GI's Chances Are Better.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Viet Nam assignments in the last reporting month. About 300,000 men will be drafted into the Army under current plans for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1967. And based on current strength requirements for Viet Nam, a Pentagon spokesman estimated one-third of the total will see service in the war zone.

Army officials are quick to add that any radical change in the Viet Nam situation could rapidly alter such figures but barring some unforeseen turn before a relatively few will wind up in Viet Nam assigned to rifle companies or spots where they are likely to see heavy action, an Army source says.

Of the hypothetical 1,000 draftees, about 40 will be wounded, but their chances of dying later are far reduced from Korea or World War II because of helicopter medical evacuation, vastly improved hospital systems and the absence of enemy artillery and airpower.

A significant number of those who do become casualties, including draftees, will be in Viet Nam because they volunteered. More than 4,000 men asked for

more than 45 per cent of the Army's present 155,000-man force in Viet Nam is classified as support personnel — everything from cooks, supply clerks and typists to helicopter mechanics and truck drivers. Almost one out of three is in the supply network.

A Pentagon spokesman said even men assigned to such combat-bloodied units as the 1st Cavalry, Airborne, Division run an excellent chance of getting a job behind the lines. He said in the average 16,000-man division, about 6,000 to 7,000 men actually are caught up in day to day combat operations.

Say Purge 'Just Begun'

TOKYO (AP) — The Chinese Communist party disclosed this week that the wide-ranging purge of writers, artists, cultural chiefs, party officials and military men has "just begun."

Mao Tse-tung's disciples made clear in two long articles in the Peking People's Daily that the purge — described as "a great proletarian cultural revolution" — is in full cry and far from ended.

The articles, distributed serially for the past four days by the New China News Agency, dealt in depth with the purges of the past and attacked Chou Yang, former dictator of literature and art, as "a black-hearted, nasty character" whose "gang of monsters and devils" plotted to seize power from Mao.

The People's Daily said the present cultural revolution is the sixth — and most profound — stage of a socialist struggle in China that has been continuing since the Communists took control of the country in 1949.

"This great proletarian cultural revolution has in fact just begun," it said, "but it has already shown its great and far-reaching significance."

The 10,000-word article attacking Chou Yang also confirmed that the purge is continuing.

Mayors Meet The Legislators

HOUSTON (AP) — Mayors of a dozen Southern cities were to discuss what their cities need from legislators today at the Southern Conference of the Council of State Governments.

More than 200 legislators and top legislative aides as well as mayors from 12 cities across the south are attending the four-day meeting which got under way Tuesday.

Texas Gov. John Connally was to address the delegates Thursday night.

A New York landscape expert told delegates Wednesday "Americans are fed up with polluted streams and air so polluted that non-smokers soon may be using filters."

Henry L. Diamond, director of the White House Conference on Natural Beauty in New York State, said politicians backing beautification are assured of strong public support.

Frank Hildebrand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency, said tourists spent \$906 million in Texas last year.

He said the \$906 million was in addition to \$72 million that tourists paid in direct state taxes last year.

He said the 1965 expenditures by tourists represented a 70 per cent increase over monies spent in 1963.

Checking On Shrimp Boats

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (AP) — Reports that three Mexican shrimp boats are fishing in United States territorial waters are being investigated, the Coast Guard said Wednesday.

Officials at Corpus Christi said the boats were first reported on Monday some 25 miles south of the Corpus Christi area.

U.S. jurisdiction extends three miles out into the Gulf of Mexico, but state jurisdiction extends 10 1/3 miles out.

Lt. Cmdr. Roger Millat, public relations officer for the Coast Guard in Corpus Christi, said the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is investigating the report.

