While it is true that some of our businesses have felt the pinch of the cutdown of cattle feeding, and are having to hustle to maintain their position as compared to a year ago, others are doing better and actually showing gains.

Think positive....Let's resolve to make the year 1975 a good year!

IT STAGGERS the imagination, and boggles the mind of Friona sports fans to realize that the Chieftain basketball team finished with a 2-2 record for the first half of district play—in third place.

Everyone feels like the team should have beaten Morton. And if the Chiefs had have gotten just one or two calls in their favor at Dimmitt the other night—chances are they could have beaten the Bobcats, even in their own gym.

So, the team has the big second half to go, and they are out to prove some things.

Someone made the statement that if this bunch of clean-cut hard-working and talented boys lose out on the district title—for the second time this school year—then there is no justice in the world today.

We have to agree.

TOM PATTESON loaned us his latest copy of the Texas Livestock Market News, and the report had an interesting article entitled "How much meat are we actually eating?"

The report states that in 1973, Americans consumed on a per capita basis, 109.6 pounds of beef. At first glance, this sounds like a lot of beef, although upon examination, it really isn't.

Consumption figures are measured in the form of carcass weight. With an average yield of 66 per cent of boneless edible meat, plus another 25 per cent shrink during cooking, the average comes down to 54 pounds per year, or only about 2.36 ounces of beef per day.

Like the sign says—we need to buy Texas beef, and less less!

LAST LEGISLATIVE session an El Paso House member named Charles F. Tupper had an \$8.5 million idea—put out license plates renewable for five years. And the time for that worthy experiment has arrived.

Purchasers of some 9,500,000 license plates for 1975 will get an extra-heavy non-corrosive steel license plate that will have to do for five years. For the next four years, through 1979, each winter the owner will simply stick on a 1x2 inch adhesive "validation tag" properly identified. The little tags will cost about 3 cents apiece.

That cost compares to about 43 cents for the original plate. It figures out that the State, over the five-year period, will come out \$8.5 million ahead.

A few classes of motor vehicles will have to go by the old routine: dealers, state officials, members of the Legislature, radio operators, purchasers of "personalized" plates, and anyone else who has to have a specific car number. These folks will have to replace their plates annually.

As for the rest of us, we'll not worry about any change this year. To get the heavy 1975 plates, we'll go to the county tax office between Feb. 1 and April 1—or mail in our renewal notices with an extra \$1 per vehicle beginning Feb. 1. The \$1 covers postage and handling. Remember to do this, if at all, by March 1.

Chamber Names Top Citizens For 1975

Friona's outstanding citizens for 1975 were honored at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet Monday night.

The banquet was held at the Community Center-Showbarn for the second time, and once again drew a record of over 600 people.

Following the awards, principal speaker Cavett Robert made an inspiring and challenging speech to those attending.

Honored as man of the year by the Chamber was A.W. (Dub) Anthony, Jr. Mrs. Pete (Myrl) Buske was chosen as Woman of the Year. Her husband is the former winner of the "Man of the Year" award.

High school principal Raymond Cook was selected as "Teacher of the Year."

In a unique award, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Scales were chosen as "Most Courteous Employees." Dale

Cleveland and Carol Ann Bavousett, both Friona High School seniors, were chosen as our outstanding young people.

Anthony, a longtime official in the Grain Sorghum Producers Assn., which he served as president for six years, has also served as a director on the U.S. Feed Grains Council. He has been president of boards at both Friona Wheat Growers and Friona Farmers Co-op Gin.

The Friona agricultural leader was named Parmer County's "Conservation Farmer of the Year" in 1957. He is a board member for Parmer County Community Hospital.

Other organizations which Anthony serves as director include Plains Co-op Oil Mill, Growers Seed Assn., Plainview Production Credit Assn., and Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative. He is a trustee for the

High Plains Research Station, and is vice chairman of the Plains Agriculture Environment Council.

In late 1973, Anthony was appointed to the Agricultural Advisory Committee for the Federal Energy Commission.

Mrs. Buske has been a Friona resident since 1929, and was cited for her role as a wife, mother, and church worker. She is an active

Credit Union's Annual Meeting Is Tuesday

The 21st annual meeting of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union will be held Tuesday (February 4) at the Friona High School Cafeteria.

The meeting will begin with registration at 7:30 p.m. A barbecue supper will be served beginning at 8 p.m.

