



Choose Wisely From Wealth

The nation's textbook publishers are enjoying an unprecedented boom. Total sales are reported to be 10 per cent above last year's with even better business predicted for next year. Another impor-tant factor is the increase in federal aid to education, which brings heavier textbook spending especially in areas where the schools have had sharply restricted buying power. Also, the use of closed-circuit television and various automatic teaching aids has boosted the demand for printed study ma-

It is good to know that there is such a brisk market for textbooks. It is good to know that America's young people have such a tremendous variety of educational materials available to them. But the textbook boom can also be taken as a reminder of how important it is for schools to choose wisely from this wealth.

There has been some fear that the federal government, as it pours more and more funds into public school education, will seek a decisive voice in textbook selection. Though this may be more a bugaboo than a genu-ine threat, the idea should be and sure-ly will be resisted by state and local school authorities.

The coin has another side, however. The public is more knowlegeable in such matters than it used to be. Unless educators at the local level make sound choices of teaching materials, with an eye to the highest edu-cational values, they may find themselves facing public demand for some-thing better. This might prepare the way for the federal government to step in. That can be avoided if educators are both wise and fair in exercising their responsibility.

Almost every Army trainee will sympathize with Joseph Fidtler, inlate of a Pennsylvania correctional institution who landed in the pokey when he violated the terms of his parole. He applied for work in the band. Instead he was assigned to cut

grass. David Lawrence **Need New Kind Of Statesmanship**

WASHINGTON - Time was when Labor Day was an occasion for exthe contribution being made by the American workingman to the national welfare. Today, however, although labor unions are probably dogood than harm, the fact is that the amount of injury to the private - enterprise system being inflicted by unwise labor leadership is steadily increasing.

LABOR UNIONS could be a constructive force in the production and distribution of goods and services, but the chief weakness at present is a failure to be concerned with equitable settlements that would give stimulus to the investor. The wages of money have not kept pace with the growth of the country. Increases in labor cost not only have brought inflationary prices but have prevented in many industries a better rate of return to the investor.

The labor viewpoint which is typical nowadays was reflected in some comments made in the NBC-TV program "Meet the Press" on Aug. 28, when George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO, criticized the current concept of presidential "guidelines" for wages as he said:

"THE GOAL of guidelines - to keep a stable economy - we are for

All too often we hear of a clergyman going off on a tangent such as Some people say, "If that's Christianity, I want no part of it." But such actions are not Christianity. They are the result of human foibles and frailty, and Christianity should not be blamed — and won't be by people who think the matter

No person should enter the ministry of the church unless he is willing to accept the moral responsibility of such a calling. Unfortunately, many enter the ministry because they have a desire for prestige, to be a community leader, to exercise influence, or because they feel that it is a job which gives one unlimited freedom. To be a true minister of Christ is one of the most difficult and arduous tasks in the world - but when entered into as a result of Christ's call, one of the most satisfying and re-

No, this man has forfeited his right to be a minister - even though God may have forgiven his sin. How can we help ministers like this? By pointing out to young people considering Christian service, that they should never consider the ministry unless they are completely surrendered to Christ, and to the spiritual service that, but we feel it can't be done by trying to apply a specific figure across the board to all of American industry."

Yet in that same talk, Mr. Meany, in seeking to remove any blame from the shoulders of labor unions for contributing to the inflationary wave, himself applied a generalized "guideline" when he talked about profits. He de-

BUT A "specific figure" cannot be ustifiably applied across the board on profits. For in nearly every industry profits vary as between competing companies.

The key factor - whether the rate of profit is actually rising — is too often ignored by labor leaders as they tend to rely on generalizations. Statistics are available, however, which show that in many an industry the rate of return to the investor is less than it was five or ten years ago. But it will not be found that labor costs paid out by management in those industries have gone down. The construction industry, for example, shows no gain at all in the past five years in the rate of return for the investor, but the wages of labor nevertheless have risen.

TO TAKE an over-all figure of profits for industry is misleading. While many new businesses have entered the field, it is also a fact that some have not made any gains in profits. The total number of persons em-ployed by industry and business has risen substantially as more and more jobs have been created. But what have labor unions done to promote efficiency so that the wages of money will likewise be increased as businesses expand? "Featherbedding" has by no means been abolished. Some of the labor unions still insist on payment for work not done. In some industries, unions even put into effect "work quotas" so as to limit the output per worker.

THE LABOR leader nowadays exerts little influence on the side of increasing efficiency. To retain elected office, he must stand on a platform demanding more and more benefits for union members, irrespective of the consequences. Strikes are called to enforce that concept.

