Guardsmen Put Down Rioters In 'Frisco

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Police and National Guardsmen with "shoot to kill orders" maintained order and quiet today in San Francisco's riot-torn Negro sectors after one brief outbreak Wednesday evening was quelled quickly.

The effectiveness of police and military control raised hope that the rioting touched off Tuesday night by the fatal shooting of a Negro youth by a white policeman may have run its course.

TEST TODAY
"The test is whether we have a quiet night tonight. If we do the guard will leave tomorrow morning," said Maj. Gen. Paul R. Teih, 49th Infantry Division commander.

It was unseasonably hot again in San Francisco today. Late Wednesday, as the temperature soared to 95 degrees, 1,200 guardsmen joined police in the patrol of Negro districts. Another 1,300 stood by in the city and still another 2,000 were posted in suburban areas.

Lt. Col. Harland Smith, their commander, told the guardsmen: "If you are attacked or fired upon, shoot to kill. Don't fire over anybody's head." About 75 per cent of his heavily armed men had helped put down racial rioting a year ago in the Los Angeles Watts area.

THEY ARE MOVING
They immediately moved against tense knots of young Negroes in the streets. "All right, this is it—move. Now!" they ordered.

Mayor John F. Shelley and Gov. Edmund G. Brown declared a state of emergency and imposed a curfew Tuesday when the first rioting followed the killing of a Negro youth by a white policeman.

Stock Market Prices Drop

NEW YORK (AP)—Wide losses were taken by some glamor stocks as the stock market approached its 1966 lows late this afternoon. Trading was moderate.

Volume for the day was estimated at 5.8 billion shares compared with 5.99 billion Wednesday.

Although Du Pont and Motorola—conspicuous losers of the last two sessions—staged recoveries in early trading, the rest of the market failed to follow.

U.S. Forces Suffer Highest Casualties

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. forces suffered more casualties in South Viet Nam last week than in any week of the war, the U. S. command announced today. The high toll apparently resulted from the hard fighting south of the demilitarized zone, where American Marines are battling North Vietnamese regulars.

American casualties during the week total 970, the U. S. command said, including 142 men killed and 825 wounded. Three Americans were reported missing in action or captured.

The previous highest number of American casualties was during the week ending last May 21, when 146 U. S. troops were killed and 820 wounded, a total of 966.

ENEMY LOSSES
American casualties last week were nearly three times as high as South Vietnamese losses. South Vietnamese dead numbered 98, the wounded 290, the Vietnamese command said.

The highest American death rate in one week came last November when 240 were killed, most of them in the battle of the Ia Drang Valley. In that week, 470 others were wounded.

Enemy losses rose also. Viet Cong and North Vietnamese dead last week totaled 1,165, the commands said. There were 722 the previous week.

Many of the American and enemy casualties apparently were suffered in Operation Prairie, the U.S. Marine operation just south of the demilitarized zone. In hard fighting there Wednesday a company of Marines seized a heavily fortified hill, killing 50 North Vietnamese, and held their ground against three Red counterattacks and heavy mortar fire through much of the night.

Allied forces overran two Viet Cong prison camps this week and said one looked like the Nazi concentration camp at Dachau "all over again."

U.S. forces, directed by a South Vietnamese army private who had escaped from the Reds, seized a camp in Phu Yen Province about 200 miles northeast of Saigon.

HALF-STARVED
They liberated 10 Vietnamese suffering from malnutrition, boils, pneumonia, skin infections and deformities caused by unmet broken bones. About 40 to 60 other prisoners were dragged away by the fleeing Viet Cong guards.

The prisoners left behind were half-starved, but the Americans found more than a ton of rice in the camp.

Soldiers of the Korean Tiger Division sweeping Phu Cat Mountain discovered a Viet Cong prisoner of war camp whose only inmate was a ragged old man too weak to walk. He said the Communists had evacuated about 60 prisoners seven days earlier but he was too feeble to go with them. They left him behind with two days supply of rice.

5,372 DIE
The strength of U. S. armed forces in the country increased to 315,000, the U. S. command said, just 2,000 less than the strength of the regular South Vietnamese forces. Estimated enemy strength in South Viet Nam remained at 283,000.

The latest figures increased to 5,272 the number of Americans killed in the Viet Nam war and brought the wounded total to 19,372. Since Jan. 1, 1966, the number of Americans killed totaled 3,424.

In the air war over North Viet Nam, American pilots sighted four Communist MIG21s Wednesday, 99 miles northwest of Hanoi, but a spokesman said there was no engagement.

Economists Foresee Recession By 1970

WASHINGTON (AP)—Nearly three-fourths of the country's industry economists foresee a recession by 1970 and half of that group expect it to start next year, the National Association of Business Economists reported today.

A poll of members, made public at the start of NABE's annual meeting, showed general expectation that next year will bring continued expansion, but at a slower rate than in 1966 or 1965.

DEFENSE HIKES
The experts who guide industry's investment, price, and purchasing policies forecast a 1967 national output of \$781 billion, 6 per cent above this year's estimated \$737 billion. The expected rise of \$44 billion would compare with about \$56 billion this year, the association said.

"A major factor in next year's expected growth will be rising defense expenditures, while business capital spending is forecast to peak at about mid-year," said Charles E. Reeder of the Du Pont company, vice-

Fiery Foe Of LBJ Wins

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Lester G. Maddox, an ardent segregationist running a shoestring campaign, has captured the Democratic nomination for governor — upsetting a moderate candidate and Georgia's middle-road racial course.

Maddox, a furniture merchant who quit the cafeteria business rather than serve Negroes, decisively defeated Ellis G. Arnall, a former governor, in Wednesday's primary runoff. Arnall had led a six-man race two weeks ago.

GOD AND PEOPLE
"God and the people are my campaign managers," exulted Maddox, 50, after pulling off a major upset without big-money backers or the support of high-ranking politicians.

With 1,742 of 1,908 precincts reported: Maddox 419,557, Arnall 356,078.

A fiery opponent of the federal government, President Lyndon B. Johnson, liberalism, socialism and communism, Maddox says he shares the racial views of Alabama's Gov. George C. Wallace. But Maddox said very little about racial issues in his campaign.

Arnall, 59, who scored a major upset two decades ago to win the governorship over the popular Eugene Talmadge, had charged in the runoff fight that Maddox was radical and extremist, a man whose symbols were an axe and pistol.

Maddox, in resisting integration in 1964 and 1965, once waved a pistol to chase Negroes from his place and provided a handles for white patrons. When ordered by a court to serve Negroes, Maddox quit the cafeteria business.

'Killer' Leaves 23 Persons Dead

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—Hurricane Inez battered the Dominican Republic's Barahona Peninsula and the southwestern peninsula of Haiti today and threatened Cuba as it whipped northwestward.

As Inez swept through the Caribbean with 160-mile-an-hour winds, Tropical Storm Judith was still in a formative stage about 650 miles southeast of San Juan, P.R. Its highest winds were reported at 50 miles per hour.

CUT OFF
Commercial communications with Barahona were cut off but the navy and army had contact through shortwave radio.

Thunderous waves smashed against Santo Domingo's seawalls early today as the hurricane sailed across the water 75 miles to the south.

COILED FURY
Winds of the hurricane force extended 70 miles out from the center, far enough to hit the port of Barahona 50 miles northeast of the peninsula's tip. The city of 20,000 is snugged in a jungle valley with steep mountains on each side forming a natural funnel for flooding.

About 200,000 persons live on the peninsula, an area of coffee, sugar, cotton and banana farms.

