Byrds Facing Stiff Races

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — The conservative Byrd organization faces the stiffest opposition yet to its political power from the moderate-liberal wing of the Democratic party in Tuesday's primary.

Virginia voters, with the unique chance to pick both Senate candidates, have a choice from among the two men in office, Sens. A. Willis Robertson and Harry F. Byrd Jr. and challengers with state legislature experience who have come on strong.

A third race of almost parallel interest is for the 8th District House seat where Rep. Howard W. Smith, a powerful congressional figure as chairman of the House Rules Committee, is — at 83 — seeking a 19th term.

A challenger nearly 40 years Smith's junior, George Rawlings Jr., a Fredericksburg attorney, has gauged the old conservative to do what he has seldom had to do in recent times — get out and campaign.

Byrd, who succeeded his retired and now gravely ill father last November by appointment, is opposed by Armistead L. Boothe, a north Virginia attorney who served with Byrd in the state senate.

Robertson, at 79 the same age as Byrd Sr., is opposed by state Sen. William B. Spong Jr. Spong is rated as the strongest possibility to upset any of the three men running under the banner of the party organization established by Harry Byrd Sr. when he was governor of Virginia and the controlling faction in state politics for 40 years.

The factor of age against vigor and youthful outlook doesn't apply to the race between Byrd and Boothe for the four-year unexpired term of Byrd's father as it does to the full-term contest between Robertson and Spong or the House race between Smith and Rawlings.

Boothe, 58, is older than Byrd who is 51. But Boothe argues that Byrd's record is not attuned to modern times. Byrd, heavily favored in the campaign, has seldom replied to Boothe's assertions.

The Boothe-Byrd campaign came to a premature end. Last Thursday Byrd canceled the rest of his campaign so he could go to his father's bedside at Berryville where the former senator is in a coma with a malignant brain tumor.

The following day, Boothe canceled the remainder of his schedule, in deference to Byrd's position and out of respect for Byrd Sr.

Robertson's age — as Smith's — has been a constant campaign factor. And the senior senator — a physical fitness buff — frequently opens his own talks with a reference to it.

"I couldn't have obtained all this essential Senate seniority if I were only as old as my opponent," he told a Richmond audience.

President Headed Back After Long Holiday

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson headed back to Washington today after a long holiday that coincided with the July 4th recess of Congress.

His plane, carrying Mrs. Johnson, their daughter Luci and Luci's fiancé, Pat Nugent, and Rep. Henry B. Gonzales, D-Tex., took off at 10:36 a.m. EDT.

The President and Mrs. Johnson flew to their ranch home some 70 miles north of here June 30 after appearances in Omaha, Neb., and Des Moines, Iowa.

The Johnsons Sunday drove into Johnson City, 15 miles from the ranch, for services at the First Christian Church. Then they led two bus loads of newsmen and photographers to the President's rebuilt birthplace about a mile from his present ranch home.

The birthplace, a tiny frame structure sitting amid post oak and pecan trees, will be opened to the public Wednesday on a one-month trial basis. If enough tourists show up for a free-of-charge look, the house may be kept open year-round except when the President is at the ranch.

Johnson was born in or near the site of the building on Aug. 27, 1908. He lived there until he moved to Johnson City with his parents at the age of 5.

Like the boyhood home in Johnson City, already a public museum, restoration of the birthplace was financed by the Johnson City Foundation, which gets its money through annual tax-free contributions by the President and Mrs. Johnson and their two daughters, Lynda and Luci.

Church Of Presidents Razed

WASHINGTON (AP) — A leveled to make room for an office building. Chalked signs on the brown stone front of the church proclaimed the destruction and addition: "sale — books, mirrors, paintings."

This was one of Washington's best-known churches today on the eve of its demolition. It was the church of at least eight presidents, most recently of Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Just seven blocks north of the White House, National Presbyterian — with its stately Romanesque bell tower — is to be sold — to a Baptist church in nearby Alexandria, Va.

Upstairs there is more litter. Papers tell of the history of the church — some in a personal way.

An old letter lying in a pile starts: "Dear Frances: There was a splendid looking fellow at the Lenten dinner — the other night." Nearby, a file folder, stuffed with papers, is labeled "July-Dec. 1954, paid bills, vouchers." A couple of old women's shoes lie nearby alongside the mound of papers and a rubber stamp saying: "For deposit only to the account of the National Presbyterian Church."

But the razing of the 80-year-old building doesn't mean the end of National Presbyterian. It's moving farther out to residential Northwest Washington.

"It's not anything new to have a new building for this congregation," said The Rev. Dr. Edward L. R. Elson, senior minister. The new building will be fifth since the church was organized in 1795.

The Rev. Dr. Elson noted that all of the historical fixtures — including the pews used by presidents — will be in the new building.

President Eisenhower was the last president to attend services regularly at National Presbyterian. Others included Andrew Jackson, James Polk, Franklin Pierce, James Buchanan, Grover Cleveland, Benjamin Harrison and U.S. Grant. Most of the others worshipped there on occasion — though some in earlier buildings.

King Leads Rally For Chicago Area

CHICAGO (AP) — Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Sunday brushed past signs calling for “black power” to post the demands of his Chicago civil rights movement on the front door of City Hall.

The posting came after a heat-defying antislavery rally in Chicago’s Soldier Field and a traffic-halting march through the Loop. Better housing, more jobs and better schools were among the demands.

COMMON FRONT
Earlier, King linked arms with civil rights leaders, including Floyd McKissick, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality, to form a common front in the struggle for Negro equality.

