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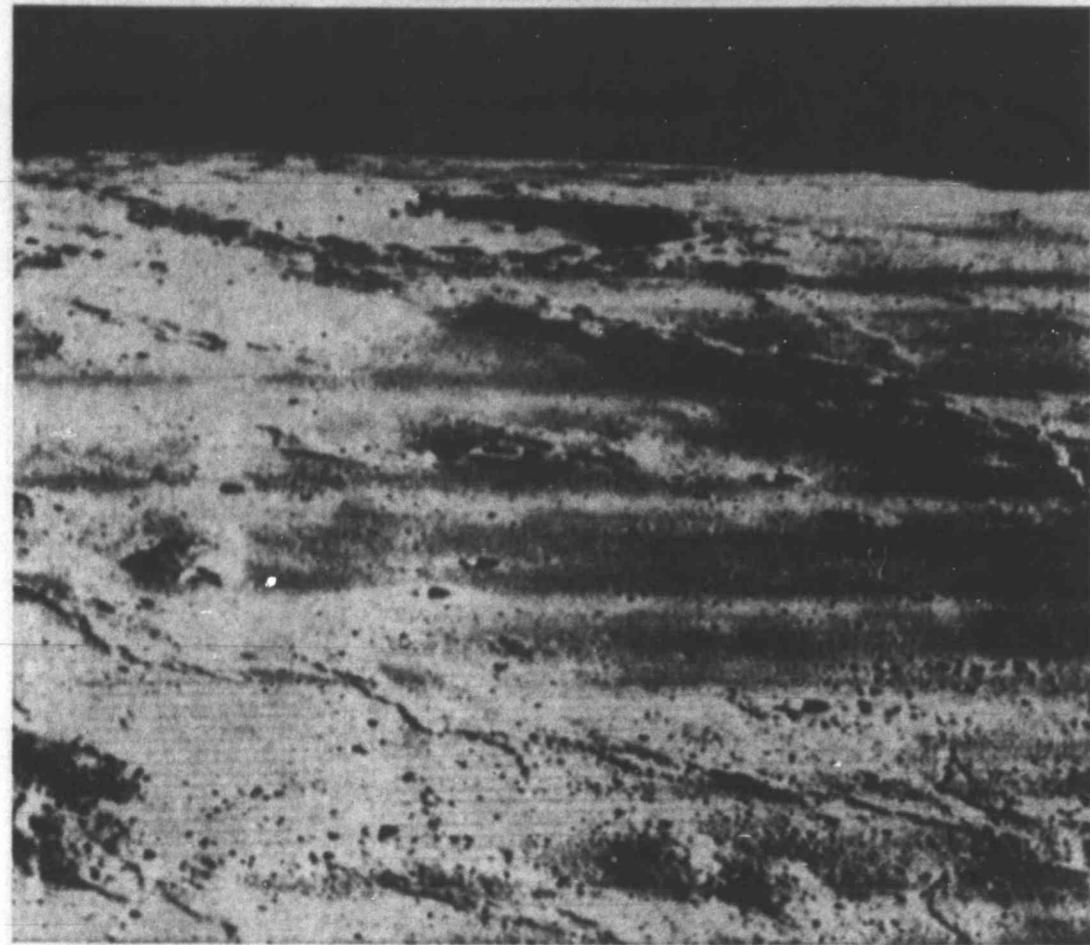
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Crater Marius On The Moon

Ruby Pins Survival Hopes On Chemical Treatment

DALLAS (AP)—One of Jack Ruby's doctors said today it is not often possible to cure cancer by chemical treatment, although that appears to be the only course open in Ruby's case. This opinion was expressed by Dr. Eugene Frenkel, another member of the Southwestern Medical School staff attending Ruby, killer of Lee Harvey Oswald. Dr. Jack Barnett, also on the staff attending Ruby, said that the general condition of Ruby is stable. Ruby feels reasonably well and is resting comfortably. Barnett added that in the past 24 hours X-ray examinations indicated that Ruby's lower intestinal tract was clear of cancer but examination of the chest is incomplete. **SURGERY RULED OUT** Frenkel said the medical team looking after Ruby at Parkland Hospital expected by late today to determine the type of chemotherapy was best and to begin administering it at once. Doctors earlier ruled out

surgery and radiation treatment. Newsmen asked Frenkel if he considers Ruby's malignancy a terminal case. He declined to answer directly, but did say that "a large number of tumors are active for years and not curable but also are not terminal." **INCREDIBLE RUMOR** Asked about speculation that Ruby might not live more than 10 to 14 days, Frenkel said: "That kind of rumor is incredible about even a known kind of tumor." Frenkel said specialists have not yet determined the primary source of Ruby's cancer. He said no more apparently malignant lung nodules had been found. Attendants said the former night club operator is devoting much of his time to watching television. Ruby earlier had been scheduled to go on trial again in February after his death sentence was overturned by an appeals court and a new hearing ordered. Surgery was ruled out be-

cause the cancer had spread to too much of his body. The type of malignancy does not respond to radiation. **FREE OF PAIN** Ruby knows he has cancer. He was told Saturday. Nonetheless, a hospital report said, he is "reasonably cheerful and continues to be free of pain" except for "mild discomfort" caused by chest tubes inserted to drain off fluid. Barnett said another tumor was found in Ruby, this one in the pleura, or lining between the chest and lung. The second tumor, Barnett said, also was malignant and of the same variety found in a lymph node on Ruby's neck Saturday. The disclosure of new cancer considerably dimmed his chances of going on trial again. Ruby gunned down Oswald two days after the Kennedy slaying. He has been in a Dallas County jail cell since, except for a one-month trial that ended in a death-penalty conviction and a subsequent overruling by a Texas appeals court, and an appearance in federal court.

Commisses Charge U. S. Jets Raid Hanoi Again

Longer Truce Is Proposed By Mansfield

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield wants the United States to propose a 45-day or longer truce in Vietnam for the purpose of negotiations. But two of his Southern colleagues counter that the war should be stepped up.

The Montana Democrat's comments were among a series made on Vietnam strategy Tuesday.

Henry Cabot Lodge, U.S. ambassador to South Vietnam, would say nothing about the war as he returned for Christmas and a talk with President Johnson.

Mansfield, long a foe of stepped-up military effort, said the United States should offer a "cease-fire and stand-fast" from Christmas through mid-February in hopes of getting North Vietnamese leaders to negotiate a settlement of the war.

BOMBINGS URGED

Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., and Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., however, called for more military effort.

Hollings met for 5 minutes with Johnson shortly after returning from an inspection trip to the war area.

He urged bombing of 75 more military targets in North Vietnam but admitted, "I don't think I've changed the President's mind."

ALL-OUT EFFORT

Stennis told a dinner audience in Jackson, Miss., that a Johnson request for \$10 billion in additional war funds this fiscal year would be inadequate. The President has estimated his request of Congress next month might be about \$9 billion to \$10 billion in supplemental funds.

Stennis urged an all-out military effort and said "much bloody fighting lies ahead and it may take years to win a complete military victory. These guerrillas are far from being defeated."



Summons Served To Halt Book

William Manchester is author of the book "Death of a President," the publication of which Mrs. John F. Kennedy apparently tried to block yesterday by serving a summons on Look Magazine and Harper & Row publishers in New York. Mrs. Kennedy chose Manchester to record events of the assassination "in the interest of accuracy" but later was reportedly disturbed by his use of some of her personal recollections in the book. Look Magazine editor-in-chief William Attwood said the magazine was going ahead with plans to serialize the book. (AP WIREPHOTO)

Coppolino Denies Strangling Charge

FREEHOLD, N.J. (AP) — he last saw him alive. Dr. Carl Coppolino's defense rested at his murder trial today after he took the witness stand to deny that he killed his friend and neighbor Lt. Col. William E. Farber in 1963. He said instead he tried to save the victim's life.