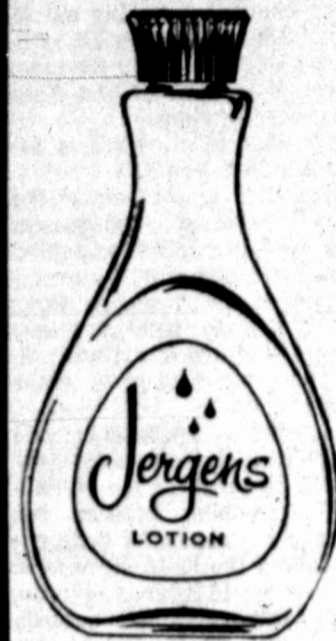

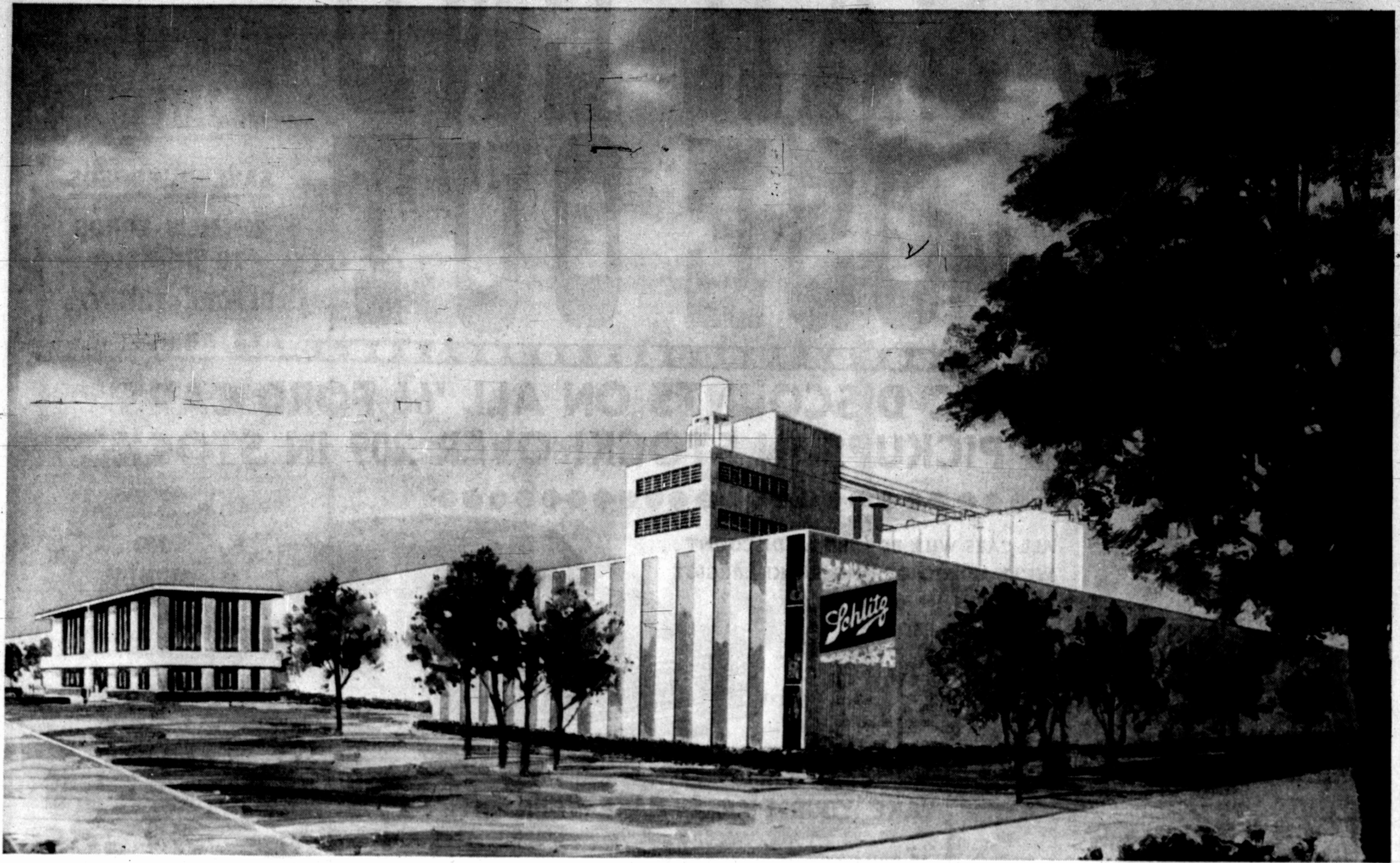

They Were Seeing Saucers Back In 1897

Houston Post Writer

HOUSTON (AP) — Yellowed newspaper clippings tell of a series of sightings across Texas in 1897 of the "mysterious airship."

They added up to what might be called:

The Great Airship Flap of 1897.

Some of the accounts resemble accounts nowadays of unidentified flying objects.

Consider this report from the 1897 Houston Daily Post:

"Childress, Texas, April 17—The much talked-of airship was seen here last night about 1:16 o'clock. The Rev. J. W. Smith was the first to discover the curious aerial monster.