McKissick, who at first had said he might not be able to attend the rally, told the crowd of some 35,000 that the concept of black power had been misinterpreted, that it meant only that Negroes “have a right to determine their own futures.”

He called for a “united black consumer bloc that would be able to strike at any concern,” and ended his speech with a pledge to come to Dr. King’s aid at any time — “He’s my brother.”

SIX STEPS

GOP Proposes U.N. Changes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans proposed today six steps to strengthen and modernize the United Nations, including a special 1,000-man brigade of technicians and experts for emergency peacekeeping.

The proposals were included in a report adopted by the Republican Coordinating Committee at a meeting June 27-28 and released today.

The report criticized what it called the decline of U.S. leadership in the United Nations as “but another measure of the opportunities thrown away by the present administration.”

Saying the United Nations should have “the active support of the people and the government of the United States,” the report added:

“Republicans take a realistic view of what the United Nations can and cannot do. We do not believe, as do some, that it is a panacea for the problems of the world; nor do we believe it works against our national interest. Experience has shown that the U.N. on many occasions has been useful in easing international tensions and in implementing our own foreign policy objectives.”

The report recommended consideration of these points to strengthen and modernize the organization:

Expansion of the military advisers’ group in the office of the secretary-general.

A plan proposed by several GOP members of Congress to create “a first brigade of 1,000 technicians and logistical experts in a peacekeeping force” for use in emergencies.

Screening applications for membership to determine whether the applicant state “can support the full responsibilities of membership” and establishing a special status in the United Nations for certain small independent units that could not support full membership responsibilities.

An all-out effort to set up a dependable system for financing the organization.

Nationalism Stirring In Romania For Own Destiny

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Nationalism, the powerful force that has often brought trouble to the Balkans, is stirring today in Romania.

The nation’s Communist leaders are cultivating the nationalist spirit to unite the nation in a determination to seek its own destiny without interference from the Soviet Union.

Romanian nationalism has proved a headache for the Kremlin, which has dominated this part of the Balkans for a generation.

In theory, Communists deplore nationalism, which runs counter to the Red credo that the workers of the world should unite and break down national barriers.

Romanian nationalism manifested itself several years ago in a rebellion against Moscow’s economic plans. The Soviets wanted this land of rich wheat fields and oil wells to specialize in some products and import others, tying itself to Soviet economic needs.

Romania refused and made some pointed remarks about it being uncommunitarian for one country to try to exploit another.

With success on the economic front, explosive field of territorial claims.

The extensive overlapping of linguistic groups in the Balkans — people speaking Romanian living among those speaking Hungarian, for instance — has been the cause of much bloodshed.

In 1964 Romania published some old writings of the Communist prophet, Karl Marx, saying that Bessarabia should

be part of Romania. Before World War I, Bessarabia was in czarist Russia but its people spoke Romanian, Ukrainian and other languages. After that war, Romania got Bessarabia from the Soviet Union and another named Bukovina from the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

Stalin, with Adolf Hitler’s approval, demanded Bessarabia back in June, 1940, during the two-year Soviet-Nazi alliance before Hitler attacked the Soviet Union. Stalin also demanded part of Bukovina, although it had never been Russian.

Weak and defenseless, Romania yielded.
The Communist regime installed here after World War II did not talk about this. But in 1964, documents began to appear here to show that the majority of the people in Bessarabia and Bukovina still speak Romanian. These areas are now border areas near Soviet Ukraine and Soviet Ukraine.

In a speech May 7, the general secretary of the Romanian Communist Party, Nicolae Ceausescu, indirectly blamed Soviet leadership of the world Communist movement for hurting Romania in the period before the beginning of World War II.

Ceausescu blamed the Moscow-controlled party for calling Romania an imperialist state holding oppressed people in occupied territory. This apparently meant the party dutifully reported Stalin’s desire to get Bessarabia back.

A few days after Ceausescu spoke, Soviet Communist Party Secretary General Leonid I. Brezhnev came to Bucharest. The visit seems to have been hasty, possibly made because of the speech, which also contained criticism of all military alliances.

The official description of Ceausescu’s talks with Brezhnev made them sound rather cool. Ceausescu then went off to border areas near Bessarabia and Bukovina to recall Romanian history rather pointedly. Brezhnev was here again last

week for a summit conference with the Soviet bloc nations. One of the main items of business was strengthening the command structure of the East European military alliance, the Warsaw Pact.

Romania apparently blocked the Soviet plan because it did not want to relinquish any control over its own 200,000-man army.

Plane Crashes Boost State's Weekend Toll

Texas Violent Deaths
By The Associated Press

Nine persons died in two private plane crashes in Texas Sunday, boosting the state's weekend violent death toll to 39. Ten other persons died in traffic mishaps, a low total for the state, drownings claimed five lives and nine persons died of gunshot or stab wounds.

The Associated Press tabulation began at 6 p.m. Friday and ended at midnight Sunday.

In the plane crashes, four persons died when a Cessna 210 burst into flames after crashing in a field near Jacksboro, and five died when a Bonanza

crashed while attempting to land at the Andrew Airport.

FOUR DIE
Killed in the crash 10 miles northwest of Jacksboro were four Los Alamos, N. M., residents. They were identified as Dr. James E. Sears, about 43, a dentist; his wife, Valina Bardwell Sears, 41; their son, Kenneth Sears, about 10; and Louis D. Kilgore, 41.