Inez took 23 lives, injured at least 500, and left 10,000 homeless Tuesday when it swept Guadeloupe. The little French island was the first land the storm encountered as it entered the Caribbean from the Atlantic.

Inez' tightly coiled fury pushed some of the heaviest rain storms in years over parts of the Virgin Islands, east of Puerto Rico. Some 165,000 square miles of sea was whipped into a fury.

Unruly Mob Dispersed

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—An unruly crowd roamed the streets in downtown St. Louis Wednesday night throwing objects at cars and store windows after a demonstration at police headquarters.

Police estimated the mob at 100 persons, and said most were Negro youths. They were dispersed. Several cars and store windows were shattered. A fireman was struck on the chin by a rock.

A detective shot him while he was in custody. Police said Hayes threatened officers, and bolted while being taken to headquarters for questioning in a holdup.

C-City To Lose Hospital Oct. 15

COLORADO CITY (SC)—Charles L. Root, owner of the Root Memorial Hospital at Colorado City, announced Wednesday that increased costs and reduced income caused by medicare would force the closing of the modern 30 bed hospital, Oct. 15.

The Root Memorial Hospital was founded by Root's father, the late Dr. C. L. Root Jr., in 1927, but it has been enlarged and improved on several occasions. Root has operated the hospital for the past 30 years, since the death of his father.

Additional expense was incurred in the first half of the year in meeting federal standards for plant and equipment, hospital manager, and employees were added to service the new

records library required by medicare officials.

Root says that medicare payments amount to about 50 per cent of hospital patients at Colorado City, and government regulations require that they be served on a cost basis. This has led to a drop in income, while costs have been increasing.

Root says that he made the decision with extreme reluctance, both because the closing will leave Colorado City without a hospital and because it will result in the loss of 55 jobs. Nevertheless, in justice to suppliers and employees, the move had to be made, since continued operation will simply result in increased losses, he added.

Root also operates the Root Valley Fair Lodge, a modern rest home and he said that it would continue in operation—at least until the provisions of medicare become applicable to nursing homes on Jan. 1. The same conditions will bring about the same problems at the nursing home, he felt.

HUMPHREYS JOINING CLIFF DWELLERS

Veep Wants To Eat Home Lunch

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Hubert H. Humphreys are joining the ranks of city cliff dwellers and moving into a fancy high-rise apartment near Capitol Hill.

One of the reasons? So Humphrey can go home for lunch. "This is something we've thought about for a long time," Mrs. Humphrey said in an interview. "We're excited about the move."

TAKING TIME
The vice president and his wife plan to move within the next month, but say, "We're taking our time."

There's decorating, for instance. "I haven't had time to give it much thought," Mrs. Humphrey said.

She plans to use furniture from their pleasant two-story three-bedroom home in suburban Chevy Chase, Md., for the apartment.

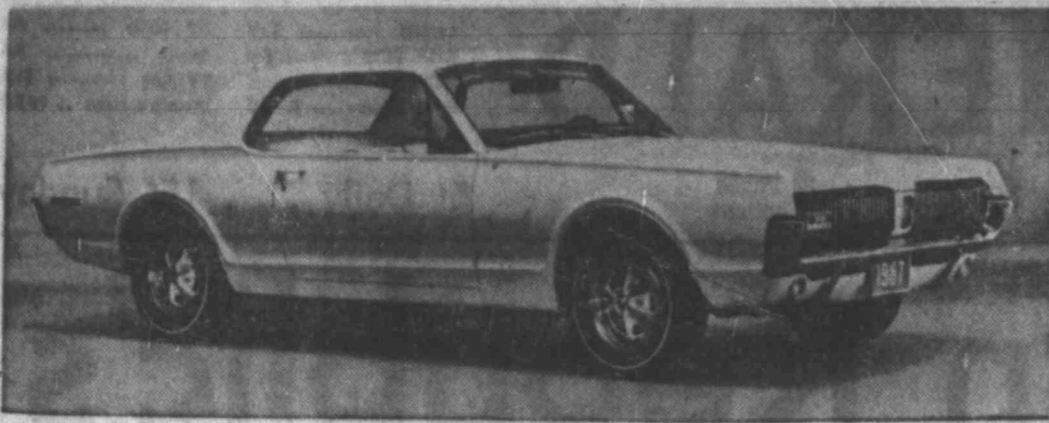
SWIMMING POOL
The new apartment is on the eighth floor of a nine-story cooperative in southwest Washington, along the Potomac River. A cooperative is an apartment in which tenants buy space as one would purchase a house.

The Humphreys haven't disclosed the price, but similar apartments range in the \$60,000 to \$75,000 bracket. The building has an indoor swimming pool, a sun terrace, gardens with playground equipment and a sailboat pond. Their apartment has two balconies overlooking the river, two bedrooms, a den and a large living-dining room.

HOUSE SOLD
Congress has voted \$750,000 for an official home for the vice president on the Naval Observatory grounds next to the British Embassy. But President Johnson and Humphrey decided to delay spending the money because of the cost of the war in Viet Nam.

The Humphreys have sold their Chevy Chase house to a realty firm. It had a reported value of \$40,000, but the sale price was not revealed.

They moved into it 18 years ago when Humphrey became senator.

Gimbel Dies At Age Of 81

NEW YORK (AP) — Bernard F. Gimbel, retired chairman of the board of Gimbel Bros. department stores, died today after a long illness. He was 81.

Gimbel took what had been a small family business, begun as a frontier trading post in Indiana, and turned it into one of the nation's great merchandising chains.

Still, he retained the unhurried speech and spontaneous gestures of the Midwest until his death. He became the merchant prince of a \$500-million domain, but he continued to act much like the country storekeeper.

A big-handed, gregarious multimillionaire, Gimbel spent half a century cultivating good will as well as a department store empire. His philanthropies were widespread.

Round-faced, white-haired, a man who was forever giving away toys to children, Gimbel was asked to play the role of Santa Claus in the movie, "The Miracle on 34th Street."

With good humor, Gimbel turned it down.

The expression, "Does Macy's tell Gimbel's," has become a national byword.

Plane Hijackers Must Stand Trial

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, (AP) — President Juan Carlos Onganía declared today those responsible for hijacking an airliner with 48 persons aboard and forcing it to land in the British-ruled Falkland Islands will stand trial.

The president issued a communique early today terming Wednesday's action by a group of rightist extremists a "serious uprising" and declaring that the full force of the law will be brought to bear against those responsible and the instigators. The British Foreign Office in London said it had been informed that Argentina was terming the hijacking "a case of piracy."

"Recovery for the Falkland Islands cannot be used as an excuse for actions by factions," the communique added.

CLAIM STRESSED

The hijackers, emphasizing Argentina's claim to the Falklands, forced the airliner to land on a racetrack in the Falkland capital.

The four-engine Argentine

DC4 was stranded on the 3,600-foot racetrack, with one wheel stuck a foot deep and the track apparently too short to permit a safe takeoff with passengers and fuel aboard.

HOLED UP

The hijackers were reported holed up in the airliner, while the 25 other passengers and five crew members were lodged in homes in Port Stanley, the Falkland capital.

The armed extremists from the rightwing El Condor organization seized the plane over the South Atlantic Wednesday to emphasize Argentina's claim to the bleak islands some 300 miles east of Tierra del Fuego.

Argentine and British officials had not decided early today how to get the hijackers and other passengers, who include three children back to Buenos Aires. They could come on a British ship which sails Monday on a monthly voyage from Port Stanley to Montevideo, Uruguay, or smaller planes might be sent to get them.

The hijacking coincided with the presence in Buenos Aires of Prince Philip, husband of Queen Elizabeth II, who arrived Monday to attend the world horse jumping championships as the guest of Argentina's military president, Gen. Juan Carlos Onganía.

