## Mahon Asserts **Budget Based** On Long War

WASHINGTON (AP) - Assuming that the war in Viet Nam may go on for another year, the House Appropriations Committee recommended today \$58.61 billion in new Defense Department financing for the fiscal year starting July 1.

But the committee, in a report by Chairman George H. Mahon, D-Tex., emphasized that the decision for full-year financing was "arbitrary" and "should not be construed as a prediction as to when the war will end."

"The date of the termination of the war is, of course, impossible to predict," it added. The funds recommended by

the committee, subject to House action next week, are \$946.63 million more than President Johnson requested and almost \$12 billion more than was appropriated in a comparable bill last year. Last year's initial bill was inadequate, however, and an extra \$11 billion was provided in a second measure. MAYBE NOT ENOUGH

The money in the pending bill might not be enough, the committee noted, and several billion dollars more may be needed if combat operations continue at a high level.



### This Calls For Urgent Action

This nation's rising concern with traffic safety is rabre than justified. The latest comparison available between American battle casualties in the Viet Nam war and traffic deaths on our streets and highways should help put this urgent and tragic problem in perspective.

In recent months, the death rate in traffic in the United States has been running 14 times the death rate of American soldiers in the stepped-up fighting in the jungles of Viet Nam.

During the past 12 months, when most of the American casualties in Viet Nam have occurred, the deaths among our soldiers, sailors and airmen in that war have averaged 267 a month. During the first four months of this year, the traffic deaths in this country have averaged 3,777 a month. Furthermore, the rate of traffic injuries here has run many times higher, both in number and gravity, than the wounded rate in the American expeditionary force in Viet Nam.

That is not to say that driving on our highways is "more dangerous" than fighting the war in Viet Nam. For there are tens of millions of drivers and car passengers in this country, against some 285,000 Americans in the military forces in Viet Nam. Consequently, the death rate per capita is running far greater in the war forces than among highway and street

However, if the traffic death rate continues its first four months average, more than 45,000 Americans will be killed during 1966. The figure probably will be greater than that, as the death toll is steadily rising; for example, there was a 20 per cent increase in April, 1966, over April, 1965. The Texas Department of Public Safety has predicted 31 will die in Texas alone over the July 4th holidays. To the war in Viet Nam and the war on poverty, it is past time to add a war on motorcide. The traffic death rate has reached an intolerable level.

### Tax Hike Warning A Deterrent

Despite signs that the United States' booming economic growth rate may be slowing down slightly, the Johnson administration continues to warn that inflationary forces may at any time force a tax increase. That is a sound stance, both economically and

Should the Viet Nam war accelerate inflation, despite the still faint leveling-off signs, the warnings will serve to prepare public opinion for an additional tax increase. And that should help lessen the adverse political impact on the administration in an election year, should that increase become necessary.

The continuing tax-increase warnings also should caution Congress on the economic danger of authorizing higher spending in the next fiscal year than the President has requested. Indications already are that Congress

may add \$2 billion or \$3 billion more than Johnson proposed for fiscal 1967. Finally, repeating the tax warnings may, in itself, help to contain inflation. The prospect of higher corporate taxation may move business and industry to cut back a bit more on record and rising investment-expansion rates. The possibility of higher personal income taxation should somewhat lessen soaring consumer

Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler, in his latest warning, says that the situation is still uncertain enough-both in the war's course and in economic trends-that another imminent tax increase "remains very much an open question." It would be wise for both management and families to keep their own budgets flexible enough to absorb such an increase if one cannot be avoided.

It now is evident that, even though the Soviets are trying to improve their agricultural production, they will still be dependent upon the outside world.

THE STORY IS the same in Latin America and on other continents. The Communists are spending billions of dollars annually on propaganda and subversive activities. Much of this money could better be used to buy wheat and flour for the Russian peo-


The free world could, of course, deny economic help to the Russian people, but this would mean starvation for millions. There is, on the other hand, a strong movement inside Congress to permit extended trade relations with the Soviet bloc in Eastern Europe. No serious objection is likely to be raised to this course if, at the same time, the United States government spent at least a billion dollars a year to carry messages of truth to the people behind the Iron Curtain

ONCE THE interdependence of nations is fully understood, peoples now under Communist leadership-including the people on the mainland of China, who also need wheat-would undoubtedly in the long run awaken to the fact that they alone have the supreme power to prevent war and maintain peace by cementing peace-

### First Class Is First Class-Stick To It

Tommy Hart's "rim" Monday about European rail service brings to mind another European service-hotels. When we were "over there" in the latter part of 1959 and through most of 1961, we were amazed at the efficiency of the trains, and, to a lesser extent, the hotels.

FIRST-CLASS French, German, Swiss, Austrian and Spanish hotels are, as the Volkswagen ad says, "like wonderful." The rates are not cheap by any means, except in Spain, where you feel like a thief when you pay the bill, but the service is excellent. Don't take our word about present hotel rates in Spain, though. Generallissimo Franco's country may have started tourist - tapping by this

Rooms in top-quality European hostels are squeaky-clean, the service personnel are wonderfully polite and efficient, the food is delicious (and in some places goes with the room)— it's all very nice, indeed.

HOWEVER. No one, including Premier Chou, should ever have the total misfortune of having to stay in a second- or third-class European hotel. Once, visiting Paris during the height of the "season," we were forced to stay for two weeks in a flea-bag hostelry laughingly called "second-class" by the natives. We say "forced." In a way. There were rooms at good hotels, but the rates were locked up from blat to were jacked up from high to exorbitant during tourist-time, and we didn't feel like paying through the nose.

WE HAD DRIVEN in, via non-air-

many, and were hot and tired by the time we found a room at the Hotel des Familles, located about two blocks south of the Place de la Con-

corde, we think.

