AN OLD IDEA REGARDING the state of Texas has been brought up by a pair of legislators. With all of the flack that Texas has been receiving, although the state is the nation's richest energy-producer, the idea may have some merit.

We refer to the old idea, and privilege that the state has, of dividing itself up into five smaller states.

Buffeted by Eastern ecologists who oppose offshore oil drilling and construction of oil refineries, and newer threats, such as the loss of natural gas for irrigation purposes, the failure of the farm bill, etc., the idea may be getting closer to being a reality.

According to the treaty under which Texas joined the United States, we retained the right to divide into as many as five states.

Using a little quick arithmetic one can easily see that this would give Texas ten senators instead of two, and would still leave Texans with less representation than New England, which has only 66,608 square miles, to Texas' 267,338.

New England now outvotes Texas 37-26 in the electoral college. Should the state vote to split up, this would be reduced to 37-34. "Splithood" would not change the setup in the House of Representatives, since this is based on population.

State senator Bob Gammage, and Dallas representative Fred Agnich are supporting a movement which would call for a referendum on the splitting question on next year's general election ballot.

We would like to see the referendum, just to see out of curiosity how the voters would react. As usual, the referendum would not be binding, but it would give state legislators a yardstick to go by.

There was a time when we doubt if such a proposition would have been favored by many, simply because of plain old stupidity called PRIDE at being the largest state, for whatever that was worth.

However, since Alaska came along and punctured most Texans' egos, we won't have to worry about that problem quite as much. (Many Texans, though, contend that Texas is still the nation's largest "fully thawed" state.)

The two Texas lawmakers argue that our state is the nation's major energy producer, one of the major agricultural, industrial and shipping states, but can be rendered helpless in the U.S. Senate, where little old New England has 12 votes to our two.

If the Supreme Court were to call the splitting move unconstitutional, the two lawmakers say, then that might uncover a new can of worms.

According to Gammage and Agnich, if any part of the 1845 treaty were termed unconstitutional, the whole treaty would have to be thrown out, and Texas would revert to being an independent republic again.

That might be the best idea yet. Then, maybe we could apply for foreign aid.

WE CAN'T LET the class of 1975 get plumb gone without once more telling them how proud we are of each one for their honors and achievements.

Problems Not Beyond Solving, Says Mahon

"Our problems were man-made, and they can be man-solved," said Congressman George Mahon during his luncheon visit in Friona this past Tuesday.

The congressman visited and spoke briefly with some 100 Friona residents who turned out at the Community Center for an informal meeting with the longtime Lubbock representative.

Mahon addressed himself primarily to the problems being faced today by our country, and the problems he and his congressional classmates are facing. Friona was one of a number of stops he made during the Congressional break for Memorial Day.

He had earlier addressed a coffee meeting in Farwell, and went from the Friona meeting to Bovina for an afternoon coffee meeting which drew some 70 of his constituents.

"There is one thing different about our present-day problems," Mahon said. "Usually, you can see a light at the end of the tunnel. At the present time, we're not so sure about the solutions to some of our problems," Mahon stated.

Repeating a phrase he has used throughout his meetings in the area, the congressman stated that he senses a "Tide of unhappiness prevailing the country. The members of congress realize that we are 'on trial' by the people of America," he told his Friona audience.

Mahon attributed at least a part of the unhappiness to the bad experience the nation had in Vietnam. "The American people have not been willing to accept failure," he said, apparently referring to the Vietnam debacle.

Addressing himself to the problems of the High Plains area, Mahon said he was well aware of the cattle feeding problem. He was instrumental in getting the Emergency Livestock Act passed last year, which made some loan money available to financially-plagued cattle feeders.

He termed the president's recent veto of the Emergency Farm Bill as "unfortunate." "The House and Senate had passed the bill, and I was very much in favor of it, but the president vetoed the bill on the advice of the Secretary of

Agriculture. With farmers facing increasing costs on every hand, this is bound to hurt the confidence of farmers," Mahon stated.

He said that he was in favor of severely curtailing importation of beef to help strengthen the beef market for U.S. cattlemen, but said that the consumer-oriented legislature, this would be virtually impossible. There have been some strides made in this direction, however, Mahon said.