As labor costs rise, prices go up to inflationary danger points, and the purchasing power of the dollar is correspondingly reduced. Employers are unable to raise wages and preserve a fair rate of return. So they pass on their costs in increased prices to the consumer. Eventually inflation reaches a climax, and an ensuing recession brings unemployment. These contingencies could be prevented by labor - union statesmanship. Little over 20 years ago, in response to requests by many students and parents, several Big Spring pastors prevailed upon the school administra-tion to include Bible in the high school

THERE WAS ONE condition—funds for the instructor would have to be raised independently of the schools. The Texas Supreme Court had ruled a number of years prior to that that tax funds could not be used for this purpose, although credit could be given if the course met the required instructional standards.

THE BIG SPRING Pastors Association took this project under its wing, and immediately the association en-listed the aid of The Herald. Gifts began to come in, and eventually enough had been raised to venture out for an instructor. Miss Elizabeth Akers was contacted, and she had ex-

THIS WAS A happy stroke, for she got the program off to a good start. The teacher not only knew the Bible material, but she had a lot of other projects to stimulate interest. She had students putting on plays, pageants, and even making a home movie of Biblical episodes. One year the club took a hand in preparation of the East-er program at the amphitheatre.

IN TIME the teacher was married to Johnny Johansen, and except for the time when their children were small, she has been the teacher of the Bible Class. Sometimes, if her class load in Bible does not utilize all her time, she teaches other classes for the high school. I have no way of

knowing how many young people have taken the Bible course over the years, but I would make a horseback estimate of 1,200 and possibly 1,500. Probably three-fourths of them have come under the influence of this fine personality.

THE BIBLE course is purely opsteady strength. The course material is beamed away from sectarianism and doctrines, being focused instead upon the great literature in the Book of Books, upon its ethical and moral precepts, upon its rich historical back-

It's purpose is not the same as in church or Sunday schools, nor is it to evangelize or convert. Still, I feel that the vast majority of the students who have passed through this class are better people for it. I feel that most of them have had their interest in the Bible stimulated, they have been made to feel at home in reading and studying the Bible. Out of their own experiences and devotions, and out of the instruction in their own homes and churches they have been spiritually

HOW MUCH has been raised by the appeals through the columns of The Herald I could not say. WASHINGTON-Education is wearing a new face - one a little frightening to those who recognize it.

Another way to put the matter is that education is turning from a professional category into an "industry." It is now a relative infant, but it is feeding on a giant's diet some six per cent of the Gross National Product today, but with a menu and appetite that seems limit-

THE JOINT Congressional Economic Committee is worried because makers of educational "hardware" are gobbling up cultural publishing comhow. Xerox has purchased Wesleyan University Press. The Raytheon Company has bought D. C. Heath, Inc. a good old textbook firm. Radio Corporation of America has made a subsidiary out of Random House. General Electric has started an operation for "electronic learning devices" called General Learning Corporation.

YOU CAN SEE that education is getting out of the hands of the pedagogues and into those of the promoters. One of the supposed advantages of these aids, says a report, "to relieve the teachers of much of the drudgery and drill . . . "
The theme of "painless" learning lends itself to salesmanship and propaganda. We must expect mammoth claims of what must be done so that "everybody" can have a full educa-

NEW YORK (AP) - The two hottest things this year have been the weather and the economy, and there is a good chance that neither will cool much until fall.

TEMPERATURES can be forecast closely and measured exactly. But what happens when Washington blows coolants on the economy? It's not nearly as precise. Inflation is a pickpocket, President

Johnson says, but a recession resulting from too much anti-inflation would be a housebreaker. The economy has been booming now

for six years and its fever is measured in the highest interest rates in 40 or 45 years. As some economists view it, the nation is demanding too much from its body, perhaps pushing itself beyond its ability to fulfill its

By high interest rates, taxes, less government spending? And how should the medicine be measured out when you consider that an overdose could provoke a recession? The burden of slowing demand so

SHOULD demand be cooled? How?

far has been on interest rates monetary policy - and much of the banking community is angry. Few people like high interest for long. The banks of course get more for their money but they pay more, too. They feel the government should cut spending and perhaps increase taxes. In other words, use fiscal policy as a

The administration, naturally, has been slow to move in this election

FIRST, THERE is a dangerous time lag between application of re-straints and the time they take effect. Some of the Federal Reserve's restrictive monetary policies of many months ago, for example, are just now cutting into demand.