An ancient pile of seven stories, the Hotel des Familles featured the world's first elevator, operated, we were told, by a "flic" on beat, by ex-galley slaves left over from the reign of the Sun King; and cold-and-colder running water. colder running water.

WE THOUGHT: Well, at least we'll get a bath. But no. When we toddled down the hall to one of the two shower rooms (located on only two floors of the hotel), we found a sign, in French, which said the water had, most unfortunately, been cut off for the moment. Same at the other shower-room. The water in the rooms was not cut off, though, and we could only conclude that the hotel proprietor was trying to save on his water bill while the crazy Americans were on hand, For the showers remained off-limits during the entire two weeks. We paid for baths at a public bath-house.

THE HOTEL des Familles did not serve meals, except for what the management referred to as breakfast. This consisted of one crescent roll of the consistency of pre-Cambrian rock and a pot of coffee (au lait on the side) which would have floated Charles de Gaulle, nose and all. They did change linen each day.

maps in the situation room in the White House are the target areas in North Viet Nam. Because the President and the President alone determines the range of the Americanbombers from day to day, he studies these maps with the intense concentration he brings to every decision large and small

His press conference warning that the war may be enlarged seemed to mean just one thing: Bombing will strike the industrialized area around Hanoi, the capital, and Haiphong, the port through which military supplies continue to come. This is what the Joint Chiefs of Staff urge with a growing insistence. BUT A STRIKE against Hanoi-Hai-

phong will risk, as has been clearly spelled out in a half-dozen memoranda passing across the President's desk, greatly expanding the war. That risk is one reason the President and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara have until now resisted the pressure of the joint chiefs.

As with so many aspects of this undeclared war, the American public has not been told the nature of that risk. It is clearly spelled out on the maps the President studies with such

THEY SHOW three air bases close

to Hanol and three around Haiphong. The largest base, in the Hanoi area, is Phuc Yen, which can handle MIG-21 supersonic aircraft. Phu Yen is 15 miles north-northwest of Hanoi and 81 miles from the nearest point on Red China's border. That means, at supersonic speeds, that China is only minutes away.

The other two fields are Bae Mai, hree miles south of Hanoi, and Gia Lam, two miles south of the capital city. Each has a potential for taking jets, according to intelligence esti-

TWO AIR FIELDS for the defense of Haiphong are Kien An and Cat Bi.

WASHINGTON-On the top secret Potentially they can take jets, but it is doubted that either field can handle them at the present time. A third big field, Kep, is in the Hanoi-Haiphong complex, 32 miles northeast of Hanoi along a railroad line. Kep can take jets and probably the advanced MIG-21s. A half-dozen times bridges on the nearby rail line have been hit.

> The important fact, however, is that up to now not one of these bases has been hit. Befere the oil and other installations in and around Haiphong can be bombed-leaving out Hanoi, with the potential of large civilian casualties-the bases and the related ground-to-air missile sites must in large part be neutralized. BUT WHAT HAPPENS at the first

> radar warning of an impending attack on the air bases? The MIGs take off for bases already prepared just across the border in Red China a few minutes away. From there they would have virtually the same capability for attacking American bombers and fighter - bombers. At that point, beyond a doubt, the pressure from the military would be turned on to take out the Chinese bases. And from the viewpoint of military logic, trying to secure the American strike against the Hanoi-Haiphong industrial complex, this pressure would be hard

> THAT IS THE warning from those who fear the risk of an enlarged Asian war. They believe that if China received a direct blow, wiping out some of its air bases, it would feel impelled to retaliate with a massive reprisal. What form the reprisal would take they do not presume to say.

An end to the war by bombing has popular appeal, as Republicans, notably Rep. Gerald Ford and Richard Nixon, are demonstrating. President Johnson, studying his maps, can feel the hot breath of the bombersmilitary and political—on his neck.

## Speculation Is Raised On Fidel's Status

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) - Mention of Fidel Castro has been strangely missing lately in broadcasts over the government-controlled radio in Cuba.

Miami monitors of Havana Radio have not heard the Cuban throughout this week. They recalled only sparse mention of him since he was reported in-specting Hurricane Alma's damage June 8.

That contrasts sharply with former daily mention of Castro in newscasts and other reports.

It also coincides with widespread speculation as to Castro's status. Robert McCloskey, U. S. State Department press officer, fanned the conjectures by commenting on Castro's "uncharacteristic silence."

But exiles, often gullible to the numerous rumors about things happening to their enemy No. 1, are mostly wary of this one. They point out that Castro has played hard to find before.

One of the prime minister's most vociferous critics, his sister Juanita, who lives here in self-imposed exile, has re-mained silent on speculation as to his whereabouts.

Castro, who likes to make speeches, made his last broadcast address on May 1. He called President Johnson of the greatest criminals in history." He told his people that Cuba's vital sugar crop would be small.

On June 4, Castro was reported seen on television among officials attending a function at which President Osvaldo Dorticos spoke.

BELMONT, Mass. (AP) — A school for pupils from a hospital ending more than half its graduates on to college, where they hope to match the records of last year's seniors.

It is the Arlington School, on the grounds of McLean Hospi-tal, a division of the Massachusetts General Hospital.

SUCCESSFUL Dr. Francis de Marneffe called the school "one of the most successful ventures ever undertaken by the hospital" in his commencement address Thursday.

He is director of the hospital, where the experiment in the education of the emotionally disturbed started five years ago. Since then, 25 of the 75 graduates have gone to college. All eleven seniors graduated Thursday, and seven of them look forward to college careers. Of the same number who went

on last year, six of them posted averages of "c" or better. Headmaster John F. Dunn believes the school is the only one of its type in the country a college preparatory course with regular teachers and structured classes, operating in a hospital.