"He thought at first that it was a star shooting, but after

watching it a moment or two, saw that it was not . . .

"It soon disappeared, traveling in a westerly direction. The Rev. Smith thinks that it must have been 2,000 feet high and traveling very fast."

Or this one:

"Longview, Texas, April 20—Last night about 9:30, the Post correspondent and family, on returning from church, saw the so-called airship.

"A bright light, seemingly about the size of Venus, moved swiftly to the northwest, disappearing beneath the horizon.

"In a few minutes, it reappeared . . . The light emitted a series of intermittent flashes of a steel color. No car (cabin) was seen."

Here's another:

"Atlanta, Texas, April 19—

There was considerable excitement here today, caused by a visitation last night by the mysterious airship.

It was first seen by Jim Nelson, a farmer . . . His attention was attracted by a peculiar noise and, looking up, he discovered the mysterious aerial traveler.

"It seemed to be descending straight to the earth with great rapidity, and Mr. Nelson's hair stood out with fright . . .

"But within two or three hundred feet of the earth, it paused for an instant . . . then moved off at a rate of speed about equal to that of an ordinary passenger train."

The Atlanta dispatch says the airship was seen by other citizens when it sailed over the city at 5 to 15 miles an hour. Most described it as cigar-shaped, and some said it had long wings on either side.

erred parties at the anchor and cut the rope below him and sailed off in a northeast direction.

"The anchor is now on exhibition at the blacksmith shop of Elliott & Miller and is attracting the attention of hundreds of people."

MAN FROM MARS

Another bizarre account was found in the April 19, 1897, edition of the Dallas Morning News:

"Aurora, Wise County, April 17—About 6 o'clock this morning the early risers of Aurora were astonished at the sudden appearance of the airship which has been sailing throughout the country . . .

"It sailed directly over the public square, and when it reached the north part of town, collided with the tower of Judge Proctor's windmill and went to pieces with a terrific explosion, scattering debris over several acres of ground, wrecking the windmill and water tank and destroying the judge's flower garden.

"The pilot of the ship is supposed to have been the only one aboard, and while his remains are badly disfigured, enough of the original has been picked up to show that he was not an inhabitant of this world.

"Mr. T. J. Weems, the U.S. Signal Service officer at this place and an authority on astronomy, gives it as his opinion that he (the pilot) was a native of the Planet Mars . . .

"Papers found . . . are written in some unknown hieroglyphics. This ship was too badly

wrecked to form any conclusion as to its construction or motive power . . .

"The town is full of people today who are viewing the wreck and gathering specimens of strange metal from the debris. The pilot's funeral will take place at noon tomorrow."

Restraint Urged Regarding Trials

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sens. J. W. Fulbright and Leverett Saltonstall called today for restraint in any American retaliation if North Viet Nam puts captured U.S. pilots on trial as war criminals.

Amid widespread predictions in Congress that prisoner trials would generate public demands for all-out conventional war against North Viet Nam, Fulbright said this would be a "disastrous course" for the United States to take.

Fulbright, Arkansas Democrat who heads the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said, "If we start retaliatory action I'm afraid there would be no end to it."

"The history of warfare indicates that retaliatory action leads to barbaric conflict," he said. "I would hope that, at least, there will be no attacks on civilians in any action we might take."

Fulbright is a leading critic of Johnson's Viet Nam war policies.

Saltonstall, senior Republican on the Senate Armed Services

Committee, said in a separate interview that everything possible must be done to make it clear to the North Vietnamese that they cannot condemn American war prisoners as criminals at trumped-up trials.

"But we must act legally," the Massachusetts senator said. "We cannot engage in indiscriminate slaughter as a retaliatory measure. We don't want to make criminals of ourselves just because they do."

Sen. Stephen M. Young, D-Ohio, told the Senate Wednesday the South Vietnamese are executing many prisoners of war turned over to them by U.S. forces. He said the United States "in the name of humanity and decency" should stop transferring Viet Cong prisoners to South Vietnamese units.

Young said he would favor the "gravest reprisals" if Hanoi puts U.S. prisoners on trial. He added such trials would make escalation of the war inevitable and "mean the deaths of many, many Vietnamese nationals."