WOMAN LEADER

The airliner, which is owned by the Argentine government, was flying from Buenos Aires to Rio Gallegos, 1,700 miles to the south, when it was seized. Among the leaders of the hijackers was Maria Cristina Verrier, 27, who owns a small theater in Buenos Aires. The plane landed on the racetrack because Port Stanley has no airstrip.

 Acceptance of a Greek gift by East proved fatal to the defense, and South, the donor, was thereby able to salvage his four heart contract.
 South was a shade short of the requirements for a demand bid. However, once North was able to keep the bidding open, South had too much to leave anything further to chance (observe that his holding is worth 22 points—counting the extra point for all four aces), and he proceeded directly to four hearts. The singleton club made the suit contract appear to be more attractive.
 West was reluctant to lead away from one of his honors, so he opened the nine of hearts. The deuce was played from the dummy and South won the trick with the ace.
 Declarer had resisted the temptation to play the ten of clubs at trick one for, if East does not cover with the king, then North's honor has been wasted and South intended to

make full use of dummy's sequence in clubs. Observe that by leading the queen of clubs thru East subsequently and ruffing out the king, declarer can establish two discards on the jack and ten.
 In order to avail himself of the required club tricks, he needs two entries to dummy. If trumps are divided two-two, there is no problem, for the king of hearts and the third trump will provide the necessary transportation. If hearts do not divide favorably, then extraordinary measures are necessary, and South directed his efforts accordingly.
 At trick two the jack of hearts was led from the closed hand and the six was played from dummy. East was delighted at the prospect of winning a trump trick and he produced the queen. The shift was to a small spade. South played the ace and led a heart to North's eight in order to put the queen of clubs thru. East covered with the king and declarer ruffed.
 The king of hearts provided another entry to the North hand and South disposed of two diamonds. Also declarer subsequently lost two spade tricks, this proved to be a mere book-keeping entry, for he already had his 10 tricks in.
 East could have foiled his opponent's strategy by refusing to take the queen of hearts. Also he sacrifices his trump trick thereby, his investment comes back with interest subsequently, for the declarer can get over to the dummy only once—with the king of hearts—and North's clubs can never be utilized. South must eventually lose two tricks each in spades and diamonds.

Twister Hits In Florida

 Unseasonably cool weather, rain and cloudy skies covered wide areas from the Midwest to the Atlantic Coast today. Fairly mild temperatures were reported in much of the deep South and far West.

Showers broke out during the night from the central Gulf Coast across the middle Atlantic states and rain and gusty northwesterly winds hit sections of the upper Great Lakes region. Thunderstorms and tornadoes swept some areas in the South Wednesday.
 One twister struck at Fair Lane Acres near Bradenton, Fla., damaging four mobile homes and destroying carport canopies.
 A second tornado ripped through nine blocks in the northwest part of Gainesville, Fla., unroofing several structures, toppling trees and blocking streets. No injuries were reported.
 Clear, warm and dry weather prevailed in most areas from the Rockies to the Pacific Coast. Temperatures reached above 90 degrees Wednesday in much of California. The 95 at San Francisco was a record high for Sept. 28. One of the day's highest readings was 101 at Red Bluff.

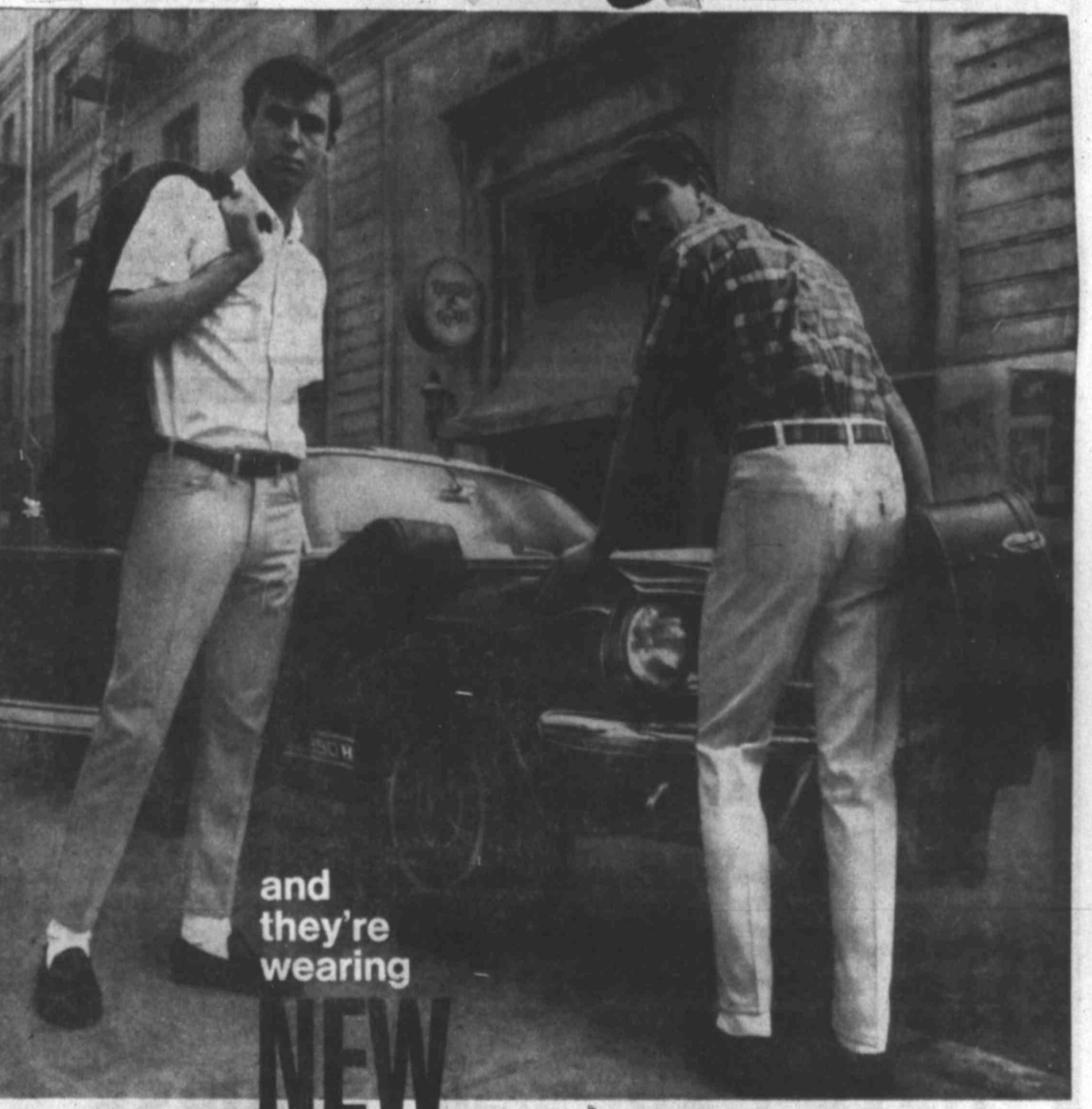

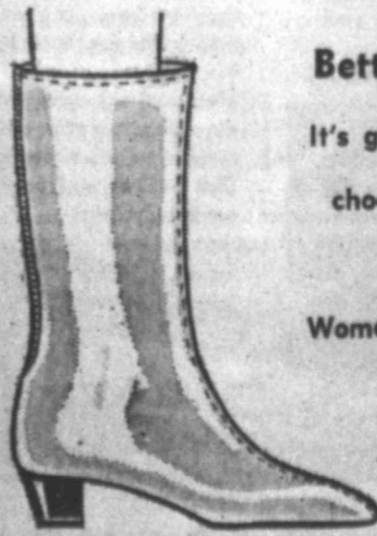

Action Springs Up At Dawn

Attack Force Socks Enemy

ABOARD IWO JIMA OFF VIET NAM (AP) — Action seemed to spring up with the dawn, everywhere at once. Landing craft filled with fighting men spun from two large ships, maneuvered into assault lines and churned white streaks in the sea toward the beach. Helicopters with more troops swirled up from flight decks, closed into formations and darted inland. The men, and the tanks and artillery that would follow, were the special landing force of the U.S. Navy's 7th Fleet Amphibious Ready Group—a fast-moving assault force.