They were on a flight from Dallas to Santa Fe, N. M. The crash happened about 9:30 a.m. Four men and a boy were killed about 4:30 p.m. when a single engine plane veered sharply to the left off the runway and crashed at Andrews. The five, all from Andrews, were identified as: Clifton McGlory, 30, of Houston, was missing and presumed drowned Sunday after he slipped off an inner tube as he and his wife, Barbara, 27, floated on in-

ner tubes near Galveston's west beach.

James C. O'Neil, 45, of Galveston, apparently drowned while fishing off the Bolivar Peninsula, east of Galveston Island. His body later was washed ashore.

Charles Ray Bell, 12, of Houston, drowned Sunday in Lake Houston.

Glen Arthur Young, 23, of Fort Worth, was shot to death Sunday as he stood in front of a Fort Worth grocery store.

Guadalupe Perez Jr., 31, of Santa Rosa, died Sunday following a two-car crash at an intersection of two country roads three miles north of La Feria.

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Woman Hurt In Shoot-Out

POST FALLS, Idaho (AP)—Lillian Jo Ramus, the young woman who charged out of a motel room, spraying bullets from a gold-plated M1 carbine at policemen and FBI agents, lay seriously wounded today but was responding to treatment.

One FBI agent was wounded in the shoot-out just before midnight Saturday before the 28-year-old woman fell with bullet wounds in the head and left hip. After emergency surgery at a hospital in Spokane, Wash., 20 miles away, she was taken off the critical list.

FIRED SHOT
"After we told her to come out, she opened and closed the motel door several times, then fired a single shot inside the room, apparently to make us think she had shot herself," said FBI special agent Robert Rockwell of Coeur d'Alene, who was shot in the leg.

"We told the officers over the bull horn to stay back, then she opened the door and started firing," he said. There were "almost a hundred" officers surrounding the motel, said the wife of the owner, Mrs. David Doty.

The sawed-off M1 carbine had been fitted with a pistol handle so it could be used as a hand gun. Her wild flurry of shooting sent bullets through a screen door into Rockwell's car and flattened the tires on her own automobile.

OPENED FIRE
The officers then opened fire with pistols, rifles and a shotgun. Miss Ramus fell to the ground, screaming. Police found a loaded .38-caliber revolver in her clothing, and a .22-caliber rifle and a .44 magnum carbine inside the room, along with ammunition for all of the weapons and a fountain-pen tear-gas gun.

Authorities had been looking for Miss Ramus since last Sept. 13, when she and Johan M. Bosley, 29, of Spokane, both held on forgery charges, used smuggled-in hacksaw blades to saw through the bars on a cell window in the Spokane city jail.

They jumped from their third-floor cell window to the roof of the men's quarters on the second floor, then two stories to the ground. Miss Bosley was seriously injured in the last jump and was left behind.

COUNTERFEITING
Miss Ramus and three other persons were accused of counterfeiting \$40,000 worth of \$20 bills, and printing \$5,000 worth of fake unemployment, welfare and railroad pay checks. She also is charged with armed robbery in the \$1,325 holdup of a market in a Seattle suburb.

Officers had watched the motel room all Saturday afternoon, hoping she might come outside. Her brother and an unidentified man visited her for several hours. Police said she apparently had returned to the Northwest to visit relatives.

Namu Dies In His Pen

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—Namu, the gentle world-famed killer whale who became a motion picture star and a subject for many scientific studies, is dead.

Ted Griffin, who bought the 4½-ton, 20-foot whale from two Namu, B.C., fishermen and brought him to Seattle for a marine attraction, said the friendly beast apparently drowned when he dove under a float at his waterfront pen and got caught in a net Saturday night.

Griffin said Namu had been acting odd for a week or so. He said summer is the whale mating season and that the big mammal, which had to come up for air from time to time, may have been trying to escape when he became entangled.

It was the first time a killer whale had been kept alive for any length of time in captivity.

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Condemnation Suit To Begin Tuesday

It was doubtful Monday morning if any of the civil cases set Monday afternoon in Howard County Court would go to trial as scheduled, Judge Lee Porter said.

He added that plans are to begin trial Tuesday of the condemnation action brought by the county to acquire three acres of land needed for FM 700 right of way.

Monday afternoon, he said, several motions on the cases were to be heard and outcome of these would determine the course of the court later in the week.

The condemnation action on Tuesday is against Tarbox and Gossett, owners of the three acres the state and county needs as right of way for the proposed extension of FM 700 west from US 87. The land is adjacent to US 87 and FM 700 on the west side of the former highway.

W. H. Eysen Jr., attorney for the landowners, said that his clients have asked they be paid a fair price for their land, and they contend the offer made by the county of 90 cents a square foot is not equitable. The owners have asked for about \$150.

This is based, Eysen said, on the price paid for land across the road called the Brown Estate. The county, Eysen alleges, paid more than \$3.30 a square foot for this land, and he said his clients feel their property should have a comparative value.

The trial in the county court will be before a jury. The county will be represented by Gil Jones, former district attorney, who has been engaged to appear for the commissioners. He will be assisted by County Attorney Dee Jon Davis.

A National Guard weapons carrier was used by police to rescue stranded motorists from their flooded-out cars in the West Texas city.

"We're rescuing them all over town," said Police Sgt. Billy Ray.

Injured was Police Chief Harold Wallace. He was taken to a local hospital for treatment of injuries he suffered in an auto crash during the cloudburst.

Winds were unofficially clocked at 75 miles per hour and some golf ball-size hail reportedly fell in sections of the city.

The storm hit the oil city about 6 p.m.