Defense attorney F. Lee Bailey announced at 12:13 p.m. that he had finished his case. Prosecutor Vincent P. Keuper, who rested for the state Tuesday, said he had no rebuttal witnesses. Court was then adjourned for lunch.

Under cross-examination, Coppolino unemotionally admitted that he had been intimate with Farber's attractive widow, Marjorie, both before and after the retired Army officer's July 30, 1963, death. But in point after point, Coppolino denied the story Mrs. Farber told from the witness stand that he had solicited her to kill her husband or that he did the job himself when she failed. Reds Claim Eight Planes Shot Down

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — The Communists charged that U.S. jets raided Hanoi and its suburbs today for the second day in a row. Radio Hanoi declared eight American aircraft, including a pilotless reconnaissance plane, were shot down.

LULL CONTINUES

U. S. headquarters reported one Air Force Thunderchief was shot down by enemy ground fire. Hanoi claimed four U. S. planes were downed.

A lull in the ground war in South Vietnam continued with no significant engagements reported.

U.S. headquarters reported a 155mm howitzer shell accidentally exploded during firing by a U.S. artillery unit five miles northwest of Tay Ninh City, killed two American soldiers and wounded two more. The shell exploded in the tube of the artillery piece, a spokesman said.

'AIR PIRATES' MET

The Soviet news agency Tass said in a Hanoi dispatch, relayed from Moscow, that American planes raided the city for about an hour and a half.

"As yesterday," the Tass correspondent said, "they bombed the right and left banks of the Red River, the embankment and the area of the bridge linking Hanoi with its suburb Zylam."

The air pirates were met with dense antiaircraft fire. Numerous bursts clouded the clear sky. A rocket soared up, leaving a white trail behind. I saw a U.S. plane catch fire and a parachute detach from the plane."

NO CONFIRMATION

Though refusing to confirm or deny Communist accounts of the operations Tuesday, the official U.S. spokesman in Saigon said he had no American reports indicating that bombs landed on the North Vietnamese capital.

The spokesman reported that American bombers attacked a rail yard six miles northeast of Hanoi and a truck depot five miles south of the Red capital. He said both targets were in swamp and rice paddy areas well outside the city proper.

'DANGEROUS STEP'

The North Vietnamese charged that U.S. pilots bombed and strafed "many quarters inside and near Hanoi" and said the raids constituted "an extremely dangerous step of war escalation."

The organ of the North Vietnamese Communist party, Nhan Dan, called on its army and the Viet Cong to "avenge the people of Hanoi." After the last American raids near Hanoi early in December, the Viet Cong attacked Saigon's Tan Son Nhut airbase.

MIGS SIGHTED

U.S. pilots sighted nine or 10 Communist MIGs in the Hanoi area during the raids Tuesday, a spokesman reported, and tangled with two of the late-model MIG21s.

The spokesman said the MIGs fired air-to-air missiles and their cannon at a flight of four

Fred Hyer, 78, who discovered the great Howard-Glasscock oil field that eventually touched off the mid-20th century boom in Big Spring, died this morning. He was stricken at his home at 1729 Yale at 6:40 a.m. Rosary is to be said at 7 p.m. Thursday at the River-Welch Chapel, and mass and the funeral rites will be at 10 a.m. Friday at the St. Thomas Catholic Church. Viet Cong Inflict Heavy Casualties

DA NANG, South Vietnam (AP) — Viet Cong attackers inflicted heavy casualties on a detachment of U.S. Marines and Vietnamese troops at separate outposts before dawn today, a military spokesman announced.

One target was a post manned by a platoon from a company of the 3rd Battalion, U.S. 5th Marine Regiment, on the perimeter of the big Leatherneck base at Chu Lai, 52 miles south of Da Nang.

The other was the headquarters of the 3rd Battalion, 6th Regiment of South Vietnam's 2nd Division, about 70 miles south of Da Nang. Believed to have been defended by about two government companies totaling perhaps 300 troops, the headquarters was overrun by a Viet Cong force of undetermined size.

No figures were announced on specific losses.

A Marine platoon ordinarily would run from 30 to 50 men. Military units which suffer heavy casualties normally are considered to be out of service until reinforcements and new material build them up to normal combat strength.

Bizarre Insurance Fraud Plot Fizzles

NEW YORK (AP) — A 27-year-old woman research analyst, reported dead five months ago, has been found alive in what authorities describe as a bizarre plot by her and two male companions to defraud two insurance companies by staging her accidental drowning.

Dr. and Mrs. Werner A. Lindenmaier of Upper Montclair, N.J., had not known that their daughter, Miriam, was alive until they were reunited with her Tuesday in the Bronx County courthouse.

HOTEL ARREST

Miss Lindenmaier, who was employed as a \$5,500-a-year media and rate analyst for a Manhattan firm for more than six years before she disappeared, was found working as a waitress for 87 cents an hour and in a restaurant in White Plains, N.Y.

She was arrested Tuesday in her hotel room where she was registered under the name of Elizabeth Pangborn, authorities said.

SPAIN TRIP PROMISED

One of the accused men, Alvin Brodie, 34, a construction worker named by authorities as the father of Miss Lindenmaier's unborn child, was alleged to have promised her that they could go to Spain with the \$36,000 in insurance money.

Burton B. Roberts, chief assistant Bronx district attorney, said official wiretapping, authorized by the Bronx Supreme Court last September, played a key role in solving the case. He said that police listening in on a telephone conversation heard Miss Lindenmaier's voice for

the first time Thanksgiving Day.

PREGNANT

Following this up, they traced her to White Plains, about 19 miles north of Times Square, then put her under surveillance before making the arrest. She signed a waiver of immunity and testified before a grand jury Tuesday.

Roberts declined to answer many questions by reporters on grounds they involved evidence. He did not indicate how the wiretap was used.

Roberts said Miss Lindenmaier, a 5-foot, 6-inch blonde

who wears thick-lensed eyeglasses, is six months pregnant. Authorities said Brodie resides with his wife and four children.

TWO CHARGED

Miss Lindenmaier, described by associates as a quiet, bright person who rarely used make-up, Brodie, and a second man, Thomas Martin, 26, a New York elevator operator, were arraigned Tuesday night in Bronx Criminal Court.

They are charged with attempted grand larceny and conspiracy by "staging the accidental death" of Miss Lindenmaier last July 9 in Long Island Sound.

Miss Lindenmaier was paroled in custody of her parents. The two men were ordered held in \$7,500 bail each.

A preliminary hearing for all three was scheduled for Dec. 20. Roberts said that last July 9, the trio rented a dory with an outboard motor. About two hours later, Roberts continued, the two men told police that the boat had capsized off Hart Island in Long Island Sound. They told police that Miss Lindenmaier had drowned and her body had not surfaced.

Roberts said two insurance policies with Brodie as beneficiary, aroused his suspicion. In addition, the girl was reported to be an excellent swimmer. The policies, one for \$10,000 with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. and the other for \$5,000 with the Equitable Life Assurance Society, provided for double indemnity, or a total of \$36,000 in case of accidental death.

Roberts said that Brodie had made claims for the insurance proceeds to both companies but neither had paid off.

Fiery Crash Claims Three

PARIS, Tex. (AP) — A fiery collision of a convertible and a pickup truck five miles north of Paris on US 271 killed two women and a man late Tuesday night. Another woman suffered serious injuries.

State patrolmen identified the dead as Harold William Ritchey, 35, driver of the pickup who lived on Rt. 4 near Paris; Marjorie Ann Nelson, 42, of the Reno community near here, driver of the convertible, and Billie Adams Randolph of Bogata, Tex., a companion of Mrs. Nelson.

Montie Downs of Powderly, also in this vicinity, was taken to Methodist Hospital in Dallas with serious injuries.

The three women were en route to the home of Mrs. Downs.

