**TWO-WAY PRESSURE**

**FCC Searching For Air Room**

WASHINGTON (AP) —The Federal Communications Commission is searching for more broadcast room as everyone from Uncle Sam to commercial television producers, taxi drivers and mobile restaurant owners flood the air waves.

The FCC feels the biggest pressure for a spot on the communications dial now is the fast growing land mobile radio service, uses of two-way radios.

Some feel the government may have to turn to television's Ultra High Frequency channels to find the room for expansion as more and more governmental agencies and private firms reach for a microphone.

**PORTABLE PIZZA**

Land mobile service includes fire and police departments, the military and public service companies whose need for quick communications is obvious.

Less apparent is the need to equip city garbage trucks with two-way radios and radio-dispatched portable pizza and enchilada parlors. But they are there nonetheless. Even the Archdiocese of New York has a radio setup.

A segment of the FCC says that the only available space for these services is now currently occupied by the government and

commercial UHF television channels 14 through 83.

There apparently is little chance the FCC will be able to free the government-held frequencies. The Defense Department has most of them and contends they are needed for military matters.

**PAINFUL**

That leaves only the UHF channels and, even though they are sparsely populated with television stations, any decision to allocate them—even if it's only two or three channels—for the two-way radio users would be painful to the FCC. The commission for years has been trying with some success to develop them for commercial and educational use.

Since World War II the land mobile radio service has grown from practically nothing until today there are more than 230,000 authorizations for such systems in the United States of these, 155,000 are for business.

Users of these mobile radio systems have been complaining that their channels are so crowded that base station interference is blotting out communications.

Nobody doubts that the UHF television spectrum is sparsely settled. Nationwide there are 121 stations on the 70 channels available while 495 stations are crowded on the 12 Very High Frequency channels—2 through 13.

But the FCC has not wanted to cut down the number of UHF channels available for future expansion.

A blind spot, induced by his opponent's preemptive opening bid, led to South's downfall in his four-spade contract.

West's three-heart call on a jack-high suit was distinctly off center; however, it did serve to give North a problem. He finally chose to double, despite his even distribution and lack of support for the other major suit, spades. South promptly resolved matters by jumping to four spades. His suit was self-sustaining, and inasmuch as North had forced him to bid at the level of three, he expected his partner to put down a strong hand.

West opened the three of clubs and the ace was played from dummy. A spade was led and when East followed

with the four, South put in the ten which won the trick. A heart was returned and declarer finessed North's queen. East was in with the king and led a club which his partner ruffed. West returned the jack of hearts and East trumped away the dummy's ace. West was out of spades and therefore could not ruff the next club; however, South still had to lose two diamonds and he ended up with a 200-point deficit on the deal.

Declarer's timing was faulty. Once the spade finesse succeeded, his contract was virtually assured, provided that he concentrated his full attention on drawing trump. It is suggested that when the heart is led, South should refuse to finesse, and instead, go up with North's ace in order to lead another spade to his jack.

When both opponents follow to the second round of spades, South cashes the ace to draw the last trump. The fall of the king of hearts under the ace serves to provide declarer with his 10th trick without any further effort on South's part; however, it is not actually essential to his success.

Observe that declarer can always establish a second trick in hearts by leading toward North's queen after the ace has been cashed, inasmuch as West must play before the dummy. In other words, if West has the king of hearts, the defense can take at most one heart and two diamonds, since South has a discard established for his fourth club on dummy's queen of hearts.

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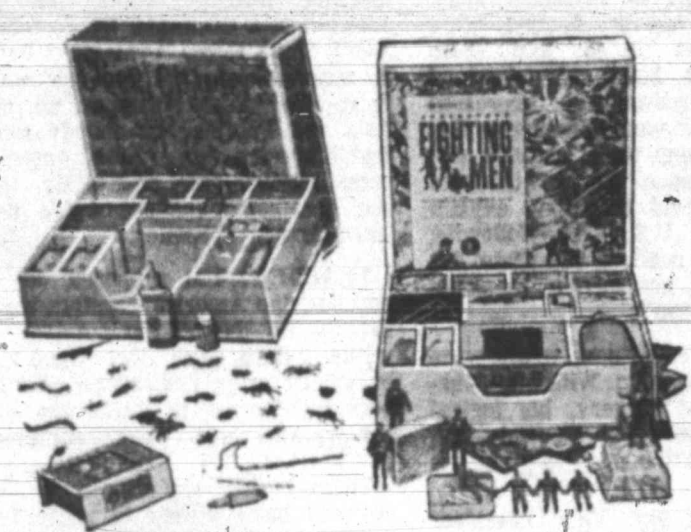

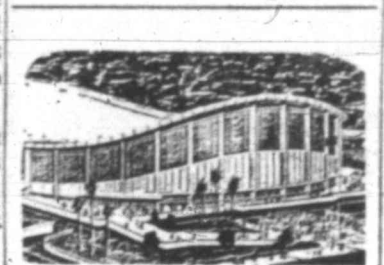
Featured speaker will be Ben Barnes, speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

AUSTIN (AP) — Janice Rose Teague, who doctors hoped would be the smallest baby born to survive, died Thursday, almost 2 1/2 months after her premature birth.