Also on the program will be entertainment, reports from the various committees, and election of three directors. Door prizes will also be given.

Lloyd Lovell, Lubbock, will be the speaker for the banquet.

Entertainment will be provided by the Friona High School stage band, under the direction of Charles Faulkner.

Directors whose terms are expiring are Dale Houlette, Geneva Williams and Edward White. Houlette is currently serving as vice president of the board, and Mrs. Williams is the treasurer. White is a member of the executive committee.

Holdover directors include Ray Landrum, president, Charles Scales, John Baca and Jerry Brown.

Members of the credit union's loan committee are Ralph Roden, Leonard Coffey and Alvin Gaines. Coffey's term is expiring on this committee.

The FTFCU's supervisory committee is made up of Larry Knowles and Charles Scales.

Mrs. Williams pointed out that the Credit Union's year-end statement which showed shares of \$1,124,868.89 represented an all-time record for the organization.

On December 31, a total of \$14,563.77 in dividends was paid to members, making a total for the year of \$53,943.95, also an all-time record.

The Credit Union had total assets of \$1,393,256.65 as of December 31, an increase of \$105,403.97 over the same date a year earlier.

At the beginning of the year, the Credit Union has a total of 1,842 members, an increase of 39 over the same date a year ago.

A new program was instigated by the Credit Union on January 3 of this year. It is disability insurance on loans. Each member is asked to visit the office and get their loan covered

Team Girds For 2nd Half Of District Play

After their second heart-breaking loss in eight days, the Friona Chieftains are having to reach "way down in their pride department, in order to get back "up" for the second half of district play, which begins next week.

The Chiefs got a break from district action on Friday, when they hosted Lockney's Longhorns, but it wasn't expected to be much of a respite.

Adding injury to insult from the Dimmitt fracas was a badly bruised ankle by senior forward Gene Strickland. When Strickland got to school on Wednesday following the Dimmitt game, the ankle was swollen twice its normal size.

He underwent treatment by the trainer at Hereford High School, and by Thursday was feeling somewhat better. Coach Larry Dyess indicated that Strickland would try the foot out against Lockney.

"That had to be hurting Gene. It happened in the second quarter, and we didn't know anything about it

until after the game. Gene went up for a shot, and came down on the foot wrong," Dyess said.

The Chieftain coach said he thought the boys would rebound for the big second half of the season, during which Friona's work is cut out for them.

"They know what's ahead. I think they'll do the job," Dyess commented.

The Chiefs go to Littlefield Tuesday to begin the second half of district play. Then they travel to Morton next Friday (February 7) in an effort to get back at the Indians, who have accounted for two of the team's three losses.

In order to have a shot at the district title, Friona is now forced to win the second half title outright, which would throw the Chieftains into a playoff with Dimmitt for the league crown.

Most fans feel that the team can beat the Bobcats on their home court, providing they get at least half of the breaks.

License Tags Go On Sale

The sale of Texas license tags, the new five-year variety, is scheduled to begin Monday, Feb. 3, according to Hugh Moseley, Parmer County tax assessor-collector.

Motor vehicle owners have been receiving the

past several weeks license renewal applications from the Texas Highway Department in Austin for the purpose of obtaining 1975 plates.

Owners may order their tags by mail by sending the three-part renewal application, registration fee and \$1 to cover the cost of mailing, said Moseley.

Applications should be sent to the county courthouse in Farwell and not to Austin, he explained.

License plates may also be obtained in person at the county tax office, he added, by bringing the application.

Deadline for displaying the new tags is midnight, April 1.

45 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 7, 1930

Residents of the city who have been patiently waiting the coming of the new waterworks system for the city have seen something to begin along that line. Mr. McDade of Amarillo has arrived, and will drill the water well for the system. Mr. Harper, who will superintend the laying of lines, is also here, and all are anxious to get the work underway.

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40 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 8, 1935

Mayor F.W. Reeve reports there is much encouragement that actual work of construction on Federal Highway 60 through Parmer County may begin within the near future. Mayor Reeve said he had a positive guarantee from the state highway commission that the entire strip across the county would be completed by the coming autumn.

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35 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 9, 1940

A new 200,000 bushel grain elevator will be ready to handle grain by March 1 in Black. Black Grain Company is building the concrete structure at the cost of \$140,000. Pete Braxton of Black will be manager of the grain company.

