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





# **Woman Hurt** In Shoot-Out

POST FALLS, Idaho (AP)-Lillian Jo Ramus, the young woman who charged out of a motel room, spraying bullets from a gold-plated M1 carbine at policemen and FBI agents, lay seriously wounded today but was responding to treatment.

One FBI agent was wounded in the shoot-out just before midnight Saturday before the 28year-old woman fell with bullet wounds in the head and left hip. After emergency surgery at a hospital in Spokane, Wash., 20 miles away, she was taken off the critical list.

FIRED SHOT "After we told her to come out, she opened and closed the motel door several times, then fired a single shot inside the room, apparently to make us think she had shot herself," said FBI special agent Robert Rockwell of Coeur d'Alene, who was shot in the leg.

"We told the officers over the bull horn to stay back, then she opened the door and started firing," he said. There were "al-

# Over \$2 Million Goes Into Stanton's Program

By DOROTHIE ERWIN

STANTON, Tex. (AP)- The welcome sign on US 80 says this West Texas Town has 3,000 friendly folks.

The 1960 census found 2,228 people in Stanton and the Texas Almanac's 1965 estimate was

More than \$2.1 million dollars in federal urban renewal money is being spent here-between \$700 and \$1,000 for every man, woman and child in town, depending on whose figures you

Stanton is surrounded by cotton and sorghum fields and ranchlands. Cotton gins and rämshackle Mexican and Negro houses line the south side of the highway and the Texas & Pacific tracks, and the rest of the town is north of the tracks.

Here a bank, city hall, county library, car lots, farm equipment dealers and shops are dominated by the shiny dome of the Martin County Court-

So Stanton looks much like many other West Texas towns —except for the streets.

The excellent paving in residential areas is the first impressive sign that \$3 million is being spent here, including a public housing project separate from urban renewal funding.



### Delayed But Not Doomed

Some will in envy call it the good luck which Lyndon B. Johnson seems to possess. Others will call it good judgment and a refusal to be panicked into a premature decision.

Whether it is luck or good judgment, President Johnson seems to have been spared the painful necessity of raising taxes in a congressional election year. Benedictions from Democrats throughout the land will fall upon him like autumn leaves.

The threat of runaway inflation kept the administration's fiscal policy experts on their toes. At some point a raise in taxes might be needed to cool the inflationary fever symptoms. But automobile sales have declined.

Housing construction has fallen to the lowest level in three and a half years. There was an increase in unemployment last month-possibly due primarily to students on vacation trying to enter the job market. Against this slowing down of the economy, however, corporations are spending record amounts for new plant and equipment and a shortage of skilled workers has become almost chronic. Then, too, the rising tempo of the war in Viet Nam is certain to bring a substantial increase in defense spending and with it heightened business activ-

Thus a tax increase has been postponed. But it would be foolish to conclude that the need for increased tax revenue is passed. The need, in fact, will become irresistible, probably early in 1967, not so much to dampen the fires of inflation but to finance the increasing costs of the war in Viet

### A Pinch Of Caution

While the optimistic notes of recent days in the wake of increased bombing and other pressures on North Viet Nam are encouraging, the words of caution uttered with these need to

be underlined. Close observers have been saying for some time that the Cong and North Viet Nam were losing some of their zest for the attack against South Viet Nam. The tide has been turning and some of the effectiveness of a novel approach by guerrilla forces has been counteracted

Still, this has not yet brought North Viet Nam to the point of considering negotiations. There is no assurance that they will now, although the odds are increased in ratio with the hope-

lessness of the situation. However, it would be unwise to count chickens before they hatch, even if officials in highest posts do take cognizance of a weariness on the part of aggressors: We are engaged in a grim task, and it would be well to regard it as just that until there is some deed to the contrary.

# Congress Avoids The Strike Issue

WASHINGTON-Congress is away on vacation, but the nation is face to face with a problem that should have been solved long ago-how to prevent strikes that inflect widespread dam-

The threat of a nationwide strike on major airlines has been before the country for some time. Other work stoppages involving losses of millions of dollars to innocent bystanders have occurred, but Congress, which has been under the influence of laborunion contributions to political campaigns, has refused to legislate a formula to prevent strikes that adversely affect the public interest.

