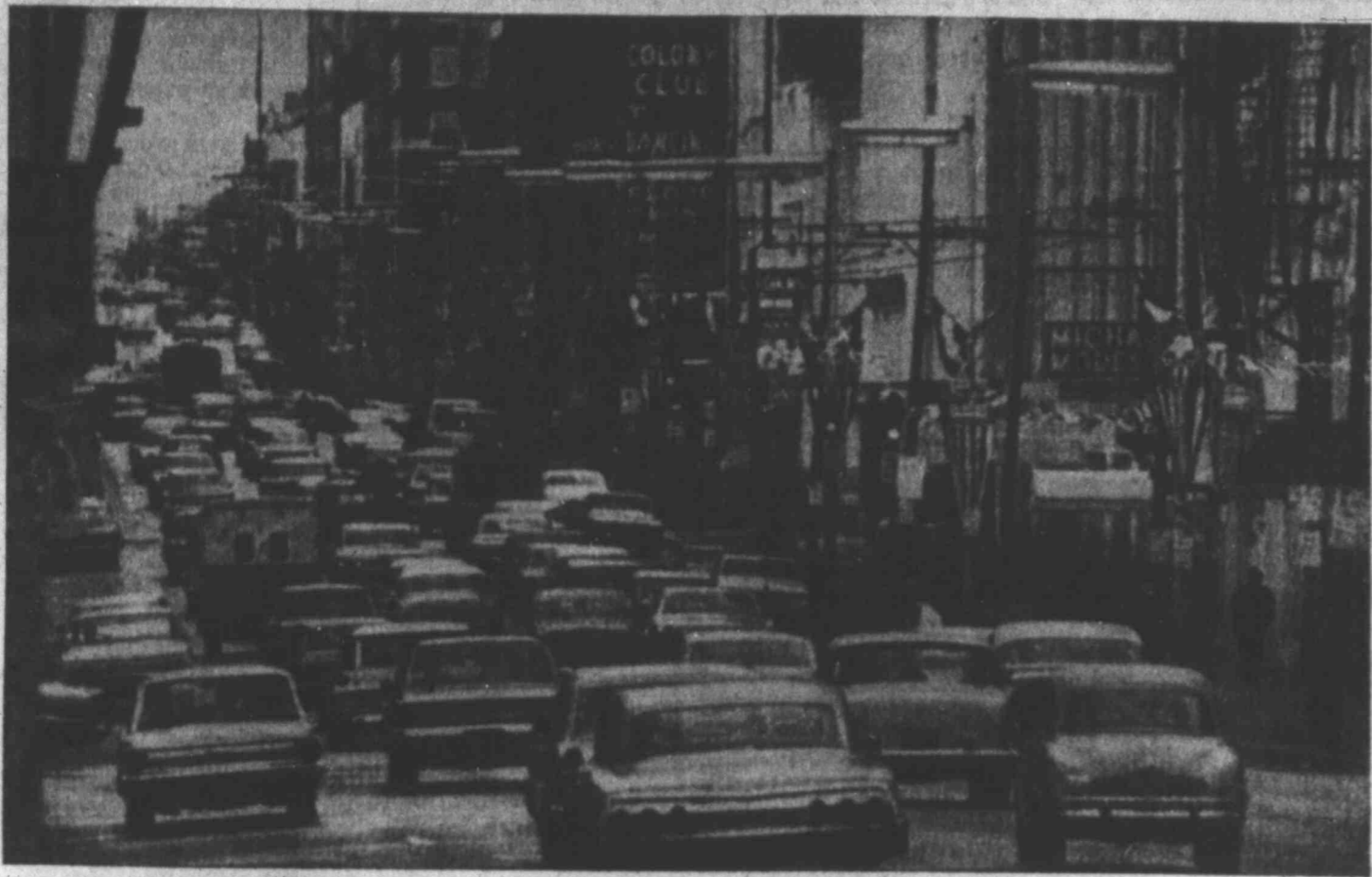

Thousands Of Bus Riders Stranded As Drivers Meet

DALLAS (AP)—City bus drivers went into what they termed a "continuous meeting" at 2 a.m. today, leaving thousands of bus riders stranded in this city of nearly 850,000.

Police said automobile traffic moved well during the morning rush hour and observations indicated that no jams developed. HEARING OCT. 11 The city obtained a temporary restraining order which in effect called for the drivers to return to work.

'Gold Coast' Is Whacked By Hurricane

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Inez, still a killer after nine wild days over tropical seas, roared today up an Atlantic Ocean alley between the famed resort cities of Miami and Nassau.

Dead ahead of the storm lay Great Abaco Island, "the land that time forgot," and other Bahamian isles which often have heard the howl of the hurricane.

Inez had slowed to a crawl, a development that often portends a change in direction. But forecasters predicted she would continue on to north-northeast, toward isles in which many graveyards hold victims of other tropical storms.

DIRECT HIT

Lashing out to east and west, Inez jabbed at the south Florida "Gold Coast" with gusty winds and squalls and sent a tornado spiraling into Nassau that killed a 16-month-old native child.

Great Abaco, second largest of the Bahamas Islands and the home of 6,500 persons, was scheduled for a direct hit. Although Great Abaco is largely populated by natives of African descent, it contains several white communities—settled by loyalist refugees of the American Revolutionary War—where customs have changed little since 1776.

THREE MISSING

Gale warnings came down along the southeast Florida coast, home of 2.5 million people, after an uneasy Sunday during which Inez hurled squalls into the area, whipping the palm fronds.

In Nassau, capital of the Bahamas, flood waters ran two feet deep down some streets in the city of 50,000. The twister lashed a group of shacks occupied by field hands. Three persons are missing.

Weakened and knocked out of shape by her collision with the Sierra mountains of Cuba, Inez wound up tightly again over the Atlantic.

GAMBLING CASINO

Her top winds were raging at 80 miles an hour around the eye and were expected to reach 100 by the time she roars through the dense pine forests of Abaco late today or early tonight.

Rain bands spread through most of the Bahamas as Inez thrashed very slowly to a point 110 miles east-southeast of Miami and 90 miles west of Nassau.

Also in the hurricane's path was Grand Bahama Island, site of a plush gambling casino and a vigorous industrial development directed by Wallace Groves, an American known as "the king of Grand Bahama."

BUTTONED UP

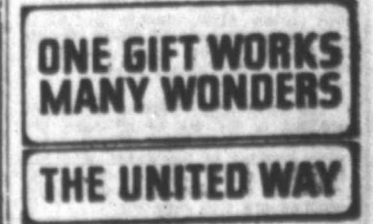
The U.S. Missile Tracking Station on Grand Bahama was tightly buttoned up. Most of the new resort hotels and industrial plants enticed to the Bahamas by a tax break followed suite.