Five inches of rain fell on the Dick Jones farm, about seven miles east of Plainview during a two-hour period Sunday. Jones said some hail also fell in a wide area, but no damage was reported.

An airborne tornado was sighted near Plainview and severe weather also struck portions of the Panhandle - South Plains area.

Wichita Falls received 2.70 inches of rain. The rain, cooling for the North Texas city, was much needed.

Heavy hail was reported in the area around Plain and Silverton and some scattered showers were reported near Lufkin.

Forecasters called for the shower activity and thunderstorms to continue in most sections of West Texas, but the rest of the state was to have clear to partly cloudy skies and warm temperatures.

Heavy thunderstorms rumbled through the Ohio Valley and parts of the Great Lakes Monday in the wake of tornadoes that ripped through five midwestern states.

Although storms caused extensive damage in parts of northeastern Illinois and southwestern Wisconsin the beneficial rains brought much-needed relief to parched areas.

Tornadoes caused much damage Sunday night and early Monday in Minnesota and four other midwestern states. Violent weather also lashed parts of the nation from Idaho to New England.

No deaths or injuries were reported, but one twister demolished a Wadena, Minn., home.

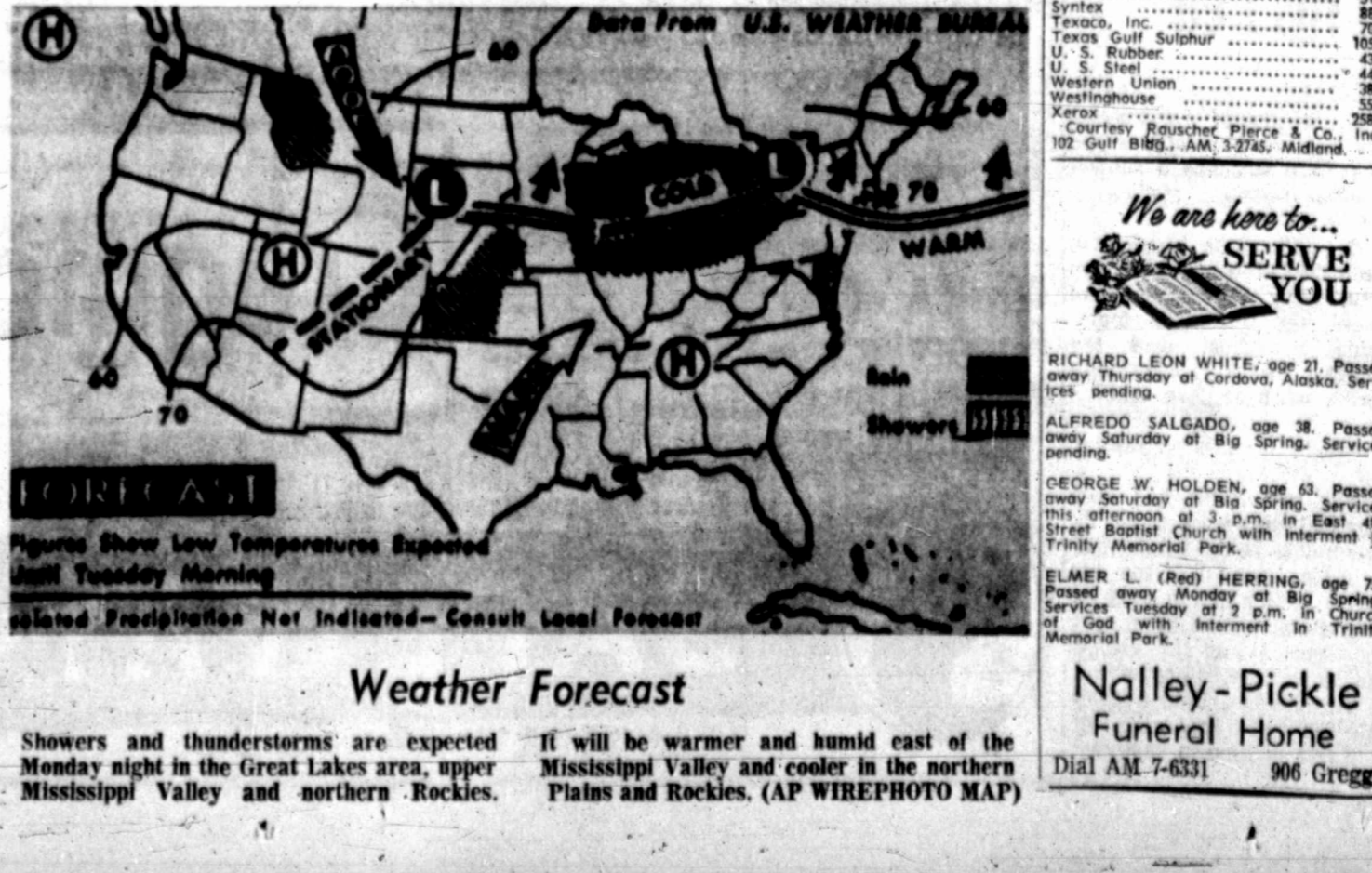

Palmer's Rites Held Today

Jessie Palmer, 63, who struggled to death July 5 after being struck on the head with a club, was buried Monday morning in City Cemetery.

No relatives of the deceased have been found.

The body was kept at the Nalley-Pickle Funeral Home since July 1 in an effort to locate kinsmen.

Graveside rites were conducted at the burial today.

Meantime, Avery Foster, 34, who is accused of striking Palmer with a club in a brawl on the night of July 5, is being held in the Howard County jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond. Both men are Negroes.

