Kidnaper Is Thanked

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)-The mother of 11-year-old Kenneth Young, a kidnap victim now safe at home after a 72-hour ordeal and payment of \$250,000 ransom, says of her son's abductor: "I feel sorry for the man-out there being hunted. If I saw the man, I would thank him for returning my son home alive and well."

Arline Young made the comment Thursday night at a news conference in the family's expensive home, once owned by film star Deanna Durbin. This was the first meeting with newsmen for Kenny, who wore a baseball cap over his shaved

'I Didn't Feel Chicken'

Impatient about photographs but anxious to relate details of his kidnaping, he disclosed that apparently only one man was involved.

Flashing a shy smile, Kenny said, "I didn't feel chicken about it. On the first day, he said I would be home Wednesday night.

"I wasn't scared except when he showed me

Consistently referring to his abductor only as "he," the financier's son told of the food given

'He Forced It Down Me'

"I didn't like it. He fed me TV dinners-meat loaf. He forced it down me."

Then he described the shaving of his head, a maneuver apparently designed to make the tape

of a blindfold stick better. "He did it Monday at 11 o'clock, Kenny said. "He put me on the bed, then made me bend over with my feet on the floor and clipped my head."

Kenny wore only undershorts when he appeared at 3:30 a.m. Thursday at the apartment in nearby Santa Monica of John A. Negrey, 43, an aerospace

Negrey said the boy's wrists were taped with adhesive and a strip of adhesive dangled from his forehead. The boy was drowsy from sleeping pills given him by the kidnaper.

'I've Been Kidnaped'

"I've been kidnaped. Can I come in?" the boy

Negrey then learned that Kenny was the son of Herbert J. Young, 35, president of the \$423-million Savings and Loan Association of Beverly

A telephone call to the Young home released a torrent of joy and relief. "Hi, dad," Kenny said. "I'm all right. Come and

get me." Mrs. Young said she had been certain "deep down -here in my heart" that Kenny would be returned

Bound, Blindfolded

unharmed.

But she described the phone call as "the happiest

moment in my life." Her son said he had been left bound and blindfolded in a car parked in the basement garage of an apartment building in Santa Monica. Following instructions, he waited 30 minutes, then wiggled free of the bindings and ripped loose the bandages

He took an elevator to the street level and sought help at the nearest apartment,

The previous evening his father had paid the ransom in \$100 bills in a roadside meeting with a man who drove a 1965 white Chevrolet Impala.

Highest Ransom Paid

The FBI said the \$250,000 was the highest ransom ever paid in this country for a victim released unharmed. Serial numbers of the Federal Reserve notes were retained by the FBI.

Investigators said Young's description of the white Chevrolet is a prime clue. Police said it bore California license plates "NBD 770."

Although operating on the "lone kidnaper" theory, officers said they were not discounting the possibility that more than one person was involved. FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover assigned 300 agents and the full resources of his agency to the

Investigators were studying a composite drawing of a male Caucasian based on the boy's description of his kidnaper and the father's description of the man who picked up the ransom money. The Youngs have three other children, Jeffrey, 3. Gregory, 6, and an adopted daughter, Cathy, 3. All were asleep when Kenny was spirited away early Monday by way of an outside staircase at

the rear of the house. The staircase, which provides access to the patio and pool area, leads to a sliding glass door near Kenny's room.

Judge Rules Against Adam

WASHINGTON, (AP) - U.S. District Court Judge George L. Hart Jr. dismissed Adam Clayton Powell's suit for his seat in Congress today, holding that the court has no jurisdiction over what the House does about its membership. An immediate appeal was planned.

To order seating of the Negro Democrat from Harlem, the judge said, would be "to crash through the political thicket into political quicksand."

Hart also denied Powell's application for a three-judge court to hear the constitutional challenge of the resolution that excluded him.

The judge said the federal court does not have jurisdiction in the case.

QUICK APPEAL Herbert Reid, one of Powell's attorneys, said that the issue will be taken as quickly as possible to the U.S. Court of Ap-

Reid said he would file the appeal probably some time to-

"The doctrine of separation powers, which developed over a period of two millennia, is firmly embedded in the warp and woof of our Constitution,' Hart said in his decision.

