Takes Time To Solve Pollution

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas Gov. John Connally says state and local governments must solve their air and water pollution problems or the federal government will step in.

But, the governor, said these solutions take time.

Connally addressed the Texas Air and Water Resources Foundation Wednesday night. Officials of Harris, Galveston, Chambers and Brazoria counties attended the meeting

The governor said Texans cannot solve the pollution problems by blaming industry.

"We all arrived in the current state of air and water pollution together," he said. "We shall all solve the resulting problems to-

He said solutions will be reached through mutual understandings and cooperation, in frank exchanges and binding commitments "to do more than we're doing to enhance the qual-

ity of our air and water." "Solutions will not be found in finger - pointing, accusations, threats and newshandouts," the

governor said. He said there is a tendency to blame industry which he added is unfortunate because Texans have encouraged industry to lo-

cate in the state. Connally said Galveston Bay pollution "did not occur overnight (and) it cannot be corrected overnight, much as we might wish it.

"A far off bureaucrat, or a local one, could decree that the offenders be closed until corrective facilities are built," Connally said. "Who would suffer the consequences? Not he, but the people here-you, the citizens of Galveston Bay.

"Such a course is unreasonable. . . the full weight of governmental authority should be concentrated upon those consistent offenders, measured by a realistic standard, and those who callously ignore the urgency of corrective action."







Young People Judge Themselves

The matter of a "juvenile jury system" for our municipal courts, under which youths would recommend fair, punishment if guilt is found. judgment for their contemporaries brought before the court, is worthy of more detailed study, and apparently

it is going to get this.

The record of all cities who have essayed this principle into the area of stressing respect for the law among the young people is not at hand. The one city of which we have some knowledge is Houston, where the plan seems to be a success.

Young people are chosen to sit as observing "jurors" when one of their number is charged with corporate court misdemeanors, most of them traffic violations. While they may not have legal status, the corporate judge is willing to listen to their reactions,

and even their recommendation as toa verdict: either not guilty, or the

Young people in Houston who have served on the juries, a report said, tend at times to be even harsher than adults would be. But they are also fair, in the main, are willing to consider extenuating circumstances, and are willing to give "another chance."

One main result of the Houston experiment has been that the young people who serve as the juries find that they, themselves, benefit to great degree. After such service, they have a more wholesome respect for what society's restrictions have to be, and they are more careful to see that they are not going to be among those on the receiving end of a traffic ticket.

Record As A Gentleman

Joining what seems to be an unusually large exodus this year of citizens who have left a favorable imprint upon the community is Don Robbins, who has resigned as Big Spring High School football coach to move to a more attractive post in his profession. He will be an assistant at Texas Western.

The tenure of a football coach, as a norm, is not long. But we feel that many people in Big Spring would have been happy to see Don Robbins stay on longer.

The football enthusiasts will point to his 26-13-1 won-lost-tied record and find it gratifying.
We're proud of this, too, but we

think there are things to be said of Don Robbins. Mostly, that he has been as interested in developing young men as he has football material; that he has been self-effacing, but nonetheless a leader; that he has met his crises with personal courage and without any rancor; that above all, he has been a gentleman, an example to the boys he trained as well as to the adults with whom he had contact.

Don Robbins leaves Big Spring with good wishes for continuing success. There is nothing in his career to date that will keep him from achieving the success he hopes for.

Time To Cut Off From Russia

can the United States refrain from severing diplomatic relations with the Soviet government, especially since the news has been published that Russians presently will begin killing American soldiers in Viet Nam?

This question is being asked now as officials study the following UPI dispatch from London:

"Authoritative sources said here today the Soviet bloc was readying major consignments of missiles for North Viet Nam and of experts to install or possibly even operate them."

APPARENTLY this means that not only the Soviet Union but some of the Eastern-bloc countries under the influence of Moscow are ready to carry on war against American troops in Southeast Asia.

Up to the time of this development, it was insisted in the capitals of both the Soviet Union and Red China that only individual "volunteers" were engaged in the fighting and that such help as was given by their governments was in the form of supplies, including airplanes.

BUT IT IS becoming clear that the principal governments in the Communist world-namely, the Soviet Union and Red China-are assuming the role of belligerents in a war against the United States. This certainly confirms the need to consider further the frequently made suggestions in Congress that the United States cut off all trade with any country which is helping the North Vietnamese in the war against

South Viet Nam and the United States. Under international law, American troops have gone to the aid of the South Vietnamese government as the

WASHINGTON - How much longer result of a formal request to Washington for military assistance. Once the American troops are engaged in battle with an aggressor, a state of war actually exists, irrespective of whether it has been formally declared.

> THE UNITED STATES government state of war against the Communistbloc governments, but can announce its intention to ban all trade and cut diplomatic relations with such countries as participate in the assault on American troops.

The Soviets and Red Chinese theoretically have a right to assist an aggressor government, but they must face the consequences. Since the United Nations seems impotent or unwilling to act, America has every right also not only to shut off trade with the Communist-bloc countries, but to insist that our own allies do the same.

PRIME MINISTER Harold Wilson of Great Britain has just made a futile trip to Moscow to try to persuade the Russian government, which is cochairman with Great Britain of the Geneva Conference, to take steps to bring about peace in Southeast Asia. It is apparent that, instead, the Soviet government is undertaking to escalate its own auxiliary operations, and Communist China has publicly announced its intention to take "all necessary actions" until final victory is won in South Viet Nam by the Com-

UNDER SUCH circumstances, the United States has no alternative but to apply the rules of international law, which permit an embargo to be imposed and even blockades to be ordered against all shipping to Communist countries

For the Soviet Union or Red China to begin to operate missiles that will be fired by their own experts against our troops represents a definite "escalation" of the war which the Congress of the United States can hardly ignore. (Copyright, 1966, Publishers Newspaper Syndicate)



Governor Byrd, a political reformer in the Virginia Senate since 1915, had promised the people a Program of Progress. It was not an empty slogan for it entailed 50-odd amendments to the Commonwealth's Constitution.

AMONG THESE proposals were pay-as-you-go internal improvements, separation of cities and counties, a separation of their tax facilities from those of the state, and the short ballot All of the propositions had to be offered to the people for referendum. Byrd set out by automobile to campaign for his program (he was not a candidate for re-election), and he had asked a number of persons in each community to make arrangements for his appearances there. His schedule-makers, his advance men and his local sponsors came to be called the "Byrd Organization."

THAT'S HOW it all started. There wasn't then, and never would be, a patronage system. Harry Byrd, descendant of early Virginia settlers but of a family impoverished by wild living, built his own fortune as a farmer, a hemisphere-wide apple producer and shipper, and small town newspaper publisher. He took nothing and refused much from public subsidies.

Having established a modern state political structure, as well as a new highway and park system, and a steeltrap anti-lynch bill, Byrd returned in 1930 to private life. He might have remained there if President Roosevelt hadn't named Senator Claude Swan-

son of Virginia to his cabinet. Byrd's successor in the governorship appointed him to the unexpired term. Byrd took office on Roosevelt's inaugural day, March 4, 1933.

THE ORGANIZATION, following the guidelines of Byrd's program of Progress, concentrated on the statewide offices, those of governor, lieutenant governor and attorney general. It usually landed its approved candidates there. Governors Pollard, Peery, Price, Darden, Tuck, Stanley, Almond Harrison and Godwin followed Byrd in unbroken Organization - oriented

LATE IN 1965 the Senator, feeling his age of 79, resigned his office. One of the last things he did before leaving Washington was to dictate a twopage introduction for the book "Washngton and Lee: A Study in the Will to Win" by this columnist where the Senator summarized, I believe, his political faith. He did so by quoting from President Washington's farewell address with its emphasis on religion and morality. Washington said:

"OF ALL THE dispositions and habits which lead to political prosperity, religion and morality are indespensible supports."

Governor Harrison named Harry Byrd Jr., a political figure in his own right, to succeed the revered father. Never in its history did the Organization go into an election with more disadvantages than in the Democratic primary of July 12, 1964. And never, as a following column will set forth, have its death - notices been more gleefully and erronesously pronounced by its envious opponents.