It had been thought at first that Palmer's death had been directly caused by the blow alleged to have been administered by Foster. However, an autopsy showed that the actual cause of death was strangulation—the victim apparently regurgitated food as a result of the blow and, being unconscious, suffocated.

Wayne Burns, district attorney, said that he was holding Foster on a charge of murder regardless of the autopsy showing. He said that the strangling, he felt, was the direct result of the blow on the head.

Makes Branding Calves A Lot Less Painful

LITTLEFIELD, Tex. (AP)—Cattle branding took on a new look at the famed Yellowstone Ranch recently when George White showed High Plains area cattlemen and ranchers how to "freeze brand" calves.

The method, developed by a U.S. Agriculture Department veterinarian but used by White before the agency announced its discovery, does away with the use of hot branding irons.

A copper branding iron is placed in a solution of dry ice and alcohol. The iron is cooled to 95 degrees below zero before it is placed on a clipped side of the animal for 20 to 30 seconds.

The freezing solution kills cells producing pigment in skin and hair. When the brand thaws, the hair falls out.

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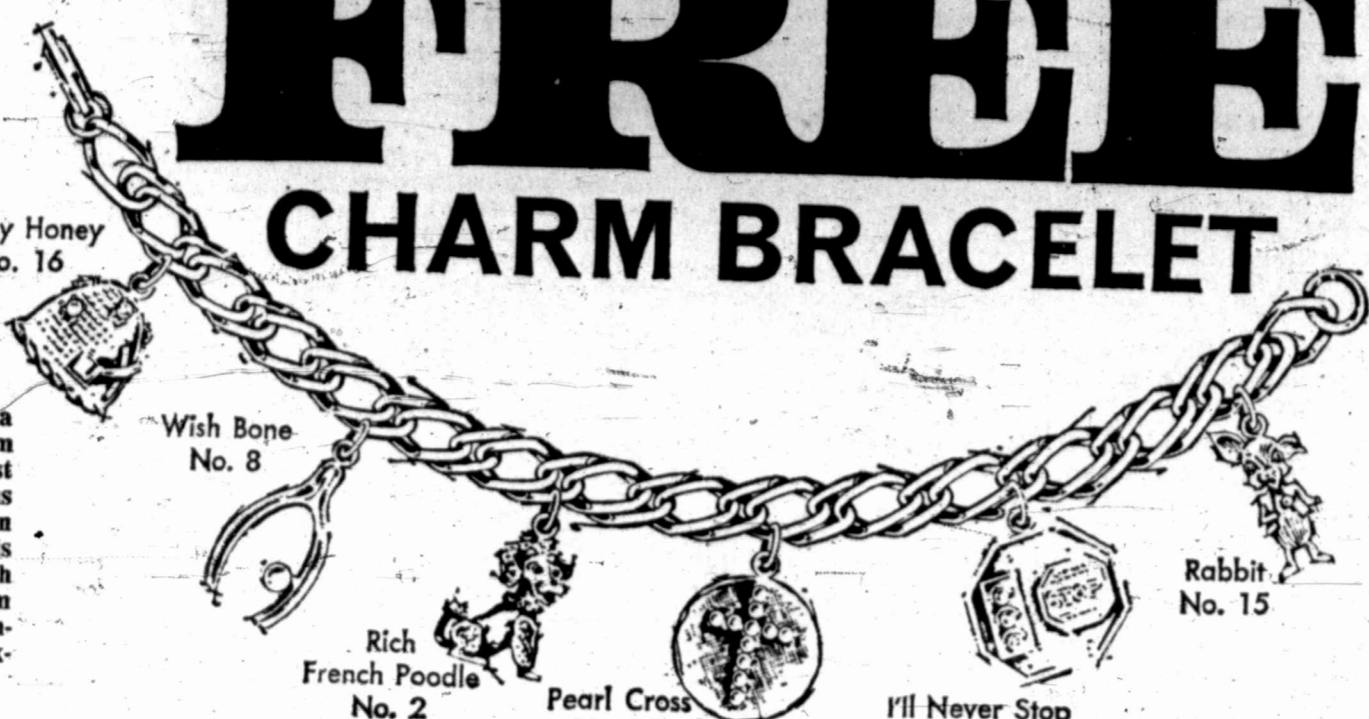