Hart said for the court to decide the case and grant what Powell had asked "would constitute a clear violation of the doctrine of separation of pow-

DEFIED COURTS On that basis he accepted the core of the House defense against the action by the New

York Negro Democrat. The House excluded Powell on grounds he misused Education and Labor Committee funds. defied New York State courts in a defamation suit and was contumacious toward House committees that investigated him. He contends the House wrongfully established qualifications not required by the Constitution. Powell asked Hart to set up a three-judge panel to hear a con-

stitutional challenge to the resolution that excluded him. TUESDAY ELECTION The law authorizes a district judge to establish such a panel when an act of Congress is chal-

lenged. The House contends its resolution is not an act of Con-Powell, who will try to regain his seat in a special election Tuesday, also asked Hart for an

injunction ordering the House to seat him immediately. Thurs-day in Albany, New York's highest court ruled Powell could run for the 18th Congressional District seat.

HHH's Visit To Arch Spurs **More Fighting**

PARIS (AP) - Fighting broke out between police and anti-Vietnam demonstrators today as U.S. Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey went from talks with President Charles de Gaulle to the Arch of Triumph to lay a wreath on the tomb of France's unknown soldier:

A crowd massed around the arch when Humphrey arrived from Elysee Palace and sent up shouts of "U.S. murderers" and "Peace in Vietnam." Some displayed placards with the same

COPS MOVE IN Strong police reinforcements moved in and fighting broke out, but there appeared to be no serious injuries. Police hustled the demonstrators, including a number of students, into several police buses and took them

The fighting occurred where the Avenue Des Champs Elysee joins the Place de l'Etoile, a huge traffic circle. The broad traffic circle separated the Champs Elysee from the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, where Humphrey laid a wreath.

PEACE IN VIET Humphrey came from West Berlin, where noisy young demonstrators threw flour, a firecracker and beer glasses and waved a North Vietnamese flag outside two receptions Thursday night for the vice president. He was not hit and appeared unruf-

As Humphrey arrived at Orly Airport today, about 200 demonstrators set up shouts for "peace in Vietnam" as they stood on the roof the airport administration building several hundred yards from the honor salon where Humphrey stepped from his plane.

WASHINGTON (AP) Chances are fading fast that an increase in Social Security benefits will be in effect by July 1, the date suggested by President Johnson.

"Sept. 1 is a good date to think about," said one source deeply involved in the legislative handling of the bill.

.Congress is considered certain eventually to pass some legislation aligning payments more closely with today's cost of living. But benefit increases probably will not be initially as generous as the 20 per cent average increase Johnson proposed, nor will the payroll tax increase be as steep as such a boost would

by Baker, the onetime Senate aide whose outside dealings made him a millionaire, was sentenced today to a prison term of one to three years.

No fine was imposed. Baker could have been sentenced to as much as 48 years in prison and fined up to \$47,000.

The Justice Department said Baker would be eligible to apply for parole after one year if the sentence is upheld on appeal. SEVEN COUNTS

William O. Bittman, the government attorney who prosecuted the case, declined to comment on the sentence. Bittman first said that Baker would be eligible for parole after four months, but this later was cor-

Baker was convicted on seven counts on charges of income tax evasion, theft and conspiracy. U.S. District Court Judge Oliver Gasch sentenced him to one to three years on each count, with the sentences to run concurrent-

FREE ON BOND

Baker's attorney, Edward Bennett Williams, promptly announced the conviction and sentence will be appealed. Baker remained free on \$5,000 bond pending disposition of his ap-

Baker appeared before the court in a dark blue suit, a dark blue tie and a pale blue shirt. Both he and his attorney left the courtroom immediately after the sentencing and neither had any comment for reporters. 'FAIR TRIAL'

Bittman told the reporters he had gone over the whole record in the case and is sure Baker "recieved a very fair trial" and that the government had "prosecuted the case vigorously. Baker told a reporter who called his home here Thursday

trial, he said, he had been "looking after quite a few enterprises.