Inez, only a shadow of the storm that was believed to have killed hundreds in three Caribbean countries, was making probably her last swipe at land.

Flight Raid Led By Texan

SAIGON (AP)—A Texan led the flight of Air Force B-57 Canberra which destroyed or damaged 50 buildings in an enemy camp 35 miles southeast of Da Nang Sunday, the American military command reported.

The flight leader, Capt. Billy Frazelle, 37, of Mart said there may have been more damage, but heavy smoke caused by the attack prevented further observation.

Texas Violence Toll Totals 25

At least 25 persons perished in Texas over the weekend from traffic accidents, shootings and other forms of violence.

Thirteen lives were lost in wrecks and six persons were shot to death.

The Associated Press tabulation began at 6 p.m. Friday and went through midnight Sunday.

The toll: Maggie Wilcox, 25, and S. Sgt. James T. Nelson, 33, of Kelly Air Force Base were killed Sunday when the car in which they were riding went out of control on US 87 at San Antonio.

The body of Victor Urdiales, 15, of San Antonio, who had been missing since late Friday, was found Sunday in a large reservoir near Converse. He had disappeared beneath moss-choked water while pushing a small boat.

SHOT TO DEATH
Al Johnson, 19, of Houston was shot to death on a Houston street Sunday. James Smith, 29, also of Houston, was charged with murder.

Arthur Thomas of Fort Worth drowned Saturday night in Big Fossil Creek at Haltom City, near Fort Worth, while on a fishing trip.

Lester Ray Waldrop, 9, of Kennedale, a Fort Worth suburb, was shot to death Saturday when a cousin's shotgun went off accidentally and hit the boy.

Wilbert A. Hill Jr., 11, drowned Saturday in the pool at the Boys Club of Dallas after diving into deep water.

An argument among six persons riding in a car on a Fort Worth freeway Sunday morning resulted in the shooting death of Clarence Bell, 21, of Fort Worth.

Bobby J. Green, 38, of Richardson, was killed Sunday morning when he was thrown from his automobile in an accident on US 75 near McKinney and then run over by another vehicle.

Charles Crayton, 31, of Fort Worth, was shot to death near his home Saturday after an argument with another man.

Two Dallas women died in separate accidents Sunday morning in Dallas. Fifty-year-old Maxine Pence was killed in a two-car accident in the Oak Cliff section of Dallas. About two hours later, Mrs. Sharon Skinner, a 20-year-old mother of two children, was fatally injured when the car in which she was riding crashed through barricades and was impaled on steel pilings of a bridge which was under construction.

Sheriff Wants Guards To Help Halt Violence

HARLAN, Iowa (AP)—Shelby County Sheriff Orrell Gearhart early today requested that the Iowa National Guard be called out to help quell violence at the Western Iowa pork plant near this southwestern Iowa community.

The sheriff said the violence erupted shortly after midnight in and around the plant in the 15th day of a strike by mem-

bers of the United Packing House Workers Union.

NO DOCTOR
He said more than 30 windows had been shattered in the plant building and several persons were injured when house trailers were tipped over near the plant. Five trailers were occupied by workers reportedly to have been sent in to work at the plant.

Gearhart said he was unable to determine how badly the injured were hurt because "we can't even get a doctor in there."

He said "about 70 persons" were milling around the building, adding that some of them were "using guns. They didn't fire at us," he said, but a number of shots were fired in the

WAGE DISPUTE

He said officers were unable to do anything "because we don't have enough reinforcements."

A contract between Local 1225 of the Packing House Workers and the company expired last April, but the workers remained on the job until Aug. 18.

Last week, the company began rehiring replacements for the strikers, and full production was resumed Thursday.

The union reportedly struck in a dispute over wages. There have been no negotiating sessions between the company and the union, officials said.

Film Producer Has Mud Carpet

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Film writer-producer Cy Bartlett's \$110,000 home has a wall to wall carpet of mud — thanks to a water main break in the Hollywood Hills Saturday.

The mud oozed into every room of the house, coating nearly all the furniture, and backed up against an exterior wall to the eaves.

Bartlett, who wrote the book and film of "12 O'clock High," lost a house in a mud washout in a rainstorm following a 1959 brush fire.

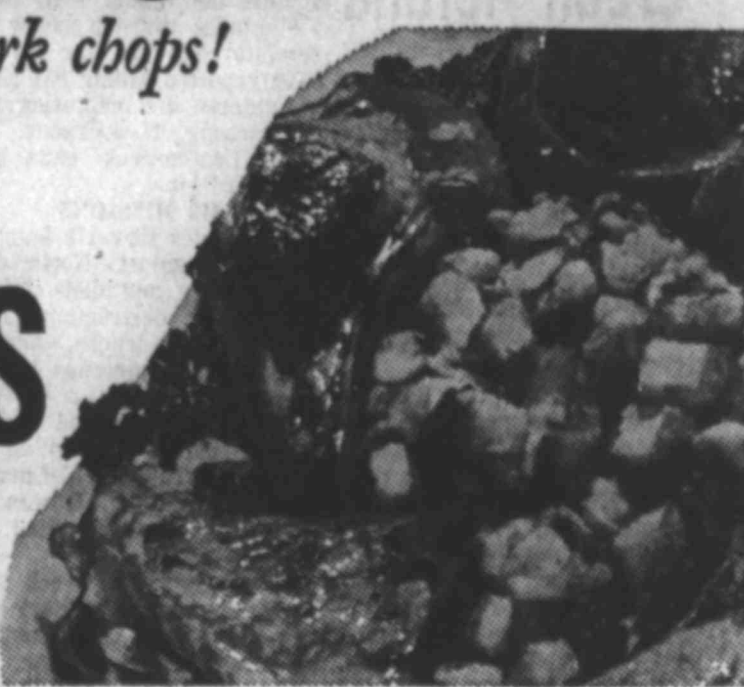

**Half Of Texas
Due Cold Air**

A fresh blast of cold air headed toward Texas today, threatening to chase away the idyllic autumn weather that prevailed over the weekend.

The front, which brought snow and rain to the northern Rockies, was expected to sweep into the Panhandle about mid-morning.

The Weather Bureau said showers would form along the system's passage and temperatures would fall to the 40s during the night.

Cooler air should cover the northern half of Texas by late Tuesday.

Clouds built up in Central Texas before dawn and began spreading northward. Elsewhere, skies were mainly clear, with temperatures ranging from 53 at Lufkin to 74 at Brownsville.

Presidio and Alice had the nation's warmest readings Sunday with marks of 95. Fort Worth's 76 was the state's coolest afternoon high.

Thunderstorms associated with the front should break out in North and East Texas tonight and Tuesday, the Weather Bureau said.

