Bingo Buffs NY To Hire Gal Spies

NEW YORK (AP) - Bingo cheaters beware! The city is set to hire housewives as spies and, if they spot skullduggery, your number will be up. License Commissioner Joel J. Tyler, announcing the plan Sunday, said the women will be undercover agents.

"I'm going to send teams to particular games in each of the boroughs," he said. "It isn't that we suspect any widespread cheating, but some bingo fans become real experts in playing this game. So expert that they win all the time, and they win because they've learned how to cheat."

Buffs Big Spenders

As for the female spy squad, Tyler commented, "I'm not going to say publicly how many we're going to hire."

The commissioner said the city realized \$800,-000 in fees from bingo games last year and quoted a report saying New York State bingo buffs spent \$30.8 million in 1964.

The state gets a \$12.50 fee and the city \$10 for each "occasion" at which the game is played. Bingo games are conducted by many religious organizations and clubs, with volunteers running the games.

Extra Cash To City

Tyler told of his bingo spy plans on the With radio program "New York Speaks Out."

Plans call for the women agents to work two nights a week. They'll be paid \$20 a night to play bingo and observe. If they lose, they'll be reim-bursed. If they win, the extra cash goes to the city.

The women will make no arrests. They will report irregularities to the License Department. Department inspectors will take it from there. The women selected will receive one week's training from the state Bingo Control Commission.

Flimsies Fail

Bingo is a form of lottery. Numbers are drawn and announced. Players may hold one or more cards and mark the numbers when they appear on their cards. A set of five numbers running horizontally, vertically or diagonally wins.



The tornadoes 'roared upon them in the midst of heavy rains and nearing dusk, which apparently prevented them from watching the skies closely. Witnesses said the Waseca warning siren began blaring a couple of minutes after the tornado had passed.

One of the first on the scene at Waseca was Arthur Kost, whose ambulance service in Mankato took two ambulances to the stricken town of 6,100 some 25 miles to the east.

DECAPITATED-"I picked up two dead people, one of whom was almost decapitated," said Kost. "I saw several cars that had been knocked around like balls. At first, the hospital was a mass of confusion. People were sitting on chairs and lving on stretchers. Five were killed in Waseca and two were critically hurt and taken to a Rochester_hospital.

Police searched the wrecked area today but reported no additional dead or injured.

More than- 60 persons were treated for injuries and 14 remained hospitalized in Waseca. Police said eight Waseca homes were destroyed and about 30 others were damaged. some severely, on the south side, of Clear Lake, where the twister hit. Many cars were damaged.


National Guard units were on duty guarding the twister-damaged area, a stretch about two blocks wide and eight blocks long in the southeast part of town. The twister skipped over-Clear Lake and struck homes on the other side.

A More Pressing Matter

It would be interesting to know what South Vietnamese Premier Nguyen Cao Ky had in mind when he announced that work had started on a fortified barrier just below the demilitarized zone, from the South China Sea about 15 miles inland. He may just have succumbed to the Maginot Line syndrome, no respecter of youth or middle-age.

He can scarcely have any illusions about his own capacity to do the job. Even if he could spare the troops from other sectors, especially from the Mekong Delta area, he could not be sure that they would prove reliable. Certainly the best officers are in no mood to be exiled to that lonely. land near the 17th Parallel.

Furthermore, a fortified barrier would have to be a lot longer than 15 miles to serve as a deterrent to infiltration of North Vietnamese troops. It would be easy to bypass the coast That is precisely what is being done

now, by way of Laos and Cambodia An effective line, with almost continuous barbed-wire entanglements, mine fields and strong points would be astronomically expensive. Some of our military experts suggest that a truly dependable fortified barrier would require a half-million' troops to man it.

Then, if Ky has read his history he will know that the French tried a number of similar variations in the war against the Vietminh. None of them worked for long.

Whatever his motives, Ky should know that a leak proof string of fortifications, something more than 600 miles long to include the border areas of Laos and Cambodia, is simply not in the cards. At least a half-million more U.S. troops would be needed for that job

Ky will do better to concentrate on the difficult, demanding and costly job of bringing the Mekong Delta under control of the Saigon government.

Reform Or Revolt

For many years South American leaders have repeated a litany learned by heart, so that meaning and comprehension have long since been lost. They insist that redistribution of wealth, land reform, education and better housing are essential to a stable Latin America. Having said it, they immediately return to business as usual.

President Eduardo Frei of Chile went to the recent hemisphere presidents conference in Punta del Este, Uruguay, grimly determined to remind his colleagues that words without action invite catastrophe. If there is not basic reform by consent, he believes, violent revolution is not faroff

. UNFORTUNATELY, many of the critics not only are misinformed, but they do not examine carefully what has actually been said by the spokesmen for the United States government.

Thus, the real complaint of the administration is that the speeches and statements of the critics are being regarded in Hanoi as a sign of American dissension and disunity and are.

This is, of course, but another way of saying that the critics are giving "aid and comfort" to the enemy. To many persons the phrase is synonymous with the concept of treason.

EVEN IN THE face of the serious damage to the American cause in Vietnam resulting from the speeches and statements by the dissenters at home, there has not been the slightest indication from. any administration source that it wishes to squelch dissent or otherwise interfere with freedom of speech. What the critics overlook is that the right of rebuttal is equal in importance to the right of dissent. The Washington Post said editorially last Thursday:

"The government of a free society has no right to suppress, restrain or punish dissent; but it is under no obligation to refrain from reply or rebuttal."

On the same day, the Washington Star commented:

"DISSENT IS not an exclusive prerogative of senators, nor are they entitled to any special immunity when they choose to dissent . . . The dis-senting senators have no right to stifle dissent from those who disagree with them."

One of the most significant statements by any of the critics was made by the Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, in a speech at a meeting in Norwalk, Conn., sponsored by church groups, Dr. Blake, general secretary of the World Council of Churches and for many years a leader in the Presbyterian Church in America, came closer than anybody else to demanding that the United States stop the fighting and surrender to the enemy. He outlined these four points as peace terms

The strangest thing about the whole controversy is that the critics pay no attention to the indefatigable efforts of the United States government over many months to get the enemy to negotiate. They seem to think that the only way to attain peace is by abject surrender, with no guarantee that South Vietnam will not be overrun by Communist forces as selfgovernment is denied the people. The New York Stock Exchange Index is now at an all-time high. Last Thursday it reached \$51.45, topping the previous high of \$51.06 on Feb. 9. 1966. It closed the week with still another record at \$51.54. In fact, since the low of Oct. 7, 1966, it has risen 30 per cent.

These high averages certainly do not reflect the present economy, which has been more sluggish than in almost any period in the past six years. But presumably they represent an expectation of the future.
