UN Mission Breaks Off Visit To Aden

ADEN (AP) — The U.N. mission to help the South Arabian Federation and Aden toward independence angrily broke off its visit today, charging the British with lack of cooperation. The three-man mission's sudden departure resulted from its refusal to deal officially with the British-backed South Arabian federal government and the government's retaliatory refusal to let the head of the mission, Manuel Perez Guerrero of Venezuela, make a policy statement on television. Guerrero said his group would deal only with the British as the administering power. "We will offer the mission every cooperation, but they must deal with the federal government direct," said acting

PORT ARTHUR, Tex. (AP) — Johnny Hebert, 8, was found drowned early today in a 20-foot deep water-filled sandpit. The boy had been missing since Thursday afternoon when he failed to return home from school.

Post Office Work Starts

ACKERLY — Thirteen months after the post office department announced that a new post office building was to be provided for Ackerly, the contractor today began pouring the foundation for the building.

Travis Russell, postmaster, said that the job got under way Friday morning. The announcement of the plans for the building were released by the department March 10, 1966.

The building will occupy a tract of land acquired over a year ago by the post office department. The site is just north of the present post office building. The location is on the east side of First Street between Avenue G and Avenue H.

The plans call for the construction of a building with 1,000 square feet of floor space and 7,820 square feet of surfaced parking area. The building is being constructed under a plan by which the department leases the structure and land from the builder.

Two Wanted Here Held Elsewhere

Arthur L. Miller, wanted here for felony swindle, is being held by the U.S. marshal's office in Fort Worth, A. N. Standard, sheriff, said today. Standard said that an effort to bring the man here will be made when the federal authorities are through with him.

Progress Reported In Trucking Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal mediators pressed for nearly round-the-clock talks today between the Teamsters Union and the trucking industry in an effort to reach a national contract agreement. Sources reported some progress in the all-night negotiations that ended at 4:30 a.m. today.

Gina's Thigh Not Obscene

ROME (AP) — Actress Gina Lollobrigida, 39, was acquitted Thursday by an appeals court of obscenity charges stemming from the film "Le Bambole" (The Dolls).

A five-judge tribunal interrupted its hearing to go to a nearby theater and see for itself — projected bigger than life on the screen — the exposed Lollobrigida right thigh that had caused the legal action.

The judges returned to their courtroom and deliberated for two hours, after which they held she had committed the minor infraction of offending public decency but was not guilty of the more serious charge of taking part in an obscene spectacle. The court then granted an amnesty.

The judges' decision applied to French actor Jean Sorrel, director Mauro Bolognini and Producer Gianni Hecht Lucari, as well as to Miss Lollobrigida.

The thigh-revealing sequence brought a charge of public obscenity against the Italian actress and conviction last Nov. 5 at the city of Vierbo.

She, Sorrel, Bolognini and Lucari were each sentenced to two months imprisonment and fined 40,000 lire (\$64). The jail terms and fines were suspended.

Pedestrian Killed

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Elisardo C. Mejia, 33, was struck and killed early today by a truck as he walked down a San Antonio street.

More talks are scheduled for 1 p.m. Trucking Employers Inc., reported it had raised its offer of a three-year wage increase to 44 cents an hour from its previous 37-cent offer. But the union reportedly had not significantly dropped from its last reported demand of 56 cents an hour.

Numerous fringe benefits, working conditions and new trucking equipment demanded by the union also are involved in the negotiations.

The Teamsters national contract covering 450,000 workers in 12,000 firms represented by trucking employers expired at midnight last Friday. The union has been free to strike since then.

But trucking industry officials have threatened to counter with a lockout at 1,500 of the nation's biggest companies if the Teamsters strike even a few of the firms.

Chief federal mediator William E. Simkin told both sides it is vital to the nation's interest for them to continue talks and trucking operations until a contract agreement is reached.

At Simkin's insistence, the negotiators remained at the bargaining table from 10 a.m. Thursday until recessing early today, breaking only for meals.

Government officials continued efforts to head off a threatened strike by six shopcraft unions next Wednesday against 138 railroads. Among those meeting with both sides Thursday was Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz.