ANSWERS TO BRIDGE QUIZ
Q. 1—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
♠ 53 ♠ Q962 ♦ AKQ8 ♣ 742

The bidding has proceeded:
North East South
1 ♠ 1 ♠ 2 ♠

What do you bid?
A.—Three hearts. An approach bid of two diamonds, while it might work out as well, is not our choice. The three heart bid describes a hand with four trumps and at least 13 supporting points. Having made this call we are relieved of obligation to take any further drastic step.

Q. 2—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠ 8 ♠ K855 ♦ K1053 ♣ J873

The bidding has proceeded:
North East South
1 ♠ 1 ♠ 2 ♠

What do you bid?
A.—Three hearts. On hands of only moderate strength where a take-out double has been made and you possess a good fit with partner's opening, best results are usually obtained by offering an immediate jump raise. This serves to disrupt enemy communications, but at the same time does not prevent partner from proceeding to game if he has a really good hand.

Q. 3—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠ K2 ♠ A632 ♦ 86542 ♣ K2

The bidding has proceeded:
West North East South
1 ♠ 1 ♠ 2 ♠

What do you bid?
A.—Two spades. A doubtless honor is deemed to be normal trump support for an overcall. Nothing is to be gained by a bid of one no trump, for your hand is not exactly balanced and none of your strength is in the adverse bid suit.

Q. 4—East-West vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠ KQ7 ♠ A J1063 ♦ J8 ♣ K87

The bidding has proceeded:
West North East South
1 ♠ 2 ♠ 2 ♠

What do you bid?
A.—Three no trump. You have 14 high card points facing a partner who was able to make an overcall at the two level. This should be enough to produce a game and in light of your spade holding, a nine trick contract should prove the easiest to fulfill.

Q. 5—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
♠ QJ32 ♠ J109 ♦ 73 ♣ Q753

The bidding has proceeded:
East South West North
1 ♠ Pass 1 ♠ Dble.
2 ♠ Pass 3 ♠ 3 ♠

What do you bid now?
A.—Four spades. What appears to be a very indifferent holding to you should prove very welcome to a partner who could find double and then contract for nine tricks entirely on his own. Your trump holding plus the doubling diamond should bring that total to 10.

Q. 6—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠ K853 ♠ 855 ♦ KJ4 ♣ KQ9

The bidding has proceeded:
North East South West
Pass Pass 1 ♠ Pass
1 ♠ Pass 2 ♠ Pass
3 ♠ Pass ?

What do you bid now?
A.—Four spades. At the outset your hand appeared to be the veriest of minimums, but in the light of bidding developments you have a very representative holding and it is suggested that you contract for game. Had partner's second bid been in hearts, no such action could be contemplated.

Q. 7—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠ J93 ♦ K1055 ♣ KJ10873

Partner opens one no trump. What is your response?

A.—Three clubs. This is perhaps somewhat abnormal, but we can think of no better call. If partner rebids three hearts, a return to three no trump is indicated. If he bids anything other than three no trump, then you should plan to play at a minor suit contract.

Q. 8—East-West vulnerable, as South you hold:
♠ A98542 ♦ VKQ8 ♣ KQ2

The bidding has proceeded:
South West North East
1 ♠ 2 ♠ Pass Pass ?

What do you bid now?
A.—Three clubs. This hand possesses tremendous offensive possibilities despite partner's failure to take positive action. A jump rebid in spades is acceptable, but the one bid is preferred because of your tolerance for a red suit contract should partner have great length in either of those suits. A reopening double is not recommended because of your lack of preparation for a "leave in."

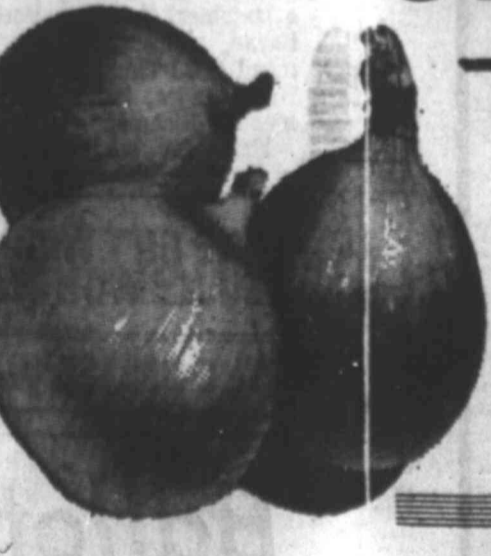

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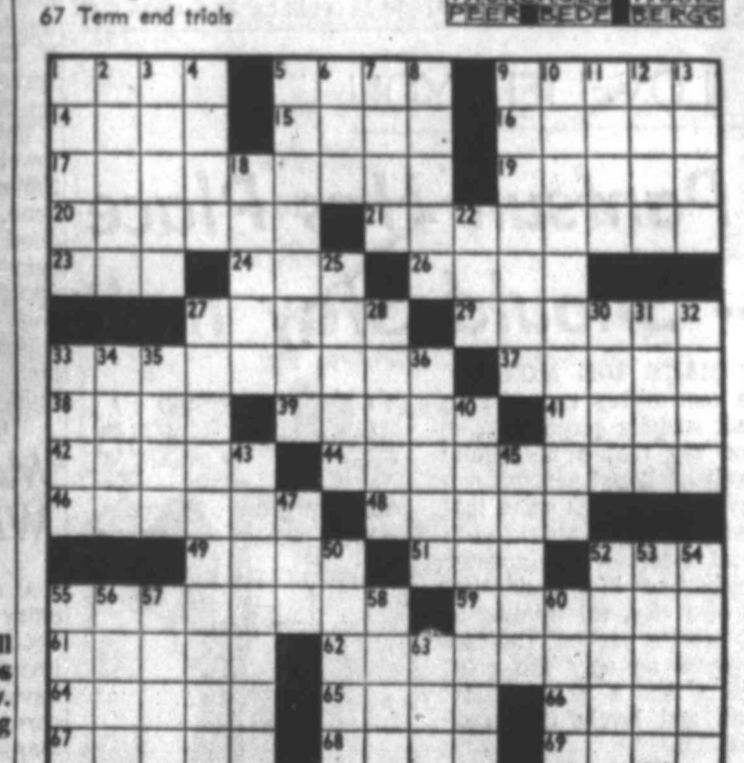
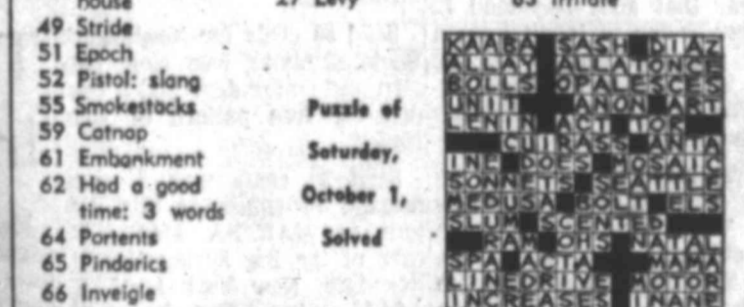

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TEXANS AT WAR

'They Knew Every Move We Made'

By The Associated Press

"The Viet Cong knew they had us," said Sgt. L.C. Ronald Olson, a Texan at war, recalling a battle in which he suffered one of his two Viet Nam war wounds.