Although each operation is tailored for particular ends, Operation Deckhouse Four illustrates the basic concepts. It incorporated maneuvers by sea, air, land and even under water. Submarines of the 7th Fleet, aided by aerial and other sea-borne reconnaissance teams, sought the best landing beach.

DESTROY MISSION
It was hitting just three miles south of the demilitarized zone. The mission was to find and destroy a regiment of the North Vietnamese army's 324B Division that had infiltrated into South Viet Nam through the neutral zone.

The operation was called Deckhouse Four, the latest in more than 20 assaults into Viet Nam by the Amphibious Ready Group since March 1965. The group's punch is simultaneous sea and air assault. While one Marine element hits the beach, another Marine force is landed to put the enemy in a squeeze.

HIT ANYWHERE
The full force of men, artillery and warships can strike anywhere along the Vietnamese coast within 48 hours. The group can sail 500 miles a day — all ships can make at least 20 knots.

Nearly 2,000 Marines of the 1st Battalion, 26th Regiment, 5th Division, are aboard the three key vessels the carrier Iwo Jima, the transport Vancouver, and the Thomaston, a dock landing ship. Rocket ships capable of blasting out hundreds of 5-inch rockets every minute join the booming 5- and 8-inch guns of destroyers and a cruiser to plaster enemy positions.

NERVE CENTER
Air support wings in from the nearest land bases or from carriers at sea. Navy Capt. William J. Maddocks of Arlington, Va., has the final word on all operations until the Marines establish a command group inland.

Operations then come under Marine Col. H. D. Wortman of Alexandria, Va., commander of the special landing force. Maddocks and Wortman work together and have headquarters on the Iwo Jima. This flagship,

Texan Draws Prison Term

DALLAS (AP)— A jury assessed Frederick Peter Semanovich a five-year prison sentence Wednesday after it found him guilty of murder without malice in the slaying of 18-year-old Suzanne Haslett May 22.

The 10-man, two-woman jury turned down the defense's request for a probation sentence. The five-year sentence assessed was the maximum for murder without malice.

The battered body of the pretty, blonde girl, a bank messenger and amateur folk singer, was found in her small apartment the day after the state claimed that she and Semanovich had been to a theater to see "The Ten Commandments."

Final arguments in the trial centered around an alleged oral statement made by Semanovich, a 23-year-old welder, after he was arrested.

Police witnesses during the trial testified that Semanovich said he beat and choked the girl after she chided him when he wanted to go to sleep.

The state had asked the jury to find him guilty of first degree murder and had indicated it would seek the death penalty. Semanovich, his face showing little or no expression, was calm as he stood near the defense table as the jury returned its verdict.

Valenti Gives Impression Of Disciplined Energy

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Man on the move: Jack Valenti. Early each Monday morning, Valenti leaves his Washington, D.C., home for the airport and takes the plane to New York, where he headquarters until Wednesday at his Fifth Avenue office as president of the Motion Picture Producers Association of America. Then he flies home and spends the rest of the week at his Washington home.

Why does he keep his home in Washington when the film business is centered in New York and Hollywood?

WORLD HUB
"Washington is a gracious and fascinating town," he explains. "It is the hub of the world. Since so much of our business comes from foreign countries, it is important for me to remain in touch with the embassies."

Once a month Valenti flies to Hollywood — "to try to blot out the resentment against a president of the producers association who lives in the East."

Next week he leaves for a tour of Europe; he plans to visit South America in November, Asia in January.

NOT SO BAD
"During this first year I expect to be putting in double time

so I can learn the business thoroughly," said the former Houston advertising man. "But it's not so bad, really. When I was working at the White House, I left home at 7:30 and got back at midnight."

Valenti gives the impression of disciplined energy. He talks tirelessly about the movie medium and his hopes for it.

So far his travels have been solitary. His wife, a secretary to President Johnson when he was senator, gave birth to a son, John Lyndon, July 30.

LBJ'S BUDDY
The Valentis, who also have a 4-year-old daughter, chose Lyndon B. Johnson as godfather for their son, and it is apparent that

the warm relationship between the two men continues. It's possible, though not too probable, that Valenti may be able to improve the President's movie attendance.

"His wife and daughters are great movie fans," reported Valenti. "Lynda and Luci used to run movies at the White House almost every night and Mrs. Johnson often joined them. The President is not anti-film; he simply works too hard to see movies."

"However, I did see him in a showing of 'Seven Days in May' (in which Pentagon generals attempt to take over the presidency). He had a wry smile on his face after that one."

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP) — A burglar dropped in on his latest robbery — at a downtown grocery store. Officers say the man, who had a hole in the floor and dropped 10 feet into the store. He escaped with about \$2,000 from the store's safe.

WASHINGTON (AP) — In what Sen. Everett M. Dirksen called an anti-inflation test, the Senate has rebuffed President Johnson's plea to hold spending down to budgetary levels.

By a 65-3 vote the Senate passed and sent back to the House Wednesday a \$10.5-billion bill for the Labor and Health

Education and Welfare Department. Before the vote, Dirksen forced a test of whether the Senate was willing to cut the measure \$300 million — the same amount its appropriations committee had added to budget requests.

40-24 VOTE

He lost by a 40-24 vote the Republican leader said "shows

who stands where on cutting spending" to cope with inflation. Of the 21 Republicans who voted, seven opposed Dirksen's move.

Dirksen told reporters that "Johnson ate me up" at a recent White House meeting about Congress' action in voting more funds than he had requested.

"I told him I would show him who is for reducing spending

and who is not," Dirksen said. As it turned out, 33 Democrats and seven Republicans voted to sustain the higher spending level. Dirksen mustered four Republicans and 10 Democrats for his move.

NOT CLEAR CUT

Sponsors of the measure said the issue was not as clear cut as Dirksen tried to make it. They noted that Johnson had

cut deeply into such popular funds as college student loans, health research and aid to school districts with a high percentage of federal workers.

These three programs were increased by \$529 million over the President's January estimates, the boosts being offset in part by reductions made in scores of other items.

The Senate's version of the

bill was \$100 million under the aggregate voted previously by the House, but contained \$7.5 million to finance the national teacher corps operation in poverty-stricken areas. The House had denied any funds for this purpose.

The Senate votes failed to disclose any sign that Congress will reverse its trend and top off the \$3 billion Johnson contends

it is in the process of appropriating above the amounts he asked.

They indicated instead that the President is likely to have to resort to withholding spending some of the funds Congress makes available if he intends to live within his \$112.8 billion budget for the current fiscal year.

Ex-Actor Wages Strong Campaign

EDITOR'S NOTE — One of the country's most exciting and important elections is shaping up in California. Here, a veteran political hand sizes up Republican Ronald Reagan as a candidate to beat incumbent Democrat Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Politically, as in his celluloid days, Ronald Reagan is demonstrating that he is "box office."