On the international front, Moscow Radio said it goes along with Hanoi's view that the captured American airmen are war criminals — not prisoners of war. The report monitored in Tokyo referred to recent statements by North Vietnamese diplomats that the captured airmen are war criminals and the issue lies solely with Hanoi authorities.

About a week later came this report in the Houston Daily Post of April 28, 1897:

"Merkel, Texas, April 26 — Some parties returning from church last night noticed a heavy object dragging along with a rope attached.

"They followed it until in crossing the railroad it caught on a rail. On looking up they saw what they supposed was the airship.

"It was not near enough to get an idea of the dimensions. A light could be seen protruding from several windows; one bright light in front like the headlight of a locomotive.

"After some 10 minutes, a man was seen descending the rope; he came near enough to be plainly seen; he wore a light blue sailor suit, was small in size.

"He stopped when he discov-

Guadalupe Basin Hearings Slated

AUSTIN (AP)—Hearings will be held in New Braunfels Aug. 1, Victoria Aug. 3 and Edna Aug. 5 on the Texas Water Development Board's proposed five reservoirs in the Guadalupe Basin, one in the Lavaca Basin and one in the Lavaca-Guadalupe Coastal Basin.

The reservoirs, part of the \$3.7 billion Texas Water Plan, will cost a total of \$281.5 million.

Also to be discussed at the hearings are development plans for the Colorado-Lavaca Coastal Basin. More hearings on the water quality in the basins, will be held by the Texas Water Pollution Control Board.

Estimated cost of the Guadalupe Basin construction is \$208.5 million, Lavaca Basin \$51 million and Lavaca-Guadalupe Coastal Basin \$22 million.

The Guadalupe plan calls for these projects:

- Ingram, seven miles northwest of Kerrville on Johnson Creek, \$8.5 million, 53,500 acre-foot of storage, 1,580 acres of surface area. (An acre-foot is 325,851 gallons.)
- Clifton Crossing, \$14.5 million, 2.5 miles west of Wimberly on the Blanco River, 146,800 acre-foot, 4,000 acres.
- Lockhart, \$5 million, three miles north of Lockhart on Plum Creek, 59,850 acre-foot, 3,520 acres.
- Cuero 1 and 2, \$117.5 million, four miles north of Cuero on the Guadalupe and Sandies Creek, 2.8 million acre-foot, 102,900 acres.
- Confluence, \$63 million, about seven miles above the Confluence of the San Antonio

Schlitz To Dedicate Giant Brewery Friday

LONGVIEW, Tex. (AP)—The Jos. Schlitz Brewing Company's \$13 million brewery here will be dedicated Friday to set off five days of celebrations.

The huge plant, which covers nine acres under roof and is on a 140-acre tract less than two miles from downtown Longview, is capable of producing one million barrels of beer annually.

Automated to maximum degree, the brewery is termed by industry leaders as the most modern in the world.

Principal speakers at the dedication ceremonies will be the brewery president, Robert A. Uihlein Jr., and his uncle, Erwin Uihlein, board chairman.

The board of directors also will be present and have scheduled a formal meeting, the second such meeting ever held outside of Milwaukee in the company's 117-year history.

Company officials will arrive Thursday afternoon by charter plane and be guests of honor at a private dinner given them by members of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association.

Immediately after the dedication ceremonies, the company will be host at an outdoor luncheon on the brewery grounds.

Friday night, Schlitz will present a fireworks display.

Friday afternoon, Schlitz distributors, retailers and their employees will be taken on guided tours of the brewery. Saturday, employees and their families will be luncheon guests of the company and shown through the plant.

The public tours will be between 3 and 6 p.m. Monday through Wednesday.

Connally will visit six countries in behalf of San Antonio's 1968 HemisFair.

The governor and Mrs. Connally will leave San Antonio Sunday and follow this schedule:

- Panama City, Panama, July 25-27; Caracas, Venezuela, July 27-30; Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, July 31-Aug. 3; Montevideo, Uruguay, Aug. 4-6; Lima, Peru, Aug. 6-9; Bogota, Colombia, Aug. 10-12; arrive back in San Antonio, Aug. 13.

Britons Tighten Up Belts For Economic Austerity

LONDON (AP) — Britons hitched up their belts another notch or two today and moved into a period of economic hardship as austere as any they have faced since World War II. There were doubts the new austerity program had gone far enough but some unions rebelled.