"They knew every move we made."

Houstonian Olson was a medic in a Special Forces group in charge of A Co., Third Nung Bn., composed of Chinese who fled the Communists.

SNIPER FIRE

"We were in the second assault wave against a Viet Cong stronghold near Loc Ninth. We got immediate sniper fire and then ran into a battalion of hard core—and I mean hard core—VC."

"They divided the company into small groups, nice and neat. That first night we had 24 killed and 102 missing."

Three times the remains of A Co. fell back 50 yards and tried to regroup for a stand, but three times they were overrun.

"We had only 20 people with us and four wounded. We were taking fire from all sides. They had closed the trap," Olson recalled.

'CHASED ALL WAY'

His company commander called in an air strike "on top of us," says Olson, who suffered a minor flesh wound in the arm.

"We E and E'd for 26 hours," said Olson, using Army slang.

Drills Slashed By Guard Unit

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—The commander of the Texas National Guard's 36th Infantry Brigade says the unit is cutting back to a less intensive training program.

Brig. Gen. Ross Ayers said Sunday most units have reached a point of readiness to permit the number of training assemblies to be cut from 72 four-hour sessions a year to 60 sessions.

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara ordered an intensification of training last November when the 36th Brigade was made a part of the select reserve force of the Army National Guard and the U. S. Army Reserve.

After a short stay here, he is to report to Camp Pendleton for further duty with the Marines.

