

John Ben Sheppard, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, is a man of many ideas. Never before has the constituency of the regional chamber been challenged with so many worthwhile projects within the compass of a single year.

One of the things which has concerned Sheppard, and which should concern the area, is the trend of most small towns and communities. Census figures show that almost all of them lost population during the last

The welfare of the region is wrapped up in its small city and towns just as well as in the larger places and metropolitan points. Their vigor could contribute to the health of all West Texas.

selected as pilot points for self surveys, analysis and suggestions by a task force. Ultimately, there will be conferences in which findings will be given local leaders.

The most hopeful point of the project is in the latter step. Most communities have a fair knowledge of what they have, although they may not have gone through the useful exercise of taking an inventory. Most of them can be fairly objective about the strong points and the obstacles when stimulated to it.

Background For A President

WASHINGTON - Because of the number of Republican governors who have just been elected or re-elected. there has naturally been a tendency to look for potential presidential candidates among them. This raises a question that has often been discussed but never settled-whether the best presidents of the United States have come from those holding federal office or those occupying state or local posts

THERE ARE many good arguments in favor of selecting a governor to be the party nominee, since he has served as chief executive of a state government, but the real problem is finding the man with the right kind of training for the particular issues that are dominant when he takes office. Few governors, for example, have had much experience in dealing with international questions. Yet to day these are of a critical nature and can have a tremendous impact on the whole domestic economy.

In nearly every case where a governor has reached the White House, he has had to spend much of his time in the first year or two acquiring an intimate knowledge of national and international affairs. But there were instances in which some of the senators, too, were not familiar with the background of developments abroad.

BACK IN 1960, this correspondent wrote in these dispatches that, among the men being boomed for the presidency, there were two who really had an intimate knowledge of the relations of Congress and the executive. and knew more about the background of national affairs than the other potential nominees. These two men were Vice President Richard Nixon and the then-majority leader of the Senate, Lyndon B. Johnson. There is no question about the fact that Senator Johnson-who won the vice-presidential nomination with the support of the Speaker of the House-had had an

unusual training in Congress and that this has belped him to a large extent in dealing with legislative matters but with a difference. since he became President.

A GOVERNOR who has the responsibilities of a state office and yet wants to be nominated for the presidency must begin to study national and international problems, and unless he has the money to build up a staff of his own, he is not likely to be epared as some rival who has private resources.

Governors are handicapped, too, by the fact that generally they are not too familiar with politics outside of their own states, and it requires a lot of time for them to line up support in other states. They usually must be at the mercy of political organizers, some of whom they may not know

THE SENATOR or member of the House who achieves political prominence, on the other hand, makes friends with the members of Congress from other states. Also, being in Washington, he is likely to be frequently in contact with the national headquarters of his party.

In the final analysis, much depends upon the ability of the winning candidate to learn quickly the background of the main issues and then to apply good judgment in making national and international policies.

SUCCESS IN the presidency is, after all, largely a matter of individual capacity, though in Great Britain, Canada and other countries no one ever wins the highest post unless he has been active in the parliamentary body itself. Out of all the potential candidates for the presidential or vice-presidential nominations next time, only three men-President Johnson, Vice President Humphrey and former Vice President Nixon-h a v e had any leadership role in the legislative branch of the federal government as well as experience in the executive branch. As well as persuading Australian girls to return, Riddle hopes to encourage European girls to come to Australia on working holidays or to take permanent positions.

Two Victims Of Too Much

WASHINGTON - Lyndon Johnson and J. Edgar Hoover, friends of the road, now find themselves companions of prosecution, so to speak.

The President is to go on trial in London before an International War Crimes Tribunal for his alleged misdeeds in Viet Nam. The FBI Director stands publicly charged in Washington with violating the Federal laws against wiretap in the case of Mr. Johnson's former aide and Senate

staffer, Bobby Baker. IT WON'T DO to say, as yet, "How the mighty have fallen!", for the prosecutors of Johnson and Hoover have not come to court with sound minds and pure hearts. The President's chief tormentor and the sponsor of the International Tribune is a public fool, the 94-year-old Lord Ber trand Russell, the philosopher of "peace." The FBI Director's inquisitor is a corporate scold. The Washington Post.

If international judicial bodies and the U.S. Supreme Court were more in the mainstream of rational thought. one might predict with some confidence that the distinguished men on trial would walk away-as so many fortunate killers and rapists are doing these days. But what man, however renowned and guiltless, can feel his reputation secure at the hands of post-Nuremberg and Warren Court

GOVERNMENTS are instituted among men, says the Declaration of Independence, to secure certain self-evident rights, but that was a long while ago. Both Jefferson and Hamilton, agreeing on little else about government, warned against making too

many laws. Mankind, they knew, doesn't stop when it's got a good thing going like democracy. One parliamentary assembly leads another, and statutes breed like rabbits whenever politi-

cians get together. The Nuremberg Tribunal, on which Lord Russell's drumhead court is modeled, sprang from the loins of a quasi-government the Allied Powers of World War II, which were also the parents of a multi-headed child, the 117-member United Nations.

LUCKILY, the President is to be tried in absentia, but the FBI Director has no ocean between himself and his would-be punishers. The Washington Post has been saying in its news stories of the Baker pre-trial proceedings that J. Edgar Hoover is technically in violation of the Federal Communications Act and the Fourth Amendment as well. The Post's editorial page archly concedes it to be " that Hoove altogether unlikely "will be prosecuted for . . . a crime, punishable by 10 years in prison and " But it is a hurried a \$5,000 fine reader who does not find much gloating in both the news stories and ed-

itorials-a gloating to be shared by J. Edgar Hoover's myriad enemies among the crooks and the communists, the liberalissimos and all anti-Americans. For those of us who have feared Mr. Hoover has stayed too long in office, there must be regret and indignation that he has been made a casualty in L'Affaire Baker.

HOW MUCH mischief might be averted if it were not for the propensity of mankind to make too much of a good thing! Each year we are overwhelmed in Congress with the spurious offspring of self-government: too many laws. Around the world we are entangled with the progeny of international love matches: too many treaties. At Nuremberg, at the UN. in Geneva, we pick up the scepter and put on the wool sack for the reigning and the judging of the world's multitudes. Isolation? Maybe it wasn't so bad.

Large investors, it seems, can receive trading information well ahead of small investors, thus permitting them to act faster. Or, by the very nature of their position, professional investors seek out and obtain information not available to small in-

The big question here is what constitutes "inside" information; that is, information that should be available only to the officers of a company until the time it is released simultaneously and impartially to the public?

The AFL champion will be decided Monday, Dec. 26, and the NFL title game is set for Sunday, Jan. 1, both in the home park of the Eastern Division winner. Both leagues have tentatively scheduled their allstar games for Jan. 15, but a switch could be made.

The leagues also will try to set up a plan, date and site for a joint draft for 16 NFL teams, including New Orleans, and nine

Other items on the agenda include a decision on the AFL's conversion against the one-point-rule of the NFL, and the NFL division of its conferences. 




