ABERFAN, Wales (AP) — Heavy rain fell on this grieving Welsh village Saturday, bring-ing fear that a death-dealing mountain of coal slag might move again and imperil nearly 2,000 exhausted rescue workers toiling in the ruins of a buried

Police said the death toll in this greatest tragedy of modern Wales may rise to 220 - most of the victims the young children

As the dreaded rain began pouring down on the vast heap of coal mine refuse still menacing the village, workers report-ed 130 bodies — nearly all chil-dren from 7 to 11 — had been recovered from the wreck of Panteglas School.



#### Some Worthwhile Amendments

Texas voters on Nov. 8 will be treated to one of their big biennial headaches. This is the matter of trying to come to an intelligent decision on multiple constitutional amendments.

On this voting day, your big ballot will contain no less than 66 proposals to amend the state's antiquated constitution. There are those of us who hold that it is past time for Texas to call a constitutional convention and write a new charter of government; but this bold action is not yet in sight, and the next best thing is to try to fathom which amendments are worthwhile and which are not.

The proposals this year are almost beyond intelligent interpretation, even by the experts. The Herald does not profess to say that all the amendments are bad, but it is not in a position to recommend passage of all. However, there are at least four which we believe should be support-

NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT - Would authorize the Legislature to pass statutes enabling counties (or groups of counties) to set up airport authorities, if the voters of the counties involved were to approve. It could very likely be that this is just the machinery Howard County will need to expand its own airport, and local people should give this amendment support.

This doesn't mean the creation of an airport authority. It does mean that the county could have one if its people so decreed by ballot. NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT - Calling

for elimination of the poll tax and setting up an annual registration of voters. Of course, the poll tax is gone, by federal court decree. The seal issue in this amendment is to set up registering machinery annually, so that

the way is opened to no periodic check on voter registration, then you really can expect in a few years to see the names off tombstones being voted by unethical groups. We already have witnessed, in the big cities, much false registration. Without reasonable certification, we are in for every kind of election abuse the mind of

NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT - This provides for more bond money for use by the state Water Development Board, and new areas of water development in which this money can be spent. These funds would be re-

There is no question but that water is the No. 1 problem in Texas: saving what we have, helping areas where there is a shortage, mapping an over-all program that will permit all sections of the state to grow. They will never grow much more without assurance of water. We believe the water development program ought to have

full support.
NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT—This is another voting change, and it would lift the long-time discrimination against the rights of servicemen to vote. Texas has had such a ban since in its first days, when it seems that troops garrisoned in the state were regarded as mercenaries and not fit to

Today, there are literally thousands of top-notch citizens in uniform who cannot express themselves at the ballot box. They deserve this right, along with the rest of us, and ought to have

There are a dozen other amend-ments, some of which you may have a personal interest in. The main point is to be sure to vote on Nov. 8, and qualified people will be properly certified as to voting qualifications.

If Texas lets this one slip by, and for Nos. 2, 7, 11 and 14.



The Weather-And Many Other Things

To those of us who long to cling to the eternal verities in a fastchanging world, even a small token from the past is stimulating.

And so it is that I express my pleasure at having received—as for so long at this time of year—the latest edition of the Old Farmer's Almanac. As the publisher himself admits, the number of farmers is decreasing, so as of now he regards a farmer as anyone who has a garden, livestock, or even a lawn.

IT'S NOT that most of us need to know the planting tables or the gestation periods of animals any more, but there are interludes of interest and delight in the 148 pages packed into the little book which is offering its 175th edition. It claims to be the oldest continuously published periodi-cal in America, founded in 1792 while G. Washington was president.

A lot of things, I take it, haven't changed since then. I mean the listing of forthcoming eclipses of the sun and the moon, the tides, the dissertation on the planets and the stars, the nights of full moon, the zodiac read-

YOU CAN STILL get your planting tables, and the dates of killing frosts; sportsmen can learn of the best fishing days; housewives can pick up suggestions of menus and recipes; the youngsters can find some pages of charades and puzzles.

One would sort of get the feeling, from reading the Old Farmer's 'Almanac, that life is much the same as it was generations ago. But even OFA concedes that we are in the Atomic Year 23. And it pays heed with four or five pages to the scientific advancements of the past decade or so—to such things as Lasers, guided missiles, air cushion vehicles, and something called "quasars" (for

quasi-stellar objects) a new class of

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celestial matter.

BUT THIS is a little sophisticated for Old Almanac readers. More appealing is an advertisement that shouts, "Franklin Stoves are IN." And, among the ballads, "Over the Hill to the Poorhouse."

In the last analysis, OFA is used as a prognosticator of the weather, as presented by Abe Weatherwise. He claims he did pretty well last year, with his day-to-day forecasts running 63.9 per cent correct. He confesses, however, that he missed on his prediction of precipitation.

IN TIMES past, OFA's weather has largely been that for New England. This year, the publication has taken it by various zones. For the southern states, he says:

"There will not be, in 1967, the freezing threats experienced in the last two winters. Temperature on the whole will be 'normal.' "

If that's not satisfactory, there's this piece of intelligence:

"MANY BLOSSOMS on plum trees in the spring, heavy fruit crops in the fall, oak (and other) leaves remaining on trees in December indicate a severe Winter is coming up. The thickness of fur on most animals, goose bones, pigs' melts, distance be-tween caterpillar stripes are winter predictors. Birds, particularly owls, pileated woodpeckers and swallows are predictors-as, of course, is the woodchuck. When hornets build nests high off the ground, expect deep snows. Bees, spiders and ants-as well as certain flowers-are useful as short-term predictors. Nature on the whole, however, is not easily understood and bird and animals, who should know, are often as midled by her as is mankind."