Prisoner Meals Cost 19¢ Each

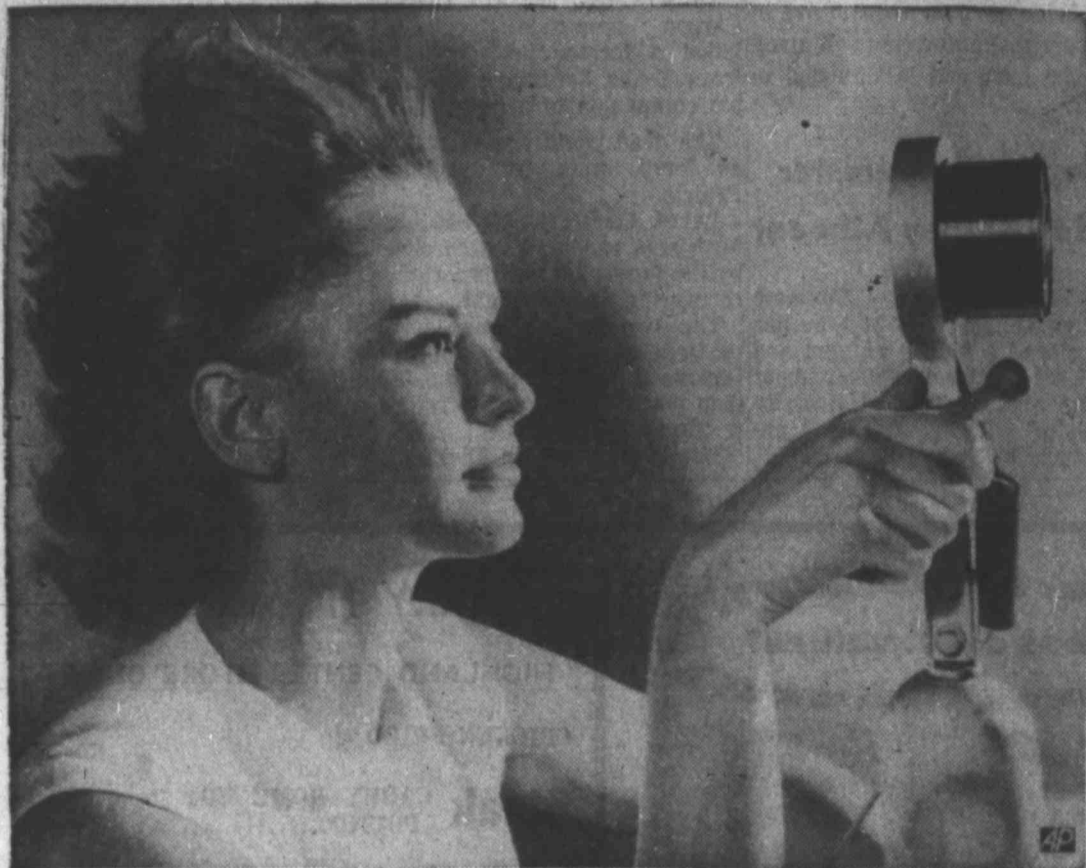

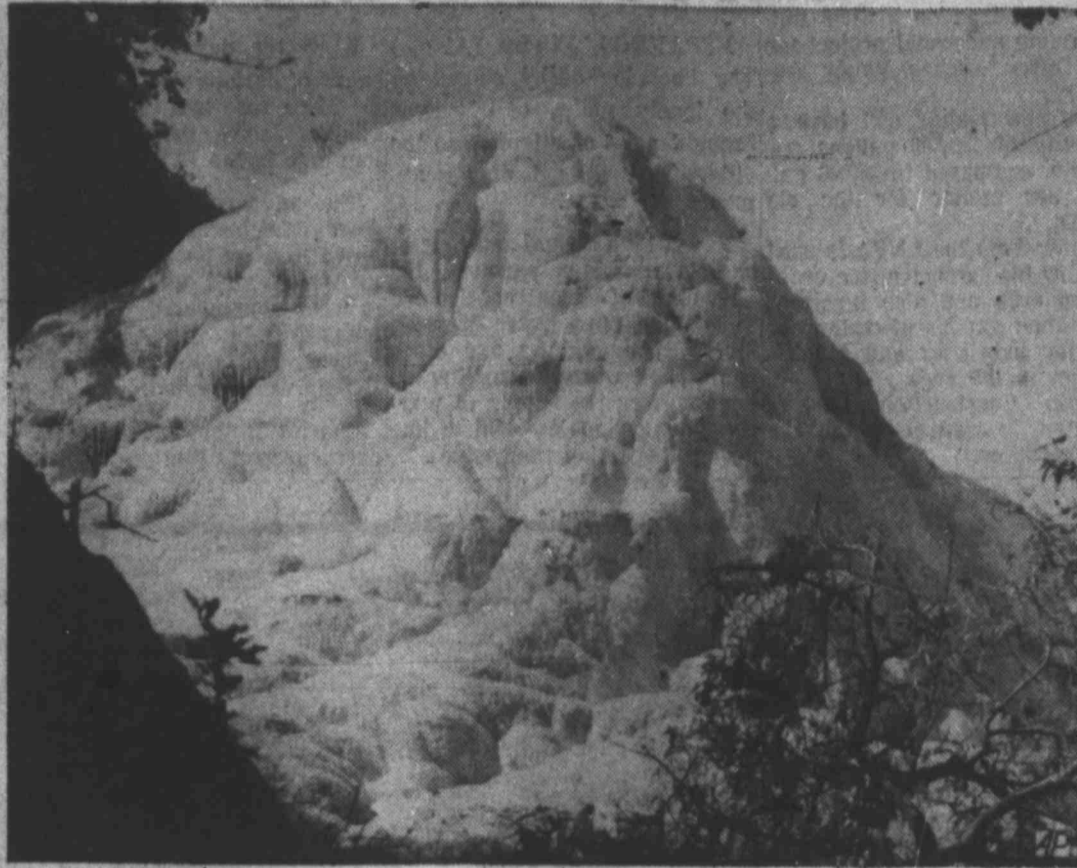

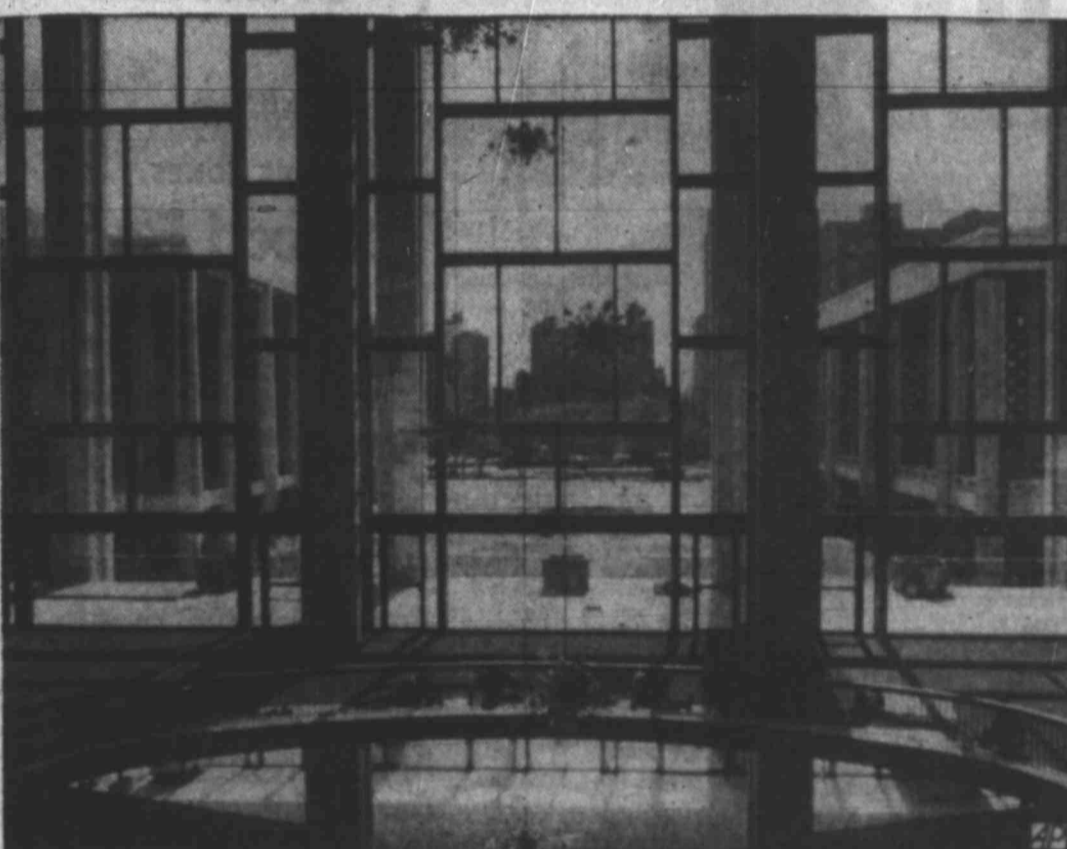

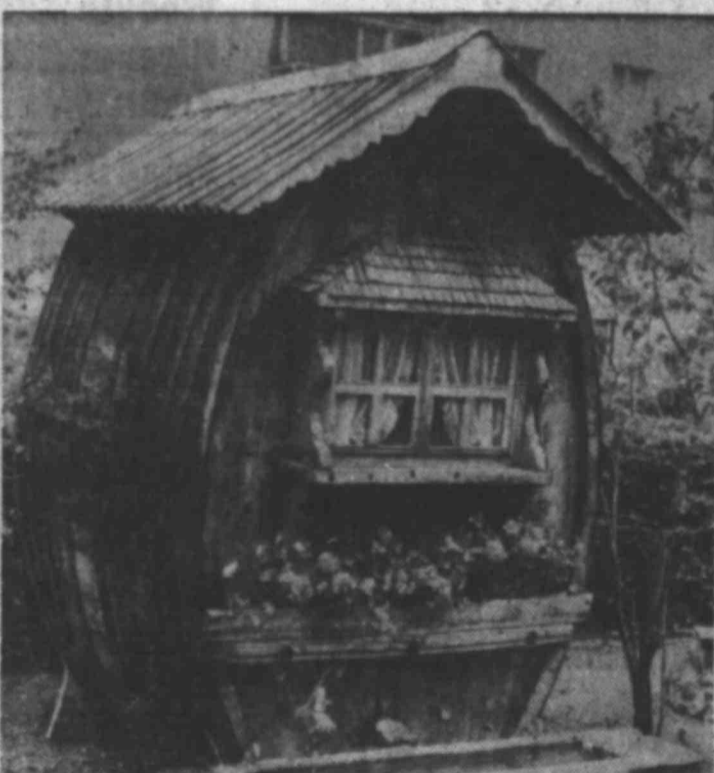

Hubert, Barry Agree Viet Will Not Be Major Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey puts "so-called inflation" and "the quality of extent of the ad-

ministration's program" ahead of the Viet Nam war as top issues in the November congressional elections.

Former Sen. Barry M. Goldwater agrees that Viet Nam will not be the issue. He says the increased cost of living and "morality — crime on the street" both will be more important.

But Rep. Melvin R. Laird said today President Johnson's conduct of the war is a major issue in the elections.

Martin County Grand Jury In Session

Judge Ralph Caton of 118th District Court is in Martin County today supervising the work of a grand jury for that county.

Wayne Burns, district attorney, said that he had nine felony cases to lay before the grand jurors. Seven are DWI second offenses; two are forgeries. One of these also involves a theft count.

Burns estimated it would take all of today to complete hearing on the cases.

He listed the following cases to be laid before the grand jury.