"I have plenty to keep me busy," he said. This has been his story since 1963, when he resigned as secretary to Senate Democrats after issues were raised about his financial dealings outside his

Senate job. He made \$19,600 a year at that post but also amassed a fortune he estimated once at \$2 million in various interests such

as law, real estate and motels. At one time, Baker's immediate superior was Lyndon B. Johnson, who was Senate Democratic leader before he became vice president and then Presi-

At his trial, Baker testified that then-Vice President John-

Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D-Okla., when Baker went to Johnson about his financial troubles. A big issue in the trial was

what Baker did with some \$100 -000 raised by California savings and loan company executives in 1962, ostensibly for political campaigns. Baker said he turned the money over to Kerr, who died in 1963. The government charged that Baker pocketed \$80,000 for his own use.

The jury found Baker guilty of all nonduplicating counts that the government had charged. This included evading some \$23,-000 in income taxes for 1961 and 1962, theft of the campaign funds, and conspiracy to defraud the government in its income tax collection by arranging with others to conceal funds meant for Baker.

Planes Shot Down In Fast Sky Battles

TEL AVIV, Israel, (AP) -While a tank battle raged below, Israeli Mirage jets and swift Syrian MIG21s slugged it out today in dogfights that Syria said swept over Damascus. Israel said six MIGs were shot down and Syria claimed two Mirages.

An Israeli spokesman said two MIGs were shot down in a morning battle and four after fighting in the skies resumed in the afternoon. He made no mention of Damascus and said all the Syrian planes were downed in the area of the Sea of Galilee, where the intense ground fighting was in progress

FIRST FIGHT Before the first air battle, Israeli and Syrian forces engaged in a long-range duel of tanks, artillery and mortars across the desert frontier south of the Sea of Galilee that continued into the afternoon.

The Israeli planes took off and succeeded in silencing three Syrian gun positions in strafing runs before they were jumped by the supersonic, Soviet-built MIGS, an Israeli spokesman said.

LOUD EXPLOSIONS By Syrian accounts, the air battle swirled up and over Damascus, where loud explosions were heard. These may have been caused by antiaircraft fire.

The city rattled to the sound of

guns and jet planes overhead. The Israeli spokesman, without saying the sky battle extended to Damascus, said two MIGS were downed and the action was broken off. He insisted no Mirages were lost.

A Syrian army communique disputed this and in turn said no MIGS were lost. It said four Israeli planes flew over Syria at a low altitude and were engaged by Syrian MIGS.

BAGGED In the ensuing dogfight, an Israeli plane was shot down and a second was bagged by antiaircraft fire near the scene of the fighting along the armistice

line, the communique added. The Israeli army said the fighting opened when Syrian guns fired on Israeli armored tractors working on the southeast shore of the Sea of Galilee. Syria said the tractors were accompanied by tanks, artillery and machine guns

TANKS DESTROYED Both sides then went into action with tanks, artillery, mortars and automatic weapons.

Syria's army communique said "two enemy tanks and three tractors were destroyed in the fighting. Our losses were confined to damage in the houses of some peasants in the hamlets of Nasserieh and Izzedin, with no casualties."

The Israeli spokesman said an Israeli soldier was wounded, two tractors were damaged and a Syrian tank was seen in flames. He also reported two buildings damaged by Syrian shells in the Tel Az Kazir settlement. Other Syrian shells fell in the Ha'on settlement.

In the air battle the spokesman said all the Israeli planes returned to base. It was not immediately known how many planes were involved in the ac-

made.

The body was unearthed on a tip received by Johnston County Sheriff Herman Ford. It was found near Bee, nine miles southeast of Tishomingo near the lake on the Oklahoma-Texas border.

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



The Too Easy Answer

The President has proposed an in-crease in postal rates to finance proposed increases in wages for postal

He suggests a one-cent increase on first class and airmail rates, and adjusting other rates. This is necessary to underwrite wage scales competi-tive with private industry, he says. Perhaps postal workers are in need of better rates of pay, but it should take more than this simple explanation to get approval of a general postal rate hike. Within the past three decades, rates have gone up 150 per

cent. Much of the burden has gone to the higher class of rates. There is a growing suspicion that junk rates ought to be brought up sharply.