TEXANS AT WAR Captain Hails Medics In Viet

"The medical men of our team accomplished more and had a deeper psychological impact on the Vietnamese people than all of us put together," a Texan at war and senior advisor to the Vietnamese army said.

"My medic treated between 200 and 300 people a week," said Army Capt. Donald J. Stiles, 33, who headed a five-man advisory team which operated in Viet Cong territory.

PRICE ON HEAD

"Just to show you how much the Viet Cong rated the medic—he was the only one on our team besides me, the leader, who had a reward on his head. It was 1,000 piastres or about \$1,000. The Viet Cong were very aware of him," Stiles said.

The captain is a native of Terrell and since late September when he returned from a year in Vietnam he has been assistant senior Army instructor for the ROTC program in Dallas schools.

PACIFICATION HAILED

"The pacification program was the most impressive of the war to me," Stiles said. "It tries to bring people back

to the Vietnamese government and to establish some form of government where there is none under Viet Cong control. Our biggest hindrance is our inability to secure these areas," he said.

"The vote this last September clearly showed the people want to participate and come under government protection but until we can physically secure these areas, they can't."

Stiles said he felt the medical help alone convinced many villagers the South Vietnamese government was on their side.

Farm Editor Rips Senator

FORT WORTH (AP)—C. G. Scruggs, a Dallas member of the Texas College Coordinating Board, took issue Tuesday with Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., over proposals to double tuition at state universities and colleges.

Yarborough declared Monday in San Antonio that the board's recommended step was "barbaric, outworn, shortsighted, anti-education, anti-people."

Scruggs, who also is editor of the Texas Progressive Farmer magazine, countered in a speech to the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association:

"We feel Sen. Yarborough doesn't understand the tremendous cost for higher education in Texas. We would hope Sen. Yarborough would concern himself with national education problems and let Texas take care of its state education problems."

Scruggs also accused Yarborough of petty politics in criticizing the college board.

"One of the reasons for the request for increases in higher education was brought about," Scruggs added, "by higher cost of administration of federal education programs."

U. S. Agencies Approve Loans

WASHINGTON (AP)—Loans or grants totaling \$995,665 have been approved by federal agencies for projects in Texas.

Officials said Tuesday that the Housing and Urban Development Department reserved \$520,000 for a housing project at the University of Texas, which proposes to build six units for 140 women students.

The Office of Economic Opportunity approved \$155,945 to finance a Head Start preschool children's training program to be conducted by the Abilene School District.

Also announced was approval of a \$229,720 loan by the Farmers Home Administration to Oak Island-Douglas Bayou Water Supply Corp. to improve its water system in Chambers County.

Cotton Votes Being Counted

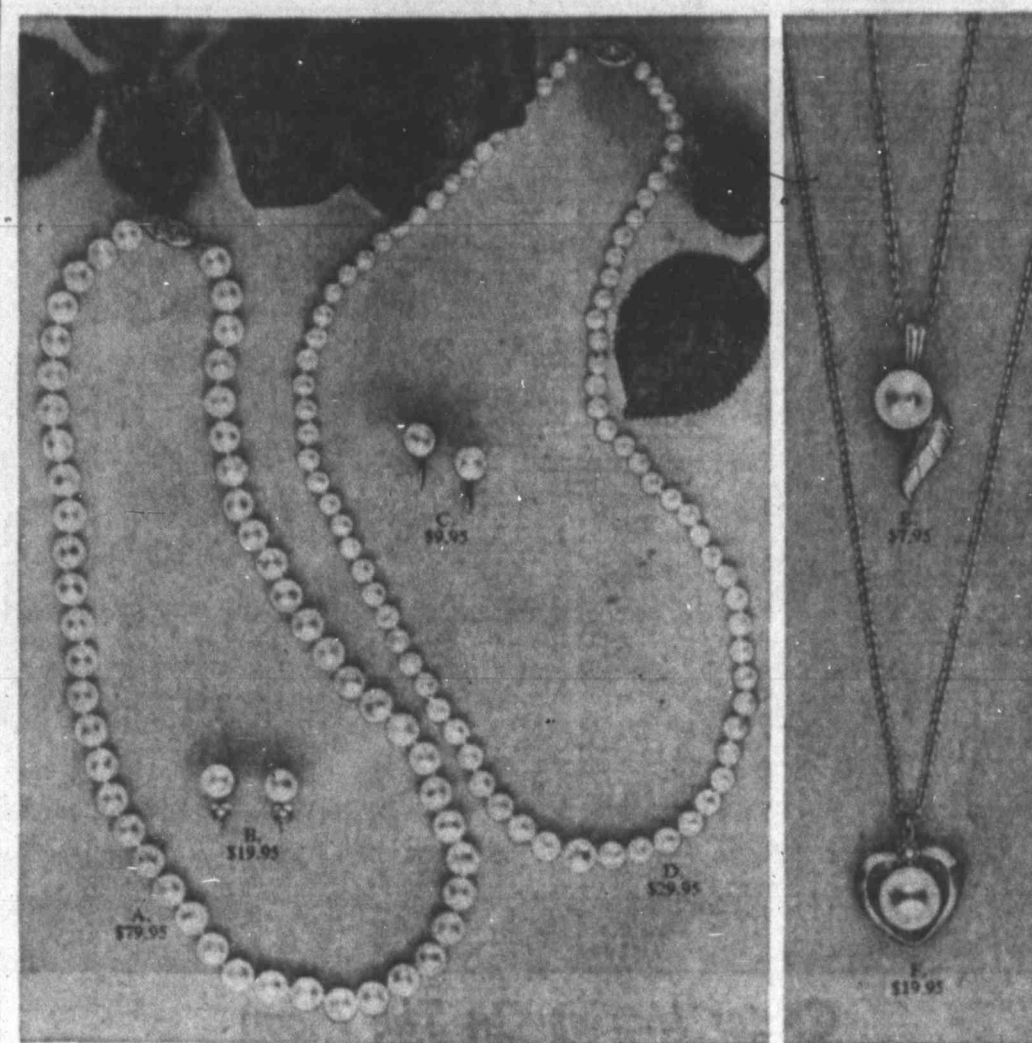
WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department will tabulate today votes cast in last week's mail referendum of growers on two cotton proposals. Results were expected to be known tonight.

One proposal asked growers to approve continuation of marketing quotas on the 1967 cotton crop. The other proposed that growers be assessed \$1 a bale to finance a broadened research and marketing promotion program for cotton. To be adopted, the proposals require two-thirds approval.

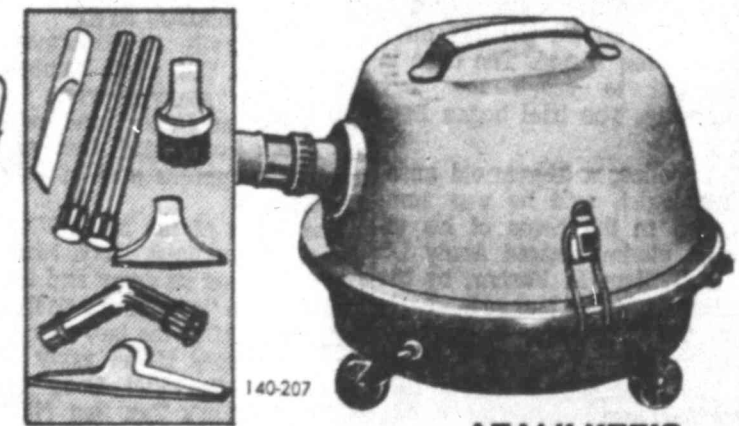

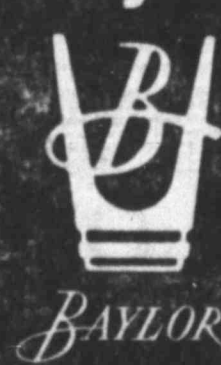

Red Aid Fails

Somali Still Democratic

MOGADISHU, Somali Republic (AP) — Nearly \$100 million worth of Soviet assistance has failed to make Communists out of the fiercely independent and traditionally democratic Somali.