Concerning a water import plan for this area, the legislator said "This lush area would be tremendously downgraded if its water supply were terminated. We are trying to cultivate all of the interest we can on the state level. This is a problem that must be solved and WILL be solved," Mahon said. He complimented governor Dolph Briscoe for his efforts toward a water import program, as well as Speaker of the House Bill Clayton, this area's representative. "They are both vitally interested in a water import program," he said.

On the Federal Power Commission's ruling to downgrade the priority of irrigation gas, Mahon stated "With the world needing food and fiber, it would be ridiculous to turn the (gas) priority over to industry. As someone stated during the hearings, 'you can't eat automobiles.'"

Mahon was instrumental in getting the recent hearings scheduled in Lubbock and Albuquerque. Ordinarily, all hearings of this type are conducted in Washington.

Mahon, who is chairman of the powerful House Appropriations Committee, pointed out that the United States and Russia are the world's two great super-powers, and warned that the communists are gaining, and in fact have surpassed the U.S. in some military categories. He said he didn't believe Americans want the nation to "let down its guard" at this point.

Referring to the national debt, Mahon decried the fact that the 1976 federal budget calls for increasing the debt by \$100 billion for the year.

"We've got to be willing to sacrifice and work toward a balanced budget. Without sacrifice, we can't possibly solve our problems," Mahon said.

The congressman opened his remarks with glowing compliments for the community center. He had been given a tour of the building, and was told that the center was built completely from donations, without

Plans Gain TDH Okay

Project Nursing Home cleared another plateau last week with the approval of the plans by the State Department of Health.

The architect, Raymond Powell, met with the nursing home committee here Thursday, and made some changes on the master plan prior to having the final plans drawn.

The committee also finalized plans to purchase seven and one-half acres from Tommy Jones in the northern part of town for the location of the nursing home complex.

"The property we are buying will give adequate room for future

expansion to allow for retirement cottages and dormitories in addition to the nursing home itself," stated Dr. Bob Alexander in reference to the final plans.

The architect plans to work up the final drawings, and the nursing home board will be seeking bids for construction of the facility. A tentative date of July 28 was scheduled for bid opening on the project.

The nursing home project continues to move steadily forward. Local leaders are shooting for an August groundbreaking for the project.

Friona Flashbacks ...from the files of The Friona Star

45 YEARS AGO—JUNE 6, 1930

One of the saddest affairs that has visited Friona and community in many years occurred Monday morning, resulting in the death of Paul Highfill, the fourteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Highfill, whose farm home is a few miles southeast of Friona. It appears that Paul had ridden his pony to the pasture to bring in a cow and young calf and nothing more was known of him until the pony appeared at the home with his lifeless body attached to it by means of a small rope, one end being tied around the boy's body while the other was tied to the pony's neck. The body was considerably mangled and death had evidently resulted from being dragged or kicked by the pony.

40 YEARS AGO—JUNE 7, 1935

Much of the news due to appear in the Friona Star today does not appear because a first class mail sack was stolen from the Santa Fe station in Panhandle Tuesday night, which contained letters from Friona with news and advertisements, as well as hundreds of other pieces of mail. The mail pouch, according to bank officials, contained a large number of checks for Panhandle banks.

35 YEARS AGO—JUNE 7, 1940

Mr. Harley Bulls, music director in Friona Schools, has been recently appointed as seventh district chairman of the Rural School Music, a division in the Texas Federated Music Clubs. The seventh district covers something over forty-five counties, including the Panhandle and extending south beyond Lubbock.

30 YEARS AGO—JUNE 1, 1945

Mr. and Mrs. C.R. Owens, of the Hub Community south of Friona, have received word from their son, Pvt. Juel Owens, informing them that he has been liberated from a German war prison, where he had been since the 4th of last October, and is in good health. He was liberated April 29. Pvt. Owens has been overseas a year and took part in the invasion on D-Day and was in combat most of the time thereafter until he was taken prisoner.

25 YEARS AGO—MAY 26, 1950

The Friona substation of the Southwestern Public Service Company, has been completed and is ready for operation. C.D. Hardesty, district manager for the Southwestern Public Service Company, announced this week. The installation of a new voltage regulator completed the project, Mr. Hardesty added.

Vera Ann Jones was named state champion over all typing contestants throughout Texas. She chalked up a highly enviable score of 155.02 with 97 percent accuracy at Austin recently. This surpassed the state record for both 1948 and 1949.

20 YEARS AGO—JUNE 3, 1955

Farmers east of Hub received two and one-half inches of rainfall Monday afternoon in a short period of time. The heavy rain washed the newly planted cotton completely away. The thunderstorm occurred halfway between Hub and Dimmitt, and will cause the farmers in that area to replant all the cotton.

Gaylor Maurer was commissioned a Second

Lieutenant in the United States Air Force Reserve upon graduation.

15 YEARS AGO—JUNE 2, 1960

Farm-to-market roads are still being built in Parmer County in spite of the greatly curtailed state-federal program. A contract for 9.7 miles of construction on FM1172 was awarded a Lubbock firm this week, it was announced by the State Highway Commission. James C. Kerr submitted low bid of \$128,914 on this project. It covers grading, structures, base and surfacing from State 86 (3.5 miles west of Castro County line) to Lazbuddie. Eventually, it is planned to continue this road northward to tie in with Highway 60 near the community of Black.

10 YEARS AGO—JUNE 3, 1965

Open house for the new \$100,000 addition to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona will be held from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday.

5 YEARS AGO—JUNE 4, 1970

Congressman Bob Price has been advised by the Department of Agriculture that the budget limitations have been removed to permit preliminary work to proceed on 25 watershed projects in 16 states—including Running Water Draw and Lower Running Water Draw Watershed projects in the 18th Congressional District.

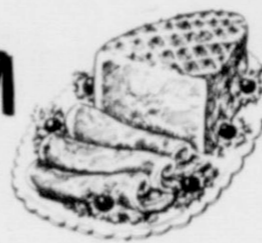

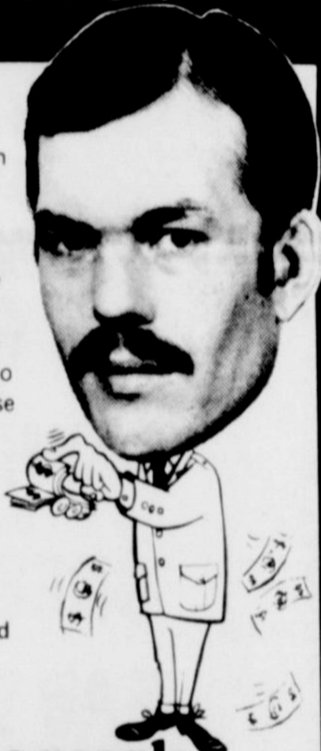

Extension Service Sets County Food Workshops

Topics for the three day presentation will be Canning Fruits and Vegetables and Pressure Canner Clinics, to be presented by Jana Pronger, representative of the Parmer County Extension Service. Miss Pronger urges that those attending bring their pressure cookers to be tested and she will test as many as time permits. If

From a dollars and cents standpoint, how much did Federal grants-in-aid and revenue sharing produce for Parmer County in the past fiscal year?

Did the price it had to pay for these grants, by way of taxes allocated to the programs, make them worthwhile financially?

Under the various types of aid available—there are hundreds of them—assistance is offered to states and local communities for purposes ranging from welfare grants and child care to road building and education.

The cost to some localities, in the past year, proved to be greater than the aid received. Others got back more than they put in.

A comprehensive state-by-state study of the programs based upon Treasury Department figures, was made by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit research organization that keeps watch over government taxation and spending.

A breakdown of its figures indicates that the amount of aid received by Parmer County was relatively small.

An estimated \$1,973,000 went to the local area in the

year under a variety of aid programs.

In the State of Texas as a whole, the grants totaled \$2,111,000,000 the Government's figures show.

The amounts refer only to grants-in-aid and revenue sharing and do not include Federal spending in local areas for goods and services.

As to the cost of the benefits received, the Tax Foundation finds that some \$2,273,000,000 of the taxes collected throughout the state went into the aid programs.

Parmer County's share of the cost was approximately \$2,111,000, exclusive of matching funds.

Nationally, the figures show, \$38.5 billion was distributed in grants-in-aid and \$6.1 billion in revenue sharing, a total of \$44.6 billion.

In 23 states the costs exceeded the grants received. The other 27 states came out on the plus side.

Indiana was the biggest loser, paying \$1.58 for every \$1 that was returned. Alaska was the chief gainer, paying only 36 cents per \$1 of aid.

The inequity is attributed to the fact that some communities need more aid than others.