James McNew, forgery and passing and theft over \$50; Lloyd W. Allen, forgery; DWI, second, cases, Margarito Cuelar; Wayne Earl Calhoun, Homer D. VanZandt, T. W. Edwards, Jesse Jere Jones, Weldon Marion Knudson and Albino Rodriguez.

New Deputy On The Job

Sheriff A. N. Standard's new deputy, Leon Ward, formerly of Snyder, has officially begun his duties.

The new officer moved into his residence at Forsan over the weekend and began work today.

Standard had promised the residents of Forsan that a deputy would be located there but until Ward was employed had not been able to fulfill his promise.

Ward, formerly a deputy in Scurry County, has a wife and two sons.

Standard pointed out that he now has a deputy stationed in Coahoma and one in Forsan. Sam Roberts is the Coahoma deputy.

Supreme Court Faces Puzzlers

WASHINGTON (AP) — With tradition-dictated ceremony the Supreme Court opens its new term today — and starts down the road toward what will be its busiest year.

As the nine black-robed justices troop to the bench through parted, long maroon drapes, they already face a record-high docket approaching 1,500 cases.

Included are deeply controversial puzzlers on eavesdropping, privacy, church-state relations, obscenity and civil rights.

But, as is customary, the opening session is brief, with out announcements of any decisions.

Then lawyers are admitted to practice before the Supreme Court — and the justices adjourn to a week-long series of conferences to decide whether they will hear hundreds of appeals filed during the summer.

Next Monday the court will begin handing down its rulings.

BIG QUESTIONS
This is Earl Warren's 14th year as chief justice and the 17th year in court history. Warren is 75.

The associate justices in order of seniority are: Hugo L. Black, 80; William O. Douglas, 68 on Oct. 16; Tom C. Clark, 67; John M. Harlan, 67; William J. Brennan Jr., 60; Potter Stewart, 51; Byron R. White, 49, and Abe Fortas, 56.

The problems they are being asked to weigh this year include: Can the state of Virginia forbid marriage between the races? Can the Iowa Supreme Court take a child from his "Bohemian" father and award him to more "conventional" grandparents?

DEATH PENALTY
Is the death penalty constitutional? Even can a college insist that

students shave their beards and get haircuts? A top attention-getter is Teamsters President James R. Hoffa's appeal from a 1964 jury-tampering conviction. The union leader argues the Justice Department violated his constitutional rights by planting a "spy" within his defense councils.

The eavesdropping question is raised by Fred B. Black Jr., a Washington public relations man whose hotel suite was bugged by the FBI. Convicted of income tax evasion, he is seeking a high court hearing.

The question of privacy recurs in an appeal by Time, Inc., from a \$30,000 damage award. It is based on an article in Life magazine that likened the play, "The Desperate Hours," to the real-life experiences of a family held hostage by three escaped convicts.

CIVIL RIGHTS
On obscenity, the court will decide whether booksellers who claim they were not aware of the contents of allegedly obscene publications may be punished.

Among the civil rights cases before the court is one that asks whether four Episcopal ministers, arrested after trying to integrate a bus depot restaurant in Jackson, Miss., can sue the sentencing judge for damages.

One of the ministers is the Rev. Robert L. Pierson, son-in-law of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York.

And on the church-state front, the court has been asked to take on two Maryland cases that may have historic ramifications. One question whether government funds may be used to help build church-related school buildings; the other whether church property may be exempted from taxation.

He said, "I don't believe they really felt that they could trust the security and fate of this nation in hands that might be impetuous."

Bogus Money Record Set

WASHINGTON (AP) — Counterfeiters turned out record amounts of phoney money last fiscal year and apparently are headed for even higher production marks.

Reporting this today, the Secret Service said in its annual report that it seized a record \$9 million in counterfeit money during the fiscal year which ended last June 30. It said about 90 per cent of the bogus bills were caught before they got into circulation.

The total seized the year before was \$3.36 million.

Experts Blame Feud For Shipping Snag

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — A shipping backlog, cut to near zero only a few months ago, has again become so serious that more than 60 freighters are waiting to be unloaded at this key port, U.S. officials and shipping sources said today.

These experts blamed the situation largely on feuding between the Army, the Agency for International Development and mismanagement.

The situation can be cured only by firm action at a high level in Washington to make

the Army and AID work together, said the sources, who asked to remain anonymous.

The shipping experts urged, among other things, that U.S. contractors with proven performance in the field be given the job of supervising the unloading of vessels bearing war goods and aid material.

Additional port facilities are being built along the river near Saigon, but the new berths may not be ready for months.

Other U.S. authorities acknowledge a bottleneck but at-

tribute it chiefly to the South Vietnamese government's drastic economic reforms they say this resulted in jammed warehouses.

The government and shipping sources said there was practically no backlog of ships in June. Now they said, there are about 50 freighters moored off Vung Tau, near the mouth of the Saigon River, and another dozen anchored and waiting in the river near Saigon.