The erstwhile movie actor, now Republican candidate for governor of California, has been drawing crowds, stirring applause and laughter in speeches, fielding tough questions about government, and generally waging a strong campaign.

This is his first try for elective office, although he has been around the fringes of politics for years, and he turns out to be something of a phenomenon.

BIG MARGIN
Reagan won the nomination last June in a contest with former San Francisco Mayor George Christopher, carrying 53 of the state's 58 counties and taking a towering 64 per cent of the GOP vote.

Now, campaigning up and down the 750-mile length of California, Reagan is drawing well. It may be largely curiosity to see him in person that brings out the people. His face was familiar, via movies and television, for years before he cast himself into his present role.

"Ronnie has been in millions of living rooms as a nice guy for a long, long time," said a Reagan lieutenant, "and that's one of the big things he has going for him."

SMOOTH TALKER
There are others. He makes a smooth speech, seldom using a text or pausing to reach for a word. He says he writes all his speeches himself. They are punchy, articulate, a blend of humor, serious discussion of issues, and satirical pot shots aimed at his Democratic opponent, Gov. Edmund G. Brown.

Reagan rattles off statistics to support his arguments on state questions. Discussing such problems informally, he tends to be more incisive than in speeches or news conferences. Neutral observers often remark, "He has been doing his homework."

"BUBBLE TAX"
In the lush, green and gold Napa Valley—the wine country—Reagan stirred clapping and laughter when he ridiculed the special tax on sparkling wines by calling it "the bubble tax."

Reagan, a zealous apostle of private enterprise, says Los Angeles businessmen have provided 4,000 jobs in Watts since the Negro riots in that section of the city last year. With a sense of timing, he paused and added "and that's almost as many as there are poverty workers there."

NO BARBS
By contrast, he was all earnestness at a veterans' home north of San Francisco. No jokes. No barbs at Brown.

Reagan's looks, the trim figure, wavy hair and squint-eyed smile, and his personality, sometimes boyish, more often urbane, bring a rapt, dreamy expression to women's faces.

At 55, he looks very much as he did in his hit films. He has a pretty wife, actress Nancy Davis, and two children, Patti, 13 and Ronnie, 7. These are all political assets.

"A lot of people figured he would be pretty and pretty dumb," a politician said. "They've been surprised."

TOUGH RACE
Brown says this is the hardest of his three gubernatorial races. He won office in 1958, defeating former U.S. Sen. William F. Knowland and was re-elected in 1962, defeating former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

"Reagan will be tougher than either of them," Brown said. "But we've turned the corner now and we're on the way."

A recent poll, regarded by analysts as reliable, gave Reagan an edge at this stage but showed Brown gaining. The State Poll gave Reagan a rating of 45 per cent, Brown 41, and 14 listed as "don't know." Its comparable figures in June were Reagan 48 per cent, Brown 37 and "don't know" 15.

BARRY BACKER
Los Angeles Mayor Samuel W. Yorty, says, "If Reagan can project the image of being a moderate, I think he can win. Vice versa, if they pin the extreme right-wing label on him, people will be leery, leery of extremism."

This touches on Reagan's recent political history. He worked hard, speaking and fund-raising, for Sen. Barry Goldwater, the GOP presidential candidate in 1964. Reagan delivered an election-eve speech of such power that Californians are still talking about it today—even the Democrats.

Like an echo of that campaign, Reagan said recently in a talk to a religious group in Fresno, "We want a policy based on what we know in our hearts is right." A Goldwater slogan of 1964 was, "In your heart you know he's right."

"CONSERVATIVE"
Reagan started as "a bleeding-heart liberal, a New Deal Democrat"—to use his own words. Today, he accepts the label, "conservative."

The wide swing in philosophy began, he says, during World War II when he was adjutant in an Air Force base. "I began having doubts then that government can operate as efficiently as a private organization," he said.

His doubts deepened, he said, in England after the war. He went there to make a movie. By that time, the Laborites had ousted Winston Churchill and started nationalizing some industries. "I didn't like the look of what was going on there," he said.

VOTED FOR IKE
Reagan says he was one of the first to urge Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower to run for president in 1948. To be sure, Eisenhower's party affiliations were unclear at the time. But his statements on national problems stamped him as a middle-of-the-roader.

Texas Teacher Jobs Vacant

AUSTIN (AP)—The Texas State Teachers Association said Wednesday Texas is facing the "worst teacher shortage in 25 years," with nearly 5,900 positions either vacant or filled by unqualified teachers.

The association said it received questionnaire replies from 82 per cent of the state's 1,300 school districts.

Districts reported 1,082 vacant jobs and 4,400 posts held by not fully qualified teachers.

Charles H. Tennyson, association director, said more than 10,000 teachers are employed this year with only emergency permits.

"Superintendents apparently feel that almost one half of the holders of these 10,000 emergency permits are not qualified to handle the professional duties required of a classroom teacher," he said.

ROME (AP)—Italy is fighting three wars, all within its own frontiers. In none is victory in sight.

More than 20,000 heavily armed troops and national police are in action against terrorists at the Austrian frontier, hill bandits in Sardinia, and the Mafia in Sicily.

The toll in lives in the three outlying regions has run into many hundreds in recent years. Scores of the dead have been soldiers and carabinieri, Italy's army-trained national police.

NIGHT RAIDS
The three regions have full-scale military operations. Battle-equipped Alpine troops and armored cars operate in the Alto Adige of the north. Cavalry roam the wilds of Sardinia. Roadblocks and motorized

troops make night raids in Sicily.

Italy took over the Alto Adige from Austria after World War I. Terrorists demand that the region be given back to Austria.

Company Increases Price Of Newsprint
SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—An increase to \$138 a ton from \$134 in the price of newsprint in Western markets was announced Wednesday by Crown Zellerbach Corp.

The firm said the \$4 a ton increase was the first since 1957. It is the company's intent, a spokesman said, to charge the new price at least through June 30, 1967.

Seven centuries of bloodshed had made the Mafia a law above the law in Sicily until the bomb slaying of seven policemen aroused Parliament and prompted new laws and a tougher crackdown.

More than 10,000 soldiers and national police are in action on the island. At least 30 soldiers and police have died in gun-fights with the outlaws since the war. Palermo alone has had 600 violent deaths since 1961. The inland town of Corleone, ith 20,000 population in the heart of the Mafia country, had 150 killings in that time.

Hubby's Calls Cost \$1,084

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—Kathleen Hunt received six collect telephone calls from her soldier husband in Viet Nam last month. Recently she received the bill — \$1,084 — plus federal tax of \$108.40.

Mrs. Hunt, a University of Arizona student from Pittsburgh, doesn't doubt that the bill probably is that much.

She said she'll offer to pay \$800 in one lump and \$100 a month until the bill is paid.

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Scramble Egg Order For Family

Scrambled eggs is one good answer when baby needs half an egg, junior insists on three, sister wants "almost two," and daddy responds, "Oh, one or two; doesn't make any difference."

Of course the wide range in egg sizes gives a lot of leeway in portion control, too. According to standards established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, jumbo eggs weigh a minimum of 30 ounces per dozen; peewee eggs, just half that weight. Large eggs fall in at 24 ounces; medium, 21; and small eggs, 18 ounces.

But it's a bit inconvenient to keep eggs of all sizes on hand, to match personal appetites.

Also, the relative economy of different sizes usually changes with the seasons. Right now, when mature hens are providing most of our eggs, large sizes are more abundant and hence lower priced than small eggs, ounce per ounce.

Scrambled eggs, however, assure each member of the family exactly the desired amount, no matter which size is used. Further, eggs of Grade B or C make just as good, just as nutritious, scrambled eggs as do those of the higher grades.