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20 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 4, 1955

New Friona residents are—Tom Jarboe, teaching in the Friona schools and Leo Reed—mechanic at Reeve Chevrolet Co.

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15 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 4, 1960

Funeral services for Arthur Owen Drake, 79, a resident of Parmer County and the immediate Friona area for over 51 years, were read Tuesday afternoon from the Friona Methodist Church. Mr. Drake died suddenly last Sunday morning at home.

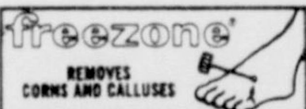
IT'S HISTORY!

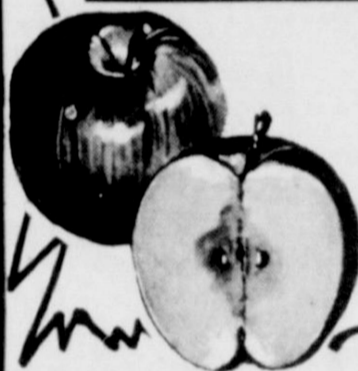

Historical Marker Is Tabbed For City Church

An Official Texas Historical Marker for the first church in the City of Friona will be erected on or about April 5, 1975, it was announced today by Hugh Moseley of Farwell, chairman of the Farmer County Historical Survey Committee.

The marker will be placed at 220 W. 6th St., Friona in front of the Adobe Union Congregational Church Building. Dedication plans will be announced in the near future.

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 27 by 42 inches and is sponsored by Farmer County Historical Survey Committee.

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas Historical Commission's program of preservation activities. These include archeological investigations, small museum consultation, and administering the National Historic Preservation Act in Texas. As of 1970 the Historical Commission had erected more than 5,000 official markers.

The name and location of

the present marker will appear in the next edition of the "Guide To Official Texas Historical Markers" in order to stimulate tourist travel in this area, to arouse interest in historical tours, and to acquaint the people of this locale with their unique heritage.

The inscription on the marker reads:
SITE OF FIRST CHURCH IN CITY OF FRIONA

The City of Friona was founded in 1906 by George G. Wright Land Co., of Kansas City, an agency employed by the XIT Ranch owners to sell their range lands in small tracts. Religious-minded settlers in 1908 organized the Union Congregational Church. Charter members included Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Fergus, Charles Karr, Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Karr, Walter Kell, William McCandish, Mr. and Mrs. D.W. McMillen, Mr. and Mrs. Ross V. McWilliams, Mr. and Mrs. C.B. Oleson, Mr. and Mrs. John Orbaugh, Mr. and Mrs. Seth Roush, Bert Shattuck, Mrs. Nellie Shattuck, and A.N. Wentworth.

George G. Wright donated

six lots at this site and the Congregational Church building society of New York made a \$770.00 construction grant. Friona's first church building, a frame structure with hand-painted, arched windows and a belfry, was completed and dedicated on May 23, 1909. The basement added in 1916 served as center for social activities. After that meetinghouse burned in 1921, this adobe chapel was built. It was used until the Congregationalists in 1969 erected a sanctuary on a new site. In 1973, this building was given to the Girl Scouts to be used for their meeting hall and activities and for a "Pioneer Heritage Chapel and Museum".

PLAINS IRRIGATION GAS USERS ASSN.

January 22, 1975

TO: Board Of Directors

Gentlemen:

The use of natural gas for irrigation fuel has been seriously threatened. In an Opinion by the Federal Power Commission issued 12-19-74, the Federal Power Commission held that uses for irrigation pumping should not be included in the definition of "commercial" service, and went on to hold that pumping operations and agricultural activities would be clarified as "industrial." The Commission held that if there were alternate fuels that could be used, that natural gas could not be used, and obviously irrigation motors could be run by propane, butane or diesel if the propane, butane or diesel were available.

It is absolutely essential to muster all the help of all farm organizations to keep these priorities from being changed, and convince the powers that be that agriculture in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas would be destroyed if we are prohibited from using natural gas as a fuel. This should be publicized in your papers prior to your county meetings, and every effort should be obtained to get this news to every irrigation farmer, and I hope that you will take whatever time is necessary in order to accomplish this purpose.

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Bobcats Get Breaks; Claim First Round

Whistles, Coldness Hurt FHS

Dimmitt's Bobcats captured the first half title in District 3-AA Tuesday night, with a 53-50 win over the Friona Chieftains in a hard-fought basketball game at Dimmitt.