FIVE BIG AIRLINES are involved in the current crisis, and they handle two-thirds of the air-passenger business of the country. While the five lines employ only 94,000 workers, they represent 64 per cent of all airline employment, and the five companies handle more than 60 per cent of the country's airline traffic as measured in revenue passenger miles. These lines serve 231 cities in the United States and foreign countries, and the United States mails are, of course, delayed when planes stop moving over such large areas.

UNDER THE Railway Labor Act, which embraces airlines; provision has been made for emergency boards and cooling-off periods. But all these have been exhausted in the present disputé. A fact-finding board has submitted its recommendations, which the airlines are ready to accept as a basis for negotiation. The labor union, however, has turned them down as

THE UNITED STATES has experienced several painful strikes in recent months, and the facts have been fully presented from time to time. The legislators here, however, continue to show a strange indifference to the whole question of changing the existing statutes on labor-management

THE PLAN didn't work any better than our own Area Redevelopment program worked under the New Frontier. The recent trend in Western Europe has been to relocate not the industries, but the workers. Since last year, the U.S. Labor Department has also been experimenting in people-

OFFICIALS WITH whom I have talked about the pilot programs prefer to be nameless. The subject is touchy, and the programs may flop. It is touchy because the government is competing with business and with labor unions in the efforts at job-finding. Also, it is touchy because the will-to-work among Americans is racially and regionally uneven, and because the only way to bring people to jebs is to move them into our already overstuffed cities.

AT THIS WRITING, people-moving has involved trial runs in 11 states at modest cost. Congress was skeptical enough to require that only persons who were "involuntarily" unemployed be eligible for loans and grants to move to another area.

Labor Department officials started with a sampling of 9,800 persons who were jobless and presumably jobseeking. But when these

screened and interviewed, it turned out that close to half of them (3,200 as against 3,600) did not qualify under the congressional language as "involuntary unemployed individuals . qualified to perform the work for which they are being employed.'

THERE FOLLOWED another shakedown test. Applicants were asked: "If provided with relocation assistance to move, discussed prior to this interview, would you be willing to move to another area for a job?" One-third (1,059 persons) of the eligibles (3,600) gave negative answers. This last phase of the elimination left roughly 2,500 out of the original selection of 9,800 who were thought to be job-seeking and job-capable. Then, the Labor Department officials began to scout for suitable openings. They did this mostly by answering newspaper help-wanted ads, which might well have been done by the job-seekers in the first place. It developed that there were some 800 openings, of which 558 were useful in placing the applicants - Of these, 239 were right in the areas where the jobless persons had been examined, and 319 were in nearby areas.

THE 319 willing-to-work-and-willingto-move persons were relocated in that many jobs, and at the latest report 87 per cent of them had made

THE MONTHLY figures on how many people have jobs and what percentage of the labor force says it can't find jobs as been a chief reason in recent years first for making money easy and now for making credit tight. The idea was this: easy credit would help the economy expand and make jobs for the disturbingly high number that didn't have them; and then when the economy started to overheat, tight money would help ward off a bust that would cost many jobs.

The large number of people out of work in 1963 and 1964 the jobless rate of the monthly statistics was the prime talking point for cutting taxes. And the record number now employed and spending lots of money is one reason for talking about raising taxes. The reasoning: a tax cut would give consumers and business more to spend and thus make jobs; and now the idea is that the recent exuberant spending and speculating may have to be curbed by raising taxes again...

THE JOBLESS rate plays a part in purely business policy decisions. As one guage of economic health, the employment statistic - and particularly the trend it is taking - can help determine whether firms play things close to the vest or go all out for expansion.

So important has the unemployment statistic become in recent years in economic and political thinking that it is closely associated with many of the Great Society programs, especially those with the accent on helping people who find it hardest to get jobs and hold them.

> BUT IT ISN'T quite that simple or automatic. Booming prosperity and lots of jobs also can bring problems. And that's what is worrying business and government leaders

The low jobless rate can mean shortages in some skilled labor fields. The appetite of labor for higher wages grows fast when the scarcity is the supply of labor rather than the number of jobs. And big wage boosts can feed inflation.

### WHAT OTHERS SAY