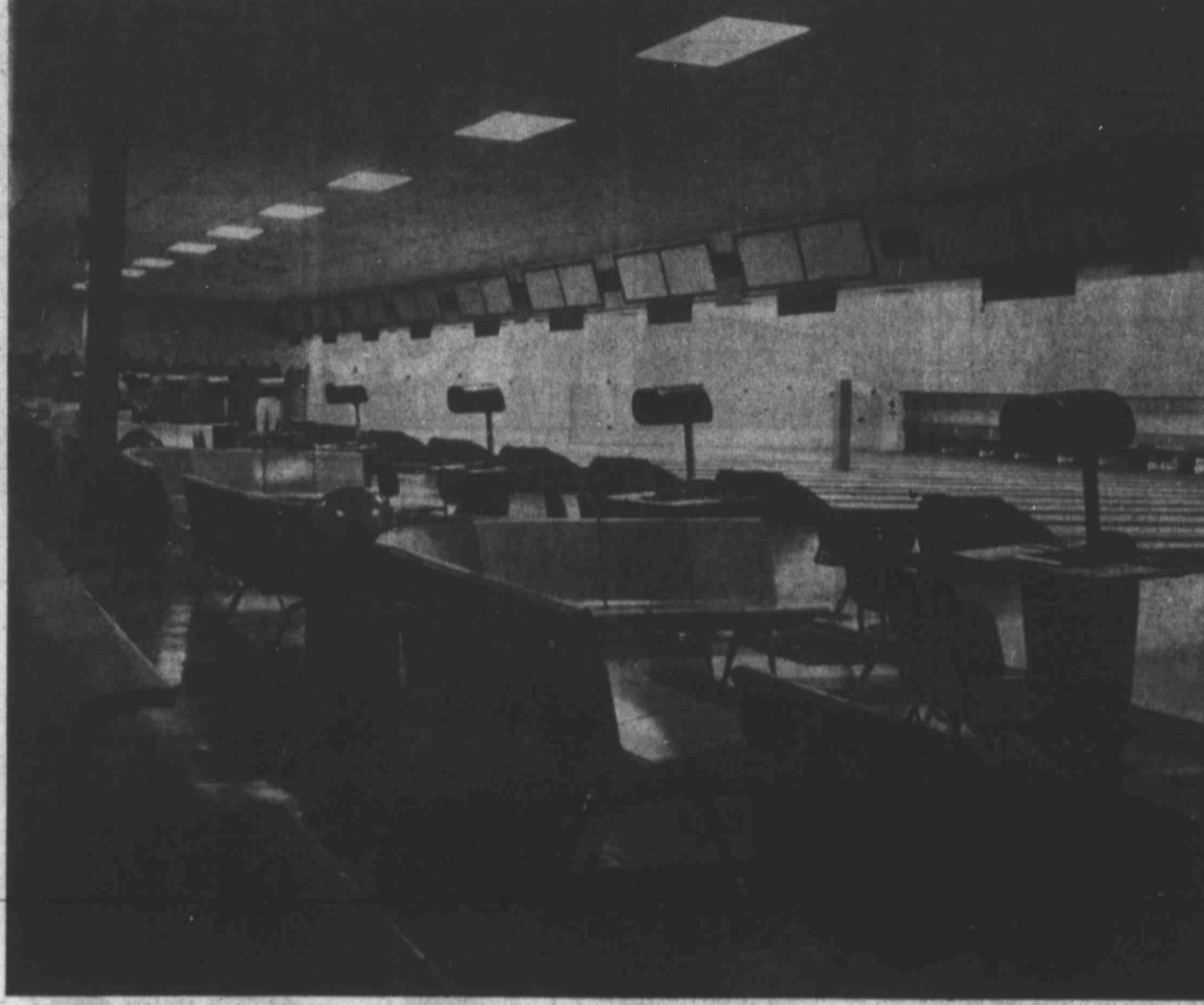

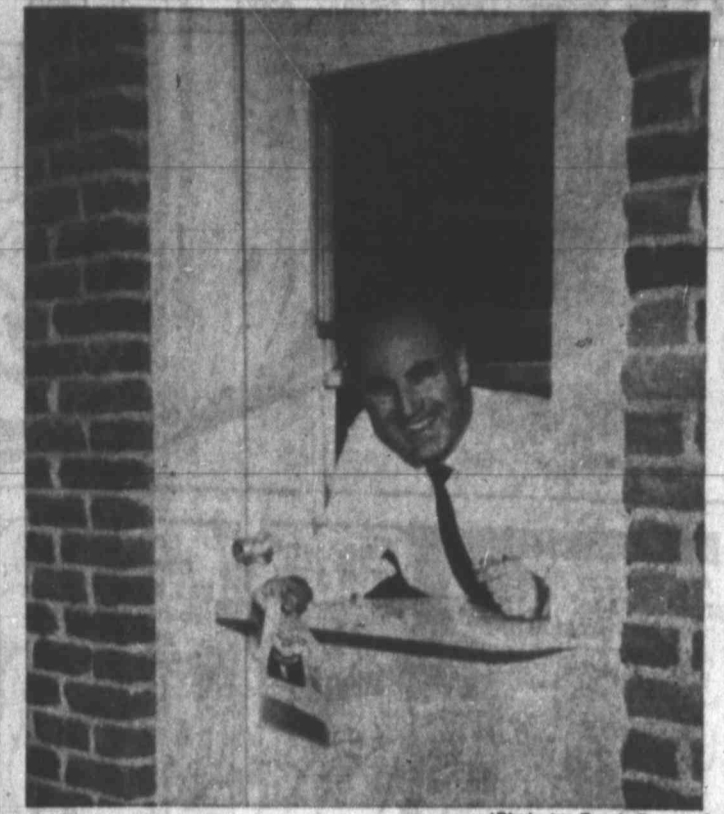

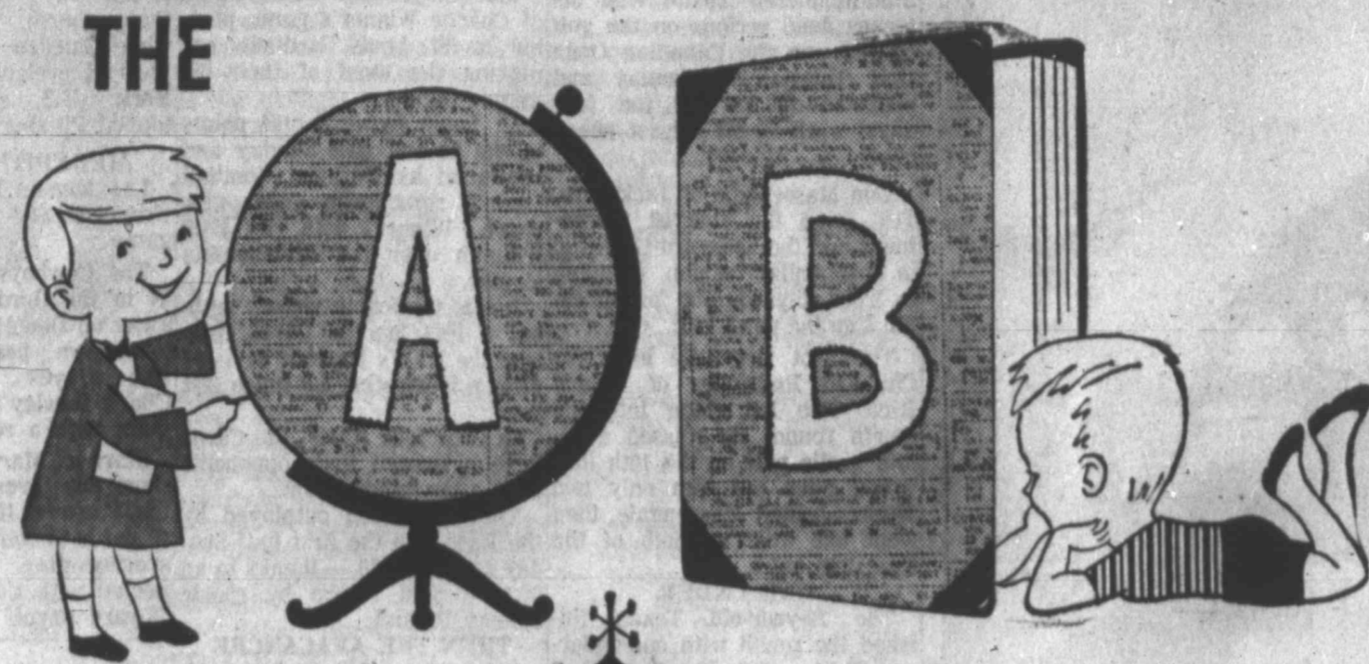

San Francisco Curfew Lifted

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — As the last 1,200 National Guardsmen rolled home Sunday, Mayor John F. Shelley lifted the curfew he imposed during San Francisco's race riots.

