City Ambulance Operator Named

DAN REEVES of the Dallas Cowboys says he gets kidded a lot about the way he talks, being from Georgia. This is particularly true when the Cowboys are training in summer camp, which is in Thousand Oaks, California.

Reeves said here Tuesday that he told some of the folks in California last summer "You'd better get used to the way I talk because the next president of the United States is going to talk just like me."

He said the general reaction from the California natives was "Jimmy who?" Says he can't wait for the Cowboys to go to Thousand Oaks this year, as he has a few "I told you so's" saved up.

The Cowboy official is from Rome, Georgia, a distinction he shares with Friona's Hollis Horton. He went to high school in Americus, Georgia. "Before Jimmy Carter, Plains was nine miles from Americus. Now, Americus is nine miles from Plains," Reeves explains the sudden turnaround.

REEVES SAYS he knows that the Cowboys have a lot of good fans in the Panhandle-Plains area—probably more loyal fans than live right in the Dallas area.

"One thing about it, we can't hear you all when you boo," he joked.

DURING THE 1960s, riots and demonstrations were the order of the day.

The 1970s have produced a new, violent type of crime—the seizing of hostages by terrorist groups.

Perhaps the most famous incident happened during the 1972 Olympic Games at Munich, when eight hooded Arab terrorists took nine Israeli athletes hostage, demanding the release of some 200 Palestinian guerrilla prisoners of war.

The German officials pretended to go along with the terrorists, and were supposedly providing them with a get-away airplane. But police opened fire at the airport. Although 17 people died, the Israelis were freed and the terrorists were foiled.

The following year, 1973, a group of terrorists hijacked a 747 jet and its 137 passengers. After landing in Benghazi, Libya, the terrorists freed the captives, and set fire to the plane.

The latest example of terrorism happened on U.S. soil, and in the nation's capital, no less, with the cold seizing this month of 134 hostages by the 12 Muslim guerrillas and the terrorizing of the Washington area for 39 hours.

What is behind this latest "fad" for the super criminals? Do the mass media contribute to the problem rather than helping to solve it?

These are questions that are facing officials in high places of responsibility as the United States sees this type of offense enacted on its own soil. And, as usual, there are differing opinions as to how to handle the terrorists.

"Promise them anything, but give them handcuffs," said conservative leader Ronald Reagan this week. Reagan thought it was soft of the Washington leaders to let the leader of the terrorists go free, without even having to post bail.

Reagan says he doesn't believe it is immoral to break a promise to people such as this. "The normal rules are suspended when it's a question of capturing madmen in order to save innocent lives," he reasons.

We tend to agree with this opinion. Why should terrorist boss Hamas Khaalis be free to return to his home, where he can plot his next terrorist move, instead of being shut away so far that he wouldn't see light for at least a year?

On the other hand, those who disagree with the "eye for an eye" theory argue that you have to keep your promises, in the event that similar circumstances present themselves in the future, otherwise future negotiators would not be believed.

We do not profess to have a solution to the problem, but here's hoping that this type of terrorism loses its contagion before it erupts again in our country.

Rex Williams has been named emergency ambulance operator for the City of Friona, which will take charge of all ambulance calls as of April 1.

Williams has been a resident of Friona since 1960. He has been

employed with Herring Implement Co. most of the time he has lived in Friona.

To prepare himself for his new duties, Williams has completed an 18-hour vehicle extraction course, has taken the Cardio-Pulmonary

Resuscitation (CPR) course, and a 28-hour Emergency Care Attendant's (ECA) course conducted locally through Amarillo College.

In addition, Williams has been making trips with Parsons-Ellis Ambulance during the month of March and observing techniques and practices of an ambulance driver and attendant.

When the city assumes ambulance duties, it will put into service a brand new van-type emergency vehicle that is equipped with the latest devices.

"It is virtually an emergency room on wheels," Williams said regarding the new ambulance.

The vehicle contains one large and two small, portable oxygen bottles. It has a vacuum system with suction, has its own power supply, and is fully heated and air conditioned.

The emergency vehicle will be in direct radio contact with Parmer County Community Hospital, and will be able to communicate with any hospital in Amarillo, as well as other communities that participate in the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC).

In the treatment area of the van, a headphone set is installed whereby a doctor can converse by radio with a hospital. There is also a microphone foot switch, so that the doctor could operate the microphone and use both hands to work with his patient if necessary.

There is a door between the driver and the patient area, with an intercom system between the front and back. The front portion of the van is equipped with two "captain" style bucket seats.

The van is large enough to accommodate two patients at one time if necessary.

The vehicle is equipped with emergency lights on the sides, front and back, to light up an area at night, in case of a wreck or other emergency. The inside of the van has two types of lights, including a fluorescent light.

