Plane With 19 Aboard Vanishes In Atlantic

Radar Patrol Craft Search Is Under Way

Mass. (AP) -An Air Force Constellation with 19 men aboard is missing today and presumed to have crashed in the Atlantic some 125 miles east of Cape Cod.

The four engine EC121H, a radar patrol plane out of Otis, vanished from radar screens early this morning while on a routine air defense mission. Officials said there was no

indication the plane was in trouble when contact was lost. First word of a possible crash came by radio from a small fishing

A massive search was organized immediately after the fishing vessel reported seeing a plane hurtle through the fog into the rough seas.

Rescue planes from Labrador and Bermuda and other Atlantic bases swarmed over the area, seeking the lost craft. Coast Guard cutters, fishing vessels and merchant ships joined in the hunt. The searchers reported an oil

slick and unidentified debris in the area where the plane was said to have crashed. Identity of the 19 men aboard

the Constellation was withheld by the Air Force pending notification of next of kin.



West's three-heart call on a jack-high suit was distinctly off center; however, it did serve to give North a problem. He finally chose to double, despite his even distribution and lack of support for the other major suit, spades. South promptly resolved matters by jumping to four spades. His suit was selfsustaining, and inasmuch as North had forced him to bid at the level of three, he expected his partner to put down a strong hand.

West opened the three of clubs and the ace was played from dummy. A spade was led and when East followed with the four, South put in the ten which won the trick. A heart was returned and declarer finessed North's queen. East was in with the king and led a club which his partner ruffed. West returned the jack of hearts and East trumped away the dummy's ace. West was out of spades and therefore could not ruff the next club; however, South still had to lose two diamonds and he ended up with a 200-

point deficit on the deal. Declarer's timing was faulty. Once the spade finesse succeeded, his contract was virtually assured, provided that he concentrated his full attention on drawing trump. It is suggested that when the heart is led. South should refuse to finesse, and instead, go up with North's ace in

to his jack. When both opponents follow to the second round of spades, South cashes the ace to draw the last trump. The fall of the king of hearts under the ace serves to provide declarer with his 10th trick without any further effort on South's part; however, it is not actually essential to his success.







When it comes to state aid, exceptionally low for Texas' growing and financially hard-pressed cities, every little bit helps. Consequently, it is welcome news that the Texas Highway Commission has decided that the state will assume a substantial part of the maintenance cost of state highways and expressways running through cities

It was not until after World War II, with the inception of federal aid to highway development, that Texas began to assume the cost of construction of highways within city limits. That trend has now progressed to the point where the state pays for most of the construction costs and much of the right-of-way cost, though not utility relocation costs, for highway

routes in the cities. In Texas, state aid to the cities is 'driving to cover such "aid."

For the cities themselves simply do not have the financial resources demanded for necessary public works and services for their burgeoning popula-

The Election And Viet Nam

the world, particularly in the foreign offices, the experts are analyzing today their reports on the election results in the United States, trying to determine just what impact the voting for Congress may have now on the policy the United States will follow with respect to the Viet Nam war.

FAMILIAR AS most of the governments abroad are with the importance of an election involving the members of a national legislature, many offi cials in other countries do not realize that an American president retains all of his power irrespective of what majority is held in Congress either by his own or a rival party. Thus, President Eisenhower served six out of his eight years with the opposition party. in control of both houses.

The big majority given President Johnson when he was elected in 1964 was in the nature of a landslide, and it is natural for the incumbent party to lose some seats in an election held in the mid-term of a president. There will be observers in Europe and Asia, accustomed to parliamentary systems, who will construe the reduction in the Democratic party's majority as a trend toward "a vote of lack of confidence." But this appraisal does not take into account the domestic issues which could also have brought about a smaller margin.

WASHINGTON-In capitals all over United States on the Viet Nam war can hardly be measured by examin- possible embarrassment later. ing the election results this week. For there were many Republicans who during the campaign endorsed the administration's policy in Viet Nam, and there were some in the President's two obvious questions: own party who disagreed with it. Unquestionably a majority of the people feel that, when the United States is at war, the fullest support should be given to the President in the conduct of the military operations. The Viet Nam war has produced considerable controversy, but there is only a small minority of the voters who would favor retreat or surrender.

On the whole, most people in America believe that the President is seeking an honorable peace and should continue the war till this is achieved.

FOREIGN GOVERNMENTS, therefore, would be making a mistake to construe the election result as in any way a repudiation of the President's policies in Viet Nam. The chances are that now the President will feel free to make a concentrated effort to settle the war or else to intensify military activity in the hope of forcing the enemy to the peace table. Certainly with the election out of the way, administration has a more flexible hand, and it will not hesitate to take the course which most Americans are demanding —an attainment of the main objectives so that South Viet Nam will not be again the victim of aggression.