So, what's the weather going to be?

#### David Lawrence Wrath Against The Party In Power

WASHINGTON - Fifty-four per cent of the adults in the United States do not know the name of the congressman from their own district. A Gallup Poll taken a month ago shows that the percentage of the uninformed now is identical with what was recorded in 1942.

This means that the citizens are more likely to vote for or against a party in power, rather than the individual. They will do the same thing in the November elections this year. While some able men in both parties who deserve re-election will feated, basically the principle is sound. It fixes responsibility on the party which has had a majority in both houses of Congress but has failed Yet Americans have more to adopt the measures that the people

> AGAIN AND again the two-thirds majority which the Democrats have had in the Senate and in the House of Representatives for the past two years has been broken down by a coalition of members from both parties who perceived the will of the people as different from the policies recommended by the administration.

A spirit of protest is manifested even by some newspapers which have supported the Democratic party in the past. The New York Times, for instance, which came out in favor of the election of Lyndon Johnson in 1964, had an editorial on Tuesday of this week taking issue with some of the most important pronouncements by the administration on economic conditions in the country. It read in

"INFLATION is no longer a future threat. It is here now.

"The President and his advisers may be convinced that the economy is in good shape and will get better. But a likelier prospect is that the expansion will become even more distorted and unstable

"Continued inflation, if labor presses for wage rises to compensate for increases in the cost of living, could accompany rising unemployment, especially a m o n g those who lack

"THE NOTION of employing tax policy to keep the economy from getting out of hand is sound. But timing is vital. This newspaper recommend-ed just such a policy early this year, when inflationary forces first began making themselves felt. At that time the administration professed to see no real danger. Only now, only belatedly, tax policy is being employ-

The electorate today is dealing with the effects of a series of inflationary factors which have been allowed to grow in the last two years. It's not difficult to produce a boom, but it's hard to check the excesses that the boom generates. The problem is complicated for an administration that is afraid to propose a tax increase just before a congressional election. Yet if measures of this kind had been enacted early this year, they might have brought stability and started a recovery which would have diminished the protest vote.

INSTEAD, dissatisfaction is being even more vehemently expressed. A housewives' revolt against high prices, which started in Denver, has spread to Nebraska, Florida, Oregon, California, Texas and other parts of the country. Boycotts of supermarkets are being urged. The stores say they can't roll back prices, as their own

costs are rising, too.

All this will be reflected in the results of the coming election. The voters will vent their wrath on a party label. But perhaps the politicians will involuntarily acquire a new respect for the importance of party responsibility and the need for the chief executive to join more closely with the legislative branch in the making of national policies that really express the will of the people. ### Marquis Childs Too Optimistic Words Have Peril

WITH PRESIDENT JOHNSON IN THE PACIFIC - Of the No. 1 in this troupe there can be no question. The President of the United States on tour, whether in Hawaii or New Zealand, is on stage 24 hours a day. Nor of the No. 2 can there be much oubt. Mrs. Johnson with her unfailing warmth, her graciousness and the reputation she has won for conservation and the advancement of beauty in the environment is an unfailing counterpoise to the ceaseless movement of her husband.

THESE ARE the principals in the public view. A No. 3 at the level just below might well be Walt Whitman Rostow, the President's adviser on security affairs. While he is never seen, it is hardly stretching a point to say that he is frequently heard.

Insofar as this journey around the Pacific has a serious content other than the promotion of goodwill, it is supplied by Rostow. He is a brilliant theoretician with an extensive grounding in China and Asian policy in general. His principal work in economics has had to do with the underdeoped countries and the takeoff point when with sufficient infusion of outside aid they begin to increase production at a rate hitherto considered

BUT, AS important as Rostow's inellectual contribution is his temperament, which in a striking way com-plements that of the President. Rostow is a practicing optimist. His unfailing, and many would say uncritical, conviction that America is following the right course in Asia reinforces the President's own zeal.

It would be an oversimplification to say that what the President proposes as he moves from country to country is a Marshall Plan for Asia. But that is what many Asians draw from the words of hope and cheer.

The speech that he delivered at the East-West Center in Honolulu had the unmistakable stamp of Rostow. The President talked about the International Education Act, which he said he would sign in the course of his Pacific journey. He announced that he was directing Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare John Gardner to begin work immediately to establish in his department a new center for educational cooperation which is to advance the aims of the act. And, on top of this, the President proposed a world conference on education to be held in 1967.

ALL THIS is splendid and in the melting pot-the true melting pot of Asian peoples-in Hawaii it seems

But whether these high aims have any relevance to the great impoverished masses of Asia is questionable This is where equating Europe and the postwar American effort that renewed that continent with the vastly different circumstances of Asia seems a distortion of history. As critics of American policy in Viet Nam have said, it is also a distortion to apply the terms "Munich" and "appeaser to those who say that the United States is dangerously overcommitted in a part of the world where poverty, disease and incipient revolution are