The principal reason for the economic recession deliberately set in motion by their government — the defense of the pound sterling in world money

markets — was complex and confusing to the man in the street. But he will be hit by higher sales taxes, tighter curbs on consumer credit and a freeze on any increase in wages, prices or dividends.

The austerity program, announced in Parliament Wednesday by Prime Minister Harold Wilson, also chopped \$2 billion off government spending, much of it in foreign aid and maintenance of British armed forces in

The aim is to curb spending at home and abroad and promote domestic production of goods for export in an effort to eliminate the perennial deficit in foreign exchange. This deficit has persisted over a number of years and has brought the pound close to devaluation.

There have been heavy sales set off by fears of devaluation, and its price has dropped in re-

lation to other currencies. But the exchange rate went up sharply Wednesday after Wilson announced his program.

Wilson's proposals, which almost led to the resignation of his deputy prime minister, George Brown, were seen by many as first aid only for an economy badly out of kilter and not a long-range solution.

The reaction at home included expressions of dismay from labor leaders, the backbone of support for Wilson's Labor government.

Frank Cousins, head of the Transport and General Workers Union, the largest in Britain, said his organization could not "accept and cooperate" with the wage freeze.

"I think it is quite the wrong way of dealing with it," he said.

Marion Can Appeal Higher

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—The U.S. 5th Court of Appeals has affirmed the death sentence given James Lee Marion, convicted of slaying a wealthy Midland, Tex., woman.

Marion was convicted of slaying Mrs. Fred Turner on the night of Oct. 29, 1963. Marion, in a statement given officers, said he beat down her bedroom door and took a pistol from her.

Marion now has 90 days to appeal the sentence to the Supreme Court.

Attorneys for Marion argued that he was held a month without a lawyer to advise him, thereby violating his constitutional rights.

The decision recorded Monday said: "We affirm (the conviction) on the basis that he had no right as such under the state of the law as it then existed to counsel, retained or court appointed, during the interrogation process."

It was just this year that the Texas Legislature spelled out the need of counsel for arrested persons and their right to be advised that they need not testify against themselves.

Mrs. Turner's husband, an oilman, was not at home on the night of the slaying.

Turner, 67, was owner of Tomy Lee, the 1959 Kentucky Derby winner, but was known in oil circles as a man who found vacancies in some oil areas, filed claims, and used legal means to prevent the claims from being taken away from him.

Marion was 22 at the time of the slaying. Mrs. Turner was 66.

Trial for Marion was held at Lubbock.

The accused Negro said he laid down on a bed and took a nap after killing Mrs. Turner. Screams from relatives as they found the body awakened him.

As he attempted to leave, he struck Mrs. Clarence Scharbauer on the head with a pistol and then lined Mr. and Mrs. Scharbauer, the sheriff and a deputy against the wall. Mrs. Scharbauer was a daughter of the Turners.

Officers found Marion crouch-

ing in the attic of a small shed on the Turner property a short time later.

Turner died a short time after the slaying following a heart attack.

Statements which officers said Marion made following his arrest were read at the trial over the objections of defense attorneys.

In the statements, Marion said he broke into the house and then broke down Mrs. Turner's bedroom door after she threatened to shoot him. He said he wrestled the pistol from Mrs. Turner.

The statement also said:

"I hit her several times with her gun until she fell to the floor. She was screaming, so I got a cloth that was on the floor and put it over her face and head to keep her from screaming. I kept hitting her with the gun until she stopped screaming."

Ike, Romney Discuss 1966

GETTYSBURGH, Pa. (AP)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Michigan Gov.

George Romney talked about 1966 but not about 1968, they say.

The former president said after the two men met Wednesday at his Gettysburg office that they hadn't discussed the 1968 presidential campaign. Romney

has been mentioned as a possible candidate for the Republican nomination for president.

What they did talk about, said Eisenhower, was the 1966 election, in which he expressed hope "the governor will have the biggest victory ever."

Detoured Airliner Skids To Dramatic Safe Landing

FORT WORTH (AP)—A detoured airliner carrying 38 persons made a dramatic emergency landing in a shower of sparks on a foam-covered runway early today because of a faulty landing gear.

Scores of fire engines, ambulances and crash vehicles raced down the runway as the Braniff turboprop skidded across the foam and spun into a grassy field at Carswell Air Force Base.

Airline officials said the 33 passengers and five crew members, on Flight 133 from Chicago to Houston, all escaped injury.