The United States will, of course, insist upon an international guarantee that, if American troops are withdrawn, there will be no repetition of the invasion or infiltration from the north by the Communists. It would not be surprising if mediation efforts by foreign governments which have been neutral in the Viet Nam situation would become more pronounced in the

THE COMMUNISTS know that the United States does not intend to do anything that might cause it to lose prestige throughout the world. A settlement has to be achieved that protects South Viet Nam and makes possible a withdrawal of troops by the United States. There is a difference of opinion as to what kind of guarantees can be given so that the sacrifices made by American forces will not have been in vain. The controversy over just how the South Vietnamese shall be safeguarded is complicated by the absence of some central authority like the United Nations to set up a system of guarantees.

WHILE THE KOREAN situation has never been entirely solved, peace has been maintained through the auspices of the United Nations, and it would not be surprising if a similar mechanism were agreed upon to settle the Viet Nam war. But with political campaigning in recess for another two years, the President now can make plans either for a peace conference or for an escalated war-in Viet Nam. The decision turns on what the Communists decide about entering into peace negotiations. The American people will be behind their President even if there ensues a prolonged war.

The 'American System'

WASHINGTON - President Johnson noted at his pre-election press conference that "in the past, some foreign nations have misunderstood the American system," and expressed the hope that it wouldn't happen this time. Instructions were instantly dispatched to Peace Corps teachers around the world that they explain politics in the U.S.A. The following transcript has reached the State Department from our men in the "Republic of Ugastan":

TEACHER: I will now analyze the post-election situation. With Mr. Johnson undergoing surgery, his logical successor, Senator-Bob Kennedy, has assumed a position of readiness

Pupil: Book say Vice President Humphrey is man most likely to succeed. You say Senator Kennedy.

Teacher: You uneducated, underprivileged foreigners can't seem to get the real facts through your thick skulls. The next election is in 1968, and Bob Kennedy logically moves closer to the White House whenever LBJ has an illness. The most important feature of the recent election was not who won or lost, but the unexpected need for Mr. Johnson to go under the knife.

Explain why it is wrong for Mr. Nixon to be a "chronic campaigner" every other October for the Republicans, but why it's all right for Mr. Johnson to be the same thing for the Democrats

Teacher: All I can say is what the President told his press conference. You foreigners just don't understand the American system.

Marquis Childs Has An Era Come To An End?

WASHINGTON - In the big-city states where they must win presidential elections the Democrats are in sad disarray. This says more about 1968 in the aftermath of the Congressional election than anything that happened in that rather confused and uncertain exercise of the franchise.

MAYOR RICHARD J. Daley can only survey the ruins of his oncepowerful organization and wonder whether not only his own future but the future of his party in Illinois holds any promise. White backlash, the uproar of demonstrations and counter-demonstrations, or merely a surfeit of the too-familiar past, an era has come to an end.

The story of disaffection and discontent, bickering and backbiting within party ranks, is similar in one form or another in New York, Michigan, California, Ohio and Pennsylvania. The Republicans are taking over in those states and a question mark on the horizon casts a long

A YEAR OR more ago serious political observers were suggesting that Lyndon Johnson might not run for reelection to a second full term. He would find a way-possibly in the drain on his health of another four years in the Presidency-to withdraw. This possibility cannot be idly dismissed with the party structure cracking up and with the prospect ahead of two years of contention with a Congress dominated by a Republican-Southern Democrat coalition. Johnson is unaccustomed to that kind of adversity. With the Northern cities shifting al-

legiance the election showed another aspect ominous for Democratic prospects two years hence. The South is n revolt. This is not merely opposition to integration as ordered from Washington. There is confirmation for the reports of a widespread hatred of the President as the fountainhead of all the evils of a troubled time.

EVERY DEMOCRAT returned Congress will be under compulsion with '68 ahead to prove a bigger foe than the next man of whatever the White House wants. The focal point for the South's opposition will be George Wallace of Alabama, a zealot thirsting for revenge not alone on the political establishment of the North, Republican as well as Democratic, but on the whole apparatus of power with special emphasis on the mass media of press and television. He can count on being generously supplied with funds by rich ultra-conservatives who see him as the instrument to balk the Great Society.

Checking the rot in the Democratic structure in the Northern cities is a arge order. The President has shown little aptitude for that kind of task. One reason is his obsession for keeping all the controls in his own hands. foreclosing all options, making all the decisions. The Democratic National Committee has been reduced to a pale skeleton that scarcely performs even the routine functions of political liai-

IN THE big-city states factional infighting makes even a show of unity all but impossible. California is a prime example. Amateur Machiavellis, contending for power, looked on as the unhappy Pat Brown tried to keep afloat in a sea of troubles. Jesse Unruh, the speaker of the house, seemed to be acting on the assumption that it was just as well to let Ronald Reagan come in and then in the wake of the Reagan blundering in Sacramento a new wave of Democrats, led by Unruh, would be restored. This ignores the powerful men who furnished Reagan the advertising knowhow for his successful campaign and who will now be masterminding his

This is in part at least the psychology of the Kennedys and their devoted followers. Forming a sort of government-in-exile they plan for the day when the "rightful ruler" will be restored to power. The prescription is for personal popularity, youth, the glamour of a name.

WITH THE primary importance of television that may be enough. But, given the shift to the right, there is no guarantee it will be. As a contender for the hatred of the South Sen. Robert F.