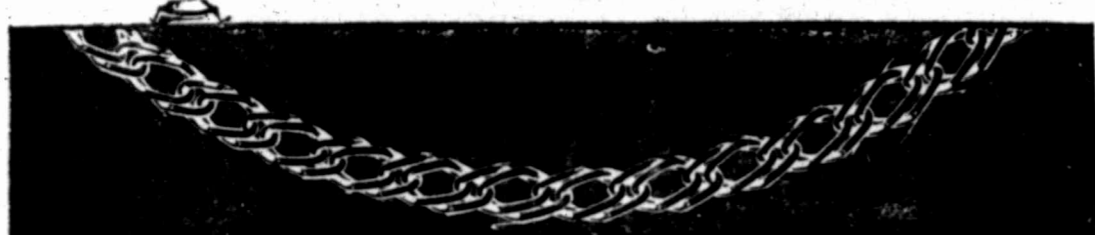

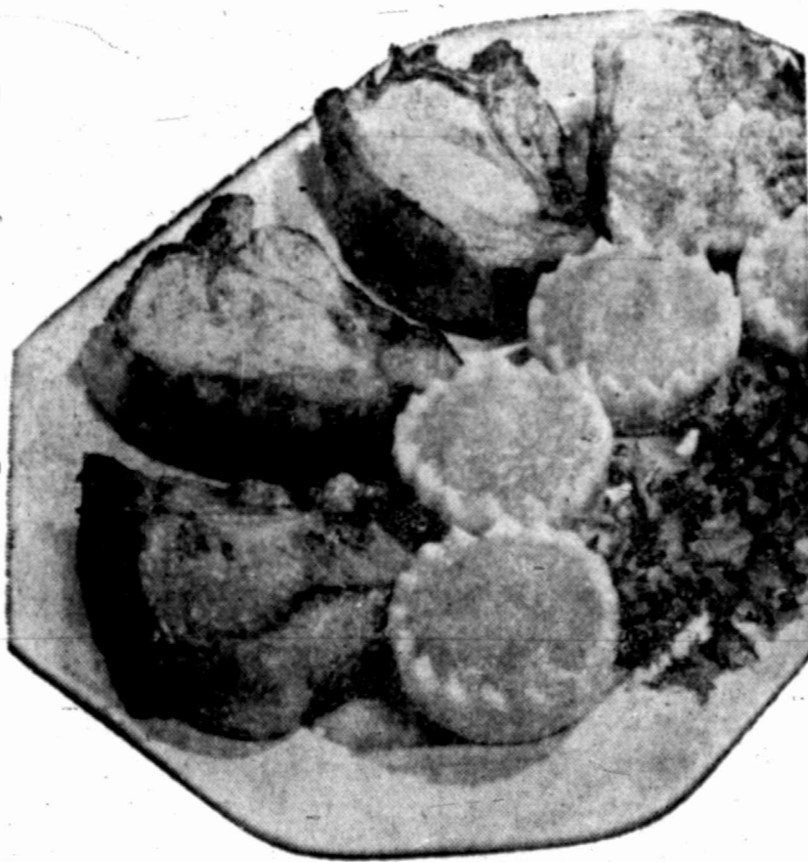

URBAN RENEWAL

Over \$2 Million Goes Into Stanton's Program

By DOROTHE ERWIN
STANTON, Tex. (AP)—The welcome sign on US 80 says this West Texas town has 3,000 friendly folks.

The 1960 census found 2,228 people in Stanton and the Texas Almanac's 1965 estimate was 2,690.

More than \$2.1 million dollars in federal urban renewal money is being spent here—between \$700 and \$1,000 for every man, woman and child in town, depending on whose figures you like.

Stanton is surrounded by cotton and sorghum fields and ranchlands. Cotton gins and ramshackle Mexican and Negro houses line the south side of the highway and the Texas & Pacific tracks, and the rest of the town is north of the tracks.

Here a bank, city hall, county library, car lots, farm equipment dealers and shops are dominated by the shiny dome of the Martin County Courthouse.

So Stanton looks much like many other West Texas towns—except for the streets.

The excellent paving in residential areas is the first impressive sign that \$3 million is being spent here, including a public housing project separate from urban renewal funding.

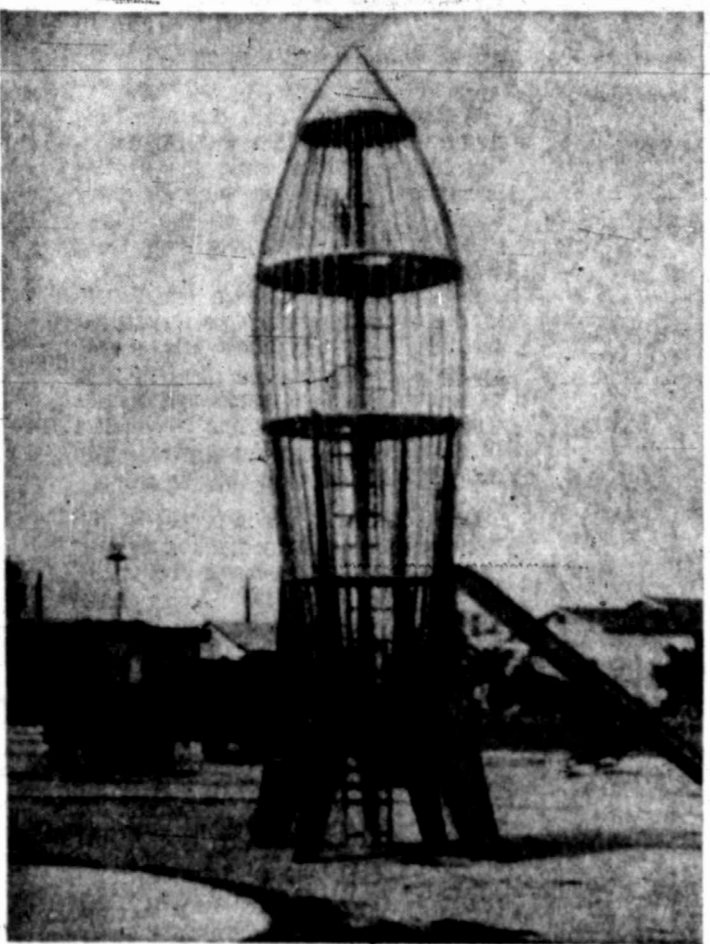
The housing program—78 new units under construction—will give priority to persons displaced by slum clearance. The town's master plan is to be complete by 1970.

Stanton residents paid most of the paving bill themselves, with assessments against their property. But with this, a city bond issue, school construction and other locally-financed improvements, they gained credits toward the city's share in both urban renewal projects.