"The passengers reacted remarkably under the severe conditions," said Mary Sherffius, 20, a stewardess from Denver, Colo. "They kept asking us if there was anything they could do and tried their best to help with everything."

The youngest on board, Paul White, 13, of Kansas City, admitted he was a "little bit afraid." He said:

"I got sick... I started to cry, but then I looked at the other big boys and they weren't crying

and I decided that I shouldn't either.

"Boy, I really have something to tell old Claude."

Claude is a cousin, Claude Quigby III, whom he was going to visit in Houston.

Cameron Reager, 25, of Artesia, N.M., who had a similar airline experience three years ago, said:

"Maybe it was just intuition, but I felt all along that we were going to make it in pretty good shape."

"My stomach did a flip flop, but then I realized I had plenty of life insurance and was sitting pretty well with my Maker..."

"But you know, I was quite happy when we landed, and I realized my wife wasn't going to collect all that insurance."

R. D. Hunsicker of Houston, an official of Trunkline Gas Co., called it a "real experience."

"They (passengers) kept their heads very well... There was no visible panic at all... but a couple did get upset," he said.

The landing gear problem developed just before the airliner was due to land at Houston. It

circled several times before Braniff officials directed the pilot, Capt. James O. Thompson of Farmers Branch, Tex., north to Love Field in Dallas.

At Love Field, where Braniff is headquartered, the craft made three unsuccessful passes. Its left main gear could not be lowered while the right gear and nosewheel descended normally and jammed, refusing to retract.

Thompson was ordered to take the crippled airliner to Carswell, a base with runway and extensive crash equipment. It has been the scene of numerous emergency landings by stricken commercial aircraft.

"God!" exclaimed an unidentified passenger as he leaped off the plane. "Am I glad to feel this ground!"

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Takes Time To Solve Pollution

HOUSTON (AP)—Texas Gov. John Connally says state and local governments must solve their air and water pollution problems or the federal government will step in.

But, the governor, said these solutions take time.

Connally addressed the Texas Air and Water Resources Foundation Wednesday night. Officials of Harris, Galveston, Chambers and Brazoria counties attended the meeting.

The governor said Texans cannot solve the pollution problems by blaming industry.

"We all arrived in the current state of air and water pollution together," he said. "We shall all solve the resulting problems together."

He said solutions will be reached through mutual understandings and cooperation, in frank exchanges and binding commitments "to do more than we're doing to enhance the quality of our air and water."

"Solutions will not be found in finger-pointing, accusations, threats and newshandouts," the governor said.

He said there is a tendency to blame industry which he added is unfortunate because Texans have encouraged industry to locate in the state.

Connally said Galveston Bay pollution "did not occur overnight (and) it cannot be corrected overnight, much as we might wish it."

"A far off bureaucrat, or a local one, could decree that the offenders be closed until corrective facilities are built," Connally said. "Who would suffer the consequences? Not he, but the people here—you, the citizens of Galveston Bay."

"Such a course is unreasonable, the full weight of governmental authority should be concentrated upon those consistent offenders, measured by a realistic standard, and those who callously ignore the urgency of corrective action."

Georgia Skelton Is Recovering

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Georgia Skelton, wife of comedian Red Skelton, is resting comfortably at Sunrise Hospital in Las Vegas, recovering from a bullet wound.

Mrs. Skelton, who is reported in satisfactory condition, was accidentally shot early Tuesday when she moved a 38-caliber pistol, part of a gun collection, and it went off, police said.

The accident happened in her suite at the Sands Hotel, where her husband is appearing.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The short-change the soldiers in Viet Nam, so he proposed cutting \$250 million from the \$620-million tagged for development loans.

The Senate voted 59 to 34 to make the cut, Chairman J. W. Fulbright of the Foreign Relations Committee — the bill's manager — was among the yeas.

Sen. Peter H. Dominick, R-Colo., used the domestic interest rates in pushing through an amendment to double to two per cent from the present one per cent—the interest rate on the first 10 years, the grace period of the development loans.

Fulbright complained that war costs are cutting into domestic projects.

"I spent a good part of yesterday," he told the Senate, "talking about one little project involving \$60,000 for operating a fish hatchery in my state. The Senate, he said, couldn't

Ends Study Of Flight, Turns To Poetry, Music

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Got a minute? Well, spend it contemplating the discoveries of Victor M. Gonzalez, 42, who spent a decade thinking and doing in the dusty attic of the aerospace age.