Another impressive feature of scrambled eggs is that they are easy to prepare and fun to serve in a variety of ways.

Here's a good basic recipe: Take 6 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, a dash of pepper, 1/4 cup milk, and 2 tablespoons butter, margarine, or other cooking fat or oil. Beat eggs until fluffy. Add salt, pepper and milk. Place fat in frying pan and heat until it just bubbles. Add egg mixture, and cook until firm, but not hard, stirring constantly. Serve immediately.

Stuff Tomatoes For Luncheon

Having friends for a noontime get-together? Here's a cool menu.

STUFFED TOMATOES

6 large (2 lbs.) tomatoes
1 cup fine or medium grated carrot
1 carton (8 oz.) creamstyle cottage cheese
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. black pepper
1 tbsp. minced fresh chives
Paprika and lettuce

Wash tomatoes; cut a thin slice from bottoms if necessary to have them stand straight. Remove centers from stem end in large ping shape; remove seeds with fingers from centers; dice and reserve. Remove any seeds from tomato cups; drain upside down in refrigerator. Mix diced tomato (from centers), carrot, cottage cheese, salt, pepper and chives. Pile into chilled tomato cups. Sprinkle with paprika; serve on lettuce.

Cold Meat Loaf Changes Dinner

This loaf, like the French pates, benefits from being cold.

COLD COUNTRY MEAT

1 1/4 lbs. ground chuck beef
1/2 lb. bulk sausage
1/2 cup finely diced cooked ham
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1 cup soft bread crumbs (2 thin slices with crusts)
2 to 3 tbsps. finely grated onion, pulp and juice
2 tbsps. minced parsley
1 large clove garlic, crushed
2 tbsps. chili sauce
1 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper

Mix together thoroughly all the ingredients. Pack into a loaf pan (8 by 4 by 3 inches) that has been rinsed with cold water; loosen sides; turn out into a baking pan (11 by 7 by 1 1/2 inches). Bake in a moderate (350 degrees) oven 1 hour. Pour off any fat and liquid; after 10 minutes, turn out; cool, chill. Slice thin.

Chicken Wings Make Surprise

Any leftover chicken wings will make good snacking.

BAKED CHICKEN WINGS

1 lb. (about 10) chicken wings
1/4 cup butter
1 tsp. salt
3/4 tsp. dry mustard
1 1/4 tbsps. paprika

Snip tips from wings with a kitchen scissors; wash and dry. Melt butter in a heatproof glass baking dish in a moderate oven. Stir salt, mustard and paprika into the butter using the flat surface of a small spatula to make smooth. Dip wings in seasoned butter and fit into the same dish in one layer. Bake in the 375-degree oven, turning wings over halfway through baking period, until tender—about 45 minutes. Drain on paper toweling. Makes 3 servings.

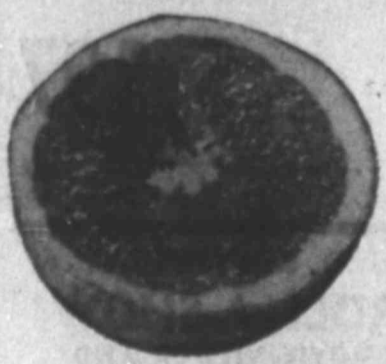

Meals Play Important Role In European Travel Plans

There are many ways to tour Europe and countless scores of things to see. It suited the itinerary of Dr. and Mrs. Arch Carson, 110 Cedar, to travel on the "demi-pension" plan.

"That way, we could set our own time schedule," Mrs. Carson said. "Best of all, our pre-selected hotel reservations included two meals a day. It gave us a home port for our sight-seeing and assured us of two perfect meals; for our third meal, we could pick a place of our choice."

Mrs. Carson explained that food can be the forgotten detail in travel plans. Nothing can fracture a picturesque scene so quickly as unpalatable food; nothing can re-capture time and temper lost in looking for a pleasing place to eat.

"Besides," she added, "European food is an adventure in itself. Over there, the whole atmosphere of food is different. The Europeans regard the art of cooking as a profession. The word 'chef' demands respect and reputations are built on the quality of his cooking."

In England, the Carsons became aware of the training required for apprentice chefs. Their hotel was in the London theater district and tradition required waiters to wear white tie and tails.

"It's amazing to see teenagers impeccably dressed, with matching manners, mixing a table-side sauce with wines and oils," Mrs. Carson said.

SCHUMAN CIRCUS

Excellent food isn't restricted to hotels and restaurants. Mrs. Carson recalls a hot dog stand outside the Schuman Circus in Copenhagen, Denmark.

"The stand was so clean I felt we were his first customers, yet he had been at that spot for years. And you wouldn't believe the hot dogs. The sausage and bread were not mass produced; they were made by family cooks who really cared about the taste. The sandwiches were just as perfect as the most formal meals."

In a delicatessen in Salzburg, Austria, the Carsons remember the delicate pastries and small cakes.

"The shop owner had such regard for his work that he sold the cakes by weight. They weren't expensive, but they were so pretty it seemed a shame to eat them," Mrs. Carson said.

Then there was the roast suckling pig served in an Old Madrid cafe where famous Spanish bull fighters and Ernest Hemingway ate. It was there the Carsons saw an event that had been burning continuously since 1725. The Carsons made it a point

to try regional food and local customs. They weren't always impressed.

KIDNEY PIE

In Shakespearean country, they met and ate kidney pie. They decided it's best left to the English. All along their trip they tried for coffee, other than demitasse variety; and they often longed for a glass of cold water with their meals.

"And I can't imagine what the Europeans have against plain old pie," Mrs. Carson said. For some reason, they favor desserts that are spun sugar creations."

Mrs. Carson concludes that Europeans foods are certainly the most perfect and spectacular around; and that's all very well when you are touring their land and enjoying their ways.

"But there's nothing better than fresh vegetables cooked in my own kitchen," she said.

In selecting her recipes, Mrs. Carson chose those that are for-

eign in tone but easy to prepare.

TABBOULI

1 cup cracked wheat
1/4 cup olive oil
1 lemon
1 garlic clove
1 stalk celery, chopped
1 small onion, chopped
1 tomato
Parsley
Pepper and salt
Tabasco

Wash wheat in hot running water; drain and dry thoroughly. Marinate overnight in olive oil, lemon juice, garlic and salt to taste. Mix in other ingredients, seasoning to taste with coarsely ground black pepper and tabasco.

This may be served on sliced tomatoes-as a salad or used as a party dip.

FLAN AL CARAMELO (Caramel Custard)

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
1 1/2 cups light cream
1 1/2 cups milk
8 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup whipped cream
1 cup chopped candied orange peel

In a heavy skillet cook 1 cup

of sugar and water until caramelized to a light golden color. Carefully pour into a 2 quart baking dish, turning so as to coat the bottom and sides.

Scald the light cream and milk until a skin forms on top. Whip eggs with remaining sugar until well blended. Strain milk and cream into eggs and mix well. Add vanilla. Strain the custard into the caramel-coated dish and set it in a shallow pan of water. Bake in a 325 degree oven for 45 minutes, or until it is set. Cool the "flan" and turn it out onto a serving dish. Garnish with whipped cream and orange peel.

QUICHE LORRAIN

Pastry shell
14 slices lean bacon
1 cup grated Swiss cheese
4 eggs
2 cups light cream
1/2 tps. salt
Dash of nutmeg, cayenne, white pepper and sugar

Line a 9-inch pie plate with pastry shell; trim and crimp edges and chill for one hour.

Fry bacon until crisp, drain well and break into small pieces. Sprinkle bacon on pastry shell and cover with cheese.