The infant, daughter of a 20-year-old laborer and his wife, weighed only 2 1/4 ounces when she was born Aug. 30 but had gained to 37 ounces when she died. A hospital spokesman said "She just suddenly quit breathing."

The infant had lived in an isolette, a cabinet with controlled temperature and humidity.

# Nippy Weather Eases Its Bite

Nippy weather eased its bite in northern areas of Texas today and it was almost balmy again in the central and southern sections.

Temperatures at the colder spots generally were eight to 10 degrees higher than Thursday's lows, ranging down to 26 at Perryton, 32 at Dalhart and 37 at Amarillo—all in the Panhandle—before dawn.

Weather Bureau observers reported a new cold front still was headed southward but probably would not reach the state before midnight. It was expected to chill the northern half of Texas again by Saturday but to have little effect elsewhere.

Outside the cool belt a number of places had readings in the 60s and 70s near daylight, with Brownsville the warmest at 73.

Scattered showers pelted Southeast Texas and light rain fell around Houston during the night. It was foggy at Galveston.

Forecasts called for occasional showers again Saturday in parts of Southeast and South Central Texas. No moisture was predicted in other sections.

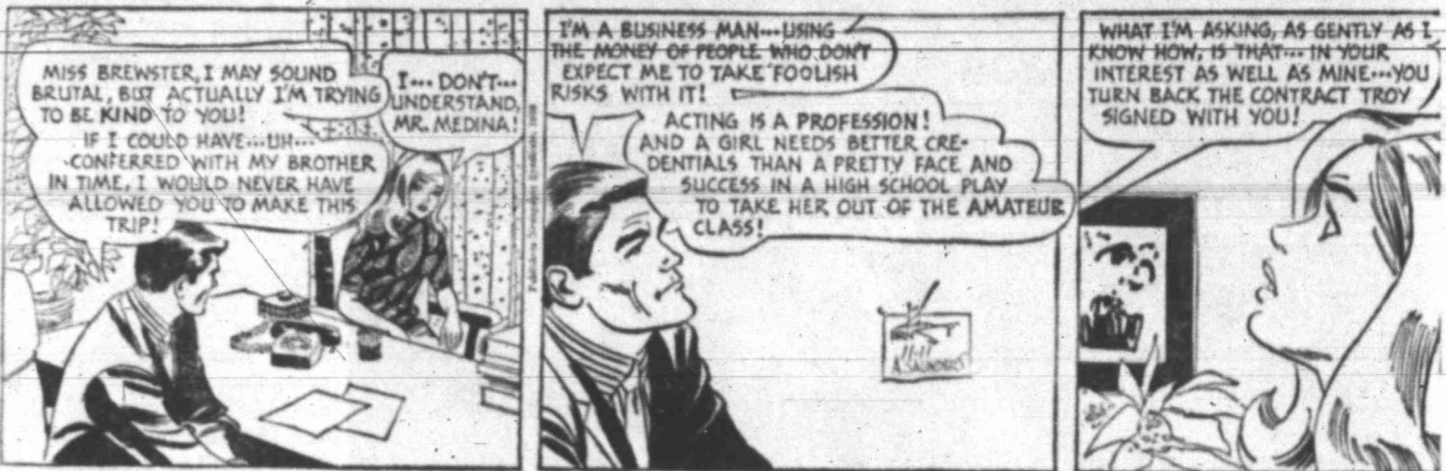

kind of eyesore and inconvenience (the dogs!) on their neighbors. The lawyer's fee could be split up among the offended neighbors, and might be well worth it.

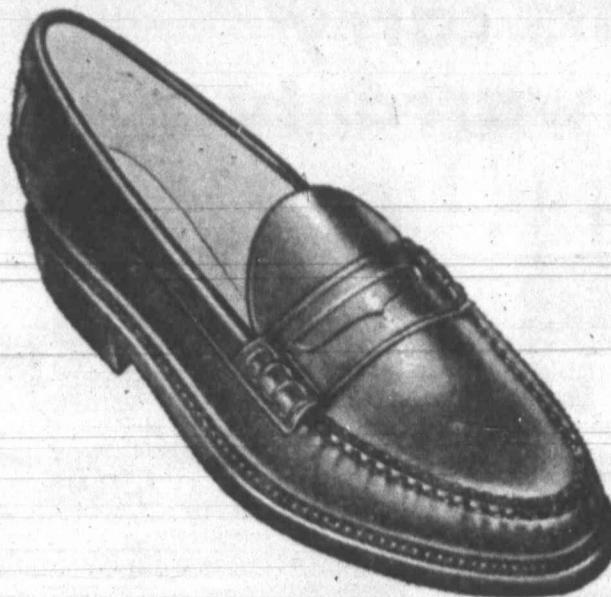
DEAR ABBY: If baby-sitters ever form a union, these rules should be included:
