Franco Seeks Laws To End Dictatorship

MADRID, Spain (AP) - Gen. Francisco Franco proposed new laws today to bring a modified form of democracy to Spain after 27 years of dictatorship.

He asked the nation in an address to Parliament to approve changes in the national organic laws that would provide for a premier and a chief of state. He now holds both posts.

Franco also proposed an increase in the membership of the Cortes-Parliament-by the inclusion of 100 members directly elected by Spanish heads of family. The laws would give a broadening of representation in other official bodies.

"A real democracy cannot be merely formalistic," Franco told the Cortes. "It requires moral and material elevation and true citizenship.

Clamor For Colleges

Among the many pressures on the Legislature when it convenes in January will be those from two-year college districts seeking a four-year sta-

Already Odessa Junior College is renewing its campaign in this direction, and last week trustees at Del Mar College in Corpus Christi gave their blessing to a similar move. Before the Legislature convenes, it is safe to say several others will be knocking at the door.

Perhaps there should be more fouryear colleges in the state, although there is no particular shortage at the moment. The state's scholastic population, swollen by the post-war baby room, is due to hit the college level a major blow next autumn. By 1968-70 the Korean War baby population surge will be gravitating to the

Obviously, these young people will have to have some place to go, but it does not necessarily follow that the new four-year sschools have to set up to accommodate them.

Probaby the commission on higher education will have some pertinent recommendations to make on this point. There is a feeling in some parts that where four year colleges are needed, perhaps they should be started from scratch regardless of whether a two-year institution exists in that place. The implication is that the two-year college would be kept intact to serve its perculiar needs. And it may be at this level that the bulk of the big increase will

Right Of Criticism

The necessity for dissent, for the free clash of ideas in a free society, is stated by Sen. J. William Fulbright in the November issue of Redbook. He reminds us that now, as in the past, "the most valuable citizen and the most valuable public servant is the one who gives a higher loyalty to his country's ideals than to its current policy, and who therefore is willing to criticize as well as to

Fulbright has had a special problem of his own. As chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee he appears to have a political obligation to support the administration. Instead, he has taken a lonely road with a handful of other senators and criticized this government's involvement in Viet Nam and in the Dominican Republic. He has been accused of igorance at best; treason at

This public reaction should disturb all thinking Americans. Even if it is called a "war," responsible criticism need not be stifled unnecessarily. It is well to remember that Abraham Lincoln as a representative condemned the Mexican war as unnecessary and unconstitutionally begun by President Polk. When accused of treason because he made the same criticism the Unitarian minister Theodore Parker replied: "Why, if people cannot discuss the war they have got to fight and pay for, who under heaven can? Whose business is it, if it is not yours and mine? If my country is in the wrong, and I know it, and hold my peace, then I am guilty of treason, moral treason.'

Events may prove that the criticism was good or bad. No matter, as long as it is permitted as one of the fundamental attributes of a free society.

Fulbright put it this way in his conclusion: "Criticism is more than a right; it is an act of patriotism - a higher form of patriotism, I believe. than the familiar rituals of national adulation. All of us have the responsibility to act upon this higher patriotism, which is to love our country less for what it is than for what we would like it to be."

The Diogenes Awards, 1966

WASHINGTON - Any post-election period is a good time to give the Diogenes Awards for Honesty, This year's top prize would have to go to "The Machinist," a labor weekly published by the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace workers (IAM).

SCORNING all morning-after alibis and any limp lies about a hidden moral victory, "The Machinist" titled its featured post-election yarn: "New 90th Congress Looks Cold to Labor." It unflinchingly predicted that the conservative coalition of the new Congress will attempt to: outlaw the union shop; pass anti-labor, anti-trust legislation; curtail the right to strike against public convenience; sock low and middle income groups with new taxation; cut back medicare, minimum wage and maintain Section 14-B.