There is a suspicion, too, that a considerable block of the high pay scales in private industries is coming from the segment supported wholly or in greater part by government contracts. This is making it increasingly difficult for operators not blessed with this largess to get competent help to exist. They, like the man who carries the mail sack, are getting the short end of the stick.

Experiment Worth Watching

A demonstration in sub-irrigation of land in the High Plains area is under way between a farmer and a gas company, which supplies many of the well power units. The five-acre plot for production of sorghum and a simflar one for sudan grass production is designed to cut irrigation labor by 90 per cent and water requirements by 50 to 70 per cent.

This requires a total of 67,300 feet of black polyethelene pipe, plus 66,000 feet of perforated lateral lines which will be about 18 inches under the surface. Cost of the system is esti-

mated at \$300 per acre.

At first blush this seems to be uneconomical, but if it can reduce labor costs by the factor mentioned, it would pay out in a few seasons, especially when the lifting charges on water is cut by half.

If the demonstration proves up an early payout, it should encourage widespread use. It would not only give the producers a considerable advantage in production costs, but it would provide the added - and even more significant - bonus of doubling the life of the water supply.

Democrats In Trouble On War Issue

MADISON, Wis .- Of the 17 Democratic senators who have been in one degree or another critical of administration policy on Vietnam on the doveish side, seven are up for re-election in 1968. With President Johnson at the head of the ticket they will all have their troubles if the war is still going on in standing aside from the Johnson line.

For Sen. Gaylord Nelson of this state it is a particularly tight trap. He has gone a long way in opposing the Vietnam war.

NOT ONLY on the war but on the agricultural front Nelson had to disassociate himself from the Johnson administration. Either he must get drastic action out of Washington to convince the farmers that the price slide will be reversed or he must carve out an independent stand. Either way it will be tough.

Add to this the deep split in the Democratic party between the Johnson-Humphrey and the Kennedy factions. They fought it out for the governorship nomination in the primary last year, with Patrick J. Lucey carrying the Kennedy banner and David Carley claiming the Johnson - Humphrey blessing. Lucey, who was lieutenant governor, won the primary with a majority of 100,000 and then went down in the Republican sweep as Gov. Warren Knowles was handily re-elected.

BUT THERE WAS one Democratic survivor who is the party's bright new star with an old and potent name. Bronson C. LaFollette was reelected Attorney General by about the same margin as in his first race in the Johnson landslide of 1964. The LaFollette name and the LaFollette tradition of pioneering social legislation are still strong in Wisconsin.

I have a friend who says he is an agnostic. Just what is an agnostic? He is a pretty opinionated U.F.H.

The fact is: there are two kinds of agnostics. The word means, "I don't know," or "unknowable." The one kind of agnostic (the true agnos tic) says that God is unknowable to him. The other denies that God is knowable to anyone. The first may be honest, and, indeed, thousands of people can say that, as far as they are concerned God is unknowable.

Obviously, your friend, being opinionated, as you say, is of the "nobody-knows-God variety." This is the same as saying, 'What I don't know can't be known.' It labels the great saints of the centuries as deluded and misguided men. It is an exclusive position which says what he doesn't know isn't worth knowing.

I respect an honest agnostic, and there are some. But an opinionated agnostic is often filled with self-importance, for he claims to be intellectually superior to too many people who are as smart or smarter than

A man at Harvard University told me publicly he was an agnostic, and didn't believe the Bible, I asked him if he had ever read the New Testament, and blushing, he admitted he hadn't. An intellectual will at least examine the evidence before he pronounces judgment. God has said, "Ye shall seek me and find me, when you search for me with all your heart." (Jeremiah 29:13).

AS FOR KNOWLES, he is cautiously keeping the options open. He can challenge Nelson for the Senate seat or he can try for a third twoyear term as governor. Caution is Knowles' watchword.

Confronted with the revolt of the dairy farmers, Knowles called for law and order. There is nothing a govercan do about milk prices. serves, and he wonders why Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman lowered the parity price last year.

THE FARM REVOLT is certainly not confined to Wisconsin. Sen. Milton Young (R., N. D.) took a poll last month similar to those that in the past have proved close to the mark. It showed Richard M. Nixon with 67 per cent, Johnson 33. Matched against Romney the President got 25 per cent of the straws, the Michigan governor 75. The sleeper was in the fil per cent for California's Ronald Reagan to 39 for LBJ.