Stanton began in 1880 as a German farm community. Its streets are named for saints and it once boasted a large convent. In 1900 Stanton sent the champion wheat to the Chicago World's Fair. Then the oil years broadened the town's economy.

In 1958, Stanton voted for urban renewal and the first project was started in 1962 on a \$587,279 federal grant. This project is nearly complete and includes paving of 145 blocks, a new children's playground, water and sewer improvements and the buying of 35 substandard dwellings for clearance.

The second project, with a federal grant of \$1,561,704 (m) commenced in February with the signing of a federal con-

This 162-acre project includes 108 homes and 12 business buildings, some of them now vacant. Substandard structures will be bought and cleared. The owners can keep title to the land if they agree to build homes to standards. Other houses will be rehabilitated. The area includes about 80 per cent of Stanton's Mexicans and Negroes.

Here the gins scatter cotton lint. Negotiations are under way with the gin owners for relocating the gins outside of town.

An old lake bed south of the tracks will be excavated. Now, it will not hold the runoff from a heavy rain, and sometimes this can mean flooding downtown.

The plan is for six injection wells to be put in to return rainwater to water-bearing sand. The perimeter of the 16-acre excavation will be developed as a park.

Also planned are more water

and sewer lines, paving a ball park and a playground.

In the first project, 11 families and five individuals were relocated, and all stayed in

White, who is a Ford dealer, says, "I was opposed to federal government subsidies, but when the people voted for this and it was going to be put into effect, I studied it and decided it could be done right."

"Stanton's plan has been the community's own," says White. "The federal government has never told us what to do."

"The only way that cities can clean up blight is by a national effort. If we want it, we have to pay for it. The people who own this kind of property certainly can't do it."

One outspoken opponent of the spending boom in Stanton is Jim Tom, chairman of the board of First National, the town's only bank.

Tom says the 1958 election was not well publicized and voters did not understand urban renewal.

"It's just too much money to be spent in a place like this," says Tom. "The federal government can't give you anything without taking it from someone else. Every community should stand on its own."

India Rounds Up Leftists

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—The Indian government rounded up more leftists today in Uttar Pradesh, India's most populous state, in an effort to prevent a threatened general strike. More than 500 persons were put behind bars.

The strike was called for Tuesday by leftists seeking to show their strength against Prime Minister Indira Gandhi with a massive demonstration against her economic policies.

Among those jailed were Jyoti Basu, India's top ranking pro-Peking Communist, at least one member of Parliament, and several state legislators.

ANSWERS TO BRIDGE QUIZ

Q. 1—As South, vulnerable you hold:
♠A864 ♥A10985 ♦10932 ♣A4
The bidding has proceeded:
North East South West
1 ♠ Pass 1 ♥ Pass
2 ♣ Pass ?
What do you bid now?
A.—This hand rates one more try, and the suggested call is three hearts. On a point count basis, the hand is valued at 11 points, eight in high cards and two for distribution. The additional point is added for the fifth heart when partner supports that suit.

Q. 2—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠942 ♥AK AQ10 ♣AJ107
The bidding has proceeded:
North East South West
Pass Pass 1 ♥ Pass
2 ♣ Pass ?
What do you bid now?
A.—Since you are now assured that partner will respond to your next bid, there is no great necessity for jumping. A slam contract is definitely in the offing, and you should take it easy as to the best means of ascertaining which denomination will prove most playable. Bid three clubs and await your partner's reply.

Q. 3—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠QJ982 ♥A5 ♦1042 ♣AQ6
The bidding has proceeded:
West North East South
1 ♠ Pass 2 ♦ Pass
2 ♣ Pass ?
What do you bid now?
A.—While it may be tempting to double the two spade bid, we lean toward a pass. Despite your impressive holding, you must remember that your spades are unfavorably located under the declarer and while it is likely you will defeat the contract, it is not apt to be a complete slaughter. There is the further consideration that your penalty double of two spades may induce East to run out to three diamonds, a contract which you are by no means prepared to hurt.

Q. 4—Partner opens with one heart and you hold:
♠Q8432 ♥A104 ♦K95 ♣83
What is your response?
A.—Two hearts. A response of one spade should be avoided, for it might lead to complications. This hand is not strong enough to justify

two forward-moving bids. In support of hearts it is worth only nine points and therefore comes within the limit of a single raise.

Q. 5—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
♠AK6 ♥AJ 74 ♣KQJ1083
The bidding has proceeded:
South West North East
1 ♠ Pass 1 ♥ Pass
2 ♣ Pass ?
What do you bid now?
A.—Two no trump. This is preferable to the jump rebid of three clubs. Theoretically it is one point short, containing only 18 points, but the extra ten and a solid six card suit more than compensate for the technical deficiency.

A.—The appropriate procedure at this point is not clear to you, a forcing pass is in order. Partner heard you open with a demand bid and cannot drop the bidding. He should be given this opportunity to clarify his original negative response.

In order to learn more about the hand, it is suggested that a temporary bid of three hearts be made at this point. This may put partner in a position to bid a slam.

The bidding has proceeded:

Huge Auction of Real Estate Is Shaping Up

HOUSTON (AP)—A real estate auction involving an estimated \$40 million in property—believed to be the largest ever held in Texas—is planned here for Sept. 7-8.

Robert L. Moody, Galveston insurance executive, owns most of the real estate to be auctioned, said B. W. Roberts, president of the Gulf Coast Real Estate Auction Co. of Houston, which is handling the auction.

Thomas H. Sullivan, a Houston investor, will offer several motels and tracts of land, and a number of other local businessmen will have property in the "This will be the biggest real estate auction ever held in the Gulf Coast area, and to my knowledge, it will be the largest one ever conducted in Texas," said Houston investor A. E. Kuehner, who will serve as the auctioneer.