Trust Fund Started For Kevin Heady

 Unlike many adults, three-year-old Kevin Heady does not feel sorry for himself.
 "All he talks about is getting a new foot so he can go home and play," Carl Heady, Kevin's father, says.
 Kevin, an active, bright blue-eyed youngster, lost his right foot as a result of an accident at his home on Finley Road on April 29.
 He is the grandson of Zada and Kenneth Heady formerly of Friona and the great-grandson of Mrs. Alvin Carter of Friona.
 He was playing on a swing set in his back yard while his mother was cutting the grass on a riding lawn

mower. Mrs. Heady, after missing a stretch of grass, backed up and accidentally hit Kevin, who had abandoned the swings and headed for his mother.
 The blades of the mower cut deeply into the young boy's foot, ankle and leg. Luckily, Kevin's father and a friend were close by when the accident occurred. Carl Heady heard the collision and a subsequent scream from his wife, and at the same time, neighbor Gerald Casey was working in his yard. The two men held Kevin while Mrs. Heady ran into the house and brought a towel to wrap around the young boy.
 He was then taken to Irving Community Hospital, where a tourniquet was applied to stop the bleeding. Kevin was immediately transferred to Parkland Hospital in Dallas by ambulance because of its better facilities.
 "Gerald Casey came over and helped us," Heady said. "He heard the accident and jumped the fence. He held Kevin's leg while I drove to the hospital and was a tremendous help."
 Kevin lost a large amount of blood and physicians did not close the wound for two weeks because of a fear of infection. Since the accident, Kevin has received ten pints of blood.
 The accident has been tough on both Kevin and his parents, they say. He has already undergone five operations and is scheduled for another soon. His foot was amputated from the heel forward in the first operation. Additional surgery was necessary to check for possible infection and to set a badly damaged ankle. Nevertheless, Kevin appears surprisingly good natured and playful.
 "He wasn't in good spirits the first time I saw him," said Steve Harmon, a member of the Irving chapter of the American Business Clubs (AMBUCS). Harmon visited Kevin soon after the accident while he was in great pain.
 Heady, manager of White's Auto Store on Story Road, has been a resident of Irving for the past nine years while his wife Judy has lived here all of her life.
 "The Headys are certainly good people, the kind of people that contribute a great deal to our community," said Gene Waldrum, another member of the AMBUCS. With that thought in mind, the AMBUCS have initiated a trust fund

for Kevin to help alleviate the medical bills facing the family. Although the Heady family would not even begin to estimate the possible medical bill, it was learned that the hospital costs in such cases are approximately \$100 per day. Kevin has already been hospitalized for 19 days.
 The Headys do not have medical insurance on Kevin.
 The AMBUCS are hopeful of raising \$3,000 for the boy's expenses. "Certainly, that will not cover the expenses, but it will ease the burden," Waldrum said.
 Several different options exist for Irvingites who wish to contribute. Persons may donate blood, which can be either used by Kevin or credited against his medical expenses.
 In donating money, persons may write checks to the AMBUCS, signifying that the money is for the Kevin Heady Trust Fund. Contributions are tax deductible. Or persons may contribute directly to Kevin's trust fund at Irving Bank and Trust Co., 111 E. Irving Blvd., Irving, Texas 75060.
 "People who would like to donate should contact Ron Runge at Irving Bank & Trust or Steve Harmon and myself," said Waldrum. "These people can call us and we will come out to their homes to collect the money."
 The city's two AMBUCS chapters have kicked off the drive with donations of \$200 each.
 Despite the accident, those coming in contact with Kevin and his father can sense a strong and positive attitude about the future.
 "The doctors have said that Kevin's new artificial foot will fit somewhat like a boot. They even say that he'll be able to play football," Heady said.

Frionans Graduate From A&M

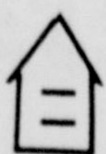
Two students from Friona received degrees at Texas A&M University's spring commencement exercises.

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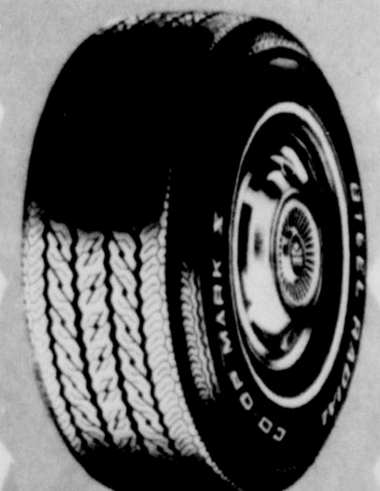
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