The Chieftains, suffering their second loss of the first half, just couldn't buy a break in the vital district contest. And when you consider all the factors, it's a wonder the game was as close as it was.

The Bobcats, it seemed, got all the breaks. Officials whistled the Chieftains down 21 times on fouls, to only nine for Dimmitt. Included in Friona's foul totals were six offensive ("player controlled") fouls. The 'Cats made a good percentage of their shots, while the Chiefs were shooting a season low mark of 30 per cent from the field.

The fouling difference was so much a factor that the Chieftains never did gain the one-and-one free shot status, in either half, while Dimmitt went to the line on the 1-1 situation seven times in the vital fourth quarter.

Friona outscored Dimmitt, 46-42, from the field, but the Bobcats, thanks to the additional free shot opportunities, won the game at the free throw line by leading 11-4 in this department.

The game started off like the barn-burner it was expected to be. Friona took the first lead, 1-0, on Dale Cleveland's free shot 1:02 into the first quarter. The lead was to change hands seven times during the first quarter.

Jumping Jack Craig Williams (number 30) gave Dimmitt leads at 2-1 and 4-3, while Friona took leads on shots by David Hutson and Gene Strickland. It was Strickland's two long shots from the side at 3:04 and 2:19 that gave Friona its longest lead of the game at 11-8.

The Chiefs missed a couple of good chances to take an even longer lead, once on a fast break when a layup wouldn't fall. Dimmitt used the opportunity to trim the lead to one, 11-10 at the buzzer, thanks to a long jumper by Williams with 11 seconds left in the quarter.

Williams kept up his torrid pace to open the second period, with another long jump shot 24 seconds into the quarter, and gave Dimmitt a 12-11 lead that the Bobcats would not relinquish.

Dimmitt took three-point leads, which were trimmed back to one at 14-13 and 16-15 on baskets by Strickland. On the last one, with 4:56 left in the half, Gene injured an ankle, although no one knew it at the time.

After that Strickland basket, Friona went frigid for a period of 3:47 on the clock, and Dimmitt stretched the 16-15 lead into a seven-point lead at 22-15 with 1:21 left in the quarter.

Clay Bandy came in to score a basket, and Hutson got another to cut Dimmitt's lead to three at halftime, 22-19.

Baskets by Cleveland and Hutson kept Friona within a point in the early part of the third quarter, but Dimmitt kept responding, mostly on the shooting of Williams, a newcomer to the team from last year.

Dimmitt had four-point leads at 28-24 and 30-26, but Strickland got a layin to trim it to two at 30-28. After Dimmitt made it five at 33-28, reserve David Clark scored a layup, and Cleveland got only his second basket of the game, again pulling Friona within one point, at 33-32.

But the Chiefs again couldn't get their shot to fall, and Dimmitt increased its lead to three at the end of the quarter, 35-32 on a late basket.

A short but costly cold spell hurt the Chiefs in the middle of the last quarter. Hutson's pair of baskets had kept the team close at 39-37, when Dimmitt rallied for three straight baskets to take an eight-point edge, longest of the game, at 45-37 with 4:54 left.

However, Friona rallied with Hutson again getting a pair of buckets and Dusty Peters a layup after Strickland stole the ball, to pull back close at 45-43.

Peters fouled out a minute later, in a weird situation that almost cost Friona a technical foul. Clark had reported, and was trying to get into the game before Peters drew his fifth foul. When the foul came, Clark went on into the game, and officials tried to access Friona a technical foul for Clark's "failure to report," when he actually had reported much earlier than needed.

The refs first called the TF, but when the scorekeeper remembered Clark reporting, they withdrew the extra foul.

Cleveland gave Friona fans hope with a vital three-point play with 2:03 remaining, and Dimmitt in its

Even with reserves playing much of the final quarter, Friona still scored 25 points for the final margin of 85-44.