Head-On Fatality

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Mrs. Lillian Marie May, 58, of Campbellton died Thursday night in Santa Rosa hospital of injuries suffered in a two-car head-on collision Sunday near Three Rivers in which another person was killed.

More Champions In Spelling Bee

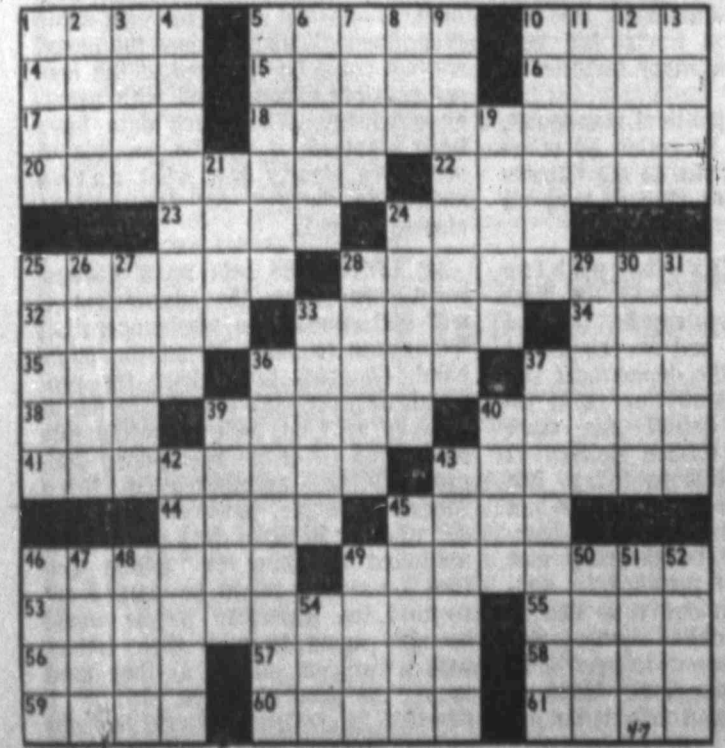

FOR TAX INCREASE PLAN Discount Rate Slash Might Spell Trouble

WASHINGTON (AP) — The first drop in the Federal Reserve discount rate in more than 6½ years could spell more trouble for the administration's plan for a 6 per cent surtax on corporate and most individual incomes.
The board, in a dramatic move Thursday which could signal a further general easing of credit and lower interest rates, dropped the discount rate from 4.5 to 4 per cent over most of the country effective today.
But Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., chairman of the Senate House Economic Committee, said the action should reinforce opposition to the surtax plan designed partly to stem inflationary pressure expected by government economists later this year.
MISTAKE?
Proxmire said softening business conditions demanded the unanimous action taken Thursday by the board for 10 of its 12 districts. Although the Atlanta and St. Louis districts failed to seek a lower discount rate, they are expected to follow suit.
If government policy now is aimed at stimulating the economy, Proxmire said, "it would be a mistake to shove up taxes that would discourage business expansion at the same time we reduce interest rates to encourage business."
The Treasury Department

welcomed the discount action as a sign of a "desirable further easing of credit availability and interest rate levels." The administration has sought lower interest rates.
Some government experts said the lower discount rate would act as a stimulant to the economy which is now more sluggish than the administration anticipated. This could give the administration stronger economic data to present to Congress later this spring in defending its surtax plan.
LOWER INTEREST
A lowering in the discount rate normally means lower interest rates for businessmen seeking loans and for consumers buying houses, automobiles and other goods on the installment plan.
Just how fast the lower discount rate might be felt on consumer loans is open to conjecture. One New York banker said loan demand still is good but in time consumers should be able to borrow money more cheaply.
The discount rate is the charge made by the Federal Reserve for funds borrowed by its more than 6,000 member banks to improve their reserve positions. Other interest rates are pegged upward from it.
The board said its action was in line with recent declines in interest rates and in keeping with its policy of assuring enough credit to permit orderly economic growth.
Banks have already lowered their prime lending rate from last year's peak 6 per cent to 5.5 per cent. This is the rate banks charge their most favored customers, usually corporations, for loans.