Residents of the Friona area are asked to make note of the fact that beginning April 1, they should call 247-2211 for ambulance service.

Pet Clinic Set Locally

A small animal vaccination clinic will be held at the Friona Fire Station on two consecutive Fridays in April, it was announced this week by City Manager Jake Outland.

The clinic will be held between the hours of 3 and 5 p.m. on Friday, April 1 and again on Friday, April 8.

The city will issue tags for the animals, at \$2.50 each, and the rabies inoculation administered by Dr. Cash will run \$2.50 each, for a total charge of \$5.00 per animal.

According to city ordinance, all animals kept within the city limits are to be tagged and inoculated yearly.

Nurse Aide Class Is Scheduled To Begin

Monday, March 28 will mark the beginning of the second, 36-hour Nurses Aide training class for persons interested in becoming a nursing aide.

Attendance of the classes neither obligates the student to become an employee at Prairie Acres nor guarantees employment, however, is planned to prepare persons for work in nursing homes, hospitals or home health care with basic nursing skills.

A minimum education of high school graduate or the equivalent will be required for attendance. Seniors who will graduate this spring will be accepted.

More than 147 students have graduated under similar courses taught by Madie R. Schmidt, R.N. who is Director of Nursing Services at Prairie Acres.

The course will include classroom instruction, floor training and demonstrations. Guest lecturers will include a physician, minister, dietitian and nurses.

The course will continue for 36 hours at a cost of \$8.50 (workbook charge) and will begin at 11 a.m. March 28 in the Nursing Home.

No Relief Seen For The Farmer

Farmers of the Friona area had better hope the "Indian sign" is wrong for the 1977 crop year.

J.W. Crim, who had made the annual weather reading at his home place near Lazbuddie every year since 1922, was ill this year and could not attend. But his family members carried on the tradition.

Reduce Heart Trouble By Following Rules

All humans gamble with their lives to some extent. We know there will be earthquakes, but they are so rare, we do not have a corner earthquake station. We do have fire stations because we know there will be a certain number of fires.

We also know there will be 850,000 deaths caused by heart attack and stroke this year.

There are precautions people can take, regarding heart attack and stroke, much as we close match covers before striking. The precautions against heart attack and stroke deal with "risk factors" which are every bit as sensible to observe as fire safety requirements.

The risk factors are smoking, lack of exercise, improper diet, high blood pressure and obesity. A person who ignores all these factors is gambling against pretty big odds. There are indeed many people who smoke a pack or two a day, eat foods

high in cholesterol and saturated fats, don't exercise moderately, are overweight, and don't control high blood pressure with readily available and effective drugs.

On the other hand, chances of

heart disease can be reduced, by modifying the effect of these factors in day-to-day living habits. Unfortunately, heredity, sex, age and race are risk factors that can't be altered. Some families tend to have more heart attacks and strokes; men suffer these diseases earlier in life than women, with increasing age increasing the chances of heart attack; and black Americans, for some reason, are more likely to have high blood pressure.

But whatever age, sex, or race you are, your lifestyle can be altered to cut down the risks. Just as the combination of all the factors may be deadly, the absence of all the factors can mean a longer and more enjoyable life.

How? The answers are easy to list, but changing lifestyles requires some effort. The answers are: quit smoking, eat foods low in cholesterol and saturated fats, get moderate exercise, watch your weight, and have your blood pressure checked. High blood pressure is the main risk factor in heart attack and stroke; fortunately, it is controllable in most cases.

Vehicle Registration Deadline Nears

Have you picked up your 1977 motor vehicle registration sticker yet? It not, be prepared to push the panic button.

That's exactly what members of the Tax Assessor-Collectors Association of Texas are about to do.

R.W. Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, said that county officials "literally were ready to crawl the walls" when the organization's board of directors met in Corpus Christi recently.

"Very few motorists have registered their vehicles—just like last year," Townsley said. "Tax offices are staffed to handle the anticipated rush to get stickers ready, and they've simply got nothing to do."

Despite the easily handled stickers, which were initiated in 1976 and computer-prepared registration applications—which eliminates most of the delay formerly involved in typing registrations—motorists simply aren't remembering last year's frustrating last minute lines.

"Tax collectors are waiting for the 'big crunch'," Townsley said. "Motorists will have no one but themselves to blame if they wait until the deadline April 1 to get their registrations. Every county in the state is running way behind

schedule." Hugh Moseley, tax assessor-collector, operated a special booth in Friona last month to sell registration stickers. Late registrants will need to visit Moseley's office at the Court House in Farwell.

Many motorists could have registered by mail, but mail registrations ended February 28.

Meantime, those motorists who don't want to take time off from work to wait in line for as much as several hours had better take a few minutes to register their vehicles today.