SOMEWHAT DOWN the forthright ness scale was Sen. Bob Kennedy. Beaten back by the defeats in six out of ten Senate races which he contested; and seven out of ten gubernatorial races, Bob released figures which showed him looking better in the House campaigns. Here he had campaigned for 61 candidates and raised his average by getting 42 winners. But he listed as winners such entrenched Democrats as Edith Green (Ore.), Frank Thompson (N. J.), John Moss (Calif.) and Melvin Price (Ill.), who hardly needed his endorsement.

TO KENNEDY'S credit, he did help to bring back such of his personal followers as John Culver (Iowa), Tom Foley and Brock Adams (Wash.). A New York Times story, summing up Bob's two years as a senator, raises the question of whether the senator really meant to help Frank O'Connor,

the gubernatorial loser, or whether Bob has been busy at gathering disciples of his own.

Bob was franker about the future than about the immediate past. No "D" Award for RFK.

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THE RIPON SOCIETY (Liberal Republican) spoiled its chances for a Diogenes prize by distorting its report to fit its prejudices. It dubbed Viet Nam as "the silent issue of 1966," although President Johnson's pre - election snarling at Richard Nixon on the Manila Conference was audible around the country and the world. The Riponese ient featured Robert Finch's win for lieutenant governor in California over Reagan's defeat of Gov. Pat Brown, calling Reagan's campaign 'noncommittal and non-ideological." The Ripon report accentuated the negative by showing that many GOP seats lost in 1964 "were not picked and that conservatism and 'Goldwaterism' hardly mattered at all. Too devious for an honesty award

AN HONORABLE mention goes to Human Events" (conservative). This lively weekly blazoned its front page with pictures of its frankly-acclaimed favorites: Reagan, Tower, Curtis (Neb.), Hansen and Kirk. But it also noted several "firsts" that went against its editorial policy: the election of a woman governor over Martin (Ala.), and the victory of the Negro Brooke, a Republican but not a ull-blooded conservative.

For unrelenting honesty, the machinists came first, with rightism and conservatism finishing ahead of quibbling Republicanism and Left-of-Johnson Liberalism. (Distributed by McNaught Syndicate, Inc.)

Marquis Childs The Burden On Secretary Rusk

WASHINGTON - Six years and 652 478 miles after that first meeting in Palm Beach with young Presidentelect John F. Kennedy Dean Rusk is still Secretary of State. The enduring qualities he has shown are loyalty, stamina, caution, modesty and a stubborn hold on what he believes to be the fundamentals of America's position of power in the world.

RUSK HAS been the victim-or the beneficiary, depending on the viewpoint-of peripatetic diplomacy in the pattern set by the late John Foster Dulles. He has long since passed the Dulles' record of 559,988 miles. And President Johnson is about to send him on still another tour of a large segment of the globe.

Early next month Rusk will swing around Asia. While the itinerary has not been finally determined he will go not only to several of the countries that participated in the Manila conference but others as well, including at the start, Japan.

MOVEMENT, to some critics it appears to be movement for the sake of movement, is becoming a dominant objective with the President himself. Shortly after his return from his Asian tour he called United Nations Ambassador Arthur Goldberg to the ranch in Texas for consultation. He urged Goldberg to start off within a day or two for several Western European capitals to present at the highest level the American stand in opposition to a new bombing pause that would leave the Communists free to prosecute their war without him-

nevertheless true that the office tends. to be a thankless one. The Secretaryof State is the target for attacks that critics-hesitate to aim at the President. He is, in short, a kind of buffer zone where the forces contending overthe direction of American policy feel free to operate without restraint.

THE SIX years have meant for Rusk a drain on his health. In the demands of the office he has spent virtually all the savings he had accumulated during eight years out of government as president of the Rockefeller Foundation. Every Saturday and almost every Sunday see Rusk at his imposing office in the State Department keeping appointments and trying to stay abreast of the flood of

Even sympathetic critics have said this must mean somewhere along the fine a failure to reorganize the sprawling State Department and delegate authority.

Rusk joined the President at Manila and went with him on the balance of his tour for what purpose was never clear. Repeatedly the President praised him in extravagant terms as one of the greatest Americans who has ever lived. And that may be the reward for the well-nigh-impossible