Local 231 refused what the Master Plumbers Association called its final offer, believed to be an increase of about 60 cents per hour over three years.
The union scale is now \$4.30 per hour.

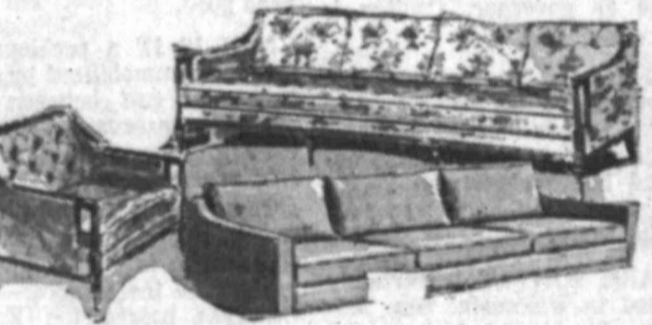

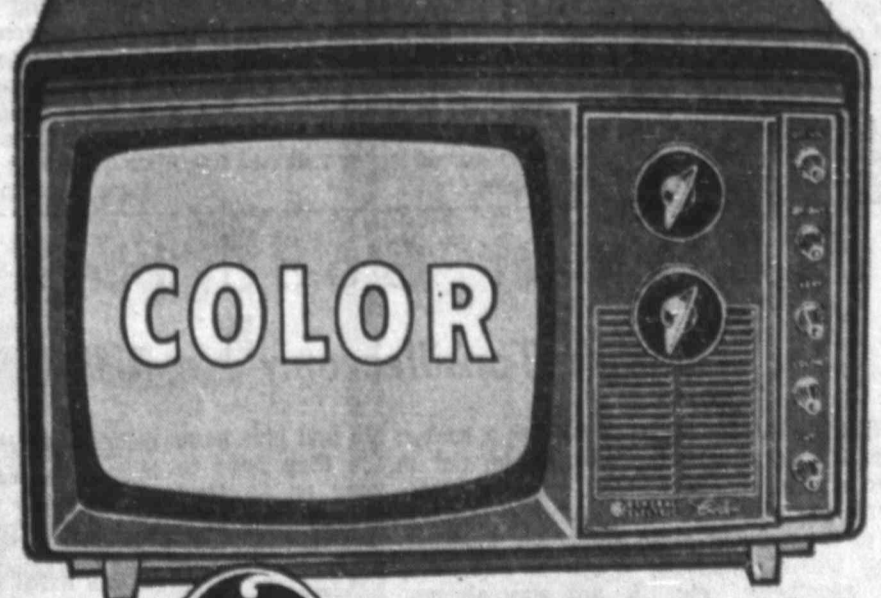

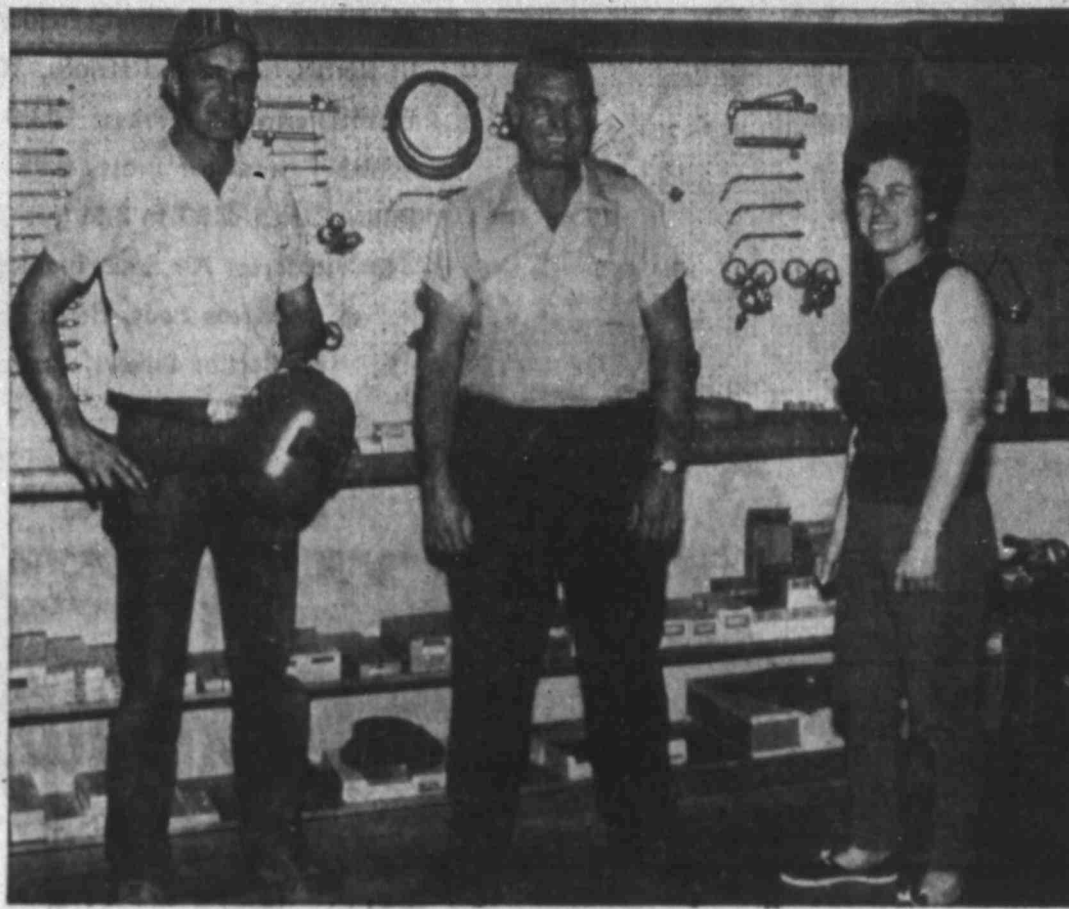

LSD User Now Dead

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—"Mother, I've blown my mind," Roy Buehl, 22, told his mother one day, admitting he had been using LSD, the psychedelic drug, for six months. Now, he is dead.

His body was found last Monday by Mexican officials on the beach near Ensenada in Baja California. A bullet was in his head, a pistol at his side. It was suicide, his mother said.

"Perhaps some young person, perhaps many, can learn from this tragedy," his mother, Mrs. Roy N. Buehl, said Thursday.

She said she was shocked when her son told her he had been on LSD. "After all," she added, "he had all the advantages of wealth and good schools. And he was popular and a leader with a creative and incisive mind."

Mrs. Buehl's late husband was San Francisco manager of the telephone company. He died in 1963.

Transportation Meeting Slated

Some 250 Department of Defense Transportation and storage officials in the United States have been scheduled to attend a three-day seminar at Dallas, April 25, 26, 27.

The April 25 meeting will be specifically for representatives of the civilian industry transportation and storage organizations only.

Delegates will participate in panel discussions concerning objectives, policies and problems of traffic management, commercial transportation and non-temporary storage of military household goods as governed by the Department of Defense personal property program. Suggestions will be sought to effect improvement in the program for the mutual benefit of the department and civilian industry.

40 Cases Filed In March

Forty civil cases, of other types than divorce or annulments, were filed in 118th District Court in March — an unusually large number of such petitions.

As a result of these 40 cases, plus 28 new divorce suits, the docket books of the court wound up the month 10 cases larger than when March 1 ushered in the period.

In all there were 68 new cases filed in the court. The starting number was 1,036. At peak, there were 1,104 cases on the books. The month ended with 1,046.

The month began with 213 divorce petitions on file. Twenty-eight new petitions were filed. This was countered by 14 decrees issued by the court and seven cases dismissed. The total April 1 was 220.

There were 461 civil suits other than divorce suits on file March 1. Sixteen of these were tried before the court, one was tried before a jury, and nine were dismissed. This left 476 on hand when the month ended.

Criminal cases decreased by 11 during the month. Five were tried before the court, six were dismissed, and one was tried by a jury.

There were five annulments on file March 1 and the same number when the month ended. There were 30 tax suits pending at the outset of the month. The same total stood on April 1.