It would be rough to be one of some 10 million motorists trying to register their vehicles in the last few days of the month.

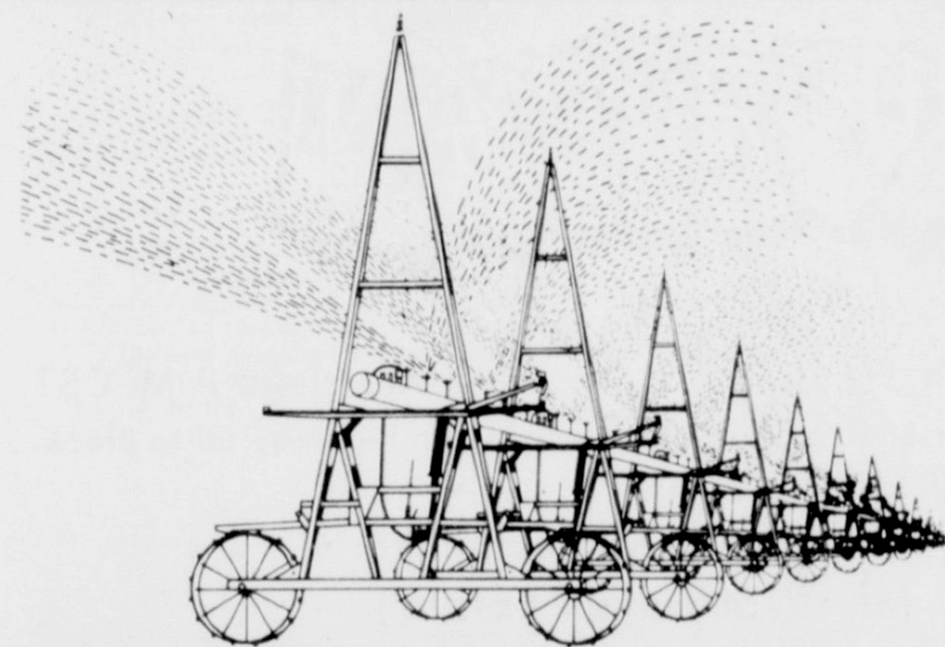

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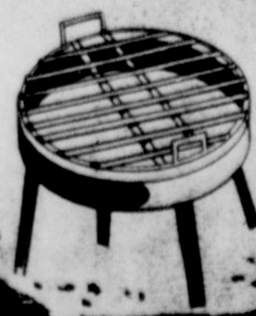

With two events to go, Friona held an 11-point lead over the Mules, 144-133. But Muleshoe placed 1-2-3 in the mile run to take an eight-point lead at 158-150. The Mules then edged the Chiefs in the final event, the mile relay, giving them the meet title by 12 points.

The Chiefs had wins by freshman David Fleming, Koty Kothmann and Eddie Brailiff. Muleshoe dominated the first places with nine wins. But the Chiefs showed good depth by winning 22 medals plus the runnerup team trophy.

Fleming ran a personal best in the 440-yard dash to win that event in the time of 53.7. Kothmann also had his career best in the discus with a toss of 134-4.

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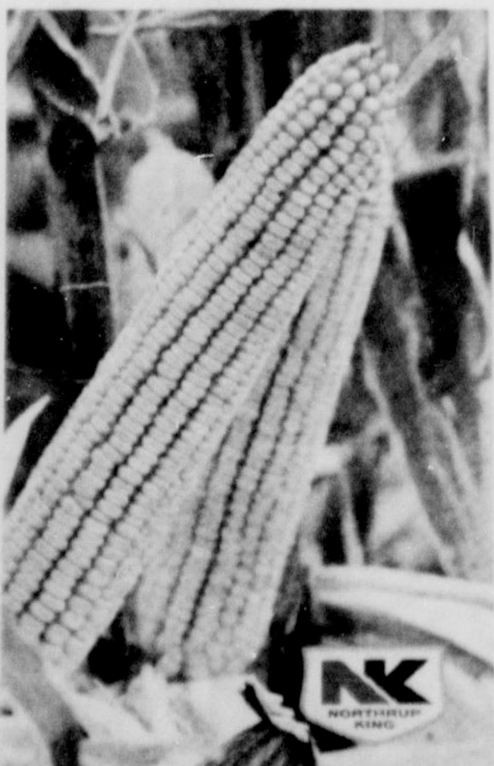
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Rebate Indicates Xmas Sales

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Tuesday that city sales tax rebates for the first quarter of 1977 totaled a record \$89.5 million, up 18.5 per cent from the same three-month period last year.

Bullock said that the record rebates—which exceeded the previous quarterly high by more than \$5 million (second quarter, 1976)—were based on record sales during the 1976 Christmas season.

