28 Seamen Feared Lost In Great Lakes Freighter Disaster

(AP) - Rescue forces fanned out over Lake Huron today in search of survivors of the illfated Daniel J. Morrell which sank in a storm with a feared loss of 28 lives.

One crewman survived the Great Lakes' worst disaster in eight years.

Three bodies were recovered today after an all-night search.

Wednesday. All were in an area about 20 miles southeast of the Harbor

Beach Light. Gale force winds and heavy snow hampered overnight rescue operations. Enlisted in the search were three Coast Guard helicopters, three cutters and

three other vessels. The search turned up several

logged life preservers, all stamped Daniel J. Morrell. Orange-colored oars and other debris also were recovered.

the 60-year-old ship.

"I saw two life boats launched before the ship sank," said deck watchman Dennis Hale, the survivor. Plucked from a liferaft by a helicopter, Hale was clad in undershorts, pajamas and a beneath the bodies of three crewmates who died from expo-

An empty liferaft bobbed on waves near the coast and a life ring and debris from the Morrell washed up on the snow-covered shore at the northern tip of the Thumb District. The wreckage was found by a 100-man search party that scoured the

BLINDING SNOW

The blinding snow hampered the search by three Coast Guard cutters over a 400-square-mile area of Lake Huron. The storm grounded Coast Guard aircraft during most of the hunt.

Any crewmen not in life boats would have died within three hours in the 36-degree water.

Hale, 26, of Ashtabula, Ohio, was sleeping when he "heard a hard thump.

"I thought the anchor was dropping," he said. Books turnbled off a shelf in his room and he jumped out of bed.





He cashed the ace of clubs and the ace of diamonds, and then led a small diamond in the hope that the queen would prove to be an entry. East turned up with the king, however, and he proceeded to cash the jack of diamonds and the queen of spades to administer a one trick setback.

A simple precaution would

have protected South against virtually any development except a four-zero division in trumps. All he has to do is to discard a diamond from dummy on the second round of hearts. This will protect North's trump holding from any further assault for, if the opposition persists with another heart, South can ruff in his own hand, cash the ace of clubs and the ace, king of spades and then give East his trump trick. North's ten of spades provides a late entry to run the remaining clubs. South's tricks consist of four spades, one diamond, and five

Trans-Texas Airways, which is Big Spring's commercial air carrier, inaugurates its new Turbo Jet fleet here today when the Convair 600 "Silver Cloud" arrives about 5:45 p.m. and departs for Dallas for an arrival time of 7:20 o'clock.



2-China Deal **Dealt Blow**

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - The U.N. General Assembly's rejection of both the bid to seat Peking and the proposal to seek a compromise solution of the issue of China's representation has dealt a severe blow to advocates of a two-China policy.

The 62-34 defeat Tuesday of the Italian plan to turn the China problem over to a U.N. study group virtually doomed chances of any two-China formula now, goal of the proposed study.

REAPPRAISED decision of the United States to support the Italian plan had been viewed as a maor shift by Washington toward the two-China idea. But the poor showing Peking made in this year's vote and the lack of support for the Italian proposal was expected to prompt a U.S.

The results of the balloting came as a general surprise. Peking had been given virtually no chance of winning a seat under the two-thirds majority rule, but few expected it to emerge 11 votes behind the Nationalists. Supporters of Red China

blamed the defeat on Peking's own attitude, pressure from the United States and the "quality" of new African governments. BIG PRESSURE

"The United States put on great pressure at every capital, including my own," said Ambassador S.O. Adebo of Nigeria, who favored Peking. "With new countries and poor countries economic pressure is a great weapon, and the United States has used it effectively."

Ambassador Marof Achkar of Guinea, a cosponsor with Albania of the resolution to seat Peking, said the results re-"the quality of the governments" that have come to power in Africa as a result of coups d'etat. Some new nations in the United Nations voted against Peking "because they wanted to please the United States," he said.

Uncertainty over the significance of the purge going on inside China and the worsening dispute between Moscow and Peking were also believed to have had an effect.

The United States and other opponents of the Chinese Reds expressed belief the emphasis the Albanian resolution placed on its demand to expel the Nationalists helped defeat it.







This would be helpful, too, because the authorizations granted by the late Congress appeared to be ob-vious to the painful fact that inflation already had dealt the economy some sore blows.

This means that some programs, particularly where they involve construction, will be retarded. Even though buildings, highways and the like are worthy and needed, they can be postponed without harmful effect. What remains is to put the brakes on some of the benefit programs pending a more realistic appraisal of what they have done and might reasonably be expected to accomplish. Substantial cuts here also could help to avoid a tax increase, or at least minimize it.