In South Dakota Sen. George Mc-Govern faces the same kind of dilemma as Nelson in Wisconsin. Critical of Vietnam policy, McGovern was one of 17 senators calling on the President to continue the bombing pause in January, 1966. At the same time McGovern has conducted a valiant fight for an effective food-forpeace program and this may stand him in good stead with the farmers

ONE OF THE striking things about attitudes sampled in the farm states is that, as in the nation, support for the President's conduct of the war steadfly declines. But a step-up in the bombing gets over-whelming approval. This reflects the hope the bombers can save American lives on the ground and bring the war to an end. Get it over with, that is the longing rarely expressed openly that seems to sum up most attitudes. (Copyright, 1967, United Feature Syndicate, Inc.)

Does anyone know how a guy who doesn't have a cat, canary, dog, keeps fairly regular hours, loves peace and quiet can get a not too costly efficiency apartment?

No, no-don't say to me that Inside Apartments are taking names. Don't tell me to put my name on a list 10 feet long. This is serious. One day the condition may become criti-

LET ME tell my story (Mr. Apartment Manager, lend an ear just this once) and you be the judge. For over six months I have a bedroom and bath. No kitchen facilities.

It would be unfair and unkind to say that I have suffered. Eating out three and four times a day is funfor a couple of weeks.

When I first arrived in Big Spring sympathetic and understanding friends often invited me over for dinner. It was always a pleasure to accept. Seldom did free feedbags drop below two a week.

LAST MONTH I noticed a decline. It wasn't a seasonal drop.

An analysis of the situation helps the understanding, but it doesn't solve the problem. Food prices are going up. Money is getting harder to hold. Economy measures must be taken and it's natural that lonely, hungry, newsmen should feel the pinch first.

The fact that often I didn't know when to go home certainly contributed to the present predicament. Some buddy, for example would invite me over for dinner on a Friday night after he had called his wife and discovered he was two hours late.

WE WOULD get to his place in high spirits and totin' goodies. Our jovial moods would melt down the ittle woman, and we would wind up having a fine evening. Invariably the hour was late and the only alternative would be to stay overnight. I'm

always agreeable Saturday the hosts provided breakfast around noon. The afternoon would be spent in recalling some of the events of the previous day, and someone would always get an idea to have

WHILE THE friend's wife cleaned the house, I would shower and shave and try not to use more than two bath towels. While the wife showered and fixed up, friend and I amused ourselves by mixing things or running out for fresh supplies.

By the time Saturday night was old and ready to depart forever, we would all be fast friends. Of course, that always called for a cup of coffee for the road. Besides we had to go back to their place to get my dirty shirt,

ONE WORD would lead to another and pretty soon it would be too late to go home again. I like to get home on Sunday afternoon, though, and sort of get ready to go to work Mon-day and hit the ball. Seldom did I get a second invitation to a Friday night dinner.

Could be that I've worn out the welcome mat?

Holmes Alexander The Return Of Isolationism

WASHINGTON - History skips, rather than repeats. There was pre-Easter indication that the U.S. Senate, in one particular, relates the Vietnam War to World War I.

There is, to put a finer point upon more isolationism being generated today than at any time since the "Mr. Wilson War," as John Dos Passos has called it. Isolationism was an honorable term in its heyday. It should not be confused with ugly, stubborn, doctrinaire anti - Americanism which sometimes shows in times of stress nor with the brainless pacificism of Simple Simons and Nervous Nellies.

THERE WAS plenty of anti-Americanism in the Senate debates on Defense Department requests for additional money to support our fighting

Furthermore, there was plenty of pacificism. It is the senseless creed of non-resistance and non-violence in a world where such form of non-action becomes a national suicide complex. Three senators - Morse (D., Ore.), Gruening (D., Alaska) and Nelson (D., Wis.)-obstinately voted to refuse the \$12.1 billion supplemental appropriation which is necessary to keep our troops in guns and ammunition after the middle of this year.