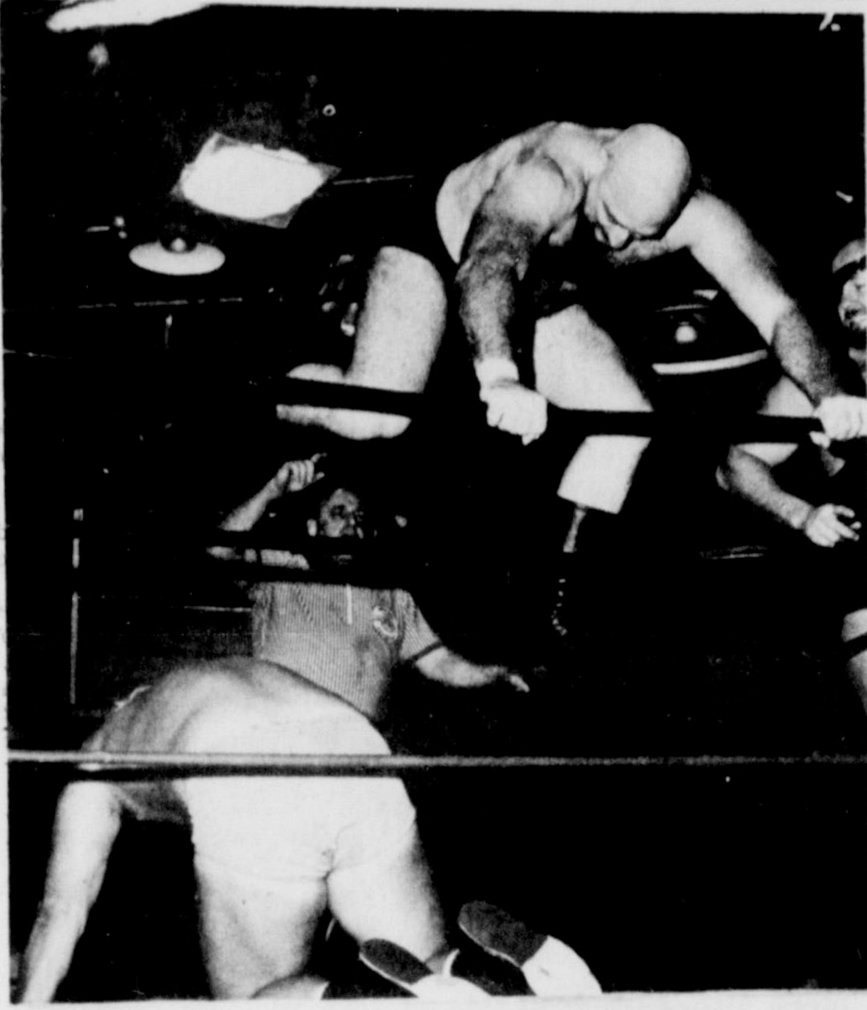

Dr. Gill explains the center's family concept of treatment as a necessity "because all members of the family are affected by the illness of any member" and by working professionally to help every member of the family during a marriage or family crisis "we can treat the primary patient rapidly and get the family back in shape as soon as possible."

Counseling for the most part involves working with outpatients. Community needs are carefully watched by the staff at the center, and convenient outreach offices are located in Tulia, Dimmitt, Friona, Muleshoe, Littlefield and Floydada. The Central Plains Mental Health Center serves nine

counties: Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd and Motley.

Bullock said his office has been besieged with calls and letters this month by businesses which were unaware that the license requirement was repealed as of Dec. 31, 1974.

"Obviously, the past administration didn't get the message out," Bullock said. "I consider it good news that we've been able to do away with the store license."

The store license, which started at \$5 for a single store, was a minor revenue source. Its repeal by phases was ordered by the Legislature in 1971.

Bullock said that some 240,000 stores in Texas had previously been covered by the license act.

SCS Report


It is grass seeding time according to Herb Evans, SCS, Friona. Whether you are thinking spring seeded cool season grasses or warm season grasses, this is planting time.

Your seedbed should be prepared. When I say that I mean you should have a clean firm seedbed. If the seedbed has not been firmed up by weather it will need to be cultupacked. Experience has shown that a firm seedbed results in the best stands of grass.

Kinds and rates of grass vary according to the soil type and individual needs.

The Soil Conservation Service does have the recommended kinds and amounts needed for your particular farm. Also if you are going into an extensive planting program, the Great Plains Conservation Program will provide benefits.

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Commissioners - - Court Prepares To Let Bids, Gives Okay For Personnel

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday morning, Jan. 27, to discuss land lease bids and the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center.

During the session, Commissioners voted to advertise school lands in Gaines County for lease. According to County Judge Paul Fortenberry, there are approximately 2300 total acres in the school lands available for lease and Parmer County's share of the lands amounts to approximately 1700 acres.