The mayor also ended the state of emergency he proclaimed during the Tuesday and Wednesday disturbances.

Next, he said, is a drive to find jobs for unemployed Negroes as a means of preventing future trouble.

Rioting started after Matthew Johnson, 16, a Negro, was shot and killed by a white policeman while fleeing a stolen car. But both city officials and Negro leaders declared the underlying cause was the lack of employment among the city's 80,000 Negroes.

Shelley urged employers to call a special telephone number if they had a job available.

Labor unions, the Chamber of Commerce and other civic groups are working with him, the mayor said, "in a program to find these needed jobs."

Fort Worth Plant Struck

FORT WORTH (AP) — About 650 workers at Menasco Manufacturing Co., which makes aircraft parts, struck at midnight when union employes and management could not agree on wages and working conditions.

Jack H. Read, president of the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers, Local 2121, said the union seeks a three-year contract among other things.

Read said the company is working on projects involved with national defense.

Management submitted what it called its final proposal Sunday morning following about 25 meetings with union officials, Read said. He said union members rejected the proposal by secret ballot and voted to strike today.

Bryant, 27, said he called police after he couldn't get his car started.

Bryant, a twin, said his daughters make it the seventh set of twins for his family. Bryant has a twin brother and his other brother and sister are twins. He has three aunts and a cousin who have twins.

Africa Gets New Nation

MASERU, Basutoland (AP) — Africa gets its second new nation within a week at one minute past midnight tonight as Basutoland, a British enclave surrounded by South Africa, becomes independent Lesotho.

Last Friday Botswana, formerly Bechuanaland, became the first black-ruled country to border white-ruled South Africa.

Independence for Basutoland leaves nearby Swaziland, slated for independence in 1968, and rebellious Rhodesia, the last British territories in Africa. Basutoland has been a British protectorate since 1868.

New School Named For Negro Trooper

WYANDANCH, N.Y. (AP) — The new elementary school of Wyandanch, N.Y., has been named for Milton L. Olive, 18, a Negro paratrooper who died in action last year in Viet Nam.

The 29-room school was named at a ceremony attended by some 600 persons.

Olive was killed when he threw himself on a hand grenade to save four comrades. He was awarded the Medal of Honor last April.

Marines Capture Hill When Viet Cong Vanish

Near The Demilitarized Zone, Viet Nam (AP) — For 11 days U.S. Marines dashed up 30-degree rises along a spiny mountain 5,000 yards south of the demilitarized zone trying to take an elaborate system of bunkers stretching four miles along the ridge.

Artillery, hours of pounding by B52s and other aircraft, and napalm had damaged only small portions of the bunker system, which Marine intelligence officers believe housed at least a battalion guarding key infiltration and supply trails.

Kilo Company of the 3rd Battalion, 4th Marine Regiment was the first to slog up the trail and be hit by withering fire from the bunkers. After two days, Kilo claimed 48 enemy dead.

BUZZING HEAT On Friday, India Company moved up, the lead men hacking through vines and bamboo.

The company crashed through the brush single file. They passed 21 empty bunkers, lying cool under the buzzing heat. The enemy had quietly drawn back, it seemed. In between the bunkers, the North Vietnamese had cut steps in the ground and put up hand rails along the steeper stretches.

After walking four hours, India Company entered a bombed out clearing. The lead man walked past a bunker. The bunker spouted machine-gun fire on the ranks of Marines.

GUNS OPEN UP "I dropped two snipers. I think, with my rifle, then our machine guns opened up. They didn't expect our lead men to have machine guns," said 2nd Lt. Jim Hallman of Bloomfield, N.J.

Hallman kept fighting though shrapnel had torn his right cheek and a bullet had pierced his left ear.

"Another (sniper) jumped out of a spider hole and shot one of my men in the chest and tried to drag the body in with him," said Sgt. Randolph Fascett of Sacramento, Calif.

MORE GRENADES The North Vietnamese threw more grenades and increased the machine-gun fire. India Company withdrew, drawing more fire on its flank from below the ridge. The battalion dug in for the night.

Helicopters could not land in the battalion's hastily blasted landing zone and hauled the wounded up in baskets. Supplies came crashing down 20 feet from the helicopters.

NO WATER There was no water for 24 hours. As dawn broke Saturday, some Marines were slashing bamboo to suck out a precious few ounces of juice.

India Company tried again Saturday afternoon. The company moved single file along a trail and another bunker opened fire.

"I was 10 yards away," said Cpl. Russell Clites of Los Angeles, who was first in the column. "They fired right out of the brush. I couldn't see a thing. The machinegun bullets started walking across the ground toward me. I dove back and started throwing my grenades."

CEASE FIRE Artillery shells and fighter-bombers came over the company and hit the hill. One artillery round fired from the valley below exploded short of the target and wounded four Leathernecks.

A gunnery sergeant leaped up screaming "Get on that radio, Marine, and tell those guns to cease fire! Cease fire! Cease fire!"

He grabbed the radio and repeated the order. India Company again withdrew under fire, carrying its wounded.

Sunday it was Mike Company's turn to try to gain the rise. More artillery and air power worked over the hill until the trees were sparse and black. Still the bunkers were intact.

Mike Company's commander, Capt. Edward Crowell of Lincoln, R.I., inched his men carefully past the bunkers where India Company had been set back the two preceding days.

Crowell's men threw grenades methodically into some bunkers and fired rockets into others.

Mike Company advanced, pouring fire in every direction. They still were unopposed.

Crowell decided on a charge to the top. The Leathernecks tossed grenades, and moved up the hill, yelling encouragement to each other.

CHARGE TO TOP The 100-yard charge was over in five minutes. Not one Marine was injured. The North Vietnamese had disappeared.

The Marines said their battalion's casualties were light. They reported 148 confirmed enemy dead and 265 probably killed in 11 days.

Honolulu Editor Dies; Was Native Of Colorado City

HONOLULU (AP) — Riley H. Allen, a native of Texas who served as editor of the Honolulu Star-Bulletin for 48 years, died Sunday at the age of 82.

Allen suffered a stroke in early September. He was born in Colorado City, Tex., but was reared in Smiths Grove, Ky., and Seattle, Wash. He attended the University of Washington before joining the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

Funeral services will be held in Honolulu.

Gals Exercise Civil Rights

DALLAS (AP) — With the new civil rights for women, it was not too much surprise when detectives reported they had broken up a ring of female burglars.

Police recently reported that the ring of 11 women was responsible for at least 10 burglaries around Dallas, taking loot valued at more than \$3,000.