Combine remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Pour into pastry shell and bake at 400 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 325 degrees and bake 30 minutes longer; or until a knife inserted in center comes out dry. For brunch or luncheon, this dish can be served hot or cold.

SWISS CHEESE FONDUE

1 tsp. butter
3 level tps. flour
2 cups milk or white wine
1 lb. grated imported Swiss Cheese or Swiss Guyere (must be imported as domestic cheeses will not melt properly)

Dash of salt, pepper, nutmeg, and garlic salt
French bread

Melt butter in saucepan. Add flour and blend well. Stir milk in slowly. When milk has been added, bring to a slow boil and add cheese, stirring constantly with fork until melted. Add remaining seasonings to taste.

Serve piping hot in a chafing dish. Cut bread into bite-size cubes, each piece having some crust. Bread cubes are dipped into hot cheese with Fondue forks or skewers.

Blend Rice, Cheese To Stuff Zucchini Squash

Most Americans have become so cosmopolitan in their cooking they think little of blending the best of several nations in one dish. This recipe, took a favorite of the Italians, zucchini, nestled it in a bed of Spanish rice, then topped them both with very sharp American cheese slices. Result: an en-zel to any appetite.

CHEESE, RICE AND ZUCCHINI

3 small zucchini squashes
2 (15-oz.) cans Spanish Rice Dinner
8 slices (one 6-oz. pkg.) American cheese

Cook zucchini in boiling water 10 minutes, then remove from water and drain. Cut up 4 cheese slices and combine with Spanish rice. Place zucchini in buttered 11 1/4 x 7 x 13 1/2-inch baking dish. Spoon Spanish rice mixture around zucchini. Bake in a hot

When he has his druthers, and dines in fine company on fine foods, his frequent choice is the famed Long Island Duckling prepared to his personal specifications and served with spicy Black Cherry Sauce.

ROCKY'S LONG ISLAND DUCKLING

1 Long Island duckling, quartered
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. pepper
2 tps. poultry seasoning
2 tps. paprika

Rub the seasonings into the quarters of duckling. Place in dry skillet, skin side down and cover tightly. Cook at 350 degrees or over moderate heat for one hour, turning at 20 minute intervals. Do not pour off fat during cooking.

SAUCE

1/2 cup port wine
1 whole clove

Pinch each of nutmeg, thyme and allspice
1/4 tsp. grated orange peel
1/2 cup bottled brown sauce
1/2 cup currant jelly
1/2 cup canned pitted black cherries
Juice of 1/2 orange
1 tsp. butter

Combine the wine, spices and grated orange peel and cook over moderate heat until volume is reduced to one half. Heat brown sauce and add. Blend well and then add the jelly. When jelly is dissolved add the black cherries, orange juice and butter. Serve very hot over duckling.

3 cups quick-cooking rolled oats
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Sift together flour, salt, and soda. Thoroughly cream together lard and sugars. Add eggs and vanilla. Beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients and mix well. Add rolled oats and nuts. Mix. Form into rolls 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper. Chill thoroughly, cut into 1/4-inch slices. Confusion Factor High On Interest Payments

By JOHN CUNIFF AP Business News Analyst NEW YORK (AP)—The focus is on interest rates again, and the confusion among small borrowers is in direct proportion to their concern about the matter. Just how is interest figured?

—Few loans are made for exactly one year; often they are made for several years or for a few months or even weeks or days.

ADVANCE PROFITS—Repayments on practically any consumer loan are made not by the year but by the month or even by the week; consumer loans often are installment loans.

—Few lenders wish to wait until after the borrower has used the money before charging; instead, they take their profits in advance.

DISCOUNTING—Many people in Massachusetts will find they are not paying the rates they commonly see quoted for large loans.

1. Discounting. Banks favor this method. The interest is circulated in advance and deducted or discounted from the principal amount of the loan. A \$1,000 loan at 6 per cent gives you \$940; the interest has been deducted.

2. Adding on. Sales finance companies commonly use this method. You begin with the price of an object—an automobile, for example—and add on the interest charge in advance.

3. Actuarial. This method is often used by small loan companies and on charge accounts. Interest is calculated not in advance but every month on the unpaid balance. It often figures out to 12 to 18 per cent.

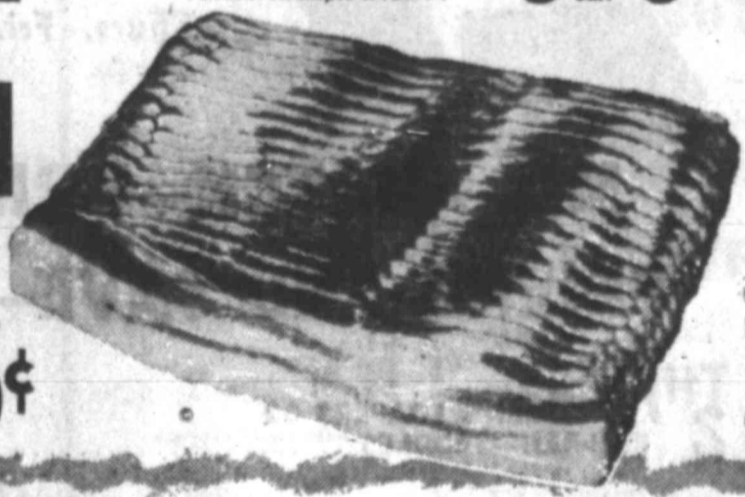

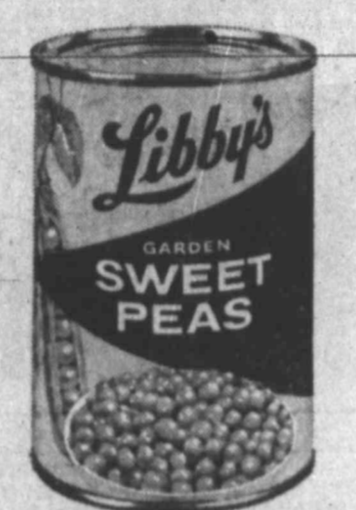

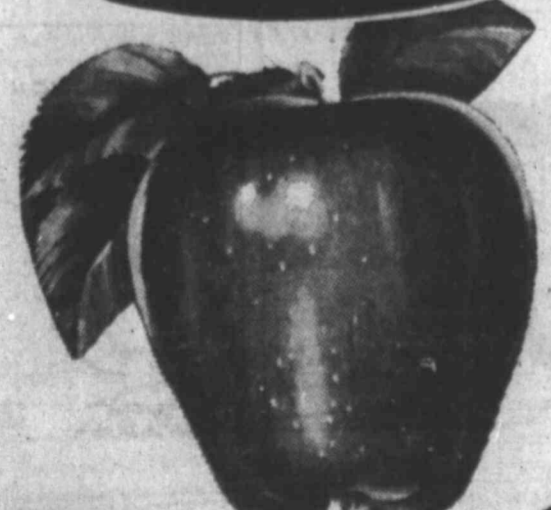

TEXANS AT WAR

'Those People Were' Trying To Kill Me'

By The Associated Press

"After three times, they decided to send me home," quipped Robert Wayne Cooper, 21, a Texan at war.

"Those people over there were trying to kill me."

Cooper, a Navy corpsman, returned to his home in Fort Worth last month after being wounded in Viet Nam for the third time. He served as a medic with the Marines since January.

'GETS BAD'

"It gets bad over there sometimes," said Cooper, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Cooper of Fort Worth. "You have to find something to laugh about or you'll lose your mind."

He said some think it strange that he laughs when talking of war and being wounded, but to him it is an attitude of necessity.