BUT RABID anti-Americanism and prostrate pacificism are not the same thing as isolationism, which is the rather noble concept of staying out of other people's wars. The neo-isolationists of the Vietnam War era are statesmen who believe we shouldn't become needlessly involved in military operations overseas by the sheer

momentum and habit of meddling. One such statesman, Fulbright of Arkansas, is in bad repute today, but

some of his ideas are sound and will, I believe, become a building block for postwar policy. Fulbright has found that our foreign aid tends to make us unwitting allies of the governments that receive it.

FULBRIGHT is more right than wrong about this. His neo-isolationism is more the mood of the 90th Senate than is popularly supposed. During the same set of debates on military funding, there was a clearer example set forth by more reasonable senators than Fulbright generally is.

When the Armed Services Commitreported the bill, Chairman Russell of Georgia noted that he and his committeemen had disapproved funds for building the first seven of 30 Navy cargo vessels - "huge floating arsenals," Russell called them - to be deployed around the world for emergency supply of troops.

RUSSELL IS THE last man to countenance military unreadiness. He and his committee had approved most of the Defense Department's requests without a blink. His reason for eliminating this investment in forwardbased supply ships was not economical, but was a mixture of the psychological and philosophic.

Some nations, he said, would interpret the presence of an ever-ready invasion force as intimidation, and we ourselves would be prepositioning not only our forces but our decisions.

Here, then, in the midst of war, was the suggestion of postwar policy. If we ever get out of Vietnam, Russell was saying, let's try to stay out of other jungles. It was very much the language of isolationism, vintage 1918. (Distributed by McNaught Syndicate, Inc.)

David Lawrence The Postal Problem

WASHINGTON - The idea of establishing a government corporation to own and operate the postal service and its buildings has been suggested in one form or another several times before and has been ignored by Con-It may well be that Postmaster Gan-

eral Lawrence F. O'Brien's proposal in a speech this week that the government form such a corporation to take over the postal service was mere-ly a method of focusing attention on the formula or private ownership which requires that customers alone pay for the full cost of a service.

THE MEMBERS of the Senate and House, however, are not likely to permit any substantial increase in postal rates or give up their power of "pa-tronage," which enables them to have a voice in the selection of postmasters throughout the country as well as considerable influence in spending of federal funds for new postal buildings and other facilities in their own areas.

Indeed, from a political standpoint, more votes might be gotten by offering a free mail service to the citizens of the United States than to keep on increasing their postal rates.

UNFORTUNATELY the public knows little about the way the Post Office Department is managed. Some persons who have had experience at high levels inside the department say it is being inefficiently operated today. The annual deficit has risen from around 363 million dollars 12 years ago to 1.2 billions today. But the reasons for the "deficit" are not easy to analyze, because of the complicated system of bookkeeping that is used. Thus, for instance, a substantial part of the deficit is due to what is commonly called "junk mail" -letters not addressed to any individuals but to "occupants." Much of this "third-class" mail is sent out by businesses which find it a relatively inexpensive way to sell goods.

PUBLICATIONS get reduced rates in what is called "second-class mail privileges." Since government funds are about to be spent to support educational television, it is being argued that the printed word can be considered "educational" along with the spoken word.

Differences of opinion prevail as to how the mail delivery costs are figured. Certainly mail carriers are essential for the handling of "firstclass" mail and they can deliver other kinds of mail, too, without much extra expense.

THE ARGUMENT for years has been over what are equitable "second-class" or "third-class" rates. A disinterested and impartial commission is needed to examine the economic facts and come up with some recommendations as to how the postal service could be operated at the lowest possible expense and with greater efficiency. When such data have been obtained, it will be possible to see more clearly just what rates should be charged for the various classes of mail.

IF CONGRESS sets up a govern-ment corporation, the administration will still control the whole operation from year to year. If, on the other hand, Congress turns down the proposal, then pressure to increase postal rates of all kinds will unquestionably be exerted-as it has been-upon Congress, by the administration. The American people, however, will wonder whether in these days of virtually unlimited spending for "public wel-fare," a system might be worked out so that the American people would be able again to mail their letters with a two-cent stamp, as they used to in "the good old days."