A report was given on the progress of construction of the new Parmer County Law Enforcement Center facilities and the money involved in the construction.

It was reported that progress is "coming along fine" and the "money situation looks good."

In further action concerning the law enforcement center, Commissioners agreed to authorize the Sheriff's Department to employ two additional police dispatchers to work in the center when it is completed.

Also included on the agenda was a discussion of the county's insurance program. Action taken involved discussion and renewal of automobile and general liability insurance. Insuring of building and contents was discussed by the Commissioners with renewal to be approved at a later date.

Among other business conducted at the meeting were the approval of the current county tax rate and discussion concerning a new farm road running five miles south and three east of Bovina. Also, certain road crossings were approved for gas and water lines.

Commissioners present for the session included Jimmy Briggs, Charlie Jefferson, Tom Lewellen and Cecil Atchley and Judge Fortenberry.

Next meeting has been scheduled for Monday, Feb. 10, at which time the Commissioners anticipate the approval of a tentative date of February 24 for letting bids on leasing of the school land.

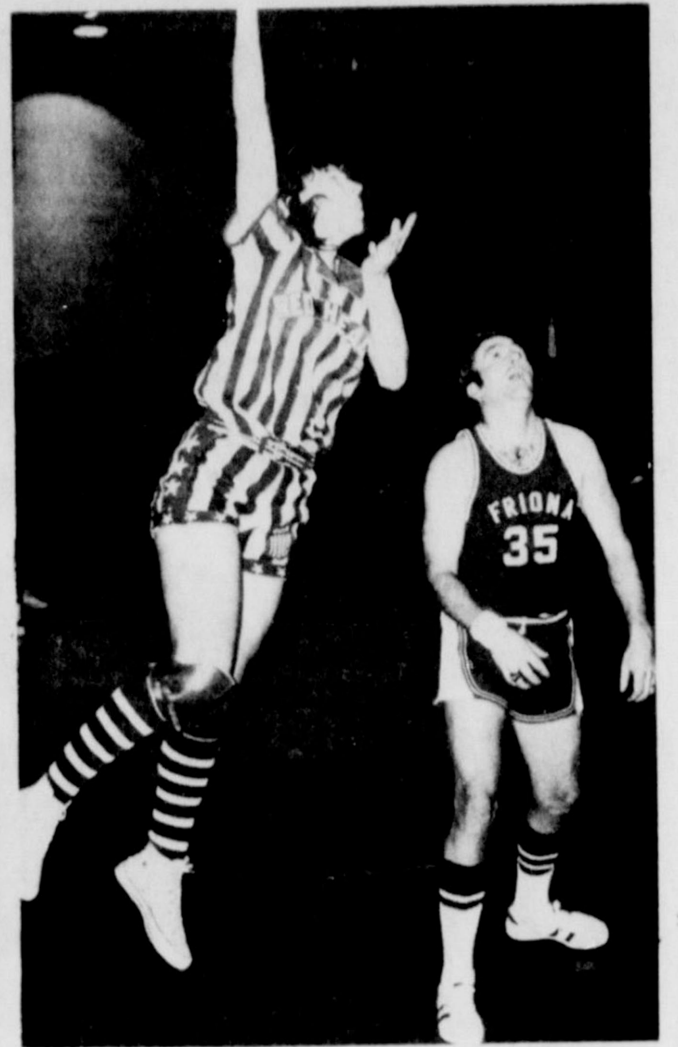

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Farmers May Face Gas Shortage

L.B. Brandes of Floyd County, Texas, President of the Board of Directors of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, stated that in an Opinion issued on 12-19-74, being Opinion 697-A, the Federal Power Commission held that the use of natural gas for irrigation should not be included in the definition of "commercial" as it has always been classified, but now must be held to be classed as "industrial" use, reducing gas for agriculture from Priority 2 down to Priority 3. As far as inter-state gas is concerned, this would effectively put an end to the use of natural gas for irrigation, and it would be highly doubtful if one farmer out of one hundred could secure butane, propane or diesel in sufficient quantity to power his irrigation well, even if he could afford to pay the price that butane, propane or diesel would cost.

If farmers are to continue to use natural gas for irrigation, every effort should be put forward by every organization of farmers of every kind and nature to prevent this change in priority.