Cooper was first hit 10 miles from Da Nang by a booby trap rigged in a bamboo hedge. He suffered an ankle injury, but the marine who triggered the trap was killed.

BULLET IN BACK

On a field maneuver in June a Viet Cong bullet pierced his back and imbedded beneath his rib. He recovered within three days.

Six weeks later, during Operation Hastings, Cooper and other U.S. troops were running out patrols near the demilitarized zone.

"That night they (Viet Cong) came in and dropped mortars on us," he recalled. "We were lucky no one got hurt real bad."

Cooper received an arm injury and, after a spell on a hospital ship, was flown to the naval hospital at Corpus Christi. Cooper, whose brother Billy, 24, is an Army helicopter maintenance man in Saigon, is awaiting orders for reassignment.

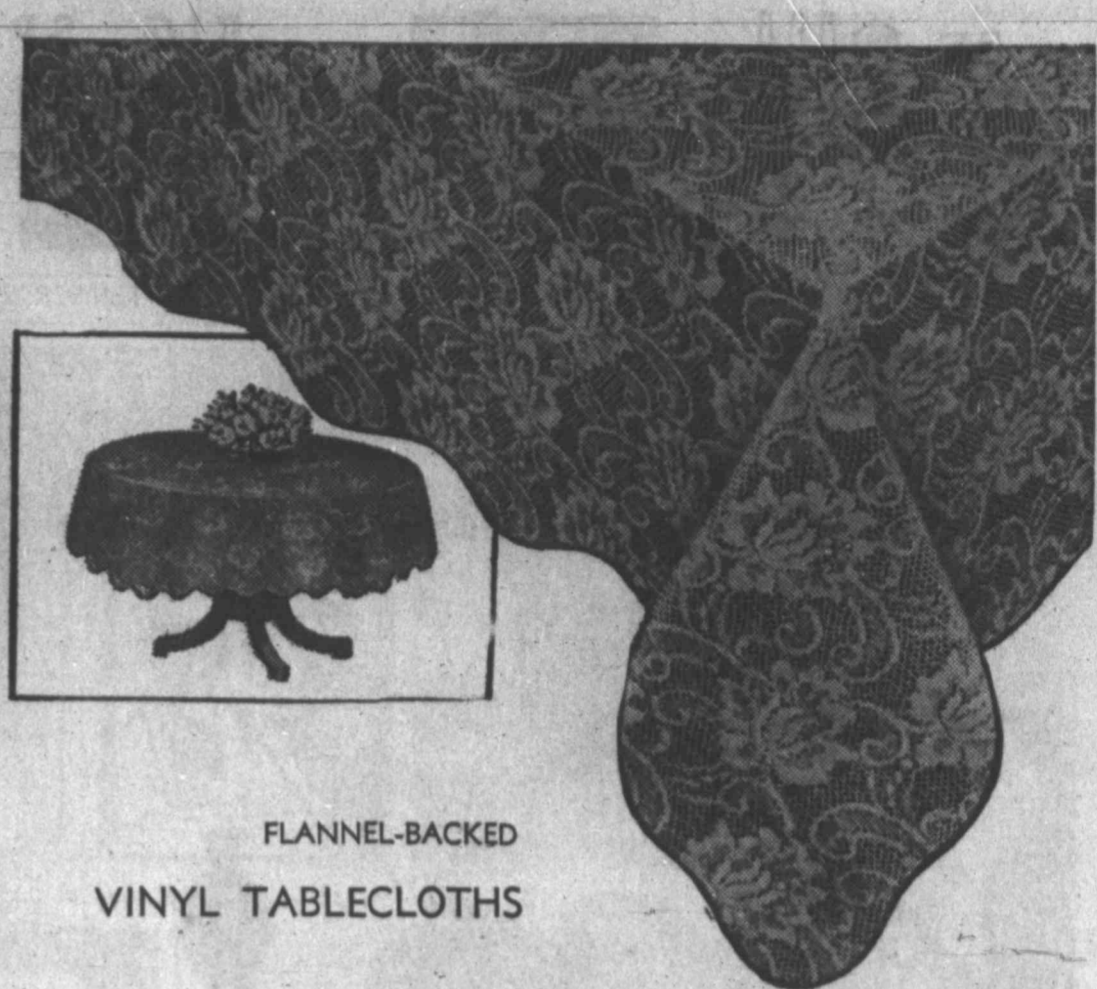

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Lillian Smith, novelist, essayist and an early spokesman for civil rights in the South, died Wednesday at an Atlanta hospital after a lingering illness. She was 68.

Her controversial first book, "Strange Fruit," about a tragic love affair between a white boy and a Negro girl, was a best seller and won her international recognition. It sold more than three million copies.

Miss Smith was born in Jasper, Fla., but had lived in Clayton, in the north Georgia mountains much of her life. She had been ill with cancer for many years.

Two Communists Leave Thailand

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Two Soviet representatives left for Moscow today after being ordered out of the country by the Thai government.

One was Alexei Oboukhov, personal secretary to the Soviet ambassador. An embassy spokesman said the Thai Foreign Ministry informed it he had been declared persona non grata but gave no specific reason.

Aboard the plane with Oboukhov was Leonid Manurin, a Soviet trade representative who was expelled on charges of collecting information injurious to Thailand.

"Someday, I'll be in a position to work for them." That was in 1957. It was after he had failed twice for the Democratic nomination for governor and twice lost to Republicans for the U.S. Senate.

He tried again for governor in 1958 and for the Senate in 1960 without success. Now Mahoney, 64, has achieved a measure of success. Rep. Carlton R. Sickles, D-Md., conceded Wednesday that Mahoney, an opponent of open housing legislation, won the Democratic nomination for governor of Maryland in the primary Sept. 13.

It was a typical close finish for Mahoney. An official tabulation, lacking only a check of voting machines in Baltimore city, showed Mahoney's margin over Sickles was 1,629 votes.

Mahoney will face Republican Spiro T. Agnew, the chief executive of Baltimore County, and Independent Hyman Pressman, comptroller of Baltimore city, in the general election Nov. 8.

NY Newsman Writes '30'

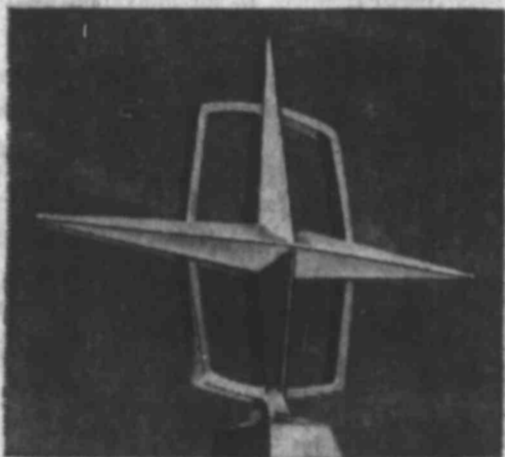
NEW YORK (AP) — Arthur Krock wrote "finis" atop his column in the New York Times today to mark the end of a 48-year newspaper career that spanned 18 presidencies and brought him three Pulitzer awards. According to Who's Who, Krock will be 80 on Nov. 16.

Both living former presidents, Harry S. Truman and Dwight D. Eisenhower, sent expressions of regret.

"Over the years you have always had my admiration and respect," said Truman.

"His retirement will leave a great hole in the Washington press corps and I, for one, will miss him sorely," wrote Eisenhower in a message for publication with the announcement.

Krock, who grew up in Glasgow, Ky., began newspaper work on the Louisville Courier-Journal and moved to the New York World after covering the Versailles peace conference in 1919.