Most retailers file their sales tax reports on a quarterly basis. These reports for the Christmas quarter were due January 31 for processing and are now reflected in the March allocations.

"We knew that Christmas sales were going to be up, but, frankly, this was more than we dared hope for," said Bullock. "This is a late but welcome Christmas gift for city treasuries across the state." The rebate to the City of Friona was \$10,535.07.

Mike Windham, Lazbuddie FFA, showed the champion Chester White barrow. Driven by his brother, Russell, the barrow first won the heavyweight class before being named breed champion. Mark Mimms, also of Lazbuddie, had the fourth place heavyweight Spot barrow.

Lazbuddie 4-H members Sherrie Seaton, Vandi Tarter, Barbie Seaton and Russell Windham had several placing barrows. Sherrie showed the first place mediumweight Spot Barrow that was later named reserve champion Spot. Another Spot barrow owned by Russell Windham was third in the lightweight class. Vandi Tarter won first in the lightweight Duroc class and Barbie Seaton placed seventh with her heavyweight Chester

White. Other Lazbuddie youngsters showing barrows were Joe Dan Tarter, Steffan Moore, Charleson Steinbock, Mickey Powell and Danny Powell.

Randy Gerles of Farwell placed eighth in the mediumweight Duroc class. Mark Miller won seventh with his lightweight Chester White.

Proposed Legislation Is Threat To Ginners

If a standard for exposure to cotton dust as proposed by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) should go into effect, many cotton gins may be forced out of business. And as a direct result, the cost of growing cotton will go up, says an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Calvin B. Parnell, cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, contends that the proposed standard, which is designed to protect individuals from the disease byssinosis, could have a severe impact on the cotton industry. "Estimates of the cost of engineering controls to meet the standard vary from \$40,000 to almost \$200,000 per gin. Furthermore, engineering controls are such that there is no assurance that they would meet the standard."

With the tremendous cost involved in putting in the controls to protect employees from cotton dust, many

gins processing 3,000 bales or less would be forced out of business, believes Parnell. "In some cases, cotton production would cease since producers would not grow cotton if they had to transport it 50 to 100 miles down the road. And, where the gins would make the investment in the controls, the cost would have to be passed on to the producers, thus decreasing their net profits."

Cottonseed oil mills and textile mills also face compliance with the dust standard. Again, the cost of engineering controls would be tremendous—as high as \$1 million—with no assurance of meeting the standard.

The proposed standard sets out to limit an employee's exposure to cotton dust as measured by a vertical elutriator over any eight-hour period. Meeting the standards calls for the use of respirators and work practice controls along with mandatory engineering controls, explains Parnell.

Congressman George Mahon announced this week that officials of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration have agreed to conduct field hearings on their proposed cotton dust standards in Lubbock, Texas, on May 10 and 11.

"I am most disturbed over the potential impact these cotton dust standards could have on the economy of West Texas and the nation," the Congressman said. "If implemented as they are now written, these unreasonable standards could have the effect of shutting down thousands of gins across the Cotton Belt, and would cost millions of dollars in the loss of jobs and other economic benefits."

Congressman Mahon urged cotton industry representatives in West Texas and area citizens generally to provide as much information as possible at the field hearings in Lubbock. Requests to appear at the hearings may be made at the OSHA office in the Lubbock Federal

Building. The hearings will begin at 9:30 a.m. on May 10, and will be held at the South Park Inn.

Three Rainbow Girls Earn High Honors

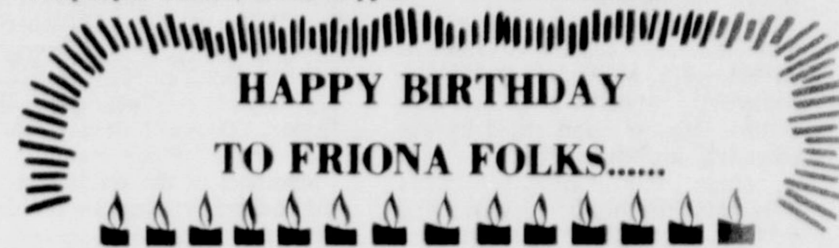

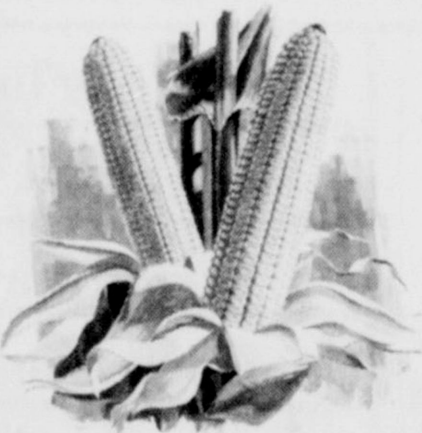