His study of flight started simply enough. He stood in the middle of the Mojave Desert two 15-foot fiberglass wings strapped to his arms.

He flapped.

Nothing happened.

When Gonzalez sat down to think it over, a cable connecting the wings broke. "Aha!" He thought as his arms were wrenched to the ground. "The principle of leverage."

And so it went, as Gonzalez devoted himself to determining the principles that keeps birds in flight.

His formal education consists of high school in Puerto Rico and a course in watch repair. As a working machinist he knows how to weld.

After the Mojave disappoint-

ment, Gonzalez returned to his Los Angeles home. "I studied birds, butterflies, bees, grasshoppers. I even studied flying fish."

He bought 25 pigeons and clipped their wings in different designs. He removed all the feathers from some birds' wings, replacing them with cloth cut in a bat-wing effect.

Separately, he began work on his aluminum-frame "ornithopter" — two wings mounted on a sulky-type carriage driven by bicycle pedals and chain.

"Then, three years ago," Gonzalez says, "I saw it for the first time. The secret of flight." His 5-foot-3, 110-pound body was stretched on his lawn as he watched a bird.

"I noticed a bird's body moved up and down while the tips of its wings stayed in the same plane. That was it.

"Birds don't flap their wings. That's an optical illusion. Their bodies move up and down."

He incorporated appropriate changes into his ornithopter, lengthened the wings to a 42-foot span, and added a propeller.

Back to the Mojave. A gust of wind collapsed the wings. Back to the shop. Repairs. Back to the desert. He forgot to put a pin in a drive wheel. The gears stripped. He never left the sand.

"I think I accomplished what I set out to do. I have discovered the principle of wing-flapping flight."

With that, Gonzalez gave his machine and plans to the University of California at Los Angeles and turned to other pursuits, poetry and the guitar.

Astronauts Are Leaving Lots Of Litter

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — America's many achievements in space include the distinction of being the world's foremost celestial litterbug.

A thermal glove, an exposed roll of color movie film and an expensive 70mm camera are now earth satellites as a result of mishaps while astronauts were outside their spaceships.

In addition, there is a collection of other orbiting junk discarded intentionally by astronauts to save the trouble of stowing.

Gemini 10 pilots John W. Young and Michael Collins threw away about 14 items Wednesday as they prepared their cabin for re-entry.

Most of these went into the bag that had contained the lifeline Collins used for his walk in space. What didn't go into the bag was just tossed out the hatch, like the lifeline itself.

The pilots, cramped for space among all the loose gear, were especially happy to see the lifeline go. When Mission Control asked about it, Collins replied, "Gone, thank God."

Collins lost two objects during his half hour outside Gemini 10. One of these was the 70mm camera, another was a small experiment package he was to attach to the Agena 8.

During Gemini 4, astronaut Edward H. White II watched as a thermal glove drifted out of the hatch.

While Eugene A. Cernan was strolling outside Gemini 9 a magazine of exposed movie film got away from him, as did a lens.

Eventually, all of this space flotsam will burn to cinders as gravity pulls it into the dense atmosphere.

Marchers Put On New Shoes

FALFURRIAS, Tex. (AP) — Mexican-American farm workers—most of them breaking in new shoes on a long hike—logged another notch of their 400-mile trek to the state capital today.

Twenty marchers who are members of a South Texas union, led by two clergymen, are making the journey to dramatize the plea for a \$1.25 an hour minimum wage for farm laborers. The march will end at a rally Labor Day at the Capitol grounds in Austin, Tex.

The Rev. Antonio Gonzales, a co-director of the march, said motel accommodations for the hikers have been made here "so they can sleep in comfort and return to the road refreshed" every morning.

The marchers are averaging about 12 miles a day in temperature near 100 degrees.

A marcher had to fall out Wednesday for the first time since the hike began July 11.

Paulo de la Cruz, 63, of Rio Grande City, Tex., was helped to a bus that trails the march and rode the rest of the day Wednesday. Father Gonzales said de la Cruz "had heat exhaustion" but recovered quickly and was expected to continue the journey.