This little republic of 4.5 million largely nomadic people nevertheless is the major Soviet foothold in Africa south of the Sahara.

SOVIET TRAINING
In their Moscow swimsuits, Soviet technicians and their wives crowd onto Mogadishu's Lido Beach together with Peace Corps teachers from the United States, German economic advisers, and businessmen from Italy.

Some 250 Soviet military experts are training the Somali army in the use of \$35 million worth of Soviet equipment. About 400 Somali cadets are training in the Soviet Union.

a dairy plant in Mogadishu, a meat factory at Chismayo in the south, and are building a big new port at Berbera in the north. They have installed Soviet transmitters at Radio Mogadishu. Soviet doctors are at work in Somali hospitals.

"SOMETHING OF FLOP"
Plans for three big state farms on the Moscow pattern have been drastically scaled down.

There may be a total of 500 Soviet technicians, experts and advisers in Somalia. Many have their families with them.

"There is no doubt the Soviets are highly regarded," one Western diplomat says. "When Somalia rejected the West's pretty miserable offer of military aid, the Russians jumped in with a far more generous counteroffer. That boosted their popularity, but their economic assistance has been something of a flop."

TRY, TRY, TRY AGAIN

City Commission Grants Zone Change On 25th

Al Milch was finally given the go-ahead for a zone change on the property at Birdwell Lane and Twenty-fifth Street Tuesday night. The decision followed a public hearing that featured considerable discussion and even a real-estate sale.

Attorney Gil Jones, represented Milch, and repeated a previous request for either a Zone NSPD (neighborhood service, planned district) or a Zone MF (multiple family). The property is now zoned for one family residential use.

On the Zone NSPD, Commissioner Jimmy Morehead made the motion to deny the request, which was seconded by Walter Stroup. On the vote, John Stanley voted with them for the motion, and Chester Cathey voted against it.

On the MF Zoning, Stanley made the motion to approve the request, which was seconded by Cathey. Stroup and Morehead voted against the motion, and Mayor Arnold Marshall broke the tie by casting his vote with Stanley and Cathey.

For the most part, the public hearing was calmer than the two other ones when the matter was brought before the city commission and denied. During one exchange, Jones offered to buy the property of Luther Bean, who opposed the zone change, at the price he paid for it — \$1,000 — and Bean immediately agreed.

Jones opened the hearing with his request and presented plans of the area, in addition to letters from local real estate appraisers, lending agencies, and other property owners in the area, all indicating the zone change would be beneficial for the more than four acres at issue. He said the position of his client is that the property is of small value, if any, for residential use and that neighborhood service would make the best use of the property. This was the general implication of the letters he presented.

Bruce Frazier, Cecil Kelley, Tony Taroni and Beena spoke in opposition to the zone change. Frazier explained that except for an error in deed transfers, the property in question would have a deed restriction against anything but residential housing in the area. He showed the commissioners about a dozen pictures of commercial zoning in the immediate area, some vacant, and said a small grocery within sight of the property had gone broke, plus there are numerous vacant commercial places close to the property that have "gone begging."

He challenged the affidavits presented by Jones as not representing the people in the area. He also said Milch has a planned neighborhood service area in the Kentwood Subdivision that could be used, rather than the one he is asking for.

Schools Not To Renew Contract

Big Spring Independent School District Tuesday night authorized Sam Anderson, superintendent, to advise John Burgess, city attorney, that the district does not propose to renew the contract it has with him on collection of delinquent taxes.

However, the board was informed that Burgess has told Anderson he is retiring as city attorney effective Jan. 1 and has no wish to continue his work with the school board. A new city attorney is to be named and it was suggested that negotiations be opened with this official on possibly continuing the assignment Burgess has had.

Chicago Plans To Rebuild Large Areas

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago has charted a 15-year, \$6-billion campaign to rebuild large areas of the city and to seek lasting solutions to its social and racial problems.

The long-range, comprehensive plan will carry the city through the year 2000 and includes the reshaping of virtually every area of its life and basic structure.

Hailed by Mayor Richard J. Daley as "a practical design for the city's future," it provides for better neighborhoods, more housing and schools, new parks and recreation facilities, more and faster transportation and a revitalized central core.

The plan was made up by the City Planning Commission.

MORE JOBS
Much of the cost, an estimated \$400 million a year, will come from federal and state aid, Daley said. The program will double present expenditures for such improvements.

In the social sphere, the plan calls for measures to bring more white families back into

the city, to open more job opportunities for all persons and to expand greatly the educational system at all levels.

It provides for open housing for all of Chicago's citizens and recommends that "fair housing" laws be adopted throughout the metropolitan area.

POPULATION EXPLOSION

The plan envisions Chicago in 1980 as composed of more and younger families. It projects a rise in population to 3.7 million, including a nonwhite population of more than 1.5 million. But it maintains that general improvements in the city will attract more people, especially younger, middle-income families now gravitating toward the suburbs.

In Chicago, the plan sets these policies to provide for a "diverse, harmonious population."

—Reduce the loss of white families while accommodating the growth of the nonwhite population under the city's fair housing law.

RACIAL RIOTING
—The use of redevelopment and conservation programs to achieve racial balance in neighborhoods threatened by massive racial transition.

—Local improvement plans to encourage established families to remain in their neighborhoods.

—The provision of "the broadest possible choice of housing cost and type to meet the needs of people, including low-income families and the elderly."

The problems of the near

West Side, the location of the City Planning Commission's first specific area proposals, are as varied and complex as any in Chicago.

It was the site of racial rioting last summer and its southern and western sections are largely Negro.

HOLY WAR LOOMS

African Powder Keg Smoldering

MOGADISHU, Somali Republic (AP) — Africa, which already has an abundance of powder keg smoldering at the tip of the turbulent continent's eastern horn.

Djibouti, or French Somaliland, the last French colonial outpost in Africa, can provide the fuse for the explosion.

The little Somali republic is bracing itself against any attempt by neighboring Ethiopia to annex French Somaliland, which the Ethiopians claim is an integral part of their territory.

INDEPENDENT VOTE

Next year, the colony's 96,000 people will choose in a referendum whether they want independence or continued association with France. If they choose independence, the key question is whether their tiny patch of sand and desolate scrub can stand alone against the contending claims of Ethiopia and the Somali Republic.

A move by either to take over in France's place likely will mean war. And it will be a new point of East-West friction.

As of now — with Soviet assistance — the Somali Republic has built up an army of 9,000 men which Western experts say is geared primarily to a defensive role. It has an air force of nine old-type Soviet fighters — three MIG15s and six MIG17s.

BORDER NOMADS

On paper, this does not sound like much against Ethiopia's army of 40,000 equipped with modern U. S. weapons and advised and trained by U. S. experts. By African standards Ethiopia has a formidable air force, using American jets.

But if armed conflict arose over Djibouti's future, the Mogadishu government would put its faith in Somali nomads, numbering about three million, who roam the border areas of the Somali Republic, Ethiopia and the northern frontier district of Kenya.

The Somali Republic has a population of only 2.5 million, but it claims its fiercely independent

people are linked with the border nomads in a common yearning for self-determination.

The lean, wandering Somalis learn to use rifles as they learn to walk. They can go for days without food or drink. They know every contour and hidden waterhole of the sun-seared desert and can march up to 50 miles a day.

The Mogadishu government indicates it has only to give the word and Somalis in Ethiopia's Ogaden region and in Kenya's northern frontier district, as well as in French Somaliland, will rise as one in a holy war for their Moslem homeland.

Oil Output Tops Demand

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Oil producing states were told today their petroleum production in 1966 has exceeded demand by 176,000 barrels a day.

Minor Jameson Jr., a Washington, D.C., petroleum economist, said continuation of such a trend could cause serious problems for state conservation agencies.

In a report placed before the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, Jameson said 1966 crude oil production increased 321,000 barrels a day over 1965 but actual market demand increased only 345,000 barrels a day.

"Clearly, the increase of about 321,000 barrels daily included a substantial amount of 'borrowing' against the future production," said Jameson, executive vice president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America.

If demand and supply are to be kept in balance, Jameson said, domestic crude production will have to be increased in 1967 by only 175,000 barrels a day because of the excessive 1966 output.

He said experience has shown that production in excess of market demand usually results in subsequent downward adjustments.

"U.S. production in 1966 has continued to exceed substantially the real market demand for crude oil," he said. "In none of the past five years has production exceeded demand by such margins."

He said it is unrealistic to expect that production can continue to exceed demand another 12 months.

Jameson made his semiannual report at a business session concluding the three-day annual meeting of the 33-state body that serves as a forum on oil and gas conservation matters. Gov. Paul Johnson, D-Miss., was expected to be elected chairman of the group, succeeding Gov. Henry Bellmon, R-Okla.

'Astrobugs' Will Orbit

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Packed inside a beehive-shaped capsule, thousands of tiny "astrobugs" aim spaceward today to orbit earth 74 hours so scientists can learn if it is safe for humans to take distant trips to planets.

Perched on the tip of a sleek Delta rocket, the wasps, fruit flies, beetles and other living specimens blast off between 2:20 p.m. and 3:20 p.m. EST as the opening shot in America's \$100-million "bring-em-back-alive" biosatellite program.

Goal of the program is to test how radiation and weightlessness in space affects the growth of plants and animals, structure of body cells and basic biochemistry.

After 47 orbits, Biosatellite 1 was to fire a retrorocket about 5 p.m. Saturday and parachute to earth. Aircraft are scheduled to catch the falling capsule over the Pacific Ocean and fly the specimens to Hawaii for analysis.

Mutations which develop in the creatures will help biologists conclude what effect a similar environment would have had on

men living in space for long periods, such as on a journey to the planets.

Wives of Kiwanians will meet at the office of the home demonstration agent in the county courthouse on Thursday morning to prepare ham sandwiches to go with cookies and cold drinks.

The boys and girls selected for the party were chosen by social workers who are familiar with the families in the area.

A feature of these annual Christmas parties sponsored by the Kiwanis Club is that the gifts must not be "practical"—only playthings and toys are to be offered.

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Blue Laws Might Cause Headache

The 1967 Texas Legislature, with plenty of other worries on hand, may get another king-size headache—Sunday closing laws.

Four of the state's largest cities have wrestled with the problem of restraining Texans to six days of labor a week and the result is mostly confusion.

Austin was the scene of the latest revolution against legislating a legal day of rest. A city ordinance making a customer personally liable for Sunday sales rather than the store owner lasted just two weeks before it was repealed. The City Council's second attempt after 92 Sunday buyers got court summons and there were reports of moves under way to flood the court with thousands of violations as a test.

'BLUE LAW SQUADS'

Austin copied its ordinance from Houston where the city rule against "lying on Sunday" is still in effect. However, Houston has had to use special "blue law squads" of policemen to enforce obedience.

Fort Worth officials in past years arrested as many as 400 salesmen in attempts to close big discount stores on Sunday, then the firms got a court order stopping the arrests.

It was a court action from Corpus Christi that resulted in a Texas Supreme Court ruling that the latest state laws allowed store owners to sell prohibited

items on Sunday as long as the customer signs a slip of paper saying it is an emergency purchase.

LAWS LEGAL

"There's no doubt about the blue laws being sustainable," says Austin City Atty. Doren Eskew, who wrote the now defunct Austin ordinance. "They have been upheld by both the U.S. Supreme Court and the state Supreme Court. And they are upheld, not as many people think for religious reasons, but because cities and states have the police power to require one day surcease from labor. The laws may not be the personal preference of a lot of us but they are legal and the chances of being overruled by the courts is remote."

Eskew says 49 states have some sort of Sunday closing law now.

STILL ON BOOKS

"There is no doubt our blue laws leave a great deal to be desired," Eskew said. "They need to be simplified and clarified if they are to be our laws, but that is a job for the legislature not the courts."

Texas' Sunday laws go back more than a century. Some of the first are still on the books. An 1863 law, still effective, says it can be a \$50 fine to force employees to work on Sunday or hunt game within half a mile of any church. The statute was amended in 1871 to exempt housewives, operators of steam boats and stage coaches, sugar mills, sheep herders and livery stable workmen, among others.

In 1910 high state courts held that Sunday baseball games were legal. In 1925 a new set of blue laws exempted many sales made before 9 a.m. and after 1 p.m. on Sunday, cities were given authority to pass their own ordinances governing Sunday movies.

42 ITEMS LISTED

Numerous attempts to open or close businesses on Sunday have been made in recent years. In the 1950s there were court cases as attempts were made to close the newly-popular drive-in type grocery stores on Sunday. A little later determined efforts were made against new and used car sales.

Most current effort concerns big discount stores which have moved into suburban areas of Texas' big cities where they stay open late at night and on Sunday, much to the discomfort of downtown department stores and other merchants.

The present principal Sunday closing law names 42 general items that cannot be sold on both Saturday and Sunday except in emergency. Food is excluded but the prohibited lists include clothing, home appliances, radio and TV sets, jewelry, motor vehicles, toys, records, cameras, musical instruments, household linens and other items on many Christmas shopping lists.

'EMERGENCY'

Most discount stores keep a stack of printed "emergency" certificates by the cash register and when the customer signs one the sale becomes legal on Sundays.

Enforcement of the state law is left to local officials with no special funds or state help offered.

"The state passed the law and they should enforce it," said a Houston official.

And that's where the 1967 Legislature may become involved.

'Prettiest' Builder Has 20 'Teachers'

MANSFIELD, Ohio (AP) — The 27-year-old boss of the Zimmerman Excavating Co. may be Ohio's prettiest contractor.

JoAnn Zimmerman, a former student at fashionable Bryn Mawr College, heads a contracting company in Mansfield inherited from her father, the late Joseph J. Zimmerman. Her mother is the firm's vice president.

Her decision to take over the company was made suddenly last February when her father died. But it was not surprising. "I had wanted to go into the business when I was in school," she said, "but dad didn't feel it

was the sort of thing a girl should do."

Had she really planned to prepare for contracting work she might have chosen engineering school rather than Bryn Mawr for two years. She did get a business administration degree from Ashland College.

Miss Zimmerman was in her third year of school teaching when she changed careers.

"It was a real rude awakening to learn how much I didn't know — and I'm still learning," she said. She has 20 "teachers" in the men employees of the Zimmerman firm. She credits them with helping her through her "initiation period."

Heavy, wet snow snarled traffic from Virginia to New Jersey and closed many schools in the Washington, D.C., area. The capital recorded five inches of snow while its Virginia suburbs were blanketed by eight inches. One traffic death was blamed on the storm.

As the storm intensified over the Atlantic and headed northward, heavy snow warnings were posted for extreme eastern Pennsylvania, northwest New Jersey, southeastern New York and most of southern and central New England.

Forecasters said snow accumulations of six inches or more would be whipped into drifts by winds gusting to 40 miles per hour today in those areas.

On the opposite coast, heavy rain sent some streams in Oregon over their banks, flooding many roads. More rain, with snow in the high mountains, was expected to continue from the north and central Pacific Coast inland to the northern Rockies.

Mostly sunny and dry weather was forecast today for the rest of the nation, with warmer temperatures from the Gulf states through the Mississippi and Ohio valleys.