Roberts, who estimated the value of the property, said buildings and large and small tracts of land to be offered are in the areas of Houston, Austin, Texas City, Arcadia, League City, Dickinson, Cleveland, Pasadena, Seadrift, Greenville and Kerrville.

Ship Sinks Short Of Port

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (AP)—The Coast Guard said a Liberty ship trying to make port at Norfolk, Va., for repairs to a leak sank early today 23 miles south-southeast of Cape Hatteras, N.C.

The 32-man crew had abandoned ship shortly before it sank at 1:10 a.m. The crew was picked up from lifeboats by the tanker Hess Petrol and were to be transferred today to a Coast Guard vessel off Cape Henry, Va.

The Italian ship Paestum, built in 1944 as the Liberty ship Samspeed, later named the Cape York, was loaded with 9,496 tons of powdered phosphate. She was headed from Boca Grated, Fla., to Italy.

Crewmen discovered her No. 2 hold flooding last Tuesday and temporary repairs were made at Charleston, S.C. She was headed for Norfolk when the pumps began a losing battle with the steady inflow of water.

The 441-foot ship was sold to the Italian firm of Neptuno Società di Siciliana in 1952.

Congress Is Back On Job

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress, ending a 10-day vacation today, barely has time to put down its suitcases before shouldering the burden of major decisions on the Viet Nam war and foreign aid.

Both houses are expected to take up Tuesday the compromise version of a \$17.4-billion bill to authorize procurement of military hardware and pave the way for an across-the-board pay raise for the armed services. Actual funds depend on appropriation measures to be considered later.

The authorization bill, substantially larger than administration recommendations, includes provision for several controversial items such as a nuclear frigate and a start on a second, and development of a new manned bomber and the Nike X antimissile system.

The House next takes up its version of the \$4.1-billion foreign aid authorization act, which for the first time would authorize a two-year program. Congress previously has insisted on authorizing foreign aid only a year at a time, with a full review each year.

The Senate has a different version which may be considered late in the week, or more probably next week. Viet Nam and foreign policy generally are certain to figure largely in the debate in both chambers.

The House has only minor matters before it today, but the Senate considers a House-passed bill to give federal civilian employees a pay raise of about 2.9 per cent, with improvements in fringe benefits.

The Senate, after acting on the defense authorization, is scheduled to take up legislation for stepping up programs to alleviate water and air pollution.

Later in the week, if time permits, the Senate is expected to renew a lively internal scrap on a proposal to add members of the Foreign Relations Committee to the special watchdog committee supervising the Central Intelligence Agency.

Present members of the watchdog committee, now drawn from the Armed Services and Appropriations committees, oppose enlargement.

Welk Doesn't Mind Being Kidded On 'Square Image'

EDITOR'S NOTE—The hip musical shows, the variety hours come and go, but Lawrence Welk and his bouncy, danceable beat bubbles on year after year—and it will be his 12th on ABC next fall. Here he defends the kind of music he makes—and prefers.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Descriptive labels seem to be a part of the entertainment business. They include "cool," "hip," "far out," "corny," "square." It's only natural that the champagne music makers would come in for a share of this.

"Square" is the word most frequently applied to me.

Now, how could I possibly resent that? It's no secret that our music appeals to the more mature audience.

The rating services show that mothers are our most loyal fans, fathers are the next most numerous group, followed by the smaller children, then the teenagers.

It is difficult to please everyone, even members of the same family. Teenagers are in frequent disagreement with their elders, not only in the matter of music. Often the very fact that something is enjoyed by the parents is enough to have it branded "corny" by the youngsters. It works both ways.

Actually we very much want to add more teenagers to our audience, and are making every effort to accomplish this without alienating our loyal old fans.

On this year's spring tour, more teenagers came to see us than ever before. Several times I was told, "Mr. Welk, I'm one teenager who enjoys your music." I'm sure that our young entertainers, Barbara Lennon Sisters and the Blanders, have contributed to this.

We watch the charts for what the kids like and are including some of the modern beat in our music. We now use two guitars on our show, and as many as three or recordings. The kids like guitars.

Back to that appellation "square."

In the reading Aladdin has done several times on our show—"The Square," by Charles S. Brower — the term means loving your country, honoring your father and mother and following the rules of fair play — the principles that made our country great. Under this definition, I'm proud to be called a "square."

I've probably been kidded as much as any figure in the entertainment business. This sort of thing is part of America. Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and John F. Kennedy were the targets of some very witty satire and accepted it in good spirit.

A few years ago the very talented Stan Freberg put out a popular record, an extremely funny take-off on me and on our orchestra. I enjoyed it immensely. Not only did Stan do an excellent job, but he used our theme song, "Bubbles in the Wine," which is my composition and on which I collected royalties on every record sold!

Expects No Ban On U.S. Stamp

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — An official of the Polish Postal Ministry says he doubts Poland's Communist government will bar U.S. mail with a new commemorative stamp bearing a crowned eagle instead of the postwar Communist eagle.

The official noted that even Polish stamps have depicted various types of eagles, depending on what historical period was being commemorated.

The U.S. stamp, to be issued July 31, bears a cross commemorating 1,000 years of Christianity in Poland and the eagle commemorating the millennium of the Polish nation. The crown commemorates the monarchy.

U.S. government sources in Washington said the Polish Embassy had objected and warned that mail with such stamps might be barred from Poland.

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