Holmes Alexander Percy's Got To Prove It

WASHINGTON - "Hasn't he ever heard of Bob Kennedy?" somebody stage-whispered during the press conference here when Senator - elect Chuck Percy (R., Ill.) was projecting himself as the very model of a seen-

but-not-heard freshman member. It was refreshing, all right, to find a young, attractive, self-effacing newcomer of the old school, happy to be aboard, willing to live and learn, conceiving his immediate duty to be one of making himself a good Senator. But we shall have to wait a while to ascertain whether the national commonwealth of politics and the Republican party have been enriched.

YOUNG MR. Percy replaces ex-Senator Paul Douglas, 74, who was a domestic liberal whenever it came to ripping up the social mores with civil rights experimentalism and to villifying the profit motive of free enterprise. But Douglas was and is an individual of such powerful intellect and angelic integrity of character that he could cause all except the most hardhearted opponents to hear the still. small voice of conscience pleading: "Consider that you might be wrong and Douglas right." The Douglas standard is a high one to be measured by, especially as Percy's domestic liberalism may not be very different in kind than that of his predecessor.

BUT DOUGLAS, whatever his farout ideas on political economies and racial leveling, came close to being a red-blooded emotionalist on all matters touching patriotism. He and Senator Joe McCarthy were joint authors of legislation for the permanence and glory of the U.S. Marine Corps. Douglas never joined the blood-sport called anti-McCarthyism, and found it hard to find much wrong with a man who was an extremist against communism. A veteran member of the Com-

David Lawrence Tax Money To Pay For Campaigns

signed into law the other day a bill that establishes a strange precedent. For the measure gives the citizen the right to say whether or not the federal government shall spend his tax money to pay some of the expenses of a political campaign for the presidency. Nothing like this has ever been authorized before, and it opens the way now to further stipulations by the taxpayer who may not wish his funds used to finance various federal projects if he deems them wasteful or un-

THEORETICALLY, the new law attempts to provide about 30 million dollars to each of the two major political parties for expenses incurred not by candidates for Congress or by aspirants to public office in the states or cities but by presidential and vice presidential nominees. Nothing in the bill limits private con-

tributions to political campaigns. Not a cent is provided by Congress for presidential-primary or convention expenses or other outlays made before the party nominees are selected.

IF THE NEW law had been designed to cover all the expenses of a campaign by presidential and vice presidential candidates, with private contributions prohibited altogether, this might be commended as at least removing some of the improprieties from contests for the presidency.

The new statute doesn't mention corrupt practices at all. While these are covered to some extent in previous statutes, unfortunately such laws have not been enforced by the party in power, irrespective of its label. Plenty of circumventions have been tolerated.

a satisfactory formula. IS IT CONSTITUTIONAL for taxes to be used to support a political party of whose aims or platform many taxpayers disapprove? While it is true that 50 per cent of the contribution is going to go to one major party and 50 per cent to the other, the fact remains that the taxpayer would, in effect, be giving financial aid to a party in whose platform he does not believe or whose candidates he doesn't wish to support. Might he not demand that he be allowed to designate that his contribution go only to his own party or to the candidate he wants to vote

ENTIRELY APART from political campaigns, moreover, should the citizen be permitted to mark on his income-tax return his wish that no part of his money be used to support certain legislative measures? The way has been opened by Congress to permit tax forms to be marked so that the citizen can indicate what he wants his money spent for out of all the appropriations made each year for federal projects. It presents an issue with which Congress will have to wrestle soon if certain portions of taxpayers' funds are to be set aside each year to finance political campaigns.

LBJ Still **Gets Criticism**

By JOHN CUNNIFF

New york (AP) - For many months, President Johnson took no fiscal action to correct economic imbalance despite urgings from many quarters.

Now that he is acting, some of the same people who criticized him then are criticizing him

In the past couple of months, the inflationary fires have cooled some. Certain economists who favored tax increases aren't so sure anymore. And the political face of the nation has

Johnson's first move was to suspend the 7 per cent investment tax credit that some econ omists said was making it too easy for business to continue spending. Such spending, they said, was inflationary.

This week, Johnson announced plans to cancel or delay \$5.3 billion in federal programs for the present fiscal year, the purpose being to relieve inflationary pressure placed on the economy by heavy federal spending.

Johnson also moved in another direction. Because high interest rates and a money shortage were depressing the housing market, the President freed \$250 million in funds to help finance mortgages of 15,000 new homes.

Johnson says now he will decide by the end of the year whether to ask for an income tax increase.