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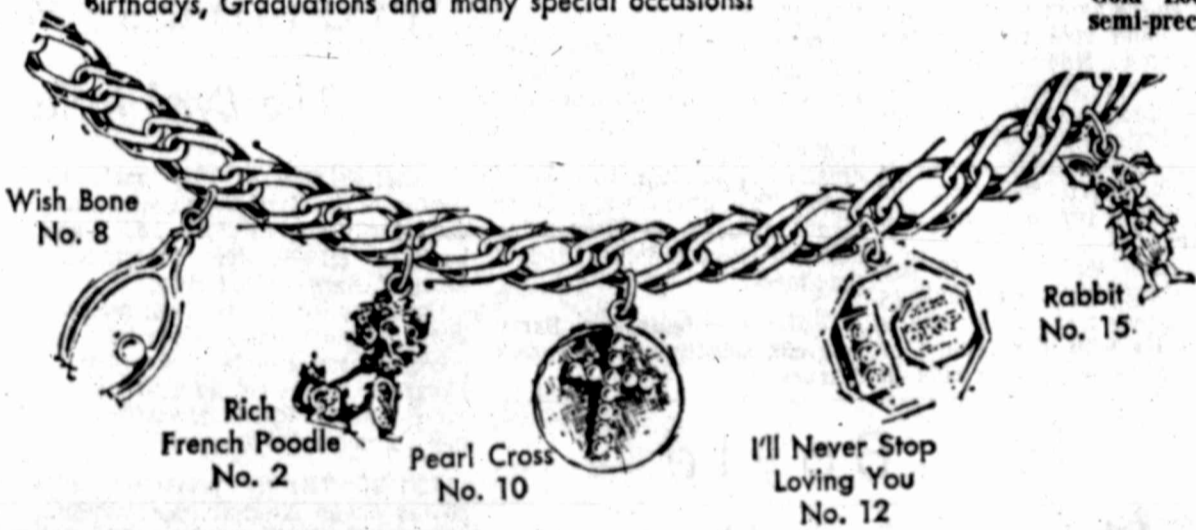

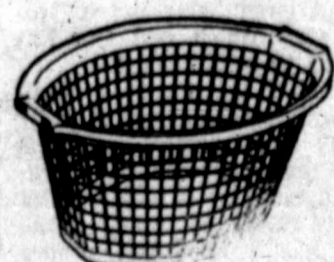

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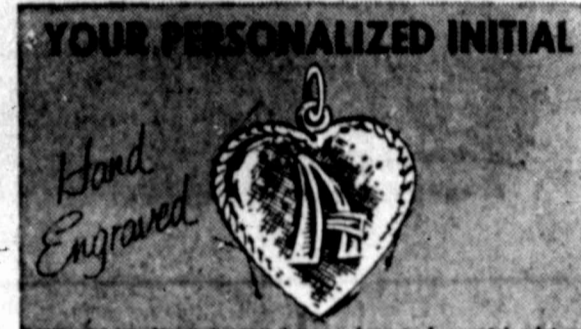

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Brand Likes The Change To Comedy In 'Laredo'

EDITOR'S NOTE: Don't let that rugged face, or even memories of his Al Capone role in "The Untouchables" fool you, Neville Brand, one of the three Texas Maskers in NBC's "Laredo," is a serious performer who studied at the American Theatre Wing. That face, however, is currently a part of his fortune.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — How do I like being a comedian after playing hoods all the time? So what's the big switch? When they signed me up for the part of Reese Bennett in "Laredo," I did some research on the Texas Rangers. And you know what I found out? After reading a few books on these guys, I discovered that the Texas Rangers were the Al Capones

and the Frank Nittis of the Old West!

Some Texas Rangers signed up because they were wanted — not by their women folk — but by the sheriff in some town. I gather a good many of them were wanted for bank robbery or cattle rustling, but others were wanted for plain old murder. They didn't have any FBI in those days, so if a guy killed a man in Kansas, all he had to do was cross the border into Texas and no one could touch him.

But if he killed a guy in Texas and wanted to stay in that state, the law would let him off if he signed up for a hitch with the Rangers. When his hitch was over, he'd be a free man again.

and no one would lay a hand on him — until he killed his next man.

Al Capone couldn't get off that easy in the 30s, because they had the FBI. But anyway, the way I look at it — I'm still playing a hood, only Western-style!

I can't say I've always wanted to play comedy, because with my face I never thought anybody would want to laugh if I told a joke. But now that I've tried it, I really like it. I've been an actor for a long time, but it wasn't until last year when I started playing Reese Bennett, that I really had to work. Comedy is a lot harder than any other kind of acting.

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