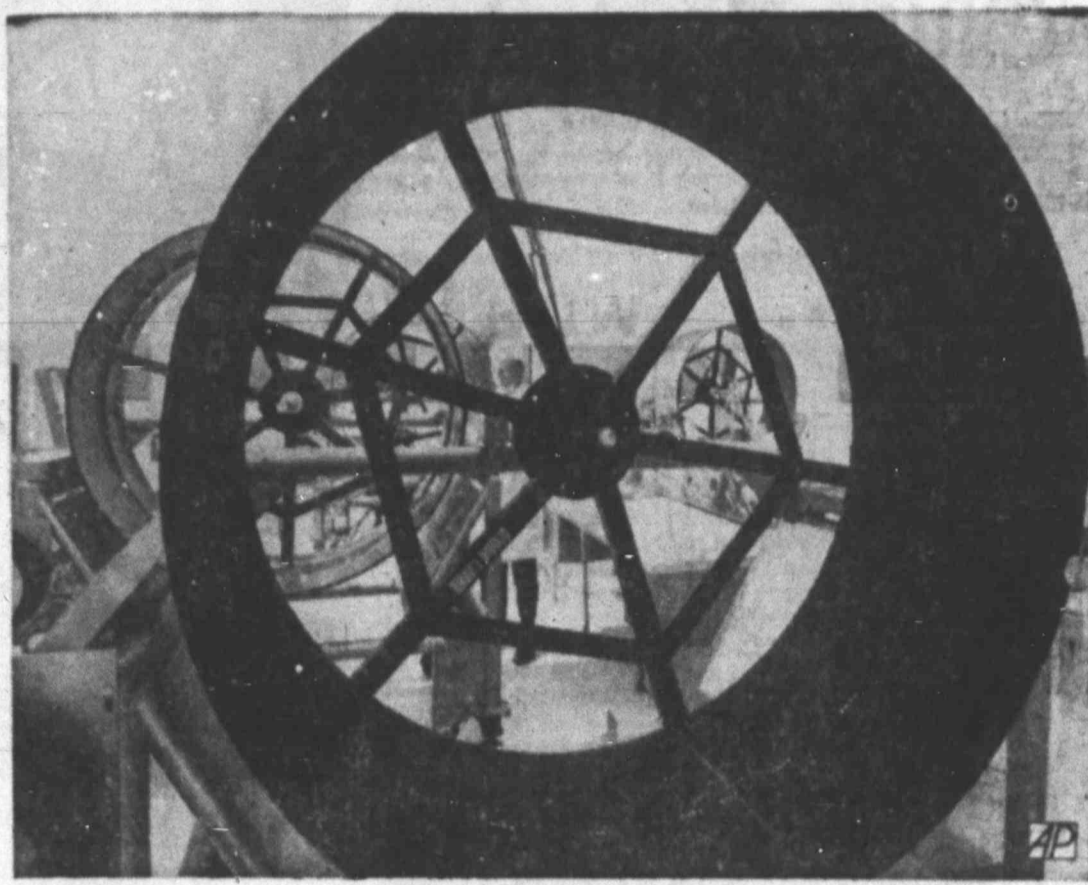

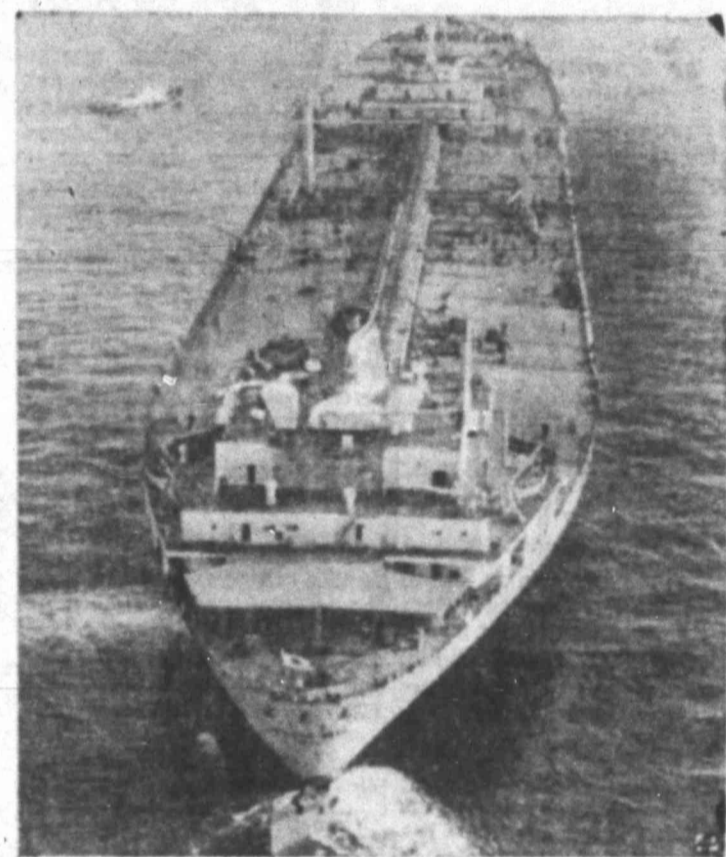

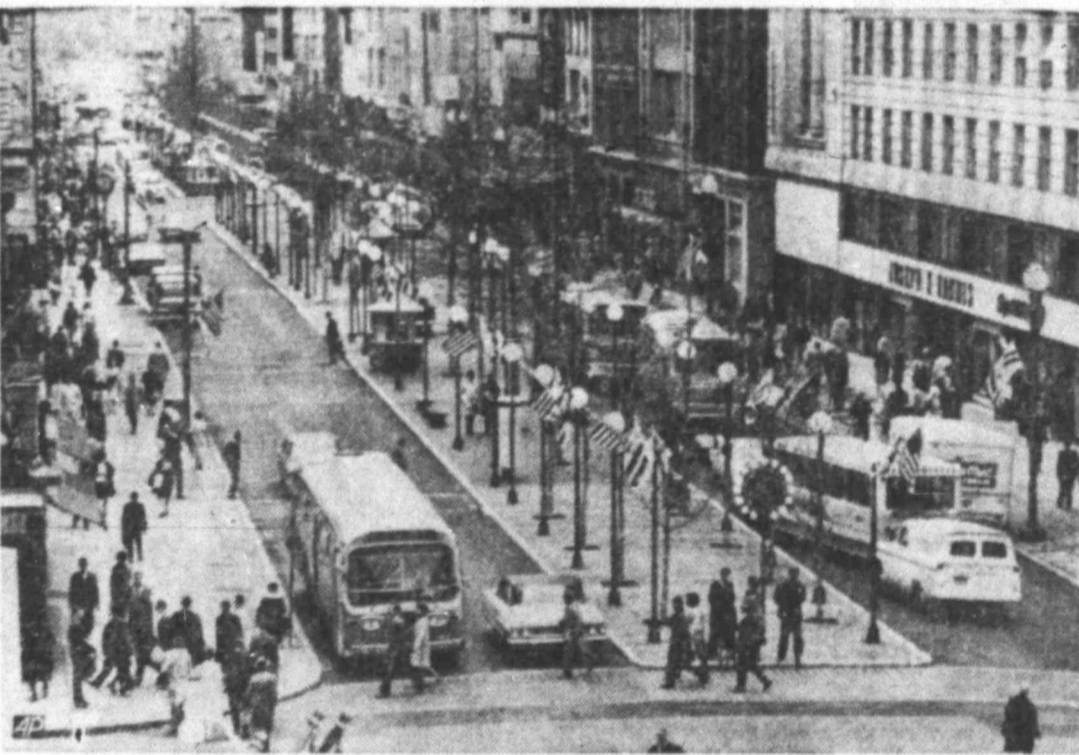

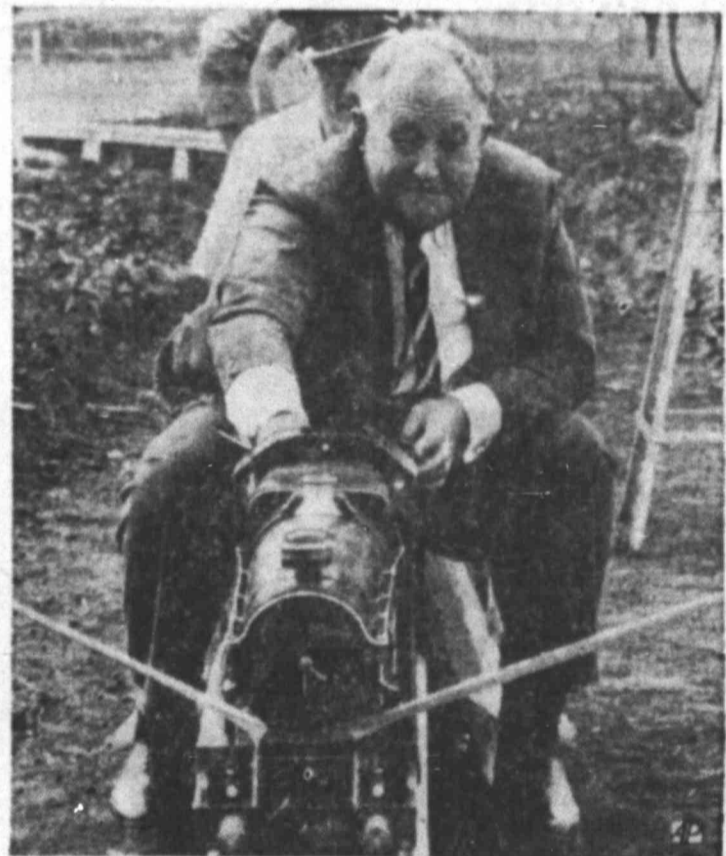

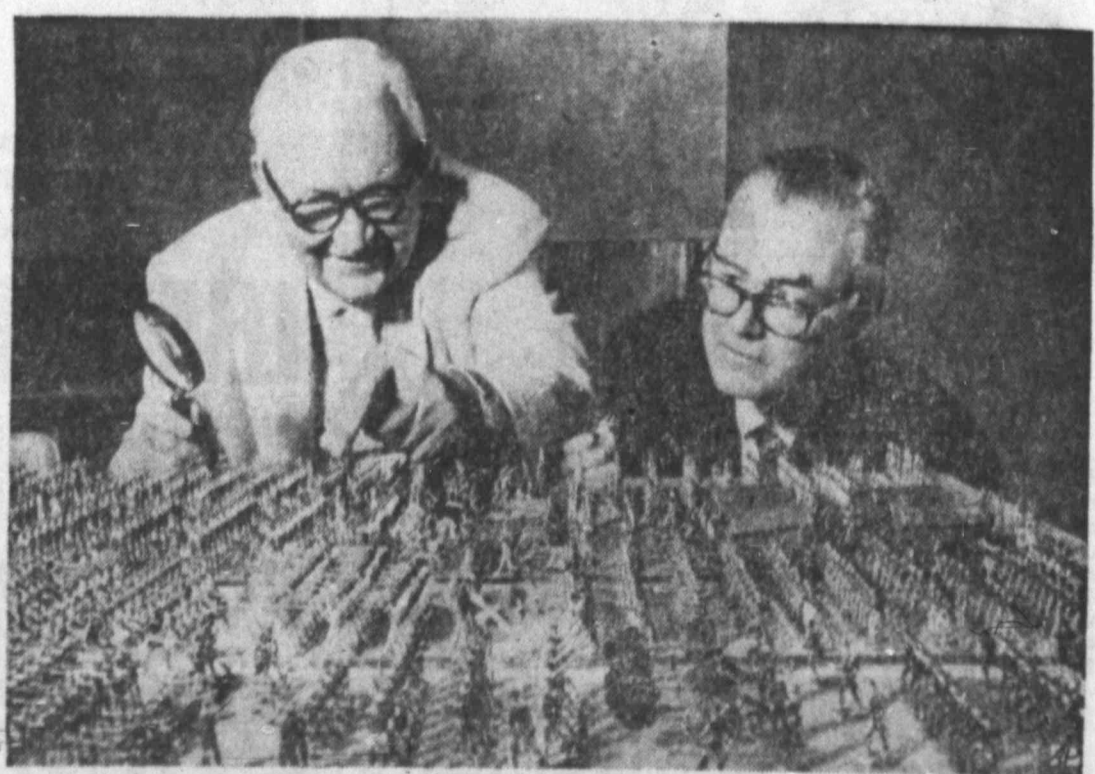

Texas Mosquito Money Sought

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Mosquito Control Association is expected to recommend today a state constitutional amendment authorizing autonomy and more money for mosquito control districts.

The association winds up its two-day annual fall meeting this afternoon.

A. G. Foyle, director of the Orange County Mosquito Control District and head of the association's legislative committee that has worked several years on mosquito control legislation, says the amendment would give the districts taxing authority up to 25 cents per \$100 evaluation.

Present revenue source is the constitutional maximum of 80 cents permitted county commissioners courts, he said, and most counties with mosquito control districts are already at the maximum.

The amendment also would make the directors of the districts elective. They are now appointed by commissioners courts.

Foyle said his district had a budget of \$40,000 this year and that this "wasn't a drop in the bucket."

Altho North's double of West's opening preemptive bid of four hearts is intended primarily for penalties, partner has the option of bidding if he has a highly distributional holding. South's values were not distributional, however, he was reluctant to defend, and he did have a good suit. Of East's double—the less said the better.

West opened the king of hearts and East began a high-low by playing the nine. West continued with the queen, North ruffed with the three of diamonds and East followed suit with the four of hearts.

It appeared to South that his opponent must hold all

of the missing trumps to have any signs of a double, in which case it would be quite a task to do East out of a diamond trick. As an initial step declarer led the seven of diamonds from dummy. East covered with the eight and South put up the queen as West showed out.

A club was led to the queen. East was in with the ace and he returned the jack to dislodge dummy's king. A club was ruffed in the closed hand with the deuce of diamonds as East followed suit with the jack of clubs. Three spade tricks were cashed to produce the following four card position:

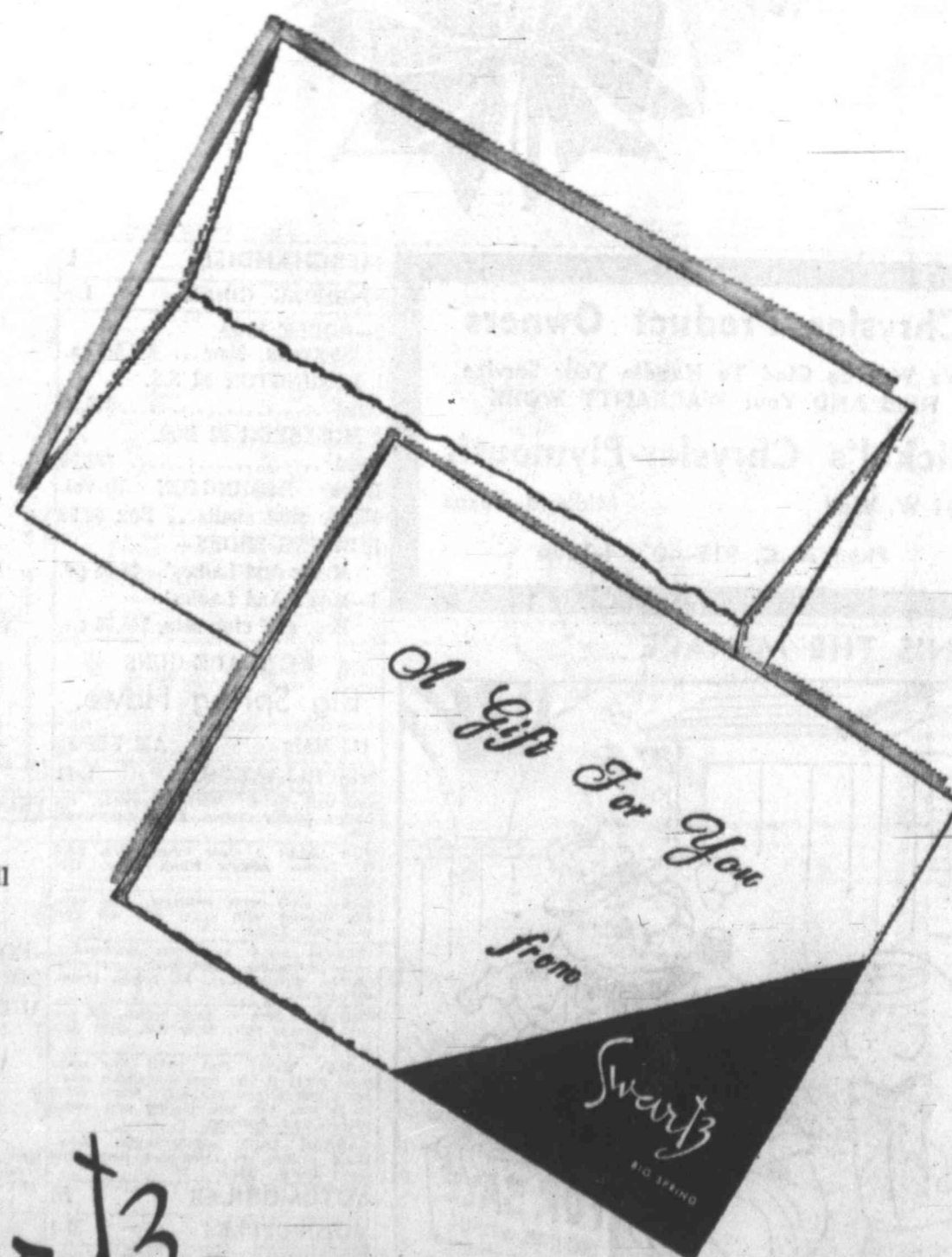
A club was led from dummy and in order to prevent declarer from scoring a cheap overruff, East trumped with the nine of diamonds. South topped this with the king and then led the ten of hearts, trumping in dummy with the jack of diamonds as East helplessly undertrumped with the four.

On the club return, East's ten-five of diamonds was trapped under declarer's ace-six, and the defender's apparently sure trump trick had vanished into thin air.

Altho North's double of West's opening preemptive bid of four hearts is intended primarily for penalties, partner has the option of bidding if he has a highly distributional holding. South's values were not distributional, however, he was reluctant to defend, and he did have a good suit. Of East's double—the less said the better.

West opened the king of hearts and East began a high-low by playing the nine. West continued with the queen, North ruffed with the three of diamonds and East followed suit with the four of hearts.

It appeared to South that his opponent must hold all

of the missing trumps to have any signs of a double, in which case it would be quite a task to do East out of a diamond trick. As an initial step declarer led the seven of diamonds from dummy. East covered with the eight and South put up the queen as West showed out.

A club was led to the queen. East was in with the ace and he returned the jack to dislodge dummy's king. A club was ruffed in the closed hand with the deuce of diamonds as East followed suit with the jack of clubs. Three spade tricks were cashed to produce the following four card position:

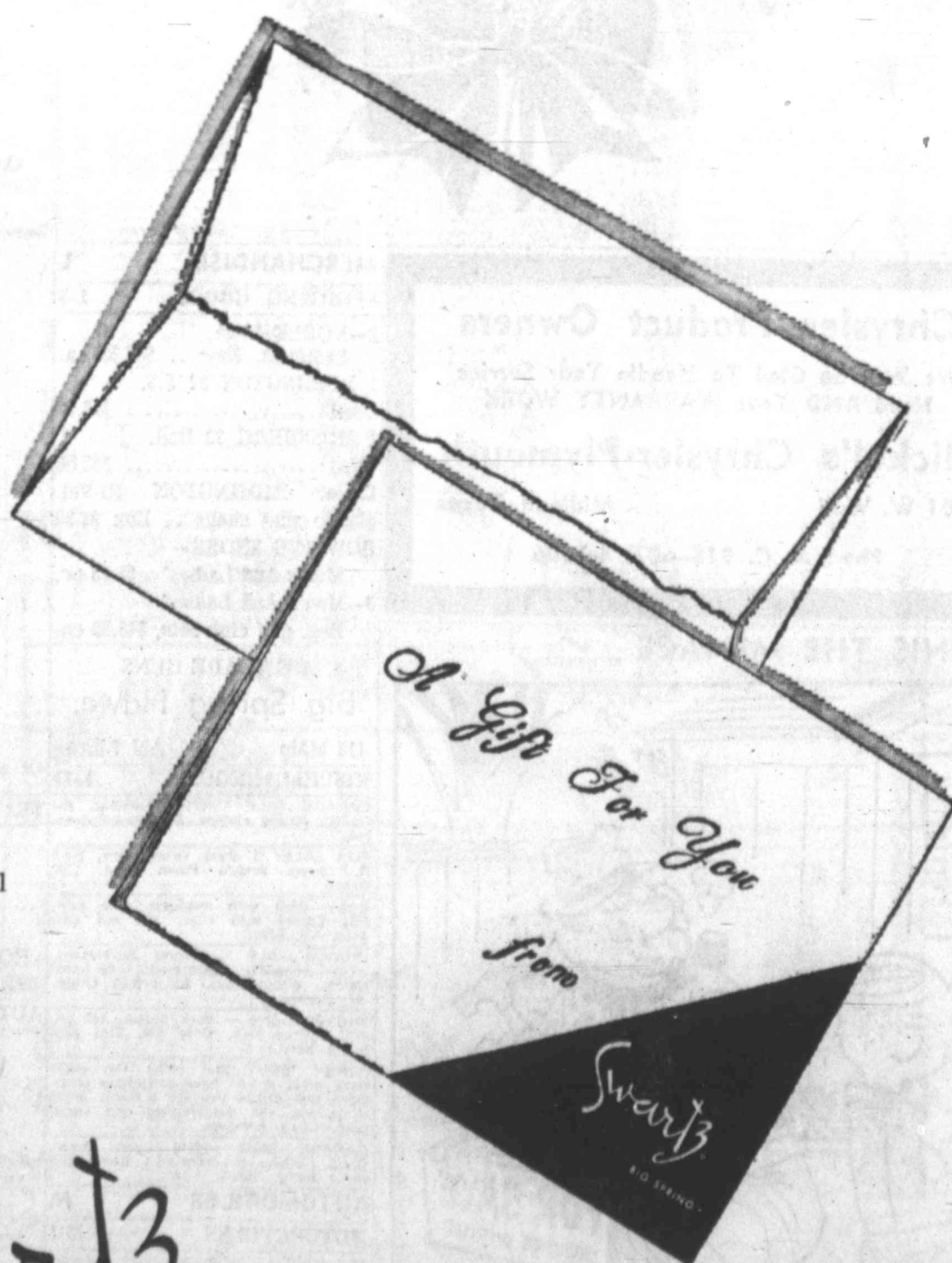
A club was led from dummy and in order to prevent declarer from scoring a cheap overruff, East trumped in with the nine of diamonds. South topped this with the king and then led the ten of hearts, trumping in dummy with the jack of diamonds as East helplessly underruffed with the four.

On the club return, East's ten-five of diamonds was trapped under declarer's ace-six, and the defender's apparently sure trump trick had vanished into thin air.



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
